Political Appointments

One of the most laudatory observations ever made about the state board of control, back when the late Claude Teer, John Wallace and H. R. Meyer comprised its membership, was that the board never got involved in the political maneuverings centering around Austin. The board, set up as a business organization to run state affairs, did just that, letting political chips fall where they would.

As a result, nobody seriously questioned the efficiency of the board and those former members.

One wonders if the free-of-politics label will still be worn, after Tuesday's revelation of minutes of a board meeting at which a large number of employees were discharged.

This is not to question the officials' right to release employees who do not meet the required standards of efficiency. They have that right. But there ought to be good reasons for wholesale discharges.

The Associated Press says records show that Chairman Harry Knox, Jr., and Frank Davis voted for the discharges, overruling Tom DeBerry. DeBerry is quoted in the minutes as saying, "I want to have good reasons for voting for their dismissal," and a little later on in the proceedings Knox is quoted as having said, "My reason is that we have some other people whose names will be presented a little later that I would prefer to have in those positions."

No question of inefficiency or dishonesty here. No issue raised as to state economy. Just a frank declaration that one has some preferred people to whom one wants to give some state jobs.

Both Knox and Davis are recent appointees, Davis having been named by O'Daniel last fall and Knox by the governor this year. That gives the two O'Daniel appointees a majority over DeBerry, who was named by Governor Allred. And the recent action indicates that the newcomers will follow a "victor and spoils" policy in the operation of their department.

The board of control, administering the many phases of state government that it does, ought to be completely free of politics. It never will be, if there is a turnover in every employee position each time a new member is named to the board.

Washington Daybook

WASHINGTON—To understand the recurring shakeups in the Japanese government, keep these factors in mind:

At the beginning of the "incident" in China, Japanese leaders confidently predicted the show would be over in six months. Instead it is running past the middle of the third year.

In those three years every Japanese has had to work harder, and now all are getting less for their work than when this conquest of great Chinese resources started.

A half million Japanese have been killed or wounded. A million more are in the field. In a constant stream they move from their homes; often nothing comes back but ashes of the dead.

Domestic discontent with the situation has caused cabinet after cabinet to fall. Yet each new cabinet finds exactly the same old problems that caused the fall of the last. They must raise more and more money to conduct a war in China. And the war looks less and less like a victory.

Prices of rice are higher and rice is harder to get. In Japan that hurts.

THE ARMY RULES

Nobody in Japan or America is fooled when the Japanese army leadership claims it is not the motive power behind the government. Nevertheless, arm; authorities go through the motion of keeping the army from assuming active leadership of the cabinet. General Nobuyuki Abe, retiring premier, was not on the active army list. And in his place was appointed Admiral Yonai of the navy.

Washington observers found that was significant because the army must operate through a navy premier, and the navy in Japan traditionally has pursued a broader policy than the army.

And how may the cabinet shakeup affect U. S. Japanese relations?

It is remotely possible the government shakeup, coming as it does on the heels of several recent similar shakeups, may be the turning point toward a shift in the Japanese objective in China. Despite Japanese protests to the contrary, it is taken as a substantial fact that he Japanese aim in China is the displacement of foreign interests.

Another prospect is that the Japanese will employ different methods in China, even if their objective is not changed. The domestic discontent in Japan, together with such pressure as the United States may apply during its negotiations for a new treaty to replace the one we are ending this month, could easily awaken Japan to the need of a change of methods.

SOME "METHODS"

The objectionable "methods," as outlined by American observers, include:

First: Army authorities in China act as if Japan were already sovereign there, even though they claim they have no plans for a permanent conquest.

Second: Japan has substituted a fiat currency of her own in China, advantageous to herself, but potentially harmful to foreign traders who never can be certain from one day to the next that it will be worth anything.

Third: Exchange is manipulated to the advantage of Japanese.

Fourth: Japanese trade monopolies, or virtual monopolies, are fostered as "military necessities."

Fifth: Civilians are abused by army authorities.

Sixth: Americans deny there is any "military necessity" for the noisome barricades such as are enforced in such spots as Tientsin. Their purpose, as viewed here, is simply to humiliate foreigners in line with the ultimate purpose of ridding China of them.

HOLLYWOOD—This is the story of an actor's return to Broadway... an actor who learned to like Hollywood but liked himself enough to leave Hollywood in time. It is, therefore, a rare story.

The actor is J. Edward Bromberg, hereinafter to be labeled Joe. There can be no doubt that he is an actor. Four years ago New York critics voted him Broadway's outstanding performer—for his role in "Men in White." He wasn't making big money then, but when he finally came to Hollywood—because few can resist a four-figure offer—the ante had piled up in competitive bidding. Joe had waited because he liked the Group Theatre and what it was doing. But three years ago he came.

