75 PLANES IN AIR RACE WILL PASS THROUGH TEXAS

MANY FAMOUS PILOTS ENTER FOR CONTESTS

THREE CITIES OF WEST TEXAS WILL BE HOST TO PLANE FLEET

(By Associated Press)
ROOSEVELT FIELD, N. Y., Sept. 4.—Thirty-one of more than 75 planes entered in the national transcontinental air races starting tomorrow were on the field today.

They were mostly planes entered in class A, largest of the three divisions in point of numbers, the first to get away, starting at 5 a. m. tomorrow. Two other groups, class B and part of class C, start Thursday at 5 a. m. The non-stop race for planes in class C gets under way Sept. 12.

Prizes totaling \$57,000 will be awarded in the three divisions. The same prizes will be made available by the planes in the three divisions. The race will take five days, overnight stops being made at Columbus, O., Kansas City, Mo., Fort Worth, Tex., El Paso, Tex., and Yuma, Ariz. Thirty minute stops during the day are to be made at Harlingen, Pa., McKeen, Pa., Dime House, Ind., St. Louis, Mo., Wichita, Kan., Oklahoma City, Okla., Abilene, Tex., Midland, Tex., Pecos, Tex., Lordsburg, N. M., Tucuman, Ariz. and San Diego, Calif.

Classified in the entry list is Clarence Chamberlin, last minute entry in class A, who was late appearing for an examination of his plane, load check and certification of his entry, had a last chance to arrange these details today.

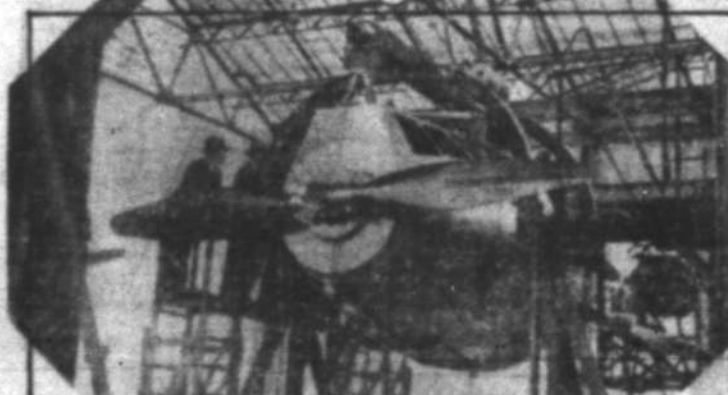
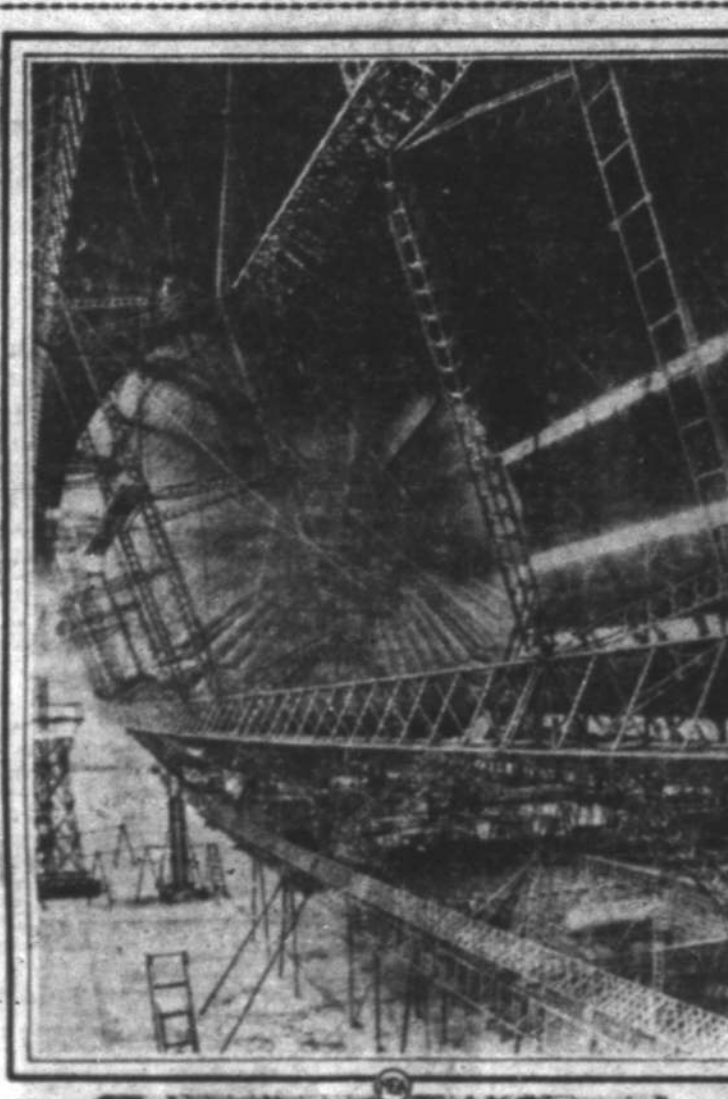

