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Reagan ready for trimmer tax cuts

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan, directly challenging House Democratic leaders on a three-year tax cut, is embracing a slimmer version of his original plan with some added features while courting the Southern conservatives who gave him a big budget victory earlier this year.

One of the conservatives, Rep. Kent Hance, D-Texas, agreed Thursday with Rep. Barber B. Conable, R-N.Y., senior tax-writer in the House, to introduce Reagan's latest attempt at a tax compromise.

Reagan, refusing any further compromise with Democratic leaders, said the revised plan "will put us back on the road to a sound economy." Most of the package had been proposed three weeks ago by conservatives and had been embraced by Reagan advisers, if not by the president himself.

It includes a 25 percent cut in personal tax rates over three years, with the first 5 percent taking effect Oct. 1; reductions in the marriage penalty;

liberalization of savings incentives; elimination of estate taxes for all but the wealthiest 2 percent of Americans; faster tax writeoffs for business; and a special tax break for those who own lands on which oil wells are located.

The original Reagan plan called only for a 30 percent cut in personal tax rates over three years and the faster writeoffs, or depreciation, for businesses. The 25 percent personal reduction is \$16 billion smaller.

Reagan had wanted to leave the other features, such as the reduction

in the marriage penalty, to a second tax bill he had planned to submit later in the year.

Vice President George Bush, speaking to Associated Press broadcasters at a White House meeting Thursday, predicted: "We will get a tax bill the president can sign. We're going to need the help of a lot of Democrats."

Flanked by congressional supporters, Reagan made a brief statement outside

the Oval Office on the steps overlooking the Rose Garden and expressed his "special appreciation" to the group, saying it "is united in the belief that together we must rebuild the economy."

House Democratic leaders, who agreed Wednesday to push for a two-year plan with more relief for lower- and middle-income taxpayers, withheld comment on Reagan's latest move.

Treasury Secretary Donald T. Regan told reporters that if the opposition "can come up with something at the last minute that accommodates this package, of course we'll talk." But he added: "It's not likely at this point."

The fate of the new Reagan plan is in the hands of the 190 House Republicans and 63 conservative Democrats who supported Reagan's budget-cutting blueprint earlier this year.

Hance conceded that the new Reagan plan will lose in the House Ways and Means Committee, which is scheduled to begin drafting a tax bill next week. Hance and Conable will make their stand on the House floor, just as backers of a Reagan-endorsed budget package did in April.

Flooding claims two more lives

A 10-year-old Waco boy and an Army sergeant are dead after being trapped in floodwaters fed by yet another day of heavy rains that drenched Central and North Central Texas.

Waco officials said the body of Remigio Pena is believed trapped in a storm sewer after he and a friend were swept into Waco Creek while riding their bicycles.

Assistant Fire Chief C.W. Terry said Thursday that a search for the boy's body in the 13-block long storm sewer pipe which empties into the Brazos River will resume today.

The body of Staff Sgt. Thomas W. Edwards, 30, of Fort Hood, was found south of Killeen Thursday about three miles south of where he tried to cross a flooded road to help some stranded motorists.

Officials said they had to wait for floodwaters to recede before recovering Edwards' body from a tree on Mountain Creek.

A tornado touched down on the outskirts of Galveston early today, tearing the roofs from several homes and an apartment complex and damaging cars. Galveston County authorities said one person was slightly injured by flying glass.

Rising water also caused street flooding throughout Southeast Texas, where a tornado watch was posted early in the day.

Baytown Civil Defense Director Fletcher Hickerson said water had seeped into several homes in the Brownwood section and some downtown businesses.

Hickerson described street flooding as extensive, but said most of the major thoroughfares remained open.

In Houston, police reported waters had risen as high as four feet along many feeder roads. Slick streets also caused several accidents as heavy traffic piled up during the morning rush hour, but no injuries were reported.

As the heavy rains continued to pound the Upper Texas Coast, residents cast a wary eye to the south as the National Weather Service reported a tropical depression had formed about 75 miles off Brownsville in the Gulf of Mexico.

At 6 a.m. today, forecasters at the National Hurricane Center said the poorly defined center of the tropical depression was located about 75 miles east of Corpus Christi.

Forecasters said the weak storm system would probably move to the north and move inland along the upper Texas coast today.

Area rental agencies closed down

Employees of three Midland rental service agencies were arrested and the agencies closed down Tuesday and Wednesday in connection with a County Attorney's Office investigation of deceptive trade practices by the agencies.

Misdemeanor charges have been filed against the owner of Action Rentals, an employee of Rental Services and the manager and an employee of Rental Locators for operating without a license as specified in the Texas Real Estate Licensing Act.

Section H of the act calls for real estate licenses for anyone who "aids in the attempt to locate or obtain for purchase, rent or lease real estate property."

In other words, according to Scott Henderson, assistant county attorney, managers or owners of these services which list apartment and rental home availabilities must have a real estate broker's license, while individual employees must have a real estate salesman's license.

"We're not out to enforce each little part of these laws," Henderson said. "This was selective enforcement to keep the public from being hurt. It was their complaints that prompted

the investigation."

Henderson said the County Attorney's office has received numerous calls about the rental agencies. "We've had lots of complaints," he said. "I mean about 15 to 25 a week. We had been referring them to small claims court, but when it got that high, we had to do something."

The Better Business Bureau of the Permian Basin also received complaints about the agencies. Henderson said the BBB's information also aided investigators.

"Essentially," Henderson explained the problem, "these groups were designed to help people find apartments and there aren't that

many places for rent. People who are looking for apartments and find nothing out of desperation respond to their (rental agencies) ads and pay \$25 to \$35 to find out that nothing's available. They are given listings of apartments, but then they go there and find they (apartment complexes) have no vacancies."

"Sometimes they (agencies) do make occasional placements," Henderson conceded. "But usually, they (individuals) are in no better shape than when they went into the place."

