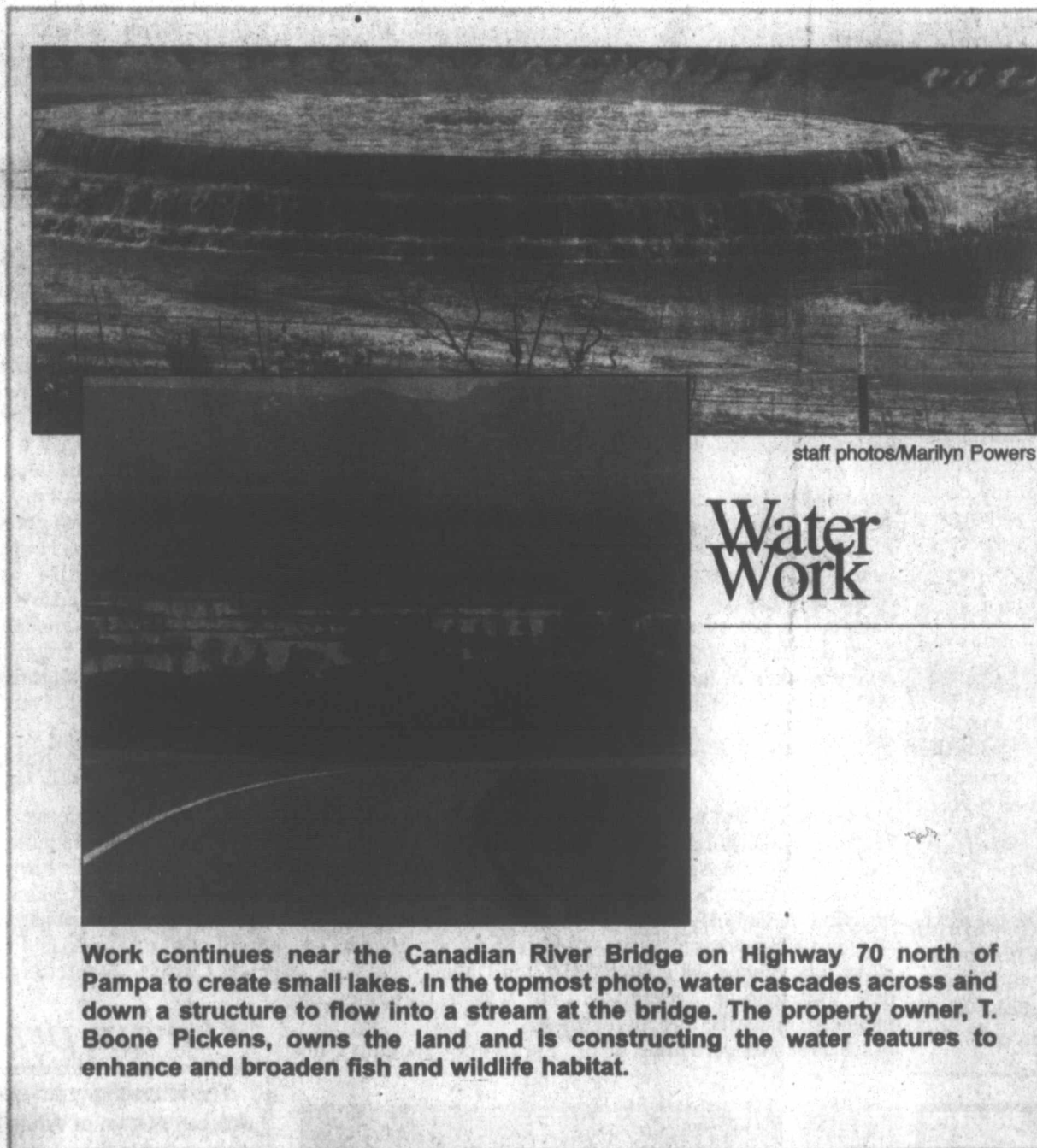
WHITE DEER — Motorists along U.S. Highway 60 west of White Deer were treated to an aerobatics show Monday as Jody Wood twisted and turned trying successfully not to let the spray from his plane drift onto passing cars. Wood of Wood Flying Service, like everyone else in the Texas Panhandle, was battling mosquitoes this week. He was out spraying over the Carson County Cotton Gin with his 402 Air Tractor spray plane on a still Monday morning in preparation for the gin's annual meeting tonight.

