Singing Mother Trains For Opera And Carols Away While She Works

(By NEA Service) NEW YORK, Aug. 5.—The keyboard of my piano is not going half as much for my singing as the washboard I bend over almost daily. The Singing Mother of the Bronx, as her neighbors call Mrs. Mary Bair Grenier, continued: "Instead of playing an important role on the boards, as has been my ambition since I was a little girl, it is the boards that play such an important role in my life—the washboard were played upon the lawn and refreshments of candy, ice cream, cones and cake were served to Lester and Mary Elizabeth Grimes, Roger and Martha Kuykendall, K. Anthony and Pauline Barrie, Turner and Sarah Kimmel, Corrine Abney, Junior and Wallace Woods. "At any rate, I've already reached the concert stage," she said. "And I shall soon reach my goal, which is the Metropolitan Opera House! I once sang on the stage of the Metropolitan. True, it was only in the chorus—but I shall do better next time!" "In spite of household worries and bringing up four healthy youngsters," she was asked. "Not in spite of it, but because of it! That idea that 'motherhood kills a woman's career as a singer' is absurd. Just look at Madame Schumann-Heink and Madame Honoré! I would say that motherhood is the greatest asset for a singer. With every new baby there is a renewed call for lullabies, and nothing will mold a voice so much as the subdued crooning of a lullaby. When it comes to developing the right registers, nothing is as helpful as housework, especially the washboard. Bending over it, and driving into the ends—develops body and mind and lends your vocal chords a pliability that makes for ease and brilliancy of tone, which is a coloratura's first requirement." "Mucic's Call" Turning around on the piano stool, the Singing Mother struck a few chords. Instantly, her brood of four gathered around her. "Sometime, I always find time to play a little and sing a little every day. I acquired that habit when I was in the choir in Harrisburg, Pa. 'The neighbors will tell you that I am often found scrubbing sinks while singing scales.' That proves that I can successfully combine my career with the home. At least, I have found out that it works, although there are many who doubt it. "No Choice Here! "Of course, if it came to a choice between my career and my children, I believe they are a safeguard. The youngsters would come first! After all, I am a mother which means more to me than being an artist! But next to my children comes my music, and there is no reason why the two cannot work hand in hand. It is better to be a safe guard against that dangerous disease so prevalent among artists, and commonly known as 'temperament.' Thank goodness, I do not suffer from 'artistic temperament.' "It was very hard at times all right, to stick successfully to my career with the home. The first time I came to New York, all ready to conquer the stage of the Metropolitan Opera House, I found things very different from what I had imagined them to be. All my earthly riches consisted of \$200, and when the little pile was finally gone, it was the vandeville stage for me, and then once more back to Harrisburg. "But fate was later kind to me. While I was singing here at my piano one evening last summer, crooning to sleep my baby with 'Just a Song at Twilight,' two men passed out little house and stopped under my window to listen. Presently, there was a knock at the door. A gentleman entered, and introduced himself as one of New York's foremost singing teachers. "Twasn't Long "Well, he offered to put the finishing touches to my voice with the result that a few months later, I faced the Metropolitan critics at the Metropolitan Hall. New U. S. Bomber Plane Is Soon Be Put On

NEW YORK, Aug. 5.—A third giant bomber to be constructed recently for the Army, larger and heavier than previous two, and employing tubular steel wing construction, will be under development for five years, will be tested. Keystone aircraft corporation, Tol, Pa., next Wednesday, the corporation announced through press representatives here to be a "super-cyclops" and with four tons of military load, including one-ton bombs, in addition to six, possibly ten, machine guns. It will be driven by 550 horsepower Packard motor which has been under development for the past two and a half years. Richard Blythe, representative of the Keystone company, revealed. The first two giant battle planes, to be tested recently after construction were the Fokker biplane and the Curtiss condor, equipped with six machine guns. The super-cyclops is said to be the mightiest plane yet constructed in the United States and believed to be the mightiest in the world, like the Curtiss condor is a bi-plane, while the Fokker is a monoplane.

