Young Farmer Feedlot Tour Is Scheduled

The annual Area 1 Young Farmers feedlot tour will be conducted Feb. 20-21 and will depart from Plainview.

The tour date was set recently in a meeting of Area 1 Young Farmers officers.

On the tour cattle and hog feeding operations will be visited in Plainview, Friona, Hereford, Tulia and Canyon.

Those taking the tour will see warmup cattle preparing for feedlot, feedlot finishing, farrow to finish hog operations, cattle meat processing facilities, an agricultural computing center, wet grain feeding to cattle, hybrid grain silage feeding compared to corn silage feeding and a pure bred hog operation.

According to Glenn Odum, president of Young Farmers, the tour should be of interest to all young farmers in this area and those planning to make the tour are invited to bring their bankers as guests.

The tour will be made by chartered bus and will be directed by Sam Thomas, Southwestern Public Service Co.

In other business during the meeting, officers voted to hold the next area banquet at Plainview.

Hale Delegates Attend National FB Convention

CHICAGO — Three Farm Bureau members from Hale County were among the 5,000 in attendance at the 1968 annual meeting of the American Farm Bureau Federation this week in Kansas City, Mo.

Representing this county were: Mr. and Mrs. Owen Benn, Hale County Farm Bureau president, and John I. Bowling, Hale Center.

The annual meeting kicked off the Golden Anniversary year—1969—of the nation's largest general farm organization. Texas Farm Bureau, third largest state in terms of membership size with 110,689 members, was represented by eight voting delegates in the business session where national policies for next year were adopted.

Designated county Farm Bureau representatives at the national convention received special recognition at a leadership luncheon on Thursday, closing day of the meeting. They will report on the annual meeting to their respective county Farm Bureaus when they return home.

Key issues discussed at the Kansas City meeting included the future direction of farm programs, farm exports, farm marketing — bargaining, and monetary — policies. Policies adopted by the voting delegates from 49 states (all except Alaska) and Puerto Rico will be presented in January to the new Congress.

In addition to the general sessions of the convention, special conferences were held covering the areas of natural resources, dairying, field crops, livestock, horticulture, poultry and service-to-member programs.

TALK IN PRINT

While men are being killed in Vietnam, negotiators in Paris are squabbling over the shape of the table to be used in the peace conference sessions. If charges of murder can be made in any war, the table squabblers are guilty.

Fantastic, but a fast way to bring peace in Vietnam: At sunup, lock all the principals in the Paris peace talks in a room and give them this ultimatum: "Come to terms that will end the Vietnam war immediately or all of you will be shot at sundown." That would get fast results.

Dallas has another "image" problem...one that will hurt it as much as anything that has happened in that department.

Incidents that have left the city in bad repute include the rudeness to the then Senator LBJ, when he and Lady Bird were shown around in the area of Commerce and Akard, and the spitting-upon Adlai E. Stevenson when the late UN Ambassador spoke in that city. The city unjustly bore the bad image brunt of the assassination of President Kennedy. The latest bad publicity is the story about the city asking the widow of a policeman a refund of \$27.75 of his pay check. When he was shot to death while on duty on a Sunday, he was carrying a paycheck that paid him through Tuesday. Officials tried to explain away the incident by calling it a "clerical slip-up."

Leon P. Gilvin, Amarillo contractor, Thursday was named to be chairman of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission. The appointment was made by Gov. John Connally. Gilvin is a son-in-law of Mrs. Fritz W. Struve of Abernathy.

Reports said that Lynn Rhodes, who has served as minister of Abernathy Church of Christ the past few years, will move to Tulia after the first of the year. He will be minister of a Tulia Church of Christ. Mrs. Rhodes is a former homemaker teacher in AHS.

Good news was in the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal Saturday. It concerned approval of U.S. Highway 87 between Amarillo and Lubbock as part of the nation's Interstate Highway system. It will connect in Amarillo with Interstate 40 (route of US 66). The 125-mile project will cost \$43.1 million and should be completed in five or six years. This will place Abernathy on an Interstate Highway. Gains locally will include the service roads that will be built on both sides of the IH throughout this area and its entire route. We hope that the Interstate Highway work will include a grade separation where FM 54 and US 87 intersect three miles north of town. Many accidents, including some with fatalities, have occurred at that dangerous intersection over the years. An overpass may carry FM 54 traffic over the new IH.

