H. D. Hord Ships First Wheat From County Saturday

H. D. Hord, who lives between Spur and Dickens, shipped the first wheat out of the county last week.

The wheat was shipped to Lubbock in a Santa Fe car and contained two thousand bushels. It was the first carload of wheat to be received in Lubbock. The wheat was shipped by Wood and Moody Grain Company, Crosbyton for storage in Burrus elevators.

The wheat produced on the Hord farm tested 61.8 pounds per bushel, with moisture content of 12.3 percent, said Raymond Anthis, chief inspector of Lubbock Grain exchange. It was classified as No. 1 dark hard winter wheat. The pounds per bushel is about the average for the last year or two. No. 1 wheat must weigh 60 pounds per bushel.

Hord has another 1,000 bushels of wheat in storage at Crosbyton, and that amount will be held there until sufficient has been received to fill a box car. Harvesting was delayed on the Hord farm by rain and still more is to be harvested.

Other wheat acreage is expected to be good. Construction of storage space for wheat has been urged by county agent Chas. Taylor. The wheat loan price for Dickens county has been set at 1.87 per bushel for this year.

TEXAS VOTERS FAVOR ANNUAL LEGISLATURE SESSION, POLL SHOWS

AUSTIN, Texas, June 9 — A large majority of Texas voters believes the Legislature should hold another session, according to the latest statewide survey by The Texas Poll.

The poll shows, however, that almost half of the voters think the lawmakers now have a regular session every year. Only two out of every ten realize that regular sessions come once every two years.

Qualified voters, as a group, are only slightly better informed than the general adult public.

These findings are based on a survey in which the following questions were put to a cross section of the adult population:

The city clean-up campaign extends thru Monday, and all persons are urged to take care of their premises. Especially are vacant lot owners asked to clear the debris, weeds and grass from their lots. City trucks will make the round next week to pick-up all trash, grass, etc.

SPUR JUBILEE PROCLAIMED BIG SUCCESS BY OFFICIALS

The Third Annual Spur Cowboy Jubilee closed with a bang Saturday night, June 4, and officials of the show proclaimed it the best show ever staged in West Texas.

The show was well attended during the four performances, despite threatening weather on the opening night. Prize monies totaling over \$2500 was distributed to the winners in all contests Saturday night.

Top honors for roping went to Slinging Sammy Baugh, Rotan rancher and Washington Redskins Professional football player. Baugh with a time of 89.3 for four calves, two in calf roping and two in doubt mugging, was winner of the special prize of a saddle presented by the Emery, Swenson and Neustadt interests. Baugh's best time, and the best time for the show, was 12.3 in calf roping. His nearest rival was Floyd Lamond with 13.5, followed by Jimmie Byrd, 16.0 and Alton Clark 16.3.

In the double mugging event Baugh again was tops with 21.5 followed by Murray Rogers, 22.0; Bobby Byrd 28.2 and Buck Thompson with 31.4.

The riding events, the Cisco Kid from Petrolia, Texas, tied A. G. Olre of Wichita Falls for top honors. This included bareback riding, bull riding and steer riding.

The Old-Timers Roping contest brought the crowd to their feet with cheers for these fellows over 55 years of age. Al Bingham, Spur, was declared winner in this event with a time of 65.9. Bob Westerman was second with 66.4. In the Cutting Horse contest, 1st place went to Berry Hart of Spur, second to J. B. Baidree of Jayton and third to R. O. Senisbaugh of Benjamin.

The Girls Sponsor contest drew lots of interest and top honors both for Champion Cowgirl of West Texas and best cowgirl of Dickens County went to Miss Barbara Speers of Dickens. Sadie Smith of Odell representing Gail, Texas, was second; Vera Mae Blackwell riding for the Bradley Ranch, third; Juanita Ward, riding for the City of Floydada fourth and Mrs. Shortie Freeman riding for the City of Electra was fifth.

The show opened with a grand parade downtown and moved to its arena where an afternoon performance was staged. Over 75 contestants took part in the three days event.

President Eric Swenson of the Cowboy Jubilee and other Directors of the show, was high in praise of the sportsmanship shown by all contestants during the event.

