District Legion Meeting Sunday

A caravan of cars will leave Ballinger early Saturday morning for Brownwood carrying members of the American Legion from here to the division and district meeting to be held there on May 25 and 26. The meeting of the 17th District was set for a meeting on this date in Brownwood and later division officials decided to also have the 5th Division meet there at the same time. A call has been made to all members of the 16th, 17th and 18th Districts to assemble in Brownwood with Geo. Epple, division commander of Kerrville, in charge.

The program committee at Brownwood has worked out a program of entertainment for Saturday afternoon, Saturday night that will be worth going to every Legionnaire. Sunday a union service will be held at the Methodist church Sunday morning in which every church in Brownwood will take a part. A luncheon will be given by the Brownwood post Sunday at noon to the visiting Legionnaires at the Soldiers and Sailors Memorial Hall.

At 2 o'clock in the afternoon the division will meet in a session after which a short business session will be held by the district members. This will be the last district or division meeting to be held in the 17th District before the meeting of the state department and it is important that Legionnaires meet to transact business.

The local legionnaires are completing plans here for the Decoration Day program on May 30 at Evergreen Cemetery. The meeting will be held immediately after 6 o'clock and every store in town will be asked to close and attend with their families. The service will be short and military with the Legionnaires, National Guardsmen, Spanish-American War veterans and Confederate Veterans taking part.

The service will be held in the grove of the cemetery near the new lily pond and fountain and at the conclusion of the program a firing squad will fire a salute to the dead and as taps is blown a bouquet will be placed on the grave of every soldier buried in the local cemetery.

MISSOURI COAL MINES INCREASE IN PRODUCTION

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., May 21.—The production of Missouri coal mines increased 1-2 million tons in 1928, according to the annual report of the Missouri Bureau of Mines.

The total production of coal during 1928 for the entire state was 3,510,191 tons, representing a value of \$9,373,151.62, according to the report.

Fort Worth Clinic Guards Against Fire

FORT WORTH, May 21.—In an effort to guard against the possibility of a catastrophe happening in Fort Worth hospitals such as occurred in the Cleveland Clinic disaster, Building Commissioner B. Larson and Fire Marshal Ligon recently announced that they would conduct a thorough inspection and make a detailed study of fire hazards in Fort Worth hospitals.

The generation of gases through burning chemicals is a phase of building inspection which has never been given much consideration, Larson stated, because it has been assumed that those persons handling the chemicals have a broader knowledge of them than building inspectors and engineers.

The Fort Worth Children's Hospital, a wooden structure, will be the first hospital visited by Larson and Ligon.

Webb's advice was chiefly in reference to women who are inclined to be buxom, but his opening comment referred to women's knees in general.

"Knees are ugly and awkward," he declared. "Women should keep them covered up. They should wear their skirts below the knees."

Then he dwelt upon how fat women, or women inclined that way, may look slender.

