12 Banks Fail to Open After Death of Official

(By Associated Press)
OKLAHOMA CITY, Nov. 27.—C. Graves Shull, State Bank Commissioner, announced today that twelve State Banks failed to open their doors today, closing immediately as the result of the sudden death last night of H. A. McCauley, 55, who was interested in all twelve of the banks. Representatives of the State Banking Department were placed in charge at each of the institutions.

Rotarians Hear Shumway in Talk

The Ballinger Rotary Club met at the Central Hotel Wednesday at noon with almost 100 per cent attendance. Only three members were absent from the meeting and those present brought guests to make it the largest attended session ever held by the club.

The program for the day was in the hands of the boys' work committee, with Ed Shumway, of Abilene, as the principal speaker. Mr. and Mrs. Shumway arrived late for lunch but in time for the Boy Scout leader's part on the program. He used his full time in talking about boys, their training, and the proper kind of leadership for them.

"If all boys were good, we would not need the Boy Scouts and other such organizations," Mr. Shumway asserted. "It is the boy who is slipping and getting away from the right kind of clear living who is most in need of the right kind of leadership, regardless of where it comes from." Mr. Shumway illustrated his talk with a number of experiences demonstrating that some man by close association with a wayward boy had caused his life to be changed entirely. He said one Rotary club in this section of the country has a committee looking after one boy who had been slipping. The boy will never know perhaps that the men are particularly interested in him, but nevertheless they are guiding his life to a large extent. The Scout executive praised the work of the Scout leaders and the football coaches of the country in training boys to live right. In particular the speaker referred to Chairman Bruce, of the local Scout council, and Coach Felton Wright, of the Ballinger high school.

At the close of the meeting Mr. Shumway played the piano and led the closing song which was thoroughly enjoyed. Mr. Shumway is a song leader with wide experience and talent.

Story of Ballinger Is Well Received

"The Story of Ballinger" was shown on the screen at the Palace Theatre Tuesday night for the first time and was well received by a packed house. The audience apparently was more than satisfied with the motion picture taken here, which was in clear print, showing good photography.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Nov. 27.—The bodies of Frank Henly, his wife and their two small children, all shot to death were found today in the family home near here, the sheriff's office was advised. The belief is expressed that Henly killed his wife and children and then himself.

Ike Musil Caught In Slaton Tuesday

Ike Musil, about 35, who lived at Rowena for over ten years, turning from farming to liquor manufacturing, was arrested in Slaton Tuesday afternoon by the chief of police of that town. Deputy Sheriff John White in a telephone conversation with the authorities at Slaton told them Musil was wanted in Runnels county as well as by the Texas penal officials. Musil was taken to Lubbock Tuesday night and lodged in jail there to await the Runnels county officer who will leave for him about Friday.

Musil was first arrested about seven years ago for liquor law violation and sentenced in district court here. After serving his term he returned to this county and was again arrested for this offense. He posted a cash bond of \$1,000, and after failing to appear for trial, the bail was forfeited.

Later he was again captured with considerably over 300 gallons of "whiskey, wine and beer, the largest amount of liquor ever to be taken by Runnels county officers from one person. The miniature distillery, winery and brewery was brought to Ballinger on a truck and destroyed by order of the court here. In this case another cash bond of \$1,000 was made which was also forfeited when Musil "skipped" again.

Later the man was caught near Mason with a carload of liquor and tried there for this charge. At this trial he was sentenced to two years in the state penitentiary. While en route to Huntsville with Transfer Agent Bud Russell, Musil was lodged in the Gonzales jail or a night. At dawn it was found that the slippery Ike had sawed his way to freedom and since that time had been in hiding.

Sheriff R. E. McWilliams received a tip recently that Musil was at his home near Rowena, but upon investigation found this was false.

Musil is wanted here on two prohibition law charges and is also wanted by the penitentiary authorities.

JUDGE EMULATES PORTIA IN BOARDING HOUSE SUIT

BRADFORD, Eng., Nov. 27.—Shakespearean justice was meted out in county court here when Mrs. Laura Walker, who takes in boarders, was sued for \$150 alleged to be due T. Mosley.