A criminal offense, having no real estate license could bring those convicted a fine of \$100-\$500 and up to a

year in prison for the first violation. Corporations on a first violation invoke a fine of not less than \$1,000 and not more than \$2,000.

Henderson said second-time offenders face fines from \$500 to \$1,000 and not more than two years in prison, while the corporation could be fined anywhere from \$2,000 to \$5,000 for a second offense.

Ordinarily, Henderson said, such offenses could be handled by the Texas Board of Realtors. However, a group with no license does not come under the jurisdiction of TBR. "So we

Begin won't end attacks on Palestinians

JERUSALEM (AP) — Prime Minister Menachem Begin got the backing he wanted from President Anwar Sadat in their summit conference on the Israeli-Syrian missile crisis. But Begin refused the Egyptian's request for an end to Israeli attacks on Palestinians in southern Lebanon.

The two leaders met for six hours Thursday on the southern coast of the Sinai peninsula, which Israel is to return to Egypt by next April. At a joint news conference, Sadat blamed Syrian President Hafez Assad for the Lebanese crisis and said he asked

Begin to allow "ample time" for U.S. envoy Philip C. Habib to work out a peaceful settlement.

Begin said he accepted "the request of my friend President Sadat to give more time to Mr. Philip Habib to try to solve the crisis in Lebanon, caused by the Syrians, by peaceful means."

Sadat said he also asked Begin "to end the raids on the Palestinians" in Lebanon, but the Israeli leader made it clear these would continue. He said the Palestinians were planning "day and night to carry out murderous attacks against our people," and

"what we do is an act of legitimate self-defense in the highest moral sense."

Habib was leaving Washington today for more meetings with Arab and Israeli leaders, beginning in Saudi Arabia.

The crisis he is trying to resolve is

due to the surface-to-air missiles Syria deployed in eastern Lebanon around the Christian city of Zahle, where Syrian soldiers have been battling the Christian Phalange Party's

militia since April 1: Syria moved the Soviet-made SAM-6 missiles there in late April after Israeli planes shot down two Syrian helicopters operating against the Christians.

Sadat called for the withdrawal not only of the missiles but of the 22,000 troops Syria has kept in Lebanon since the 1975-76 civil war there. He charged that Assad's goal was to annex Lebanon and create a "greater Syria."

Assad claims his troops are a peacekeeping army to enforce the armistice that ended the civil war between

the rightist Lebanese Christians and the alliance of leftist Lebanese Muslims and Palestinian guerrillas.

In Beirut, the Lebanese capital, Syrian and Christian forces traded sniper fire Thursday across the Green Line separating the Christian and Moslem sides of the city. Police said six people were wounded by the snipers.

In Moslem West Beirut, two rival Moslem militias fought with guns and rocket grenades, killing two people and wounding three, police said. The cause of the clash was not known.

'81 Legislature burdened with medical bills

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — The Legislature legalized DMSO, provided help for Vietnam veterans exposed to Agent Orange and told dentists they may advertise if they don't claim to be painless.

It also said pharmacists may save consumers money by substituting cheaper generic drugs for name-brand products, but only with an OK from the prescribing physician.

Health care was a leading concern of the regular session and will be a major issue of the special session later this year because lawmakers

failed to renew state regulation of doctors.

All state boards that license health professionals came up for renewal under the Sunset Act, and all were approved except the Board of Medical Examiners. For the first time, laypersons will serve on such agencies as the Board of Nurse Examiners and the Board of Dental Examiners.

The act renewing the dental examiners board resolved a controversy over whether dentists may advertise. The board was accused by some of trying to stifle dental advertising with restrictive rules.

Legislators told the board it could not restrict advertising or competi-

tive bidding except to prohibit false, misleading or deceptive practices.

But they also defined as unprofessional conduct "advertising to perform any dental work without pain or discomfort to the patient."

The Legislature authorized doctors to prescribe dimethyl sulfoxide (DMSO) so long as they tell their patients the U.S. Food and Drug Administration has not found it has therapeutic value.

DMSO was touted by witnesses as useful in treating cancer and arthritis, despite the absence of FDA approval.

Vietnam veterans won help from the state in their fight with the federal

government over whether Agent Orange, a chemical sprayed in Vietnam to kill foliage, caused cancer and birth defects.

State medical schools and the State Health Department were instructed to provide genetic screening, and the department will collect data from doctors who treat Vietnam veterans exposed to Agent Orange.

The attorney general was directed to represent veterans in lawsuits to get their military medical records from the federal government.

