

INQUIRY INTO PRICES OF MEAT

GOVERNMENT SAID TO BE PLANNING INVESTIGATION OF PACKERIES

GRAND JURY EMPANELLED

Department of Justice May Look Into Reason For Constantly Advancing Prices

By Associated Press. Washington, D. C., June 1.—The high prices of meat probably will be investigated soon by the federal government. An inquiry to supplement the previous investigation into the packing house business is being planned by the department of justice. The soaring prices of meat and the question whether the country's meat supply may be controlled in violation of the Sherman law has been called to the attention of the department by individuals and by the bill of Representative Edwards of Georgia.

Since the packers were acquitted of the criminal charge the department of justice has been interested with the meat situation. It is intimated that a federal grand jury recently empaneled in Chicago might investigate some charges regarding testimony of certain witnesses in the criminal suit. Already some indirect intimation has reached the government that the packers might take some voluntary action to dissolve the National Packing Company or to bring it into harmony with the law. Whatever may be done in this regard it is believed certain Attorney General Wickham will direct a comprehensive investigation to find if the varying prices of meat are due to violations of the antitrust law. While the attention of the department has been drawn to the recent increased prices of coal, no inquiry is contemplated at this time.

The retail situation in both coal and beef must be dealt with by the states, according to officials. In many localities there are probably combinations of retail dealers which keep up prices of these necessities of life. As there allied interests operate entirely locally no question of restraint of interstate trade can be raised and the federal government is powerless to intervene.

Reports that Congress might investigate the high cost of beef were received with welcome at the Department of Justice. Mr. Wickham is willing that Congress should undertake the task as an aid to the government in ascertaining the causes of the advancing prices.

15-YEAR SENTENCE IS GIVEN CLAUDE ALLEN

Jury Finds Him Guilty of Second Degree Murder in Connection With Hillville Affair

Wytheville, Va., June 1.—After deliberating two and one-half hours the jury in the case of Claude Swanson Allen this afternoon found the young man guilty of second degree murder for killing Judge Thornton J. Masie and recommended punishment at fifteen years in the state prison. Sentence was suspended in order that the prisoner may testify in the other cases growing out of the shooting up of Carroll court house, on March 4 of this year, when five persons met death at the hands of the Allen clan.

The verdict rendered today does not mean that Claude Allen has escaped the electric chair. Four other indictments against him are pending, on any one of which it is possible that he may be found guilty of first degree murder and the prosecution taking advantage of this surprise defense when it announced it would next go into the trial of Claude for the murder of Sheriff Louis Webb. The defense raised objections to this and the objection will be argued and passed upon when Monday reconvenes July 1.

Judge Stables gave instruction for the summoning of a venire to report July 2 and remarked that he did not believe a jury could be secured from Wythe county. The prosecution moved that a venire be summoned from another county, the defense objected. After witnesses had been questioned as to the possibility of getting another jury here the court ordered a venire of 100 summoned from Washington county. The case went to the jury at 2:30 and the ball stood nine for second degree murder, two for first degree murder and one for manslaughter. Before adjournment, Judge Stables ordered the prisoners taken to the Roanoke prison and five of them left tonight under guard. Bird Marion did not accompany them, being released today on \$1000 bond.

INAUGURATION CHANGE CAUSES HOUSE DEBATE

Henry's Constitutional Amendment Provokes Long and Extended Argument in Congress

C., June 1.—The proposition to change the inauguration day from March 4 to the last Thursday in April, advanced by Representative Henry of Texas, caused considerable trouble and consumed six hours in the House today. At the conclusion of a confused debate that ended in a parliamentary tangle, the House adjourned, leaving the Henry resolution, which provides for a constitutional amendment, still under consideration. The amendment would fix the date for convening of Congress as the second Tuesday of January in each year.

Although but few members were on the floor the fight over Henry's resolution was spirited. Minority Leader Mann and Representative Sherley of Kentucky, Democrat, conducted a filibuster consuming most of the day, with lengthy roll calls.

BIPLANE FALLS WITH PARMALEE

WELL KNOWN AVIATOR MEETS DEATH IN ACCIDENT IN NORTHWEST

AFFECTIVE SCENE SHOWN

Young Woman, Sister of Parmalee's Partner, Guards His Body After Fall

By Associated Press. North Yakima, Wash., June 1.—Aviator Phil O. Parmalee was killed while attempting a flight in an aviation exhibit today. A gust of wind caused the tail of his aeroplane to shift and overturned the machine. He had been up about three minutes on his first flight and had traveled almost three miles at 400 feet elevation. His biplane plunged to earth, crushing the aviator beneath it.