Mosley testified that while boarding with the defendant and her husband he loaned her \$150. Evidence in the form of affectionate letters and postcards, however, convinced the judge that, while Mosley had indeed loaned the money, his motive was reprehensible. And so, taking his cue from Portia's famous "pound of flesh" speech, he found for the plaintiff but added:

"In view of the opinion I hold of the plaintiff the order is that the judgment debt and costs shall be paid off at the rate of twopenny a month until liquidated."

As a result Mrs. Walker has something over 300 years in which to pay up.

BURGLAR MAKES LOCK TO THWART THIEVES

Lehmberg Teaches Terracing Schools

County Agent C. W. Lehmberg has been busy during the past week on terracing work in this county. Wednesday he was preparing a questionnaire to send to the farmers on this subject in order to secure information for use at the meeting of farm agents to be held in Abilene December 5 and 6.

The general program over the entire state this year, Mr. Lehmberg said, was on soil conservation and terracing was one of the most important steps in this endeavor.

The county agent has organized groups in seven communities in this county for instruction on terracing. He said that already 37,000 acres had been pledged in these communities and that work would start immediately after he had visited the communities and given his two-day schools on the subject.

Sunshine of Summer For Winter Schools

(By Associated Press)
YHACA, N. Y., Nov. 27.—The possibility of artificially generating in winter school rooms some of the energizing rays of summertime sunshine is reported to the Optical Society of America.

It is proposed to accomplish this with tungsten lights, differing but little from artificial lights now in common use.

This property of tungsten in producing the ultra-violet rays which are popularly called artificial sunshine, and the possibilities of using it to make up for winter's dreary light, especially in cities, is described in a report at Cornell university by W. E. Forsythe and Frances L. Christison of the General Electric Company.

Heretofore the artificial sunshine has been generated principally by special lamps, using mercury, carbon arcs, or other methods not employed in ordinary room lighting.

The report says that the amount of artificial sunshine from tungsten is very small, but points out that scientific experiments tend to prove that only very small amounts of this kind of light are needed for general health purposes. Furthermore, it says that winter sunlight usually yields very little ultra-violet, and probably none at all in many city winter atmospheres.

"It must be remembered also," says the report, "that it is in the winter months that the need is greatest for ultra-violet energy."

"If the children in their play rooms or school rooms were under illumination from the tungsten lamp in ultra-violet transmitting bulbs, they might be supplied a considerable amount of the energy without being subjected to too great an amount or a too high level of illumination."

"It must be remembered also that a much greater portion of the body could be exposed in a warm room than is possible outdoors on a winter day."

FIND RATTLESNAKES IN CONNECTICUT MOUNTAINS

CANAAN, Nov. 27.—A federal geyser moth crew, working in the mountains about this town are encountering rattlesnakes at nearly every point. Louis Lemieux, one of the crew, holds the record for size of kill in a four foot rattler he knocked off on Canaan mountain. The snake was sunning itself on a rock and failed to show fight when Lemieux killed it. Later the snake was displayed in the village as the largest seen in a long while.

Ben Aldridge, who was convicted with Merriman, awaits in the Dallas jail. His execution date is December 19.

PHOENIX, Ariz., Nov. 27.—Acting Chief of Detectives E. D. Ellis reported today that an investigation indicated that William Purdie, 25, who was arrested here Friday on a robbery charge, is not Robert Hill, escaped convict from the Texas state penitentiary.

Texas authorities were asked to investigate in the belief that Purdie is Hill, a former member of the notorious Ratliff gang, in which was led by Marshall Ratliff, who was lynched by citizens of Eastland, Texas, last week.

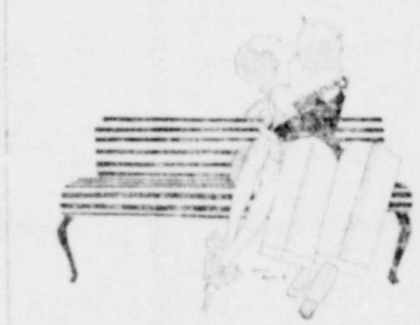
