

(Opinions expressed in this column are the views of the writer and should be so interpreted). THE NOVEMBER 2 GENERAL election is over. A week has passed since the event was staged. Sufficient time has been given to clear the battlefield of the debris made by the shower of ballots cast by the voters. Enough time has also passed for the candidates to wipe the salt from their eyes while floating up Salt Creek. Some candidates for office learned their intended way to interest the voters fell flat. These candidates were brushed aside by the voters as the harvestor separates chaff from the wheat.

The Martin County voters, at least the biggest majority of them voting in the November 2 election, clung to their party tradition, supporting the candidates who had been the choice of the majority in the primary elections.

The members of the new official family of Martin County assume their duties Jan. 1, 1955.

THE EIGHT GINS IN MARTIN COUNTY whom The Reporter contacts by telephone, last week reported 19,548 bales had been turned out. There are five other gins in the county, all located in a fine dry land farming belt. Failing to obtain the number bales ginned by these five gins, we are taking the liberty to guess they have turned out 10,000 bales of cotton. In this case the present figure of bales ginned in Martin County as of last week would be 29,548 bales.

The Texas Employment Commission has estimated the 1954 cotton crop for Martin County at 45,000 bales.

If the column's figure of 29,948 bales already ginned in Martin County be allowed to stand, the county is crowding close on the heels of TEC's estimate of 45,000 bales. A lift of 15,152 bales more during the remainder of the cotton season and the county will have reached the estimate for the season.

APRIL 15, 1955, IS SOMETIME off. But not too long for automobile owners to avoid the last minute rush by having their cars inspected at official automobile inspection stations.

Some cars are seen running around in Stanton with headlights reflecting light beams in a cross-eyed fashion; others with only one headlight, and occasionally one is seen without any headlights. The sooner such car owners have their cars inspected and repaired, the better for all concerned.

Also, with the lights adjusted, the bolts, nuts and screws tightened and replaced when necessary, and the car placed in condition to wear an inspection tag, the toll of accidents and deaths on the highways and streets will be lessened to a degree.

Early inspection of automobiles will help to decrease the number standing in line to be inspected when the deadline April 15 rolls around.

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, reports that auto inspection in mid-October was running more than 100,000 behind the figure for the first month of the 1953 inspection period.

"None of the 4,000 stations," Garrison stated, "are too rushed to give you prompt attention at this time."

He pointed out that members of the Texas Patrol "handled some 12,000 violations of the Motor Vehicle Inspection Law" during the period from April 15 to September 1, 1954.

Gins Report Big Decrease

The Martin County cotton harvest showed its first serious signs of the farmers "catching up" this week as the number of bales ginned dropped by more than 1,500 as compared with last week's total at eight reporting plants. The county total for the eight rose to 22,539, an increase of 2,991 bales during the week. The five gins which could not be contacted were estimated to have processed enough cotton to push the total for the season well above the halfway mark for the 45,000 to 50,000 bale crop.

Ginners throughout the county have reported that all the farmers they are serving have completed their first picking and most of them are well into the second time over. Some stated that dry land picking was just about caught up and that irrigated cotton crops have almost been over twice.

Four ginners said week's business was off by 75 per cent or more. One reported "about like last week" and another said an increase of 400 bales was handled.

Mary Beth Ory, accompanied by Mrs. O. B. Bryan at the piano, gave a special vocal selection and a short address by C. V. (Shorty) Shelburne, acting managing editor of the Stanton Reporter, preceded the business meeting.

CAPON SHOW SET

The first annual Martin County Capon Show, open to all 4-H Club and FFA members, will be staged in Stanton on Saturday, November 20, at the County Barn. Hila Weathers, manager of the Martin County Chamber of Commerce, sponsoring or organizing, announced Wednesday that the show will be made one of the primary events on the yearly program for livestock show and county fair activities.

Plans for the annual show were drafted by County Agent Ralph Jones and Elbert Steele, advisor for the FFA, in cooperation with local business men and civic organizations who are members of the Chamber of Commerce. It will be a one-day affair.

