S. W. Bell Tele. Co. Signs New Contract With District 6, CWA

A new 36-month contract representing an annual cost of \$24,115,000 was signed Feb. 8 by Southwestern Bell Telephone and District 6, Communications Workers of America, according to J. D. Hopkins, manager.

More than \$11,500,000 of this amount will be used to defray annual contract costs in Texas. The figure includes \$6,108,000 in increased wages and benefits for South Texas employees of Southwestern Bell.

The contract provides for renegotiation of wages after 18 months.

The agreement is effective Feb. 3. It covers 50,000 non-management telephone employees working in 917 cities in Missouri, Kansas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Texas and a small part of Illinois.

Wage increases in the new contract range from \$3.50 to \$9.50 a week.

Other major agreements include improvements in the company's medical expense plan; a new supplementary group life insurance plan; plus reduced rates for the present group life plan; improved pension arrangements and four weeks vacation after 20 years' service.

Upgrading of certain job titles, and changes in certain administrative procedures are also in the new contract, which was signed after four weeks of negotiations.

Harrist Resigns As Alderman

Earnest Harrist, an alderman for more than 13 years, has resigned because he soon will be moving into a home outside the city limits.

Harrist submitted his resignation at the City Council meeting Monday night, effective immediately.

His action in resigning more than 30 days before the April 4 election makes it unnecessary for the city to call a special election for candidates seeking to fill out Harrist's unexpired one year on the Council.

Mayor Delmar Hiller called the election for April 4 at which time three aldermen will be elected: Two from Ward 2 and one from Ward 1. Harrist's successor will be elected; N. F. Jackson, Ward 2, has filed for re-election; and Charley Garrett, Ward 1, already has filed for re-election. All candidates must file by March 4.

In accepting Harrist's resignation, Mayor Hiller commended him for his service to the city and the Council voted to draw up a formal resolution honoring Harrist.

Before the regular Council meeting, a joint public hearing was held by the Council and the Planning and Zoning Commission regarding application for rezoning and for special permits.

Dr. Aalbert Heine To Address Chamber Of Commerce Banquet

Dr. Aalbert Heine, director of the Corpus Christi Museum, will be the principal speaker at the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet Saturday night, March 4 in the Colony



Room at the Sandollar Motel.

The event, which also will mark the annual membership meeting of the Chamber, will begin with dinner at 7:30 p.m. During the evening the new officers of the Chamber will be introduced, and musical entertainment will be presented.

All members of the Chamber are urged to attend the banquet, and the public is cordially invited. Tickets at \$5 each may be purchased at the Chamber office or from any member of the board of directors.

The Chamber of Commerce is fortunate to have been able to get Dr. Heine as the main speaker. Not only is he highly regarded in the museum field but he also is a humorist who spices his talks with bits of humor.

Many people who have heard him consider Dr. Heine's humorous talks as much funnier than a lot of skits given by so-called professional humorists.

Dr. Heine has been director of the Corpus Christi Museum for 10 years. From 1951 to 1957 he was an instructor at the Museum of Natural History in New York.

From 1945 to 1951 he was a lecturer at the Municipal Museum for Education at Hague, Netherlands. He did his graduate work in geology and chemistry at Polytechnical Institute, The Hague.

In 1964 Dr. Heine received the Naumberg Award for outstanding performance in the museum field.

Free Polio Clinic March 5

A Polio Clinic will be set up in the Rockport Elementary School Sunday, March 5. The clinic will be open to the public from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. and from 2 p.m. to 6 p.m.

The oral polio vaccine is to be given free to all who desire to take it. This two-dose program is aimed at children from 6 weeks to 6 years, but many older children and adults also need to receive the polio vaccine. Polio vaccine is for all persons six weeks to 80 years of age.

If it has been three years since your last dose of polio vaccine, a booster dose is recommended. This recommendation was made by your Texas State Health Department, city and county health officers, and local doctors.

Booster doses of Polio Vaccine for people who participated in the 1962 Rockport Polio Program are now due.

This campaign was prompted by the fact that polio incidence was higher than usual in 1966.

This polio drive is being sponsored by the City-County Health Officers, local doctors, and the Rockport Lions Club.

Twenty local residents will visit homes in every section of Aransas County to accept contributions to the 1967 Heart Fund Campaign, and, as educational ambassadors, to distribute literature telling how to reduce the risk of heart attack and what to do in case of a heart attack.

"In addition to distributing this heart-saving information, Mrs. Bobby J. Driver, Heart Sunday chairman, said "the Heart Fund volunteer will present a Heart Sunday Envelope which the resident can use to strike a blow at the disease which took more than 900,000 American lives last year—54 per cent of the total number of deaths in this country."

Youth Hurt In Topple From Mast

A 20-year-old youth remained in critical condition in a Corpus Christi hospital from injuries Monday morning in a fall from the mast of a shrimp boat at Rockport Yacht and Supply Co.

A spokesman at Spohn Hospital said the youth, Charles Miller, was suffering head injuries.

Miller was working on the mast of a boat when the accident occurred.

