Walker stated that feelers have been put out to entertainment groups in an effort to put more emphasis on this phase of the celebration. A contract has been signed with Bob Hammonds Shows to furnish the carnival attraction.

The display booths at the City Park, which have proven so popular the past few years, went on sale last week, and the manager reported that sales were moving along at a satisfactory pace. However, he urged all merchants and individuals interested in having a display during the Reunion, to contact him as soon as possible. An attempt will be made to have an exhibit of some kind in each of the 28 spaces.

Special emphasis is also being put on the traditional parade which is held on Wednesday, the first day of the celebration. Local merchants, clubs, and individuals are urged to start now planning their entries. An attempt will be made to have an entry from every business in Hico.

Much interest has already been shown in the 72nd annual celebration and requests for dates have been received from as far away as California.

Social Security Officer Will Visit Hico Tuesday

A representative of the Social Security Administration will be in Hico Tuesday, June 10th at 10 a.m. to assist local residents in filing applications for disability, retirement, and survivors insurance payments.

Following are a list of questions and answers which might be helpful to persons eligible for social security claims:

Question: I have been receiving social security old age insurance benefits for two years. I have been supporting my son, age 40, all of his life because of his mental condition which dates from his childhood. Can I receive additional benefits for my son.

Answer: Yes, provided your son's disability started before age 18 and is so severe that he cannot do any substantial work toward an income for himself. Contact the social security representative who will be in Hico next Tuesday for full information to apply for the benefits for your son.

Handicap No Problem to Former Iredell Girl

(Editor's Note: The following story concerning a former Iredell girl is being reproduced in the interest of readers in that area. The subject, Miss Brenda Robertson, formerly made her home with her grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Ernest H. Bryant of Iredell and attended school there. She is the daughter of Mrs. Evia Reynolds.

The unusual angle about the story is the fact that Brenda was born with only a portion of one hand, having one finger and a thumb on the right hand. The young lady is to be congratulated for her accomplishments, considering the handicap which she overcame. The story follows, and is reproduced from the Lake Worth High School paper.)

"Did you know Lake Worth had a girl in its band that can play four instruments and is good in all four? This girl is Brenda Robertson, a senior.

"Brenda sent in an application last November for the all-girl state band. Then the first of February she received a letter accepting her. It is a great honor to be chosen for the all-girl band. Three girls are to be chosen from the best girl high school band players from four states—Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Louisiana.

"The meeting started Feb. 28 and lasted through March 1, at TWU in Denton. There were two bands, the red and the white, each consisting of 155 members. The music for the white band, of which Brenda was a member, was three times harder than the red band's music. The conductor for the white band was Lowell Little, director of band and chorus at TWU. The white band's music was recorded by a Dallas recording company. Brenda was presented with an arm patch for her jacket for being one of the girls chosen for the band.

"Brenda came to Lake Worth in 1951. She started playing a cornet in the fifth grade, but was told to give it up because of her hands. She then changed to trombone.

"Two months after she came to Lake Worth, she was promoted to the senior band.

"In the summer of 1954 Brenda started teaching herself baritone.

In 1955 she changed from trombone to baritone in the Bullfrog band.

"After the stage band was organized, Brenda was placed in it playing trombone.

"She has been elected secretary and treasurer of the band for the last two years. She was also chosen by Mr. L. B. Keith, director, as student conductor for the last two years.

"Her junior and senior year Brenda has made second baritone in the all-regional band. She has won all-state trombone, two medals for solos played at Jacksboro and Denton. She has also played tuba in the concert band.

"In summer band practice she began playing cornet, when she had been told she would never be able to play one because of her hands. It just proves 'where there is a will there's a way.'

IT HAPPENED HERE OR NEAR—

Like a Tree—A Man Must Grow Downward, Outward & Upward

Simon Peter admonishes his readers to grow. Paul in like manner gives that advice. Not in so many words, but just the same Jesus taught His disciples to grow. I sat on our patio and looked at a fine specimen of Arizona Cypress that grows in our yard. It gave me the idea for this week's column. About ten years ago I set a small bit of stem and roots in the yard. In these years it has grown to be a tree of fine proportions and a thing of beauty. As I gazed upon it Simon Peter's words came to me: "Grow."

