## To Kill All Dogs Not Having Dog License

The City Commission is making WAR on dogs in the city limits. Operating under ordinance all dogs not tagged with the official city license tag, will have to be impounded and killed.

The City Dog License is \$1.00 per dog per year. Next Monday, April 8, for one week, dog owners may secure City Dog Tags. Then, according to the ordinance, all dogs not tagged, will have to be impounded and killed.

The city is not desirous of causing any one any undue trouble with reference to dogs, but many complaints are coming to the city officials, that make it imperative to enforce the present city ordinance regulating the dogs within the city limits, that both property and children may be protected.

City officials say that due to the pressure brought on them by the public and the unusually large number of dogs in town the dog population must be thinned down. No dog will be allowed to run at large without the tax tags.

## Government Party Makes Camp Here

Thirteen tents have camped for one week on the old City Park grounds in the South part of the city to do Longitude and Latitude survey work to be used in map making. The party is with the U. S. Biological Survey of Washington. About thirty people are in the party.

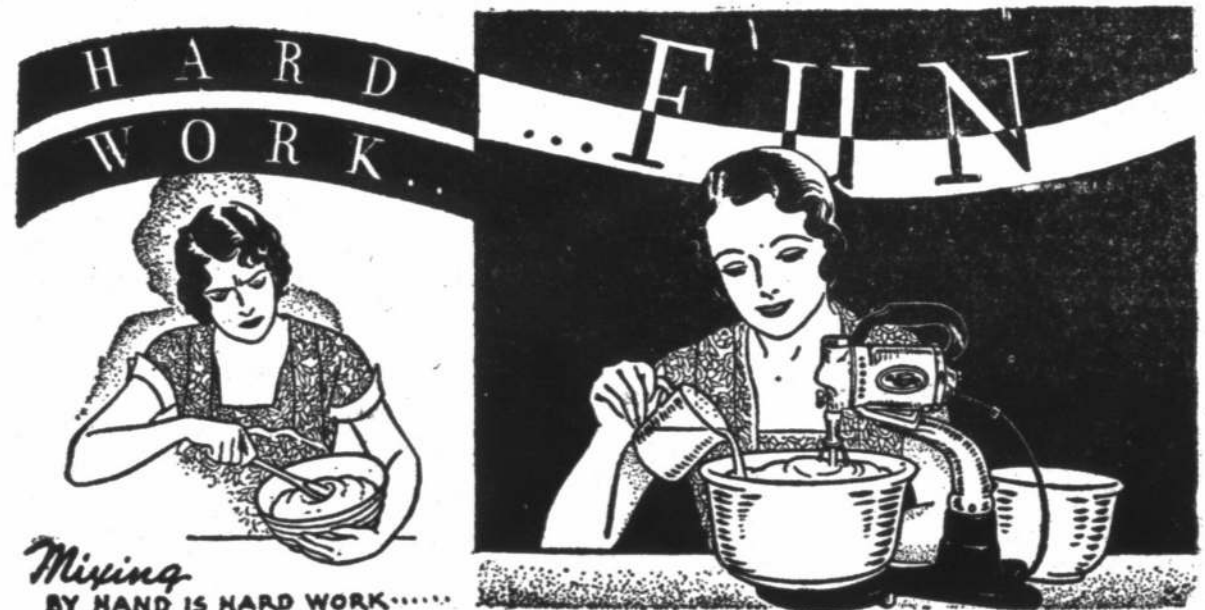
Following a landscape plan which she has worked out with the home demonstration agent, Mrs. B. H. Smith, Bastrop County yard improvement demonstrator, enlarged her yard to 150x60 feet and planted a screen of cedars and privet at the rear between the house and other service buildings.