Parmalee smiled and waved his hand to thousands of spectators as he took the air this afternoon in the midst of a gusty wind. Three minutes later he was dead. The exact cause of his death probably never will be known. As he rose before the grandstand, Parmalee swung west over Yakima river, rising to a height of about 400 feet and his speed increased to almost a mile a minute. It was noticed that his planes dipped and rolled and seemed to be controlled with difficulty. When about two miles from the grounds he swung in a wide circle for the return journey. As he swung around to the wind, the plane checked its course, flutered like a wounded bird and plunged to the ground.

It is thought that a sudden gust from one of the draws that notch the sides of the valley struck the machine and rendered the elevating planes unmanageable. The body of the aviator was dragged from beneath the machine by farmers who were working in the orchard where the machine fell. His skull was fractured and he must have died instantly. Among the first to reach the place of the fall was Miss C. E. Turpin, a sister of J. Clifford Turpin, Parmalee's partner in aviation. She hysterically threw her arms about Parmalee insisting he was not dead. Even after the body had been examined by physicians, she believed that a spark of life remained and demanded that efforts be made to resuscitate him.

"You remember how it was with Hamlet," she repeated over and over again. She refused to leave the body until it was necessary to turn it over to the undertaker. Before he prepared for his last flight, Parmalee was urged to postpone the exhibition until the wind quieted, but he laughed at the persistent and fatal misfortune that have dogged aviators for the past week and climbed to his seat. The biplane was so crushed that mechanics were unable to trace the cause of the fall.

Parmalee was regarded as the safest and most successful financial ally of the Wright aviators. He was said to have earned \$297,000 for the Wright brothers during 1911 and he quit their employ only a few weeks ago. He was born at St. Johns, Mich., 25 years ago.

In Chicago last August he established a world's altitude record of 10,600 feet but that record was broken the next day by Lincoln Beachey. Marriage licenses were issued Friday to C. H. Short of Stamford, and Annie L. Graham of this city, and J. W. Hussey of Elgin, Ill., and Lee May of Wichita Falls.

OHIO TO CHANGE HER CONSTITUTION

FORTY-TWO AMENDMENTS PROPOSED BY CONVENTION WHICH HAS JUST CLOSED

TO LIMIT COURTS' POWER

Woman's Suffrage and Direct Legislation, Are Also To Be Submitted To Voters

Columbus, O., June 1.—Forty-two proposed constitutional amendments are ready to present to voters for ratification at a special election Sept. 3 is the completed work of the Ohio constitutional convention which adjourned today. Matters ranging from the initiative and referendum and woman's suffrage to the regulating of bill board advertising were provided in the amendments. The most radical change planned in the limiting of the power of the supreme court. The name is changed to "court of appeals" and the appellate court is made the court of last resort in most cases.

Following a long campaign during which women crowded the convention hall galleries and tons of literature were distributed over the state, the convention voted to remove the word "male" in the bill of rights in the present constitution; thereby giving votes to women.

FORMER ASSOCIATES OF DARROW WILL TESTIFY

Job Harriman and Lecompte Davis Summoned as Witnesses For State Trial

By Associated Press. Los Angeles, Cal., June 1.—Job Harriman and Lecompte Davis, both of whom were associated with Clarence S. Darrow in the trial of the McNamara brothers, will be witnesses for the prosecution in the trial of Darrow for alleged jury-bribing. Harriman was served with a subpoena after the testimony of Bert Franklin, former confidential agent for the McNamara defense attorneys.

Franklin testified that Darrow had said he would get from Harriman the \$4000 which was to be used for the alleged bribery of George N. Lockwood. Mr. Harriman said today that the summons did not come as a surprise to him and that he was as ready to testify for the state as for the defense. He added that he had told the grand jury which returned the Darrow indictment all he knew regarding the alleged secret operations of the McNamara defense.

Lecompte Davis, Franklin testified yesterday, made a proposition to pay him \$8000 in the event of his pleading guilty to the charge of bribery and refusal to implicate his employers. Attorney Frank W. Fowler who was mentioned in Franklin's testimony yesterday as the man who was said by A. K. Kruger, a McNamara spokesman, to have offered him a bribe, was present in court this morning and asserted he never had been connected with the McNamara defense. There was no session of the trial today owing to the death last night of Judge Rufus McNeill, associated with the defense and formerly associated with Mr. Darrow in the McNamara case. The trial will be resumed Monday afternoon.