Let's have a look at this tree standing there some twenty feet in height, with a spread of about the same, that is, twenty feet. At its base is a fine stem perhaps eight inches in diameter. The Arizona Cypress is a member of the pine family, and perhaps had its name applied to it in Arizona because it grows so generally in that state and so luxuriantly.

Let's see how this tree grew. First, it grew downward. It put down roots deep in the earth, and in a wide arc about its base. It had to get elements from the soil with which to increase its size and height. Unless that soil beneath

it were there it never would have grown up.

Then it grew upward. Not only soil underneath a tree is essential to growth, but the air and the sunshine and the winds have a vital part in a tree's growth. If anything cut off that tree's light and air and sunshine and winds, no growth would occur. It would surely die and not even leave a sign of its having been there.

A third essential of growth occurred: It grew outward. The breadth of that tree is about equal to its height, and I dare say its rootage is about the same diameter. Those long graceful limbs are not for looks merely. They give balance and essential qualities to the whole tree that it would certainly lack if it were just a straight upward stem. Thus may we see that a tree must grow downward, upward and outward. Sounds like a sermon. And it well may be as any thoughtful soul can see.

Now back to Simon Peter's appealing words to all disciples of the Lord: "But grow." And how shall we grow? Let's get some ideas from the Scriptures. The Apostle Paul speaks of being rooted and grounded. Whereas the Arizona Cypress is rooted and

grounded in the soil of our yard, the person who would grow must be rooted and grounded in the truth. No soul can grow unless it is rooted and grounded in the truth. If one would grow in Christian graces, he must be rooted and grounded in the truth revealed in the Bible.

Just as the tree must grow upward and get essential elements above the earth, so must a soul grow upward into an experience of spiritual things, the things of God. Man must get his head above material matters and breathe the invigorating things of the spiritual realm if he would grow. In plain words, a soul to grow in the real sense must reach upward toward heaven and let God touch his spirit and imbue him with eternal principles.

A tree must grow outward. And so a man must grow outward if he is to really attain stature. His interests must extend to his fellowman and to the uplift of the world, and the wider his outreach of interest and effort, the greater his growth in character and the elements that make men to be really great and to be remembered by their fellowmen.

And that's our parable for this week.

AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE—

Under President's Proposal, Who Will Be Secretary of Def.?

Washington, D. C.—The Department of Defense and all the military services under it, sometimes appear as a centipede with a thousand legs all going in different directions.

How important is the President's proposal to reorganize the Defense Department? Perhaps the importance can not altogether be measured in dollars and cents. Even more important is the ability to make decisions when immediate action may mean the difference between destruction and survival.

In dollars and cents, our National Security Program now consumes more than 60c of every tax dollar. Of the approximate \$72 billion budget request, \$46 billion goes to national security. This is more than one-half of all the taxes collected by the Federal Government from all sources. Until some of the unnecessary activities of all the military services are curtailed, the bill to the taxpayer will continue to be high. As long as we continue to prepare to fight a war of the nature of World War II, and at the same time prepare for a nuclear war of the future, there is little hope that something less than two-thirds of all the income of the Government will not go into defense.

The President's proposal to reorganize the Defense Department places emphasis on decision-making authority and authority to carry out those decisions when made.

Under the President's proposal, the Secretary of Defense is to make the great strategic decisions and direct the control of their application. Once a decision is made, it is to be carried out without votes or objections on down the line. Under present law and practice, the Secretary of Defense does not have full authority to enforce a decision upon the separate services.

But how are these great decisions to be made? Secretaries of Defense come and go. They are selected from a political list. They may come from banking, law, from professional politics, from the automobile business or the soap business. How does a man who has spent his life in some other endeavor go into the huge Pentagon organization of approximately 39,000 (not including the Armed Forces), hang up his hat, and make proper decisions?