CALIFORNIA FOREST FIRES LAY BARE THOUSANDS OF ACRES OF TIMBER AND MENACE HOMES ON FOUR MILE FRONT

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 4.—(P)—Two forest fires, one in northern California and the other in the southern part of the state, continued to burn out of control today, harrying ranchers. Forestry officials tried fire fighters. Believed to have been throttled after a long battle, the fire which sent its withering blast over several thousand acres in the Pine Valley section near San Diego burst anew last night covering another 2,500 acres and driving efforts of fighters on a four mile front.

TRIO TAKE OFF ON JOURNEY TO MITCHEL FIELD

EXPECT TO MAKE HOP IN FORTY HOURS BACKERS SAY

(By Associated Press)
PARIS, Sept. 4.—The flying sergeants Jean Asolant and Rene Lefevre, who took off from Le Bourget field this morning on a transoceanic flight, were sighted at 9:35 a. m., by a fishing boat in latitude 44.50 north and longitude 1.47. They were heading westward.

The fishing boat was in the Bay of Biscay about 20 miles southwest of Bordeaux. The point indicated is approximately 280 miles from Le Bourget field where the start was made. This was the first report of the plane since its take-off.

The report was taken as an indication that the fliers were heading for the Azores with the intention of reaching the United States. Their general course had been south west from Le Bourget field until they were clear of the coast of France, after which it was apparent they had changed to a general westerly course.

The fishing vessel, the Dauphin, sent the report concerning the plane by wireless to its owners at Port Arcahon. The message added: "Asolant headed west, making high speed, flying higher."

Indian Races
And Legends
Disappearing

One of the most deplorable tragedies of this age is the fact that the rich culture of American Indian life is not being preserved, in the opinion of Elsie Well, newspaper woman and author who lived for some time among the Blackfoot Indians in Montana and was adopted into the tribe of the Peigans.

"It would seem as if the only solution left to the Indian problem is complete diffusion, which seems to me a crime considering that it

would eventually mean the elimination of all that rich culture," Miss Well said.

"In the tribes I know, of a total of about 2,000 Indians, there are less than 1,000 pure bloods left. The fine old warriors are living in the stories of the dead buffalo days; the old women still preserve their lovely religious sun festivals of another day, but the young generation is intermarrying and losing much by becoming educated and cultured."

The New Mexico and Arizona Indians have received encouragement through a widespread appreciation of their art. But the Blackfoot tribes, richest in beautiful legends of all tribes are at a standstill. Unless some savior of their own race rises to lead them, it is only a question of time until the last traces of this noble race are gone.

Book Is Published
By C. W. Ferguson

A book which Doubleday, Doran & Company have announced for October is "The Confusion of Tongues," written by Charles W. Ferguson, a former Lubbock man who has been in New York for two years and is religious editor for this company. Mr. Ferguson is the son of the late Rev. C. N. N. Ferguson, who was pastor of the First Methodist church here at the time of his death.

