

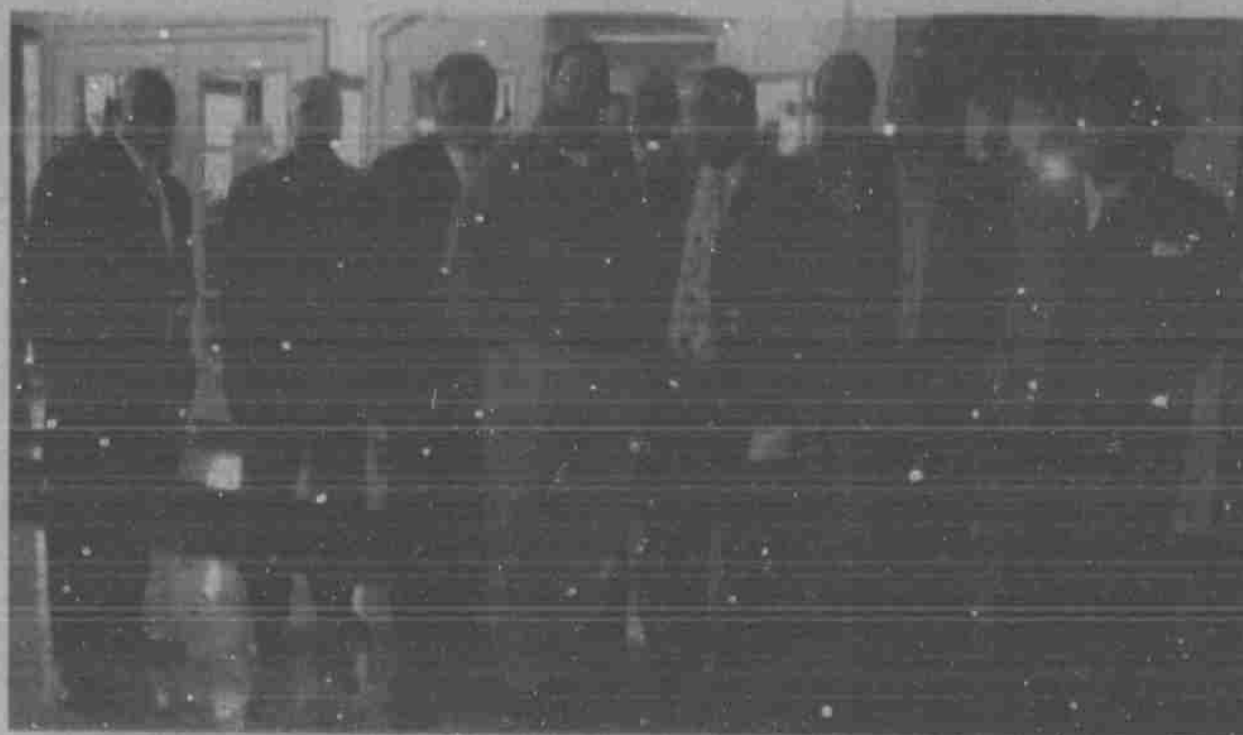

NEW YORK, NY - The NAACP named Roslyn M. Brock as Chair of the Board of Directors at its Annual Board Meeting on February 20 at the New York Hilton.

Brock, 44, became the youngest ever and fourth woman to serve as Chair of the NAACP's Board of Directors. A highly qualified candidate, her NAACP resume boasts more than 25 years of service to the NAACP in many capacities, including as a youth board member, Youth and College State Conference President, board member, and Vice Chair to the Board of Directors. Brock also created the annual NAACP Leadership 500 Summit, and has served as Chair of the Board Convention Planning Committee.

"As the NAACP ushers in a new generation, it is a great honor to be elected Chairman of the Board of this esteemed Association," said NAACP Chairman Roslyn M. Brock. "We are blessed with the opportunity to lead the fight for civil and human rights into another century, and I am honored to help the NAACP issue the clarion call while ensuring the future legacy of this great organization."

"We're looking at a generational shift in our communities," continued Brock. "We have a 48 year old President in the White House, an NAACP President who was 35 at the time of his election, and a 44 year old Board Chair. The wisdom of those who stood the test of time got us to this point, and the youth will lead the future success of our movement."

She officially announced her candidacy last August after her predecessor Julian Bond declared his retirement from the Chairman position. Bond endorsed Brock's candidacy, citing her experience in many facets of the Association as well as her youth as assets she will bring to the Chair position.

"The time has come for me to step down as Chairman of the Board and I cannot think of a better person to pass the torch to than Roslyn M. Brock. Ms. Brock understands first-hand how important youth are to the success of the NAACP. She was introduced to the NAACP 25 years ago when she served the NAACP as a youth board member and Youth and College Division State Conference President. She represents the next generation of civil rights leaders," said NAACP Chairman Emeritus Julian Bond.

"I am proud to be standing with Roslyn M. Brock as the new Chairman of the NAACP Board, and I thank Julian Bond for his twelve years of service," stated NAACP President and CEO Benjamin Todd Jealous. "Today we have elected the youngest Chairman in the history of the NAACP. This historic election, at the beginning of our second century marks a generational shift in the civil and human rights movement. Ms. Brock is fierce advocate for social justice, who is squarely focused on addressing the crises of today and winning the victories of tomorrow."