The only way he could possibly know what to do would be to hear the problems explained by qualified experts. If he can not hear and understand the thousands upon thousands of issues involved, he merely endorses the decision of some subordinate.

It seems the very real question devolves down to this proposition: Does the proposed reform of our military establishment make it more or less likely that the Secretary of Defense and the President of the United States will hear the great problems argued out thoroughly? Will it enable him to come to a definite and authoritative conclusion with the power of enforcement all the way

down the line, resulting in action to carry out that decision?

The Congress will soon have before us a Bill to enact into Law these reforms. The controversy centers on the amount of authority which should be given one man—the Secretary of Defense. Some are saying that to place such authority in one man is embracing the old Prussian type of militarism. The bill voted out of the Armed Services Committee does not give the Defense Secretary the authority requested by the President, but is supposed to give him much of the authority needed to carry out direction.

The proposition that something needs to be done is clear enough. The fact remains that this proposal is not going to appreciably reduce the cost of our military establishment. This will only be done when we finally decide that the next war will not be fought with rifles and bayonets, with huge aircraft carriers like sitting ducks, and all the frills now attached to every branch of the military.

AUTOMOBILE ACCIDENT RULES SHOULD BE MEMORIZED

Vacation time is near. Soon millions of people will be driving about the country, and automobile accidents will occur with increasing frequency. What should a person do when involved in an accident?

At such times it is hard to keep your wits about you and know just what to do. It is therefore a good idea to plan in advance just what you would do in event of a smash-up. Here are a few simple rules that every driver should commit to memory:

1. Stop! Failure to stop can result in serious criminal consequences.

2. Render Aid. If anyone is injured: (1) Render first aid. (2) Stop bleeding. (3) Call a doctor or ambulance or both. (4) Do not move an injured person in any way that could possibly add to his injury.

3. Protect the Scene from Further Damage. You may be liable for damages to approaching drivers, unless they are properly warned. If the highway is obstructed at night, have someone turn his headlights beams on the wrecked vehicles.

4. Call on Officer. Police, Highway Patrolmen, Sheriffs and their deputies are trained accident investigators whose testimony may

be invaluable in establishing your civil claim for damages.

5. Gather Information. . . Write it Down. Don't trust your memory. Don't guess—be specific. Measure skid marks. Step off distances. Be sure to obtain names and addresses of witnesses. You are required by law to exhibit your driver's license to the other driver—and he must do the same.

6. Be Careful What You Say. Even if you feel you probably are to blame, it is best to make no admission. You may learn later that the other driver was equally at fault, or more so. Emotional comments can be misconstrued by others, or may be misquoted. What ever you say, make it factual.

7. See Your Doctor if there is the slightest chance you may be injured. Serious injuries do not always result in immediate pain or bloodshed.

8. Consult Your Lawyer Immediately. The sooner your lawyer is brought into the matter, the better he can advise you and protect your rights. He can obtain statements from the witnesses while their memories are fresh and do many other things to insure that the true facts are preserved. Get your lawyer's advice before giving any interview or statements to investigators or adjusters for the other side.

9. Inform Your Insurance Company Promptly. Failure to do so may void your policy.

10. Report the Accident to the Department of Public Safety. This is required by law if there is any injury, death, or total damages exceed \$25.00.

An official accident report form may be procured from the Police, Sheriff's Dept., Highway Patrol, or State Dept. of Public Safety.

Game Warden Reports

After this long holiday we have just finished I think what we need is another holiday to rest up so we will be ready for the week end. I think by now most of us know who went fishing that they have caught more fish at other times, but outside of the sunburn, chigger bites and tick bites, most of us probably had a good time.