Judges for the show were: Johnny Koonsman, Crane Snyder, Bob McAtwee, Rusty Whitlock and Slim Mettew. Mrs. Bob Simmons was hostess and Judy Hayes co-hostess for the Girls Sponsor contest.

Ground Storage Of Wheat Given Okay For Loans

The government Tuesday rushed into the battle against \$1 or lower wheat.

They told Texas wheat growers that they could get 75 per cent of parity loans on wheat they left on the ground for up to ninety days. The balance could be collected when the wheat was placed in approved types of storage on the farm.

The governmental program was announced as threats were raised through the Texas and Oklahoma wheat belts that the grain would be selling for \$1 or lower in a very short time because of inadequate storage facilities. Government crop loans could not be extended unless wheat was stored.

Sunday School Lesson

JESUS DEATH AND BURIAL
International Sunday School Lesson for June 12, 1949

MEMORY SELECTION: "I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep.—John 10: 11.
Lesson Text: Luke 23: 33-38, 46.
Mark 15: 24, Matthew 27: 57-60
Symbolically washing his hands, Pilate allowed the Jews to proceed with the killing of Jesus. No one knows for certain the exact loca-

tion of the scene of the Crucifixion. Calvary, or Golgotha, meaning "The Skull" was either north-west of Jerusalem, in the present Christian quarter, where stands the church of The Holy Sepulchre, or north, outside of the Damascus gates, beyond the present Mohammedan quarter. The former is the traditional site and "five religious sects are rivals in conducting services and caring for it."
Two thieves were crucified

along with Jesus. One reviled him for not rescuing them all from their fate, but the other recognized the goodness of Jesus and rebuked his companion, calling attention to the fact that they, at least, deserved their fate while Jesus was innocent. This thief asked Jesus to remember him in his kingdom and Jesus promised him that he would be with him in Paradise. No one reading the gospel account of this solemn scene can fail to be moved by a conviction of its sincerity.
Hanging on the cross and enduring the torture of the crucifixion, mocked and ridiculed by the soldiers and his Jewish enemies, Jesus seven times spoke, ac-

cording to the gospel records. First, it was a plea for the forgiveness of his murderers. Then, his promise to the suppliant robber. Third, he commended his mother to John. Fourth he asked God why had he forsaken him. Fifth, an expression of physical agony, "thirst." Sixth, a word of success, that his task had been completed. Last, it was a solemn commitment of his spirit into the hands of his Father.

Matthew tells us that, when evening was come, Joseph, a rich man from Armathea, who "also was Jesus' disciple," went to Pilate and asked permission to take the body of Jesus down from the cross and bury it. Pilate gave his consent and Joseph took the body and wrapped it in a clean linen cloth and laid it in his own tomb, which had been hewn from a rock in the hillside and in which no body had ever been laid before in order to protect it from prowling animals. A huge stone was rolled up to the door of the tomb and then Joseph departed.

And an account tells us that the Jews, fearful lest the disciples of Jesus would come in the night and steal the body and then claim that he had fulfilled his prophecy of rising from the dead, went to Pilate and asked for an official seal to be placed on the tomb and Roman soldiers to guard the entrance. Pilate consented and this was done.

We are reminded that there is danger of our reading about the wonder of Jesus' life and the terrible of his death, without paying any heed to the truth that he is living and dying as he did, he laid demands upon us of loyalty to him, of faithful following of his way of the cross. Christian living is beautiful, but it is difficult as well, and requires the walking of hard roads at times, and the sacrificing for others of much that is dear to us.

When the way gets too difficult for us, let us remember the words of John 3:16: "For God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten Son that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have eternal life."

Texas 4-H Clubs Convene For 2 Days

COLLEGE STATION, June 9.—Texas 4-H club boys and girls who attend the annual 4-H Club Round-Up at College Station June 14-15 will have a full two days of instruction and entertainment.

