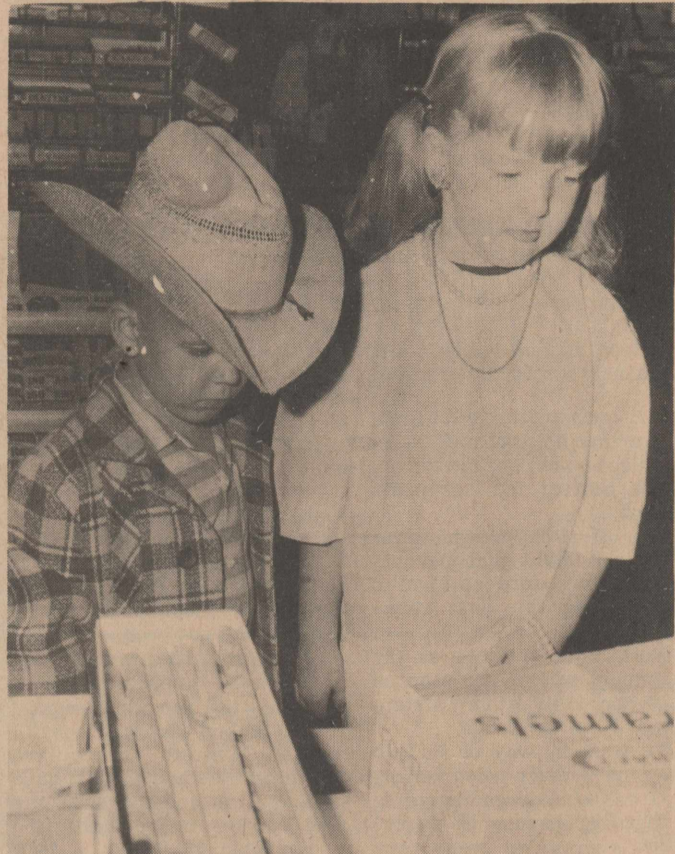

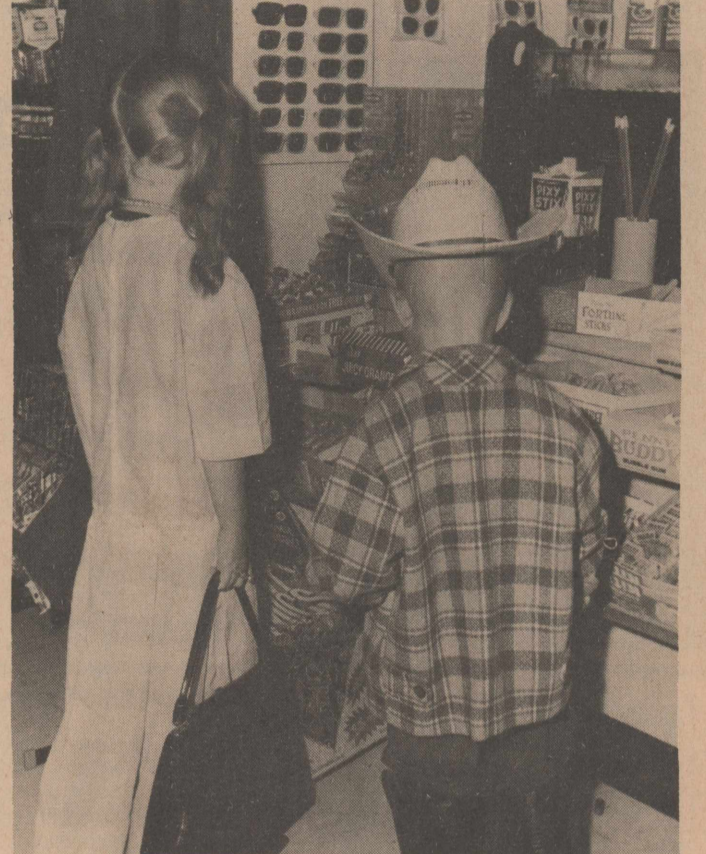

## Hugo Hondequin's Parents Write Of His Experiences

(EDITOR'S NOTE—Hugo Hondequin, Olton foreign exchange student, just recently returned to his home country of Brussels, Belgium. Upon his return, his parents wrote the Ed Thompsons expressing their gratitude for the acceptance of their son. Printed below is the letter.)

Brussel, 25 Juli 1968

Dear Mr. and Mrs. Thompson,

Hugo arrived last Monday morning at the Paris airport in very good health, a little tired after the 3-weeks trip to the East coast and the last night in America passed without going to bed.