When I speak of the fish not cooperating like they should I don't want this to be misconstrued to where you would get the idea that they didn't bite at all. I have always felt that out of one hundred fishermen ten fishermen will catch fish every time they go and fifteen will catch a few and the other seventy-five—they just don't have much luck at all. This proves then that those ten fishermen know when to fish, where to fish, and how to fish, and not only do they know how, where and when but they also are hard fishermen and by that I mean they fish hard having a plug either coming in or going out of the water the entire time they are out there fishing.

These types are very serious and are out there for one purpose and that is to catch fish, and believe it or not, they do. Now the other fifteen fishermen that I mention are not professionals by any means but they have one great virtue in common, and that is patience. This type of fishermen finds him

a likely spot where they should be, he ties up his boat and fishes and he will stay there until the bottom of his metal boat rots away or until he catches four or five fish, and if he stays that long he will eventually catch about that many.

Now this other group that is left is the ulcer-type of fisherman. He has to do everything in a big rush, even fishing. He will rush home from work, rush to his favorite fishing waters and spends his entire week end rushing from one likely spot to the other, and when he is all through he will still rush home without any fish.

Now if you are in this latter class it is not my intention to be little you by any means but I might draw your attention to the fact that regardless of how well a lake might be stocked it might not be the fault of the fish that you aren't catching them, but that it could be your own mistake that is causing this condition. I also believe that if you will spend just a little more of your leisure time in studying the habits of fish and reading a little more about them your luck will change. You know that regardless of what your projects may be you only get out of it what you put into it, and this certainly applies to fishing.

So until this time next week remember—contribute to your sport, study your sport, and last, but not least, enjoy your sport.

SNACKS CAN CONTRIBUTE TO FOOD NEEDS

Snacks are becoming a national pastime. It seems. Since this is true, it is important that nutritional needs, as well as appetite desires, be considered. And now that school is out snack time takes on added importance.

Snacks or party refreshments for children should be geared to their needs. Crisp, crunchy fruits and vegetables, or cold meats cut in attractive shapes will fill the craving for food and add some much-needed nutrients to the young folks' diets.

Teenagers, who are very often lacking in calcium, will find a flavored milk drink welcome for a mid-morning or mid-afternoon snack. Try serving frosty eggnogs with a side dish of cheese dips.

Snacks form an important part of the food intake of the older folks, too. Although the older person no longer needs food for growth, he needs good repair and maintenance foods. Calorie needs are lower, but the need for protein and calcium still remain high—fruit nabobs, tiny meat sandwiches, or meat soups will be especially welcome during a mid-evening TV program. Below I have included some recipes that could be used for this snack time.

HOME FURNISHINGS TIPS FOR HOT WEATHER

With the thermometer climbing into the 90's now we know that another Texas summer is here. To keep cool during this hot weather, avoid overcrowding your rooms with extra furniture and "necessaries." Leave space for family living. A small room should not

have many bulky pieces of furniture.

Warm colors—red, orange and yellow—tend to make you feel warm. If you have colorful scatter rugs, or other furnishings in warm colors that aren't necessary, store them until cooler weather gets here.

Too, you might like to slip-cover your furniture in cool colors, with inexpensive, cool materials such as denim and sail cloth.

USE THAT FOOD YOU FREEZE

The more turnover of frozen foods in your home freezer, the more economical its operation will be. Certain fixed costs of freezer operation are large compared with other costs involved in freezing. Therefore, the more foods used and replaced, the less the cost of storing each pound.

DOES THIS MEAN YOU?

If you're a man over 50, chances are you need more foods rich in vitamin C than your wife. Probably both of you need more protein and iron and less fat than most people get in their daily diet.

These are some of the conclusions indicated by a University of California study of nutrition.

Senior citizens would do well to eat plenty of fruits, cottage cheese, vegetables, skim milk, lean meats and lean fish. Foods important for vitamin C include oranges, grapefruit, strawberries, tomatoes, salad greens, broccoli and raw cabbage.

RECIPES

FLAVORED MILK DRINKS
Add these to your snack file and include them more often in the daily diet.

Spice milk: one-eighth teaspoon cinnamon, one-eighth teaspoon nutmeg and one-half teaspoon sugar stirred into 1 cup chilled milk.

