(By The Associated Press)
RAID CITY, N. D. June 15.—The
summer White House was set up
in a mountain country skirting the great
northern plains of the northwest.

Somehow weary from his two
all day journey from Washington,
he came into the Black Hills of
south Dakota with a hearty wel-
come from his people anticipating
months of relaxation amid these
scenic hills and cool mountain
springs.

The purple haze of a western twilight
was gathering as the President
reached his summer destination.
Crackling fires of pine wood
the numerous first places of the
room state game lodge, which
house them, took the chill from
the air and spread some warmth
to the distinguished occupants.

The special train carrying the
President and the entire White
House retinue ended its 1900 mile
journey here at 5:30 p. m. Mr. Coolidge
and Mrs. Coolidge stepped from
their car to the busy cheers of this
city's inhabitants. Rapid City,
South Dakota, welcomed its first presidential
visit with the roar of 21 guns.

Before night had settled in most
of the White House household
had left Washington and was
in the nearby cabin sur-
rounding in a car close to the
Buffalo ranch, and seven
assistants for the party in the
same White House. Hugh
James of Pierre gave the pre-
sident the buffalo meat when he
stopped there at noon today. It
was similar to the one he had
eaten at the White House.

Also in the list of those waiting
up to the name lodge to
night were Rebecca, her cousin
and her husband, who were
from her long train ride and
only Roy and Prudence from white
cities.

IN CITY YESTERDAY

EL PASO, Texas, June 15 (AP).—
A special train carrying several
hundred North Texas newspaper-
men to the annual convention of
the Texas Press association arrived
here at 8 p. m. Wednesday after
a trip of two days and one
night. Other delegations were en-
route to swell the attendance.

road with the Wichita Falls and
Southern railroad was announced
today. The merger is subject to
the approval of the Interstate
Commerce Commission.

The merger will give the Wichita
Falls and Southern company con-
trol of lines extending from Wich-
ita Falls to Dallas, Texas, connect-
ing with the Rock Island at Gran-
bury, the Texas and Pacific at Har-
vey and the St. Louis, San Francis-
co and the Missouri, Kansas and
Texas at Duhon.

Frank Kell of Wichita Falls, will
manage the merger properties.

KIMES WINNER OF "TAG" GAME WITH OFFICERS

KIDNAPS MARSHALL AS
GETAWAY MADE IN
STOLEN AUTO

TULSA, Okla., June 15.—Matthew
Kimes, phantom Oklahoma bandit,
tonight apparently was back in his
Ozark Hills refuge, after a foray
into the outside world that netted
him an automobile and caused him
to entertain one unwitting and one
unwilling guest.

A posse of Pawnee county of-
ficers lost Kimes' trail at Hominy,
Ozark county, after they had pur-
sued him northward for several
hours. The youthful bandit had
stolen a motor car at Okfus last
night, in apparently taking a two
year old boy who was sleeping in
it. The child was found, still
asleep and unharmed, in a vacant
lot only a few blocks from where
the car was taken.

Kidnap Officer
Stopped near Jennings, Pawnee
county, George McAninch, town
marshal, Kimes poked a sword off
his gun into the officer's stomach
and took him along. McAninch's
comment, thinking the officer had
effected a capture, drove back to
Jennings.

McAninch declared he knew his
captain to be Kimes. After taking
McAninch several miles, the bandit
handed him to a tree with the of-
ficer's gun belt and trousers belt.
Freeing himself early this morning,
McAninch joined the pursuing
posse.

HEADS FOR HILLS

After being truck of Kimes at
Hominy, Sheriff Jones of Pawnee
county returned to his home for a
rest, leaving a part of the posse
to retrace its steps in an effort to
pick up the trail again. Kimes
was seen early this morning at
Cleveland, Pawnee county, and
later at Hominy, Ozark county, in-
dicating that he was headed for the
Ozark Hills, a favorite rendezvous
for Oklahoma outlaws since the
days of Henry Starr.

Several days ago, Kimes per-
formed a parallel exploit at Pecos,
sneaking a car and kidnapping
its owner. He was forced to
abandon the car, however, after he
had released the owner and the
chase of pursuing officers became
too close.

SLAYER OF RED TRIED

Boris Kovceda Must Serve Life in
Penitentiary For Death
Of Soviet Minister

WARSAW, Poland, June 15 (AP).—
Boris Kovceda, the nineteen year
old youth who assassinated Peter
Volokoff, Soviet minister at War-
saw, on June 7, was today sen-
tenced to penal servitude for life
and loss of all civil rights. The
court decided to recommend to the
president of the republic commu-
tation of the sentence to fifteen
years servitude.