Gin Manager Keith Mixon said the meeting would feature a new cotton picking machine as opposed to a cotton stripper. Carson County farmer Mark Urbanczyk said the machine is a Case International 625 onboard cotton picker. "It's the only one this far north," Urbanczyk said. He said a factory representative from Case would be at the meeting to demonstrate the new technology. The gin meeting is scheduled for 6 p.m. Tuesday at the Carson County Gin.

Final hearing Thursday for service hikes

The Pampa City Commission will hold a second public hearing on its tax rate and related budget Thursday and consider on second and final reading ordinances that would raise fees on some city services.

Last week, the commission voted on first reading ordinances to raise landfill, trash collection, water and sewage fees.

According to Pampa City Manager Trevlyn Pitner, the change in landfill fees will primarily affect other cities and businesses that use the regional landfill that Pampa maintains.

Richard Morris, director of public works for Pampa, said there are some 16 entities that use the landfill, including 11 areas cities.

Under the proposed ordinances, the base rate for the landfill would go up from \$29.50 a ton to \$33 a ton.

Pitner said losses at the landfill the last few years have had to be made up with tax money from the general fund. Raising the fee should alleviate or at least reduce that problem.

Pampa City Commissioner Robert Dixon said the increased fees for trash collection, water and sewer should total \$7.83 a year.

The increases are 20 percent over last year. The trash collection fee will increase \$2.93. The increase for sewer service would go \$2.04. The basic water fee will go up \$2.86 a month.

The city commission will also hear on second and final reading an ordinance adopting the Rate Review Mechanism Tariff with regard to the gas utility Atmos Energy.

Pitner said the new mechanism will be more transparent and should allow a more comprehensive review of rates and requested increases.

Other items on Thursday's agenda include the proposed 2008-2009 Pampa Economic Development Corporation operating budget and second and final reading of a resolution approving the EDC's project grant of \$50,000 for the Gray Pampa Community Fund.

The public hearing and subsequent commission meeting will be at 6 p.m. Thursday in the commission chambers at City Hall.

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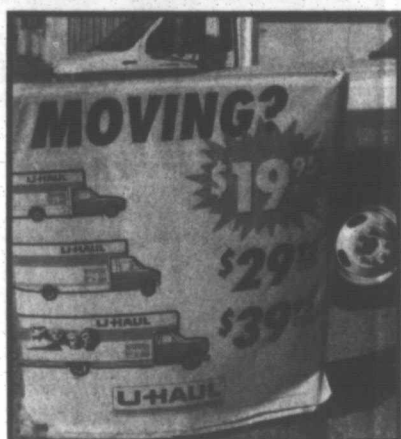
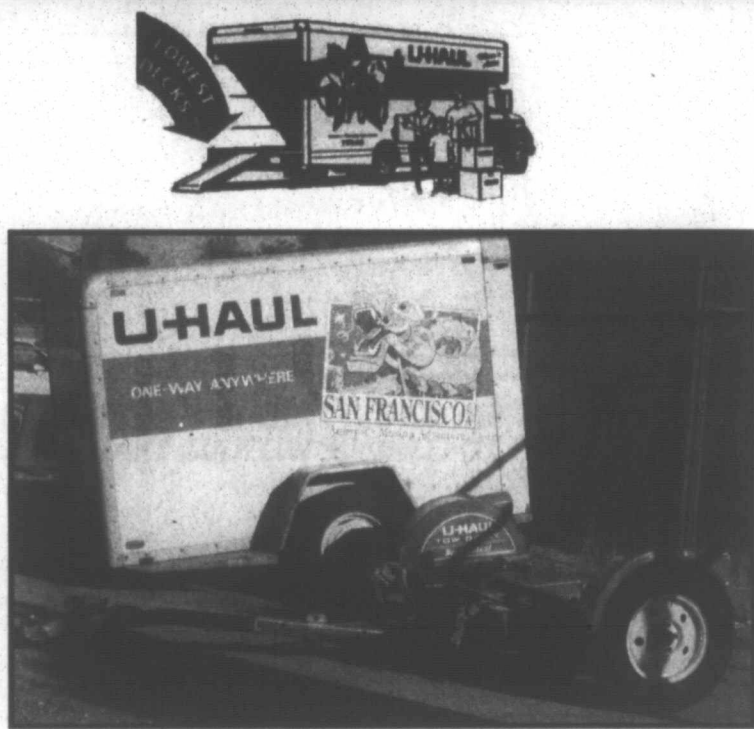
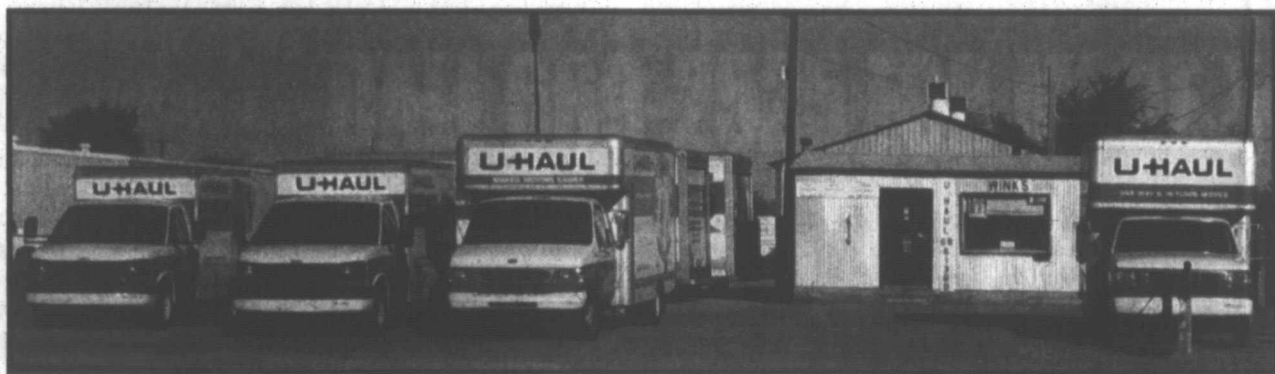

