Eagles Hold Place in District By Defeat of Alpine Bucks 26-0

The Sanderson Eagles are holding their place in district competition by the defeat of the Alpine Bucks 26-0 on the local field last Friday night. This is the second defeat of Alpine by the local squad this year.

The Eagles definitely proved their ability against the Bucks in all phases of play. In the second quarter Frank Harrell made the first touchdown for Eagles, and conversion was good. Then on a quick repeat Joe Russell carried the pigskin over for the second tally during the same period. Attempt at conversion failed ending the half 13-0.

Both sides were scoreless in the third quarter, but the heat was turned on again in the last period by the Eagles and they scored thirteen more points.

These scores were by Russell on a pass and by Bob Dishman on an off-tackle run. The extra point was converted after the first touchdown in this period, but failed after the second.

Sanderson made 10 first downs to the Bucks' 7; penetrations, Sanderson 7, Alpine 2; passes attempted and completed Sanderson 7-2, Alpine 8-1; penalties, Sanderson 80 yards, Alpine 10 yards.

The Eagle offensive and defensive ability is showing increased improvement each game and is being proven on the grid each week. Their T formation is clicking very nicely, and a lot of deception is evidenced.

During the game and between halves the fans were treated to music by the Eagle Band under the direction of W. H. McCullar. Their specialty number at the half was "I'm Forever Blowing Bubbles" being played with the lights out amid a mass of bubbles released by the band.

Tonight the Eagles go to Port Stockton to meet the Panthers on their home field. Sanderson has a slight edge on Stockton in games won and are favored to win the game.

Large Block Lease Includes 8,000 Acres In Terrell County

A block of approximately 108,000 acres in Crockett and Terrell Counties has been leased by John W. Hampton of Wichita Falls and others, who plan to wildcat as soon as titles are passed, according to reports this week.

W. J. Green, of San Angelo, and associates are understood to have an interest in the block. Bonuses paid were unreported but the ten-year commercial oil and gas leases provide annual rental of 50 cents an acre.

Hampton and others leased around 35,000 acres in Crockett County and 8,000 acres in Terrell County from John Mitchell, approximately 44,000 acres in Crockett from Mrs. Laura Hoover estate and about 18,000 acres in Crockett from Mrs. Myrtle Hoover Mitchell. The estate of Mrs. Laura Hoover includes the Armond Hoover, W. P. Hoover, Kinser and Holms-ly lands in the southwest corner of Crockett County. These holdings and the John Mitchell ranch extend into the north of Val Verde County.

Funeral Services For N. C. Rogers Wednesday P. M.

After an illness of a few days, Nicholas Clyde Rogers died Monday morning at the home of his son, Charlie Rogers, in Sanderson. Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon at the Church of Christ with Wayne Harrell, of Carrizo Springs, a former pastor, officiating. Burial was in Cedar Grove Cemetery with arrangements in charge of O. T. Suduth and Co.

Mr. Rogers was born in Waxahachie, Texas, June 15, 1860, and spent his boyhood and young manhood in that area. In 1885 he married Miss Dotla Bosworth, of Lampasas, and the couple lived in the Sheffield and San Angelo country until 1918. Mr. Rogers being in the ranching business. After moving here in 1918 Mr. Rogers retired from active work. Mrs. Rogers died February 28, 1930, and Mr. Rogers made his home with a son here.

Four children were born to the couple. A daughter, Maude, died in childhood and the other daughter, Frankie, died here on November 11, 1918. Another son, Clarence, lives in Los Angeles and arrived Wednesday morning to attend the funeral services.

Other survivors include a brother, Claude Rogers, of Sulphur Springs, Texas, and two sisters. Also three grandchildren, Charles and Harvey Rogers, of Sanderson, and Lorraine Rogers, of Los Angeles, Calif.

Local Men Have Successful Elk Hunt in Colorado

Gene Thorn and J. J. Whistler have returned from a very successful elk hunt at Creede, Colo. They left Sanderson October 3 and joined a party of five hunters at Santa Fe, N. M., for the trip to the scene of the hunt. Seven elk were bagged by the party.

The camp site was at a 9,000-foot elevation where the party experienced all sorts of disagreeable weather, including rain and snow. For two days the party was forced to remain in camp on account of heavy snow.

According to the law a hunter may kill either a bull, cow or calf elk. Mr. Thorn chose to kill a calf and was fortunate in getting his lucky shot the first day. The calf dressed 250 pounds.

Mr. Whistler did not get the large bull that he was hunting until the fourth day when he brought down an 850 pounder with a large spread of antlers, four points on each side. The bull was found on the head of the Rio Grande at an elevation of about 14,000 feet. The shot that brought him down was from a 270 rifle with telescopic sight at a range of from 500 to 600 yards, according to Mr. Whistler.

While in Santa Fe the party visited at the Museum of Natural History. This is the oldest public building in the United States, having been ordered built by the Spanish government in 1612.