We drove to Paris by bus, together with most of the other Belgian parents to welcome the 56 returnees. We arrived in Paris at half past five in the morning. The plane from New York got in at 6.15, but it took until nearly 8 o'clock before we could leave the airport for the way back (in France one must never get in a hurry). We were at home in Brussels at about 5 in the afternoon. It was only an approx. 200 miles drive, but with our narrow and overcrowded European roads, it takes time to get somewhere.

Hugo had been away for exactly 51 weeks from home, he left July 29, 1967 and returned July 22, 1968.

All Belgian and French returnees were together on the plane. The first thing we noticed when the group came out was that AFS and the American host families have really done a fine thing; our young folks were in high spirits, overenthusiastic about their American experience, feeling happy to be back home but far more sorry to know that their stay in the US had already come to its end and much regretting that their American year had passed by so fast.

It looked to us as if it weren't French or Belgian boys and girls we saw coming down the plane, but real Americans, singing American songs, speaking English together and being somewhat at a loss when having to answer questions in French or Dutch. They seemed to have forgotten most of their native tongue. So is Hugo. Since his arrival, he didn't stop telling us about Olton, the school, the community and his American family. But he has lots of difficulties in finding Dutch words and Dutch sentences to explain what he means, so he turns over to English (with a Texas accent as he says - and he is proud about it - which accent he even keeps when speaking Dutch). He is not likely to forget ever the wonderful time he was allowed to stay with you.

We too, dear Mr. and Mrs. Thompson, must thank you very sincerely for all you have done for our boy. We learned from his letters and from what he is telling us now, how friendly and heartily you treated him as a real member of the family and how much he felt at home with you.

We are also grateful towards the Olton community that received our son with open arms and did so much to make his stay in the U. S. a most interesting and learnful one.

We hope to have some day the pleasure of meeting you in Belgium, and should be very happy to welcome you at our home in Brussels. We should be delighted if Barry could pass his next summer holidays with us.

## Long Distance Phone Rates Reduced On Daytime Calls

A reduction of long distance rates goes into effect for General Telephone Company of the Southwest customers August 1 as a result of the recent ruling by the Federal Communications Commission which ordered the American Telephone and Telegraph Company to reduce interstate long distance rates by \$20,000,000 annually.

The reductions will be 5 to 10¢ from the charge for the first three minutes on daytime weekday station-to-station calls. These are calls placed between 7 a. m. and 5 p. m. Monday through Friday.

This is the 23rd time interstate rates have been cut since coast to coast service began in 1915. During that time, the cost of transcontinental calls has dropped to as little as \$7.5 (station-to-station between midnight and 7 a. m.) from \$20.70 in 1915.

Long distance rates have been cut in half since 1945 in contrast to 77 per cent rise in the consumer price index.

The 1968 graduate and defensive tackle for the Mustangs will be a member of the West Team. Buddy Fornes, head coach of McMurry College, will coach the West squad. He will be assisted by Ronnie Giles, also of McMurry.

The grid classic will begin at 8:30 p. m. Saturday, Aug. 10 in Fair Park Stadium. Pre-game ceremonies featuring the presentation of the Greenbelt Queen nominees is slated for 7:30 p. m.

The Southern Water Resources Conference is affiliated with the Council of State Governments and Interstate Conference on Water Problems.

Barnes said the conference is especially important to Texas because much of its business will be devoted to assessing and meeting water needs of the future and maintaining water quality, both of which are becoming of major concern to the state.

## TAC Considering Olton For Funds

Olton is one of three area towns seeking funds from the state airport grant program. The three projects have been proposed to the Texas Aeronautics Commission.

For the coming year \$1 million in funds is available and TAC will meet Sept. 3 to determine where the funds will go. The funds must be matched equally by local sources.

At present 79 applications for grants totaling \$1,551,806 have been filed. There is no hard and fast deadline for applications, according to TAC Chief Engineer W. O. Kerpenko.

Funds are used for lengthening runways, patching runways, constructing taxiways and lighting runways and taxiways. Olton is requesting \$27,500.

Pendergrass announced that the annual invitational golf tournament will be held Aug. 9, 10, and 11 with entries being accepted until 8 p. m. Aug. 8.



