Hurricane Strikes Coast, Centering On Freeport

A full-scale hurricane struck the Central Texas coast Saturday night, centering its furious winds and rain on industrial Freeport, 80 miles due south of Houston.

The Houston weather bureau reported at 11:15 p. m. (CWT) that winds in excess of 75 miles an hour tore across the sandy beaches at Freeport.

Communications with that city failed and no word of the damage there, if any, was forthcoming. A source which would not permit quotation said that two relief trains had managed to leave the city before the storm struck and that a third, sent in to take out evacuees, had not been heard from.

LONDON, Aug. 29 (AP)—American flying fortresses made their seventh raid on the Nazi-held continent today without suffering loss, following up the RAF's night attack with hundreds of bombers on Nuremberg, carnival city of Nazis, and Saarbrücken, the sprawling industrial and railroad center.

Axis Supply Assembly Points Are Raided

CAIRO, Egypt, Aug. 29 (AP)—United States medium bombers and British naval and RAF planes have struck hard blows at axis supply shipping and centers where reinforcements were being assembled for a new battle expected soon, it was reported tonight.

The U. S. bombers, cooperating with British naval planes, bombed an axis airport in the El Daba area last night.

RAF heavy and medium bombers at the same time smashed at shipping in Tobruk harbor, leaving at least two ships on fire and one or two others damaged.

At Least 71 Jap Planes Knocked Out Of Air

The six islands which the marines now hold and on which they had overcome all major opposition by noon August 30 (the landing operations started early August 7) were named as Guadalcanal, which has airfield facilities which the Japanese had almost completely developed; Tulagi, with its magnificent harbor; and the adjacent islands of Gavutu, Tanamengo, Makambo and Florida.

The Japanese communiqué, apparently based on earlier information, said the Japanese garrison at Sungey was "facing annihilation."

On the Chekiang-Kiangtong front to the north, the Chinese communiqué said Chushien and Lishui, both within easy air range of Japan, were recaptured Friday morning.

The Soviet communiqué said the "stubborn fighting continues" northwest of Stalingrad and that "the enemy regardless of losses keeps on attacking our positions."

The USAF bombardiers, accompanied by fighters, loosed their loads over the German airbase at Wevelghem, near Courtrai, Belgium. The raid was accompanied by diversionary sweeps of American fighters, and all planes returned safely from the full operation.

The British also were active today, making sharp attacks on Ostend and Lille. The RAF lost 30 bombers last night, and two bombers and a fighter failed to return today—but the damage to Hitler's war potential was considered a liberal dividend for the expenditure.

Nuremberg and Saarbrücken both have major war industries. When the raiders left, their big black wings were lighted by big fires at both cities. The daylight attacks were on docks at Ostend and power stations in the Lille-Lens area.

Nuremberg is specially dear to Hitler, for he staged his Nazi party spectacle there years ago. The bombing force of 300 to 400 planes centered its heaviest attack on that city, but the air ministry said the attack on Saarbrücken was "hardly less strong."

Navy Needs Your Binoculars

Have you done anything about your binoculars yet?

The U. S. navy wants them—needs them badly in spite of the excellent response to its appeals. Because of the lack of highly-trained personnel necessary for the manufacture of these precision instruments, the maximum production remains insufficient for the requirements of the rapidly expanding armed forces. For that reason, the navy must

look to private owners for glasses—must ask them to sell binoculars to the navy department for \$1. At the war's end, these glasses, if still in service, will be returned. The navy cannot, however, promise to replace or pay for binoculars lost at sea.

Here are the important points:

1. Because of repair conditions, only 7x50, 8x50, 7x35, 8x35, 8x56 of the Zeiss or Bausch and Lomb type and 6x30 military binoculars

manufactured for the navy in the last war can be used.

2. It has been requested that only those types in good condition be forwarded direct by the donor to the Naval Observatory in Washington, D. C., for inspection and acknowledgment.

3. Binoculars being sent the navy for the duration should be carefully packed with necessary identification firmly attached (owner's name and address) and shipped to the Naval Observatory, Washington, D. C.

4. If the glasses are acceptable \$1 as payment in full will be mailed to the donor as soon as possible. Otherwise the glasses will be returned.

5. If the binoculars are available after the war, they will be returned to the donors and the \$1 previously paid the owner will constitute rental and depreciation charges.

6. The navy would like to keep a complete record of all other binoculars offered as to manufacture, type, power and objective opening or aperture. It is suggested that would-be donors of types other than those acceptable at the present time forward this information by letter to the Public Relations office, Eighth Naval District, Federal Building, New Orleans.

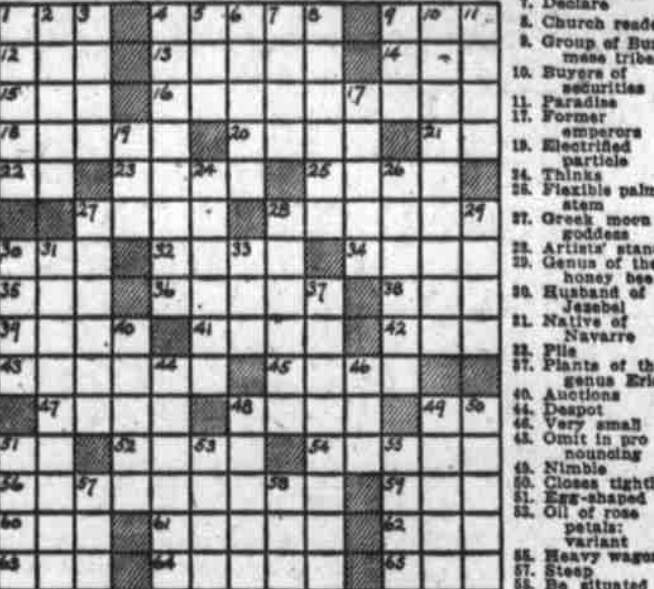

Spitfires Prove Superiority Over German Planes

AT AN RAF SPITFIRE BASE IN THE DESERT, Egypt, Aug. 27 Delayed—UP—British Spitfires in the hands of crack RAF formations composed of British, Canadian, Australian, New Zealand, Argentine and Trinidad pilots have proved to be the masters of Messerschmitts in the month the Allied fliers have been undertaking large-scale operations here, persons in close touch with the desert war said today.

These sources, who can not be identified by name, gave this picture of the latest phase of the fighting in the air:

In recent weeks Messerschmitt 109-Fs repeatedly have run away from these craft. American-made Kittyhawks and Tomahawks and British Hurricanes are a match for the Messerschmitts at lower altitudes. But these supercharged Spitfires climb 30,000 feet and are still full of fight up there.

This has altered air fighting in Africa completely. The Messerschmitts used to stay above a certain altitude, jockeying for position for fights against the Tomahawks, Kittyhawks and Hurricanes which had to stay a little below.

But now the Messerschmitts may find themselves sandwiched between Hawks and Hurricanes ascend higher still.