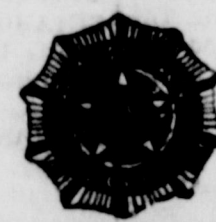

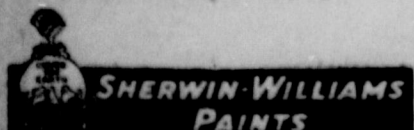

Terrell County taxpayers again have an opportunity to save up to 3 percent on their 1947 tax bills by prompt payment. As in the past years, a graduated discount schedule will be in effect on county, school and state taxes this year.

Except on poll taxes, on which no discount is allowed, the following discount schedule will be in effect during the tax paying period:

3 Percent Discount if Paid in October

2 Percent Discount if Paid in November

1 Percent Discount if Paid in December

Taxes paid during the month of January earn no discount and become delinquent after February 1, 1948.

No Discount on Poll Taxes

We've Come a Long Way from the Longhorns



Longhorns by the millions ranging the western grasslands from the Gulf Coast to Montana . . . building empires . . . making history and legend on the great cattle trails! That was sixty and more years ago. Then the railroads came, much of the range was fenced and the fate of the longhorn was sealed. Short-horn, Angus and Hereford bulls came in from the east. Gradually, the longhorns were bred out of existence, until today only a few isolated "museum" herds are left.

This is one story of continuing livestock progress, of better animals developed to meet changing conditions and needs. Who knows but that in another fifty years today's "best" may look as old fashioned as longhorns do now.

With hogs, one amazing change is in the increased speed and efficiency of producing pork. Three years ago was needed to raise a hog to market weight. Today, pigs often weigh 200 to 250 pounds at six months or less. Straight line and cross-bred breeding experiments seek even more efficient hogs to make weight in the same short time, but produce more meat.

In lambs, development is directed toward "dual-purpose" breeds. Certain breeds have been best for wool but not best for meat. Others produced the meat but were lacking in wool. Researchers have made progress on breeds of lambs to produce both meat and good wool economically.

A first step in the improvement of any animals or any herd is to use proven sires on dams of known productive ability. The eye alone is not enough. To know production records and ancestry is vital. Bull grading programs offer greater certainty in choosing a sire. Weighing young animals at weaning time and marking them is important, especially in the selection of gilts. A "touch system" of sheep grading is proving helpful in culling large bands in little time.

Martha Logan's Recipe for UPSIDE DOWN CHILI PIE

(Yields 6 servings)

1 pound ground beef	1/4 teaspoon chili powder
1/2 cup chopped onion	1/2 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon shortening	1 teaspoon Worcestershire Sauce
1 cup cooked kidney beans	1 cup cooked tomatoes

Sauté meat and onion in melted shortening. Add beans, seasonings, and tomatoes. Cover. Simmer gently about 15 minutes. Pour into a greased 9-inch pie plate. Top with corn bread batter. Bake in a hot oven (425 degrees F.) for 20 minutes.

Corn bread

1/2 cup sifted flour	1 tablespoon sugar
3/4 cup yellow corn meal	1 beaten egg
2 teaspoons baking powder	1/2 cup milk
1 teaspoon salt	2 tablespoons melted shortening

Mix and sift dry ingredients. Combine egg and milk. Add to flour mixture, stirring until well mixed. Stir in shortening. Pour over chili in pie plate.

Packers do not make livestock prices

A great deal of the increase in production of agricultural products has resulted from specialization. Farmers have increased in size. Proportionately, the amount of labor needed has decreased, allowing more labor for use in other ways.

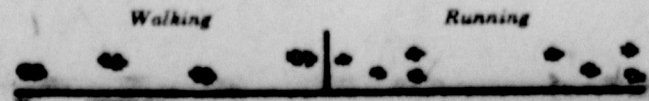

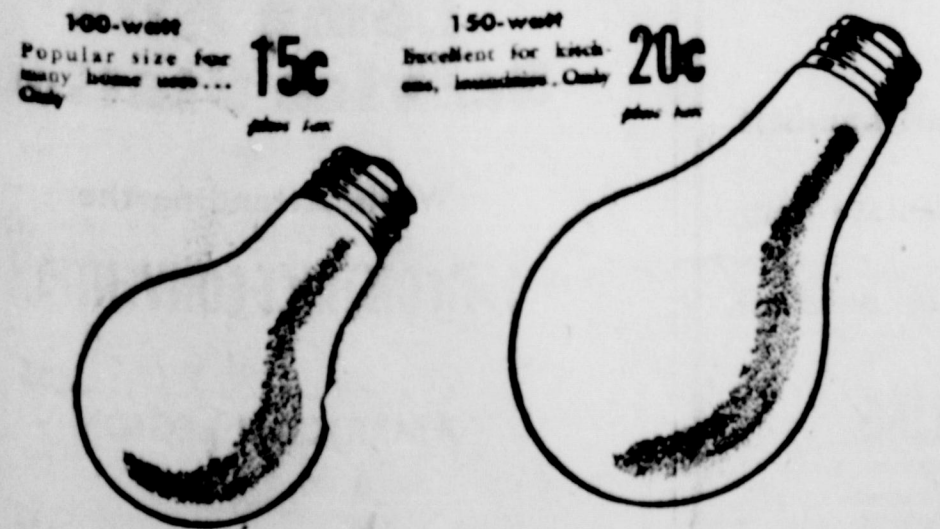