SEES NO EARLY ENDING OF TROUBLE IN MEXICO

American Consul at Chihuahua Takes Pessimistic View of Situation There

By Associated Press. Washington, D. C., June 1.—Suspense as to the outcome of the struggle between federalists and revolutionists may be prolonged for some weeks in the opinion of American Consul Letcher at Chihuahua, rebel headquarters. He informed the State Department today that the railroad and bridges between federal outposts and the city of Chihuahua, were so damaged that any serious battle could not be expected in the immediate future.

It appears that Mr. Letcher anticipated the instructions of the State Department to disengage with Orozco measures for the protection of foreigners in the country covered by the revolutionary movement. He reported to the department that he had interviewed Orozco who had promised safe conduct to Americans desiring to leave Chihuahua.

The train which arrived at Juarez last night with several hundred foreign refugees was allowed to run by the rebels upon the request of the foreign representatives in Chihuahua, headed by the American and German consuls.

ROOSEVELT LINE OF BATTLE DRAWN

CONFERENCE HELD AND FIGHT WILL BE WELL ORGANIZED BEFORE CONVENTION

WILL WATCH CONTESTS

Wishes of Roosevelt Delegates With Regard to Chairmanship to Be Consulted

By Associated Press. Oyster Bay, June 1.—The Roosevelt line of battle for the Republican national convention was formed today. At a council of war on Sagamore hill there was mapped out a campaign which it is hoped will result in the capture of the convention. The first step is to be the organization of the Roosevelt forces throughout the country.

It is planned to send to Chicago a week or so in advance of the convention an executive committee from every State in which Roosevelt delegates have been elected in which there is a contest. By this method it is expected to mobilize and drill an organization which will act as a unit on every matter which comes before the convention. As a part of this plan, the Roosevelt delegates in every part of the country will be canvassed as to their views on the temporary chairmanship that a harmonious agreement may be reached.

Although Col. Roosevelt had decided to oppose the selection of Senator Root and had asked Gov. Hadley to be his candidate, he indicated today that he would waive his objections if it seemed wiser to his supporters to reserve their fire for the more important contests. Whether Col. Roosevelt would go to Chicago to lead the fight in person is now an open question. He virtually served notice on his opponents that he might go under certain circumstances. He said he did not intend to go "unless some grave emergency, in the shape of unfair treatment should arise."

Two other points were agreed upon. Every effort is to be made to have the hearing before the National committee to settle contests held publicly. The Roosevelt supporters will fight to secure what they consider an equitable distribution of convention tickets. Roosevelt said that he had been told that the action of the committee was with the intention of using ten or twelve thousand shouters who will try by noise to overawe the delegates.

In regard to the temporary chairmanship, Roosevelt said "I want to hear from the delegates throughout the country before committing myself finally."

"Utterly Absurd," Says New.

By Associated Press. Chicago, Ill., June 1.—After hearing that part of Col. Roosevelt's statement referring to the protest against distribution of tickets, Col. Harry S. New tonight said:

"To anyone who knows anything about the capacity of the coliseum, such a statement is utterly absurd. The total seating capacity of the house, including delegates, spectators, platform officers and the band, is 11,188. The seats occupy nearly all the available space. The galleries have seats for only 3200 persons. There isn't standing room for even a small part of such a number of people as the colonel mentioned."

MENTAL SUASION PREVENTS RAIN

FARMERS SAY THEY DIDN'T WANT WET WEATHER NOW, ANYHOW

MANY POINTS ARE VISITED

Telegrams Received Here Thanking Wichitans For Waking Jupiter Up

Wichita Falls rain-makers Saturday afternoon gave up all hope that the explosion of dynamite Friday would bring rain and if it comes they will attribute it entirely to Providence. Twenty-four hours had elapsed at 6 o'clock Saturday evening since the last stick of dynamite had been fired by Col. Orth's battery on Anderson hill and not so much as a drop of rain had fallen in Wichita Falls.

Friday night the rain-makers hoped were radiant when the sky became overcast with clouds and many Wichitans went to bed expecting to be awakened by the "patter of raindrops" that never fell. One man has been found who says that a mist was falling at 3:30 a. m. Saturday, but daylight left no trace of it.