Passage of the generic drug bill accomplished what three previous

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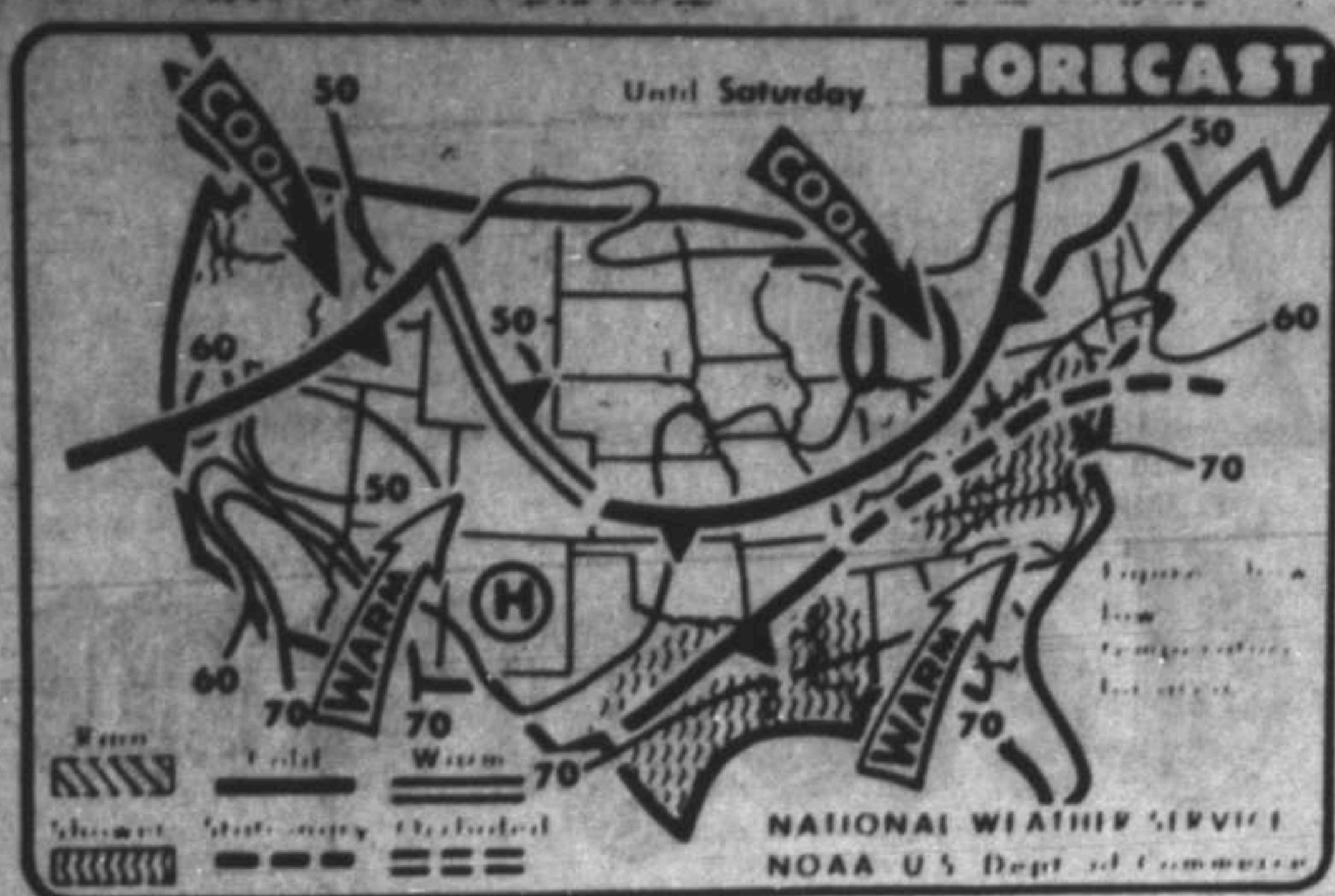

Unemployment up; Energy cost down

WASHINGTON (AP) — The nation's unemployment rate shot up three-tenths of a percentage point to 7.6 percent in May, but the first decline in three years in wholesale energy prices held inflation at the wholesale level to a 0.4 percent increase, the government reported today.

The wholesale-price inflation rate, which translates into an annual rate of 4.6 percent, was the lowest since the 0.4 percent reported last December.

The unemployment rise, which many analysts have been expecting in light of the apparently weakening national economy, was the first since last October and also marked the highest level since that month's 7.6 percent.

The May increase — up from the 7.3 percent that had held for the preceding three months — was the biggest since May of last year, when the recession boosted the unemployment rate up 0.7 percentage point, also to 7.6 percent.

Total employment actually increased about 200,000 last month, ac-

ording to the new Labor Department report released today. But the number of job hopefuls rose even faster, adding 425,000 Americans to the jobless rolls, the report said.

The seasonally adjusted unemployment rates rose from 5.8 percent to 6.3 percent for adult men, from 6.6 percent to 6.8 percent for adult women and from 19.1 percent to 19.5 percent for teenagers.

In a separate report, the Labor Department said finished energy goods at the wholesale level declined 0.5 percent in May, the first decline since February 1978.

Within that category, gasoline prices declined 1.8 percent, and the index for home heating oil decreased 1.2 percent although natural gas prices rose somewhat, the report said.

Prices for consumer food at the wholesale level stayed even in May for the second month in a row, also contributing to the relatively small increase in overall wholesale inflation.

Passenger car prices continued to rise in May, climbing 1.2 percent

after a 1.4 percent gain in April.

And price increases also were recorded for floor coverings, books, soaps and detergents, household furniture and alcoholic beverages.

Capital goods prices rose 0.9 percent, including big jumps for agriculture and construction machinery.

The 0.4 percent overall increase is in the Labor Department's producer price index for finished goods — that is, goods ready for sale. The index is considered a good indicator of future price trends in retail consumer prices.

The unadjusted 1967-based producer price index stood at 268.9 in May, meaning that goods which cost \$10 in 1967 cost \$26.89 in May.

The department's employment report also said the average workweek for employees on private non-agricultural payrolls declined 0.1 hour in May to 35.3 hours, while average hourly earnings rose three cents to \$7.16 — 58 cents above the year-earlier level.

Economists were saying in advance that the May increase in inflation at the wholesale level could be as low as

0.5 or 0.6 percent — the lowest since December's 0.4 percent.

Their optimism was based at least in part on what has become widely known as the worldwide "oil glut," a supply so great that it is holding down prices.

The situation has been created partly by brisk production by Saudi Arabia coupled with obvious conservation efforts in the United States and other industrialized Western nations.

A weakening U.S. economy also lessens inflationary pressures, partly because consumers are cutting back spending.

There has been ample evidence recently that the economy is indeed weakening in its once-robust recovery from last year's recession. The nation's output — as measured by inflation-adjusted gross national product — rose 8.4 percent the first quarter of this year. But numerous government reports have shown various economic indicators flattening out or falling since then.

Chance of rain continues tonight

The spring rains which have moistened the Permian Basin recently have a good chance of continuing tonight and Saturday, according to the National Weather Service.

A 40 percent probability of precipitation is forecast for tonight and a 20 percent for Saturday, as the yearly total of 6.58 inches may be increased.

In the 24-hour period ending at 6 a.m. today, the NWS recorded an official .01 inch, raising the June total to .43 inch.

