TWO MEN DIE IN BRADY GUN DUEL

NAVAL POWERS READY TO SIGN HISTORIC PACT

TREATY MAY BE SIGNED WITHIN WEEK

WHIRLWIND SESSION IS HELD TODAY; 5-POWER PACT LIKELY

LONDON, April 14.—One week from tomorrow, baring mishaps, representatives of the five great naval powers will affix their signatures to the historic pact which has evolved from the London naval conference after long weeks of difficult negotiations.

Announcement of this effect was made at a twenty-four minute plenary session of the conference in Queen Anne's drawing room in old St. James's palace this noon. Prime Minister MacDonald officiating as general chairman of the conference.

His announcement was the principal development in the whirlwind session, the first complete meeting of the conference since February 11. It originally was planned to try to get the treaty drawn up so that it could be signed next Thursday, but the prime minister announced that this was impossible of achievement.

As it is it will be a race against time for the drafters to get the document ready for the next meeting Tuesday, so that the Americans may catch the Leviathan immediately afterwards for New York and home.

Agreement Made
The treaty to be signed will be a three-power agreement between Japan, America and Great Britain covering limitation and reduction.

Dr. Evans' counsel had not finished questioning the panel of 24 when the court took its noon recess.

One prospective juror was excused by Judge Towne Young when he admitted his prejudice against the Klan extended to Dr. Evans.

C. B. Lohr, a Catholic, said that he did not have any prejudice.

VENUE CHANGE IS GIVEN IN BRADY TRIAL

CASE IS TRANSFERRED TO DALLAS TODAY BY JUDGE MOORE

AUSTIN, April 14.—The John W. Brady murder case was transferred to Dallas on a change of venue, entered by Judge J. D. Moore today.

Judge Moore sent it to criminal court No. 2, and set it for trial in that court on May 5.

Application Unopposed
Application of the defendant for a change of venue was not opposed by the state. District Attorney Henry H. Brooks told the court he acquiesced in allegations of the defense that a fair and impartial trial could not be had in Travis county, in view of wide publicity given the testimony on the first trial, which ended here Feb. 8.

The jury failed to reach a verdict, one juror holding out for acquittal, nine voting for the death penalty and two for life imprisonment.

Brady, former member of the third Court of Civil Appeals, was indicted for the murder of Miss Lehlia Hightsmith, stenographer for the Supreme Court Commission of Appeals. She was stabbed to death on the night of Nov. 9 in front of her apartment. Brady has been in jail since.