This last Christmas day he left. He gave a Christmas party, a farewell party, and a birthday party in one, and he hoped off. It was a pleasant goodbye to Hollywood, an au revoir, not one of those Hollywood-don't-dirt gestures.

"When I first came out," he said, "I took a little house and it seemed like a palace after my New York apartment. Mrs. Bromberg followed me, and she couldn't believe it—all this luxury. We didn't like pictures much. But Hollywood does something to you."

What Hollywood does is epitomized in this incident. The Brombergs went to dine one evening at the home of a top-flight star. They saw grandeur on the colossal scale. And then they went home, and what had seemed like a palace looked like a shabby hole. Somehow, before a month had passed they figured they'd better move—to something a little better. So far, so good....

The Bromberg career didn't exactly boom. He kept on giving top-notch performances in whatever roles came his way. The ones I remember are in "Suez" and "Four Men and a Prayer."

Last summer he went back east, looked around and decided it was Hollywood for him. On his return the Brombergs went house-hunting. They are going to settle down. It was probably the house-hunting that turned the trick finally.

"We were looking at places," said Joe Bromberg, "and being very particular. And then, suddenly, it struck us—what kind of place did we want. We knew the answer. We were looking for a mansion on the Hollywood scale. We were thinking of swimming pools and tennis courts and the trimmings. We realized what our tastes had become—and we saw the danger signal."

Joe figures they can live for five years in New York on his movie savings, although not in the Hollywood-acquainted style. He'd have had another nice raise if he'd signed again for pictures last option time. But they said no to his request for six months here and half a year there. He maneuvered a release. He's gone back to Broadway, where he'll work for much less than pictures give him.

I sort of admire that. I sort of admire a fellow who can go deaf on a pleasant fiddle and hear a far call like Broadway's.

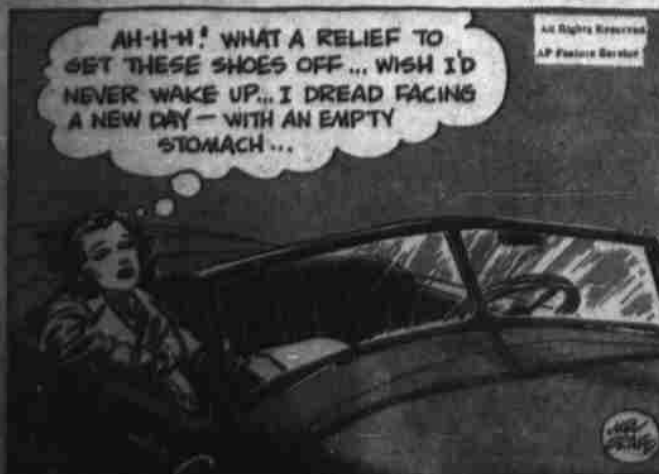

Oil Companies Act To Halt Pollution Of Nueces River

DALLAS, Jan. 24 (AP)—Fifty-three Texas oil companies took steps today to alleviate pollution of the Nueces river system under an out-of-court settlement that brought to a temporary close an injunction suit by the state.

Forty-four companies signed an agreement under which they will pay expenses of three engineers to make an immediate survey, and will follow recommendations as to diversion of waste, principally salt water, from the watershed of the river.

Nine other companies, claiming they already had taken steps to do away with the pollution, entering into a separate general agreement whereby they will give the state a report from their own engineers respecting future disposition of oil well waste.

Announcement of the settlement was made yesterday.

The state and all but two of the defendant companies entered agreements to postpone trial of the suit 45 days.

Beaumont, Port Arthur and Port Neches, cities listed as plaintiff intervenors, will not participate in the agreements and the settlement between the state and the companies was approved without prejudice to their case.

EXPORTS HALTED
OTTAWA, Jan. 24 (AP)—Canada has forbidden exports of wheat and other materials to Germany's bordering neighbors except by license.

The decision, reached last night with an order-in-council, was said by the office of Prime Minister W. L. Mackenzie King to make it possible now to prevent shipment of 1,250,000 bushels of wheat bought recently for Soviet Russia.

Sees Passage Of Wool Label Legislation

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24 (AP)—Representative South (D-Tex) expressed confidence today that congress would complete action this session on the pending wool label bill.

The measure, already passed by the senate and approved by a house committee, provides that all fabricated articles containing wool be labeled to show the exact fiber content and quantities of virgin and reclaimed wool.

South's optimism was expressed in the face of a recent statement by the United States chamber of commerce that in its opinion the federal trade commission had adequate power to cope with the labeling situation and that it recommended fair trade practice procedure, rather than legislative action, to correct any existing evils in the wool industry.