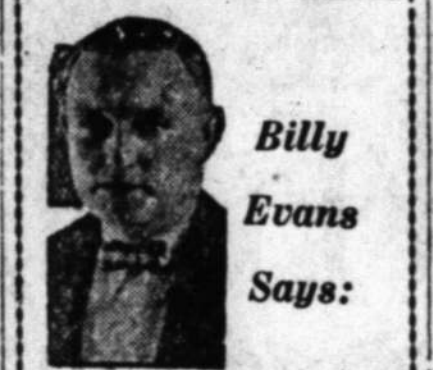

Billy Evans Says:

Exceptions to Rule
Unquestionably this is the era of slugging in baseball. A powerful offense, featuring a couple of home run hitters, goes far towards a win.

However, there are two major league clubs, the Chicago Cubs and Washington, who are disproving the accepted belief that a good offense is baseball's greatest asset.

The Cubs rank seventh in the batting averages of the National league, while Washington holds the same position in the American. The Cubs, some 15 points less than Washington, are out in front in the National League in runner-up to the Yankees.

These two clubs have been favored with excellent pitching, the Cubs particularly, and they have been obliged by backing up the pitching in sensational style.

New York is distancing the rest of the American league field because it has excellent pitching, a good defense and a phenomenal offense, featuring Ruth and Gehrig.

These One-Run Wins
Second division ball clubs lose a lot of games by one run, and incidentally, they usually come out second best when a contest goes into extra innings.

It is customary to hear clubs that are constantly being beaten by a run singing the blues about the tough breaks they are always getting. The opposition never receives credit for outplaying them to gain the coveted one-run advantage.

Constant singing of the blues about bad luck often creates the impression said club isn't nearly as bad as the record would have you believe.

Right here, I want to go on record as saying that clubs which are being regularly defeated by the narrow margin of one run are not good ball clubs and usually are had ones. It is the club that wins the tight games that sets themselves.

To be defeated by one run in a majority of games is proof of certain weak points in the offense as well as defense and very often means the team is lacking in game-ness.

Game Quite Different
Game-ness in a club or player is a most important factor in the success of the individual.

Heinie Wagner, now assisting Bill Carrigan in trying to rebuild the Boston Red Sox, was one of the most courageous players I have ever seen perform.

Wagner was a great shortstop in his day. There have been better ones, but I doubt if any of them would take greater chances than Wagner in trying to pull some daring play that either meant winning or staying off defeat.

Out of the game for 10 years in his day, Wagner, before coming back with Carrigan, he found things quite different. Recently I asked him what feature of modern play impressed him most.

There was a bit of reverse English to Wagner's reply to my query as to his impressions of the present day game.

Englishman Wins In His Attempt To Swim Channel

DOVER, Eng., Aug. 5.—E. H. Temme, English swimmer succeeded today in the first attempt of the season to swim the English channel. Taking off from Cape Gris Nez at 12:42 o'clock this morning, Temme landed two miles west of Dover.

Temme's time, as computed by representatives of Lloyd's, was 14 hours 27 minutes. This is four minutes faster than Gertrude Ederle's time last year, but has been beaten by three men, Ernest Vierkotter, Georges Michel and Norman Leslie-Durham, in earlier channel swims.

CAPE GRIS NEZ, France, Aug. 5 (AP)—The channel swimming season was opened today by a British aspirant, E. H. Temme, captain of the Cornhill swimming club. Rickard Raps Suit In Coliseum Muddle

NEW YORK, Aug. 5 (AP)—The intended suit of the Chicago Coliseum club to prevent the Dempsey-Tunney heavyweight championship fight September 22, is a mere "bid for publicity," Tex Rickard declared today. Twenty years ago major league managers looked with favor on six foot pitchers only.

