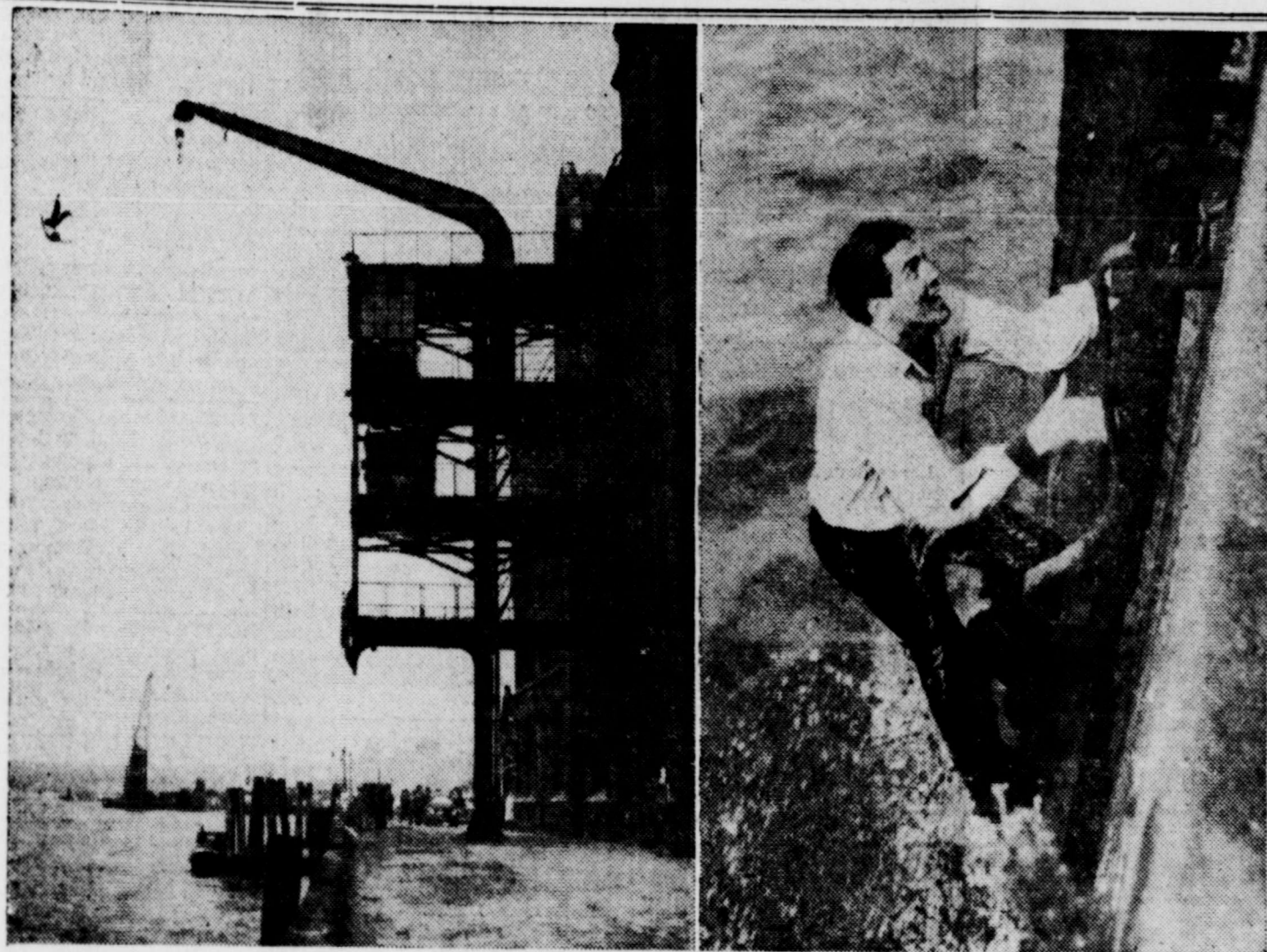

PROGRESS IS REPORTED IN MOVE TO CUT DOWN ON USE OF WATER

Cisco water consumers are making progress in the campaign to cut the use of city water to 500,000 gallons per day, Mayor G. C. Rosenthal reported Saturday. Pumping time at the Lake Cisco treating plant has already been cut slightly in the voluntary program announced last Wednesday.