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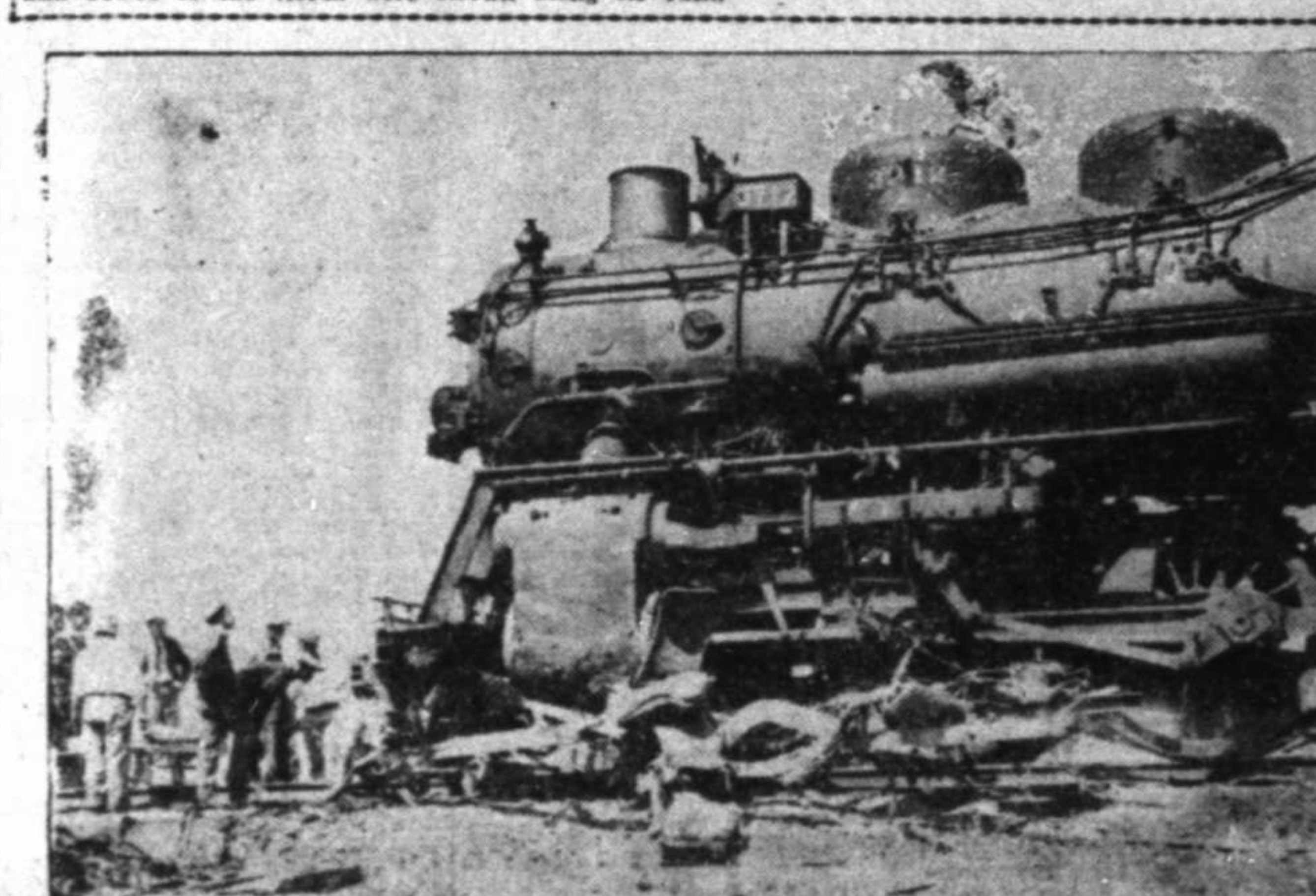
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AS SANTA FE TRAIN STRUCK BUS IN NEW MEXICO FRIDAY

Two-Year-Old Girl Dies After Drinking Kerosene

CLARKSVILLE, April 14.—After shooting and seriously wounding his wife, W. F. Hargett, farmer, turned a pistol on himself here today. He died instantly. A coroner returned a verdict of suicide in his death. No reason for the shootings was learned.

The couple resided at the home of Mrs. Alex Parker on the outskirts of Clarksville. They had been here only a short time, and little time, and little was known of them. Hargett's relatives were said to live in Alabama, and Mrs. Hargett was reported to have a daughter by a former marriage living "somewhere in Texas."

The couple was about 65 years old.

Found in Pool of Blood
Mrs. Parker, after hearing gunshots, rushed into her home and found Mrs. Hargett lying in a pool of blood in a hallway. She told officers Hargett was in a room and threatened her should she come in to the room.

She said she rushed from the house and went to a neighbor for help and when she returned Hargett was found dead with a bullet wound in the head. No hope was held for Mrs. Hargett's recovery.

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NICK WRIGHT, A. LAUGHLIN, ARE VICTIMS

TWO MEN FALL DEAD IN STREET; SLAYING IS BELIEVED CAUSE

(By Associated Press)
BROWNWOOD, April 14.—Nick Wright, 30, and Arthur Laughlin, both single, shot each other to death in a pistol fight on the courthouse square at Brady today.

The shooting started when Wright halted Laughlin as he was ascending stairs in the Commercial National Bank building to consult his lawyer, witnesses said. Both men fell dead at the rear of an automobile parked in the street after exchanging between six or seven shots at close range.

The shooting was believed to have resulted from the slaying of John Wright, brother of Nick Wright, at Brady, about a month ago. Laughlin was under bond in connection with John Wright's death.