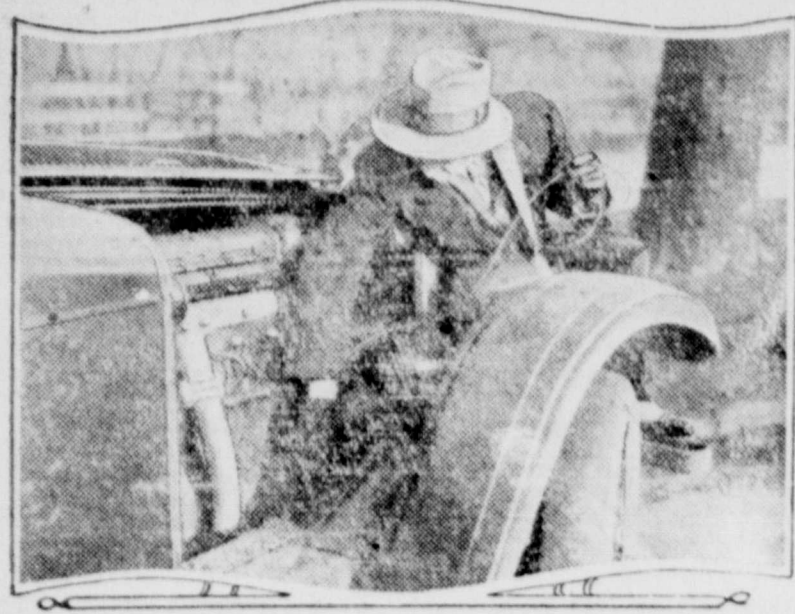

AUTO THEFT IS GRAVE PROBLEM TO CAR OWNER



THE AUTO THIEF

Proper protection against the activities of automobile thieves is the crying need of the motorist today and this necessary defense against the major problem confronting auto owners should be of nationwide scope. In the opinion of A. B. Allen, automotive expert and general manager of the Safetite System, 200 West Wacker drive, Chicago.

"Available statistics are startling in their revelation of auto theft in the United States," Mr. Allen declared in an address before an automotive meeting recently. "Scarcely, no type of car, no matter its age or condition, is immune from impending peril at the hands of automobile thieves. Every time a machine is parked, the owner runs the risk of returning from his mission to engage in a futile and discouraging search for his missing car."

"The buyer of a second hand car, too, is at the mercy of these despicable thieves, and their methods of converting their booty into cash not only are simple and efficient, but detectable only on rare occasions. Machines stolen today often are not, are resold in a few days to a trusting public

And it is this phase of the situation which best can be controlled."

An adequate system of transfer, when selling a car, which would leave no doubt as to the authenticity of ownership upon the part of the seller, was advocated by Mr. Allen. A nationwide system similar to that practiced by banks in the exchange of money for checks, whereby all owners of automobiles in each state would be listed in an office in the state capital, along with complete data concerning each machine, would be a deterrent to thieves, the Safetite System executive declared. By this method a perfect chain of title and speedy transfer of title anywhere in the United States could thus be effected.

degree to which they consume dairy products. Probably the use of meat and of milk and its products will in nearly all cases run more or less nearly parallel, and I venture to assert that it is the milk and butter and cheese, and not the meat which has the good influence in the promotion of the virile qualities of the people.

Milk is worth much more than its energy value or than its protein content would indicate. It is the great factor of safety in making up the deficiencies of the grains which form and must continue to form the principal source of energy in our diet.

"It seems probably the only unidentified substance which is physiologically indispensable, which is not sufficiently abundant in the diet employed by the people of the United States and Europe where there are used insufficient amounts of milk, butter, cream, eggs, and the leafy vegetables, is the fat soluble A."

"I wish to again emphasize the fact that there is no way to supply the dietary factor (fat soluble A) in the food of children except in the form of milk fat, and milk is therefore an indispensable food for the young."

Attention should be called to one other point. It has been suggested by some that possibly pasteurized milk or cream destroys the growth promoting qualities of the fat (soluble A). Osburne and Mendel found that passing live steam thru milk fat for two hours did not affect it, and McCollum and Davis found that it was not affected by being heated to the boiling point of water.

This should be satisfactory evidence that pasteurization of milk and cream in no way affects the growth-promoting qualities of milk fat, but on the other hand gives you one of the world's safest foods, and for that reason a majority of the states have passed laws demanding that pasteurized milk be sold. Most of our schools, especially the better organized have employed dietitians and in all instances they demand milk and cream be pasteurized.

Colored Nurse Inspects Here

Anna Mae Mathis, state colored health nurse, is in Ballinger this week carrying on the health program among the colored people here. She arrived here from San Angelo Saturday and Sunday spoke at three churches in town to the colored people to tell them about her work. Monday she inspected the school children here and only six of the entire enrollment of the school were absent.

