REPUBLICANS WIN WORKING MAJORITY

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—Republican victories in Tuesday's election assume even greater magnitude as counting of ballots nears completion than was at first reported.

Overnight returns increase the likelihood of the new administration having a dependable working majority of its own party in congress, the number of Republican members being greater than the Democrats and all other parties represented in congress.

The returns also indicated that Montana and Nevada, heretofore considered as doubtful states, would give their electoral vote to Coolidge and Daves. For a time LaFollette had threatened to capture one of these states.

The additional Montana and Nevada votes will increase the Republican electorate to 374, or one hundred more than is needed to elect a president.

The electoral vote for Davis and Bryan remained at 136, and apparently the only chance for an increase was in New Mexico, where the Democrats were holding a lead by only a scant plurality.

LaFollette's last opportunity to increase his electoral vote of thirteen which was given him by Wisconsin, seemingly hinged on returns from North Dakota, the only other state remaining in the doubtful column. Coolidge was leading in this state, but LaFollette was gaining on the president as the late returns were tabulated.

LOCAL INVENTOR MAY SELL PATENT

The question as to what he will take for his patent is being put up to H. F. Demmer by several different manufacturing concerns and sales promoters dealing in patents. The patent which is attracting the attention of the manufacturing investors and others dealing in such articles, was granted Mr. Demmer only a few days ago, but he is receiving inquiries through the mails daily.

The patent which promises to make Mr. Demmer financially independent consists of a burglar alarm for automobiles. While simple in device and cheap of construction, it promises to prove a big bar to burglars who raid garages and steal automobiles. Mr. Demmer manufactured the alarm for his own use, and realizing that there was a demand for such a device, after testing it out and seeing that it was entirely practical, he had it patented, and is now negotiating with parties for the sale of the alarm at a figure which will probably put him on easy street.

He has not decided whether he will sell the patent outright, or make a deal for the manufacture of the article and put it on the market on a royalty basis.

RUNNELS LEADS W. T. IN COTTON

Runnels county leads all counties West of the 99th meridian, in the territory known as West Texas, in cotton production, according to the government gin report compiled and made public on October 25th.

For the last two years Jones county has held first place in point of cotton production in the territory above described, but Runnels exceeds Jones by about 5,000 bales this year. Runnels county is the banner cotton county of all West Texas. Conditions being equal this county will produce more cotton every year than any other county in West Texas.

Up to Oct. 25th no county in the state had ginned as much as 100,000 bales. Ellis county had 93,765 to its credit. Williamson county had 89,875 and McLennan had ginned 82,578. These are the leading cotton counties in the state and all will probably exceed 100,000 bales this year. There are many counties which will gin more than 50,000 bales.

Long, Hard Winter Coming, Says Famous Washington Meteorologist

"We are going to have an early, long and severe winter." This isn't the usual, annual prediction of the coal merchant, nor the idle sales talk of the fur-coat salesman. It comes from no less an authority than Herbert J. Browne, famous Washington meteorologist.

Mr. Browne has recently jumped into prominence by his uncanny long-distance weather predictions which have come true in every case, over a period of years. His new scientific theories for weather forecasting have been heralded widely in both scientific and popular magazines, here and abroad.

Coal merchants, fur coat salesmen and the public do give heed to Browne's advice. So do railroads, steamship lines and winter resorts. The extent to which the latter great American business is affected by his predictions is suggested in a recent announcement in a Florida case.

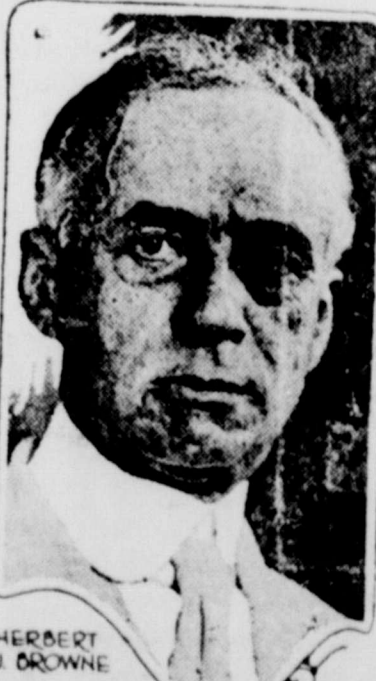
"With supreme confidence in the predictions of Herbert J. Browne, who has announced an early, long and severe winter, directors of the Miami Chamber of Commerce, have decided to announce the opening of the Miami season in November, a month earlier than any previous season in Florida history."

"To this decision the Chamber was aided by assurance of co-operation of railroads, steamship lines and hotels. Through trains from Chicago to Miami will this year begin November 15 with corresponding advance in dates of through cars from eastern and middle western cities. BUTTE MAY ASK FOR PROBE

(By Associated Press)

DALLAS, Nov. 6.—While Geo. Butte, Republican nominee, declined to concede his defeat by Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson, Democratic nominee, in Tuesday's election for Governor of Texas, Republican headquarters here and one tabulating agency in the state today announced that efforts would be made to obtain the complete returns.

Mrs. Ferguson was leading Butte by more than 40,000 votes when tabulation was discontinued early Wednesday.

W. E. Talbot, campaign manager for Butte, said however, that reports from fifteen counties, including Eastland, had been received bearing evidence that some Butte ballots had been thrown out uncounted and that these reports are sufficient to warrant an investigation which he indicated would be made.

BROOKHART WINS BY 66 MAJORITY

DES MOINES, Nov. 6.—Senator Smith W. Brookhart, progressive Republican, was 645 votes ahead of Daniel Steek, the Democratic candidate, in the senatorial race in Iowa at noon today, when a score of election boards had rechecked Tuesday's election returns.