WBC Students Preparing For Yule Holidays

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County Workers Will Join State Retirement System

In a major move Monday, Hale County Commissioners voted to enter the Texas County and District Retirement System on Jan. 1.

In the same motion, Court members voted to increase salaries of employees 10 per cent in order to cover costs of contributions by employees to the system, and to help pay for added social security tax and added income tax.

Other action by the Court included hiring of a new Home Demonstration Agent and an assistant, with the two to begin work Jan. 16.

Named as Home Demonstration Agent was Mrs. D. C. Gamble, while Mrs. Bobby Sparkman was named as assistant agent.

Meeting with the Court were the two new agents, along with Mrs. Aubrey Russell, District Home Demonstration Agent from Lubbock.

Commissioners earlier in the year had gone on record saying Hale County would go into the retirement system, but set no effective date for entry into the program.

Public Hearing

Since salaries of elected officials cannot be changed without a public hearing, action on those officials entering the retirement program was postponed until Jan. 13, when the Court will hold the required meeting.

Before that date, a complete list of proposed salary changes for elected officials will be published.

County Judge C. L. Abernathy said exactly how district officials and extension service personnel would enter the program is not known yet, since the salaries of district officials are split among three counties, while extension service employees are paid partially by Hale County and partially by the state.

Mrs. Gamble is a graduate of West Texas State University and was Home Demonstration Agent in Canyon from 1965-67. She also served as Home Demonstration Agent in Hutchinson County.

Court members set Hale County's share of her salary at \$3,000 a year, with \$700 for travel expenses. She will fill the position left by Mrs. Doyle Meadors, who resigned this fall.

Mrs. Sparkman is a 1964 graduate of Ropesville High School, and a 1968 graduate of Texas Tech, where she majored in clothing and textiles, and received her bachelor's degree in home economics. She and her husband, an assistant supervisor with the Hale County Farmers Home Administration, reside at 2601 W. 10th St.

She now teaches school at Hale Center, and will fill a position being vacated by Miss Doris Lesh, who formally submitted her resignation to the Court Monday.

The Court set Hale County's portion of Mrs. Sparkman's salary at \$1,900 with \$700 travel expense, and said her base salary would be raised to \$2,200 after six months.

Other persons meeting with the Court included County Agent Ollie Linder and Sheriff Troy Porterfield. Linder requested two filing cabinets for the Extension Service Offices, and Porterfield asked the Court to consider hiring a relief deputy to serve as jailer and bailiff when needed.

Grant Request

Commissioners granted the request for the filing cabinets, but delayed action of hiring of a relief deputy sheriff.

Other action at the Court session included approval of bills for payment, and review of monthly reports from the Plainview Fire Dept., Hale County Airport and the Plainview Health Unit. Reports earlier had been reviewed by the Plainview City Council.

Only change in the reports was a revised report submitted on the Hale County Airport maintenance fund for October. The report was revised in order to reflect treasury bill investments listed in an earlier report submitted to the City Council as income.

The new report lists total income for the year as \$17,569.71, while total expenses are set at \$13,793.52, leaving a balance of \$3,776.19.

Expenses for October totaled \$1,030.86, while income during the same period was \$821.71.

RURAL MISHAPS

Area Study Shows 16 Car Deaths

Rural traffic accidents in Lubbock County for 11 months of this year have resulted in 16 deaths and 191 persons injured, according to Sgt. O. C. Guthrie, district highway patrol supervisor.

During the 11-month period, the highway patrol investigated 399 accidents which caused estimated property damage of \$336,317.

In the city of Lubbock, police investigated 6,272 accidents during the period. These resulted in 19 persons killed and 1,212 injured. Fatalities in 1968 in the city now total 20.

The highway patrol urges certain precautions during the hazardous traffic period of the Christmas holidays:

1. Allow plenty of time for travel;

2. Check your car for safe-driving condition;

3. Use seat belts to safeguard your family and yourself;

4. Be alert to road, weather, and traffic hazards;

5. Do not overdrive for the conditions;

6. Make courtesy your code of the road—it pays.

FIRE HITS MILL HERE; BUILDING ADDITION SET

Abernathy's major industry, Southwest Textiles, Inc., chalked up both bad news and good news. Bad news was the \$30,000 to \$40,000 fire that hit the mill Thursday morning, and the good news is the addition of 23,000 square feet of floor space on the south end of the original building. This activity may add some 25 new employees to the payroll. Currently, 75 people are employed at the mill, working in three shifts.