Kovceda admitted the killing at
his brief trial today, but declared
he was not guilty of murder. He
had merely taken vengeance for
"what the Bolsheviks have done in
Russia."

York made the most of its chance
to honor Charles A. Lindbergh to-
day.

MRS. STRAPS RELATES THE
STORY OF OUTRAGES IN
EAST TEXAS

(By The Associated Press)
MATTHEW, June 15.—As pro-
tection against further violence or
intimidation, the families of J. H.
Richardson and W. A. Straps, vic-
tims of a flogging band near here
last Wednesday night, were quar-
tered in a Marshall hotel today.

Richardson, 56, and his wife were
whipped by a hooded band at their
tenant house home, apparently be-
cause they failed to work long hours
in the fields of their employer.
Straps, Richardson's son-in-law,
was struck with a pistol and knock-
ed down and his wife was laid face
downward on a trunk and lashed
with a knotted rope.

Mrs. Straps, 24, told her story
here today of her maltreatment. She
was knocked down, she said, by a
number of the band. As she strug-
gled to her feet she called her as-
sailants a coward and was knock-
ed down again. Two men, she re-
called, raised her to her feet, threw
her over a trunk and held her while
a third man beat her with a rope
flogged four times.

"Cowards, all of you," she said
she hurled at the men and more
blows fell on her back. She stopped
a moment to take a peep at her
body only a few minutes old, lying
on the hotel bed.

"I didn't count the blows," she
said, "I was too mad, but I guess
there were fifteen or twenty. After
they got through they jerked me
from the trunk and one of the said:
'Now do you understand? You are
to go into the fields at sun up, stay
until 12 get back at a'clock and
stay there until sundown.' I said
nothing. I was too far gone, I
guess."

SULL ROSS HAS BIG ENROLLMENT

SCHOOL SHOWS A RAPID
GROWTH DURING THE
PAST FEW YEARS

Special to The Avalanche

ALPINE, Texas, June 15.—At
noon Saturday the enrollment of
students in Sul Ross college for
the first summer term had reached
four hundred and forty-six, and
they were still registering. It is be-
lieved that the number will reach
five hundred or more before the
end of next week, and the enroll-
ment would easily have been in
excess of six hundred, if the col-
lege facilities, and housing accom-
modations would have permitted.
When the summer school opened
last Tuesday morning it was esti-
mated that around one thousand
extra people were thronging the
streets of Alpine hunting houses,
rooms, apartments, or even tents.
But all of these extra people were
not students. Some were summer
vacationists, and some seekers. It
was conservatively estimated that
about six hundred of the number
were here for the college advan-
tages. In some instances whole fam-
ilies came to Alpine, in order that
members of the families not en-
tering the summer school could en-
joy the cool Alpine climate, while
others took advantage of the sum-
mer school.

President Morelock reported the
following interesting facts in regard
to the enrollment this week: Friday
at noon the enrollment had reach-
ed 446, with more to enroll; 13 Pa-
so was represented with the largest
number, out of Brewster county;
which was 22; Borden county had
13 students enrolled; Houston was
third on the list with a total of 13;
Del Rio came next with 12; San
Antonio and Colorado ties with 9
students each. It is expected that a
large number will arrive from Tom
Green county next week, as their
schools are just closing this week.
They usually are among the first
by numbers in enrollment in Sul
Ross. Approximately 100 of these
now enrolled are in the advanced
classes. The college is certainly
full and its capacity is taxed, which
seems to be sufficient reason for
the college having applications for
additional buildings to care for
the present student body. There is
not standing room in the audi-
torium, and the library room is
crowded every minute in the day
—not to speak of the other depart-
ments.

PLAN TO SURFACE "AIRLINE" ROUTE

CAMPAIN WILL BE BEGUN TO
VOTE BONDS FOR
PAVING ROAD

BROWNFIELD, June 15.—At a
recent meeting of the Fort Worth-
Brownfield air line highway associa-
tion held at Dost, it was decided
that the entire route should be
hard surfaced and that a campaign
be started to secure the necessary
funds. It was decided that the
secretary should appoint one citi-
zen in each of the five counties
along the route who had not voted
road bonds, to act as chairman of
committees to be selected by them,
whose duties would be to secure
the sentiment or attitude of
voters in their respective counties
toward a bond issue, the proceeds
to be used in hard surfacing the
"Air line" and constructing other
main roads.