Temperatures were mild Thursday under mostly cloudy conditions, as the mercury reached only 77 degrees, while dropping to 59 during the night. Neither mark threatened the record extremes for the date, 103 in 1933 and 54 in 1970.

Temperatures are expected to remain mild through Saturday, with a high in the mid-80s. Winds are expected to be variable in direction at 5-10 mph.

gatherings of the Legislature failed to do and resulted from a compromise that satisfied consumers, druggists and doctors.

Generic drug substitution will begin Jan. 1, 1982.

did it," Henderson said.

"We want the managers and the owners," Henderson explained Wednesday. "The corporation may be licensed in other states and doing business here. If we can get the owners, there may be charges dropped against individual employees."

In addition, Henderson said, there were other minor violations that could be added to the charges, such as deceptive advertising.

One other apartment locator service was still under investigation this morning and Henderson said he expected it would be closed down as well.

Neurofibromatosis, whose symptoms include multiple skin tumors, was added to the Crippled Children's program, under which the state pays doctors for services, usually at less than their customary fee.

Lawmakers also passed several other bills of long-term significance to Texans' health.

A package of three bills tightens control over radioactive garbage and provides for creation of a state-owned burial ground for nuclear wastes generated by industry, oil companies, medical research centers, hospitals and atomic power plants.

Doctors urged, almost begged for, passage of the bills because out-of-state disposal sites have begun rejecting waste materials, which are piling up in barrels at medical facilities.

The state also will participate in a federally funded program to clean up toxic waste disposal sites.

Other health-related bills passed by the Legislature would:

— Exempt oxygen tanks, wheelchairs and other "therapeutic appliances" used by the sick and the handicapped from the sales tax.

— Create a statewide rabies program, with the State Health Department empowered to quarantine areas where rabies cases are concentrated. Dog and cat owners could be fined up to \$200 for not having their pets vaccinated.

— Provide fines of \$50 to \$200 for non-handicapped persons who park in places reserved for the handicapped.

— Allow the State Health Department to impose trusteeships on substandard nursing homes as an alternative to closing them, in order "to reduce resident trauma."

Man questioned after detecting surveillance

ATLANTA (AP) — A man who was questioned about the slayings of 28 young blacks was picked up because authorities believed he had detected their surveillance and they were afraid potential evidence would be destroyed, a newspaper reported today.

The man, a 23-year-old black, was questioned for about 12 hours but released early Thursday without charges. Authorities would not say whether he was a suspect in the killings, but at a news conference later he said he believed police still considered him a "prime suspect."

The Atlanta Constitution, quoting unidentified officials close to the investigation, said police decided early this week to drop the "tight surveillance" that had been in effect since May 22 because it was evident the man was aware he was being tailed.

Officials decided they had to move quickly to prevent any potential evidence from being destroyed, the newspaper said.

The Constitution quoted sources as saying some evidence seized at the man's home Wednesday was similar to evidence found on bodies of several

of the victims.

But the newspaper quoted one investigator as saying, "The fibers might be good enough for an arrest, but the police have to worry about a conviction. They have to think of a good defense attorney asking, 'How many blankets of this type have been made, 10,000?'"

Public Safety Commissioner Lee Brown said the man, whom police have not identified, was released because the questioning produced no information "that would result in an arrest."

Atlanta police, meanwhile, continued to look for David Litmon, missing since Tuesday. A general alarm was issued for the 15-year-old black youth, meaning that authorities stepped up patrols and set up roadblocks in the youth's neighborhood.

His disappearance had not been turned over to a special police task force investigating the 28 slayings and the disappearance of one black youth that have occurred since July 1979.

While the man was being questioned at FBI headquarters, authorities armed with a search warrant

went through his home and, according to the man, seized a yellow blanket, purple robe, green carpet fibers, fibers from a bedspread, carpet sweepings and dog hairs.

That material was being analyzed at the state crime lab Thursday.

The man held the news conference on the condition that neither his name nor picture be used. He passed out resumes describing his employment history.</

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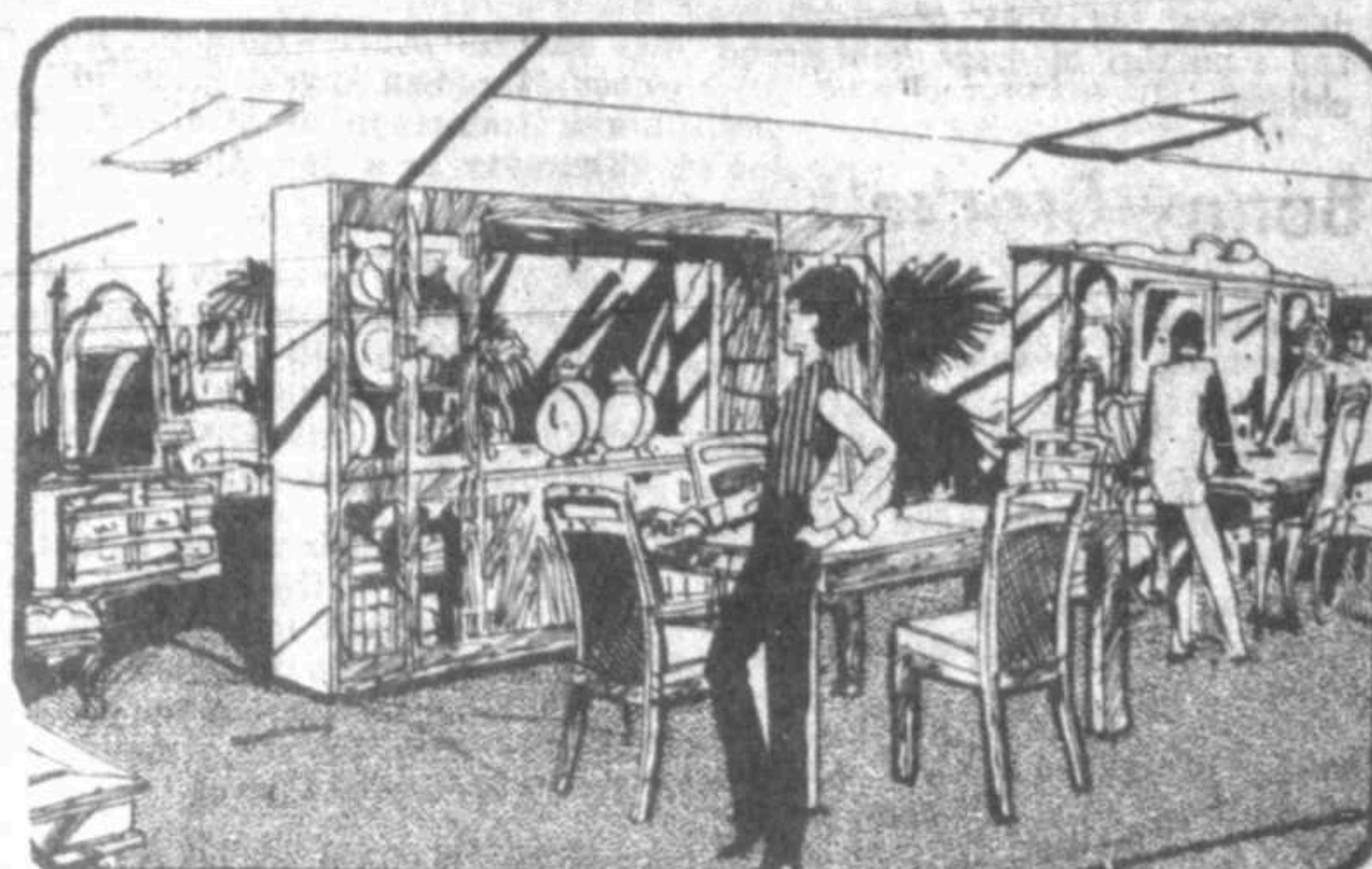