Thus the air war over the desert in the past months has climbed to new heights, and with still later models of American and British planes being turned out may soon

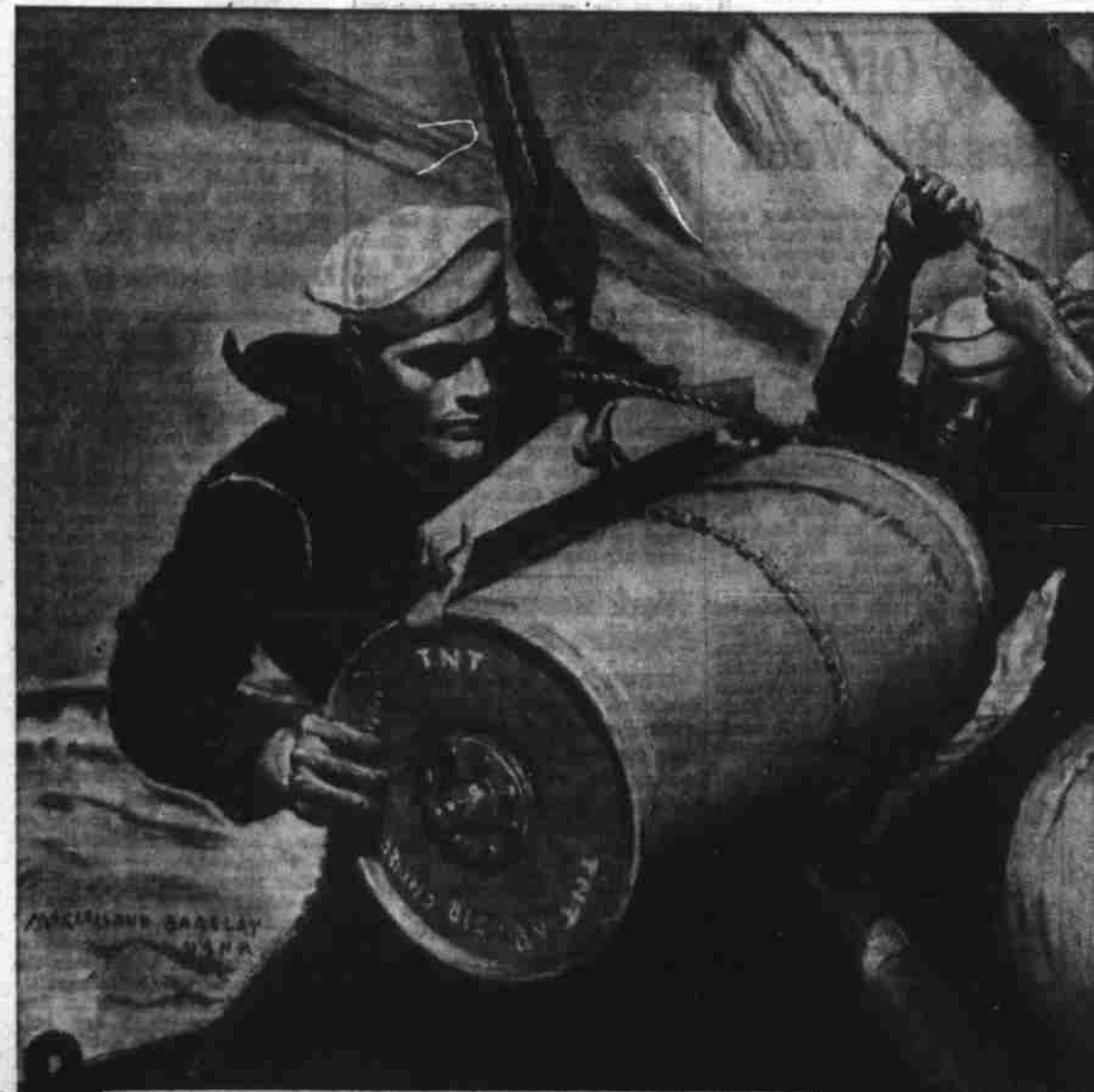

Happy Hunting--For A Few Axis Scalps

WASHINGTON—The American Indian is on the warpath again. Seven per cent of his eligible manpower is in uniform to give him, according to the Bureau of Indian Affairs, the largest percentage for any race represented in the U. S. armed forces.

On an average 500 Indians are entering the service each month, answering both the call of country and of tribe. For the red man has his own tomahawk to grind. The Iroquois Confederacy of the Six Nations has formally declared war on the Axis. So have the Cheyennes, who call the Axis "The Unholy Alliance."

As soon as the selective service act went into effect, Indians reported at the induction centers—many with their own rifles. Already their number approaches the 5,000 who served in World War I, when their valor won them citizenship.

In That Other War
Then their "representation in camp and actual warfare furnished a ratio to population unsurpassed and unequalled by any other race or nation," in the words of Representative O'Connor of Montana. Indians subscribed to \$25,000,000 in Liberty Bonds. Otis

Leader, a Choctaw, was designated the typical American soldier and his portrait was hung in the French federal building in Paris. This generation of Indian soldiers (the Army gets most of

them) is out to do as well or better.

Chee Dodge, last of the Navajo war chiefs, bought \$20,000 worth of war bonds. At Willow Springs Camp, Okla., Indian CCC enrollees purchased \$295 worth of war stamps from their canteen fund, and distributed the stamps among members.

More High Finance
When Lt. William Schick, white friend of the James Indians of New Mexico, was killed at Pearl Harbor, the tribal dancers appeared in war bond rallies. An 11-year-old Indian boy in Porcupine, S. D., sells back to his friends the marbles he wins from them, and buys war stamps with the proceeds. Alaskan Indians own \$110,645 worth of war bonds, biggest purchase from that territory. One Alaskan tribe offered free land for an air base.

The women are doing all right, too. A score of Indian girls are working in Washington war agencies. Laughing Eyes, a 29-year-old Creek, was among the first to storm a recruiting office in New York for enlistment in the Women's Army Auxiliary Corps.

In The WAACS, Too
Mrs. Villa Tinker Rippel, sister of Gen. Clarence L. Tinker of the Osage tribe who was lost at Midway, was accepted as a candidate for WAAC officer training at Des Moines. Another WAAC candi-

date, Arline Seneca, has a sister, Vivian, who is an Army nurse at Panama.

Forty Chippewa women organized a rifle brigade to be ready to pop off parachutists. In North Carolina, Indian women familiar with farming but not farm machinery have learned to operate and repair the machinery as their men go off to war. A Seneca miss, Bernice Bluey, is a machinist in an eastern war plant.

Education and experience of the Indian have advanced since the last war. Even then, he showed an outstanding ability to resist mental strain. It is notable too that few of the many Indians serving in this war have been killed. All his training and instincts serve to make him a good soldier.

Albaugh Test Is Spudded

Ray Albaugh No. 1 T. L. Higginbotham, scheduled 5,200-foot wildcat in Dawson county, CSW, SE 5-H EL&RR, spudded last week and was reported drilling past 1,600 feet in redbeds.

The test is in extreme northern Dawson county, eight miles northeast of the Welch pool, which lies northwest of Lamesa. It is almost directly west of O'Donnel.