Judging of Capons will be held at 9:30 a. m. on show day and an auction sale will follow at 1:30 p. m. Judges and the auctioneer will be announced probably next week.

The annual Capon Show will serve a two-fold purpose. It will eliminate the necessity for the showing of the birds at the annual County Livestock Show in January and will provide more emphasized competition for 4-H and FFA members. About 75 entries are expected this year.

The setting of the show for November 20 also will give buyers at the auction a break. The prize capons can be used as a choice substitute for the traditional turkey on Thanksgiving Day tables. Efforts will be made to hold the auction prices to a fair level so that all entries can be sold.

OIL NEWS

Well Just South Of County Line Flows 34 Barrels

Gulf Oil Corporation is preparing to run a production test at its No. 1-L Scharbauer Cattle Company, indicated flowing Ellenburger discovery four and a half miles north of Midland in North Midland County and just south of the Martin County line.

This projector flowed 34.50 barrels of oil in six hours on a drillstem test in the top of the Ellenburger at 12,713-763 feet.

It then drilled to a total depth of 13,098 feet. The zone at 13,025-098 feet carried only salt water. The 13,025 feet logged no fluid of any description.

Operator has cemented seven-inch casing at 13,092 feet—six feet off bottom. The Ellenburger pay section will be tested through perforations.

No. 1-L Scharbauer flowed 48.96 barrels of oil in seven hours from a Simpson sand at 12,615-699 feet. This pay probably will be tested after the Ellenburger.

Trials Slated For Hearing In District Court At Sweetwater

Seven defendants who were charged in indictments returned during July and August by a Martin County Grand Jury investigating alleged irregularities in county finances, have been ordered to appear for trial Monday in the 32nd District Court of Judge A. S. Mausey at Sweetwater. The defendants include former county judge James McMorries, former county commissioner Oliver Vaughn and Stanley Lewis and Commissioner Joe Froman who is still in office, two of McMorries' brothers, Whit and M. H., and James Herndon, contractor.

McCoy Takes Judge's Seal

Jim McCoy, who was elected to office in last week's General Election, was sworn in as Martin County Judge Monday afternoon at the Courthouse following the official canvass of votes by the Commissioners Court. The oath of office was administered by County Clerk Doris Stephenson and McCoy's bond was approved by the four commissioners present.

McCoy will fill out the unexpired term of James McMorries who resigned earlier in addition to serving the full term starting January 1. Bruce Frazier, appointed by the commissioners following McMorries' resignation, served until Monday.

McCoy announced the appointment of Mrs. Jack Arrington as assistant county superintendent immediately after taking office. He will serve as ex-officio county school superintendent as well as judge, which is normal in the county.

McCoy, who was born on a ranch near Sonora, moved to Martin County in 1927. He is a veteran peace officer having served as a deputy sheriff, chief of police and city, county and state tax assessor-collector in several West Texas cities. He was chief deputy here for three and one-half years during the terms of Kyle Shoemaker as sheriff.

Mrs. Arrington and McCoy both were employed in the tax office under Sheriff Shoemaker and McCoy stated, in regard to her appointment, "I know she is an efficient and competent worker and I have every confidence in the world in her."

County's 32 Oil Wells May Yield 500,000 Barrels

Martin County's six active oil fields have produced 371,162 barrels of oil during the first seven months of 1954 and at the present rate of production should reach and pass the half-million barrel mark by December 31.

The 371,162 barrels of oil came from 32 wells in the following fields: Block 7 (Devonian), 1; Breedlove, 5; Glass, North (Wolfcamp), 1; Glass (Sprawberry), 5; Glass (Pennsylvanian), 2 and Mabey field, 16 wells.

Teen Canteen Opens Sunday

Stanton parents and other interested area residents will get an opportunity to inspect Stanton's new Teen Canteen Center Sunday during Open House from 2 to 6 p. m. The long-awaited youth center, to be under the personal direction of Mr. and Mrs. June Graham, is located in the building formerly occupied by Riteway Restaurant.

