Kilsing, of Los Angeles, by Mexicans at Dolores, Mexico, was reported to the state department today by Harry Ott, vice consul at Chihuahua. No details were given in the first report received.

MINERS SUPPORT STRIKE ORDERS

INDIANAPOLIS, Sept. 27.—By an overwhelming vote further debate on the Kansas strike cases which have been before the convention of the United Mine Workers for the last four days, was cut off soon after the convention opened today. The supporters of Alexander Howat, president of the Kansas district, then won in the contest for a roll call vote. It is expected that most of the day will be necessary to take a roll call vote.

President Howat contends that the strikes were called when the operators failed to observe the terms of their contracts with the unions. President Lewis and the international executive board ordered the strikers to return to work. Convention rules declare that three hundred delegates must support the demand for a roll call vote. This number was easily obtained following a motion by Joseph Lynall, delegate from Peoria, Illinois, that a roll call vote be taken on the proposition supporting the administration, Lewis and the international board, which contend that the strikes ordered by Howat in the Kansas fields were illegal.

KU KLUX WORK IN PALESTINE

PALESTINE, Tex., Sept. 27.—S. L. McKenzie, until recently a service car driver, was seized by a party of masked men here last night and carried to the country where he was beaten and tarred and feathered. McKenzie was brought back to the city and dumped from an auto on a down town street. The man was attacked here on the night of August seventh but escaped from his masked assailants after a hard struggle. He had received warnings to leave the city.

CHICKS COMING TO FT. WORTH

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Sept. 27.—The Panthers and Chicks are en route today to Fort Worth to play the sixth game of the series for the Dixie championship. The sixth game will be staged at Ft. Worth tomorrow. The Texas Leaguers are one game ahead, having won three out of the five games played.

The fifth game yesterday was a victory for the Chicks, the score standing 6 to 2. The Cats took two out of three played here while on the Chick's former visit to Panthertown the two teams split even in the two game series.

It was then announced that individual Democrats would be left to follow their own judgment in voting for or against ratification of the treaties.

SHERMAN, Tex., Sept. 27.—Col. R. E. Smith, known throughout the Southwest as "Alfalfa King," died here last night. Col. Smith was owner of a large ranch in Tom Green county, as well as much business and farming property in other Texas counties.

Col. Smith was well known in Ballinger. He spent some time in this city two years ago when his wife became ill on their ranch near Paint Rock and he brought her here for treatment in the local sanitarium. After spending some time here and after it had been announced that she could not recover, the family returned to Sherman, where Mrs. Smith died.

SHANGHAI, Sept. 27.—China's third great disaster within the present year, was recorded in the Anhwei province today, where an area as large as the state of Connecticut was flooded and thousands of people drowned. Property damage will exceed eighty million dollars.

LOSES FIGHT TO SAVE NEGROES

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Sept. 27.—Habeas corpus proceedings in behalf of six Elaine, Arkansas, negroes, sentenced to death for murder in connection with rioting two years ago, were dismissed by United States District Judge Cotteral today. Attorneys for the negroes announced that an appeal would be taken to the United States supreme court.

IDLENESS IS DUE TO LOW WAGES

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27.—Objection of labor to accept work at reduced wages was assigned as a cause of some of the unemployment which exists today, by Roswell F. Phelps, director of labor statistics of the Massachusetts labor department.

Phelps was the first witness heard by the national unemployment conference which set to work today to compile statistics and ascertain the cause of idleness with the hope of recommending some remedy.

President Luther Steward, of the National Federation of Federal Employees, was called before the conference and presented a prepared statement. Steward declared that the federal government, in its capacity as employer, had been a contributing cause to the present unemployment condition when it should have been an alleviating agency.

COTTON UP ABOUT ONE HUNDRED POINTS

Cotton sold for as high as 20.25 in Ballinger Tuesday, following a gain of from 90 to 100 points over the previous day's market. Little cotton was on the streets and buyers were sluggish in bidding, some of them declaring that the present market was a big gamble and sharp fluctuations might sweep the speculators off their feet on short notice. Cotton seed continued to bring \$35 per ton.

POLICE PATROLS DELIVER BOOZE

CHICAGO, Sept. 27.—Two police lieutenants in Chicago have been summoned by the district attorney for examination on charges that patrolmen of North Halstead Street station had been acting as guards for whiskey peddlers.

CHICAGO, Sept. 27.—Evidence that whiskey had been delivered from bootleggers to their customers in the police patrol of the Grand Crossing precinct, is in the hands of federal authorities, the district attorney's office announced today.