M. L. Wilson, director of the federal extension service, Washington, D. C., and Durewood Mansford, speaker of the Texas House of Representatives, are scheduled on the first morning program. Group singing—always an im-

portant part of the Round-Up program—will be led this year by Billy Triggs, minister of music, First Methodist Church, Wichita Falls, accompanied by his wife.

Earline Gandy, editor of the young folks department, Progressive Farmer, will speak to the 4-H club girls and their adult leaders in the afternoon of the 14th. Her subject will be "Ideas for Older Girls in 4-H Clubs." Later in the afternoon, the girls will break up into groups to see demonstrations led by various extension specialists.

During the same afternoon, the boys and their leaders will make a tour of the campus and swim in Downs Natatorium.

The night program will be a Glenn McCarthy Production featuring 4-H club work.

The morning of the second day, the group will hear reports from Reta Neil Baldwin, Wilbarger county delegate to the National 4-H Camp in 1948; Jessie Lou Boyer, Tarrant county, who attended the Danforth leadership training camp; Alvin C. Davis, Garza county, a Texas delegate to the National 4-H Club Congress, and Roy Hranicky, Jim Wells county, who spent the summer of 1948 in the Netherlands as a member of the International Farm Youth Exchange Project.

A 4-H Talent program will end the morning's session, and the afternoon will be taken up by demonstrations led by extension specialists.

The Round-Up will end with the State 4-H Dress Revue in Guion Hall, and the presentation of awards.

Colorful Highway Map of Texas Off Press This Week

The 1949 Texas Highway Map is off the presses ready for free distribution by the Texas Highway Department. Showing 31,000 miles of roads, the map is illustrated with drawings and 30 full color pictures.

A panel is devoted this year to travel attractions in Mexico on the Pan-American Highway, with particular attention given to prehistoric ruins. This highway, which dissects Texas, north to south, now runs to Tuxtla, almost in Central America. Texas will be the gateway state in future travel on this international road.

Complete mileage tables of comparative distances between Texas cities and between state capitals outside of Texas to border points in Texas are given. Mileages

from Laredo south to points on the Pan American Highway are included. A United States road map, showing major national highways, is on the back of the Texas map.



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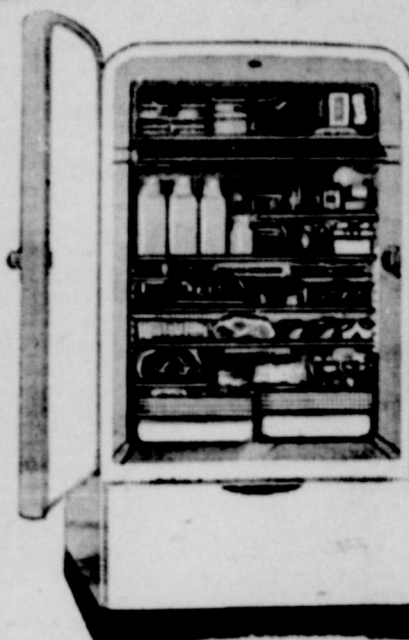
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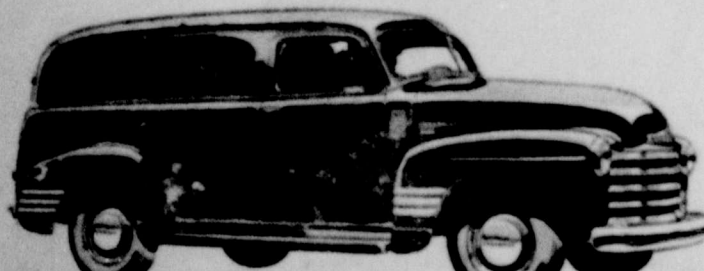
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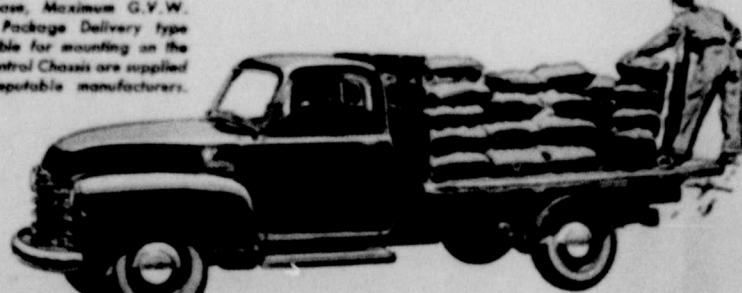

Accident Survey Released by DPS

Accident prevention is everybody's responsibility and important to every one because "it's a life-and-death matter."