Some of the rain-makers attribute the failure of their efforts to mental influence. While the dynamite was being fired farmers who drove through the firing line on their way to town to secure binder twine when they learned the purpose of the bombardment, objected and told the rain-makers that a rain was not wanted. "Wheat is alright now," they said, "rain can't help it and a heavy rain might interfere with harvest. Corn don't need rain, neither does cotton. What we want is cool weather until after our wheat and oats are cut and then you can bring us rain."

The rain-makers kept on with the dynamiting but the farmers got their desire nevertheless. The temperature took a decided drop Saturday morning and Saturday was an ideal harvest day. The promoters of the experiment are not convinced by their failure this time to bring rain, that the explosion of dynamite will not cause precipitation and believe that if there had been three or four times as many volunteers to explode the dynamite and the quantity had been greater rain would have fallen Friday morning when clouds overspread the sky in the southwest when the firing of the explosive was in progress.

While rain did not fall in Wichita Falls a good rain fell Saturday morning at Decatur and rains fell at Van Alstyne, Plano and many other points in North Texas.

Early in the morning telegrams began to pour into Wichita Falls from all over Texas and even from St. Louis and New York to learn the result of Friday's experiment and if Wichita Falls had gotten a good soaking rain all of the powder factories in the country would have had to work overtime to supply dynamite for rain-making.

Among the telegrams received were the following:

"Wichita State Bank, Wichita Falls, Texas: Congratulations. Big rain here. No more dynamite needed.—First Guaranty State Bank, Plano, Texas."

"Chamber of Commerce, Wichita Falls, Texas: Thanks for dynamiting. Fine rain falling here now. Wish you same good luck.—Business Men's Club, Van Alstyne, Texas."

Of course there are skeptics who are convinced that rain couldn't be precipitated by firing dynamite for a solid week. Some of these also were convinced last year that rain would not fall after a prayer meeting for that purpose was held here. Still others believe that it would be a good plan to pray and dynamite at the same time and to be certain that the farmers are in a receptive attitude.

TO DEDICATE COLUMBUS STATUETTE NEXT SATURDAY.

By Associated Press. Washington, D. C., June 1.—Sixty thousand men will march in a pageant after the unveiling of the National memorial to Christopher Columbus here June 8. Legions of Knights of Columbus from all over the United States, Canada, Mexico, Cuba and the Philippines will participate. The statue at the gate of the capitol, the Union Station plaza, was erected with a \$100,000 appropriation. Secretary Knox will preside at the unveiling and President Taft and other notables will attend.

REPORTED TO HAVE LEFT \$15,000,000 TO CHARITY.

POLE VAULT RECORD IS BROKEN BY YALE MAN

University of Pennsylvania Wins Track Meet with Cornell Second, Michigan Third

By Associated Press. Philadelphia, Pa., June 1.—The University of Pennsylvania won the intercollegiate track and field championship on Franklin field this afternoon with 28 points. Cornell was second, Michigan third, Columbia fourth and Harvard fifth. A new pole vault record was made by R. S. Gardner of Yale, who cleared the bar at 13 feet, one inch, on his second trial. The former world's record was twelve feet 10 7/8 inches. Both Gardner and Babcock of Columbia had broken the college record by going over the bar at twelve feet, 9 1/2 inches. When they put the bar up to the world's record height which Gardner cleared, Babcock tried three times but failed.

CUBAN TROUBLE GROWING WORSE

SKIRMISHING BETWEEN REBELS AND FEDERAL FORCES IS REPORTED

URGENT APPEAL FOR AID

Many Rumors in Circulation as to Negroes' Activities—Gunboats Still Ready

By Associated Press. Havana, June 1.—Government troops have been in touch with the rebel band in the orient for two days. Skirmishing has been constant but without important results. The report from Santiago of severe fighting near Palma Sorriano proves erroneous. The dispatch describing the bombardment of a rebel detachment in which 127 men and 18 women were said to have been killed to have referred to an engagement near the same place Thursday of which only confused accounts have been received.

The government has not yet issued any official report of this action. The government apparently is making every effort to protect American property. There is no confirmation of a report which reached here this morning of the capture of two Americans, Wheeler and Hollister near Deaguiri. Recruiting of the home guard continues actively. Reports are still current of a negro uprising in Havana and Sina del Rio provinces but there is apparently no serious foundation for such a report.