Tuesday she began a house-to-house campaign among the colored people to talk to them about health and sanitation. The State Department of Health feels that this is one of the best ways to stop certain diseases, and having a nurse to work in the homes of the colored population to teach them health methods and sanitation is the department's way of solving the problem.

As soon as she has finished her work here she will go to Winters for a similar round of inspection as that is the only other colored school in the county. She will return here on May 30 to inspect the children of pre-school age and infants.

She has been with the State Health Department for 11 years and is considered one of the best colored nurses in the service.

Miss Alexander is continuing her work of inspections in the summer round-up work this week and Tuesday afternoon went to Drasco where the Parent-Teachers Association of that place has made all arrangements to stage a big round-up program there.

State Laws Demand Pasteurized Milk

EDITOR'S NOTE.—The following article was contributed by Lee R. Stubbs, manager of the Runnels County Creamery, on the pasteurization of milk. Mr. Stubbs cites authorities in statements quoted and those interested in this subject will find the article very illuminative.

Below are a few facts on pasteurization and authority, 1929. Reference, Prof. A. C. Baer.

Just a few scattering states that have laws demanding pasteurizing of milk products are mentioned here. Georgia demands pasteurized milk and cream, and even goes further, and says all ice cream mixtures must be pasteurized, and so processed in that state.

New Jersey.—The state law reads as follows: "No person shall sell or distribute milk or cream for human consumption which has not been pasteurized."

Oklahoma.—All milk and cream also any by-products must be pasteurized. Pasteurization means heating to 145 degrees and holding for twenty-five minutes or to 150 degrees heat holding for twenty minutes or to 170 degrees.

Tennessee.—State law, pasteurization compulsory.

Most all states have laws demanding pasteurization, practically every city has strict ordinances, not only demanding pasteurization, but milk is graded and received under various observations—it must be clean, odorless, and delivered cool—then with the proper facilities the creamery distributes the milk and cream and its products in the safe, sanitary way. Certain portions are separated for sweet cream, skim milk, made into various forms of butter, milk, cottage cheese, pimento cheese, cheddar cheese. In fact, milk is the one gift to nature. Under thoughtful and expert management of a creamery every particle is put to a real use, in fact from all accounts from unquestionable authorities throughout the world after thirty years of research, milk is the most perfectly balanced food on earth without exception.

As proof of the food value of milk below is given the result of the experiment of Drs. McCollum and Davis. In this instance small animals were used—white rats—to which they fed a diet composed of the following:

Wheat alone; no growth.
Wheat, plus purified protein; no growth, short life.
Wheat plus a salt mixture which gave it a mineral content, similar to that of milk; very little growth.
Wheat, plus protein, plus salt mixture, plus a growth-promoting milk fat; results, good growth, normal number of young, good

success in rearing the young.

This series of experiments again proves the necessity of a growth-promoting fat. But it does more than that; it shows that the proteins and mineral matter from the different sources are not of equal value, those of milk being altogether superior in this respect to those of such a food as wheat. Other experiments proved that the seeds of other cereals are, like wheat, quite incomplete in themselves as diets.

Another experiment was in early 1909, Hopkins, Cambridge, England showed conclusively that on an apparently complete feed made up of purified proteins, ordinary fats, carbohydrates and salts, young rats would not grow, but that when a small amount of milk was used, enough to make up 4 per cent of the feed, growth became entirely satisfactory. This was evidence that milk is necessary for growth.

And quoting from Dr. E. V. McCollum, Johns Hopkins University, author of "The Newer Knowledge of Nutrition." This man, perhaps, is the best known food scientist in America.

