The Butlers were en route to their home at Eastland, when the four-year-old girl ran across in front of their car. In a vain effort to keep from striking the child, the car swerved to one side, striking the Bertino car head-on. Ambulances were rushed to the scene and the dead and injured were brought here.

Terrell Hearing To Start Monday

Proposed Impeachment Of State Comptroller Will Come Up In House After Postponement Thursday

(By Associated Press) AUSTIN, Feb. 13.—(P)—A hearing on charges preferred in the house of representatives against Comptroller S. H. Terrell, accusing him of violations of the law in administering the affairs of his office, including diverting public funds to his personal use, today was postponed until Monday.

Attorneys for Terrell had requested a delay until Saturday to give privately-employed auditors an opportunity to check records in the comptroller's office, but the house voted to put the hearing off until Monday, next to the last day of the special session. This action was taken after several members expressed doubt if a quorum would be on hand Saturday.

Auditors Working Former State Senator T. H. McGee and former Attorney General W. A. Keeling, attorneys for Terrell, said that auditors working in the comptroller's department had already cleared up many of the charges.

John Scott, 46, and Jesse Gatlin, 30, private policemen, died at receiving hospitals about two and a half hours after they were wounded in an exchange with the robbers.

PASTOR CONVICTED

Baptist Minister Fined On Charges Of Assault

(By Associated Press) SALEM, Ore., Feb. 13.—(P)—The Rev. Robert L. Payne, pastor of the First Baptist church the last two years, was found guilty today of a charge of assault and fined \$10 by Judge Smith in justice court. A fight broke out between the pastor and a woman, Miss Virginia O'Neil, member of the church, with a chair at a deacon's meeting. The quarrel resulted from a personal grievance implicating the minister's wife. The pastor later was ousted from the pulpit of the church.

Emergency Call Sent for Police as Students, Police Fight for Control

(By Associated Press) ALBION, Mich., Feb. 13.—(P)—An emergency call for state police was sent out by local authorities tonight after students of Albion college had torn down the doors of the city jail and battled with police. At 11 p. m. students were in control of the town except for a theatre, where all of the police of the place were engaged in keeping 180 of the students imprisoned.

When state police arrived from Jackson the prisoners in the theatre were released on their own recognizance and were told to appear in court tomorrow.

Celebrating Victory. The trouble started when 300 students, celebrating a basketball victory over Alma college, stormed the theatre and demanded admission. The available police reserves in this town of 8,000 population were called and managed to round up half of the students.

Corruption, Debauchery, Crime Shown Pro Result

Four Determined Women in Fight Against Eighteenth Amendment in House Hearing; National Crime Wave Is Pictured

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—(P)—Led by four determined women, opponents of the Eighteenth amendment today related to the House Judiciary Committee, stories of crime, corruption and debauchery, which they charged resulted from the prohibition law.

The women set out to refute claims that the women of the country favored the dry statutes. The men witnesses, among them former Senator Bruce of Maryland, backed them up with charges that the greatest crime wave of history had resulted from the Eighteenth amendment.

Confession Made To Slaying Four- Year-Old In 1928

Statement Claims Boy Was Choked Then Struck Over Head; Revenge Is Motive Alleged By Hanna

(By Associated Press) WOOSTER, Ohio, Feb. 13.—(P)—Spectator Walter J. Mouney announced tonight he had obtained a signed statement from Charles Hanna, alleging that Earl Connel, 42, killed Melvin Horst, four, in a garage in Orrville the night of December 27, 1928.

Mouney announced the statement from Hanna said Connel choked the boy then struck him over the head. Hanna, alleged the statement, only after Junior Hanna, 18, had implicated his father and Connel, the prosecutor said.

Mouney said Hanna told him the motive for the killing of Melvin was that Connel wanted revenge on Roy Horst, uncle of Melvin, then married of Orrville, for hampering Connel in his activities as a bootlegger.

Hanna, when asked tonight regarding Prosecutor Mouney's statement, said: "The prosecutor told me to tell nobody nothing."

The will, which was dated August 1, 1928, had been witnessed by Brady and Zula Mae Rouse. The grandmother, Mrs. Lena Rogers, disposed of her property shortly before she died in three words: "To my granddaughter, Lehigh G. Highsmith, I do will all my property."

Appropriations Providing Emergency Funds, Summer School Maintenance Goes To Senate

(By Associated Press) AUSTIN, Feb. 13.—(P)—The senate and a house each passed a fee bill here today, but the two differed and a fee conference committee was due to get them.

The senate adopted a committee substitute for the original measure submitted by Senator Pink Parrish of Lubbock, which did not make many departures from the existing statutes but placed a flat maximum of \$15,500 on earnings of any officer for a single year.

The house accepted a substitute bill by Rep. R. M. Hubbard, of New Boston setting a graduated scale of maximums according to population up to \$12,500 for counties of 150,000 and over, provided for a strict accounting of all fees and abolished the present practice of permitting officers to collect fees for an indefinite period after leaving office.

County Dads Will Take Up Petition

Proposed New Jail, Court Building To Be Considered By Commission Here; Bond Election Asked

(By Associated Press) AUSTIN, Feb. 13.—(P)—At a meeting to be held this morning by the Lubbock County Commissioners' court, consideration will be given the petition, which has 118 signers, for an election on a proposal for issuance of \$250,000 in bonds to provide for a new criminal court and jail structure.

A committee of citizens presented the petition to the court last Monday but no action was taken being deferred until Friday.

According to the petition the funds would be used "for the purpose of erecting, building, constructing, furnishing and equipping one court house building to be used for purpose of county offices, court rooms and jail."

The election is sought as a measure to obviate the hindrance to ward letting of contract for the new \$250,000 federal building. Government officials have announced that contract will not be let for the new federal structure, to be located on the southeast corner of the square, until the present jail structure is removed.

Swine Breeders Plan Withdrawal

(By Associated Press) BROWNFIELD, Feb. 13.—(P)—A committee of representatives of the Swine Breeders association today was investigating the feasibility of withdrawing from the National, Recording association and devoting energies of the association toward forming a state association.

At a meeting yesterday the committee was instructed to report its findings to the state association officials that circumstances indicated a withdrawal proposal.

Frank Phillips of Canyon was named chairman of the committee. Jeff Greer of Childress was appointed chairman of another committee to confer with the state association regarding the employment of a full-time field man.

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Youth Makes Confession Of Stealing Crutch And Car From Plains Farmer

PARK BUFKIN, 21-year-old youth who, Tuesday night, is alleged to have held Arthur Pendleton, Plains farmer, at the point of a gun and escaped in the farmer's automobile, was arrested yesterday in Amarillo, according to information reaching the local sheriff's office.

Bufkin, when arrested, was said to have made a confession to the charges of Pendleton. A \$200 reward for arrest of the youth and a \$25 reward for return of the car was offered by Youkum county commissioners' court and citizens of Plains. The car, a Chevrolet coupe, was recovered.