His book was mentioned Sunday by Emphrey Lee in an article in the book review section of the Dallas News and an excerpt from Mr. Lee's article follows:

"Should Attract Attention. The new book, which Doubleday, Doran & Co. announce for October publication is called 'The Confusion of Tongues.' The chapter titles indicate that the volume includes a wide variety of American movements under the head of religious. It is a spiritualist's share with Ku Kluxism and the Society for the Promotion of Atheism the honor of classification with Christian Science, New Thought and the Four-Square Gospel of Almeda McPherson. The grouping in itself is enough to attract attention. In what sense is the Ku Klux Klan what sense is to be conceived as a new and distinct religious movement? By what stretch of the imagination is the Society for the Promotion of Atheism a religious cult? Those at all interested in the American scene will await eagerly Ferguson's interpretation of his menagerie."

"The book will arouse controversy for Christian Scientists will not be pleased with either the company they are made to keep or the manner in which they are treated; while orthodox churches will find their satisfaction at the author's handling of off-brand sects somewhat neutralized by various side remarks concerning the regular organizations. And the manner of Ferguson's writing will not lessen the sting of some of his remarks for he possesses a rare knack of fact characterization."

"The Confusion of Tongues" should have inherent interest for America has long been the breeding place for cults as diverse as those which flourished in the Hellenistic world. Southern California is reported to be strangely like cities of Asia Minor in the first centuries of our era in the number and picturesque of the religious groups which find harbor there. Whether Ferguson's book is to be a sober historical survey of the various religious movements which make up the modern Babel or whether the volume is to be a satiric attack upon American religiosity and credulity remains to be seen. At the most one could hardly expect that a writer could at the same time please the Methodist church and H. L. Mencken."

HOAX RECALLED

Journalist's Death
Revives Notorious
Trick News Story

DALLAS, Sept. 4 (AP)—The Dallas Times Herald will say today that Warren Dull, newspaper reporter who dropped dead in his hotel room at Corpus Christi yesterday, had the unique distinction of having been responsible for one of the most unusual hoaxes in American journalism.

Twenty years ago, the newspaper said, Dull wrote the story of the eruption of Mt. Shasta in California. The account of the supposed disaster was sent by telegraph and cable to every newspaper of importance in the world, only to be followed shortly by a vehement denial.

The inside story of Mt. Shasta was revealed six months ago by Dull in an interview. He explained that the hoax was arranged in an effort to trap an alleged news thief who had been using Dull's stories in opposition papers.

Accordingly, Dull framed the story of the eruption and prepared to telegraph it to his paper explaining to a copy reader that it was merely a trap and should be destroyed.

The hoax, however, though overjoyed at the scheme failed to show up for duty and a substitute accepted the story as genuine. Every paper in the country carried the item as its leading story.

The next day Dull and the dead man met and the former resigned.

"The army will follow the line of conduct marked by its duty and patriotism. We will support utterances of President Calles." The army will remain aloof from political participation in the selection of a provisional president, in that selection the army's only role will be to support whomsoever Congress may constitutionally put at the head of the government.

Storm Warning For Boats Near Yucatan
WASHINGTON, Sept. 4. (AP)—The weather bureau today issued the following storm warning: "Advisory 10 a. m. Tropical disturbance central about 20 North, 85 West moving West Northwestward at rate of about 30 miles per day. It is still apparently of moderate but slowly increasing intensity and it will likely pass through Yucatan channel late tonight. Caution advised vessels bound south-eastern gulf next 36 hours."

Seaman Drowns Off Charleston Coast
WASHINGTON, Sept. 4. (AP)—The Navy Department was advised today of the drowning of W. L. Lindsey, seaman on the destroyer Flusser, near Charleston, S. C., yesterday. The body has not been recovered.

DENGUE HITS GREEK LEADER

DISEASE CUTS SWATH IN POPULATION OF CITY OF ATHENS

ATHENS, Sept. 4.—Premier Eleutherios Venizelos today was suffering from the dengue plague, which during the last month has killed 412 persons in Athens. The plague is a form of violent fever peculiar to warm countries.

The premier, who is more than 60 years old, recently completed a strenuous political campaign in which his supporters won a sweeping victory. During his long career in public life, he has endured the rigors of war and the strain of many crises and no anxiety is felt over his condition. Hopes that the attack will not prove serious is founded in part upon his uniformly good health in the past.