In Scurry county, the Humble No. 1 Newman, a wildcat scheduled for 8,500 feet, drilled below 3,030 feet in lime. Location is in the southwest quarter of section 258-97, H&TC, nine miles north-west of Snyder.

Operators were abandoning the Magnolia No. 1 Earl B. Powell, Martin county wildcat eight miles north of Stanton. It was credited with topping the Clear Fork section of the Permian lime at 5,790 feet, 3,045 feet below sea level. Total depth was 8,835 feet in black shale. Location was in the center of the southwest quarter of the southeast quarter of section 18-35-1n, T&P.

Local Firm Makes Wage Adjustment

DALLAS, Aug. 29—Restitution totaling \$972.86 has been made to 45 employees of C. H. McAllister, engaged in oil well servicing and hauling, with main offices at Big Spring and branches at Odessa, Monahans and Hobbs, N. M., representing the difference between wages and overtime pay received, and what they were entitled to under the fair labor standards act, it was announced today by Gus C. Street, Jr., regional director of the wage and hour division, U. S. Department of Labor, for Texas, Arkansas, Oklahoma and New Mexico.

In announcing the payment, Street pointed out that the company made restitution without the necessity of court action. This policy has been approved by the administrator of the wage and hour division in cases where investigation discloses that employers did not intentionally or willfully violate the law and where no aggravated circumstances of any kind are present.

Gandhi's Campaign Of Civil Disobedience Quelled On Surface, Spreads Underground

By PRESTON GROVER

NEW DELHI, Aug. 29 (AP)—Mohandas K. Gandhi's movement of civil disobedience appears to be spreading underground after three weeks of surface demonstrations in which disorder, suppressed in India's big cities, continued to boil in the villages.

From underground channels has been distributed a secret set of instructions to Gandhi's followers to concentrate their shutdown activities on the "first 30 cities" of India, declaring that "our activities should see that the climax of the movement, both in rural and urban India, is reached four weeks from now."

A government communique today reported six Indians killed and 38 injured when officers fired into a disorderly crowd around a police station in Patna province. But such incidents were not being duplicated in the cities this week-end.

An indication that authorities were less concerned about possible violence in the cities was seen in the fact Gandhi's son Devadas, managing editor of the Hindustan

Times, was freed by a magistrate who heard charges that the younger Gandhi had violated defense regulations.

New instructions to the passive resistance leaders emphasized that the all-India Congress party wanted no disorders.

"None of our activities should be such as to endanger human life, whether Indian or British," it was stated by pamphlets which were being circulated quietly.

"We will die, great leader, but we will also do. We will free Gandhi before he fasts. Long live free India."

As the movement ended its fourth week, increasing numbers of Gandhi's followers were in jail and the authorities were following a policy of keeping his name out of the public press under the theory "out of print out of mind."

Many British believed stern suppression methods had the congress party "on the run," but numbers of Indians, including some of the highest ranking industrialists and many Americans long resident in the country, considered that the movement had just begun and

that its most serious effects were likely to show up in the next few weeks.

Agitators seem always to be about. I was walking along a Bombay street when an Indian in the congress cap and white cotton homespun walked alongside until sure he had correctly read "U. S. Correspondent" on my shoulder tab and then quietly slipped the printed copy of a propaganda sheet into my hand. He slipped away into the crowd.

Generally, Indian papers are permitted to publish only information appearing in official communiques concerning the movement, but their editorial comment is extraordinarily free.

Barring the presence of large numbers of uniformed men, India in most respects appeared to be a perfectly normal, peaceable country.

Stores and hotels were open in Bombay. The Friday night cabaret dance at the fashionable but outmoded Taj Mahal hotel is so popular that it is necessary to make bookings days in advance to attend. The Poona racing sea-

son is one of the most successful of recent years.

The numbers game gambling is immensely popular in Bombay, just as it is in New York's Harlem, with chauffeurs, porters, peddlers and laundry men betting a few annas of their scanty earnings.

The bright spot of the past week was the unquestioned Indian enthusiasm over the American victory in the Solomon Islands fighting.

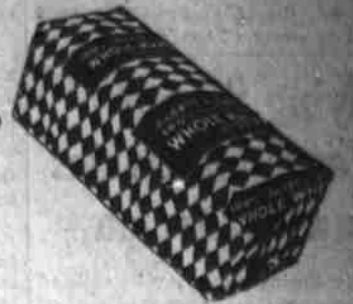

In summarizing the gains made August 1, the navy said, "our operations resulted in heavy loss to the enemy in both men and aircraft, loss of control of all vital positions in the Guadalcanal-Tulagi area and the loss of large quantities and supplies when positions were surrendered."

That night and next morning, while the marines were continuing their attack and enemy ground forces were retreating.

Jap Airfields Captured, All Resistance Overcome

Including these 12 planes, the navy said that during the August 7 and 8 air actions "our carrier-based aircraft and anti-aircraft batteries, in addition to dive bombing enemy shore batteries and supply centers, shot down 47 enemy planes of different types."

By sundown August 8 the American position on Guadalcanal had been expanded and the Japanese airfield had been captured, and resistance on Tulagi, Gavutu and Tanam-Bogo had been overcome.

loading, supplies and equipment were being rapidly unloaded from ships and sent ashore for the strengthening of positions.

At noon August 8 the enemy made the third heavy air assault, sending over at least 60 torpedo planes to attack the American naval units in the harbor. One destroyer and a transport which had been unloaded were hit, but the enemy lost 12 planes to ships' anti-aircraft and carrier-based fighters and two more to the fire of shore batteries.

The enemy made an attempt by sea to smash the offensive the night of August 8-9, sending in a force of surface vessels to assault the transports and cargo ships which were still unloading. The American supporting warships intercepted the attacking force, however, and put them into retreat. Both sides suffered damage but the navy gave no details of this.

"By nightfall August 9 unloading operations had been completed and our transports and cargo ships left the area," the communiqué said.

Red Cross Has Man On Duty At Air School

Max J. Elue, field director for American Red Cross, has arrived for duty at the Big Spring Army Flying School.

He came here from Mineral Wells where he was on the staff of eight Red Cross representatives serving Camp Wolters.

Blue will serve in the capacity of liaison agent between the military and the folks back home, working directly with soldiers to help work out knotty problems.

Appeals for emergency leave are checked by the military with the Red Cross, and in bona fide cases, loans may be made by Red Cross to the soldier to respond to the call. Red Cross also handles other types of emergency loans to soldiers, such as advancing money so that a dire situation back home may be overcome.

Occasionally, when a homesick youngster slips away or overstays his leave, the Red Cross gets in touch with the chapter in his home town, suggesting that he be contacted and induced to return at once to his post. Legion are the cases where AWOL men thought better of skipping, thanks to Red Cross, and went back to much less discipline than when their cases are turned over to the military police for necessary action.

Besides these, Red Cross will maintain other services for the men to be stationed at the Big Spring Army Flying School, all of them dealing with welfare and morale problems.

Axis Offensive Is Apparently Delayed

WITH THE ALLIED FORCES IN THE WESTERN DESERT, Aug. 29 (AP)—The anticipated axis offensive in the Egyptian desert appeared tonight to have been postponed, perhaps because of the strong Russian counterattacks west and northwest of Moscow.