The streets around the courthouse were crowded, but none besides the participants in the fight was injured. The rear of the automobile at the rear of which the men fell was riddled with bullets as was the front of several buildings.

Wright, who fell first, was shot in the right arm, the right side and through the heart. Laughlin was shot in the left hand, the face and through the heart. Both died without speaking.

An inquest was ordered for this afternoon.

STEEL MERGER FACES COURTS

OBSTACLES RAISED IN GIANT COMBINE; TO FACE TESTS

YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio, April 14.—The Bethlehem Steel corporation-Youngstown Sheet & Tube merger, which has been the subject of a long and bitter fight for its life in court.

Three main obstacles lie in the path to final consummation of the deal by which Bethlehem seeks to take over the Youngstown company, observers believe. These obstacles, raised by opposition forces headed by Cyrus S. Eaton, Cleveland financier, are:

1. Possibility that the courts may uphold Eaton's contention that stock transferred since the record date should not have been voted.

2. Possibility that allegations of law violation by purchase of votes charged in a formal statement by Eaton—may be found valid, and may be held to taint the whole proceeding with illegality. The same result could be obtained if a charge of conspiracy could be made to stick in the courts.

3. Possibility that the merger contract, may expire while litigation still is in progress, and that a new contract will have to be submitted to another stockholders' meeting.

There are other points of attack, but these three are believed to constitute the main hopes of the opposition.

Eaton has referred most frequently to the first of the three contentions—that stock transferred since the record date should not have been voted. It is on this point that the first legal action of the post-merger period will be taken—an appeal from Judge C. S. Turnbaugh's ruling in dissolving the temporary injunction which restrained the voting of proxies on 90,000 shares sold after March 22.

The appeal will be filed, Eaton attorneys said, in the district court of appeals now sitting in Carrollton, Ohio, after Judge Turnbaugh fixes the amount of an appeal bond.

TOO LATE NOW

Mexican Dies In Jail After Trying To Enter U. S.

EL PASO, April 14 (U.P.)—Juan Hurtado, a Mexican, wanted to live in the United States but immigration quota laws prevented.

One dark night Juan slipped across the Rio Grande, but was caught by immigration patrolmen. He was arrested, placed in jail, awaiting a grand jury indictment which is necessary before extradition is possible. He fell sick and was taken to the city-county hospital.

Thursday the federal grand jury returned an indictment against him.

The warrant was given to the United States marshal for service.

"It can't be served," the marshal said, "he's dead."

Juan had died just at the time the grand jury returned a true bill against him.

Mississippi Solons To Impeach Official

JACKSON, Miss., April 14 (U.P.)—The Mississippi house of representatives early voted to impeach Lester C. Franklin, chairman of the State Tax commission.

The house adopted six of fourteen articles of impeachment brought against Franklin as the outgrowth of an investigation into a \$100,000 anti-trust suit which the state once contemplated against Warren Brothers, Boston paying firm, but never prosecuted.

Franklin now faces trial in the Mississippi senate with a two-thirds vote required to remove him from office.

President Hoover performs the nation's chief executive task of throwing out the first ball at Washington, D. C., today as the American League season gets under way. Washington and Boston beat the gun for the starting of the major league campaigns by one day. Tomorrow the remainder of the big time clubs will swing into action.

The two clubs that open the hostilities this afternoon within the shadow of the national capital are destined to finish in the cellar of the junior circuit. The Red Sox practically have a cinch on last place while the fate of the Senators hinges on the hitting of Goose Goslin, the slugging outfielder of the Washington club. Goslin had a poor season last year but is due to start pounding the boards again for Walter Johnson.

Vic Payne's speed merchants of Texas Tech encounter tough competition Wednesday at Abilene when they trot out to match strides with the Simmons University Cowboys. Coach Fats Cranfill boasts a crew of veteran track and field performers, including the versatile Uncle Joe Smith, hurdler de luxe and weight man par excellence. Recently the Cowhounds contested the T. C. U. Horned Frogs and lost to Cy Leland and his mates by a comparatively close score. The Matadors will leave here Tuesday afternoon.