The ministry of hygiene estimates the total cases of the plague in Athens exceed 250,000. Of the total mortality of 1,200 in Athens for the month of August, the plague accounted for one-third of the deaths. In the Port of Piræus the rate was about as great, dengue causing the death of 176 out of a total of 592 fatalities.

The epidemic has also visited Jugoslavia and Macedonia. From Thessalonica, it was reported that a heavy death toll was claimed among the native population by the spread of the plague despite the quarantine of the frontier.

"The city bond election set for September 2 concerns a number of important problems other than the subway project," Mayor Harley D. Woods said this morning.

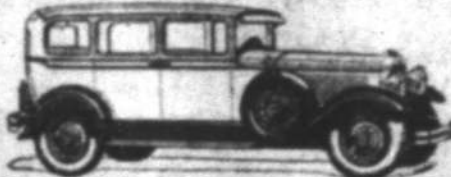

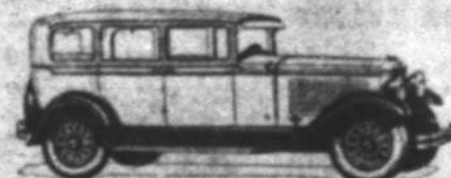

There was a flurry of selling shortly after the monthly private crop estimates were released, and September corn, bearing the brunt of the attack was rapidly driven down more than 2¢. Deferred deliveries lost from 3-4 to 10¢ in sympathy. Belief the private report would indicate prospects of a 3,000,000 bushel deficit. Corn was borne out. The average of four surveys by leading observers was 3,067,000 bushels, compared with the previous month forecast of 3,019,000 bushels, a government forecast Aug. 1 of 3,030,000 bushels, and the 1927 yield of 2,774,000 bushels.

Wheat, too, lost a little ground on scattered selling, but at the end of the first hour was only 3-8 to 1 1/2¢ under the dull opening figures. The drop was attributed partly to the continuation of favorable harvest weather in Canada and reports of rain beneficial to the crop in Australia and Argentina. The private reports projected a domestic spring wheat crop of 216,000,000 bu. 26,000,000 bu. more than was looked for by the same observers a month ago. The government forecast Aug. 1 was for 213,000,000 bu. and last year's crop was 219,000,000 bu.

The republican nominee for governor, William Tudor Gardner, an immensely popular personality, has stood on the record of both state and national administrations. Gardner's democratic opponent, Edward C. Moran, Jr., is a fighting leader of the younger generation. He has been a partisan of Gov. Smith from pre-convention days.

Furthermore, the democratic senatorial candidate, Herbert E. Holmes, who opposes the re-election of Senator Frederick Hale for a third term. But they have no delusions about

CATHOLICS PETITION TO CONGRESS FOR NEW RELIGIOUS LAW

(By Associated Press)

MEXICO CITY, Sept. 4.—A petition signed by 140 prominent Catholic laymen asking amendment of the religious laws to establish "complete religious liberty in Mexico and make the church and state independent" was before a senate committee today for consideration.

The petition was read in the senate last night and turned over to the committee on constitutional points for a report on it. The memorial was also filed with the chamber but that body was not in session yesterday.

The petition asks in part: "First, that the legal existence and personality of all distinct denominations be recognized."

Second, that the separation and independence between the state and different religious denominations be recognized and that consequently the state should not legislate in religious affairs.

Third, that this separation not be a system of hostility but of friendly cooperation in order to benefit at Washington is going about the state "selling Al Smith," as he himself terms it.

LEARNING TO BE AN AIR PILOT

LAW FOR NEW TRAFFIC OF AIR ARE SADLY NEEDED, CAPTAIN BUCHANAN FINDS

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the last of a series of articles in which Captain Malcolm J. Buchanan, writer for The Journal and NEA Service, explains the use of the airplane and how to operate it. Buchanan was a pilot with the U. S. army air corps on the western front during the world war and is now on the editorial staff of the Fort Worth Press.

By CAPT. MALCOLM BUCHANAN
The government has placed aviation control in the hands of the department of commerce. Congress, upon recommendation from the commerce department, has made rapid strides in passing laws to control flying. Three to five years ago it was no uncommon sight to see planes, flying commercially, that were not only unsafe for their pilots, but for everyone around them.