Fire started early on the windswept morning of Thursday when a motor and electrical wiring shorted out in the air-conditioning and heating building on the east side of the main structure. The blaze quickly spread to the cotton storage shed and into the part where bale cotton is received. Some 75 bales of cotton were burned along with supplies, parts and auxiliary equipment. The building sustained from \$8,000 to \$10,000 in damage, estimates said. In addition there was extensive damage to electrical wiring. This is added to the loss of cotton, supplies and auxiliary equipment and other items.

The fire did not reach into the main spinning room, however, that department shut down until 11 p.m. Thursday for repair of electrical wiring, lights and some motors. There was only two shifts loss of time in the spinning department, Roy Whitte, mill superintendent reported.

In the new construction there will be included a 25 x 75-ft. supply storage room. The addition will house the winding and packaging operation equipment, leaving more room in the original building for additional spindle machinery.

Southwest Textiles, Inc., is owned by Joe Thompson, who is serving as general manager, Rudolph Struve, Bill Wolf and Andy Reid.

**Agriculture Is
Second To Oil
In State Economy**

The Texas agricultural industry continues to be a very vital part of the state's economy.

Despite the continuing decrease in the number of farms and the per cent of the population actually engaged in production agriculture, the total value of its raw products ranks second only to crude oil, reports John G. McHane, Extension economist at Texas A&M University.

Texas agricultural producers, he explains, in 1967 spent more than \$1.6 billion for items used in current farm operating expenses. And such spending, he adds, kept a lot of cash registers ringing from cross-roads country stores to those on main street in major cities of the

state and nation.

They spent \$772 million for feed, livestock, seed and fertilizers and lime, and most of these items were purchased locally, points out the economist. Another \$309 million went for repairs and operation of capital items, including repairs and maintenance of buildings, machinery and motor vehicles, and petroleum products used in the farm business.

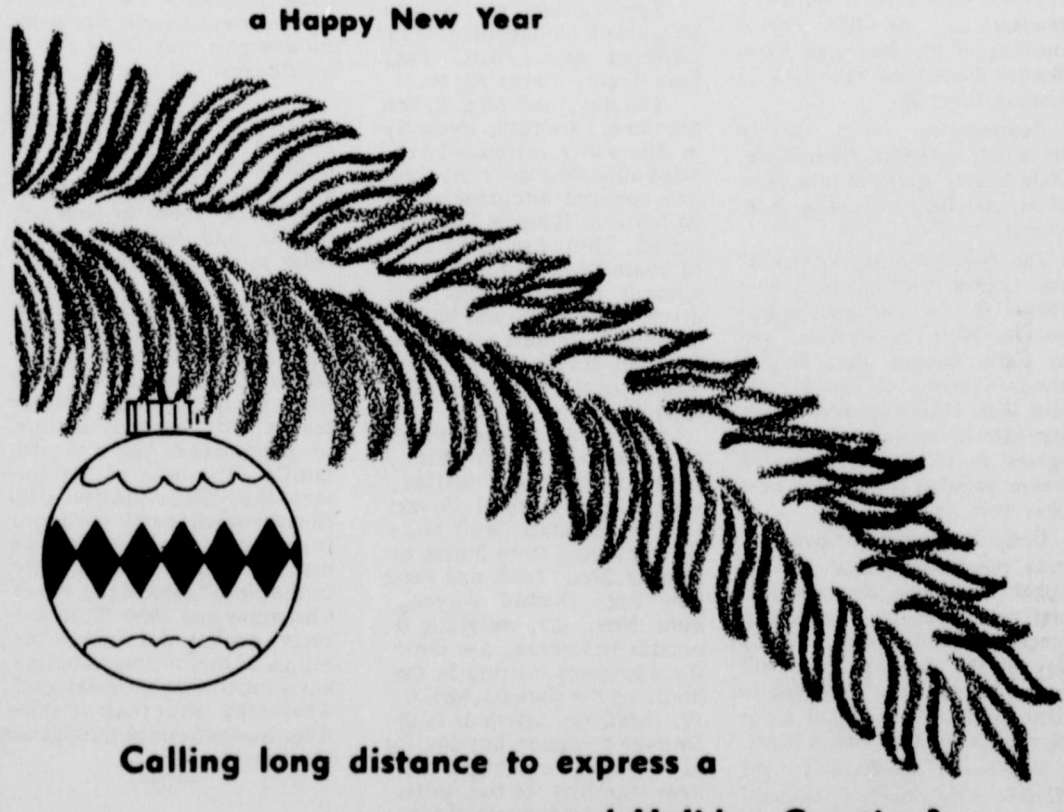

Leon P. Gilvin, Amarillo contractor, recently was named to be chairman of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission, succeeding Will Odom, who resigned. Gilvin is a son-in-law of Mrs. Fritz W. Struve of Abernathy.