This admonition is in a booklet on Texas traffic accidents for 1948 compiled in the State Department of Public Safety and analyzed by Col. Homer Garrison, director.

In addition to cold figures of traffic fatalities and losses the report carries drawings and charts to tell of the terrible consequences. One table, illustrated in red, is titled "death calendar" in motor vehicle traffic.

Another drawing with rows of little black crosses is impressive and encouraging. It shows that number of persons killed in traffic accidents per hundred million vehicle miles dropped from 14.6 in 1937 to 8.3 in 1948. It was next to lowest. A war year, 1942, was low with 8.2.

Garrison's goal for 1949 is having less than 1948 deaths. There were 2,059 in 1948, with 60,000 persons injured. Deaths are only 3 per cent below last year and Garrison seeks a drop of at least 6 per cent to meet the goal.

Efforts of civic groups and governmental agencies have reduced accidents saving six lives for every hundred million vehicle miles. Without their work there would have been 1,566 more deaths in 1948 or a total of 3,626.

Public Safety Department received 33,243 accident reports in 1948.

They showed that: Picnics, fishing and vacation trips along with inexperienced rural driving are the killers.

Persons between 20 and 24 years of age are involved in one fifth of the accidents. Garrison admonished them to "carefully look over your driving habits."

There were only seven deathless days out of the 365 day so of 1948.

Forty per cent of rural accidents occurred on Saturday and Sunday. A total of 1,495 deaths

occurred on rural highways last year or 73 per cent of the statewide total.

Fifty-one per cent of fatal accidents occurred at night.

In four out of every ten rural fatal accidents a driver had been drinking. In nonfatal accidents only two out of ten had been drinking. "If you are drinking, keep out of traffic," Garrison warned.

Garrison insists that most accidents are preventable. He says: "Accidents don't just happen. They are caused."

"With the possible exception of accidents caused by mechanical failure, causative factors can be found in every accident. In every

accident involving vehicles traveling in opposite directions, at least one of the vehicles had to be on the wrong side of the road. Every intersection accident between two vehicles involves either a right of way, stop sign, or signal light violation. Rear-end accidents involve either speed, light or following too closely."

Extension Head Warns About Ticks

COLLEGE STATION, June.—Tick season renews the danger of Rocky Mountain spotted fever over most of the United States east of the Rocky Mountains, warns James A. Deer, assistant extension entomologist of Texas A. & M. College. The disease is serious and is transmitted to humans by the American dog tick — also known as the wood tick. Serious illness and deaths from the disease are reported each season, particularly deaths of children.

Deer warns that any tick may be a carrier but most of them are not. Ticks do not have to move from a dog to a human to transmit the infection, but dogs that range through tick infested fields are likely to bring home ticks that will then transfer to humans. Measures should be followed that will control or better still eliminate the carrier of the disease.

DDT has proved an effective control for ticks, and Deer recommends a thorough dusting of

grass, weeds, and shrubs in backyards and other areas where children play. One early season dusting is usually sufficient, but a second should be applied if ticks reappear. Dusting should be done at the rate of 10 ounces of 10 percent DDT dust per 1,000 square feet, says Deer, or approximately 30 pounds per acre. At this rate, the dust is not a health hazard to children nor pets.

Tick inspection should follow outings where children or adult may be exposed to ticks. If found, ticks should be removed with tweezers, not with the fingers. It's a good idea, says Deer, to dust or dip the dog if he is picking up ticks. Dust him with a 10 percent DDT powder or bathe him in a dip made by mixing two ounces of kerosene or rotenone with one ounce of neutral soap. In a gallon of warm water.

New School Bills Put Texas In Top Ten In Education

AUSTIN, Texas, June 9.—Texas will soon be among the top ten states in education.