Storage a problem for many Americans

There is a saying that many people are familiar with and that pack rats, especially, believe: The person who has the most stuff wins.

I myself am a pack rat and can understand this philosophy all too clearly. One thing I've noticed is that the idea of collecting things, or the aversion to getting rid of items, affects people to differing degrees.

One symptom that someone has a bad case of keep-itis is what they do with their garage, if they have one.

I would love to know how many garages are actually being used to shelter vehicles. From what I've noticed, the number seems to be shrinking.

The price of a new vehicle can be shocking to someone like me who remembers what they used to cost back in "the good old days." A person could buy a house for what they would pay to own some of the cars,

pickups and SUVs that are currently on showroom floors.

Yet the showroom floor is sometimes the only time these mobile investments are sheltered from the weather.

It seems to me that more and more people are parking their vehicles in their driveways and on the street, even though they have garages. There are several reasons for this.

In some cases, the occupants have more cars than garage space.

Another cause of open-air parking is that what used to be the garage has been turned into another room, most commonly a den or bedroom, leaving nowhere to put the vehicle inside. This remodeling is most often seen where there used to be a one-car garage.

One trend which seems to be growing is to use the garage, not as another room of the house, but as storage space for some of that stuff that won't fit comfortably in the house but which the owner can't bear to eliminate.

I have driven down residential streets which used to be broad thoroughfares but which have been reduced to narrow lanes because of all the vehicles parked along the curb. Sometimes I get glimpses of what's inside garages at addresses where vehicles occupy the driveway and street.

boxes and pieces of furniture.

At other homes, the cars have lost the battle, and the garages are crammed full of stuff. It makes me wonder what the residents are going to do next for storage.

I suppose those collections of garage filler must be more valuable than the vehicles, or the owners would not risk auto theft, burglary, vandalism and weathering by keeping their rides outside.

One thing I would like to see every collector, as well as non-collector, break out of storage and display on Thursday is a flag. Thursday is, of course, Sept. 11, the anniversary of the worst terrorist attack ever to be experienced on U.S. soil. Let's let terrorists know that there are still plenty of us left and that we are proud to be Americans.

Academic mismatch leads to failures

Which serves the interests of the black community better: a black student admitted to a top-tier law school, such as Harvard, Stanford or Yale, and winds up in the bottom 10 percent of his class, flunks out or cannot pass the bar examination; or a black student admitted to a far less prestigious law school, performs just as well as his white peers, graduates and passes the bar? I, and hopefully any other American, would say that doing well and graduating from a less prestigious law school is preferable to doing poorly and flunking out of a prestigious one.