Soviets moving to sober up drunk comrades

MOSCOW (AP) — Fleets of vans marked "Special Medical Aid" patrol the streets of Moscow to pick up drunks and take them to drying-out stations.

On a typical Monday morning, 30 to 40 percent of the country's work force will be too drunk or hung over to put in a good day's work, Soviet studies have shown.

Two drunken railway engineers fell asleep at the throttle and wrecked a freight train last summer. They were sent to jail for negligently damaging state property.

It's an old Russian tradition to finish off a bottle of vodka the first time it's opened, but alcohol abuse today in the Soviet Union has reached alarming proportions and authorities say they intend to do something about it.

AFTER DECADES of largely tolerating drunkenness, and even tacitly encouraging it with subsidized low prices for vodka, fortified wines and other alcoholic beverages, the Soviet government said this week restrictions will be imposed. "Alcoholism is one of our most serious problems for the birth rate, the death rate and the economy of the nation in general," Alexander I. Smirnov of the state planning commission, Gosplan, said at a press conference.

While Smirnov said the government did not intend to reinstate prohibition, "there will be more serious restrictions on the use of alcohol."

Soviet studies show that three-fourths of all violent crimes, two-thirds of serious industrial, traffic and household accidents and nearly half the divorces are attributed to alcohol abuse.

A stepped-up publicity campaign and price hikes for liquor are steps being considered by Soviet authorities, Smirnov said.

Government warnings about alcohol abuse are circulated in schools

and factories. The state-run press gives wide publicity to crimes committed by drunks.

THE GOVERNMENT enforced prohibition for several years following the 1917 Communist Revolution. But the severe restrictions on drinking were relaxed during the 1930s, and alcohol consumption climbed in the harsh years of World War II.

Heavy drinking nowadays reflects a number of problems in Soviet society, including boredom and consumer frustration despite relative prosperity, Soviet experts say.

"Soviet State and Law," a government monthly, recently published a candid round-table discussion in which the lack of consumer goods and poor housing was blamed for contributing to alcohol abuse.

Professor M. I. Piskotin, the magazine's editor, reported that the highest rate of alcohol consumption is in newly settled regions with harsh weather and inadequate housing, such as Siberia.

A.P. Syrov, a lawyer, said the government's anti-alcohol campaign was no match for its "well-organized and mass production and sale of alcoholic beverages."

To encourage moderate drinking, another expert on the panel recommended that more "high quality beer" be made available in restaurants and bars.

Vodka is usually singled out as the major cause of problem-drinking in the Soviet union. But some experts believe that cheap red wine favored by young people and women is as big a menace.

Some analysts trace the rise in problem drinking to the Kremlin's 1955 decision to curtail production of spirits distilled from grain and expand production of fortified wines made from sugar beets.

This potent wine, which costs only \$1.60 a liter, is nicknamed "barmatka," Russian slang for "mumble,"

because of the effect it has on drinkers.

Vodka costs about \$6 per half-liter, relatively expensive for workers whose average wages are \$240 a month.

"The price of alcohol should be properly in relation to income in the country," Smirnov said, hinting that wine prices may be boosted in the near future.

The Soviets have never released country-wide statistics on alcoholism, but periodic reports in the state-run

press make it clear that excessive drinking is a drain on the economy.

When casualties of the bottle are found staggering on the streets or sleeping in public places, they are picked up by the special vans and delivered for sobering-up under medical supervision.

Afterwards, an official letter is sent to the person's place of work. His employer can deliver a verbal reprimand, assess a fine for missing work or even dismiss the delinquent for repeated alcohol abuse.

In another development, the nationwide curfew will be reduced by one hour beginning June 13, Defense Minister Jose Guillermo Garcia announced. The new hours will be from 11 p.m. to 5 a.m. When the curfew was first imposed during a guerrilla offensive in January, it began at 7 p.m.

The army has orders to shoot anyone caught out after curfew. Socorro Juridico, a Roman Catholic legal aid group that keeps track of human rights violations, says at least 857 people have been killed because of the curfew.

Judicial authorities reported Thursday finding 10 more victims of violence around the country, including eight bodies discovered in and around the capital at dawn. Most had been shot, they said.