The Texan, however, asserted that the trade commission had sent its own representatives to testify before congressional committees in support of the measure.

"The legal staff of the commission has expressed doubt that they have legal authority to proceed in some cases where deceit by concealment in wool labeling, rather than by misbranding of an article is alleged," South said. "This doubt itself contradicts the commission's own position."

"It would take years to carry a case through trial and appellate courts to determine whether such power actually does rest with the commission. The proposed law would immediately remove all such doubts."

CIVIL SERVICE TO BE INSTATED FOR PRISON WORKERS

HOUSTON, Jan. 24 (AP)—From now on, persons gaining employment in the Texas prison system must pass a written examination and meet certain other requirements, one of them setting an age limit of 35 years.

The prison board is inaugurating a civil service setup for incoming employees. Those already working in the system will not be affected by the requirements.

The new program was decided upon at a meeting of the board yesterday. Chairman Sidney M. Lester of Houston said.

No one under 30 years of age or over 35 will be employed.

The examination will test the personality, adaptability, citizenship and marksmanship of the applicants.

PONTE VEDRA BEACH, Fla., Jan. 24 (AP)—Seven months of absence from tournament golf, enforced by an appendectomy before the National championship last summer, seems to have taken little from the game of red-haired, freckle-faced Patry Berg.

The sturdy little Minneapolis fairway queen, who in a short span of years has won more than a share of trophies ranging downward from the big cup emblematic of the United States National, stopped her first enroute to Miami and her first tournament competition since she won the Trans-Mississippi last June.

"I'm working hard on my game," she remarked. "You can't tell, though, how you'll go after a long layoff. I've played well in practice, but tournament golf is a different matter."

Accompanied by her father, Patry planned to make the Miami-Biltmore tournament, starting next Monday, her first port of call in a winter circuit swing that will keep them on the go until April 2. She will be seeking her fifth Miami-Biltmore title.

Huge Natural Gas Plant For Borger

PITTSBURGH, Jan. 24 (AP)—The Koppers company engineering and construction division announced today it had received a contract for the largest plant ever built for the purification of natural gas.

A seaboard process type of liquid purification plant is to be built at Borger, Tex., for the J. M. Huber corporation, manufacturers of gasolines and carbon blacks. The amount of the contract was not given.

The plant, with a capacity of 70,000,000 cubic feet of gas a day, will be employed to remove hydrogen sulfide from natural gas which is to be used in the manufacture of carbon blacks.

A company announcement stated that adoption of the seaboard process would comply with limitations which recently were placed upon the sulphur concentration in carbon blacks by some purchasers.

He is a leader in the dairy industry that means \$80,000,000 annually to Texas. A. L. Darnell, who again has been named superintendent of the dairy department of the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show, to be held March 8-17. Darnell is professor of dairy husbandry at Texas A. & M. College.

Sees Passage Of Wool Label Legislation

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24 (AP)—Representative South (D-Tex) expressed confidence today that congress would complete action this session on the pending wool label bill.

The measure, already passed by the senate and approved by a house committee, provides that all fabricated articles containing wool be labeled to show the exact fiber content and quantities of virgin and reclaimed wool.

South's optimism was expressed in the face of a recent statement by the United States chamber of commerce that in its opinion the federal trade commission had adequate power to cope with the labeling situation and that it recommended fair trade practice procedure, rather than legislative action, to correct any existing evils in the wool industry.

The Texan, however, asserted that the trade commission had sent its own representatives to testify before congressional committees in support of the measure.

"The legal staff of the commission has expressed doubt that they have legal authority to proceed in some cases where deceit by concealment in wool labeling, rather than by misbranding of an article is alleged," South said. "This doubt itself contradicts the commission's own position."

"It would take years to carry a case through trial and appellate courts to determine whether such power actually does rest with the commission. The proposed law would immediately remove all such doubts."

CIVIL SERVICE TO BE INSTATED FOR PRISON WORKERS

HOUSTON, Jan. 24 (AP)—From now on, persons gaining employment in the Texas prison system must pass a written examination and meet certain other requirements, one of them setting an age limit of 35 years.

The prison board is inaugurating a civil service setup for incoming employees. Those already working in the system will not be affected by the requirements.

The new program was decided upon at a meeting of the board yesterday. Chairman Sidney M. Lester of Houston said.

No one under 30 years of age or over 35 will be employed.

The examination will test the personality, adaptability, citizenship and marksmanship of the applicants.

PONTE VEDRA BEACH, Fla., Jan. 24 (AP)—Seven months of absence from tournament golf, enforced by an appendectomy before the National championship last summer, seems to have taken little from the game of red-haired, freckle-faced Patry Berg.