Mr. Rosenthal reported that the city water department has completed mailing letters to users of more than 7,000 gallons during the period from May 15 to June 15. The letters told the consumer how much water he used during the period, with a message as follows:

"We estimate that 80 per cent of our customers are cooperating with a voluntary water conservation request. To insure enough water for health, sanitation and fire protection, we must have 100 per cent cooperation from our customers. We have no idea when relief will come in the way of rain, but we do have an idea of how long the existing supply of water will last.

North Stands To Have New Seats

Work will begin Monday on the remodeling of the center section of the north stands at Chesley Field, and the work will be completed by the opening of the 1953 football season, it was reported Saturday by Arlin Bint, superintendent of schools.

Mr. Bint said that workmen had completed tearing down of old seats and that the installing of the new lumber would start Monday morning. The lumber for the work is on hand. The work will be done by school employees.

The work is a part of a long range plan to remodel the entire stands at the field. The center section of the north stands will be completed this year, and the rebuilding of the south stands is planned for next year. The following year the two end sections of the north stands will be remodeled.

The new seats will be bolted to the steel frame work to assure stronger and longer lasting seating. The new lumber will receive a paint job as a preservative measure. New steps and some new rails will be built this year.

Coming in for its share of work will be the field house which was begun after last football season. The inside walls and woodwork are being painted and composition shingles will be palced on the outside walls. The field house will be ready for the opening of fall drills on September 1.

The fence arrangement near the field house will be changed to allow the teams entrance to the dressing rooms from the playing field.

The grass on the field is in good condition considering the weather, Mr. Bint said. Currentment of watering has gone into effect, and it was feared that some of the progress would be lost during the summer months.

The work on the athletic plant is in line with a general reconditioning program that has been in effect for the past few years.

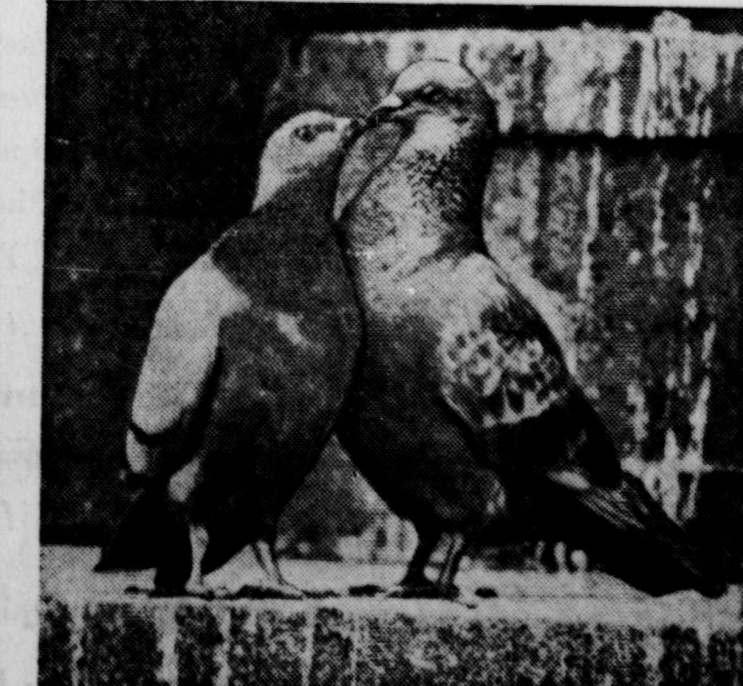

CUT IT SHORT

They tell a story in newspaper circles of the cub reporter who turned in two columns about a fire and objected when the city editor cut it to one paragraph. "The story of the creation of the world was told in the Bible in six hundred words," said the editor. "Is your story bigger than that?"

The habit in the business world of stringing out letters unnecessarily is a waste of time and good white paper. 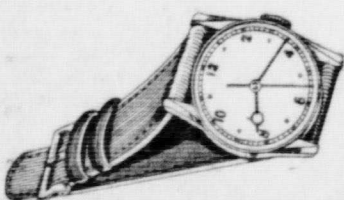

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Fastest Growing Annuals Flower in Forty Days



Fragrant Double Dwarf Nasturtiums.

Even if summer has come with no flower seed sown, you can sow the following annuals, which with normal weather should germinate within five days and bear flowers in 30 to 40.

Zinnias, ageratum, alyssum, candytuft, centaureas, clarkia, cymoglossum, annual sun flowers, morning glories, annual pinks, leptosyne, linaria, marigolds and poppies.