Maple Milk: one-eighth teaspoon maple flavoring and 1 teaspoon sugar stirred into one cup chilled milk.

Peppermint Milk Shake: Add crushed peppermint stick candy to chilled milk. Place in refrigerator until candy is completely dissolved. Add more milk if desired. Pour into serving glass and top with scoop of ice cream and shaved sweet chocolate.

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By E. R. LAWRENCE

About two or three years BD
(before the drouth) Hamilton
County grew quite a sizeable acre-
age of vetch for seed production.
Not only for seed but for winter
pasture. As the fall moisture went,
so did the vetch crop until seed
production was almost nothing.

Last fall C. I. Thomas, down on
the river on Route 1, Jonesboro,
planted about 20 acres of vetch
and oats. Some good winter graz-
ing was received from the crop
and it is now seeding out.

C. I. fertilized most of the field
with chicken manure but a spot
about an acre was not covered.
Where no manure was applied,
there is hardly any vetch or oats.

Grain harvest is getting under
way this week almost in full blast.
Some good crops will be harvest-
ed and some not so good. Self-

propelled combines are gaining in
popularity each year and it's not
going to be too long until most
of the grain will be harvested with
self-propelled jobs.

The local ASC office has the
loan rates for oats and barley
which are 69 cents per bushel for
oats and \$1.03 for barley. See the
office if you are interested in a
loan on your grains.

Wheat growers of the county
have been mailed out some infor-
mation on the wheat referendum
which is to be Friday, June 20.
Voting will be done at the local
ASC office only. Polls will open
at 7:00 and close at 8 p.m. More
information will be mailed from
the local office on this so watch
your mail for it.

The grain storage situation is
apt to be tight in some sections
of the state this year and it might
be that way here in Hamilton
County. If you are planning to
store your grain through some
commercial concern, arrangements
should be made as soon as possible.

If you would like to store the
grain on your place but don't have
adequate facilities and would like
to build them, there are loans
available for this. The FHA has
a loan with cheap interest that
might be had. This loan is for the
construction of storage bins or the
repair of old ones. The ASC office
also has a loan but it will cover
only 80 per cent of the cost of con-
struction.

If you would like to construct
storage facilities on your farm and
need a loan you might contact the
FHA office, if you don't make the
loan through one of the local
banks.

It is time to start looking over
your evergreens around the house
for bag worms. The worms hatch
in the late spring or early summer
and the larvae feed on the foliage
of ornamental plants. The
young worm spins a silken sack

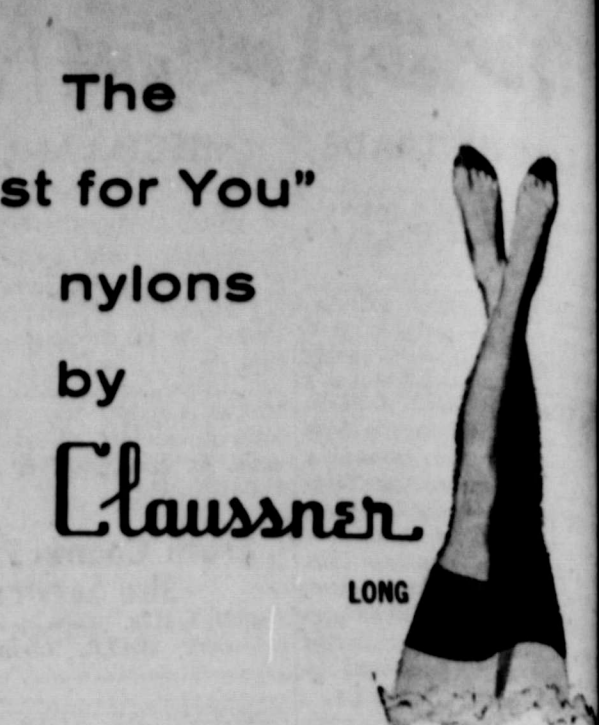
