Witnesses Looking Forward to Meeting

Tidwell explained he has instituted a personal program of his own with the family to tighten the family arrangement. "It involves doing things together such as Bible discussion at the breakfast table, personal study during the day and attendance at congregational meetings three nights a week. That way, Bible emphasis cannot become lost in the many things we do together throughout the week."

Tidwell felt that if more families could see the impact that large Christian conventions have for their youth as well as themselves, most family situations would not mushroom into bigger problems and disrupt the family circle.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON SEPTEMBER 7, 1965. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 44 proposing an Amendment to Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide for an increase in the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members; to fix the membership in the House of Representatives at 150 members; to require apportionment of the Senate according to population; and to delete the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read respectively as follows:

"Section 2. The Senate shall consist of 39 members. The House of Representatives shall consist of 150 members.

"Section 25. The state shall be divided into Senatorial Districts of contiguous territory according to population, as nearly as possible.

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling legislation in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature.

"This Amendment shall be-

come effective upon its adoption."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the 7th day of September, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

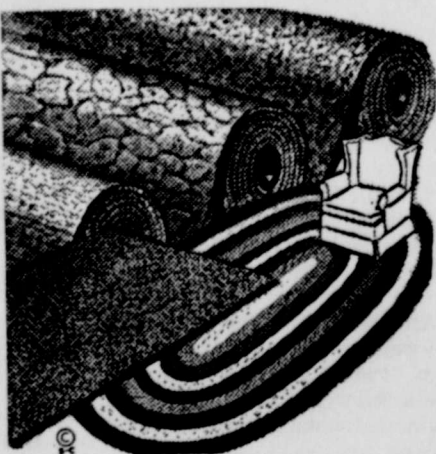

Church Installs Fallout Shelter

It's Integral Part Of New Building

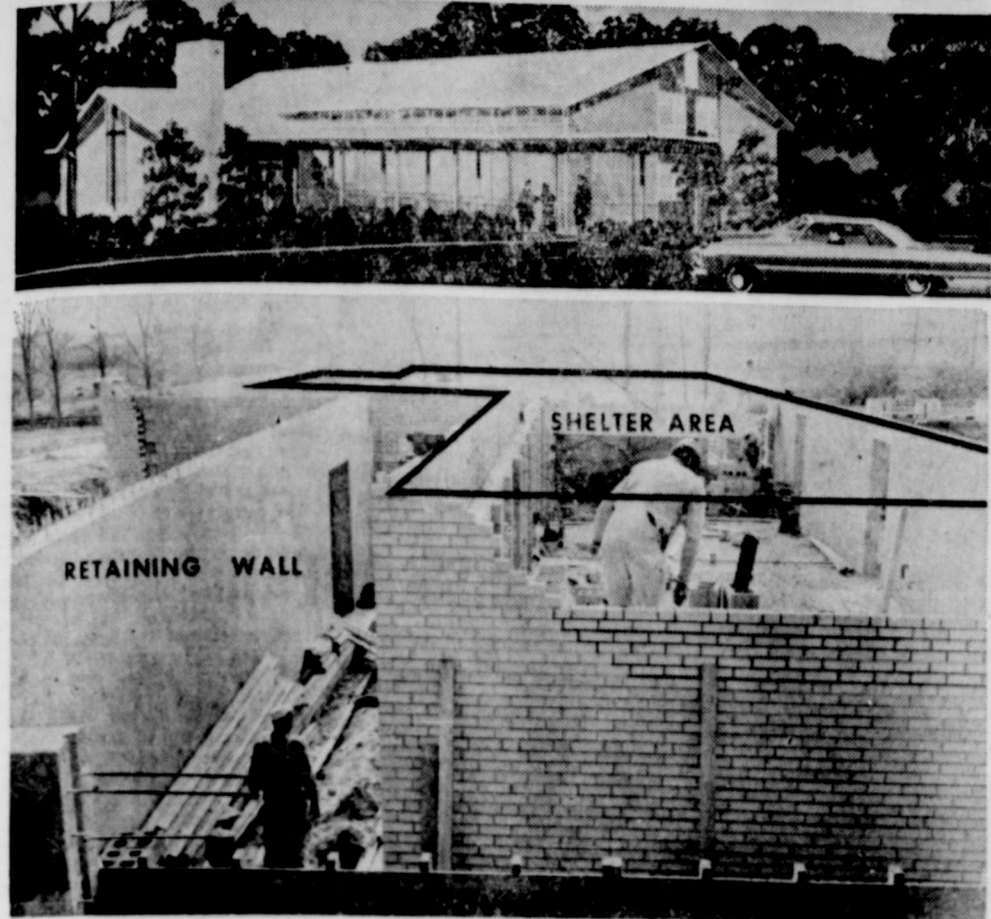
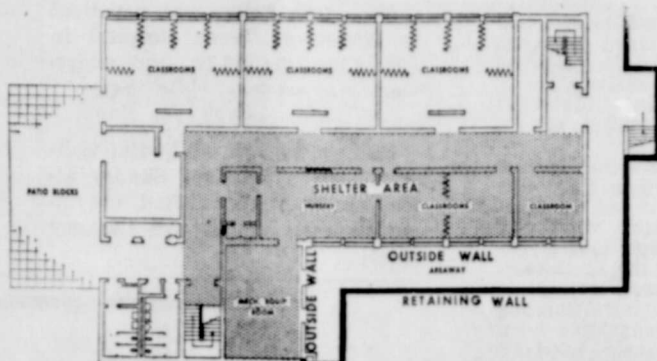
Fallout protection features built into the new McLean Bible Church at McLean, Va., are invisible to the untrained eye, as are similar measures built into many new structures springing up across the Nation. They are very real, nevertheless.