"I have come to the conclusion after carefully analyzing the effectiveness of the combinations of food employed in human nutrition that the efficiency of a people can be predicted with a fair degree of accuracy from a knowledge of the

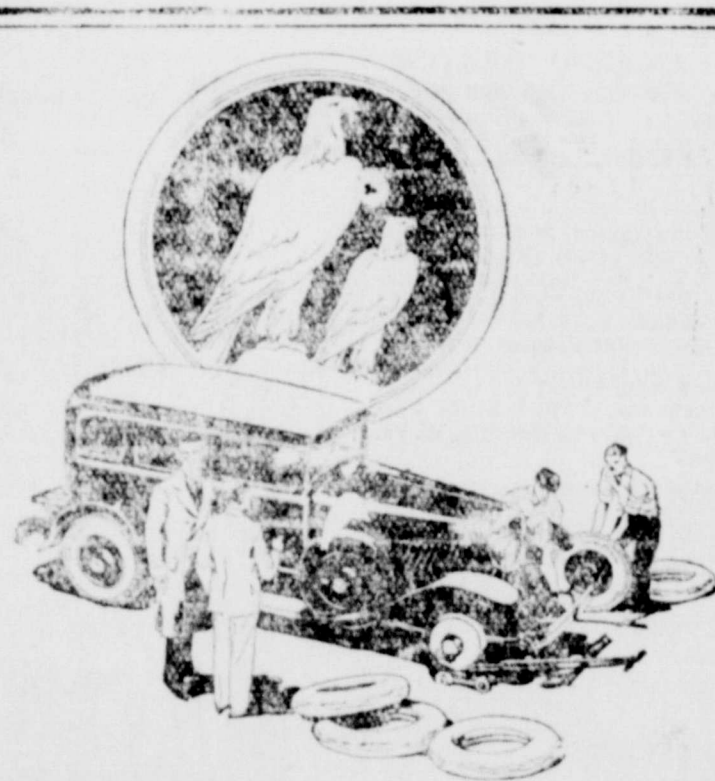

Railway Men Will Quickly Develop Commercial Phones on Fast Trains

(International News Staff Correspondent)

NEW YORK, May 21.—Now that the practicability of telephoning from a fast-moving railroad train has been demonstrated, railway officials in this country are giving attention to the commercial possibilities of the new and revolutionary system of communication.

The test, made from a railroad train on the Canadian National Railways, was successful in every sense of the word. This reporter, the first newspaper man to talk over the telephone from the train, could converse with a party 20 miles away in Toronto as easily as he ordinarily can while making a local call. The train was going about 30 miles an hour at the time but this in no way hampered communication.

Since the demonstration there has been considerable comment in the newspapers regarding possibilities of the new telephonic system and there is no doubt that the matter will receive attention from American railway officials. That the subject of telephoning from trains had been previously considered by two railroads in the United States is disclosed, however, by Walter S. Gifford, president of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company. He said:

"For some years the American Telephone and Telegraph Company has been ready to install a telephone service on moving trains and about two years ago had the matter up actively with two of the leading railroad systems in the country. Both railroads decided against it as it was not considered commercially practical. If any railroad wishes to give such service on its trains and bear the cost of it, we shall be very happy to install it and connect it with the lines of the Bell system."

The Canadian National Railway officials are proud of their achievement in being the first to establish two-way telephone communication from a moving train to a point on land miles away. They say that it is only a question of time before all of their trans-continental trains will operate such a device for the benefit of the traveling public.

One-way telephone communication from trains has been in effect in Germany but Canada is the first country to successfully demonstrate the possibilities of two-way communication. The Canadian National Railways plans to install the service as quickly as possible on two of its trains. The system will be installed on other trains subsequently.

Credit for the achievement is being largely given to a modest, self-effacing chap of 32 years, Joseph C. Burkholder, chief engineer of the telegraph and telephone department of the Canadian National Railways. He is the man who some time previously perfected the carrier current system that has been installed on 25 per cent of the company's telegraph lines and has proved one of the most revolutionary telegraph developments of the past decade. The carrier system enables a single telephone circuit to be utilized a number of times—that is one wire will do the work of half a dozen. The result has been a tremendous saving to the company and has been the means of great multiplication of telegraph circuits in Canada.