Dangerous Practice
Would-be pilots all over the country, who could raise enough money to do so, bought old worn-out planes, took flying lessons and started carrying passengers. I have seen pilots who could hardly keep a ship in the air hang out their sign and begin commercial flying. In many cases this was suicidal.

At that time there was no way to stop this unsafe practice. Laws were needed to curb the untrained and reckless aviator who endangered his own life as well as the lives and property of others.

The laws now are good as far as they go, but there is room for much improvement and coverage. It is up to the states to come in and do their part, both in examining and enforcing the laws.

As a pilot does not cross a state line he cannot be touched by national law regardless of his incompetence. The unlicensed pilot with the unlicensed ship is still a free lance and allowed to do as he sees fit. In most states there are laws to prevent him from hauling passengers.

Public Realizes Peril
But today the public is beginning to wake up to the fact that the unlicensed ship and pilot are unsafe, and as this becomes more generally known the unsafe operator will be forced from the field and flying will then be on a better basis.

The commerce department now requires pilots to obtain a certain rating for one of the three classes of flying that he intends to keep in air transport, and limited. Certificates for each are issued for six-month periods, at the end of which time they must be renewed by examination.

Airplanes must be approved by a department of commerce issued, a certificate, which must be displayed in a prominent place on the ship. The machine is given a number and an initial. The usually are painted on the upper and lower wing and on the tail. Planes with numbers only, are merely identified to show that the pilot has applied for inspection. The initial will be added when the inspection is complete.

Loss of License
Under existing regulations the unlicensed pilot is not allowed to fly a licensed ship. Neither is the licensed pilot allowed to fly the unlicensed plane. Infraction of these rules may mean loss of license. Laws governing aerobatic flying over airways and cities are in effect as well as rules which set the altitude at which pilots must stay while passing over designated territory.

In most states low flying is prohibited, and there is also a national law which has to do with the plane. But it is necessary for the states to back up the government all the way if the proper results are to be accomplished.

An illustration of the lack of flying laws came up last year in one of the eastern states. A lawsuit that resulted had some amusing aspects. A flying school was doing a thriving business. It had ample space for a landing field, but adjoining the field lived a farmer who was not sold on the aviation idea. He complained that his cattle were getting poor and being kept in a stage of nervous breakdown by the constant passing of planes over his farm. Fliers at the school could not help but take off over the farmer's fields, and the owner began to grow more angry.

At length he attempted to build a high fence at the line where his property adjoined the flying field, but found that it did no good; the planes soared over it. Finally he took the matter to court and attempted to enjoin the fliers from crossing his property. During the trial he testified his chickens had quit laying, his livestock had lost weight and his family was unable to sleep at night from dreaming of airplanes.

The court, contrary to the common belief that the sky is the limit in regard to ownership of land, held that he could not prevent flying over the property. However, the judge restricted the planes to an altitude of not less than 500 feet.

Just as a ship at sea, the airplane, when flying over dark must have displayed the proper navigation lights.

Mechanics and riggers who work on the machines must also have a certificate to insure proper work being done.