Enactment of the three Gilmer-Alkin bills into law provides the vehicle by which the state will climb from its low rank, it was declared here today by Charles H. Tennyson, public relations director of the Texas State Teachers Association. The organization led the lengthy legislative battle for re-organization of the public school system.

"These measures pave the way for more classrooms and more and better teachers, as well as providing for more equitable distribution of the cost and revising the top-level administration," Tennyson declared.

"Our children will receive a better education," he said, "as a result our state will benefit."

Tennyson pointed out that schools which fail to meet the minimum requirements of teachers' and administrators' salaries will not only fail to receive state aid provided in the laws other than the per capita apportionment, but will be dropped from the accredited list.

There are now 12,500 teachers, principals and superintendents in the public school system.

"The new laws pave the way for the addition of 1,500 teachers as soon as physical facilities can be made available."

"This will relieve much of the classroom congestion which has made for sub-standard education in many of our schools."

The new salary scale for teachers and administrators will do two things to provide Texas with a superior educational system, Tennyson also pointed out.

"Texas will be much more attractive to outstanding teachers from all parts of the country," he said. "Too, the additional pay teachers can get for holding masters degrees will send thousands of them to school to get the higher degree. The greatest enrollment in many years is expected by most Texas colleges and universities this summer in their graduate divisions."

The minimum salary for teachers holding bachelors degrees was increased from \$2,000 to \$2,400 annually. Under the new bills, they get \$54 a year additional for the first twelve years of teaching. That makes a maximum salary of \$3,051. The old ceiling was \$2,655.

Teachers holding masters degrees will have a minimum salary of \$2,628. The minimum was \$2,232. Their credit of \$54 a year additional for each year of teaching experience now continues for twenty-six years instead of twelve. That makes a maximum salary of \$4,092.

In addition, the law was revised to allow school districts to supplement the salary scale set by

law. Under old statutes, districts receiving rural, or equalization aid, were forbidden to add to the specified salaries. Furthermore, districts may employ more teachers than allotted under the law if they desire to do so.

Texas Business Shows Decline

The decline that has been under way for the last six months continued in most segments of Texas business during April, although consumer spending increased rather sharply for the first month, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

As a result of the rise in department and apparel stores, the Bureau's index of Texas business edged up 1 per cent to 219 per cent of the 1935-39 base. The April index was 2 per cent above April 1948. The level of general business has been declining gradually since August of last year when the index stood at 233.

Dr. John R. Stockton, Bureau statisticians, said the downward trend of Texas business parallels the readjustment that has been taking place in business activity in the United States. Both the value of production and the level of prices have continued to decline, with the result that the total value of the nation's output of goods and services declined from \$265 billion in the last quarter of 1948 to \$256 billion in the first quarter of 1949. Although this decline had been overshadowed in the latter part of 1948 his decline had been foreshadowed in the latter part of 1948 when inflationary pressures began to ease, the decline in the first quarter of 1949 was the first important drop since the reconversion period ended early in 1946.

Retail sales in Texas during April were 4 per cent greater than in March, but 3 per cent below April 1948. Since March and April sales were adjusted for seasonal variation, it is possible that the late Easter this year increased April sales somewhat more than usual seasonal increase. The average of the index of retail sales for the first four months of 1949 was 307 compared with 321 for the last quarter of 1948.

The trend of industrial activity in Texas continued downward for the fourth consecutive month, as the Bureau's seasonally adjusted index of industrial power consumption declined 1 per cent from March. The level of this index in April was 6 per cent below the peak reached in December 1948. The number of man-hours worked in a sample of Texas manufacturing establishments declined 2 per cent between the middle of March and the middle of April and was 8 per cent below the level of April 1948. Total employment in manufacturing industries in the State fell 1 per cent in April.

Sorghum Nursery Established At Tech

A sorghum nursery for plant demonstration and testing has been established at Texas Technological college.