Plans for the permanent establishment of the center and its operation have been worked out over a period of several months by a group of Stanton parents and representatives of high school classes. Funds for the purchase of the new furniture and recreation equipment and for paying the salaries of the hired directors have been pledged by a group of more than 40 interested Stanton men. The center will be open to all Stanton teen-aged youths between the ages of 13 and 19 years.

"Sunday's Open House is being held in order to give all parents an opportunity to see the facilities the center will offer for our youth and an opportunity to discuss with us first-hand, the plans we have made for the program which will be carried on," one of the leaders in the project said. "We urge everyone who has teen-aged children to visit the center and investigate the entire community youth program it will afford," she added.

A number of parents who have been active in the development of the Youth Center will be on hand Sunday to answer questions and outline the aims of the organization. It is expected that the new equipment will be in place for the Open House so that visitors also may see the complete physical facilities.

A set of proposed plans for the organization has been given up for presentation to the center members for their approval.

It's Invisible, Colorless, Tasteless—Deadly!

It stands to reason if you are in your right mind you are not going to deliberately set a trap to snuff out your own life. Yet there are some traps set around you in your home, your office, or your garage, if sprung at the right moment will kill you.

At this time of year the cold winds of winter whip up a new threat to your safety.

The threat comes from carbon monoxide, as reported by Dr. Henry A. Holle, state health officer. He characterizes this gas as being invisible, colorless, and tasteless—but deadly.

Dr. Holle declares many people throughout the state are lighting poorly or faulty ventilated gas stoves and furnaces in their homes or running their cars in closed garages. Closed houses keep out the cold and the deadly fumes in. A few people have lived to tell about it because someone found them before it was too late.

The blaze in a gas heater is turned down to lower the heat effect. Due to haste, carelessness creeps in and takes over. The blaze is out, gas escapes and the room is full of the deadly poison—combustible at the scratch of a match. A life is lost in the burning down of the home.

Driving your car into the garage—leaving the car running behind closed doors permits monoxide gas to form. Minutes pass until another life is snuffed out from breathing the poison gas.

If you always will remember you are flirting with dynamite when you handle gas, and that a careless moment displayed on your part may blow you and home to smithereens, it may help you exercise extra precaution when you go to light a gas stove or a furnace.

"If a person is overcome by carbon monoxide, Dr. Holle advises, they first should be removed to fresh air. In addition open windows and turn off the gas in the room. If the victim has stopped breathing, administer artificial respiration and if possible an inhalator should be used to administer oxygen. Keep the patient warm and lying down until a doctor arrives."

Horses Seem To Be Thing Of Past

In the not too distant past the number of horses found on the farm registered 100 per cent for use as power to pull the plows to till the soil, the binders to harvest the wheat and feed crops, to pull the wagons and buggies, etc. Today, since 1940, the number of trucks on farms has increased 150 per cent, tractors, 200 per cent; grain combines, 400 per cent and corn pickers, 500 per cent. During the same period, the number of horses on the farms has dropped 80 per cent.

That miracle largely is the result of mechanization which is giving agriculture the characteristics of modern industry.

The Stanton Buffaloes won over the Colorado Wolves, 12-7.

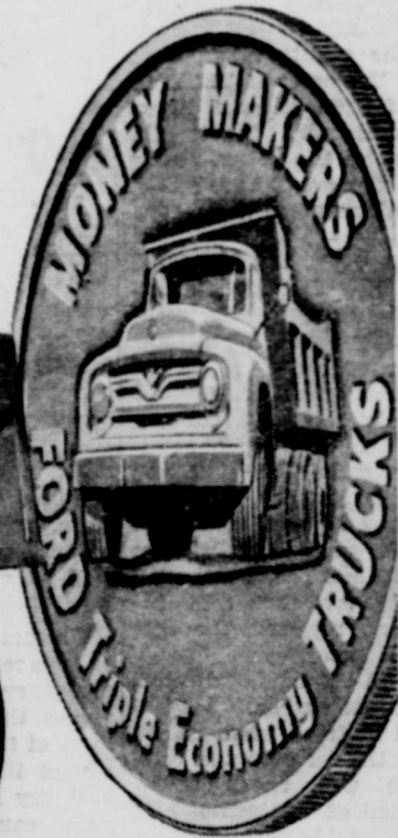
The Post Office receipts for October showed a gain of \$2,091.61 over the receipts for October 1928.