DES MOINES, Nov. 6.—Unofficial but complete returns from all precincts in Iowa today show Senator Smith W. Brookhart, Republican-independent, leading his Democratic opponent, Daniel Steek, by the close margin of 66 votes.

The complete unofficial vote gave Brookhart 446,506 and Steek 446,440.

PINE IS LEADING WALTON 125,000

OKLAHOMA CITY, Nov. 6.—The lead of W. B. Pine, Republican, over former Gov. Jack C. Walton, Democrat, for United States senator, had increased to nearly 125,000 votes today. The vote stood Pine, 288,264; Walton, 163,699.

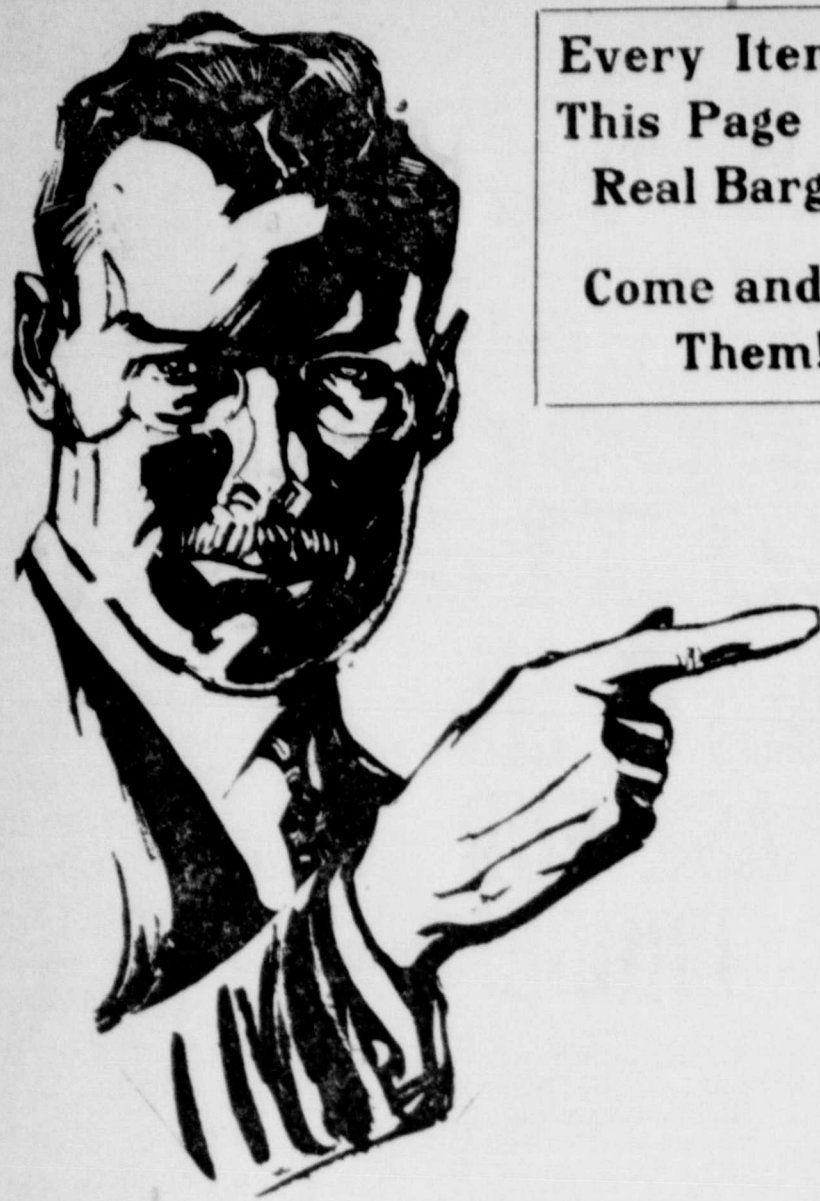

NEW SEATTLE SEWARD CABLE LAID BY ARMY SIGNAL CORPS MEN

SEWARD, Alaska, Nov. 6.—A

Dellwood, linking Seattle and
Seward, is 1,612 miles long and
weighs 17,028 tons.

The cost of renewing the cable,
which was established in 1904
with a line from Seattle to Sitka,
Alaska, was put at \$150,000. Col.
George Gibb, in charge of re-lay-
ing the cable, reported that the
deepest place found was 2,413
fathoms, Southeast of Middleton
Island, 75 miles South of the
Northernmost point of the Gulf of
Alaska. The floor of the gulf, he
added, was as smooth as the
plains in the States. The line was
laid at an average depth of 1,718
fathoms. The re-laying was be-
gun in January.

BRITISH LOVELORN RETURNING TO LONG ENGAGEMENT IDEA

LONDON, Nov. 5.—"Back to
the long engagement," seems to
have become a sort of slogan
among the lovelorn of Britain. It
would be hard to say how the
change has come about but evi-

dence accumulates that long en-
gagements are again in fashion.
The wartime habit of the hasty
marriage—not seldom followed
by repentance at leisure—is sur-
ely giving way to the protracted
and romantic engagements of
prim days when Queen Victoria
used to spunk one of her grand-

nificance is attached to this new
move in view of Roumania's re-
tention of Bessarabia.

PLANS COUNTY POULTRY SHOW

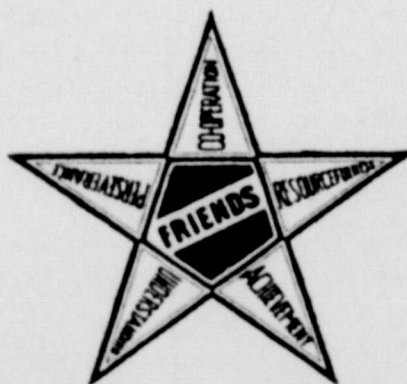