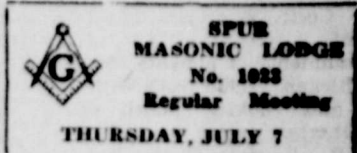

W. Young, head and professor of plant industry, said that the end types sent to the college by the United States Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C. FREE EUROPE ONE NATION

Representatives of ten European countries re-

HOUSE VOTES SELF \$1,500,000 EXTRA EXPENSE ALLOWANCE IN '49

WASHINGTON, June 9.—While
all the talk about economy is go-
ing on, the taxpayer will be in-
terested to know that the same
old bean game is going on in the
Congress of the United States.
Even though the tax experts in
Washington are predicting in
Washington are predicting a three
billion dollar deficit, and federal
revenue is expected to decline
because of the business recession,
certain members of the House re-
cently maneuvered a million and
a half dollar extra expense al-
lowance through the House.

This is the way it was done:
Chairman of the House Adminis-
tration committee, Mrs. Mary Nor-
ton, (R-N.J.), took the floor one
afternoon, when nothing much
was going on, to introduce a num-
ber of routine bills. The last one
to come along was the extra al-
lowance to Congressmen.

Mrs. Norton was getting unanimous
consent to have the other routine
bills considered, and she pushed
the pay allowance raise through
with the unanimous consent also.
When Rep. Church (R-Id.) and
others heard about passage of the
pay allowance increase for mem-
bers, under a unanimous request,
and without discussion on the
floor, they got hot. Church took
the floor and said he had been
called off the floor temporarily
when the bill passed, but that he
would have objected, otherwise.
He said the manner in which the
bill was brought up and passed
didn't suit him.

Mrs. Norton defended her action
the next week. She said anyone
who wanted to save the govern-
ment money need not hire an ex-
tra secretary. But this didn't seem
to quiet the objectors. They said
they would carry the fight into
the Appropriations committee.

Regardless of the need for an
extra secretary, (which this re-
porter thinks is non-existent in
most offices), the bill which will
cost the U. S. taxpayer about a
million and a half dollars (an
extra \$3,500 to every member of
the lower house—there are 435 of
them) ought to be debated on the

floor.
Such bills shouldn't be run
through the House like a sim-
ple administration expense. There
is a basic question involved—do
the people of this country think
members of the lower house
should spend this additional mon-
ey in order to have another job
opening in their offices? In the
case discussed above, there was
no effort to find an answer to this
question, and that alone is suf-
ficient ground to warrant a closer
investigation into the need for
such an increase in clerk hire al-
lowance for House members.

alone, stand alone, walk or hold
objects at the age these things
are accomplished by the average
child. Research has shown that
treatment is most effective if
started within the first few months
of the child's life although chil-
dren respond to treatment begun
at a much later age.

Parents planning to bring chil-
dren to the clinic are requested to
register the children at the
Center prior to the date of the

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TRUMAN PROGRAM FAILS TO CLICK IN CONGRESS

WASHINGTON.—Everywhere on Capitol Hill there is talk of compromise, on the Democratic Administration's legislative program. The talk was at first limited to Southern Democrats and Republicans, but now Truman Democrats admit the President is faced with defeat on some legislative recommendation, compromise on others and complete success on a few.

Industry prerogatives, such as erection of steel plants, etc., etc., is going to be compromised or largely defeated.

Apparently successful, or soon to be successful, are the Democratic goals on federal aid to schools, the Atlantic Defense Pact, the rearming program, ERP, extension of reciprocal trade program another three years, a federal housing bill (compromised), and minor items.

Health legislation is extremely doubtful at this session. Administration leaders don't even plan to concentrate much effort on it at present, even though it has tremendous popular appeal and could be a progressive piece of legislation. Leaders of the majority party in both houses, however, feel it is not popular with con-

gressmen.

The minimum wage battle has featured a retreat by Truman's forces in the last ten days. Efforts to broaden coverage have been abandoned. It is now hoped that a straight 75 cents minimum wage bill can be passed. This may be compromised to 60 cents or 65 cents. Repeal of the Taft-Hartley labor law appears probable in the house, but the Senate may not vote repeal. A compromise is definite in this fight, since Truman's men in the house have acknowledged defeat and abandoned their effort to pass the Lestinski bill.