An appeal for help directed to the state department by large American interests at El Cobre, Cuba, caused the hasty departure of the gunboat Paducah today from Deaguiri to Santiago twenty-five miles away. This is the nearest point by water to El Cobre and if Captain Davis, upon his arrival at Santiago finds it necessary, he will send a marine guard to El Cobre, 10 miles distant. There was a rumor to day of disturbed conditions near Manzanillo, west of Santiago, but no naval vessel will be sent there unless confirmation is received. The state department is concerned at the pending closure of the mines at Deaguiri which would throw 1500 men out of work.

The unemployed might easily be drawn into the revolution. An equal number of skilled workmen might be attached in Cuba's steel works if the ore miners quit. The Cuban Minister, Senor Rivero, today secured permission at Washington for the purchase of 10,000 rifles to arm the volunteer corps now being organized in Cuba by the government, and to enable the plantation owners to arm employees and organize guards. The request will probably be granted and the war department will have an opportunity to advantageously dispose of a lot of discarded Krag-Jorgensen rifles. Some of these rifles were sent to Cuba two years ago.

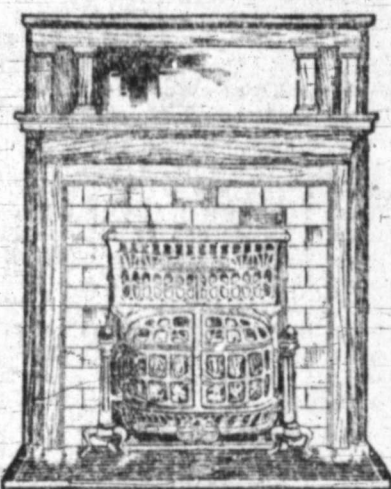

Federal Victory Reported.

By Associated Press. Havana, June 1.—The government today received a dispatch from Santiago stating that it had just been reported there that the columns under Gen. Yallaz and Col. Valliant, struck the rebels yesterday morning. The fighting continued into the evening. The artillery wrought havoc among the insurgents. The losses and scenes of the battle are not given.

Paducah Withdraws.

By Associated Press. Havana, June 1.—Interior Secretary Laredo Bru announced today that the American gunboat Paducah withdrew last night from Periqui, anchoring off the coast where she was this morning.

No Marines Landed.

By Associated Press. Santiago, June 1.—The U. S. Gunboat Paducah remained off Periqui today but did not land marines. Firing continued all night around the lines where the government has a strong detachment. A rural sergeant was killed. The miners are quitting their work and the mines will probably close tomorrow. American Consul Holliday, went to Periqui to investigate the situation, which is considered critical. It is reported that Hollister Wheeler, an American, who owns a ranch near there, has been captured and held for ransom. The gunboat Nashville at Nipe Bay has not landed marines.

The Spanish-American Iron Company has asked for protection for its property, valued at six million dollars, and located at Seltun, near Nipe Bay. Louis Gomez, who is charged with being an important conspirator in the revolt, was arrested while attempting to embark on a steamer for Santo Domingo. Other important arrests were expected, it is said.

DISAFFECTION AMONG OROZCO'S SOLDIERS

Rebel General Orders All Saloons Closed at Chihuahua—Situation one of Extreme Tension

By Associated Press. Juarez, June 1.—Disaffection among Orozco's soldiers today further increased the alarm of residents of Chihuahua and scores of them left for the American border on a Mexican Northwestern train. Fearing disturbances among his men Orozco today ordered all saloons closed. There are 1500 rebels in Chihuahua and mutiny is believed in prospect. The cities and towns which may bear the brunt of any central attack are being rapidly depopulated. American and foreign residents who arrived tonight described the situation in Chihuahua as one of extreme tension, which may break out into rioting. Bachimba, 40 miles south of here, is being fortified against the advances of Huerta's forces but it is feared the government commander may abandon the hazardous advance northward in a path of burned bridges and send his cavalry around to each side of Chihuahua. That would route the rebel army behind Bochima as well as in Chihuahua. Most of the Mexicans in Chihuahua are prepared to leave.

ZEPLIN'S NEW AIR CRAFT A SUCCESS

Maintains Flight Over Ten Hours at Average Speed of 43 Miles an Hour

By Associated Press. Hamburg, Germany, June 1.—The new military airship Zeppelin III reached here today covering the distance from Friedrichshaven in 10 hours and 25 minutes. Count Zeppelin piloted the dirigible on its maiden voyage, making an average speed of about 43 miles an hour. It easily exceeded the specifications which called for 38 miles per hour.