The following were appointed to
represent their respective counties:
O. B. Newman, Fisher county; T.
H. Greenfield, Garza county; H. B.
Holloway, Lynn county; E. G. Alex-
ander, Terry county; Youham
county to be appointed.

Report Is Promised

A report is expected to be made
by each county at a meeting to be
held at Chamberlain upon the sec-
ond of breaking dirt toward the
construction of a paved road
through Kent county.

The Air Line as located is the
shortest and most direct route from
any point northeast, east or south,
west to Brownfield and New Mexico
mountain resorts and connects di-
rectly with a State highway to the
Cachibab caverns and is on direct
line with the proposed highway be-
tween Artesia and El Paso. It is
the only highway proposed or ex-
isting between Farwell and Pecos
city, that connects directly with a
hard surfaced highway at the
Texas-New Mexico state line. In
fact New Mexico has no other
state designation south of Farwell
that reaches the Texas line. The
Air Line is also an all weather
route and where not hard surfaced,
is maintained in good condition by
the highway department.

BIG SPRING CONTINUES TO BUILD RAPIDLY

BIG SPRING, June 15.—The
building program that has been in
progress in Big Spring for the past
year is not quite as active as it
was before the decline in oil, how-
ever the permits granted during the
past two weeks shows a very good
indication that there is still an
active program. City Manager
Montan reports permits amounting
to \$15,525 during the past fourteen
days.

HEREFORD REPORTS EXCELLENT WHEAT

YIELDS RANGE FROM OVER
25 BUSHELS DOWN TO
TEN BUSHELS

HEREFORD, June 15.—Wheat
yields in the Hereford country are
gratifying to those who have al-
ready started harvesting, as most
of the farmers are making about
double the amount that was ex-
pected. The wheat is ranging all
the way from twenty-five bushels
per acre down to ten bushels, de-
pending almost entirely on the way
the soil was prepared for the crop,
as most of the crop was made with
little or no rain. Old timers say it
is the best sample of what can be
done if the summer fallow system
is used.

Jeff Giffbreath is harvesting 23
1-2 bushels per acre on his Castro
county farm south of Dimmitt. A.

Lowther just west of Hereford is
making twenty bushels per acre.
Ray Johnson, Summerfield farmer
is making 21 1-2 bushels on his en-
tire patch. It is reported, Joe El-
lett, Castro county farmer is mak-
ing better than twenty bushels per
acre, according to reports from
Dimmitt. Milton Hardy, who lives
southwest of Hereford is report-
ing the best yield so far this year. His
crop is yielding better than 25
bushels per acre. The farmers are
receiving good prices for their
wheat, and on account of the short
straw they are getting it harvest-
ed at a minimum cost. The wheat
crop will put lots of money into
the Hereford country, and with recent
rains to give the row crops a good
start, and to make grass better for
cattle, farmers, stockmen and busi-
ness men here all are jubilant over
the outlook for the future. A num-
ber of the better crops of Deaf
Smith county have not been cut,
as harvest to the north and west
of Hereford are a few days later
than the crops south of here.

AMARILLOANS BUY PHONE EXCHANGES

NUNN INTERESTS BUY 16 NEW EXCHANGES, MAKING A TOTAL OF 21

SHATTUCK, OKLA., June 15.—At a meeting yesterday of the stockholders and directors of the Northwestern Telephone company held here, all its telephone exchanges and toll lines were sold to the Panhandle Telephone and Telegraph company of Amarillo. The Northwestern owns exchanges at Shattuck, Waycross, Oage, Purgitt, Beaver, Buffalo and other points in Oklahoma together with exchanges on the Spearman branch of the Santa Fe, including Follette, Hoger and Dacozette, Texas, being sixteen exchanges and approximately six hundred miles of toll lines. Possession is to be given July 10.

The Northwestern Telephone Co. is owned by John Raynor and John Garvey, of Woodward, Wm. Quinn of Beaver, C. E. Conant of Amarillo and A. C. Oliver of Shattuck, who were represented by their directors in the meeting, the Panhandle company being represented here by Lindsey Nunn, George Hill and H. C. Pipkin, all of Amarillo. The purchase price is understood to be approximately \$700,000, that being the capital of the selling company.