A scout had the nerve to recommend a youngster, say five feet six inches in height and weighing perhaps 150 pounds, would be in dire danger of being dismissed by return wire.

"Wee Willie" Sudhoff was one of the first pitchers built along the above lines who disproved the fact that height and weight were absolutely necessary for success as a big league twirler. However, at that time, Sudhoff was regarded as a freak, turning a trick that few others of his size could.

Of late years most managers have changed their opinions on the pitching question, but even at that a good, big pitcher always gets more favorable consideration than a good, little heaver.

In the world series of last fall, Grover Cleveland Alexander and Jesse Haines, two six footers, scored the necessary victories to win a world championship for St. Louis. While they were turning in victories, Sherdell, often called "Wee Willie," was pitching just as effectively, but losing because the breaks refused to favor him.

While it might be wrong to class lack of size as a physical weakness, there is no question but that defective vision should come under such a classification.

While it took years to break down the barrier of size relative to promising, big league pitchers, it was even more difficult for the bespectacled player, pitchers in particular, to get a chance. Old-timers would have scoffed at the idea of a player with weak eyes making the grade as a big leaguer.

Lee Meadows paved the way for the bespectacled twirler. There are in the big leagues today six athletes who wear glasses in the performance of their duties, five of them are pitchers, the other, shortstop Toporcer of St. Louis.

Since control is perhaps a pitcher's greatest asset, it would seem that defective vision would handicap him more than any other player. Forced to get the ball over the 17 inch plate, between knee and shoulder, weak eyes loom as the worst possible ailment; yet such is not the case.

It is a rather strange coincidence that the two best bespectacled pitchers in the game, Lee Meadows and Carmen Hill, are on the same ball club, Pittsburgh. Of the first 37 victories scored by that team, Meadows contributed 10, losing only one game, while Hill's record up to that time was nine victories and four defeats.

There is an odd angle to Hill's connection with the Pittsburgh club. Last year Owen Bush, present manager of the Pirates, piloted the Inland team of the Pioneers Association, Hill was his star pitcher, winning 21 while losing seven. Bush sold him to Pittsburgh for a sum reputed to have been \$40,000.

At that time Bush hadn't the slightest idea that he would be the next manager of the Pirates. It is said Bush believed he had outsmarted Barney Dreyfus in the deal as to price. Next Bush finds himself manager of the club to which he sold Hill. In the spring Hill was also starting but Bush didn't since he took a lot of Pittsburgh's money for him he was compelled to give him a thorough trial. It is fortunate that he did.

Outside of possibly Kremer, no two members of the Pittsburgh club have done more to keep the Pirates out in front than the bespectacled Meadows and Hill. They have broken down for all time the big league barrier relative to a physical weakness such as poor eye sight.

"The witness said Dr. Dreher had told him she couldn't go anywhere without being followed by Leboeuf. "If I ever catch him with my wife I'll kill him," Mr. Blakeman quoted Leboeuf as saying.

This was about ten days before July 1. It was testified.

Mr. and Mrs. Leboeuf had not lived happily for two years, Mr. Blakeman said, adding that Leboeuf ran his wife away from home twice.

On cross examination Mr. Blakeman said Leboeuf ran his wife away from home after "fusses over Dr. Dreher."

After three or four days, the witness testified, Leboeuf would go after his wife, who stayed at her mother's when driven from home and she would go back to her husband.

"Jim was a good provider for his family," the witness asserted.

Deputy Testifies
G. P. Pecot, deputy sheriff, testified, while the jury was removed from the room, that recently Beadle had a headache and that he asked him if it felt any better.

"He's going to get a pain in the neck pretty soon and won't have any more headaches," the witness said Mrs. Leboeuf retorted.

Pecot declared Beadle told him, before he got separate attorneys that he was instructed to admit he killed Leboeuf, cut open the body and weighted it down with angle iron in Lake Palourde or elsewhere, "all three would hang."