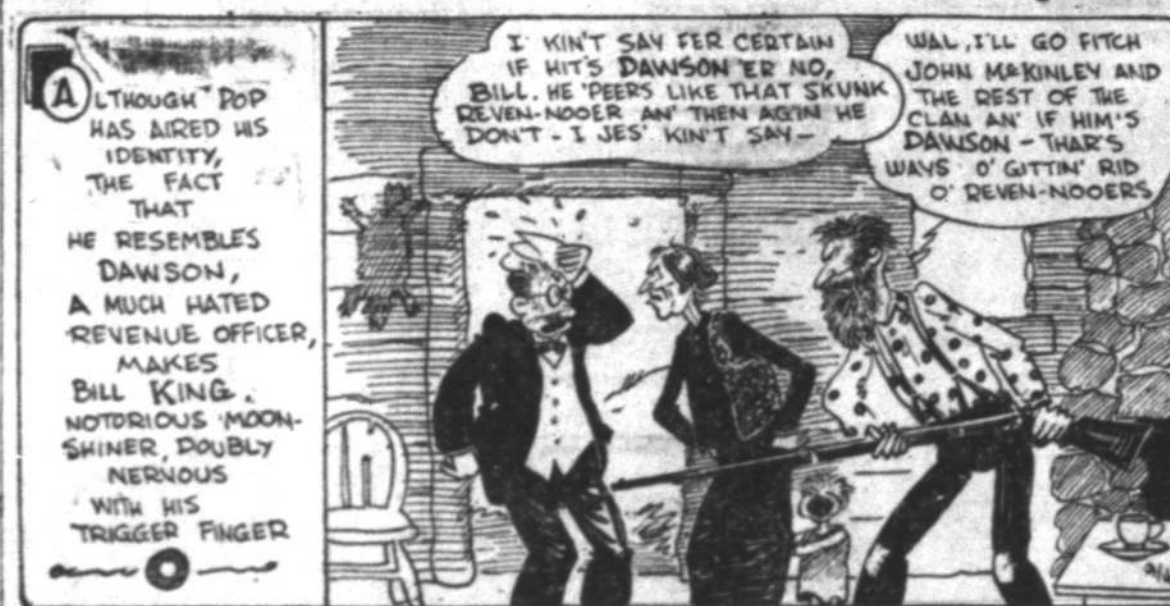

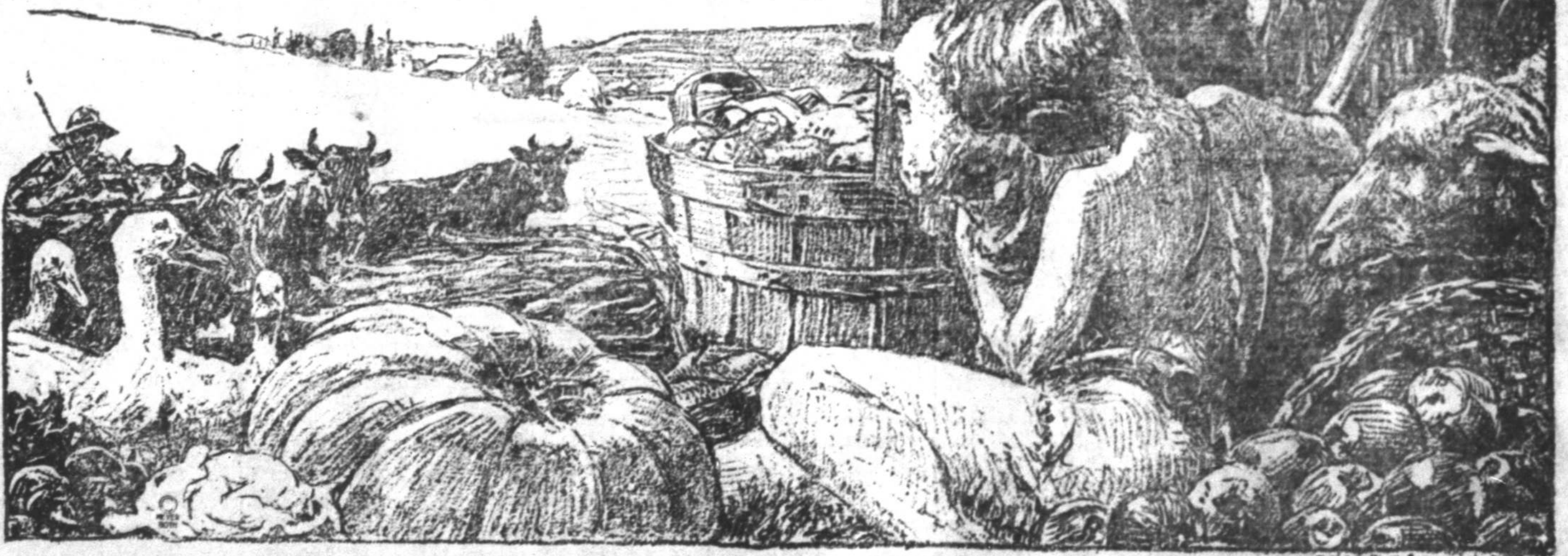