The Panhandle Telephone and Telegraph company was organized in Amarillo last February when George Hill, formerly district manager of the southwestern Bell Telephone company, resigned to become affiliated with J. E. and J. L. Nunn, in the operation of the telephone business since the organization of the company, they have acquired exchanges at White Deer, Roxana and Group in addition to the exchange at Panhandle, which has been owned by Dr. J. E. Nunn for the past twenty years. The exchange at Wheeler, Texas, has been purchased and will be taken over in the next two weeks, making a total of twenty-one exchanges. The headquarters of the company will be maintained in Amarillo, with the personnel of the company remaining the same.

SULL ROSS HAS BIG ENROLLMENT

SCHOOL SHOWS A RAPID GROWTH DURING THE PAST FEW YEARS

Special to The Avalanche

ALPINE, TEXAS, June 15.—Alpine Saturday the enrollment of students in Sul Ross college for the first summer term had reached four hundred and forty-six, and they were still registering. It is believed that the number will reach five hundred or more before the end of next week, and the enrollment would easily have been in excess of six hundred. If the college facilities and housing accommodations would have permitted. When the summer school opened last Tuesday morning, it was estimated that around one thousand extra people were thronging the streets of Alpine hunting homes, rooms, apartments, or even tents. But all of these extra people were not students. Some were summer vacationists, and some seekers. It was conservatively estimated that about six hundred of the number were here for the college advantage. In some instances whole families came to Alpine, in order that members of the families not entering the summer school could enjoy the cool Alpine climate, while others took advantage of the summer school.

President Morelock reported the following interesting facts in regard to the enrollment this week: Friday at noon the enrollment had reached 446, with more to enroll. El Paso was represented with the largest number, out of Brewster county, which was 72. El Paso county had 15 students enrolled; Houston was third on the list with a total of 15; Del Rio came next with 12; San Antonio and Colorado ties with 9 students each. It is expected that a large number will arrive from Tom Green county next week, as their schools are just closing this week. They usually are among the first in numbers in enrollment in Sul Ross. Approximately 100 of these new enrolled are in the advanced classes. The college is certainly full and its capacity is taxed, which seems to be sufficient reason for the college having approved plans for additional buildings to care for the present student body. There is not standing room in the auditorium, and the library room is crowded every minute in the day—not to speak of the other departments.

PLAN TO SURFACE "AIRLINE" ROUTE

CAMPAIGN WILL BE BEGUN TO VOTE BONDS FOR PAYING ROAD

BROWNFIELD, June 15.—At a recent meeting of the Fort Worth-Rosewell air line highway association held at Fort Worth, it was decided that the entire route should be surfaced and that a campaign toward that end would be inaugurated. It was decided that the secretary should appoint one citizen in each of the five counties along the route who had not voted road bonds, to act as chairman of committees to be selected by them, whose duties would be to represent the sentiment or attitude of voters in their respective counties toward a bond issue, the proceeds to be used in hard surfacing the "Air Line" and constructing other main roads.

The following were appointed to represent their respective counties: O. B. Norman, Fisher county; T. H. Greenwell, Garza county; H. B. Howell, Lynn county; E. O. Alexander, Terry county; Yakum county to be appointed.

Report is Promised
A report is expected to be made by each county at a meeting to be held at Cleburne upon the second day of breaking dirt toward the construction of a paved road through Kent county.

The Air Line as located is the shortest and most direct route from any point northeast, east or south, east to Rosewell and New Mexico mountain resorts and connects directly with a State highway to the Carlsbad caverns and is an direct line with the proposed highway between Artesia and El Paso. It is the only highway proposed or existing between Parwell and Pecos City that connects directly with a hard-surfaced highway at the Texas-New Mexico state line. In fact, New Mexico has no other state destination south of Parwell that reaches the Texas line. The Air Line is also an all-weather route and where not hard-surfaced, is maintained in good condition by the Highway department.

BIG SPRING CONTINUES TO BUILD RAPIDLY

BIG SPRING, June 15.—The building program that has been in progress in Big Spring for the past year is not quite as active as it was before the decline in oil, however the permit granted during the past two weeks shows a very good indication that there is still an active program. City Manager Mountain reports permits amounting to \$16,525 during the past fourteen days.