It is considered possible here that the Germans, weak in the air in Africa in recent months, had planned to fly several hundred planes to Egypt to back up their land forces and have been unable to do so because of developments in Russia.

Highway Travel Drops One-Third

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29 (AP) — An average reduction of more than one-third in highway motor

travel throughout the country and a sharp drop in state gasoline tax revenues, due to conservation of tires, gasoline and motor vehicles, was indicated today in a report by the public roads administration.

Taxis Under Sharp Govt. Restrictions

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29 (AP) — The government clamped strict regulations on the taxicab industry today in order to save tires, gasoline and vehicles.

In an order estimated to affect at least 50,000 vehicles, the Office of Defense Transportation practically froze the industry in the hands of present operators, and put new sharp restraints on their operations.

The order, effective September 1, forbids cruising for the purpose of picking up passengers; prohibits the making of commercial deliveries of property.

Other prohibitions include a maximum speed limit of 40 miles an hour, or any lower maximum limit in the jurisdiction in which the cab is operated; trips more than ten miles beyond the corporate limits of the municipality in which the trip originated; trips more than 25 miles from the point of origin to the point of destination; and operating a cab without distinctly marking it as such.

Some Gains Shown On Stock Market

NEW YORK, Aug. 29 (AP) — The stock market today stepped out of a generally unsatisfactory week with scattered favorites clinging to modest advances and many leaders failing to get anywhere.

The Associated Press average of 60 issues was unchanged at 36.8 and on the week showed a net decline of .4 of a point. Transfers of 137,490 shares compared with 180,410 a week ago.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29 (AP) — The nation will have sufficient coal to "meet all needs," the Office of Solid Fuels Coordinator reported today, adding that consumers must continue to place orders early and store fuel as rapidly as the mines can supply it if they would avoid cold homes next winter.

War Industries Classes Bid For More Women

Any woman with a hankering to earn good wages and fill a real need can accomplish both missions with one trip to the War Industries Defense school at the high school and enroll in the aircraft sheet metal shop.

Although there are two classes in the sheet metal work now running, the night class is only two thirds full, W. R. Dawes, supervisor, said Saturday, and the morning class, best suited for many women, could take many more applicants.

Some 75 persons were placed last month in employment and nearly that number is expected to be employed again this month. Women, and more than a dozen have graduated from the sheet metal class, have gone to jobs in Fort Worth, Dallas and on the west coast, according to Dawes. Since aircraft industries in Texas are doubling their capacities for workers, an even greater number

of men and women will be needed in defense work now. Welding shops, which run 24 hours a day, are going full blast. Dawes said, with most of the four classes carrying capacity amount of workers.

Requirements Outlined For Price Ceiling On Services

DALLAS, Aug. 29.—For owners of shoe shops, laundries, dry cleaning establishments, auto repair shops, filling stations and other businesses which sell services that are controlled by maximum price regulation No. 166, regional OPA officials today set out the basic requirements for compliance with the regulation.

In general these requirements are:

1. Such establishments must not charge more for any service than they charged to the same sort of customer in March, 1942.
2. If the firm did not supply a service in March, 1942, then it must not charge more than its offering price during that month.

3. Service firms must keep all records showing prices charged by them in March, 1942, for all services.
4. If the firm has been in the habit of giving each customer a receipt, it must continue to do so. Even if the firm has not given customers receipts in the past, it must now give a receipt to any customer who asks for one.
5. By September 1, service firm owners must keep in their stores a statement showing—

- (a) The highest prices they charged for service supplied during March, 1942, for which they regularly quoted prices in that month.
- (b) A description of each of these services so complete that any person could identify the services from reading the description.
- (c) The pricing method, if any, they used regularly during March, 1942.
- (d) All allowances, discounts and other price differentials which they were in the habit of giving during March, 1942.

6. By September 10, service firm owners must file a copy of the statement of prices mentioned above with their nearest war price and rationing board.
7. If a new business is opened or a new service is offered, a similar statement must be prepared within 10 days and filed within 20 days.

Artist Adapts His Program To Soldiers

NEW YORK (UP)—Yehudi Menuhin, who has been playing volunteer engagements at military posts under the auspices of USO-Camp Shows, has some emphatic ideas on the subject of how does a musician adapt his program for audiences of uniformed service men.

"I never play down to a military audience," declared the distinguished young violinist. "A group of sailors, soldiers or marines is certainly as intelligent as an audience of civilians and even more eager for good music."

Menuhin points out, however, that the great majority of men at a training post have never before heard a concert violinist or an operatic tenor in person. The performing artist, therefore, must be careful to avoid a program that is too heavy, too long or too erudite.

As a result, Menuhin has devised a novel technique for presenting one of his most successful numbers, the Second Paganini Violin Concerto, which he played for the first time in his country not so long ago.

At a service camp, Menuhin steps to the front of the stage to announce his own program. He tells the service men, "I will play the first movement of the Paganini Violin Concerto."

At the conclusion of the movement he waits for the applause to subside. "Did you enjoy that?" he asks. More applause. "Would you like me to play the next part?" Still more applause.

He plays the second movement, and by repeating the query technique before beginning the final section, Menuhin plays the entire concerto for his enthusiastic audience.

Suit Against AP Called Effort To Get Membership For Chicago Sun

Cooperative Controls Its Membership

SAN ANGELO, Aug. 29. (AP)—The government's suit against the Associated Press is a direct result of the failure of its membership to elect Marshall Field III to membership in the organization, for the newly-started Chicago Sun.

Houston Haris, publisher of the San Angelo Standard-Times, and a director and vice-president of the Associated Press, said today.

"The Associated Press is a membership organization and as such always has governed the admission of new members. In its 42 years of service, its members have built up a cooperative organization undoubtedly the oldest and largest in the nation," Haris said.

Members have paid in millions of dollars in assessments which have been invested in physical equipment," he added. "It has large cash reserves and owns \$2,000,000 worth of government bonds and, in addition, has a pension fund for its employees that exceeds \$4,000,000."

"It seems inconceivable that the government should want to break such an organization, or that it should require members to divide these assets with others without compensation."

"Marshall Field," Haris said, "is no more entitled to participate in the benefits of the Associated Press membership without consent of the membership than he would be to force the National baseball league to grant him membership in Chicago in opposition to the Chicago Cubs."

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29. (AP)—The justice department said today it had no official comment on the statement by Marshall Field III, founder and owner of the Chicago Sun, that the government's anti-trust suit against the Associated Press "was brought following a complaint filed with the department of justice by the Chicago Sun."

Govt. Action Condemned By U. S. Press

The following editorial comment on the filing of a civil action against the Associated Press by the U. S. government, was published today in the various papers cited:

Washington Evening Star: The United States government is suing the Associated Press in an effort to obtain an A. P. membership for the Chicago Sun. The Sun believes, and has so convinced a friendly administration, that this membership will be competitively advantageous in the Sun's (and the administration's) fight against the Chicago Tribune. That is the motive behind the suit. The talk by Mr. Marshall Field, the complainant, and the government lawyers concerning freedom of the press is so much window dressing. . . . it smells.