THE BUFORT RETURNS FROM RELIEF TRIP

U. S. Transport Picked up 150 Refugees On West Mexican Coast—Rebels in Complete Possession

By Associated Press. San Francisco, Cal., June 1.—Back from her relief trip to the west Mexican coast the transport Bufort today landed her 160 refugees. A committee of citizens was at the wharf to care for the strangers. W. S. Hunt, manager of a plantation of 10,000 acres in the Culiclan Valley, who was one of the refugees, said the rebels hold everything from the California boundary to Guatemala except at Mazatlan, Salina Cruz, Manzanillo and others. With 17 Americans Hunt repulsed the rebel forces at Culiclan ranch for many days. The place is now the site of a rebel camp of 300 men.

The Bufort brought news that a Socialist colony of 173 persons at Las Noches in Sinaloa is resisting the insurgents. This colony was founded in 1879 with the assistance of the late Marion Crawford, the novelist.

CAPTURE OF PARRAL BY FEDERALS IS REPORTED

Reoccupation of Several Other Points on Line of March to Chihuahua. Also Reported

Mexico City, June 1.—Parral was taken yesterday by Gen. Ragaga, according to a presidential bulletin tonight. It is said federal soldiers were received with rejoicing by the citizens. Detachments under Gen. Rivera are said to have occupied alienated Santa Rosalita, San Mar-go and other points along the line of march to Chihuahua and to have established order. Preparations for continuing the march north have been made.

The GREATEST PLAY I EVER SAW

AS TOLD TO Hush S. Fullerton
By JACK LELIVELT.

Utility Player Washington Club, Who Is Rated One of the Wisest and Most Thorough Students of the Game.

The greatest play that I recall, and the one I think was the greatest I ever saw, was made this season in an extra inning game between the Chicago and Washington clubs. Not only that, but it was the greatest game of ball I ever saw—with six plays in it that might any one be called the greatest, according to the way a man looks at it. First, Bodie caught a home run while running straight out nearly to the center-field fence; then Walker caught a fly off one ear while turning a back somersault; Lord made two great one-handed stops on the line back of third, and Taunehill grabbed two line drives and started double plays. Every one seemed to be trying to pull off the greatest stunts of his life in that game, and it was one steady succession of wonderful plays, with White and Johnson pitching magnificent ball. It is as if you took a dozen great games of ball and crowded the most sensational parts of each into twelve innings.

Then Conroy and McBride made the play that I think was the best and fastest that I ever saw. McConnell was on second base with one out when Callahan whipped a fast hit

right down between third and short, a hit that seemed certain to go through to left field without being touched. The ball was hit hard and was bounding rapidly when McBride went back and out as hard as he could, shoveling down his glove hand, scooped the ball and snapped it straight into Conroy's hands on top of third base. The play was so quickly made that McConnell saw he was out, and by a quick stop he tried to delay being touched and jockeyed around between the bases to let Callahan reach second. He played it beautifully, but he never had a chance. McBride jumped back into the line, and before McConnell could even get a good start back Conroy whipped the ball to McBride and McConnell was touched out before he had moved five feet. So rapidly was the play made that as soon as McBride touched McConnell he shot down to second so far ahead he called that Cal was able to turn and get back to first base ahead of the throw. The play must have been made in less than four seconds from the time the ball was hit, as Callahan came down to first fast and wasn't fifteen feet around the base when he was forced to slide to get back ahead of the throw to Elberfeld.

At it turned out the play saved the game for Washington as neither team scored in nine innings, and Washington beat them out one to nothing in the twelfth. If Callahan had even reached second on the play Chicago would have won, as McIntyre followed up the play with a base hit that would have scored the runner from second easily.

READY FOR REPUBLICAN NATIONAL CONVENTION

Extensive Preparations Under Way at Chicago—Supply of Press Seats Is Exhausted

Chicago, Ill., June 1.—With the arrival of several members of the National committee among them Pearl White of Louisiana in addition to the active heads of the sub-committee on arrangements, the preliminaries to the Republican National convention took a business-like appearance late today.

Secretary William Heyward announced that a total of 223 contracts for seats had been filed. The arrangements for the work of the committee in hearing contests had been practically completed tonight. The hearing has been set for June 6.