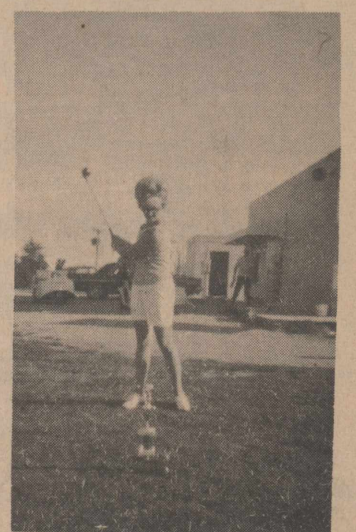

When we stopped, needless to say I took the wheel again.

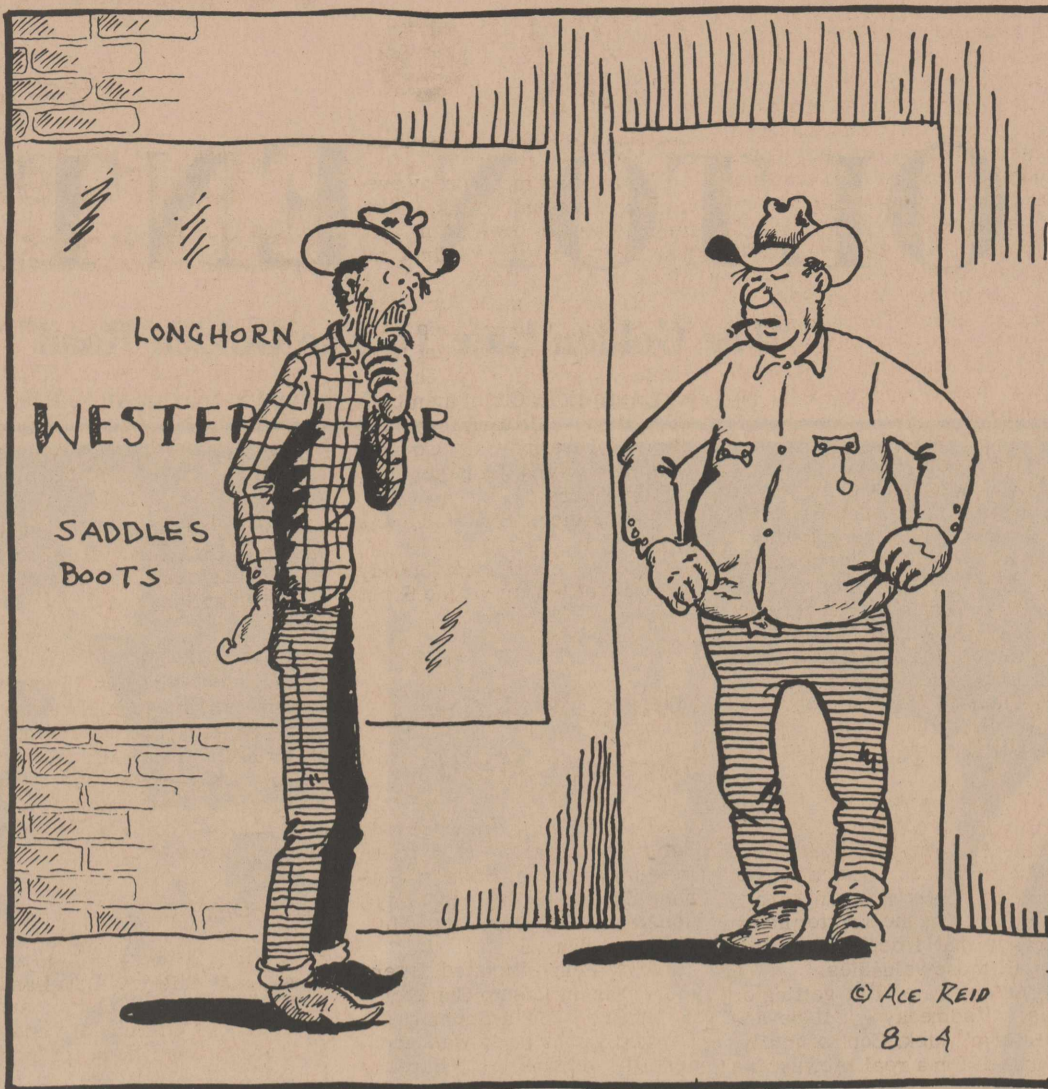
But I didn't keep it long, I thought, "I had to learn to drive and these kids are going to have to learn too and the only way they can -- is by doing it!"