Bufkin is alleged to have left Pendleton, who has only one leg, at a windmill in a pasture and took his crutch away from him. The farmer wrenched loose a fence stake and used it as an improvised cane to hobble three miles to an adjoining house for help.

Eighteen Gunmen Are Indicted In Drives On Crime

Only One Bombing And One Important Robbery Due To Arrest Of Over 400 Chicago Hoodlums

(By Associated Press) CHICAGO, Feb. 13.—(P)—Indictments were returned against 18 gunmen and true bills were reported voted naming five others today as the police drive against crime went forward with only one bombing and one important robbery blotting the record for the day.

Most of the 425 hoodlums seized in the roundup last night, including Myles O'Donnell, reputed West Side gang chief, were released today. O'Donnell, however, was placed under \$1,400 bond on a charge of disorderly conduct. Three of his four henchmen arrested with him were among those said to be named in true bills for carrying weapons.

They remained in jail. O'Donnell obtained his freedom because of a weak heart. He fainted when a photographer's flashlight beamed at the police show-up last night.

Bonds of \$10,000 each were set for the 18 less well known gunmen named in the indictment and State's Attorney John A. Swanson said early trials would be sought.

Will Investigate Reported Suicide

Father Of Shooting Victim Is Not Satisfied With Suicide Theory; Probe Will Start Saturday

(By Associated Press) DULUTH, Minn., Feb. 13.—(P)—Hopes of the defense to bring the trial of Emmet J. White, United States customs patrolman, charged with second degree murder to a speedy end were dashed today when Federal Judge William A. Cant denied a motion to dismiss the action.

George A. Healey, assistant United States district attorney, presented the motion immediately after attorneys for the state wound up their case after a single day of testimony in the effort to convict White for the slaying of Gust Henry Wirkkala of Big Falls, Minn., last June.

STANDS FOR LAWS

Allred Favors Enforcement Of Anti-Trust Act

(By Associated Press) AUSTIN, Feb. 13.—(P)—J. V. Allred of Wichita Falls, candidate for attorney general, declared here today that he stood for enforcement of the "long neglected, almost forgotten anti-trust laws of Texas."

"These laws were born out of the unhappy experience of the people at the hands of selfish special interests and their enforcement is specifically and especially imposed upon the attorney general," he said.

Rapping disbelievers with the statement that "they are not the pebbles on the beach," Mr. Smith stoutly upheld the prevalence of the Lone Star state. In a letter to the Lubbock Morning Avalanche, he points out that it most certainly does rain frogs. Not only frogs but sun perch, as large as a man's hand.

But let him tell it. "Gentlemen: I see in your paper of recent date where Miss Mae Gibson, of Chicago, told of raining frogs and she was scoffed at."

To Assume Duties

Four Days Of Debate End With Vote Of 52 To 26 For Confirmation; Demo Ranks Equally Divided

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—(P)—Charles Evans Hughes was elevated to Chief Justice of the United States tonight with the consent of the senate.

His nomination by President Hoover to succeed William Howard Taft was confirmed by a vote of 52 to 26. Mr. Taft resigned last week because of ill health. Mr. Hughes is expected to assume the Chief Justiceship immediately.

Fight Gains Support

A stubborn uphill fight in the senate against the former supreme court justice and presidential candidate, led by Senators Norris of Nebraska and Borah of Idaho, picked up unexpected support, but fell short after another full day of debate.

The roll call showed the democrats almost evenly divided. Fourteen democrats and 28 republicans voted for Hughes while 11 republicans and 13 democrats opposed him.

The end of the four day contest, which was unprecedented as the first discussion of an important nomination in open session, came after midnight when an effort by the opposition to carry the debate over another day had been defeated.

Foes of Mr. Hughes carried the debate almost entirely and launched a relentless drive today while it

Effort To Obtain Pope's Bond Fails

Former Southland Banker Held In Jail At Post On Six Charges; Bonds Are Reduced To \$2,000 Each

(Special To The Avalanche) POST, Feb. 13.—(P)—All efforts of attorneys to obtain release from the Garza county jail of J. M. Pope have failed to date and the retired Southland banker early tonight was still a prisoner.

Six bonds of \$10,000 each, set in cases charging acceptance of deposits in a bank he is alleged to have known unstable, were reduced here early today when attorneys of both state and defense reached an agreement.

The bonds were reduced individually from \$10,000 to \$2,000 and at the same time the attorney for Pope, before his arrest on the six charges covering deposits, was out on bond of \$7,500, charged with theft by battery. The bank which Pope operated in Southland for several months last fall, closed on December 2, and the owner was "missing" for a period of a month.

Women Opponents Of Pro Amendment Are In Spotlight

Feminine Witnesses In Dry Hearing Claim Prohibition Has Resulted In Worse Condition

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13. (AP)—Feminine opponents of prohibition held the center of attention today as the house judiciary committee opened its second hearing on resolutions asking repeal of the Eighteenth amendment.

Two of them were Mrs. Charles H. Babin, former republican national committee woman from New York, and Representative Mary T. Norton, democrat, New Jersey. The latter was the first to take the stand.

Asks Repeal.
Mrs. Norton is author of one of the resolutions to repeal the 18th amendment. She explained her measure, which would amend the constitution to permit a referendum on the Eighteenth amendment, saying a referendum would give voters the privilege of registering their own will.

"The dry express their confidence that they have an overwhelming majority of the people of the United States in favor of the Eighteenth amendment," she said, "if so, why should they not welcome this test? This resolution provides that in case the people vote for the repeal of the Eighteenth amendment, congress shall still retain the power to prohibit the interstate transportation of intoxicating liquors in violation of state laws. This right is expressly retained in the Federal government to give the Federal government power over interstate commerce in the transportation of liquors."

Would Bar Saloons.
The further provision is that notwithstanding the repeal of the Eighteenth amendment, no state shall permit or authorize the conduct of a saloon. I believe the American people on the whole satisfied with discarding the saloon. They do not want to see it return."

Mrs. Babin said she appeared to refute the claim of the drys that all the women of the country were in favor of prohibition. She asserted that her organization, the Women's Organization for National Prohibition Reform, was composed of more than 50,000 women all over the country, who had thought prohibition was needed to bring about temperance, but had found prohibition had resulted in a worse condition.

Numerous times she was applauded until Chairman Graham of the committee rebuked the audience for what he described as an "unnecessary demonstration."

Prohibition Fails.
At first the women of the land, Mrs. Babin said, thought that prohibition would strengthen a weak character. "They are now realizing if the spirit is not within, legislation can be of no avail."

In concluding, the witness said it was the opinion of her organization that a political party which ignores the prohibition issue will eventually sink into oblivion.