The sturdy little Minneapolis fairway queen, who in a short span of years has won more than a share of trophies ranging downward from the big cup emblematic of the United States National, stopped her first enroute to Miami and her first tournament competition since she won the Trans-Mississippi last June.

"I'm working hard on my game," she remarked. "You can't tell, though, how you'll go after a long layoff. I've played well in practice, but tournament golf is a different matter."

Accompanied by her father, Patry planned to make the Miami-Biltmore tournament, starting next Monday, her first port of call in a winter circuit swing that will keep them on the go until April 2. She will be seeking her fifth Miami-Biltmore title.

Huge Natural Gas Plant For Borger

PITTSBURGH, Jan. 24 (AP)—The Koppers company engineering and construction division announced today it had received a contract for the largest plant ever built for the purification of natural gas.

A seaboard process type of liquid purification plant is to be built at Borger, Tex., for the J. M. Huber corporation, manufacturers of gasolines and carbon blacks. The amount of the contract was not given.

The plant, with a capacity of 70,000,000 cubic feet of gas a day, will be employed to remove hydrogen sulfide from natural gas which is to be used in the manufacture of carbon blacks.

A company announcement stated that adoption of the seaboard process would comply with limitations which recently were placed upon the sulphur concentration in carbon blacks by some purchasers.

pushed the potential vote well past the 5,000 mark.

About the only group that seems more than passively interested in securing poll taxes is the Mexican population. By protecting the right to vote in their foster country a year ago they literally controlled a city election. Natives appear to be less astute than their adopted neighbors.

In Big Spring there are exceptions to the rule that you must pay a poll tax to vote, but there is no exception to the rule that you must have either a poll tax receipt or exemption certificate.

All "unders," those who have turned or will turn (prior to a given election in which they hope to vote) 21 years of age after Jan. 1, 1939, must have exemption certificates, both in Big Spring and in all rural communities. The "overs," those who turned 60 before Jan. 1, 1939, must have their permanent exemption certificates in town but not in rural boxes.

But whatever it is that they must have to vote, they must secure it not later than midnight, one week hence.

which are granted its individual leaders. In the congress, the unrestrained baiting and defaming of labor by the democratic majority has become a pastime, never subject to rebuke by the titular or actual leaders of the party.

Lewis asserted the democratic party "is in default to the American people" and that labor and the people are losing confidence.

Asserting congress was without a program, "except to enact necessary appropriations in ample time to engage in the national quadrennial political campaign," Lewis continued:

"I am one who believes that President Roosevelt will not be a candidate for re-election. Conceding that the democratic faction now permeating the disaffected convention should be coerced or dragged into renominating him, I am convinced that with the conditions now confronting the nation and the disaffection now permeating the minds of the people his candidacy would result in ignominious defeat."

He said the republican party could be "prevented from winning only by an accord between the democratic party and organized labor x x x"

Lewis also declared that the democratic party after seven years "finds itself without solution for the major questions of unemployment, low national income, mounting internal debt, increasing direct and consumer taxation and restricted foreign markets. There still exists the same national unhappiness that it faced seven years ago."

O'DANIEL CALLS FOR SUPPORT OF FDR'S BIRTHDAY EVENTS

AUSTIN, Jan. 24 (AP)—Governor W. Lee O'Daniel today urged Texans to support the president's birthday celebration January 30 by attending entertainments for the benefit of the foundation for infantile paralysis which President Roosevelt founded.

In a proclamation the governor said in part:

"The citizens of our state of 'beautiful Texas' are becoming more and more interested in the great cause of humanitarianism and brotherly love and realize that it is a noble debt to tenderly care for crippled children and try to restore their health."

While a new cold wave crept eastward across the middle west with temperatures as cold as 25 below zero in North Dakota, a storm of "wide extent and marked intensity" menaced the Cape Hatteras-Atlantic City area.

A batch of unusual weather gave Southern California heavy rain, snow, thunder, lightning and a highly unusual lunar rainbow. High seas battered the Pacific coastline.

Highway officials warned half the roads in southern Delaware would be impassable by mid-afternoon because of snowdrifts eight feet high. The Carolinas had their heaviest snow in decades. Virginia trains were running a half hour late.

Ice gorges on the Ohio river backed up nearly 30 miles but no immediate flood dangers were forecast. A steamship line canceled its annual packet excursion to New Orleans Mardi Gras.

The southern snow blanket, thickest in a generation in some places, extended from southern Georgia westward to Texas and northward into Tennessee, the Carolinas and Virginia. Hazards to humans and vegetation were great and discomforts widespread.