Professor Gail Heriot, U.S. Commission on Civil Rights commissioner and member of the University of San Diego law faculty, addresses academic mismatch in her article "Affirmative Action in

American Law Schools," in The Journal of Contemporary Legal Issues (2008). Citing UCLA law professor Richard Sander's research, Professor Heriot says that at elite law schools

52 percent of black students had first-year grades that put them in the bottom 10 percent of their class as opposed to 7 percent white students. Black students had a higher failing and dropout rate, 19 percent compared to 8 percent for white students. Only 45 percent of blacks passed the bar exam on their first try compared with 78 percent of whites. Even after multiple attempts, only 57 percent of blacks succeeded in passing the bar.

Professor Heriot points out that this tragedy is reversed when black and white law students with similar academic credentials compete against each other at the same school. They earn about the same grades. When these students with the same grades from the same-tier school took the bar examination, they passed at the same rate.

In the name of affirmative action, diversity and multiculturalism, black students are being admitted to law schools where their academic credentials are far lower than whites. The LSAT,

which ranges from 120 to 180, is an admissions test for most law schools. According to the Journal of Blacks in Higher Education, the mean LSAT score at Harvard, Stanford and Yale law schools was 170. In 2004, nationally only .03 percent of blacks scored that high compared to 3.1 percent of whites. Overall the mean LSAT score for blacks is 142; for whites it's 152.

Many blacks admitted to top-tier law schools are brought into a highly competitive environment where the chances for success are quite remote. In order for second- and third-tier law schools to have what they see as their quota of black students, they must in turn lower their admission standards. As a result, those

black students wind up in the bottom of their class. It is truly a vicious, mean agenda, where black students, who would be successes at a second- or third-tier law school, have been recruited and admitted to the highly competitive environment of first-tier schools in the name of diversity and turned into failures.

Think of it this way. Suppose you asked, "Williams, would you teach me how to box?" I say yes and the first matchup I arrange for you is against Lennox Lewis. You might have the potential to ultimately be an excellent boxer, but you're going to get your brains beaten out before you learn how to bob and weave.

It's the same with any student — black or white. He is

less likely to succeed if he is placed in an academic environment where his credentials don't begin to match those of his peers. He is likely to do much better in a slower paced, less competitive environment where he might receive more personal help.

I have frequently made this argument only to be asked: If top-tier colleges don't have racially different admissions policies, how are they going to have enough black students? My response is that's their problem. Black people can't afford to have our youngsters turned into failures so that in the name of diversity race hustlers and white liberals can feel better.