The church is one of 34 new buildings of various types which are cited in a new civil defense publication as examples of designing fallout shelter into structures at little or no extra cost at the time they are built, and without impairing their appearance or use. The shelter feature added only \$900 to the cost of the \$217,000 church, or about six cents of the \$15.24 cost per sq. ft. of the building.

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FALLOUT SHELTER BUILT-IN EASILY

A new booklet just issued by the Defense Department's Office of Civil Defense (OCD) describes and illustrates 34 new buildings across the Nation in which "slanting" techniques were used to build-in fallout protection at little or no added cost and without affecting the buildings' looks or efficiency.

The publication, entitled "New Buildings With Fallout Protection" (TR-27), also dispels the notion that a fallout shelter has to be single-purpose, underground and unattractive. It points out that all buildings across the Nation provide some degree of radiation shielding, and many of these contain shelter space in above-ground areas. Many other buildings have weak points in shielding which could have been avoided had knowledge of fallout and protection

against it been known at the time of design.

Many of the "slanting" techniques of fallout protective design were theoretically proved feasible in two nationwide design competitions, sponsored by OCD in cooperation with architects' and engineers' societies. The theories were put into practice in the 34 buildings cited by the OCD booklet.

Following are some examples of "slanting" techniques:

- Reducing or eliminating windows or placing them high up in a room to cut down direct exposure of occupants to outside radiation, which moves in straight lines.
- Filling hollow walls with a radiation-shielding material such as sand.
- Locating baffle walls in front of outside entrances, and placing inner partitions so that shelter areas would not be exposed to outside radiation.
- Arranging rooms to provide a fallout-protected inner core area.

Herbicides Should Be Applied Properly

Herbicides can be useful tools for controlling weeds if they are properly applied. Briscoe County Agent Leon Grosdidier warns that improper application can cause crop damage and lawsuits from neighbors.

To get satisfactory results from herbicides follow the directions on the label as approved by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. "These directions should be followed exactly," he said.

To avoid chemical wind drift onto susceptible broadleaf plants make application only when wind velocity is below 10 m.p.h. He ur-

ges all herbicide users to have some type of wind gauge in the field so they can know when conditions become dangerous.

Amine salt or low volatile formulations are safest, the Agent said. They do not vaporize and drift as much as the high volatile formulations.

The County Agent gave these rules for applying herbicides:

1. Use chemicals only on crops for which they are recommended.
2. Use only the quantity called for on the label.
3. Apply the chemicals only at time recommended on the label.

Texas A & M University specialists report that the greatest problems with herbicides are occurring where inexperienced operators are making applications. They suggest

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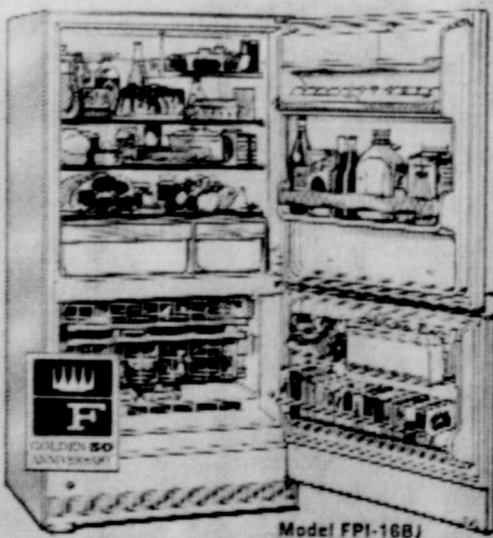


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