This list could be greatly enlarged by including annuals which take a little more time to develop, such as asters, which if sown now in the garden will produce sturdy plants more likely to resist disease than those started in greenhouses; and will flower by mid-August.

Early summer is the normal time to sow the nasturtium which will not germinate until hot weather arrives, yet is a contrary flower because it will not flower well in hot weather. The

death rate exceeded in the United States only by New Mexico and Arizona.

The death rate from diarrhea is a fairly good gauge of sanitation in a community or in a state. This condition occurs more often among children of families with low incomes, with a resulting higher frequency of death. It is highly contagious and in times past has spread like wildfire through the population. Therefore, the control of diarrhea (which may have a number of causes such as infections of the intestine, food poisoning, or colds) finally boils down to a problem of public health and education.

Public health officers and private physicians are fighting the high incidence of the diarrhea diseases by teaching those caring for infants of the need for absolute cleanliness of any food or equipment used in feeding and for measures to keep the disease from spreading. Besides conducting clinics and classes in infant care, health departments send nurses into homes to demonstrate the correct way to sterilize formulas, handle food, and disinfect the clothing and dishes of sick babies. They make surveys to see what kind of sanitation exists in homes and point out improvements that should be made.

The danger of diarrhea hinges on the fact that the infant can lose ground so rapidly. Some lose four or five pounds the first

twenty-four hours. Doctors know now that in a great many instances it is more important to replace the water and minerals lost through the food tube than to try to give specific treatment. The speed with which diarrhea can rob the body fluids demands that prompt medical attention be sought. Infants who die usually are those who are not seen until late in the course of the disease.

If Texas is to reduce the number of deaths from infantile diarrhea, a continuing fight for sanitation and adequate medical care for children must be fought.

A chamber of commerce executive for over 30 years, Wilson has devoted most of his adult life to community and regional improvement. He organized the Munday, Texas, Chamber and served as manager of the Lamesa, Olney and Sulphur Springs Chambers.

Wilson has gained wide prominence in chamber work. He at-

tended Northwestern University and Southwestern Institute to study advanced chamber of commerce administration.

He has authored many papers on management and program planning. He originated the Community Clinic program as a service of the East Texas Chamber, organized the Chamber of Commerce Managers Association of East Texas and conceived the East Texas Chamber's short course for managers and secretaries.

Before entering chamber work, Wilson attended Baylor University, taught school for 11 years and served as high school principal and superintendent at Anson, Hamlin and Munday.

His leadership ability and talents in organization work earned him a place in the Texian Who's Who published in 1937.

Precautions Are Needed At Home Before Vacation

AUSTIN, June 27.—There's no place like home and to most returning vacationers, home is a most welcomed sight.

But while the mountains and seaside promise weeks of care-free pleasure, what happens to your home? A vacant house is a constant temptation to fire and theft.

A few pre-vacation precautions suggested by Norris W. Parker, manager of the Texas Insurance Advisory Association, may save home-owners both money and worry.

A good job of housecleaning can greatly reduce the possibility of fire. Old newspapers and accumulated rubbish in attics, yards and garages are good places for fire to start. Water heater closets are dangerous when doubled as a storage closet.

Besides locking all outside doors, all cabinet and closet doors on the inside should be locked. Therefore, if a fire should start it may be confined to one room until it is discovered and brought under control.

Shades should be left up and blinds open so that a fire may be observed right away, Mr. Parker explains.

Electrical appliances such as toasters, lamps, radios, etc. should be left unplugged and refrigerators and freezers turned down to vacation level.

Inform your neighbors when you leave so that they can keep an eye on your place and report any trouble either from fire or burglary. The appearance of any strangers or suspicious persons about should be reported to the police.

Milk and newspaper deliveries should be postponed for stacked-up papers and bottles on the porch are a dead give-away that you are out of town.

Unkept yards are another clue to a potential burglar that the house is empty. Let your yardman keep up his regular visits if possible.

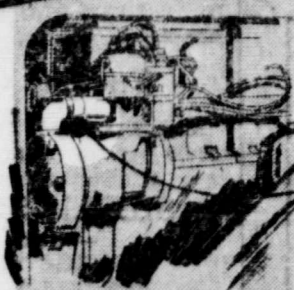
Don't advertise the fact that you are leaving town by telling strangers and ask your neighbors not to mention your absence to strangers.

These rules are simple, Mr. Parker points out, but oftentimes they appear so obvious that they are overlooked by the excited homeowner anxious to get started on his vacation trip.