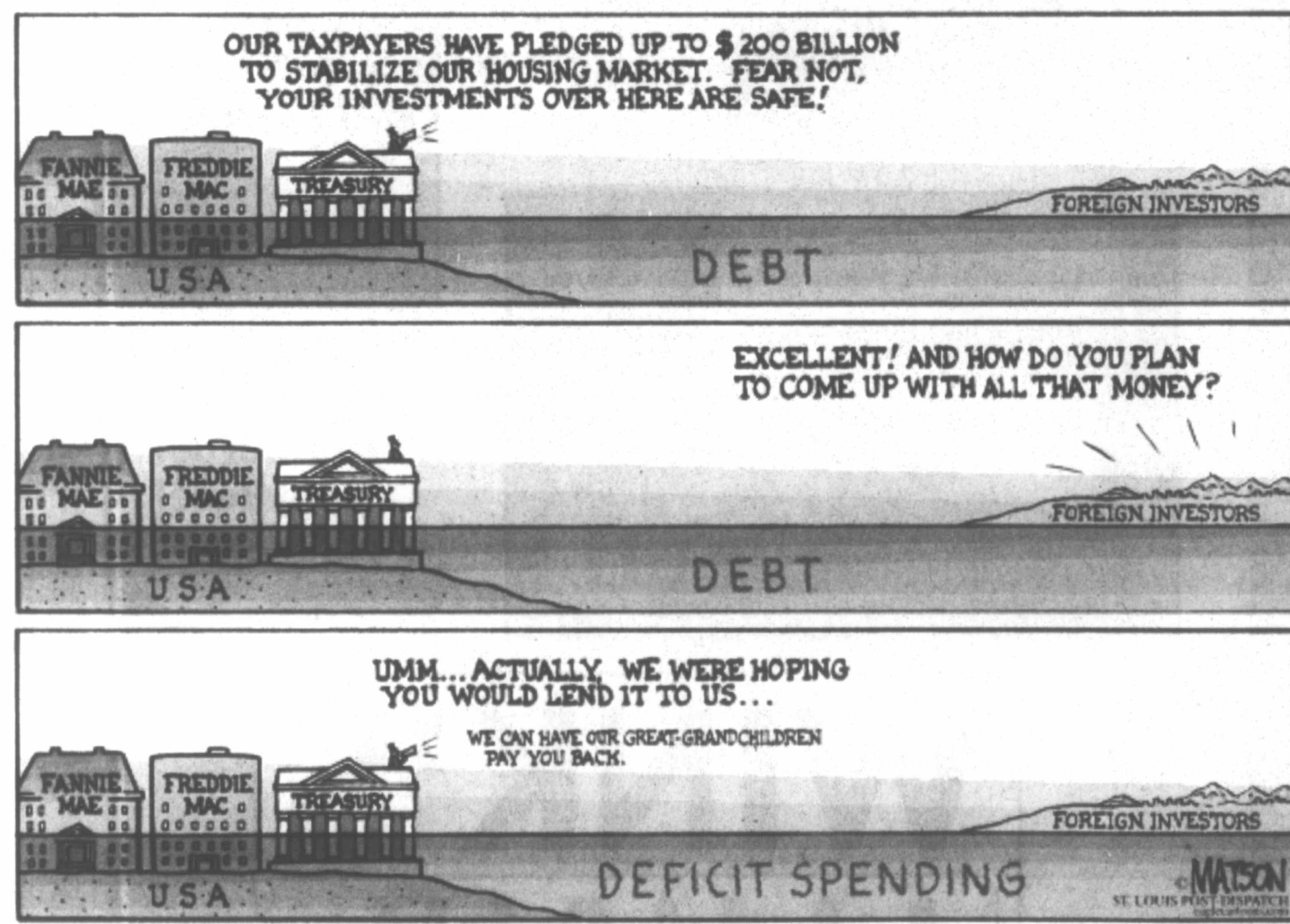

Texas Thoughts

Houston Chronicle on a recent U.S. Census report on working people:

Although American workers are among the most productive in the world, they have reaped little of the benefits of an economic expansion that began in 2001 after a brief recession.

The U.S. Census Bureau's Income, Poverty and Health Insurance Coverage report for 2007 finds that although median household income rose slightly over the last few years to \$50,233, it has yet to reach the levels of a decade ago. The number of Americans living in poverty remains unchanged at about 12.5 percent. Meanwhile, real per capita income actually declined by 1 percent. The share of the nation's income going to workers is at its lowest level since the '60s.

While the survey measured a slight drop in the number of Americans without health insurance, mostly due to increased enrollment in government programs, Texas maintains its distressing status as having a higher percentage of uninsured adults and children than any other state. A quarter of Texas adults are uninsured, as are a fifth of its children. Harris County leads the state, with an uninsured rate near 30 percent. Nearly a quarter of its children live in poverty.

The Chronicle's Mike Snyder interviewed a Pasadena couple, Josh and Kyla Hebert, whose 3-year-old daughter, Katie, suffers from brain lesions. In order to qualify for the federal- and state-funded Children's Health Insurance Program, the father actually requested that his employer cut his pay. The couple eventually qualified for the program by putting their children in day care, an expenditure that counts as an income deduction. Their predicament is no doubt a frequent occurrence

in a nation in which 45 million residents lack health insurance.

The Census Bureau figures for this year, as the country has teetered on the brink of a new recession, are not likely to provide any improvement on either the income or insurance front. All in all, the latest statistics paint the discouraging picture of a country in which Americans are producing more wealth than ever, yet workers are bringing in the same level of income, while energy and medical costs increase rapidly.

It's a situation that must change if the United States is to remain a nation where people willing to work hard can get ahead and raise healthy, well-educated children. With a pivotal presidential election looming in November, citizens should listen closely to what the presidential candidates propose and vote accordingly. URL: <http://www.chron.com>

Astana: No plans for Armstrong to ride with team

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Is Lance Armstrong coming back to cycling?

A report in a prominent cycling journal suggests that may be the case. And the seven-time Tour de France champion has put himself forward for drug testing — a necessary step for any return to the highest level of the sport he once dominated.

But any Armstrong comeback won't take place with the Astana cycling team, as cycling journal VeloNews reported. Citing anonymous sources, its Web site said Monday that the 36-year-old would compete with Astana in the 2009 Tour de France and four other road races — the Amgen Tour of California, Paris-Nice, the Tour de Georgia and the Dauphine-Libere.

Team press officer Philippe Maertens denied that report Tuesday.