Mrs. David Holmes Morton of Brooklyn, N. Y., secretary of the women's committee for repeal of the Eighteenth amendment, was the next witness. She said "we can no longer take the word of the anti-saloon league in this important matter," asserting that after the James law had become effective her organization had increased its membership by several hundred of women.

When she was questioned by Representative Sumners, democrat, Texas, as to how to go about the repeal she replied that she and the women of the country who realize the seriousness of the situation were not interested in the details of carrying the repeal.

Arguments Under Way Thursday In Love Piracy Case

Oscar R. Fowler, Tulsa attorney; A. C. Killian, and Hattie Maye Killian, were charged with a scheme to extort \$25,000 from Mrs. Maggie Hopkins of Pampa.

Defense counsel brought their case to a close yesterday, pinning hope of acquittal chiefly upon the testimony of Fowler and the sworn statements of the defendants.

Claim Wet Forces Are Diminishing

General Secretary Of World League Against Alcohol Asserts Anti-Prohibitionists Growing Fewer

CHICAGO, Feb. 13. (AP)—Asserting that anti-prohibitionists are growing fewer and fewer in congress and the state legislatures, Ernest H. Cherrington, general secretary of the world league against alcoholism, today said this was evidence of "the diminishing power" of the wet forces.

"Today the liquor crowd finds itself unable to muster more than a corporal's guard in those halls of legislation where its word some years ago was law," he told the editors' advisory section of the international council of religious education.

Power Waning.
Cherrington pointed to "the waning of the power of an anti-social force" as "significant evidence of the trend of public sentiment" after ten years of prohibition.

"It is interesting to note," he said, "that each of the ten congresses during the last 20 years has had a larger majority in favor of prohibition and its enforcement than any previous congress, and that the legislatures of the states as they stand today, together with the membership of the present congress, present a larger aggregate majority of members of all these legislative bodies in favor of prohibition and its enforcement than at any previous time."

While a congressional committee at Washington continued its hearings this morning on proposals to modify or repeal the dry law, Cherrington told his Chicago audience "the liquor crowd are now remarkable principally for the variety of schemes they suggest to evade or nullify measures which they practically confess they are too small numerically to repeal."

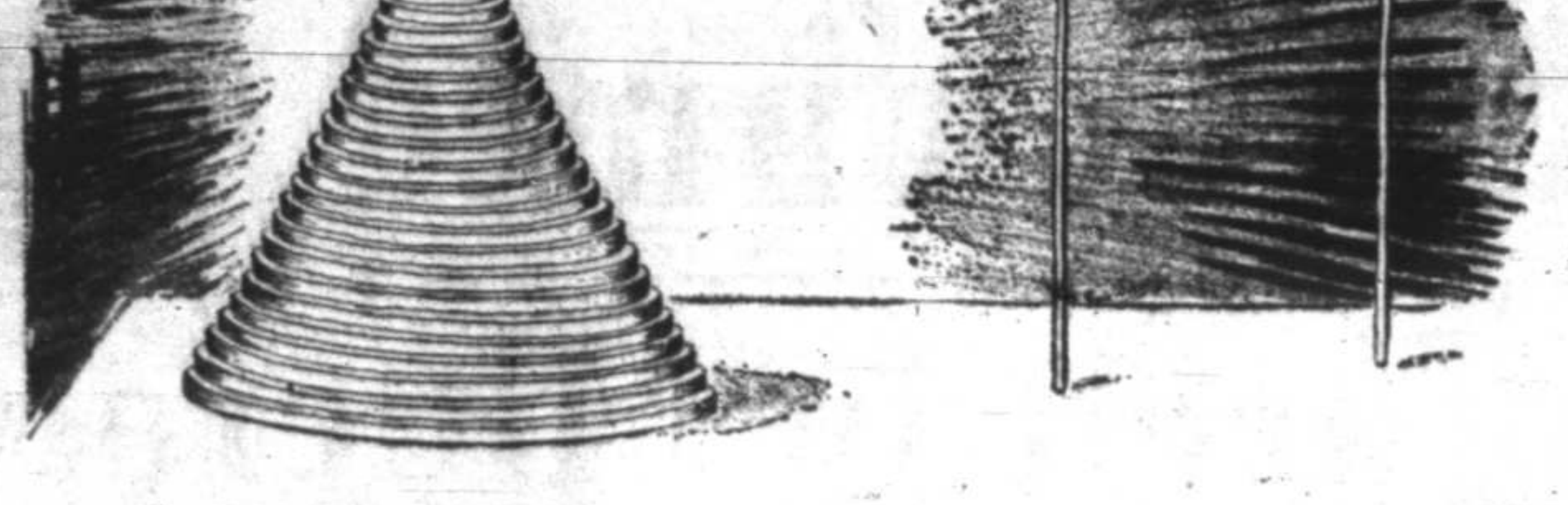
He branded as "outworn ideas" the proposals offered by opponents of the Eighteenth amendment, after they had "availed themselves of every pretext to have either the Eighteenth amendment itself, or else the laws for its enforcement declared unconstitutional."

Prohibition Only Solution.
Asserting that the only alternative to prohibition is permissiveness, he said the permissive system had a try-out of more than three centuries in the United States, "demonstrating beyond question that any degree of permissiveness for beverage alcohol fails to mitigate the evils of that traffic, and that every move toward bettering conditions has been a move toward prohibition."

"Prohibition," he added, "in its efforts to suppress the evils arising from the beverage alcohol traffic, has been successful to the degree to which prohibition has been invoked, enforced and obeyed."