YIELDS RANGE FROM OVER 25 BUSHELS DOWN TO TEN BUSHELS

HEREFORD, June 15.—Wheat yields in the Hereford country are gratifying to those who have already started harvesting, as most of the farmers are making about double the amount that was expected. The wheat is ranging all the way from twenty-five bushels per acre down to ten bushels, depending almost entirely on the way the soil was prepared for the crop, as most of the crop was made with little or no rain. Old timers say it is the best sample of what can be done if the summer fallow system is used. Jeff Gilbreath is harvesting 23 1/2 bushels per acre on his Castro county farm south of Dimmitt. A. Lowther just west of Hereford is making twenty bushels per acre. Ray Johnson, Summerfield farmer is making 21 1/2 bushels on his entire patch. It is reported, Joe Elliott, Castro county farmer is making better than twenty bushels per acre, according to reports from Dimmitt. Milton Hardy, who lives southeast of Hereford is reporting the best yield so far this year. His crop is yielding better than 25 bushels per acre. The farmers are receiving good prices for their wheat, and on account of the short straw they are getting it harvested at a minimum cost. The wheat crop will put lots of money into the Hereford country, and with recent rains to give the row crops a good start, and to make grass better for cattle, farmers, stockmen and business men here all are jubilant over the outlook for the future. A number of the better crops of Deaf Smith county have not been cut, as harvest to the north and west of Hereford are a few days later than the crops south of here.

BEING PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES

Being President of the United States must be a rather monotonous task, besides the responsibility that it places upon a fellow. Even when the President talks of taking a few week's vacation, everybody in the nation, and all of the foreign countries know all about it, and a lot of detail stories must percolate through the press, and all that sort of stuff. The President a few days ago pulled up stakes and left for the Black Hills where he will spend his summer vacation. That part of it was not so bad, but we can't see how Mr. Coolidge will get much pleasure out of it.

He'll be accompanied by a company of reporters and photographers; a regiment of clerks, attendants and minor officials; squads of secret service men and, no doubt, a whole division of the common or garden variety of tourists. When he goes fishing, should he go fishing, he'll have no delightful solitude. He'll not have the fun of arranging this and that detail connected with his vacation days. Should he decide to go somewhere, he'll have to consult with a flock of secretaries; should he decide to make it a real vacation and forego shaving, he'll have to consult a host of others, including Mrs. Coolidge. In short, it'll be a vacation merely because he is going away from Washington; he'll not be able to escape the job. It'll ride right along with him.

Taking it all and all, President Coolidge may have the best of it over the rest of us. For instance, he is presented with large fat turkeys on Thanksgiving, and is granted the privilege of shaking hands with Colonel Lindbergh. But when vacation time comes around, and most of us pore over time tables or examine the old bus to see if it will stand up under another trip, and look forward to a temporary separation from dull routine, poor old President Coolidge can only look on and envy us.

QUALIFICATIONS OFTEN NOT CONSIDERED

It is real pitiful to us how some folks are carried away with some certain spell and go wild over the achievements of some fellow, and want to shove him into prominence in places where he will not fit. For example, some fellow wants to send "Lindy" to congress. Lindy is no doubt a splendid flyer, and knows his stuff in the air. He knows airplanes, and he knows a lot of the world's geography now, but whether or not he knows anything about law making is something that has not yet been brought out on him. We figure that one of the great troubles with this nation now is that too many men are in congress today on account of some freakish thing they have done rather than on account of their qualifications. Just for the mere fact that Lindbergh flew across the Atlantic does not say to us that he is qualified for making laws in the United States, although he might, but the point we are wanting to make is that qualifications should count for more than fame, and the people might ruin a useful man to aviation by making a congressman out of him.

THE BOND ISSUE FOR ROADS

There seems to be quite a bit of agitation now going the rounds on the matter of a bond issue for roads in Lubbock county. Most of the people who oppose the issue, are opposed to it on account of the tax feature. Of course this will require a higher tax rate, but when it is considered that the tax valuations in Lubbock county are at the present time exceedingly low, because of the large amount of the county that is undeveloped, it will not be long till the actual amount that each tax payer shall pay per hundred dollars valuation will be comparatively unnoticeable and the results obtained from better roads will mean a great

deal more to the people of the county, and the business men of the city of Lubbock.

Some will say that there is no hurry on this matter. It might be that we can get by for several years with the roads we have, but it is going to cost the tax payers of this county more money every year to maintain the roads and make new ones, because they will be used more each year, and the possibility of not getting State and Federal aid would be greater to wait.