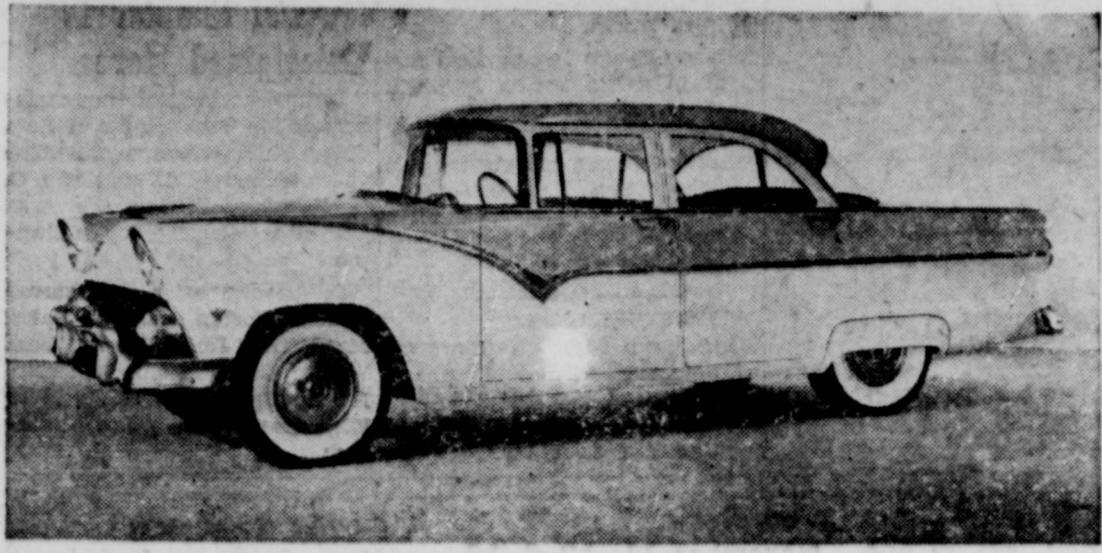

The White Motor Company will open its doors at 8 a.m. Friday for the first local showing of the new Ford for 1955. A number of the various new models being introduced this season by Ford will be on display.

Phillip and B. F. White, owners, have announced that refreshments will be served to visitors during Friday's event. They invite all area residents to visit their showroom and see what Ford has to offer for 1955. New Ford trucks will also be on display.

Ford will introduce an entirely new line—the high-styled Fairlane series—as the leader of its four lines of 1955 passenger cars to be shown in 6400 dealers' showrooms across the nation on Friday (Nov. 12).

Modern styling inspired by Ford's new Thunderbird personal car distinguishes the new Fords. Retaining definite characteristics which have won Ford style leadership, the 1955 Fords also have a wrap-around windshield and a new, lower silhouette. The Crown Victoria—a new model—is the first Ford sedan under five feet in over-all height.

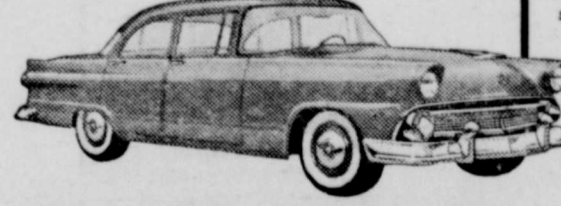

McKaskle intercepted a pass on the Morton 13 following the kickoff and the Buffs were on their way again. Myrick moved the ball four yards and McKaskle put it on the three. Myrick went over for the TD. Henson scored the point on a quarterback sneak. He was injured a few plays later and was forced to sit out the remainder of the game, turning over the "man-under" chores to Blocker.