One or two civil rights bills would be a success for the Trumanites. And even these will have to be practical and sensible measures, without merely sectional application, if they are to pass. Many observers think only one, or none, will get by the Senate. The Administration's proposal to Congress to use taxes to bring in an additional three or four billion dollars is destined to fail. Truman has against him the chairman of the Senate Finance committee, his own Council of Economic Advisors and most of Congress.

The new farm program, while probably a splendid program, has not been sold to the conservative lawmakers on Capitol Hill, and it will probably be another year before it is adopted. At least it has only an outside chance at this session, though it does have that chance. But the President's requests for the power to build and build can't be granted. From this brief run-down, it is sure sessions if it is to be enacted in its entirety.

One program the Republicans began, the Hoover reorganization proposals with a view to effecting economy in the U. S. government is still popular here, and will probably be acted on at this session. However, the proposals may be hacked somewhat, and it's doubtful if the Democrats will kick as many duplicative federal workers out of jobs as they should.

Weather Favors Early Development Of Texas Cotton

Weather conditions in general have been favorable for the early development of the cotton crop. Heavy rains in some sections of the state have caused considerable damage and made considerable replanting necessary. A rather large acreage in North Central Texas was seriously damaged during May by cutworms and army worms. Most of this acreage has now been replanted and good stands have been obtained. Excellent growing weather has prevailed during the last ten days and cotton is growing rapidly.

In South Texas cotton has developed rapidly and early planted fields have now reached the peak of fruiting. Insect populations in this area are comparatively low. During the week ending May 28, 152 fields were inspected in the Lower Rio Grande Valley for boll weevils. Of this number only 23 fields were infested, 3 fields had more than 10 per cent punctured squares and only one field had more than 25 per cent infestation which would justify control. These records are further proof of the effectiveness of the stalk destruction program for boll weevil control in reducing the population of boll weevils.

Field records made at College Station and at Waco indicate that the boll weevil population is still comparatively low but considerably higher than for the same period last year in Central Texas. Twenty-eight fields were inspected in the vicinity of Waco and 24 fields were infested with an average of 174 weevils per acre. For the same period last year 17 of 31 fields inspected were infested with an average of 73 weevils per acre. Weevils are concentrated in fields of early planted cotton.

Thrips and fleahoppers increased rapidly in South-Central Texas during the last week. Thrips are found in most fields and some fields are being seriously damaged. Fleahoppers are now reaching damaging numbers in fields of early cotton.

To insure early fruiting of cotton fields with damaging populations of thrips, fleahoppers or boll weevils should be dusted now. Such fields should be dusted after cotton is chopped and before squares are one-third grown. Dusting at this time will control thrips, fleahoppers and destroy overwintering weevils before

Either 20% Toxaphene plus 40% sulphur or a mixture of 3% gamma benzene hexachloride, 5% DDT, 40% sulphur (3-5-40 mixture) applied at the proper time will effectively control thrips, fleahoppers, boll weevils, bollworms, aphids and prevent red spiders when they occur alone or in combination.

Rotary Hoe Doing Good Job On Cotton

The rotary hoe is doing a speedup job of cotton cultivation, especially in West Texas and the Plains area.

Fred C. Elliott, extension cotton work specialist of Texas A. & A. College works best on the young cotton seedlings in getting rid of the grass and weeds early, the cheapest time to do it.

The main advantage to the rotary hoe is that it speeds up cultivation of early growing cotton. Later on, as the cotton gets taller, this weeding machine doesn't work so well because the plants outgrow it. So the cotton farmer turns to other methods of hoeing.

With all the spring rains farmers got the past months, they're growing a pretty good crop of weeds right along with their cotton. Hand hoeing costs quite a bit, but the rotary hoe cuts hoeing costs down, Elliott says. A common mistake with rotary hoe owners is not operating fast enough. Most of the time a farmer figures he's tearing the seedlings up if he goes too fast.