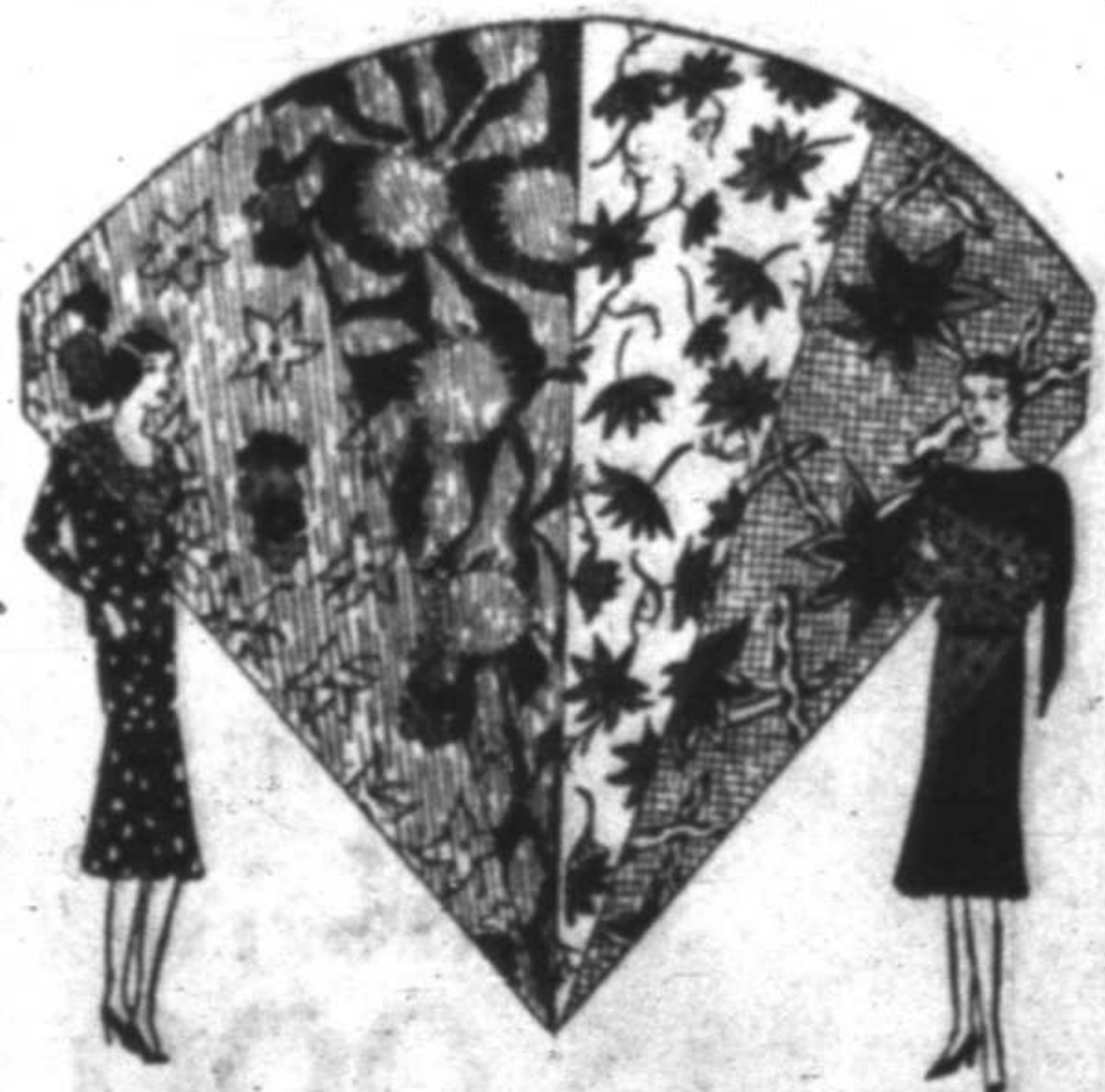

Railway Hearing Opened Thursday

Southwest Railroads Never
Charged Higher Rates On
Large Commodities, Testimony Shows

SAN ANTONIO, Feb. 13. (P.)—Railroads of the Southwest have never charged higher freight rates on large commodity shipments, witnesses testified today at the rate hearing here before the Interstate Commerce Commission and the Texas Railroad Commission.

Carloads and trainloads of rock, asphalt, gravel, agricultural products, livestock, wool and mohair have always been given common point rates and the lowest available under the tariffs fixed by the state and national carrier commissions.

Houston Man Heard.
This in substance was the testimony of F. L. Gordon, of Houston, representing the Southern Pacific lines and concurred in by C. D. Riden, assistant general freight agent of the Missouri Pacific lines, and J. A. Lynch, general freight agent of the Texas and Pacific lines.

The hearing is being held before former Gov. Pat M. Neff, now a member of the Texas Railroad commission. He succeeded Clarence E. Gilmore, who died suddenly last fall while he was conducting the hearing. Sitting with the former governor is William A. Diquet, rate

examiner for the Interstate Commerce Commission.

Started By League.
The case was brought before the two carrier commissions by the Texas Industrial Traffic league, and organization of large shippers from all over the Southwest seeking to abolish higher freight rates privileges granted the railroads more than 20 years ago when some of the lines built into sparsely settled territory in Southwest Texas.

This is the reason why golfers who play their approaches for a bounce and roll to the green get that blue feeling when they play in the rain with Shute.

A Point About Iowa

Odds Favor Porkers To Cop Fifth Straight Conference Cage Title; Teams Meet At Fayetteville

DALLAS, Feb. 13. (P)—Ambassadors of a former hope, Southern Methodist University's basketball team will see what they can do about the Arkansas University plague Friday and Saturday nights at Fayetteville.

The consensus is that the Red and Blue will do little, if anything about it, and that the Razorbacks will go marching right on to their fifth straight Southwest Conference crown. There is an outside chance, however, which makes the fact that the Mustangs are engaging the Porkers worth recording.

Moral Support Strong
There will be no lack of moral support from the five other Texas members of the conference. All are somewhat weary of the Razorbacks' dominance of Southwest cage circles. Among the Ponies' most ardent supporters in their efforts to dislodge the lanky Ozarkians will be the Texas University Longhorns, who were jolted out of a possible tie for the title by the same Ponies last week. If the Methodists could, by great good luck, get as good as an even break against Schoonover & Co., the Longhorns would receive another lease on life. But getting an even break at Fayetteville comes under the head of tough assignments.

Steers And Aggies Clash
While waiting for the returns from Arkansas, the Longhorns will entertain their olden rivals, the Texas Aggies, tomorrow night at Austin. Coach Walker's hoopsters are expected to win without undue exertion, since the Farmers took a fancy trimming from Rice in their last appearance. It is very essential to them that they do win, for if they drop another the title can be handed to Arkansas without bothering to count the ballots.

Baylor's cellar-dwelling Bears and the Rice Owls will complete the week's card with a melee Saturday night at Waco. Since their 34-10 victory over Texas Christian, 34 to 20, Tuesday night, the Bruins are more generally respected and now rate an even chance of stopping the Owls, who have won three in a row.

New Scoring Ace Looms
The Waco tussle is almost certain to produce a new leader in the scoring race. Raymond Alford, Baylor forward, now is in second place with 69 points, while Ray Hart, Rice sharpshooter, is third with 68. Roy Durr, T. C. U. center, who is leading the parade with 70 points, does not see action this week-end.

Arkansas enters its final home series looking slouder than at any time this season. Last week the Razorbacks smashed the strong Oklahoma Aggies at Stillwater. Schoonover, Prewitt and Pickren have their eyes on the hoop and the entire team is clicking smoothly. It is doubtful if the Mustangs could defeat them, even if they had another of those "inspired" games in their systems.