Beadle said he was told, the witness testified, that a man who killed in self defense had a right to bury the body.

The accused man then made the request for attorneys to represent him alone, it was stated. Previously the same attorneys had represented Dr. Dreher, Mrs. Leboeuf and Beadle.

Says Dreher Guilty
The day Beadle obtained separate attorneys, he is said to have told Sheriff Pecot that Dr. Dreher killed Leboeuf and cut open the body.

Counsel for Mrs. Leboeuf and Dr. Dreher requested they be given opportunity to show that the statements Beadle was said to have made were false, but the court said he didn't want to go into that at the time.

Court was then recessed for lunch after the judge ruled that what Beadle is said to have been told by his attorneys was inadmissible before the jury.

Trial Of Ranger Is Opened At Lefors

PAMPA, Texas, Aug. 5 (AP)—Trial of Jack Dografter, Texas, ranger, charged with assaulting W. H. Bates, deputy sheriff of Hutchinson county, began at Pefors, Gray county, today.

The case will be tried in 84th district court upon change of venue from Hutchinson county, where the ranger was indicted on July 20 by a special grand jury.

FLAMES SWEEP MANY FORESTS

PLANES PRESSED INTO SERVICE AS FIRES GAIN HEADWAY

(By Associated Press)
PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 5.—With military authorities lending aid and with government airplanes pressed into service for reconnaissance work, the northwest was fighting hundreds of forest fires today. All the conflagrations were started by lightning.

Storms rolling over the mountain timber tracts each day this week have shot down bolts of flame out of the clouds. Today a hundred fires swept through the forests of the Columbia national forest in Washington; another hundred fires were blazing uncontrolled in the Rainier national forest and more than sixty had been reported on the Wenatchee tracts.

Nine Fires in Oregon
In Oregon, where fires were reported from the Unuttle national forest, two hundred men were battling day and night in central Oregon. It was expected that in the absence of wind, the flames would eventually be brought under control without great loss of timber.

Several fires were reported burning uncontrolled in the Klamath national forest in northern California.

city which has grown in bitterness ever since. The valley business men demand reparations for losses through decreased population and farmers demand the purchase by the city of their lands at assertedly high values. The total reparations asked approximates \$7,000,000.

Buy Much Land
The city has paid between twelve and fifteen million dollars in cash for lands purchased in the valley reparations figures show.

In the reparations war, violence has been resorted to a dozen times by valley residents seeking to force the city to meet their demands. The aqueduct has been damaged more or less seriously by dynamite blasts, several of the outrages causing sufficient damage to force the shutting off of the water flow for several days at a time to make repairs.