It will cost the tax payers very little more in the total of actual expenses, when one figures the advantages derived by the roads and the savings that can easily be effected by users of automobiles, which includes a very large percent of the tax-payers. Thousands of dollars will be saved each year on wear and tear of cars, the saving of gasoline, and tires, and many other items that good roads will bring about.

Petitions are now being circulated, and it is expected that an election will be ordered in the very near future to determine whether or not this county will issue bonds for the building of better roads.

THE IDLE BRAIN

We have heard ever since we were a small boy that the idle brain is the devil's workshop, and we have just about decided that the fellow that coined that phrase knew what he was talking about. Recently a distinguished lawyer, of many years' experience in practice at the bar said that of more than a hundred persons he had defended or prosecuted in felony cases, not one of them was charged with violating the law during working hours. In other words, his experience had shown him that those periods of the day when people are taking their recreation, no matter what form it may be, are the dangerous periods.

His advice was "guard well the play hours and there will be little crime." Out of this idea has come the whole program of child welfare work, public play grounds for both children and adults, and organized recreation. Of chief importance, of course, is the proper training of the young life. It is contended with much evidence to support it that the child whose training has been properly supervised until he passes through the high school age is not very likely to go wrong.

Of course, it is impossible to provide for the supervision of the recreation of adults. It would be absurd to attempt to deal with adults as we would deal with children. But it is vital to place within reach of the growing boy and girl the opportunity for that sort of training that will mold them into self-reliant dependable citizens. The suggestion that if we will take care of the boy the man will take care of himself is pretty well founded.

There is no infallible method of training youths to be certain that they will be the right sort of men and women, but none but the foolish would argue that training is not important, even though it does apparently record a failure here and there.

One of the organizations that is trying to guard that all-important play period of youth is the Boy Scouts of America. The results will tell mightily in the future. The work is being attempted here on a well organized scale. It deserves the support of every citizen who is interested in helping to direct the natural energies of youth in right channels.