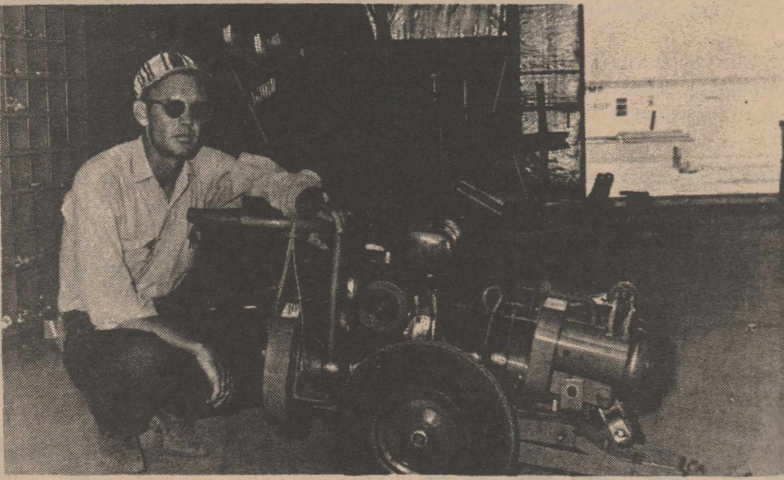

## PUBLIC NOTICE

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (SJR32)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 1-e to read as follows:

"Section 1-e. "1. From and after December 31, 1978, no State ad valorem taxes shall be levied upon any property within this State for State purposes except the tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, for certain institutions of higher learning.

"2. The State ad valorem tax authorized by Article VII, Section 3, of this Constitution shall be imposed at the following rates on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation for the years 1968 through 1974: on January 1, 1968, Thirty-five Cents (35¢); on January 1, 1969, Thirty Cents (30¢); on January 1, 1970, Twenty-five Cents (25¢); on January 1, 1971, Twenty Cents (20¢); on January 1, 1972, Fifteen Cents (15¢); on January 1, 1973, Ten Cents (10¢); on January 1, 1974, Five Cents (5¢); and thereafter no such tax for school purposes shall be levied and collected. An amount sufficient to provide free text books for the use of children attending the public free schools of this State shall be set aside from any revenues deposited in the Available School Fund, provided, however, that should such funds be insufficient, the deficit may be met by appropriation from the general funds of the State.

"3. The State ad valorem tax of Two Cents (2¢) on the One Hundred Dollars valuation levied by Article VII, Section 17, of this Constitution shall not be levied after December 31, 1976. At any time prior to December 31, 1976, the Legislature may establish a trust fund solely for the benefit of the widows of Confederate veterans and such Texas Rangers and their widows as are eligible for retirement or disability pensions under the provisions of Article XVI, Section 66, of this Constitution, and after such fund is established the ad valorem tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, shall not thereafter be levied.

"4. Unless otherwise provided by the Legislature, after December 31, 1976 all delinquent State ad valorem taxes together with penalties and interest thereon, less lawful costs of collection, shall be used to secure bonds issued for permanent improvements at institutions of higher learning, as authorized by Article VII, Section 17, of this Constitution.

"5. The fees paid by the State for both assessing and collecting State ad valorem taxes shall not exceed two per cent (2%) of the State taxes collected. This subsection shall be self-executing."

Sec. 2. That Article III, Section 51, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 51. The Legislature shall have no power to make any grant or authorize the making of any grant of public moneys to any individual, association of individuals, municipal or other corporations whatsoever; provided, however, the Legislature may grant aid to indigent and disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors under such regulations and limitations as may be deemed by the Legislature as expedient, and to their widows in indigent circumstances under such regulations and limitations as may be deemed by the Legislature as expedient; provided that the provisions of this Section shall not be construed so as to prevent the grant of aid in cases of public calamity."

Sec. 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment continuously reducing State ad valorem property taxes and abolishing all State ad valorem property taxes after December 31, 1978, except the tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, for certain institutions of higher learning.