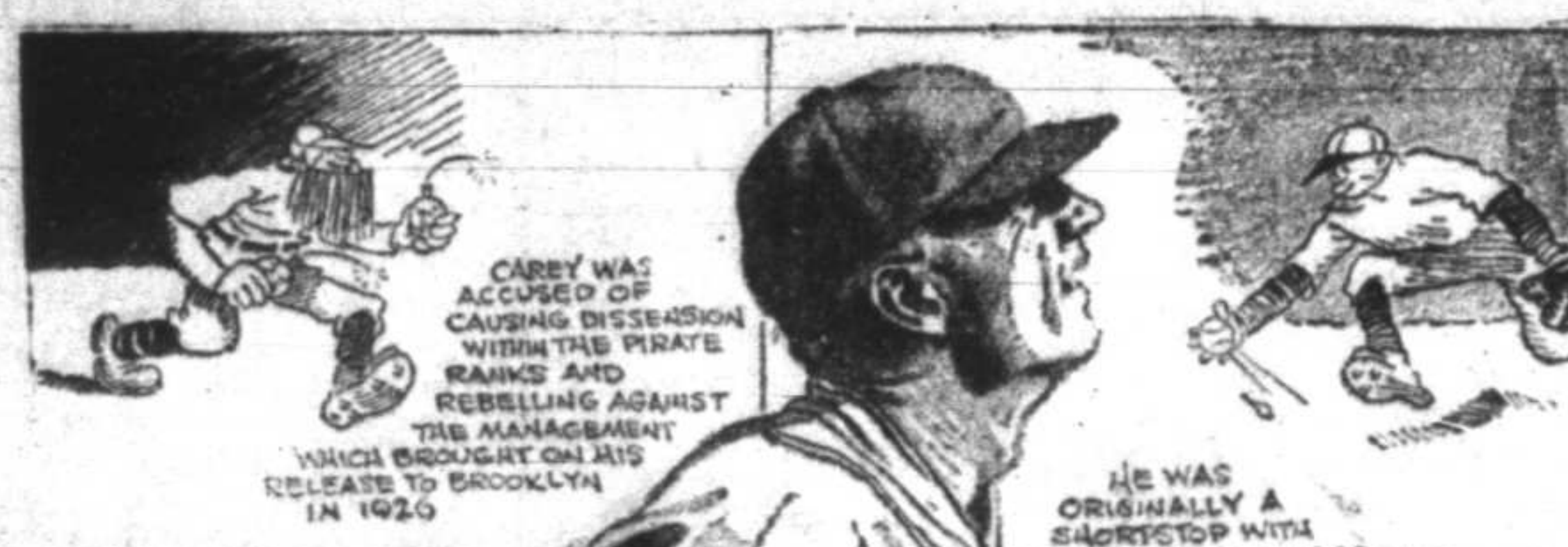
Stadium officials immediately started plans for holding the fight Feb. 23, but had not determined if both Mandell and McLarnin would be available then.

ST. LOUIS, Feb. 13. (P)—The forty-ninth annual meeting of the United States Lawn Tennis association will be held here Saturday. A meeting of the national executive committee tomorrow afternoon will lay the foundation for the general session.

Dailey, now vice-president, is a native of Kentucky and formerly lived in Topeka, Kan., where he attended Washington college and competed in college athletics. Samuel H. Colton of Philadelphia is present head of the association.

The White Sox today sent the fighting first baseman a contract for the 1930 season. No mention of salary was made, but it was indicated the amount was not in the neighborhood of \$25,000 which the "Great One" said he would demand.

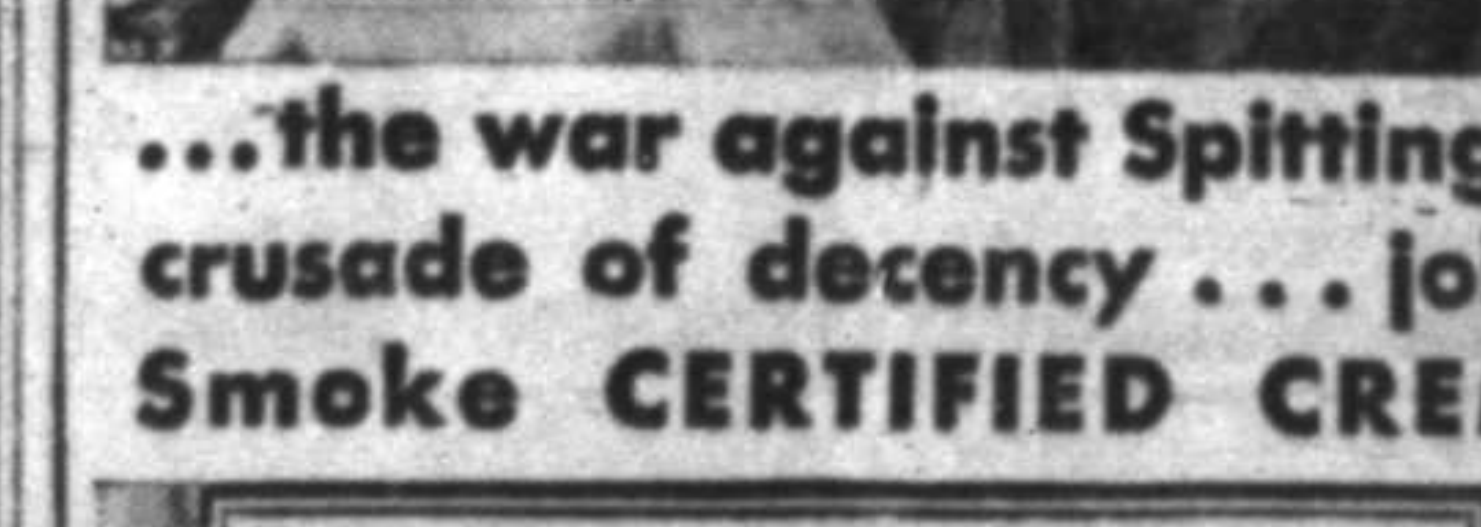

At the Lubbock county municipal course, located east of the city, the duffers have begun to swing their clubs menacingly. The short holes on this nine-hole layout has proven an ideal practice ground for beginners.

It was just an item in the news, it carried no screaming headlines and perhaps several other stories in the same edition created more interest from readers. But behind the news itself—between the lines, as it were—there appeared a lesson worthy of mention.

We refer to the recent announcement from the Citizens National bank that two of its young men, fellows who have come up through the ranks, had been elevated to executive positions.

By action of the bank's directors S. G. Wilson and Paul Hardwick take their places as officers of that institution. Mr. Wilson becomes an active vice president; Mr. Hardwick takes the part of cashier. There is a lesson here for other young men, employees of large business houses, who are still in the ranks but have their eyes and their ambitions set on higher things, and likewise a lesson for executives.

The Morning Avalanche is not in touch with the banking records or the type of work which characterizes these young men. Hundreds of people who read this editorial will know nothing first hand about either. But the fact that through the weeks, months and years they have been associated with the bank they have proven their merit to their superiors means a lot, and the world, ever eager to approve success, will be glad for them.