It was reported that Miller fell about 30 feet to a concrete slab and a pile of iron pipe on shore when the mast on which he was working started to fall.

He attempted to jump into the water but missed.

Larry Taylor was born December, 1936, in San Antonio, Texas. As a lad of 11 or 12 years of age, Larry began associating with older boys and gradually drifted into their ways: typical Juvenile Delinquent. Along with this he was learning all the illegal tricks with cards and dice and soon became a professional gambler with a natural knack of making money. Though just a teenager, he was "big time."

This was the Larry Taylor before July 22, 1955. It was then he experienced the miraculous transformation that changed his life. In a very short time he realized that God was calling him to preach. He enrolled in a well known Bible school and then climaxed his education by attending Howard Payne University of Texas.

This well-dressed, handsome young man is today one of Southern Baptists' foremost and phenomenally successful evangelists. His dynamic, but sane and constructive preaching has resulted in some of the largest and most fruitful revivals in Southern Baptist history. Over 14,000 have united with the churches during his brief ten year ministry.

A tax report revealed that 93.78 per cent of school taxes had been collected through January. Gray said if \$7,000 more in taxes are collected, the school district will have collected the estimated local funds for the budget.

Taxpayers Urged To Use Form 1040A

Taxpayers who received a 1966 preaddressed Form 1040-A are urged to file that form if it fits their needs and they are eligible to use it.

Asa L. Crow, administrative officer of Internal Revenue for Corpus Christi, said today that substantial savings will be realized if the form provided is used because fewer key-punch operations are necessary to process the return. "It also helps us utilize the full capacities for which the Automatic Data Processing system was designed," he said.

If your name or address has changed make the necessary corrections by striking lightly through the preprinted information. If you have a refund due, this will help insure delivery of the check to the correct address.

Taxpayers should also verify that their correct social security number is entered on the return they file. The filing deadline for 1966 tax return is April 17, 1967.

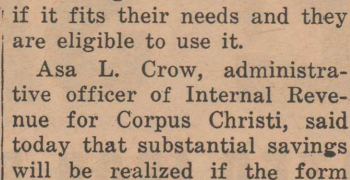

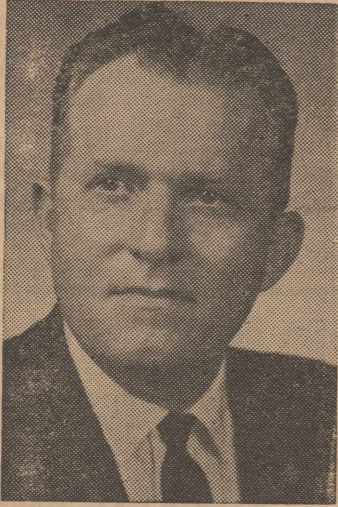

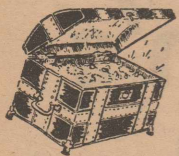

National Promotion For Rockport Area

One of the finest promotion projects ever instituted in behalf of the Rockport area is now a reality.

It is the sponsorship by the Chamber of Commerce and a number of local business people of an editorial and full-color photographic presentation of the beauty and attractions of this area.

The presentation appears on the front cover and six pages of the current issue of an outstanding magazine, "Texas Tropical Coast," which will be distributed throughout the nation to more than 75,000 persons considered prospects for visiting or moving to this area.

A total of 27 photographs appear on the six pages, 12 of them in full color in addition to the front cover. The scene on the front cover shows a young man and woman on a sun deck, with yachts and sailboats in the background.

The caption points out that these young people are enjoying "the coastal manner of life on one of the Coast's canal-type developments."

The publication, "Texas Tropical Coast," is produced and distributed by Corpus Christi Area Tourist Bureau. The distribution includes ports of entry into Texas where visitors from other states are given copies so they will have an opportunity to consider a visit to the Rockport area.

Another method of distribution is at boat shows and other similar events throughout the nation. The Tourist Bureau carefully selects those to whom the magazines are given—men and women who express an interest in the Coastal Bend region.

The Chamber of Commerce has a full page advertisement in this issue including five full-color photographs showing scenes of boats, a beach, fishing, golf, and artists at work in a setting of live oaks. Written material in connection with the ad reads as follows:

"Smart birds spend the winter at Rockport," is a local saying. A sizeable portion of the migratory waterfowl of the United States, and all the uncaptured whooping cranes in the world do.

"Picturesque Rockport, Fulton Beach and Lamar present the most restful setting on the Texas Coast for birdlife, and humans alike. While the waterfowl favor the winter months, this is a year-round resort.

"The reason is obvious. Outdoorsmen, artists and fun and sun seekers find it all wrapped in one neat package in the live-oak lined area,

properly named "The Toast of the Coast." Aransas, Copano, Redfish and St. Charles Bays provide year-round fishing. The Gulf of Mexico is only minutes away.

"Duck and goose hunting is tops or if you just prefer to watch the cranes, herons or spoonbills, you can do that, too.