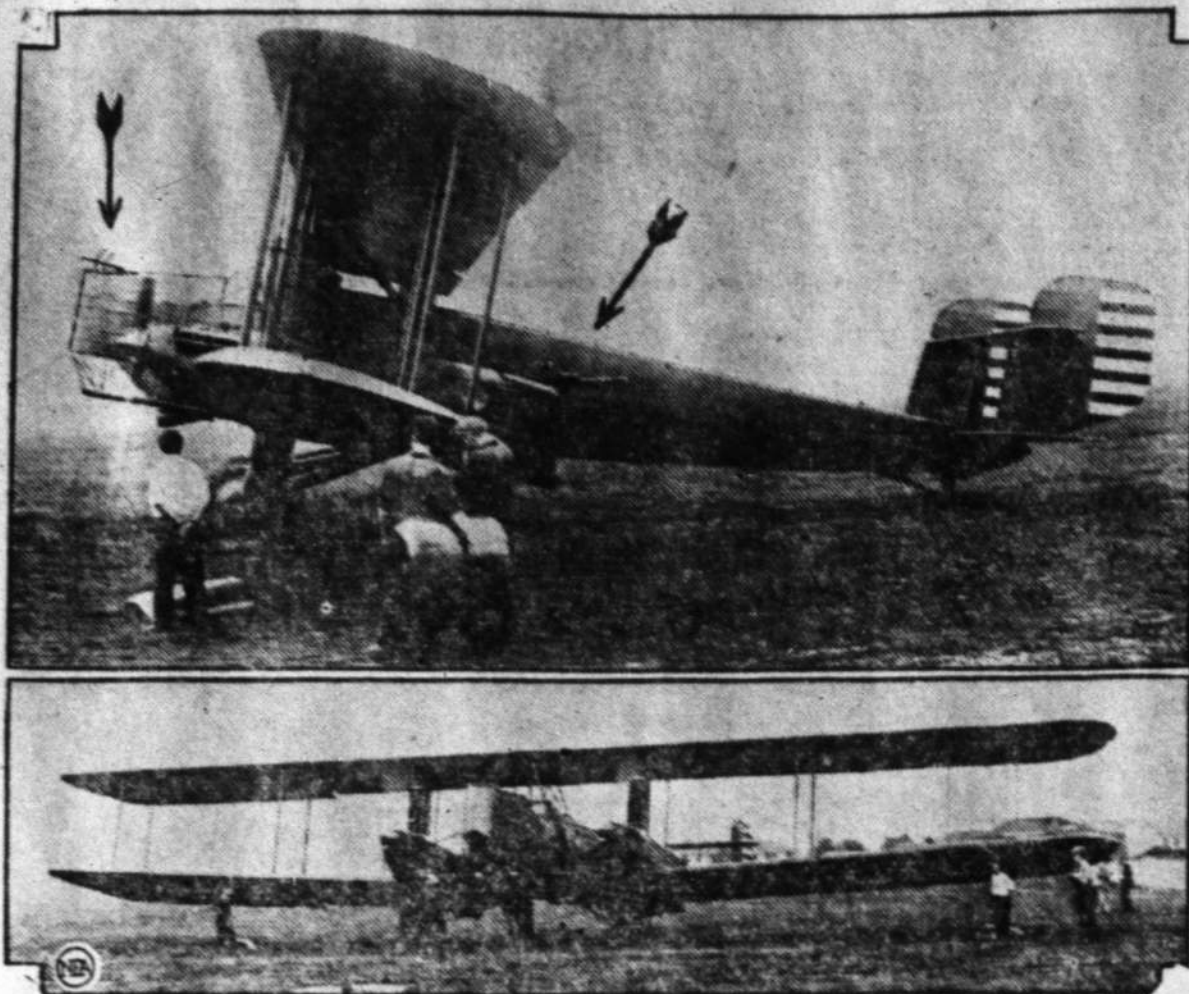

By refusing breakfast today, Sacco prolonged his hunger strike into its twentieth day.

Kellogg Is Given Guard At Home

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5 (AP)—Police guard was placed about the home of Secretary Kellogg today to guard against any act which might arouse out of the Sacco-Vanzetti case. The secretary's office previously had been placed under guard. The temporary White House dependents, although empty, are being watched.

Workers In Buenos Aires On Strike

BUENOS AIRES, Aug. 5 (AP)—A general strike in protest against the Sacco-Vanzetti sentence went into effect today. Nearly all the workers in factories and shops joined the movement.

Preparations For Executions Made

BOSTON, Aug. 5 (AP)—While friends and supporters of Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti tonight redoubled their efforts to save the two now internationally known radicals from the electric chair, Warden William Hendry began preparations for the grim duty of a triple execution at the Charlestown prison. Notification was sent to the official executioners to be in readiness and prison guards began to occupy the chair for its new occupants.

Madeiros Ates Dies

With Sacco and Vanzetti will go Celestino Madeiros, New Bedford youth convicted of another murder, but whose life has twice been prolonged through respite in order that his story "confessing" implication in the murder for which the other two murkies might be available to the courts should a retrial for them be ordered. The confession was found worthless by the supreme court and Governor Fuller held it to be unworthy of credence. Madeiros' attitude was in contrast to that of the others.