It is a fine thing when a bank, or any other big business institution, chooses for its more important positions men from its own ranks. The action spurs other employees, still in the ranks, to look ahead to the day when their promotion, if they deserve it, will come. It keeps young men satisfied with their jobs, it makes the ambition to fill them to such a degree of satisfaction that their employers will become dissatisfied with keeping them there, and will promote them. It furnishes, in brief, an incentive for better work.

And then there is another angle which should not be overlooked.

When a working force in any business is contented, it is strong for the business. A stepping stone to better things, that business is improved. The atmosphere, in time, is carried to the outside people who transact business there and the condition reacts to the benefit of the concern. Thus the choosing, when practicable, of men from the ranks to fill higher vacancies, can and often does become a vital factor.

The Morning Avalanche is always glad when business houses here see fit to promote employees to positions of greater authority—glad not only because hard work has been merited but also because it will urge others on toward success and will react to better business.

PUMPED PATRIOTISM
Once more the patriotic enthusiasts, whose fervor is properly stirred by "The Star Spangled Banner," are petitioning congress to pass a law making Francis Scott Key's immortal song the national anthem. Five million strong, according to their petition, their delegates flourish a revised version of the music to meet the objection that the original melody is beyond the vocal resources of the untrained citizen.

The members of the house judiciary committee, listening to the singing of the revised score of "The Star Spangled Banner," leaned forward in their chairs with evident interest in this refreshing innovation," according to one report. But it is not stated that they rose to their feet and joined in the singing.

Most people will ask in bewilderment why there should be a law on the subject. American people by unanimous consent have voluntarily adopted "The Star Spangled Banner" as their national anthem. Its rhythmic tune invariably stirs their patriotic fervor, even if their attempts to sing the words to the difficult air often end in melodic disaster.

During the World war, at "community sings," no set of fingers was needed to bring people to their feet at the first preliminary notes of "The Star Spangled Banner," and there could be no complaint of lukewarmness toward either song or symbol.

If the revision of the music makes it more singable, so much the better. The improved melody will inevitably work its way into popular favor. Meanwhile the proposition will be consigned to the limbo of unnecessary law to be resurrected only "if and when" the American people shall find in due reverence for "The Star Spangled Banner" and "Old Glory." Patriotic inspiration cannot be pumped into the people by passing laws.

TWO HEADS WORSE THAN ONE
The bill transferring prohibition enforcement from the treasury department to the department of justice has been favorably reported by the house committee on expenditure, with a provision as to control of industrial alcohol permits which is in the nature of a compromise. In its original form the bill required the two departments jointly to draw up regulations controlling the issuance of permits for industrial alcohol. As reported out, this was eliminated, but the bill provides that the attorney general shall investigate permits for the withdrawal of alcohol and may act jointly with the secretary of the treasury in passing on permits or renewals.

A decade's experience has shown that industrial alcohol is the bootleggers' chief source of supply, at least in the urban centers which afford the greatest problems in enforcement. If the department of justice is to be entrusted with the main job of enforcement, and is expected to get results, it ought to have ample power to deal with the chief source of bootleg supply.

Division of control can only make for divided responsibility. The dual system makes a ho's in prohibition defenses. Logic requires that the department of justice, from first to last, shall be handled by the department of justice.

On the Firing Line at the Nation's Capital

REORGANIZATION OF DIPLOMATIC RANKS IS HARD ON CAREER MEN, SAYS STEWART

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—President Hoover certainly is reorganizing the upper ranks of the U. S. diplomatic service as fast as he can at present. From the counselors of embassies on down, through the successive grades of secretaries and miscellaneous underlings, Uncle Sam's workers in foreign fields are recognized as holding their jobs mainly on a "career" basis. Some of the higher-ups were hoping until recently that Washington had adopted a similar policy toward their positions. President Coolidge did take that view of them, but evidently not President Hoover.

Among overseas capitals whither newly-appointed American ministers or ambassadors have sailed since last inauguration day are:

Berlin, Budapest, Copenhagen, Habana, Helsinki, London, Madrid, Paris, Peking, Prague, Rome, San Jose de Costa Rica, Sofia, Stockholm, Teheran, Tirana, Vienna and Warsaw—quite a few of them might well know capitals; two or three which most probably would have to look up in a gazetteer or hunt for with a microscope in an atlas.

The list is not a full list, either. It includes only the names of big, important capitals, which are easy to remember, or of smaller ones where changes have been made so lately as not to have been forgotten.

Moreover a fresh batch of appointments is delivered by the White House to the senate, for confirmation, two or three times weekly. Indications are that, before the president has finished, a very few "fair-haired boys" like Ambassador Hugh S. Gibson, at Brussels, and maybe Ambassador Joseph C. Grew, at Istanbul (meaning Constantinople), will remain out of the corps of foreign representatives which Mr. Hoover inherited from his predecessors.

The firing of an ambassador does not matter much. All the embassies cost far more to keep up than they pay in salaries. Only rich men can afford to accept them. After holding them for a few years and getting all the social fun out of them that they are good for, most of their incumbents are willing to quit, simply because they are getting tired of the game. Even if not, it is no actual hardship to them to be thrown out.

However, there are some legations (where ministers hold forth) which pay living wages. That is to say, their expenses are not so high. Being separated from one of these berths may be very severe on the diplomat who has held it. Perhaps he is a person of small means—away from home for a generation; growing old; unfit for other employment. These are the "career diplomats" one is bound to feel sorry for.

Practically speaking, there are two sides to the proposition. Nearly all European diplomats are professionals. They are smoother than ours. They know languages. On issues of international politics they usually get the better of us.

Washington had a spell of noticing this difference rather acutely eight or ten years ago, and to talk about the desirability of building up a professional corps of our own. At that time our only old hands were men who had risen to the higher posts among the underlings. They were unwilling to be promoted because they were comparatively safe where they were and reckoned that they would not be if they accepted advancement. Nevertheless, a number of them were persuaded to do so, with the tacit understanding that they were to be exempt from the mutations of changing administrations.

But of course these understandings could not be made binding by the then powers in Washington upon future powers which might follow them in office. Evidently the present powers do not consider them binding insofar as they are concerned—which is tough on the career diplomats.

But the other side?

True as it is that professional diplomats can run rings around amateurs in matters of international politics, there are many signs that the right sort of amateurs can run rings around professional diplomats in matters of business and finance.

A career diplomat who left the United States in 1910 or thereabouts, and has been gone almost continuously ever since, can scarcely be expected to understand what the going in this country are all about in 1930.

President Hoover's idea appears to be that an American representative abroad ought to be, first and foremost, an efficient trade representative, and that is what a professional diplomat is apt to be every-thing else but—so to speak.

It is hard on professional diplomats, but this machine age is hard on a lot of old-fashioned experts.

Your Health
EVERY MINUTE IS IMPORTANT WHEN GIVING FIRST AID TO GAS VICTIMS

It is necessary to remind people again and again during the winter months that running the automobile motor in the garage with the door closed, burning a gas heater without proper vents in a small bathroom and having a leaky hose in connection with illuminating gas used for cooking may yield death due to gas poisoning. The ingredient which produces death in such cases is carbon monoxide.