"The weather is balmy, the beaches are broad, and the ski basin is one of the best on the coast. Golf is played 12 months of the year. One of the

finest art schools in the country is located here.

"So, why don't you be like the birds, and try Rockport for a visit. Or better yet, buy a home at one of the region's waterfront or oak-covered areas. People do it every day."

James P. Hanway to rezoned four lots from R-2 residential B-1 business.

—Granted special permit to Mrs. Violet Brundrett to locate and use a mobile home on a lot within the city limits for a three-year period, at the end of which the Council will consider renewing the permit. Another stipulation was that the mobile home have bathroom facilities and be connected to the city sewer system or an approved septic tank.

—Granted a special permit to Mrs. Rosetta Given for a similar request and added the same stipulations, plus a requirement that the premises be cleaned up.

Next the Council voted to make two changes in the zoning ordinance, as follows:

1) The first will prohibit individual travel trailers, mobile homes or motor homes within the city except by special permit unless located in a legally established trailer camp or mobile home park. Special permits will be required for new trailer parks and mobile home parks and they can be located only in B-1 business, B-2 business or I-industrial districts.

2) The second change permits the erection of fences six feet high. The ordinance had limited the height to five feet.

—Decided to continue to explore with the Navigation District the possibility of increasing the water supply to Cove Harbor.

—Authorized Director of Public Works Tom Shults to run tests on water well No. 17 and hire Layne-Texas to work with him in attempting to improve the quality of the water produced by this well.

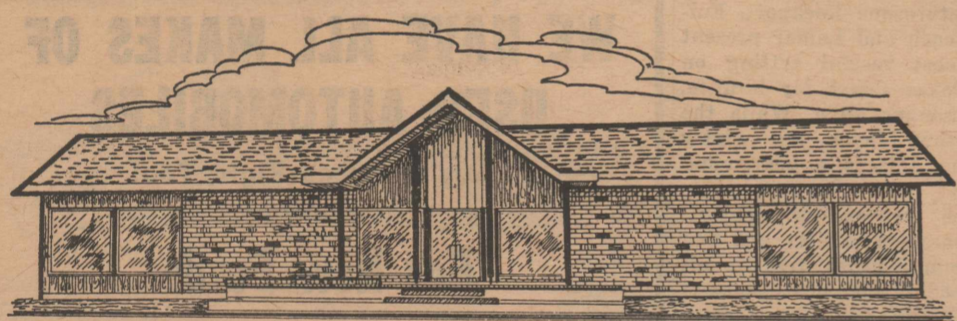

EVANGELIST LARRY TAYLOR

Larry Taylor was born December, 1936, in San Antonio, Texas. As a lad of eleven or twelve years of age, Larry began associating with older boys and gradually drifted into their ways: typical Juvenile Delinquent. Along with this he was learning all the illegal tricks with cards and dice and soon became a professional gambler with a natural knack of making money. Though just a teenager, he was BIG TIME!

BOBS WILT AS CRISIS HITS SOTEX

Overpopulated bobwhite quail in South Texas are starving while blue or scaled quail remain in good condition, according to Tom D. Moore, regional director of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Biologists, game wardens, and hunters agreed that the game little bobwhites were in distress.

One hunter described them as "nothing but sharp breast bone, and empty craw, and a fluff of feathers." He said they killed a few birds, found they were unfit to eat and quit hunting.

Along the western edge of south Texas, blue quail remain in good condition, since the habitat is really better suited to them than to the bobwhites, he said.

Department personnel forecast winter losses of quail due to the dwindling food supplies. Freezing weather has killed green weeds and such, and competition for available food with other birds and rodents is simply too much for the bobs.

Moore said normally 80 percent of this year's bumper crop would not survive until next spring, regardless of hunting pressure. This is the reason hunters were encouraged to harvest the birds.

"It is too bad," Moore said, "that every bird that is dying now couldn't have been harvested by the legal hunter when it was in prime condition."

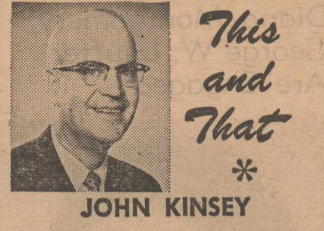

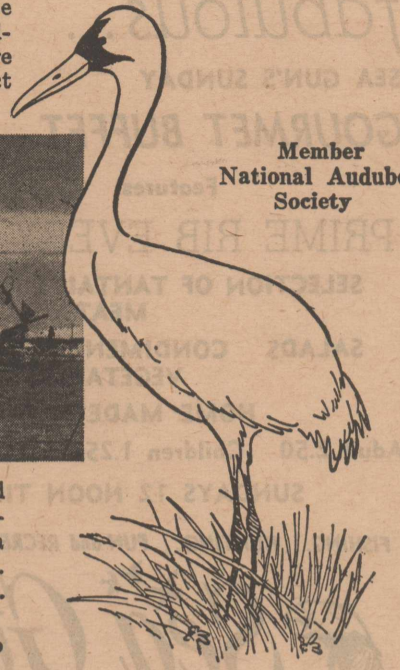