There are a couple of things to remember when using this machine, Elliott reminds. First, don't set it any deeper than enough

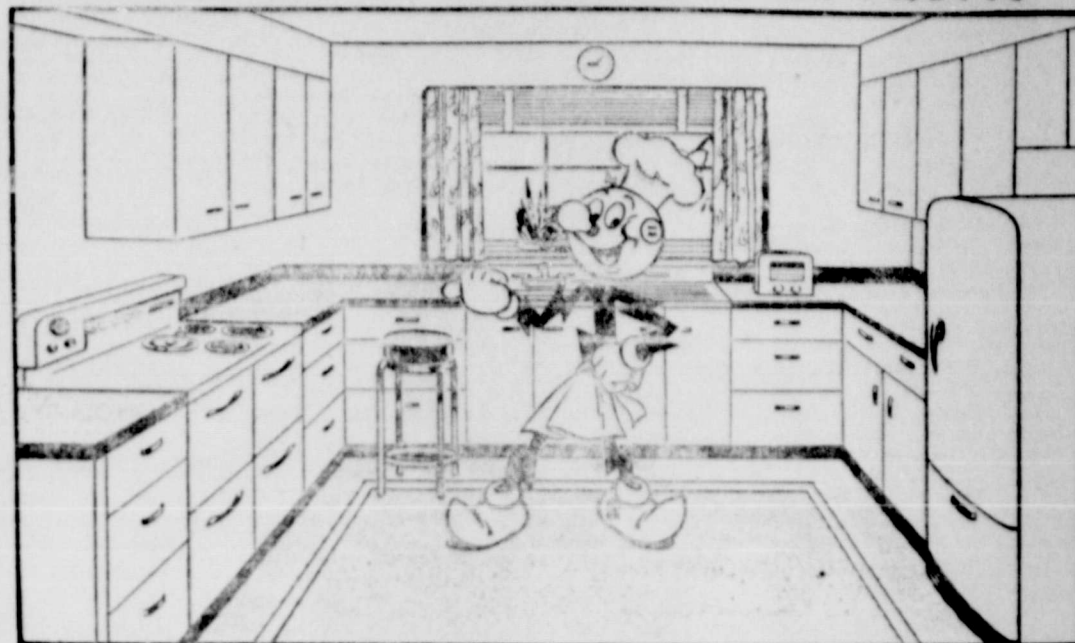
to break the crust of the soil. The shallow picking action of the picks pulls up the tender weeds and grass, leaving them to dry out in the wind and sun. The best time to do the job is about a week after a rain.

And second, the best operating speed for the rotary hoe is between six and eight miles per hour—at least four and a half mph., running in third gear. By keeping the bed flat, you'll avoid throwing seed and grass

around the cotton seedlings. It's a good idea to delay "dirt" the cotton until it gets a good start, Elliott concludes.

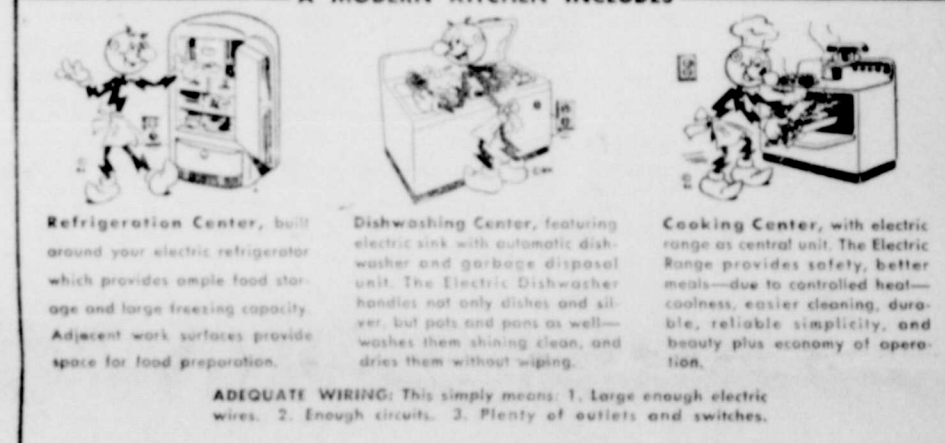