An extra charge of \$5 a case was assessed for use of the patrol and a uniformed escort of patrolmen, Assistant Attorney Merensky said.

A police captain, 25 patrolmen and 20 saloon keepers from one South Side police precinct were called before District Attorney Cline today in connection with "whiskey shakedowns."

SAYS 80 PER CENT COTTON IS OUT

Mose Garlington, who has traveled over the county, and has a pretty good line up on the cotton crop condition, says that at least eighty per cent of the cotton has been picked. He estimates that the county will receive 21,000 bales, and thinks the estimate of 23,000 to 25,000 too high. Well, we will see what we shall see, after the gins quit humming.

SUBMARINE R-6 GOES TO BOTTOM

SAN PEDRO, Calif., Sept. 27.—Two men lost their lives in the sinking of the submarine R-6, it was officially announced late today. All other members of the crew have been accounted for.

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 27.—The U. S. N. submarine R-6, attached to the Pacific fleet and anchored in the outer harbor of San Pedro, California, sank at 10:30 last night, according to information received by the Los Angeles Examiner early this morning. The sinking of the submarine is believed to have been caused by water rushing into the boat through an open torpedo tube.

SAN PEDRO, Calif., Sept. 27.—Two submarines located at the base here are searching the outer harbor today in an attempt to find the bodies of two members of the crew of the R-6, believed to have gone down with the submarine which sank last night.

An investigation of the sinking of the R-6 is underway.

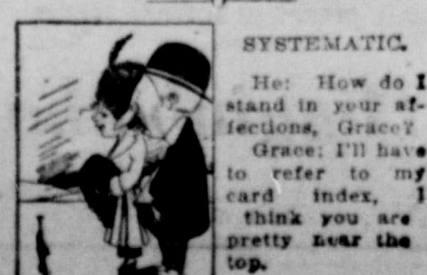

Receipts the past week give cause for the revision of several estimates and some are now even putting the total for the season at twelve thousand bales.

Yard receipts at noon today totalled 7,870 bales with each day for the week showing between three and four hundred bales received.

Cotton is selling at press hour at twenty cents and cotton seed at thirty five dollars with eager takers at those prices.

WHAT WATER WILL DO FOR THE FARMER

(The following is the 4th of a series of articles prepared by the Colorado Valley Irrigation Association, based on figures from the eighteenth annual report of the U. S. Reclamation Service, 1919.)

COLORADO GRAND VALLEY PROJECT

This project provides for the diversion of water from the Grand River by means of a diversion dam located about 8 miles Northeast of Palisade, Colorado, into a canal system on the North side of the river for the irrigation of lands North and West of Grand Junction, Fruita and Mack, Colo. About 40,000 acres will be supplied by gravity and 10,000 by pumping systems. Power for pumping will be developed within the project. Three tunnels are located on the main canal, respectively, 3723, 1655 and 7292 feet in length, adding considerably to the cost of the scheme.

Other features of the system are:

The diversion dam
62 miles of main canal
Lateral system to serve 35,000 acres

Sub-laterals, turn-outs and weirs

Power plant

Pumping plant

Drainage and flood protection works.

Only 8,000 acres were irrigated in 1918, but crops to the value of \$414,310.00 were raised, averaging about \$65.00 per acre cropped. When the entire 50,000 acres is watered, the value of crops produced annually should approach \$3,000,000.00.

The project, when 80 per cent completed, cost \$3,490,000.00, and the total cost will reach about \$4,350,000.00. Again, on this project, it is shown that the value of one year's crops, as on other projects, will approximate the cost of installing the entire irrigation system.

The population in this area showed a marked increase, and bank deposits in one year increased half a million dollars.

Diversified farming is featured in this section, the principal crops being sugar beets, Apples, alfalfa, wheat, corn, peaches, potatoes, beans, hay and oats are also raised.

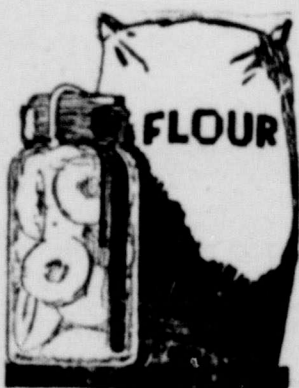

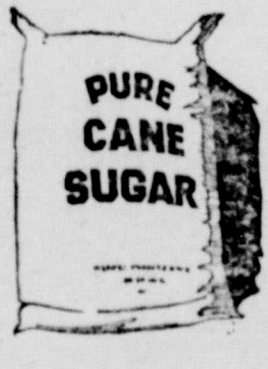