An estimated 22,000 Salvadorans have been killed in political violence since the U.S.-backed civilian-military junta took power in October 1979.

U.S. soldier kills four

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — An American soldier sprayed five fellow soldiers with bullets from his M-16 rifle today at a firing range, killing four of them and seriously wounding the fifth, the army said.

The announcement from 8th U.S. Army headquarters said the soldiers, all assigned to headquarters company, 2nd Engineer Battalion, were taking M-16 rifle qualification firing at Ingram Range east of Camp Casey, which is 24 miles east of Seoul.

The man who did the shooting, who was not identified, was placed under arrest, an army spokesman said. Names of the dead and wounded soldiers were withheld until their families could be notified.

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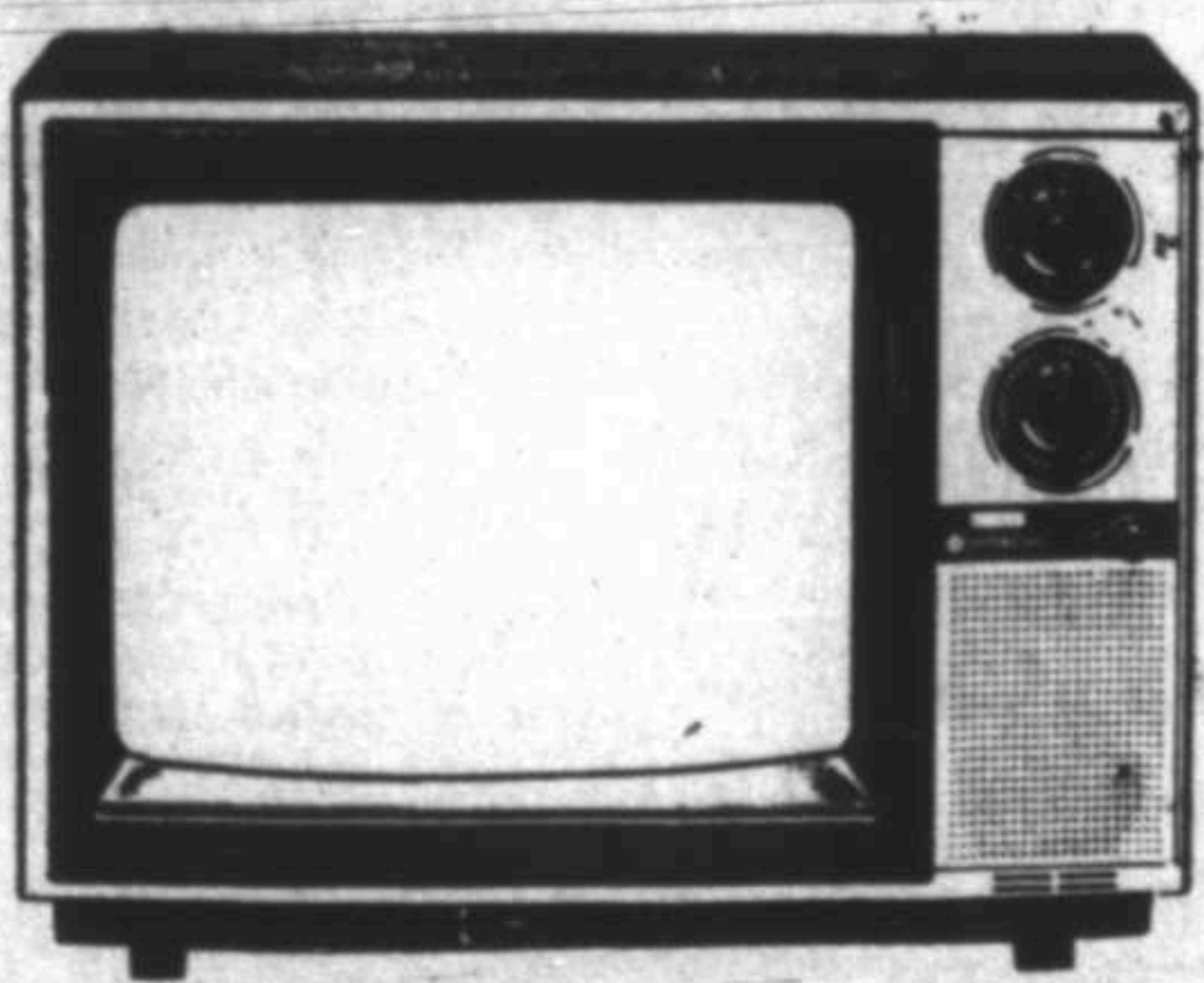

Libya cuts crude oil prices

NEW YORK (AP) — American motorists heartened by recent reports of a glut on the oil market have some more good news — several oil producers reportedly have decided to slash prices, likely meaning lower costs at the gasoline pump.

Wednesday's reported reductions by two members of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries and one American producer came on the heels of a \$4 per barrel cut on Mexican heavy oil the day before and were expected to signal more crude oil price cuts.

Among those that reportedly decided to cut prices Wednesday in the face of falling consumption and a growing oil glut was Libya, a militant OPEC

member previously opposed to any price reductions. Libya has charged \$41 a barrel, the world's highest price, for its best oil.

But Platt's Oilgram Price Reporter, a trade publication, said Wednesday a contract was being offered for Libyan oil at \$36.

Iraq, whose oil exports are growing as its war with Iran slows, shaved 57 cents off its price by reducing pipeline fees, bring per-barrel prices to \$36.93. The reduction was disclosed by a government official in Japan, a major Iraqi customer.

And Standard Oil Co. (Ohio), the largest producer of oil on Alaska's North Slope cut its price by \$2, reducing the price to about \$33 a barrel. There are 42 gallons in a barrel.

The Platt's report surprised some companies that buy oil from Libya, and a senior trader at one company said he doubted it was accurate. Several companies said the reported deal, providing 50,000 barrels a day of oil for the rest of 1981, had not been offered to them.