Baltimore Evening Sun: Probably at no time in history have Americans had a larger need for a x x x unbiased collection and dissemination of news. . . . Surely a grave question arises when in the face of the attorney general's own clear concession that the service of the Associated Press has become "synonymous with the highest standards of accurate, non-partisan and comprehensive news reporting," the government undertakes to try to compel changes in the very methods of operation that have achieved and assured these things.

Pasadena (N. J.) Herald-News: Domestic issues have been subordinated to the great, all-out effort. While our attention is thus diverted, the worst elements of the new deal, intent upon remarking America in a manner more European than America, are busy as bees. . . .

Radio, because it must beg to be licensed, is under the government's thumb.

The master of the new dealers would like to have the American press in the same spot.

When that day comes, democracy goes!

Oil City (Pa.) Derrick: Like any business or fraternal association The Associated Press has the right to accept or reject any newspaper seeking membership therein. There is no monopoly in news. It is available to all who desire to gather it. . . .

"The government now asks that the association which for over a generation has built up an enviable service prestige through the efforts of its members, must share this prestige with any publisher who covets it for business profit, political advantage, or personal aggrandizement."

Indianapolis News: The fact that the government waited forty two years under the Sherman act and twenty eight years under the Clayton act to discover evidence of monopoly is very impressive. . . . thus the implication of a sinister motive in the suit, and the suspicion that its inspiration was part of the general administration policy of trying to regiment the country.

Denver Post: The Associated Press is strictly a cooperative enterprise. The government is taking the position that its members shall have nothing to say about who is associated with them. Having made a success of their business, they must now take in as partners and share their success with everybody who wants to come in. That is absurd on its face.

The Bartlesville, Okla., Examiner: "The suit is based on the assumption that a co-operative, non-profit organization has no right to exclude or limit its services or benefits. . . . It assumes x x x that this old and superior news agency must become purely commercial and non-mutual or that its officers be sent to jail or fined or both unless it makes changes that make membership meaningless and control by its members impossible."

Texas (Tex.) Gazette: There would be no more logic in carrying out the government's intention in this suit than there would be to order admittance to participating membership in a successful mercantile establishment of an operator of a less successful establishment.

Fort Lauderdale (Fla.) Daily News: The suit x x x is an attempt to punish the great newsgathering agency for refusing a franchise to the recently organized Chicago Sun, Marshall Field's pro-administration newspaper which was founded in direct opposition to the Chicago Tribune. It is another nail in the coffin of the free dissemination of news.

Colored Women To Be Enlisted In The WACC's

For the first time in the history of the nation, colored women have an opportunity to serve with the army.

Through new regulations, opportunities are opened to colored women in the Women's Army Auxiliary Corps. The War Relocation Authority announced this week that quotas have been authorized calling for stenographers, typists, general clerks, chauffeurs and cooks. Applicants must be between 21 and 44 inclusive, physically fit, able to pass an intelligence test and to show experience in the occupations named.

Colored women desiring to join the WAAC are urged to apply for information or enlistment at one of the following army recruiting stations: Lubbock, Pampa, Odessa, Big Spring, Sweetwater, El Paso, Fort Bliss, Amarillo and Plainview.

Colorado City's Oldest Citizen Dies At Age 94

COLORADO CITY, Aug. 29. — Colorado City lost its oldest citizen with the death Thursday night of Campbell A. Jordan, 94. Brief funeral services were held at the Kiker and Sons funeral chapel at one o'clock Saturday afternoon in Colorado City with the Rev. Mr. A. E. Travis, pastor of the First Baptist church, officiating. Graveside services were conducted at the Nolan cemetery, near Sweetwater, at three.

"Uncle Sam" as he was familiarly known was born in Arkansas Dec. 7, 1846. At the outbreak of the war between the states he was a lad of thirteen and his memories of the tragedies following the conflict made vivid fireside recounting for his children and grandchildren.

He was married Dec. 2, 1869 to Alice Martha Taylor at Simpsonville, Arkansas. Eleven children were born to them. When he was sixteen he joined a missionary Baptist church and was a faithful church member from that time until his death. He was a member of the First Baptist church in Colorado City.

His favorite precepts were consistent with the 78 years as a Christian gentleman. Whenever he had advice to give about rearing children "Uncle Sam" would declare "I just raised mine by the ten commandments." His other favorite principle was the golden rule.

In 1875 he and Mrs. Jordan moved to Williamson county, Tex., going from there to Coryell county in 1884 and in 1900 to Nolan county where he lived until 1928 when he came to Colorado City. He was a farmer until his retirement.

Seven children survive him. They are J. N. Jordan, Plainview, Mrs. Emma Crist, Phoenix, Ariz., Mrs. R. J. Moody, Tulsa, Mrs. Thompson, Coppas Cove, Mrs. Virginia O'Donnell, San Bernardino, California, C. E. Jordan and L. E. Jordan of Colorado City.

Also surviving him are 28 grandchildren, 41 great-grandchildren, and three great great grandchildren.