Col. Harry S. New, chairman of the sub-committee on arrangements said it would be physically impossible to take care of the newspapers which have indicated a desire to be accommodated with seats for their representatives.

"Originally there were 434 press seats," said Col. New, "that number has been increased to 534, and that is the final limit. The assignments have all been made and there will be no additions or changes."

LARGE REVENUE RECEIPTS CUT DEFICIT

Uncle Sam Will Almost Break Even—Ends Fiscal Year Only \$5,462,000 In the Red

By Associated Press.
Washington, D. C., June 1.—Large customs and internal revenue receipts cut the deficit of the federal government nearly in half during May. The deficit for the fiscal year is now only \$5,462,000, compared with \$12,530,000 a month ago. This the lowest deficit for several months. A year ago the deficit amounted to \$6,000,000. It is expected the deficit will be entirely wiped out in June by corporation tax payments and the treasury receive a surplus of several million dollars. Total May receipts were \$58,370,000, while disbursements were \$52,908,000. Customs brought \$25,580,000 and internal revenue \$23,000,000.

The treasury vaults hold one billion thirty million dollars in gold coin and bullion for the redemption of notes and certificates. The cash drawer of the government, that is the working balance of the treasury, contains \$61,305,000. The total balance in the general fund is \$126,998,000 and total treasury cash is \$1,316,995,000.

The total circulation of national bank notes is \$179,861,000. This is pledged by 7387 banks.

MAY CUT OFF PRESIDENT'S TRAVELING APPROPRIATION

Washington, D. C., June 1.—Some of the Democrats on the appropriations committee are insisting on the elimination of the \$25,000 for the president's traveling expenses from the sundry civil appropriation bill to be reported next week. The subcommittee favors elimination and the full committee will vote Monday and later it will be the vehicle of a lively fight in the house.

POLICE IN CLASH WITH STRIKING WAITERS

Strong Arm Men Fire Revolvers in Effort to Hold Back Strikers

By Associated Press. New York, June 1.—Police of the strong arm squad tonight used revolvers to keep back 300 hotel strikers and sympathizers who assumed a threatening attitude after nine of their number had been arrested near the Hotel Savoy on charges of disorderly conduct. In the battle Detective Foy was knocked down and fallen on the 3rd of June A. D. 1912, then and there to answer a petition filed in said court on the 12th day of April A. D. 1912 in a suit numbered on the docket of said court No. 4263, wherein W. M. Priddy is plaintiff, and J. C. Ziegler, A. Zundel, Thos. J. Lee, Lucian Minor, Sylvian Blum, R. E. After the first clash with the strong arm men, the strikers attempted to storm the Hotel Haviland. Three policemen armed with Revolvers stood in the door and threatened to kill the first who entered. The first riot occurred in one of the most exclusive residence sections and within a stone's throw of Cornelius Vanderbilt's home. Traffic was stopped for nearly half an hour.

With more than two score of leading hotels and cafes affected by the strike, the hotel men's association today refused to arbitrate. More than 700 employees in twelve hotels and cafes joined the strike today and tonight. Many girls, college boys, negroes and recruits from boarding houses and cheap restaurants were pressed into service and employers continued firm in their determination to break the strike.

At the dinner hour tonight, 65 men marched out of Delmonico's after several hundred diners had been served with the first course. Union employees at Bretton Hall, the Kaiser house, the Hotel Nederland, the Hotel Savoy and the Colozis also quit while the dining rooms were crowded. The strikers declared that if necessary every waiter in the city, about 12,000 in all, will be called out.

INDUSTRIAL WORKERS MAKE TROUBLE IN JAIL

By Associated Press. San Diego, Cal., June 1.—A demonstration of Industrial Workers of the World in the city jail and a report that 45 members of the organization had reached San Juan Capistrano, 52 miles from the city with the intention of continuing to San Diego to resume the campaign against the street speaking ordinance were today's developments here. The Workers in the jail, numbering 23, formed what they termed a human battleship or battering ram. Taking off their shoes they rushed upon the principal door and tried to break it down. Chief Wilson and his men entered the room while the men were confined and stripped and searched them and found them armed with billes made from broom handles, and with small weapons constructed from steel bands, which had bound plumbing pipe to the walls.

These prisoners were immediately placed in solitary confinement. Those who had been in jail for several weeks charged with conspiracy to break the street speaking law, were released today after pleading guilty. Sentence was suspended.