Bruising play was the order of the day during the third period as both teams battled with all they had. Seemingly good scoring drives were spoiled by fumbles as the ball squirmed here and there due to crushing tackles. Neither team scored during the quarter. Morton showed signs on one sustained drive as Don Waller found the Buffalo middle softening up and hammered it for good yardage. The Buffs were strong enough to hold, however, and came out with their goal line untouched.

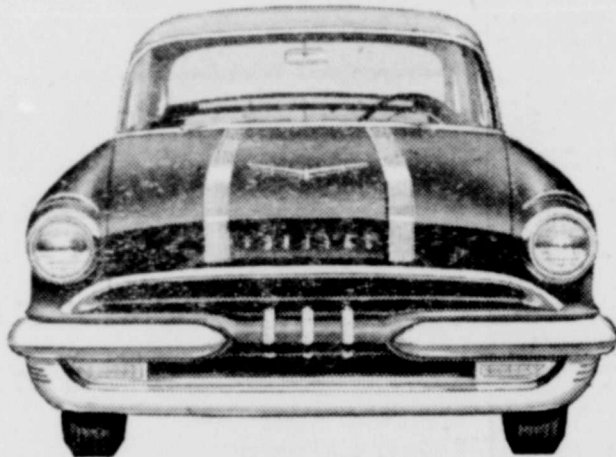

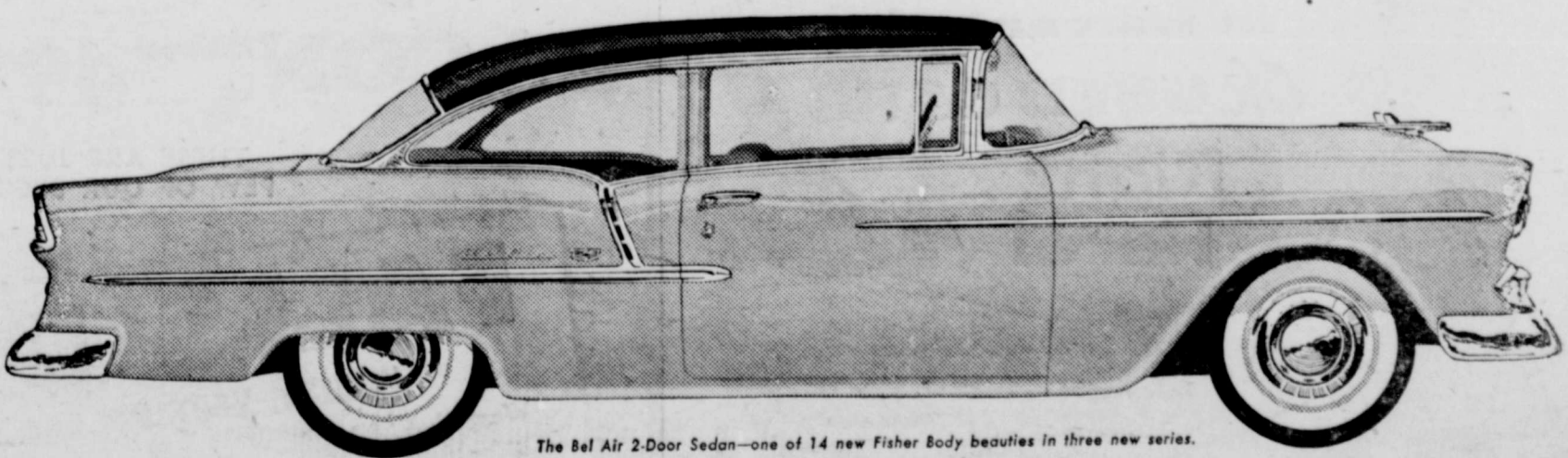