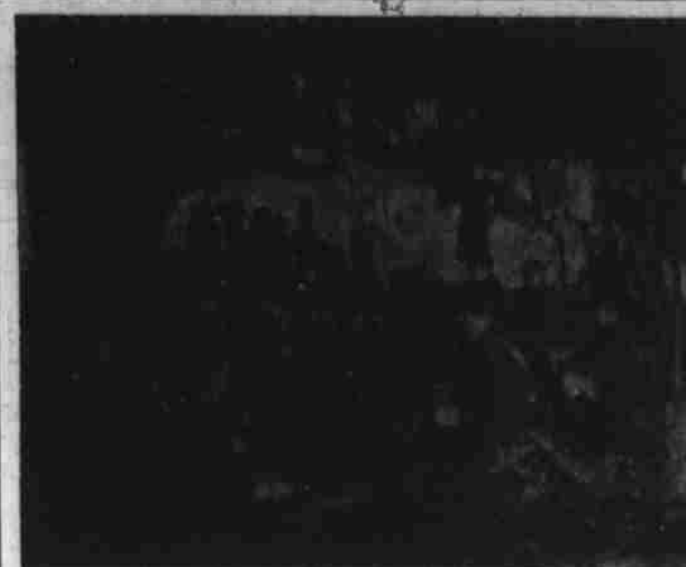

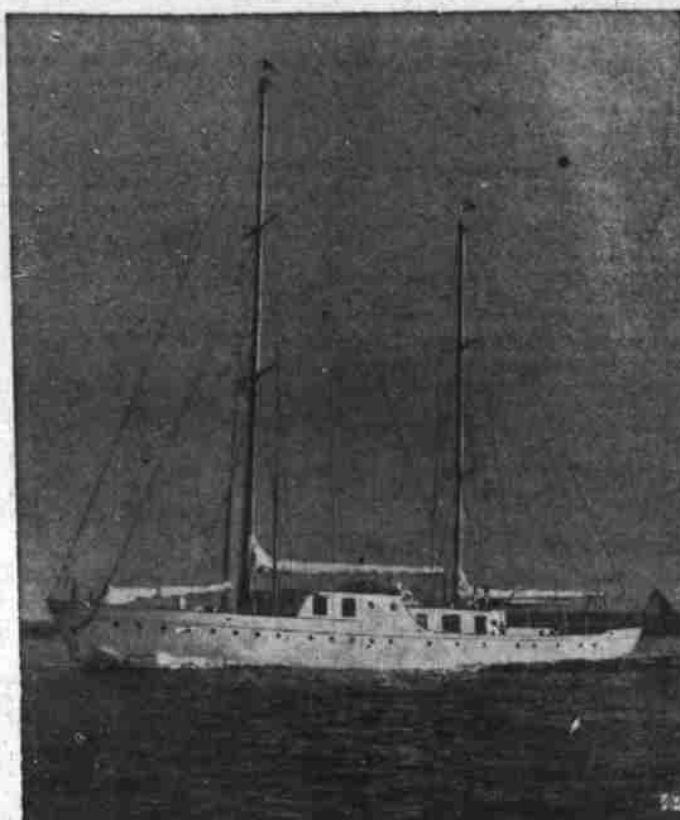

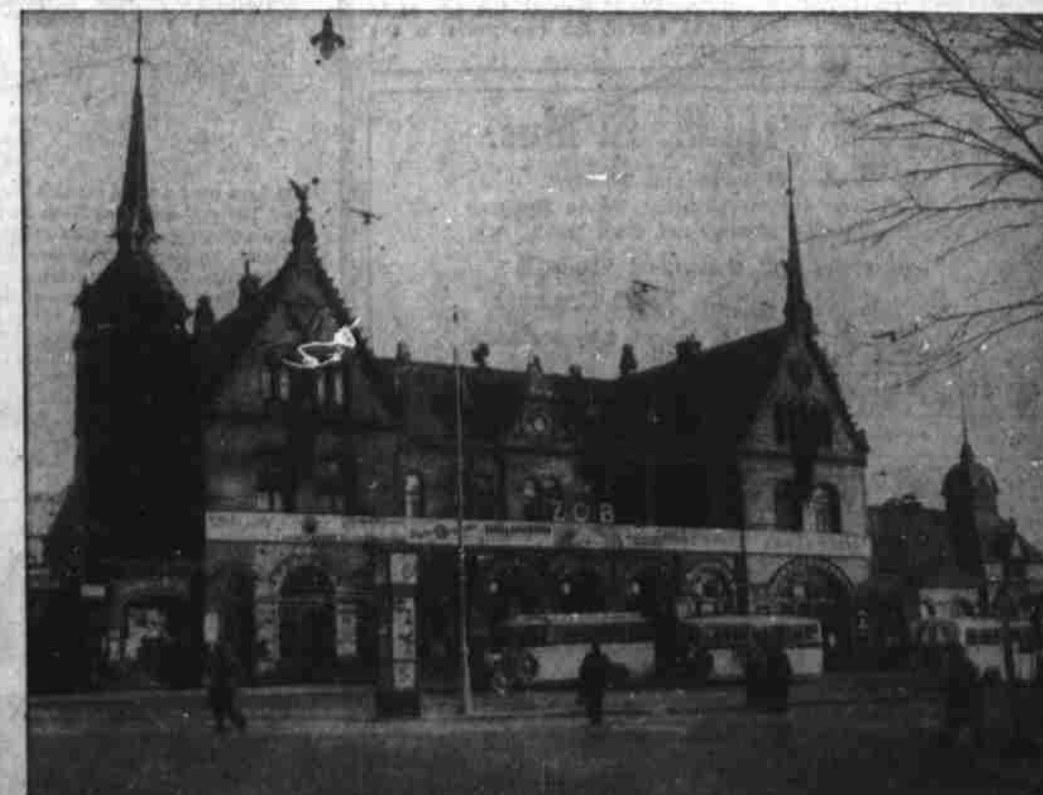

Something we've been in favor of for a long time will be instituted in the Big Spring school system this fall, when youngsters in elementary schools are issued regulation football equipment and given an opportunity for a broader physical fitness program and to round into better material for the high school team in the future. Naturally most coaches are also in favor of such programs, because it means that the material coming up to them will be more experienced and smooth working. Many schools have already taken this step, but for the most part they are in the larger cities so far. We take the attitude that Big Spring schools are showing a spirit of beneficial progressiveness which the parents of every youngster in elementary school age should appreciate.

Football fans heard several familiar names on the air Friday night if they listened to the Chicago Bears and College Stars game on the radio. As was expected beforehand Mal Kuster, the former Texas U. end, and Derace Moser of the Aggies figured prominently in the All-Star attack. For the Bears, Bulldog Turner, Hardin-Simmons' most distinguished gridiron alumnus, kept his name before the public by his stellar play at center.

Some have asked recently if Bill Roden, well known Texas golfer, is living in Big Spring now. We were told at the country club Friday afternoon that Roden is working back now, and doubtless he will play in the annual invitation tournament next weekend. Roden played in the state junior tournament at San Antonio last week, where he was eliminated in the quarter finals by Travis Bryan, runner-up for the championship.

Another man from the sporting world has gone into political Hugo Klaerner, former Texas league moundstar, has announced for sheriff in Gillespie county, according to reports from Fredericksburg. That county is one of the few in Texas which decides its county and precinct officers in the general election, rather than in the primary. Hugo's father, Alfred Klaerner, formerly held the sheriff's post there for 20 years.

Dove hunting season is just around the corner for this county, and it might be well to review a few of the rules as laid down by the game commission. Howard county is in the south zone, where the season opens on Sept. 16 and continues to Oct. 27. Shooting hours are from 7 a. m. to sunset, and the bag limit is 10 per day. You can take 10 mourning doves or 10 white winged doves, or an aggregate total of 10 of both species combined. Better not have more than one day's limit in possession at any one time, either, and guns, which must not be larger than 10 gauge, must be plugged to hold no more than three shells.

No Decline In Typhus Cases

There has as yet been no decline in the number of typhus fever cases in this area, City-County Health Officer M. H. Bennett said Saturday, and he urged anew the full cooperation of every resident in the county in a rat extermination campaign.

Poisoning of rats in the Cosden refinery community some ten days ago was believed to have achieved good results, Bennett said. He expected a representative from the state health department here soon to assist in directing a wider scale extermination campaign. Meanwhile, arrangements are being made to carry the rat-poisoning work to all rural areas, and community Victory Leaders will meet with the county-USA War Board on Sept. 5. At that time, County Agent O. P. Griffin will outline the whole program.

Bennett said a score or more typhus cases were current. Last week the first such case was reported from Garden City. Previously, cases were in the city and in the rural areas north of town.

Dove Season To Open Sept. 16 For This Zone

Season for white winged and mourning doves will open for the south zone, which includes Howard county, on Sept. 16 and continue through Oct. 27.