Tech's decisive triumph over the Canyon Teachers Saturday was a signal victory for James Harley Dallas, captain of the Crimson forces, who hails from Brownfield. Dallas put on one of the prettiest running demonstrations we have ever seen. Under usual conditions a dash specialist does not attempt to run the gruelling quarter mile race, but Dallas did this and more too. After taking first in both the 100 and 220, he entered the 440, getting away to a bad start. On the first straightaway, Dallas began passing his rivals and on the last curve spurred into the lead to breast the tape far in the lead. Later on he stepped another impressive dash, taking another position in Tech's mile relay team which won from the Buffs without any great effort.

Another district meet will be held at Texas Tech this week and league officials are expecting the largest list of contestants in the history of the organization. Coach E. Y. Freeland, director of athletics in District Two, has announced that preliminaries will be run in all running events with the exception of the 880 and mile. Preliminaries will be run off Friday afternoon and the finals will come Saturday.

Competition in the track and field division of the district meet is stronger this year than it has been in several seasons. 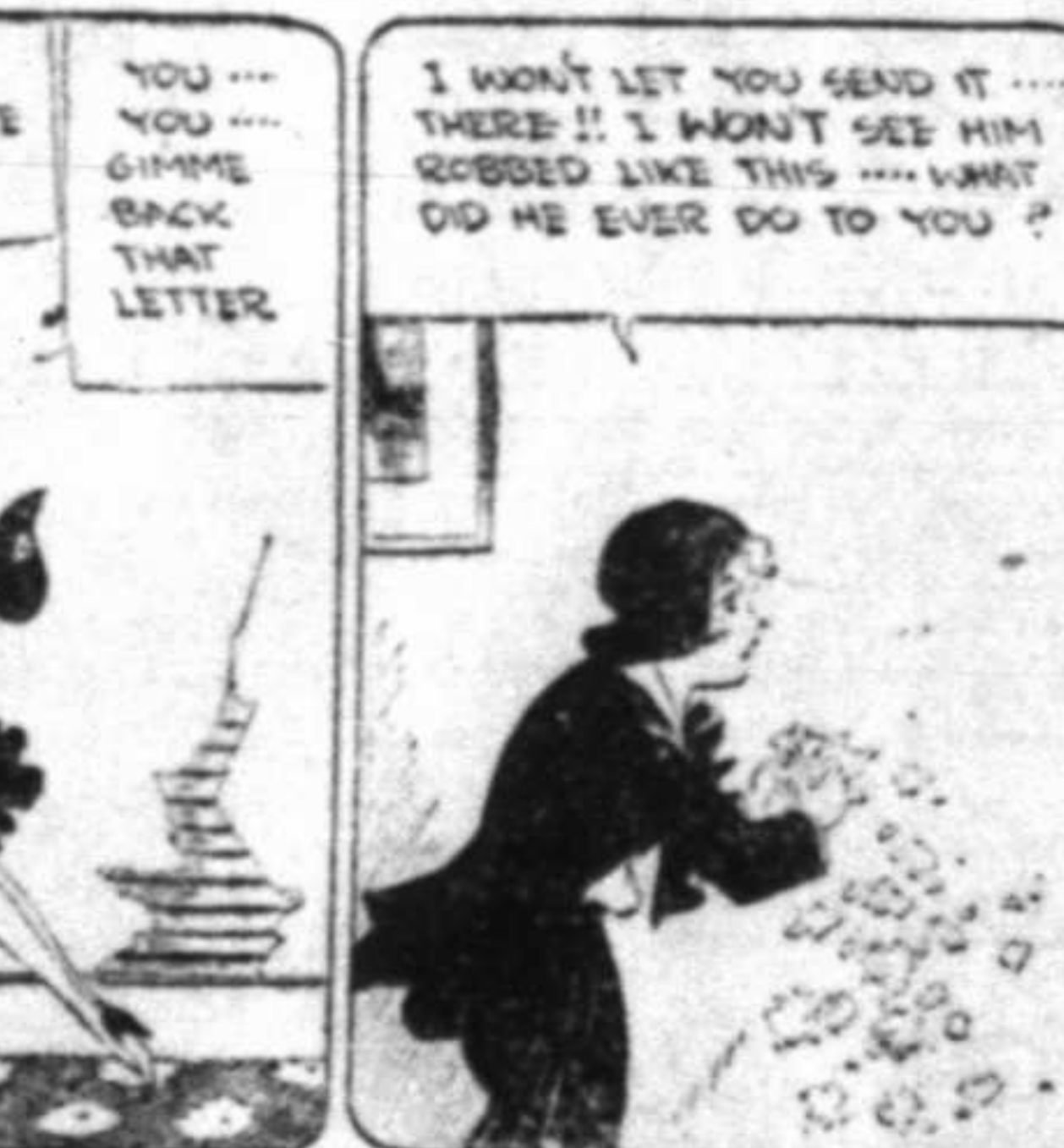