Burkholder was born at Philadelphia. He joined the Bell research laboratories there 15 years ago. He was brought to Canada from the Bell laboratories in New York by W. D. Robb, vice president of the Canadian National Railways, a little more than a year ago to assist in the development of the carrier system of telegraphy. After he worked out the system in the company's Toronto laboratories with W. G. Barber, general manager of the laboratory, he was asked to develop the problem of telephony from the trains. He worked night and day and it surprised none of his co-workers when success crowned his efforts.

"Any railway can use the information we gained in working on railway telephony," said Burkholder. "I think telephoning from moving trains will be a common matter on all trans-continental railroads of the future. The possibilities of this system of long distance communication is obvious to all."

FLYER SETS RECORD FOR HOPS OVER MOUNTAINS
(By International News Service)
CHICAGO, May 21.—When Clair Vance, veteran Boeing pilot, recently completed his 1800th hop over the "hump," a name given the summit of the Sierras between Reno, Nev., and Oakland, Calif., he established a national record for hurdling mountains.

On his daily flight with the air-mail and passenger transport plane Vance goes from sea level to 12,000 feet. On the 1,800 trips he has had only one forced landing.

AIR MAIL BUSINESS IS SHOWING BIG INCREASE

(By International News Service)
CHICAGO, May 21.—Mail and passenger planes of the Robertson Air Lines flew 39,610 miles during March, according to Harlan A. Gurney, operations manager. The total mileage involves more than 443 hours in the air and is exclusive of the passenger hops made over the field and city by the aircraft concern.

The St. Louis-Chicago mail planes were in the air during March 178 hours 49 minutes and flew 15,770 miles. Approximately 6731 pounds of air mail were carried over the route in the month.

315,000 Visit New York Each Day in Summer

NEW YORK, May 21.—How many visitors from other cities register at New York hotels during the "vacation months" of spring summer?

A recent interview granted International News Service by officials of the New York Hotel Owners Association revealed some surprising facts in connection with this question.

First came the statement that approximately 315,000 out-of-town-ers affix their names to hotel registers in the metropolis every day, during the months of June, July, August and September.

These figures, of course, are swelled considerably on days and week-ends when conventions are held here.

Next came the assertion that, according to reliable estimates, approximately \$5,000,000 is paid into the coffers of metropolitan business men daily by the influx of summer vacationers. This, if it held the year round, would be at the rate of \$12,250,000 annually. How much is paid by visitors to the railroads for transportation to New York from their home cities can only be guessed at.

The hotels, naturally, get the lion's share of this daily flood of provincial dollars. There are about 20 first class hostleries in New York City proper and it can easily be figured that each one of them must take in more than \$200,000 a day as a result of the summer trade.

The huge majority of the spring and summer tourists to Manhattan and summer tourists to Manhattan come from the Middle West and South, it was said.

Contrary to general belief, the cities of these sections and not the rural districts, furnish the most New York sight-seers.

Chicago, Ill., and St. Louis, Mo. are at the top of the list in this respect. The hotel owners report that more than 5 per cent of their incoming guests register from the Windy City. Slightly less than four and one-half per cent come from the Mound City.

Atlanta, Ga., leads among the cities of the South. Incidentally, an interesting sidelight on the flow of metropolitan visitors from Atlanta is the fact that the average length of time they remain here is less than it is in the case of people from other centers.

Atlantans apparently are disappointed at the lack of sunny geniality, to which they are accustomed, in New York.

The average summer tourist remains in New York about two weeks, the hotel owners declare, and during his visit he makes a thorough round of the city, which is to say he visits the Woolworth Tower, the Aquarium, the Fifth Avenue shops and, of course, the Broadway White Light district.

Coincidental with these revelations by the Hotel Owners Association, is the declaration by owners of sight-seeing busses that their business virtually triples itself in volume during the summer months.

GERMAN PRISONER WANTS EXECUTION CARRIED OUT