Hunters will be allowed to kill doves this year from 7 a. m. to sunset, and the bag limit is 10 birds per day. This zone extends north to Borden county's northern border, westward to Culberson county, and south to the Rio Grande Valley. The boundary eastward runs straight to Palo Pinto county, then cuts a jagged course with the southern line of Ellis county the point farthest south for the northern boundary. It then works northward, finally taking in Bowie county for the point farthest north in the south zone, and includes all counties along the Louisiana line.

There's Job To Be Done At Home

We see in the paper where the kid from across the street has landed in New Caledonia or some place in the Southwest Pacific, ready and raring to uphold the honor and integrity of his native land at a spot approximately 1,000 miles from his front doorstep.

Whatever doubts we may have about the way things are going in Washington and elsewhere on the home front, we have not the faintest shadow of a doubt about the situation in New Caledonia. The kid from across the street and his buddies from every section of the country will take care of that angle—and you can bet your bottom dollar on that.

For these kids from across the street or around the corner or across town or in the next town or ship will do their part come Genna or high water. The rising generation over whom so many elders were losing sleep only a year or two ago have done it. The

world is leaning heavily on them today, as it always has and always will. If we were as sure of anything as we are that the young folks will always deliver we'd have nothing at all to worry about.

The fighting front is well taken care of, insofar as fighting personnel is concerned. Our job at home is to see that the home front delivers. It is our job to keep the home fires burning, to see to it that the boys scattered to the four winds are given the implements of their temporary trade—the planes, tanks, ships, guns, bombs, shells, food and other necessities. We can get along very well at home without a couple of spare tires, or even without an automobile, but the boys out there on the fighting front wouldn't last ten seconds without guns and plenty of ammunition.

It is our job, safe and comfortable here at home, to see that they get them. We can do that by buying bonds. We can do it

by insisting that an end be put to the confusion and blundering that have characterized much of our home-front activity. We can do it by mounting the house-tops and shouting with all our might, "Kick the incompetents and scoundrels out!"

We are the only ones who can do that particular job. It is our privilege and our obligation. The boys can't do it, but we can.

Are we getting out of the job done, and done well? No.

If we demanded it loudly enough, much of the obfuscated thinking and doing that have been going on in Washington for months would have been cleared up long ago. We could have clarified the atmosphere with a little straight talk. But most of us have been worried too much about sugar rationing and rice rationing and other insignificant things to take a proper interest in keeping the home front on its toes in the only way we can—by pressure on those we have

chosen to lead us, and by seeing to it that they do lead us and not merely sit around on their fat office cushions and wait to be told what to do and how to do it.

Too many of us have been waiting for Washington to tell us what to do—like a bunch of fledgling birds, with open mouths, waiting for the mama or papa bird to show up with a beak full of choice worms. We're sick and tired of that lace-panty alibi.

It's time we start telling Washington what we want done. What we want done is to get on with this war by smashing all bottle-necks, human or material, and throwing the full resources of the great nation into the balance beside our boys who are facing the enemy with bare breasts.

Don't worry about the boys; they'll take care of themselves and us, too, if we'll do our part.

"Sure," says Albert Grumes. He lays aside the finger ring he's been working on—glass diamond and ruby in mounting of silver filigree—and gets to work. The ring, he says, is for no particular picture. It will go into stock.

Albert Grumes is Paramount's jeweler. No other studio has one. He is the only member of the International Jewelry Workers' union employed in the movies. His job began with Cecil B. DeMille because DeMille, in 1931, was making "The Sign of the Cross" and the picture, ancient Roman, required jewels in carload lots—or enough to justify a full-time jeweler. DeMille is still his best customer—because C. B. still makes historical movies.

Albert's workshop is a file of military insignia, naval decorations, police badges from all parts of the world. Metals, glass, bakelite, these are his materials. (Since the war he no longer uses copper, but silver). His jobs have ranged from tiny buttons to the pair of elaborate necklaces Joan Bennett wore in "Artists and Models"—he spent a month on each, using 2,400 stones in the pair. Movie jewels—especially rhinestones for diamonds—usually photograph better than the authentic stones.

Albert Grumes came to America in 1919 from Riga, then part of czarist Russia, after four years of strict, unpaid apprenticeship in his trade. "Our job," he says, "are better than that shop—we worked 12 hours, cleaned out the place, pulled down our coats and slept in the shop." But he learned various phases of jewelry-making and in spare time he took new courses making him proficient in all the 20-odd branches of the work. He earns close to \$100 a week.

He worked for jewelers in Chicago and New York before coming to Hollywood. He likes it here because of the endless variety. Claudette Colbert he considers the star most fond of jewels. Mae West is equally jewel-conscious—but in a flashier way in keeping with her act. Marlene Dietrich is "minkish" about her jewels.

Albert Grumes has been married 30 years, to the same American wife, and they live in their own 5-room home in Windsor Hills. Their married daughter, whose husband is in the army now, lives with them. At home they never talk pictures, seldom see any. Albert likes "true-to-life movies"—which may explain why he seldom goes. He has been promising himself to catch up on the new pictures, but his garden is still his main interest.

"He may be up here to explore the ruins," Sandy said, picking the main threads out of the warp of his thoughts. "But I doubt if he knows about the hiding place of the codex because, from what Tyra has said, they've been in this country several months. I didn't make that translation until January."

Philippine Government
Has Had Difficulties

(First Of Two Articles)

By JACK STINNETT

WASHINGTON—Of all the romantic tragedies of nations in exile, none is more stirring than that of the Philippine Commonwealth. It's no news, of course, that the greatest land battle of the Pacific to date was fought on the island of Luzon. But in reports of the gallant defense of Manila, Bataan, and Corregidor, the story of the struggle to keep the government functioning and intact was more or less a lost yarn.

Few people know today anything of the flight of President Manuel Quezon. Not so long ago the little giant of the Philippines was an invalid, governing his thousands of islands from a wheel chair.

A few months later, with members of his cabinet and other government officials, he was living in the sandbagged tunnels of Corregidor. The frequent bombings from the Japanese didn't shake his

frail body—but the shortages of food and the constancy of improper diet did.

In a U. S. submarine, the fugitive president fled to Panay, then to Iloilo and Bacolod, capital of Negros island. From there he traveled via plucky Lieut. John Bulkeley's PT-boats across the Mindanao Sea and twice on that journey narrowly escaped death or capture at the hands of the Japs. Then he and his party took one last look at their native land and from a still secret rendezvous with Flying Fortresses, proceeded to Australia.

About three months ago, the president and his party arrived in the United States on a transport ("on which we several times had traveled when it was a luxury liner").

Once in Washington, in spite of continued ill health and under a physician's care, President Quezon reformed his government in exile, became the 27th signee of the Declaration of United Nations; met the press; sat in several sessions of the Pacific War Council (weekly meetings of representatives of the U. S., Australia, Canada, China, New Zealand and the Netherlands Indies to consider Pacific war strategy); settled his family at Belmont, the 150-year-old estate of former Secretary of War Patrick J. Hurley, near his home in Leesburg, Va.; and now his more or less withdrawn, under doctor's orders, to try to recoup his health.