DISAPPOINTING REPORT ON CONSUMPTION IS INFLUENCE

NEW ORLEANS, April 14 (P)—Cotton had an easier opening, partly due to lower cables, but mainly to disappointing March domestic consumption total of 508,576 bales, about 20,000 less than expected. First trades showed losses of 4 points, and the market continued to ease until May dropped to 15.90, July to 15.97 and October to 15.13, or 12 points down from Saturday's close. At the end of the first hour, the market was steady at the decline.

The market ruled very dull all morning. There was very little disposition to trade owing to impending holidays. Prices fluctuated within a few points within the earlier range, although May traded at 15.93, 4 points over earlier highs. At noon the market was quiet with prices at or near the lows.

NEW YORK OPENING HAS DECLINE, 6 TO 12

NEW YORK, April 14 (P)—Cotton opened steady at a decline of 6 to 12 points under selling promoted by relatively easy cables, reports of rains in West Texas and smaller domestic consumption figures for March than anticipated. May eased off to 16.23 and new October to 15.14 under initial offerings supposed to include realizing or liquidation in near months as well as local and commission house selling of later deliveries.

Offerings were comparatively light after early selling had run its course, and the market worked up to 16.31 for May and 15.19 for new October later, or within 4 or 5 points of Saturday's close.

At midday May was selling around 16.27 and new October 15.17 or 5 to 19 points net lower.

MINISTER PLANS TO PREFER CHARGES AGAINST FOUR METHODIST BISHOPS

(By Associated Press)
 WASHINGTON, Georgia, April 14.—The Rev. Rembert G. Smith, pastor of the First Methodist church here, issued a statement today announcing he expects to prefer charges at the Dallas general conference next month against four leading bishops of the church for "political activities in 1928."

He said in part: "It is my present purpose to prefer charges at the general conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, at Dallas in May, against Bishops Cannon, Mozzon, Moore and Duffee for political activities in 1928, in support of candidate Hoover and the republican party, such activities being in violation of the rights of the church as especially of the rights of the members who were democrats."

EXTENSION GIVEN SLATON DELIVERY

SLATON, April 14.—An extension of city mail delivery service here has been authorized by postal authorities at Washington, according to Postmaster James B. Bates. About fifty additional families are included in the extensions, the majority of whom live on West Garza and West Lubbock streets, between 13th and 16th streets.

The new area will begin receiving service next Tuesday. All residences expecting to be served will be re-

quired to erect proper mail receptacles, Postmaster Bates said. Already, about 800 residences are included in the territory served and the entire business section is included. The mail delivery feature went into effect here on January 1, 1929. Initiating this service and the securing of extensions are projects that the Slaton Chamber of Commerce worked on.