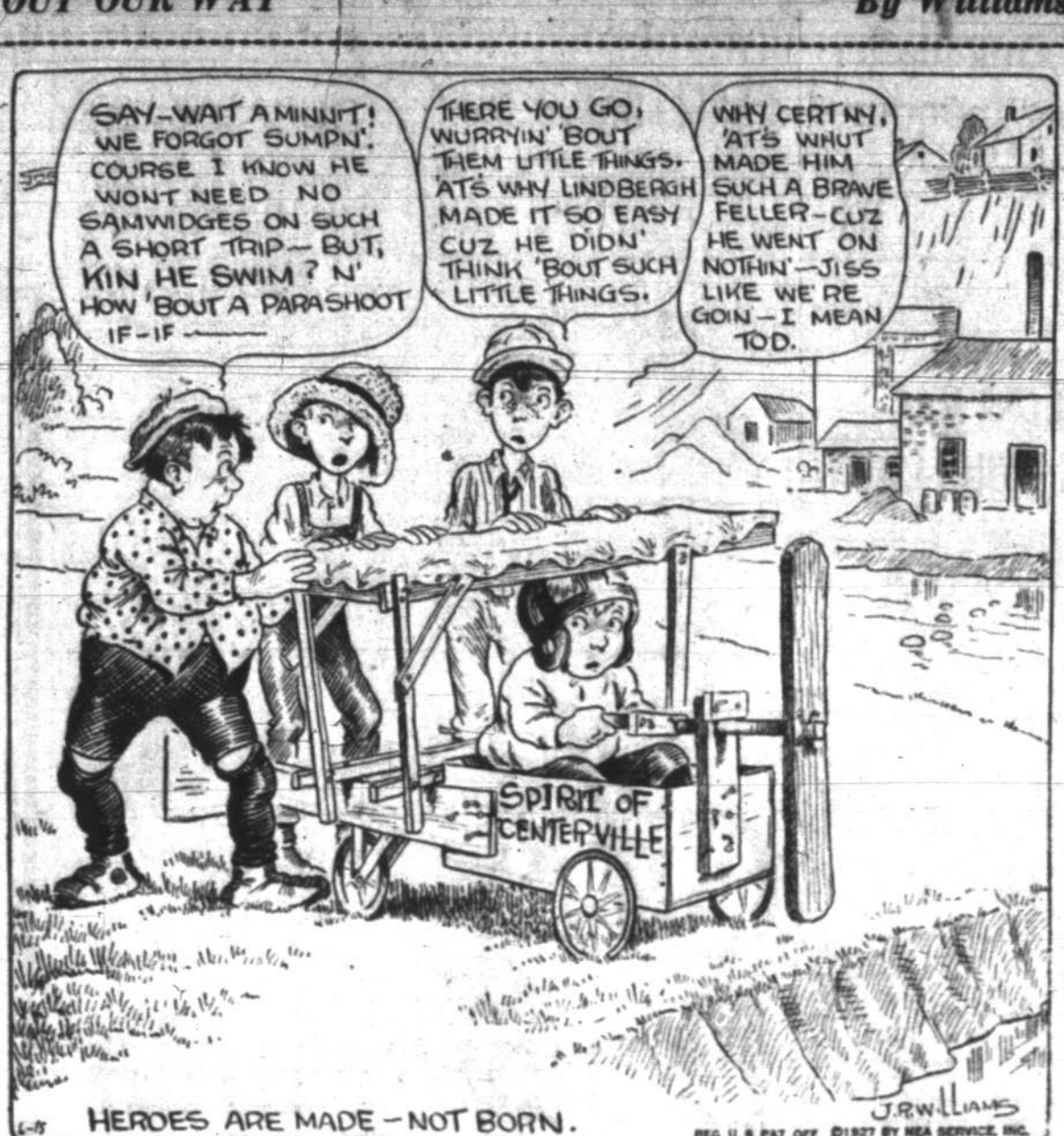
Little Avalanches

Civic Improvement

Air-Minded Cities Look To Their Flying Assets

Travel by air and shipment of merchandise by air is increasing in volume steadily, as indicated by the rapid growth of the air-mail service. Cities which have realized this and have already made provisions for landing fields and air ports are the cities which will soon lead on the air maps of the future.

How American cities can make the most of their air assets, is indicated by the air-minded activities of Peoria, Ill.

The landing field used in Peoria for the operation of mail planes for the first few months was a temporary one-leased by the Association of Commerce until such time as a permanent satisfactory field could be secured and properly equipped.

Then they secured an eighty-acre tract. This was equipped and lighted with a two-million candlepower beacon light, boundary lights and a battery of flood lights to illuminate the ground when the pilots land at night.

The Department of Commerce has lighted the Illinois highway between Chicago and St. Louis by way of Springfield and Peoria, placing 24 beacon lights at an average distance of ten miles apart.

An emergency field has been located in the vicinity of each one of these beacon lights, making night flying safe for pilots.

The preparation for taking care of the flying traffic is going to be one of the things that will occupy the minds of the American people in the future. While airplanes may not become as numerous as the automobile, they will be used in many ways that have never been thought of yet, and there will be a demand for landing fields, and Lubbock should not be unmindful of this feature of the industrial program.

Why Injuries to the Eyeball Need Prompt Attention

The eyeball may be injured by penetration into it of bits of dust, sand, iron shavings or similar material. Either the material falls into the eye and sticks in the surface, or it hits the surface of the eyeball in its awkward attempt to move it.

If a foreign substance is not removed immediately it is usually surrounded promptly by a grayish white ring indicating that infection has set in, the end result sometimes being an ulcer. Any object, bodily treated results in a scar on the surface of the eyeball that may interfere seriously with eyesight.

If pain, fear of light and constant watering are present the person may be assured that the foreign material is still in the eye and should seek competent medical assistance. The physician can use a local anesthetic to deaden the sense of pain and the reactions of the eye and can then remove the foreign material with special instruments that have been designed for this purpose.

Permit any of the interior contents to protrude through, the results may be serious. Physicians know that penetration of the eye may have effects on the other eye, the condition called sympathetic ophthalmia. They therefore urge the most careful consideration of any eye injury because of the possibility of complete loss of sight.

Sometimes an eye is injured by splashing of acids, alkalis, kerosene, by lime, hot steam or powder explosions. The most severe effects of such injuries are the secondary infections and the formation of scars which cause the eye to stick to the eye ball. Such an injury should have immediate attention of a physician who will first apply an anesthetic to relieve the pain. A wash can then be applied to neutralize such of the offending material as may still remain in the eye, using a mild saline solution for an acid burn, or other chemical antidotes depending on the substance concerned. Cold applications and regular washing with antiseptic solutions will prevent secondary infection.

The use of a proper oil or grease will relieve the pain and a suitable bandage will act as a protection. In this way serious secondary complications are avoided, unless such injury as may come after the first effect of the burn is frequently more dangerous to eyesight than the burn itself.