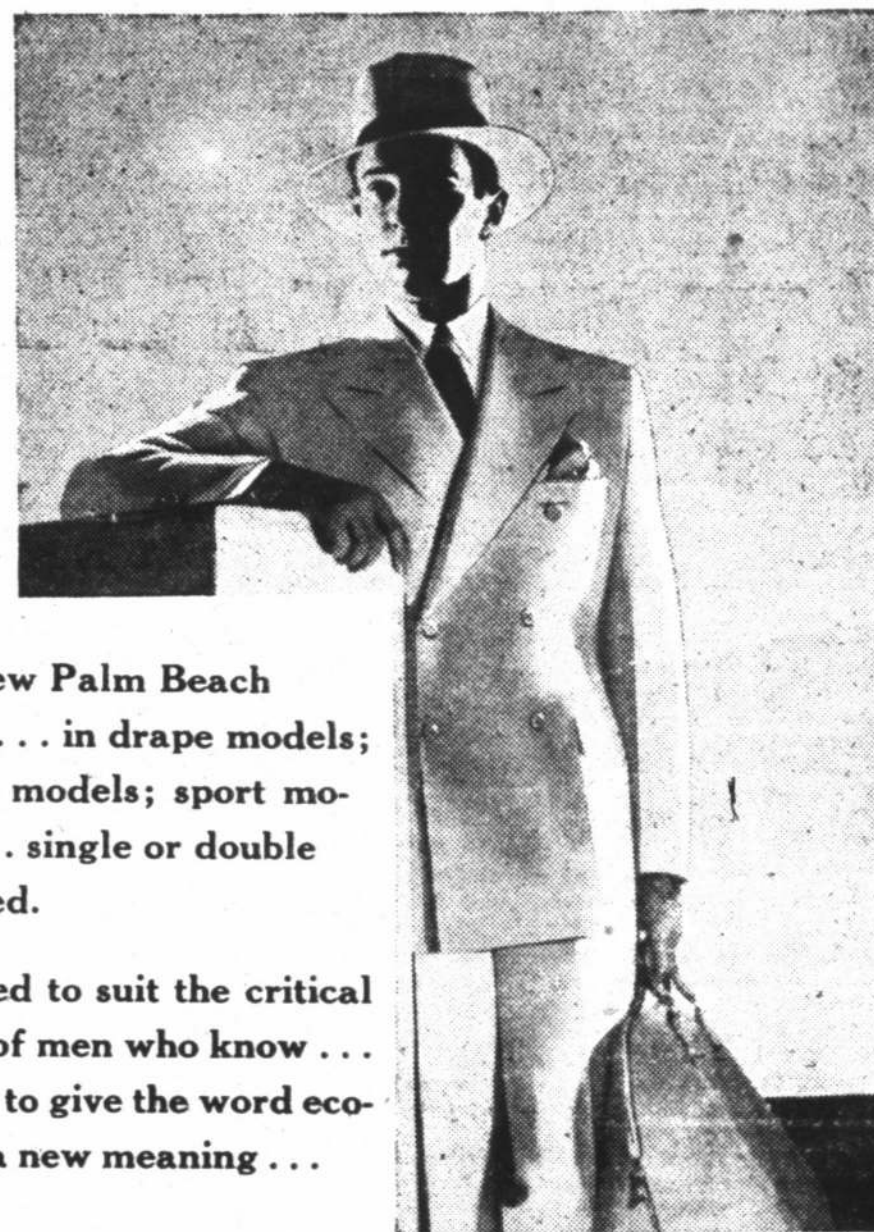

## Taking Farmers Off Relief Rolls

Austin, March 26.—Removal of all farm families from the general relief rolls to the rural rehabilitation program was a step nearer this week as officials of the Texas Relief Commission announced that henceforth all farm families residing on farming acreage will be classed as rural rehabilitation families, and will receive aid only in the form of credit advances.

As a result, these families will come under all regulations of the rural program; and notes in favor of the rural corporation will be taken from these clients for all such subsistence or on other advances from the relief administration.

Relief officials have estimated that from 35 to 50 per cent of the state's caseload consists of rural farm families and that the general caseload will be reduced by approximately 100,000 cases when all of them have been included in the rural plan.

Since many of the families affected by the new order are tenants located on farm plots, landlords will be required to waive claims on this year's crops before any further advances will be made by the Relief Commission. If the landlord, or other lien holders, refuses such waivers, the client family will be removed from the relief roll and the lien holder so notified in writing according to instructions issued by the Relief Commission.