MEXICAN AVIATOR PLANS AIR TRIP

MEXICO CITY, April 14.—Colonel Roberto Fierro, aviator today announced the itinerary of his projected flight to South America and Europe, on which he will start during the last half of May. After getting his plane in California, he will take off for San Antonio, Texas, and New York, attempting a non stop flight from New York to Mexico City. He hopes to cover the latter distance in 18 hours. From Mexico City he will leave on a non stop flight to Panama flying thence to Georgetown, British Guiana, and Natal, Brazil. At Natal he will put pontoons on his airplane and install a new motor. Then he will make the jump across the South Atlantic ocean to Dakar, in French West Africa, from Dakar, he will fly to Casablanca, Lisbon, Madrid, Paris, Brussels, Berlin and London.

If all goes well he will ship his

plane from London to Havre and then reassemble it for a flight home to Mexico City.

The letter was written after Representative Tinkham, republican, Massachusetts, announced he would demand the lobby committee investigate the prohibition activities of Bishop Cannon and the Southern Methodist board.

Commenting on the letter, which said both Bishop Cannon and E. L. Crawford, secretary of the board, would be glad to testify to any information desired, Caraway announced they would be given an opportunity to reply to Tinkham if they wished.

Tinkham, an outspoken wet, demanded the lobby committee investigate the Anti-Saloon League and the board of temperance, prohibition and public morals of the Methodist church and that it procure a list of contributions of \$500 or more to the federal council of churches.

He will return before the committee this week to finish his charges against the Anti-Saloon League and to present his evidence against Cannon and the Southern Methodist board.

Christ has assigned to his church the most colossal, Herculean, ponderous task known to heaven or earth. The task is the conquest of the world for Christ.

Our message "The Word." But let us remember that it is an imperial word; a dynamic message; a vital, living, throbbing, lifting, saving message. The word is all we need. The message of a crucified, risen, ascended, glorified Christ is amply sufficient for the world's needs. This message is all the church had in its beginning. Then the church had no creeds, no rituals, no systems, no money, no buildings, no systems, no it had was a message. "The Word" contains the most needed and the most longed for message this world has ever or shall ever hear.

The central theme of the Word to Jesus. His coming into the world was the morning star of hope for lost humanity. The day dawning at the happy anticipation treasured for long centuries—the sunrise of Christianity. No wonder heaven hung out her brightest star over the manger for the one nestled there was to change the whole face of society and literally turn the centuries out of their channel.

I. The Cross

Now if Jesus is central in the Word, what are we to preach about Jesus? Paul said, "We preach Christ crucified, unto the Jews a stumbling block and unto the Greeks foolishness." I Cor. 1:23. The central event in the central theme of "The Word" is the cross of Jesus. We must come to the cross in order to understand him and in order to see God. Someone has said "The history of human guilt culminates in the cross. The purposes of divine love are made intelligible at the cross. The rays of glory emanating from Christ are focused in the cross. Pentecost was the first fruit of the cross. Bethlehem and Nazareth, Galilee and Jerusalem, Tabor and Olivet gleam only in the light of the cross. All the great doctrines of grace revolve around the cross. Our new life with its peace which passeth all understanding and its joy which is rich and ever abiding is born in the cross. The world is stripped of its charm at the cross. Earthly glory fades at the cross. Idle life is satisfied at the cross. Our condemnation is lifted at the cross. Our ruin is removed at the cross. Our slave-chains are snapped at the cross. The bitterness of life are sweetened at the cross. The shadows of death are dispelled at the cross. The heaven of the redeemed is built upon the cross. The darkness of eternity is irradiated at the cross. Hallelujah for the cross.

Christ crucified is the most compelling, irresistible, glorious message ever revealed, heard or heard. There is no other message comparable to it.

The force that made Peter's preaching dynamic on the day of Pentecost was not his learning; it was not his eloquence. This power liberates, emancipates, sets the prisoner free. One Sunday afternoon, after having spoken to 200 state prisoners, a prisoner came up to me. He was a man I had known in his home and work before he became a prisoner. He said, "The governor has signed my pardon papers. My people have come for me and, I am going home to-

spirit? His program will be carried on and on and out and out until the dark, benighted nations shall know him, love him and follow him as king of kings and lord of lords. What an unparalleled privilege and unmatched honor we have in helping carry on this program. We have but one task, "Preach the Word."