Libya and other high-priced oil exporters have come under increasing pressure to cut prices — by oil companies and from Saudi Arabia, which charges the least for oil among OPEC members at \$32 a barrel.

Saudi Arabia, which has helped to cause the worldwide oil glut by keeping production high, tried to persuade

OPEC members at a meeting last month in Geneva to set a common price for oil. But Libya and other high-price producers balked.

"We told them (the Libyans) we just couldn't keep buying at that price," said an official for one major company whose contract to buy Libyan oil is expiring. He said Libya had not yet offered to reduce its price.

A Libyan price cut, therefore, could be seen as a way of forcing other major producers to follow suit.

"This probably means we're going to see a round of (price) cuts," said Ernest McClelland, a senior editor at Platt's. He predicted Libya "will be dropping their price to everyone. They'll have to."

Libya has been producing about 1.6 million barrels of oil a day, more than 20 percent below production last year, as its high prices have driven some customers away. The United States gets about 500,000 barrels a day from Libya, the nation's fifth-largest foreign supplier.

Gasoline prices in the United States have been slipping since March as drivers cut back on consumption and supplies mount. The new cuts in crude oil prices "will continue the competitive pressures that have been building up," said Kenneth Haley, an economist with Standard Oil Co. of California. "I think reductions are likely to continue."

HL&P attorney Jack Newman objected vigorously to the admission of the memo as evidence Wednesday, saying intervenor lawyer Robert Hager had laid no legal foundation for its authenticity.

Hearing chairman Charles Bechhoefer admitted the memo subject to authentication through other witnesses.

Intervenor who oppose granting the utility a permit to operate the \$2.7 billion project introduced the memo at a Nuclear Regulatory Commission hearing.

Denver group suing Watt

Committee wants Texas to set new standards

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — An advisory committee wants Texas' top elected officials to consider statewide standards for all new buildings — including homes — and tax breaks to persuade Texans to save energy.

The Advisory Committee on Energy Efficiency also went on record Wednesday as favoring possible legislation — rather than regulatory agency action — to help the poor with rising utility costs.

The committee possibly was thinking of proposed federal budget cuts in recommending state funds for such programs as those that provide money for low-income people to insulate their homes.

Committee members overrode a builder's protest that they were favoring a "Big Brother state" in recommending statewide energy standards for new buildings.

"I don't want you to think the Texas Association of Builders is against saving energy," said C.L. Reeves, Austin. "What we're basically afraid of is being regulated to death."

Reeves said he objected to a "Big Brother state that says 'thou shalt!'"

He said he opposed a single building code "for an outgrowth in Podunk City and a 15-story office building in Houston, Texas. It gets to be a quagmire and an anthill. Every locale should be allowed to adopt its own ordinance."

Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong, committee chairman, said, "I fear that if the committee takes a hands-off approach" cities would seek new industry by advertising they

had no building ordinances. "That's something we would want to avoid," he said.

Reeves cast the lone vote against a recommendation that the Legislature endorse statewide minimum energy standards for buildings. Cities would be required to enforce the standards by local ordinance.

Armstrong said the building recommendation and others will be submitted to the Texas Energy and Natural Resources Advisory Council — TENRAC — on June 24.

A subcommittee chaired by Alan Erwin, former public utility commissioner, recommended encouraging utility companies to submit an analysis of conservation programs along with proposals for rate increases.

The subcommittee also recommended that if the Legislature feels utility rates are too high for "some ratepayers," it should consider setting up social welfare programs to resolve the issue and not depend on rate structures, such as life line rates.

"Utility rate structures should not be used to subsidize the energy costs of low- and fixed-income ratepayers," the subcommittee said.

Erwin suggested energy stamps might be a topic for the Legislature. Susan Dirks, Austin, submitted a minority report to encourage the Public Utility Commission to develop "conservation programs aimed specifically toward the low income residential user."

She and Reeves clashed over her recommendations, including a proposal that utility regulatory agencies consider requiring electric utility companies to investigate spending money on conservation as a possible alternative to building new plants.

"I don't think one person's opinion should represent a mass unless it really does," objected Reeves.

"It is the opinion of many consumers in the state," responded Ms. Dirks, the consumer representative on the committee.

Her motion to submit the minority report to TENRAC was approved by the committee, with only four of the 14 committee members present voting "no."

The committee also recommended that the Legislature give all political subdivisions taxing power to operate transit authorities, regardless of population.

Other advisory committee recommendations included:

— Sales tax exemptions on materials used to improve energy efficiency.

— Temporary property tax exemptions as an incentive to make energy-efficient building improvements.

— State funds for cities to start energy planning and management programs.

— Additional state funds to tell drivers how to save gas in operating their vehicles.

— Law clarifying that an employer is not liable for any injury to an employee carpooling at the employer's request.

— Authorizing local governments to require ordinances that would promote the use of solar energy. Armstrong said Port Arthur already does this.

— State funds for low-income persons to make their homes more energy-efficient.

— A law that would allow any political subdivision or recognized transit authority to participate in the Public Transportation Fund.

The committee said TENRAC should submit to the Legislature report every two years on energy conservation.

Land board approves actions

AUSTIN — The School Land Board has approved an application by Border Exploration Co. to pool for gas 180.41 acres of state land and 523.59 acres of privately owned land in the Howe, South Field in Pecos and Ward counties.

Border plans to drill an Ellenburger test well with a permitted depth of 14,800 feet in the 1801 Amigo-State Unit.

Participation is based on surface acreage and the royalty was set at one-eighth and one-fifth.

No field rules were adopted.

Border also was denied an application to pool 5.66 acres of state land and 688.34 acres of privately owned land in the 17-1 Amigo-State Unit in the same field.

The School Land Board has approved an application by Getty Oil Co. to pool for gas 166.84 acres of state land and 537.16 acres of privately owned land in the Section 12, Block C-26, PSL Unit in the Brunson Ranch Field in Loving County.