Sacco Dispirited

Sacco entering the twentieth day of his hunger strike, was weak and dispirited, Vanzetti, who has fasted and eaten intermittently was more vigorous but anxiously more than hopeful. Madeiros on the other hand has attacked the special

death house menu with something akin to gusto and has called for the special delicacies allowed the condemned by law.

A faint spark of hope glowed for sympathizers of the prisoners today as Arthur D. Hill, their new chief of counsel, began a study of possible moves to save the two from the fate to which Governor Fuller's refusal of clemency apparently has doomed them.

News of Protests

While from every quarter of the globe came news of planned protests by radical sympathizers of the prisoners whose conviction for murder in 1926 brought them out of obscurity, the prisoners themselves rested their case after fiery denunciations of the governor, the judge who presided at their trial and others whom they characterized as "state perfurers."

The surprise at the withdrawal from the case of attorneys William G. Thompson and Herbert Ehrmann, had not entirely subsided today. It followed quickly on Governor Fuller's refusal to stay the execution now scheduled for the early hours of Thursday morning.

The retiring attorneys declared new counsel would be "untrammelled" by the commitments of the past and less disturbed than we by a sense of injustice.

Cattle Town Gets Physician At Last

DUBOIS, Wyo., Aug. 5 (AP)—This dude and cattle town in the heart of the waning west, 85 miles from a railroad "bar" at last, has been successful in its quest for a doctor. Dr. E. B. Danever put out his shingle upstairs over the pool hall today.

Five months ago a plan was launched to assemble all families and bachelors to insure the doctor earning a living wage for this is a healthy country. The bachelors rebelled but the tie cutters at Dunoer 110 miles from a railroad, agreed to chip in and the deal was closed. The doctor will divide his time between the two towns.

Woman And Girl Die At Grand Crossing

BRADY, Tex., Aug. 5 (AP)—Mrs. P. M. Self, 25, of Brady, formerly Mrs. Wilfrey Wear, of Brownwood, and her niece, Miss Willie Fay Cawyer, 16, of Mercury, were instantly killed at 11 o'clock Friday morning when the car in which they were riding was struck by a freight car being switched here. Other cars standing on a siding prevented Mrs. Self and the engineer from having a clear view. The bodies were badly mutilated. Miss Cawyer had just arrived here to visit Mrs. Self.

In court at Geneva, a tradesman asked for a divorce on grounds of "abnormal obesity." All his savings were used to buy food for his wife he said. The court refused the divorce.

Lengel Begins Life Sentence In Murder

Oil Operations In Mid Continent Shows Increase

TULSA, Okla., Aug. 5.—Oil operations in the Oklahoma, Kansas, north Texas and New Mexico area of the mid continent fields have increased in number over those indicated by reports of one week ago and have reached the number of 2,293 during the week just ended showing a gain of 44 operations. The Oil Weekly says today. Operations in the state of Oklahoma have increased from 1,276 to 1,379 and two weeks ago the number was 1,358. The Shawnee-Seminole area was responsible for the increase, offsetting the decrease in operations in most other sections of the state. Texas shows a consistent gain in total operations and during the last week this state increased from 1,427 to 1,467 operations—a gain of 41.

Kansas Shows Slump Operations in Kansas continue to drop off slightly. Seminole is naturally the most active spot in Oklahoma. Fifty two new rigs were erected in this district during the past week, with 545 drilling operations actually under way. 37 wells completed and 42 wells shut down for various causes, and 51 new operations started in this territory.

For some weeks the total operations reports indicated that perhaps the oil operators were pessimistic and do not care to continue the search for more oil, but during the past three weeks the tables have turned with operations steadily increasing, making it appear that operators have become optimistic regarding the future of the crude oil price structure.