In the handling of a person who has been asphyxiated by carbon monoxide gas, every moment is important. A few minutes of delay may mean the difference between life and death. Send a hurry call at once for medical aid and for the resuscitating squads of fire and police departments in large cities, but begin at once proper artificial respiration.

In large plants where gas poisoning cases may occur, it is customary to have available tanks of oxygen and carbon dioxide, which are used to help breathing while the artificial respiration is being given.

If the person is breathing spontaneously, it is not necessary to use the artificial respiration method, but the inhalations of oxygen and carbon dioxide should be given promptly. If this mixture is not available, oxygen alone should be used.

Above all things, it is important to keep the asphyxiated person warm until his circulation is again active. It is not advisable to handle the person roughly or to move him very far, because rough handling may cause serious injury. If the person has been asphyxiated in a small room fresh air should be admitted to the room immediately.

It is particularly important that the person does not attempt to walk until he has fully recovered and has been pronounced normal by someone competent to judge. Not infrequently the asphyxiated person is permitted to walk too soon and the effort thrown on the incapacitated heart results in sudden death from heart failure.

It has been learned that long exposure to carbon monoxide may cause serious changes in the brain tissue and that these effects may be seen months after asphyxiation has occurred.

The menace of gas poisoning is so serious that everything possible should be done to prevent it. Certainly, it is desirable to have regular inspections of all pipes, tubes and other means of conveying dangerous gases in close proximity to human beings.

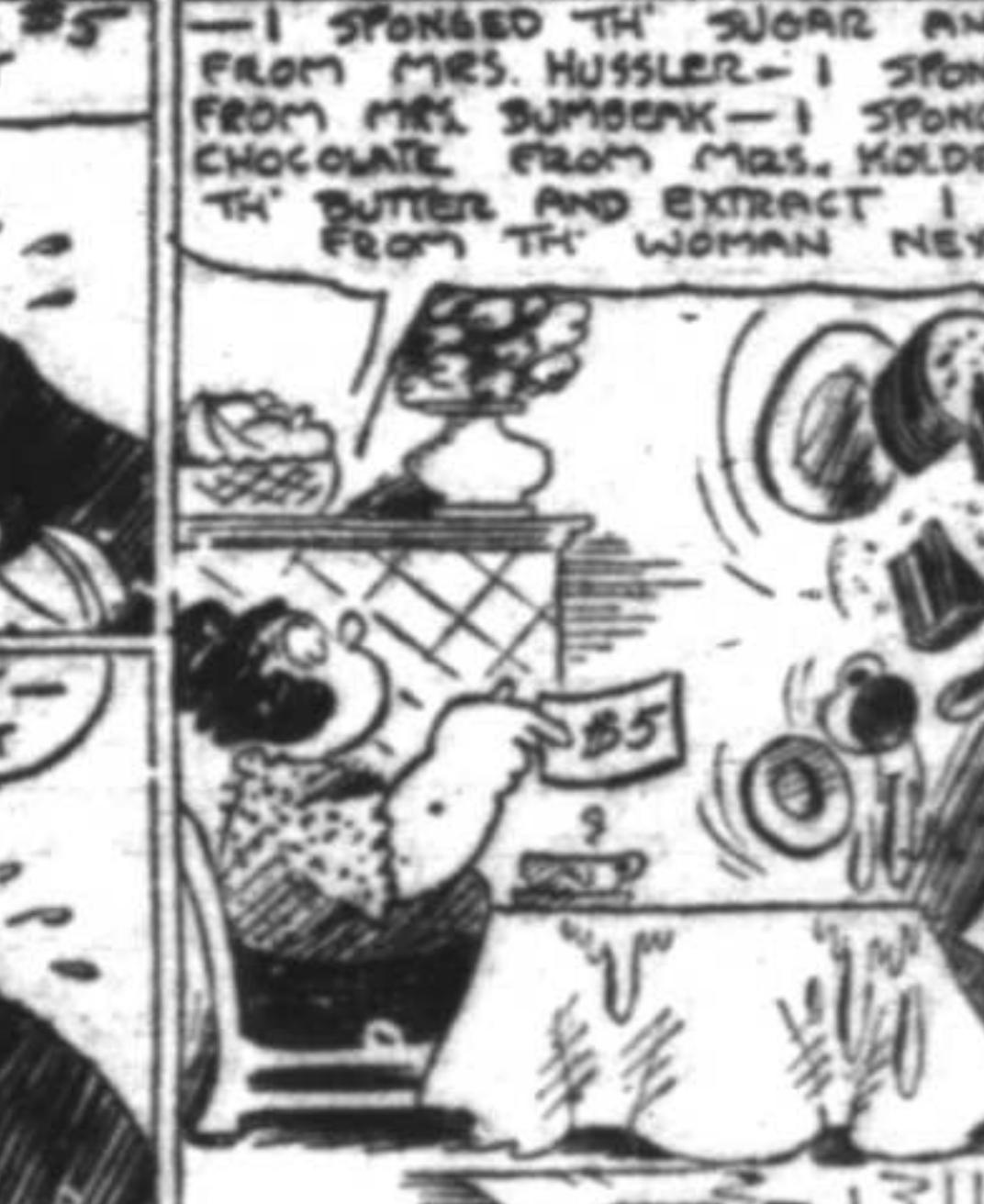

May sold up from 13.86@13.87 and closed at 13.95 with the general market closing barely steady at net declines of 7 to 10 points.

The opening was barely steady at a decline of 5 to 14 points with the active months soon showing net losses of 15 to 19 points. March contracts sold off to 13.92 July to 13.95 and October to 13.95 under the early offerings but at this level the decline was checked by trade buying and covering.

For a time the market showed strength, selling up to 13.90 for March, 13.93 for July and 13.94 for October, making a recovery of about 89 points from the low level of last week in the case of May deliveries. The demand tapered and a 1/4 cent increase. The market reacted sharply during the last hour. Last prices showed declines of about 20 to 24 points from the best on the more active positions.

Advances Caused
In Grain Sorghum

PORT WORTH, Feb. 13. (AP)—Light offerings have caused sharp advances in grain sorghum, with today showing a gain of seven cents and kafir five cents. Red oats were lower. Exporters were still out of the market for wheat, and mills reduced their bids 1-2¢. Fair demand was reported for corn seed with rather high prices prevailing.

Horn, president of Texas Technological college, yesterday expressed hope that Tech would receive the necessary funds which have been outlined for emergency purposes, following the senate's action in passing a bill to appropriate \$1,602,900 for summer schools and other emergency educational purposes.