"There are no contacts or plans of Team Astana to take Lance Armstrong," he told The Associated Press by phone from Belgium. "As far as I know, Lance Armstrong doesn't have plans to do road cycling."

"But that's a question you have to ask Armstrong," Maertens added. "We have no plans."

Astana team director Johan Bruyneel, who was with Armstrong for all seven Tour wins from 1999-2005, said

he considered it "very unlikely" that he would ride in the Tour again.

"He is a man who stays in good shape," Bruyneel said Tuesday in Sabinanigo, Spain, at the Spanish Vuelta, according to national news agency EFE. "He also does cyclocross and has run marathons. But I see it very unlikely he will compete again in the Tour of France. For me it is just a rumor, although I will have to speak with him."

The Astana team was not allowed to compete in this year's Tour after Alexandre Vinokourov was kicked out of the 2007 Tour for testing positive and the team quit the race.

Maertens said rumors that Armstrong might come out of retirement had been circulating for a few weeks.

"If it would be true that Armstrong wants to come back it would be stupid for us to say no," Maertens said, "but it's not the case."

Armstrong at least appears willing to submit to drug testing.

The U.S. Anti-Doping Agency confirmed

Armstrong is part of its out-of-competition testing pool and would be eligible for elite competition on Feb. 1, 2009. The Amgen Tour of California begins Feb. 14.

Pat McQuaid, the head of cycling's governing body, told The AP that he learned a couple of weeks ago that Armstrong is in the testing system in the United States.

"So, if he wants to come back to racing he's every right to come back. Good luck to him," said McQuaid, president of the International Cycling Union.

McQuaid suggested that Armstrong may be hoping to take advantage of new, more rigorous drug-testing procedures in cycling to answer skeptics who suspect that the champion might have used drugs when he was at the top of his game.

"It may be that he has a little bit of a chip on his shoulder because of the accusations and rumors surrounding him, none of which were ever proven," McQuaid said. "And he wants to come back and show that, now that there is a new system in place which is the biological pass-

port which can show any type of manipulation of the blood, he wants to come back and show that he is the athlete he claims he was, that his results have shown."

Armstrong did not respond to a text message or voice mails left by the AP. His manager, Mark Higgins, and Bruyneel also did not respond to voice mails left by the AP.

Armstrong, who overcame testicular cancer, has largely turned his competitive juices to running marathons since he retired from competitive cycling three years ago. In August, he finished second in the Leadville Trail 100, a lung-searing 100-mile mountain bike race through the Colorado Rockies.

"We know that Lance continued training hard after that mountain bike race," Maertens said in a separate e-mail to the AP. "He will do some cyclocross races as well in the USA."

McQuaid agreed that Armstrong's fitness could allow for a comeback.

"He's been running marathons and doing all sorts of other stuff. He hasn't really let himself go in any way," McQuaid said.

Philadelphia Eagles shift their focus to Dallas Cowboys

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Donovan McNabb has seen plenty of the Dallas Cowboys without viewing any of their game tapes.

"I've been watching 'Hard Knocks.' Who hasn't been?" McNabb said, referring to the HBO series that profiled America's Team during training camp.

McNabb and the rest of the Philadelphia Eagles won't allow themselves to savor a dominating victory over St. Louis. There's no time to dwell on old news when it's

Cowboys week.

McNabb couldn't even make it through his post-game news conference after Sunday's 38-3 win over the woeful Rams without hearing questions about Dallas. The rivals meet next Monday night in the final home opener at Texas Stadium.

"They're a confident bunch. They're an experienced bunch," McNabb said. "There's a reason why they won 13 games last year. So we know that it's going to be a battle. Every time we play

it goes to the wire somehow, so we have to prepare ourselves to go out and give up a good fight."

The Cowboys dismantled the Cleveland Browns 28-10 to start a season they expect to end with their sixth Super Bowl title. Tony Romo threw for 320 yards, Terrell Owens had a touchdown catch and the defense overwhelmed a strong Browns offense.

It'll be a measuring stick for the Eagles, who benefited from playing a woeful opponent in Week 1.

"I don't think the Rams are near as bad as what that score showed," Eagles coach Andy Reid said. "There is a lot of emphasis put on the first game of the season and it's the most important game for us that week, but the reality of it is that there are 15 more of them and that's just one of 16 games. Can we assess the talent? Well, we can for this week. We did well this week, but it's time to rip that one up and get on with the next one."