Hale County farmers have voted overwhelmingly in favor of marketing quotas set for the 1969 upland cotton crop.

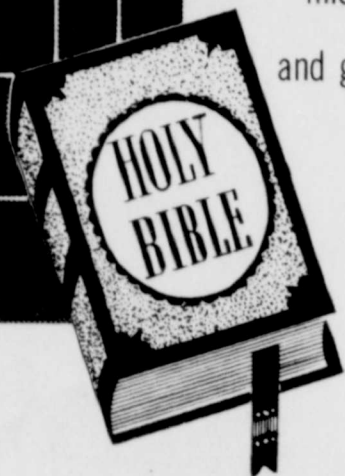

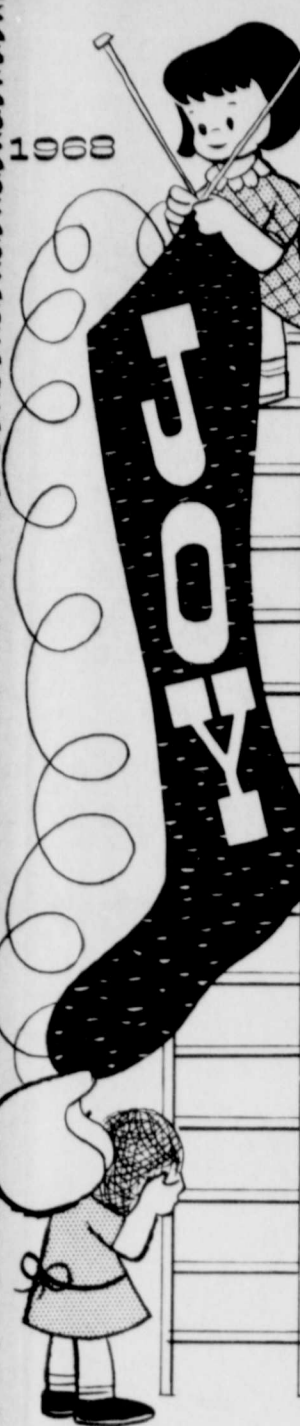

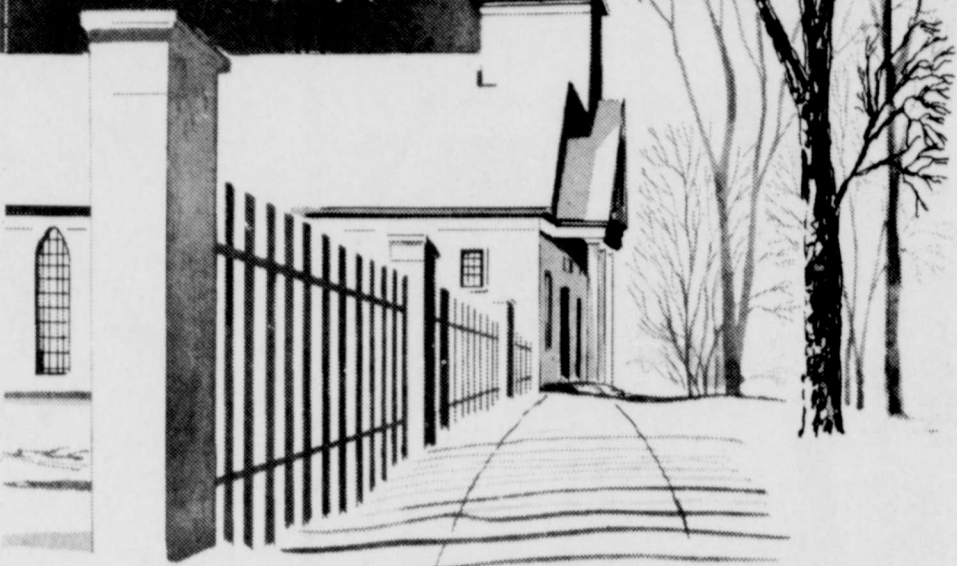