Texas Tech has applied for an aggregate appropriation of \$136,500. The divisional needs follow: \$26,000 for additional salaries; \$25,000 for maintenance; \$50,000 for equipment, and \$35,000 additional funds for summer school.

"I am hopeful," said Dr. Horn, "that the appropriation will be made without delay. I am not certain as to how much of Texas Tech's outlined funds would be included in the total appropriation, as specified in the bill which was passed by the senate."

School Children Are Hurt In N. Y. House Explosion

Fifty Injured, 12 Badly
Enough For Treatment In
Hospital, When Blast
Wrecks Brick Structure

NEW YORK, Feb. 13. (P) — Fifty school children were injured, 12 seriously enough to require hospital treatment, today when an explosion demolished two one-story brick houses and tore out all the windows on one side of public school 83, at Dean street and Schenectady avenue, Brooklyn.

The explosion occurred in an unoccupied brick dwelling directly across Dean street from a new wing of the school building. Two negroes in one of the wrecked dwellings were seriously injured.

The injured, suffering from cuts from flying glass and splintered wood, were treated by ambulance surgeons. Of the 12 taken to hospitals, two were said to be in a serious condition.

Police said they believed the explosion was caused by gas accumulating in the basement of the unoccupied house. They said they found a still in the ruins of the structure, but the still had not been in operation immediately prior to the explosion.

Some 2,000 children were in the school building at the time of the explosion, about 800 of them in the new wing. Twenty-four children who were taking shower baths at the time were bundled into their clothes by teachers and hurried to the street.

(P) — Representative Clarence Reid, Michigan, asserted today before the house judiciary committee that it was "out of the question" that Governor Green of Michigan could have attended the "wild party" in Detroit referred to yesterday in testimony by Walter Liggett, magazine writer.

Appearing with Clancy was John W. Miner, secretary of the Michigan prison commission, who asserted charges made by Liggett were "too absurd to be given the slightest thought."

Liggett in his testimony said the governor of Michigan and a number of prominent officials in Detroit had attended the party. He said the party had been given by a Detroit gambler.

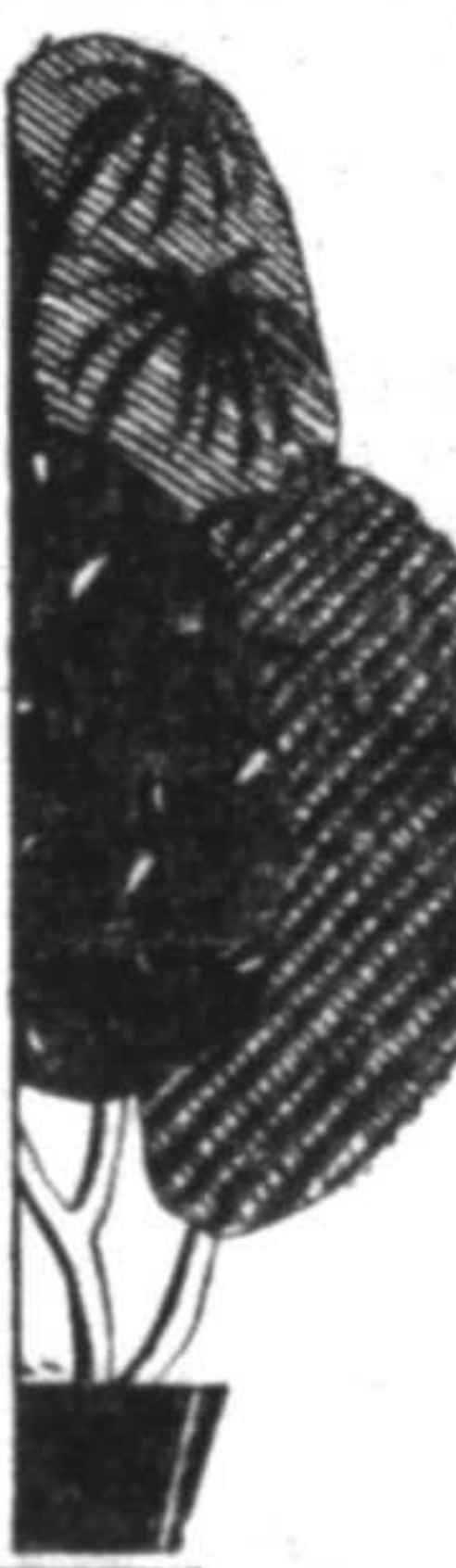

Sooner Governor Hopeful Of Texas Accepting Offer

Holloway Plans To Discuss
New Tactics For Holding
Disputed Land On Border
Of Oklahoma And Texas

OKLAHOMA CITY, Feb. 13. (P) — Although hopeful that Texas would reconsider Oklahoma's offer of \$150,000 for 28,000 acres of disputed land along the western boundary, Gov. W. J. Holloway today planned to discuss new tactics for holding the territory with J. Berry King, attorney general, upon the latter's return from Washington.

The Texas house of representatives voted yesterday to reject the offer and to notify the United States supreme court of its action so that a final order, adjudicating the boundary dispute in Texas' favor, might be entered.

Two new developments were anticipated from Texas by Governor Holloway, however. These were: Rejection of the house resolution in the Texas senate, and a counter offer from Texas.

If these fail to materialize, the governor said, he and King will attempt to postpone signing of the supreme court order, now set for February 24, until further negotiations may be had with the Texas legislature.

Japanese Outline Needs in Report

LONDON, Feb. 13. (P) — The Japanese delegation, leaving their first public statement of their naval desires and needs late today, generally agreed with the previous British and American announcements, but, to the surprise of the other delegations, failed to make any mention of their demands on the United States for a 70 per cent heavy cruiser ratio.

The paragraph in the Japanese statement touching directly on the heavy cruiser problem said:

"Japan attaches special importance to eight-inch gun cruisers and desires to maintain minimum strength sufficiently for national defense, taking into consideration the strength held by other powers."

In the statement, the Japanese reiterated their belief that submarines were eminently adapted to defensive uses and were necessary to Japan because of her geographical position.

The Japanese also expressed readiness to agree to a naval holiday in capital ships until 1936.

Prosecution Seen
For Liquor Buyer

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13. (P) — Assistant Secretary Lowman said today that whether the government would prosecute buyers of illicit liquor on charges of violating the national prohibition law would probably depend upon the outcome of the trial of Joseph Patrick Carley, arrested here last night on a charge of "buying a half-pint of gin."

The assistant secretary of the treasury, who has charge of prohibition matters, said if the charge is upheld by the court the government will proceed with future prosecutions according to the interpretation placed upon the Volstead act in that decision.

After Carley was arrested here last night David A. Hart, assistant United States attorney, asserted he believed the purchase was a violation of the section of the Volstead act which says "no one shall manufacture, sell, purchase, transport or prescribe any liquor without first obtaining a permit from the commissioner."

Lowman said the government had never obtained a high court interpretation of this section of the law.