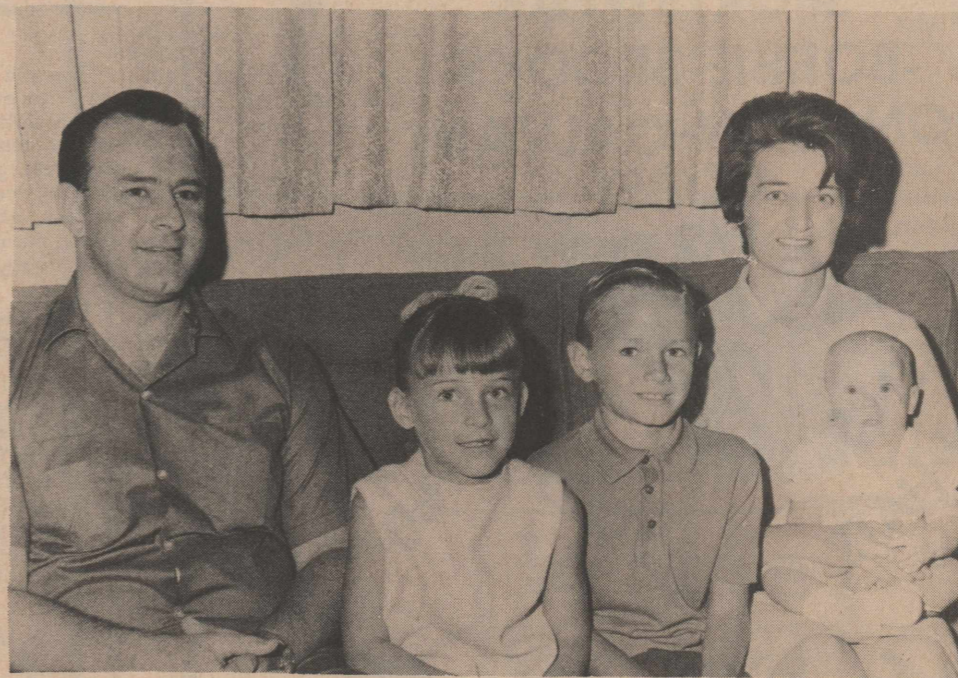

**Green Thumb Tips**

If you had trouble in your last year's garden with the diseases called aster "yellows" or aster "wilt", there are several things you can do to prevent trouble this year.

The first is to plant aster seeds where no asters have been grown before. The second is to buy seeds of a wilt-resistant variety (stated in catalog and on packet).

The third is to spray the asters with Sevin once a week to kill the leaf hoppers which spread aster yellows from one plant to another.

Do you know that there is a bi-color corn with some kernels yellow and some white? One variety is named Butter and Sugar: is of super eating quality. Just think how this corn will confuse your neighbors!

Failures with zinnias, one of the easiest flowers to grow, are almost always due to sowing the seeds too early. Zinnia seeds rot when soil is cool and damp. Wait until soil is warm, then sow the seeds where the flowers are to bloom, thinning later and transplanting the thinned plants if you wish.

Those dome-shaped paper caps or their larger sized counterparts are the perfect covers for seeds of early crops. A pinch of cabbage seeds scattered over an area small enough to be covered by 1 cap, then covered, will produce transplanting-size seedlings promptly.

Set a cap over each plant after transplanting and hurry the crop along.

**PUBLIC NOTICE**  
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOURTEEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR22)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of Texas, Article III, be and the same is hereby amended by deleting therefrom Section 18, and substituting in lieu thereof the following:

"Section 18. No Senator or Representative shall, during the term for which he was elected, be eligible to (1) any civil office of profit under this State which shall have been created, or the emoluments of which may have been increased, during such term, or (2) any office or place, the appointment to which may be made, in whole or in part, by either branch of the Legislature; provided, however, the fact that the term of office of Senators and Representatives does not end precisely on the last day of December but extends a few days into January of the succeeding year shall be considered as de minimis, and the ineligibility hereof created shall terminate on the last day in December of the last full calendar year of the term for which he was elected. No member of either House shall vote for any other member, which may be filled by a vote

of the Legislature, except in such cases as are in this Constitution provided, nor shall any member of the Legislature be interested, either directly or indirectly, in any contract with the State, or any county thereof, authorized by any law passed during the term for which he was elected."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state, at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices."  
"AGAINST the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices."

If it appears from the returns of such election that a majority of the votes cast therein are for such amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of Texas.

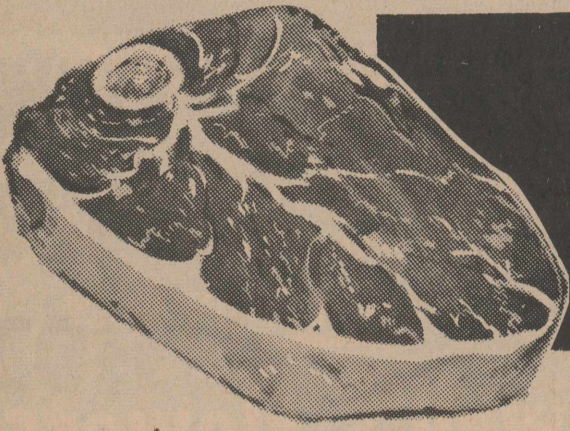