In addition to her service with the NAACP, Brock serves as Vice President at Bon Secours Health Care in Marriottsville, MD. She is the chief spokesperson for Bon Secours on government relations, advocacy and public policy. Prior to working at Bon Secours, Brock worked 10 years in health programs at the W. K. Kellogg Foundation in Battle Creek, Michigan.

She graduated magna cum laude from Virginia Union University; earned a master's degree

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Church News

From the Desk of Parson D.A. Smith
"Justice Clarence Thomas"

One of my Anglo-American attorney friends is very fond of Supreme Court Justice Clarence Thomas. She reminded me in a conversation that African-Americans should not be negative about Justice Thomas because he stands out as a great American and for justice for all Americans. My response was "we as humans have our own opinion and as African Americans we may perceive life differently as justice relates to African-Americans."

However, to my chagrin (relating to the non-action of Justice Thomas) I was totally surprised at a news story caption: "Clarence Thomas To Other Supreme Court Justices: Be Quiet".

Jay Reeve wrote: Clarence Thomas, the justice long known as the silent member of the Supreme Court, criticized his colleagues Friday (October 25, 2009) for badgering attorneys rather than letting them speak during oral arguments. Thomas - who hasn't asked a lawyer a question during arguments in nearly four years - said he and the other eight justices virtually

always know where they stand on a case by reading legal briefs before oral arguments.

"So why do you beat up on people if you already know? I don't know, because I don't beat up on 'em. I refuse to participate. I don't like it, so I don't do it," Thomas said during an appearance before law students at the University of Alabama.

Thomas didn't name names, but fellow conservative Justice Antonin Scalia is generally considered the court's most aggressive questioner during oral arguments. President Barack Obama's lone nominee so far, Justice Sonia Sotomayor, isn't afraid to ask questions either. Thomas scoffed at the idea that the justices try to use questions to influence the opinions of fellow member of the court. "All nine of us are in the same building," he said. "If we want to sway each other we know where we are. We don't need oral arguments to do that. It doesn't make any sense to me."

Reeves noted that Thomas compared Senate confirmation to selecting the referees for a college football game in hopes

of getting favorable calls for one team or the other. "That's all based on a particular outcome you want. That is the antithesis of judging. You're corrupting your process. I think the conformation process is both unnecessary, it's uniformed with respect to what the court actually does and it's very dangerous."

Thomas also noted "the court is too dominated by Ivy League lawyers and lacks regional diversity. People constantly worry about racial, gender and ethnic diversity and home states matter, too."

I am happy to know that parts of Justice Thomas are likened to brass. When he apply his thoughts to action (and quit acting like he is afraid of white males) black women may respect him and he just might become another Thurgood Marshall.

Question:

I have read some Christian who say that playing the lottery is a sin. Is that true???

Answer:

Playing the lottery would fall under the category of gambling. Gambling is defined as a game of chance for money or to take a risk in order to gain some advantage. The lottery is designed to offer the fortune of a lifetime in exchange for a small amount of money it advertises the potential for riches if you are willing to give your hard earned money for it. The temptation is to give more money in order that you will increase your chances to win. There are several problems that playing the lottery poses.

Firstly, the lottery is usually supported by those who can least afford it. The data is well documented that the poorest of our people are the ones who play the lottery beyond their ability. Again, the temptation to acquire riches with little.

Investment -- they get rich quick scheme. The poorest people of our communities have the least disposable income and consequently playing the lottery will affect what funds they have to support their families. If money is spent on playing the lottery could be used to better care for our families. Then playing the lottery becomes poor stewardship. Consider the parable of the steward in Luke 12:41-48.

Jesus expects us to be good

stewards of the things he entrusts us with, also in I Corinthians 4:1-2. We learn that it is required of a steward to be faithful.

Secondly, winning the battle would give us the financial resources that would take care of us for the rest of our lives. We would have no need to pray for daily bread; as we are instructed to pray in Matthew 6:18. It has

been my experience that God always gives us what we need. He chooses not to afflict us with excessive resources.

Recall the times when the children of Israel were in the wilderness and the needed food. God gave them enough for the day's need. If any amount of manna was gathered for future consumption (except for the Sabbath) it was found to be with

worms or it was foul. Exodus 16. If we believe God to be faithful. Then he will take care of all our needs. (Matthew 6:24). Having excess has the potential of causing us to become dependent upon ourselves, and not dependent upon God. We should do what God has given us the ability to do, but with the understanding that it is God who provides our jobs, our abilities to

get jobs and the health with which we are able to perform our jobs.

We have noticed in observing the history of African Americans in this country that the more educated and prosperous we become, the less dependent upon God we become. We suspect it is because we have forgotten who blessed us to succeed. We're not speaking against having riches or having an education.

In fact, we do advocate that riches and education are obtain-

able and are not sinful in themselves. The problem is not possessing riches. The problem arises when riches possess us riches that have been diligently worked for and not gamble for well be a tool in the hand of a faithful steward to be used by God.

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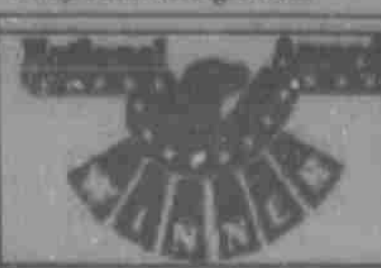

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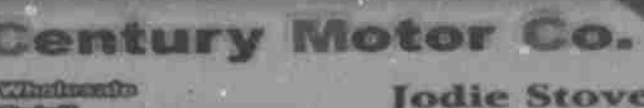
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