With him at Belmont are his wife, two daughters and a son. Officially, in Washington, he leans most heavily on Vice President Sergio Osmeña, who serves as his proxy at all public and social functions which Quezon is unable to attend; on the dashing young resident commissioner, Joaquin M. Elizalde; Maj. Gen. Basilio J. Valdes, formerly chief-of-staff of the Philippine army; and Lieut. Col. Andres Soriano.

That is hardly a start on the list of officials in Washington. In the islands, freedom may be sleeping for awhile under the blanket of the yellow invaders, but not at the commonwealth headquarters on Massachusetts avenue; or in Capitol offices of Commissioner Elizalde; or in the various suites of the many officials. There the business of the government of the Philippines goes on from dawn to dusk and far into the night.

Meat Prices
In Confusion

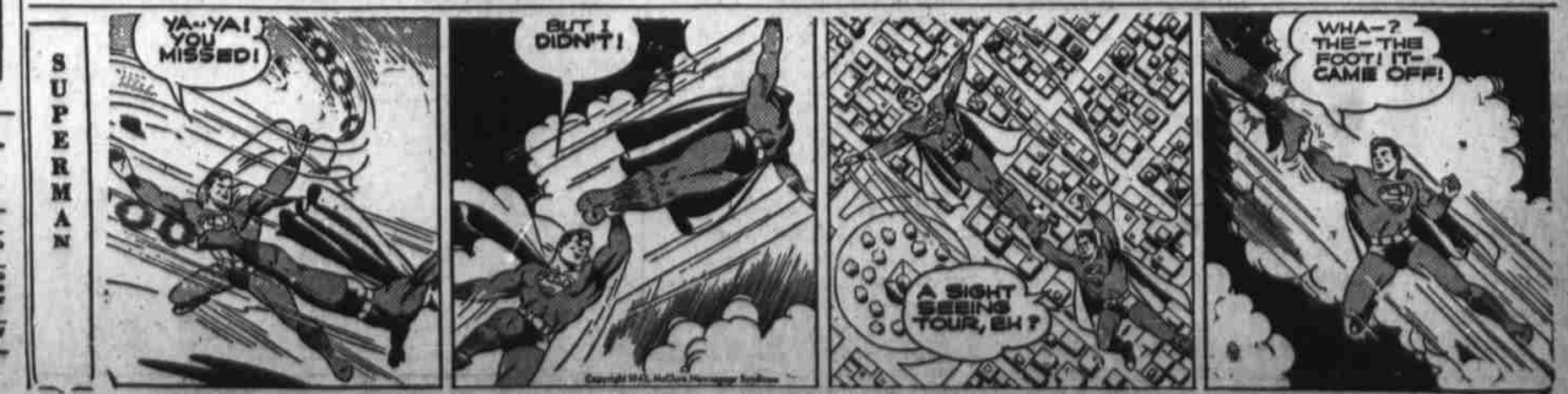
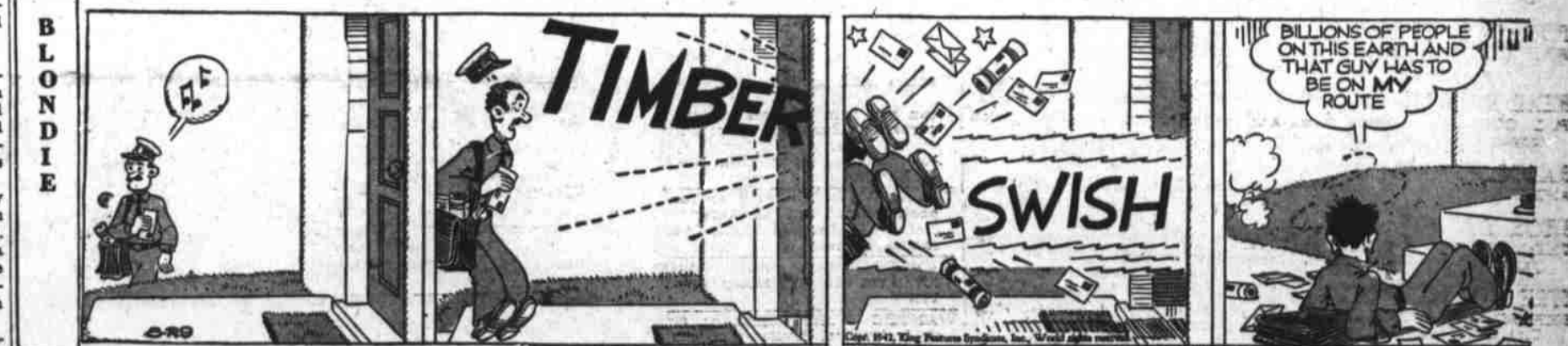
CHICAGO, Aug. 29. (AP)—The confusion over wholesale meat prices, because of price ceilings governing innumerable grades, has resulted in frequent penetration of ceiling levels and in effect "black selling," trade sources said today.

Sources in the department of agriculture, the meat packing industry and the retail buying field, none of whom would permit use of their names, agreed that price ceilings as being exceeded in a variety of ways, either intentionally or unintentionally.

Observers said that, for one thing, ceilings are based on the price schedules of each packer and, as a result, one packer may be able to charge a higher price for a specific type of meat than a neighboring packer.

This situation and other difficulties involved in applying price ceilings to the many classes of meat have led, they said, to daily penetration of the ceilings more or less generally throughout the country.

"Black selling," a term derived from European "black markets," has been encouraged, observers asserted, by freezing meat prices while no ceilings are placed on livestock.

Smallest Income Group Would Pay New War Tax Will Reach Into More Pockets

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29 (AP) — An emergency war tax designed to reach practically every individual who makes an income, no matter how small, was reported under consideration tonight by treasury and congressional officials.

Details of the plan were not

ready for publication but there were reports that the senate finance committee would be asked next week to increase by at least \$1,500,000,000 the \$1,575,000,000 which would be taken from individuals in taxes under terms of the new revenue bill already ap-

proved by the house. Conjecture centered around a form of gross income tax, possibly levied at the source, which would tap a field of \$30,000,000,000 in annual income which some committee members contend would not be reached by the bill as it stands.

There was some indication also that a system of post-war savings for individuals through bond purchases might be combined with the proposed new levy.

The breadth of the field in which additional individual taxes could be imposed was indicated by estimates that only 27,000,000 of 54,000,000 persons who receive income annually would be subject to regular levies under the house-approved bill.

The treasury was understood to have suggested a somewhat similar gross income tax on corporations to replace the capital stock and declared value excess profits levies which the committee voted out of the bill yesterday for an estimated revenue loss of \$75,000,000.

As outlined previously by Chairman George (D-Ga.), this would embody the assessment of a small percentage tax against the gross receipts of a business, after certain specified deductions for labor and materials costs.

Several committee members said it appeared obvious to them that unless the treasury proposed some alternative, there was going to be an almost overwhelming demand for enactment of a sales tax.

Malone Named Head Of Midway School

He had been in the teaching profession before coming here to organize the city's recreational program. Malone said that school would start Monday and that he would leave the school home at 8:30 a. m. on the bus run to Big Spring and then swing back toward Coahoma to complete the route within the hour.