Participation is based on surface acreage and royalty was set at one-sixteenth.

Getty is currently completing the well for the proposed unit in the Morrow Formation. The well blew out several months ago after completion in the Atoka Formation.

Current field rules provide for 640-acre proration units, with 10 percent tolerance at 100 percent acreage allocation formula.

Coal degasification field established

TUSCALOOSA, Ala. (AP) — A coal degasification field surrounding the Jim Walter Resources No. 4 mine at Brookwood has been established by the Alabama Oil and Gas Board.

The new field will be developed as a joint venture by Jim Walter Corp. and Enhanced Energy Resources, a Houston, Texas firm.

Kenneth Ansell, vice president of Enhanced Energy Resources, said 29 wells are planned to vent coal seams in and around the mine.

The establishment of the field was approved by the Oil and Gas Board at a Wednesday meeting.

Ansell said the Brookwood project will vent methane gas from the Mary Lee and Blue Creek coal seams. The gas will be collected and delivered by pipeline to a market outlet, he said.

A contract for the initial output of gas has been signed with Southern Natural Gas Corp., Ansell said.

New Mexico counties report finals, projects

Five wildcats, two outposts and three completions have been filed in the New Mexico counties of Chaves, Roosevelt and Eddy.

CHAVES COUNTY

Depco Inc. of Midland has announced a location for a 10,200-foot new field wildcat project in Chaves County, New Mexico, 31 miles northeast of Dexter.

The wildcat is the No. 3 Apache Springs Unit, located 1,980 feet from the north line and 660 feet from the east line of section 10, township 11 south, range 30 east, and five miles southeast of 9,714 Mississippi and 9,305-foot Atoka gas production in the Sand Ranch field.

Also in Chaves County, 11 miles southwest of Elkins, Coronado Exploration Corp. of Lubbock will drill an 8,000-foot new field wildcat.

Designated the No. 1 Aqua Negra, location is 2,310 feet from the south line and 550 feet from the west line of section 8, township 9 south, range 28 east and 3 1/2 miles southwest of 7,200-foot Devonian oil production in the Twin Lakes field.

McClellan Oil Corp. of Roswell has completed an undesignated Abo gas well in Chaves County, 24 miles southwest of Elkins in section 6, township 8 south, range 25 east.

The No. 1 Coyote Draw Federal was potentially to flow 850,000 cubic feet of gas per day through a 1.25 inch orifice with a flowing tubing pressure of 601 pounds per square inch.

Production is from perforations at 3,561 to 3,746 feet.

Yates Petroleum will drill the No. 1 George "QJ" Federal as a 3/4-mile north and slightly east outpost to an undesignated Abo gas area of Chaves County, 22 miles northwest of Elkins.

Location is 660 feet from the north and east lines of section 34, township 6 south, range 25 east. Contract depth is 4,275 feet.

Mesa Petroleum Corp. of Midland will drill the No. 4 Doris-Federal as a 3/4-mile west outpost to an undesignated Abo gas area, 30 miles northwest of Boaz.

Location is 1,980 feet from the south and east lines of section 11, township 5

south, range 24 east. Contract depth is 4,400 feet.

ROOSEVELT COUNTY

Enserch Exploration Inc. of Dallas No. 1 Collier "A" has been completed as a Mississippi confirmation well from perforations at 7,992 to 8,001 feet, nine miles west of Elida in Roosevelt County.

On a 24-hour potential test the well flowed 101 barrels of oil and 40 barrels of water through a 16/64 inch choke.

Flowing tubing pressure was 200 pounds per square inch and the gas-oil ratio was 1188 to 1.

The well is two miles northeast of the same firm's No. 1 Finley, completed earlier this year for a daily pumping gauge of 116 barrels of oil per day from perforations at 8,250 to 8,302 feet.

The well is also 1 1/2 miles south of Pennsylvania production in the Peterson, North field.

EDDY COUNTY

Ray Westall of Loco Hills plans to drill two 3,100-foot wildcats in Eddy County, New Mexico, nine miles southwest of Loco Hills and a half mile north of 2,500-foot Queen-Grayburg production in the Turkey Track field.

The No. 3 Denton Federal is located 1,980 feet from the north and west lines of section 27, township 18 south, range 29 east and the No. 4 Denton Federal is located 660 feet from the south line and 1,980 feet from the west line of section 22, township 18 s, range 29 east.

Yates Petroleum Corp. of Artesia will drill the No. 1 Eastern Shore "QW" Federal, a 10,150-foot undesignated Morrow test in Eddy County, 21 miles southwest of Loco Hills.

Location is 2,663 feet from the south line and 2,075 feet from the east line of section 8, township 19 south, range 27 east and 1 5/8 miles south and slightly west of an undesignated Morrow gas discovery, Coquina Oil Corp. No. 1 Gulf-Federal, finalized March 15, 1974.

Lawbar Petroleum Inc. of Los Angeles will drill the No. 1 Mee, a 2,650-foot wildcat in Eddy County, 10 miles north of Loco Hills.

Location is 660 feet from the north and west lines of section 6, township 16 south, range 30 east and 1 3/4 miles northwest of production in the Henshaw, West (Grayburg oil) field.

dard Oil Co. of New York (now Mobil) drilled five consecutive dry holes onshore.

Drilling could begin before the end of the year, Arco said, in a region in which the two companies have already conducted seismic tests.

Two California oil firms allowed to drill in China

LOS ANGELES — China has signed an agreement with two California-based energy firms to drill for oil and gas, it was announced Thursday, making the first time the Chinese government had agreed to permit an American firm to drill since the Communist government took power in 1949.

Atlantic Richfield Co., Los Angeles, and Santa Fe International Corp., of suburban Alhambra, Calif., said they had reached agreement with China's National Oil and Gas Exploration Development Corp. to explore for oil and gas in an area of the South China Sea and to share any subsequent production.

The last time an American firm actively explored for oil in China was more than 60 years ago, when Stan-
