Busy World Pauses to Observe Twelfth Armistice Day Plot to Overthrow Soviets Is Charged

International Conspiracy of War Uncovered

Plan to Defeat Government and Parcel Out Valuable Land to Neighboring Nations Told in Confession

Arrest Eight Men

Outstanding Figures in Half Dozen Nations Implicated as Co-Conspirators with Leaders of Plot in Moscow

MOSCOW, U. S. R. R., Nov. 11. — From a dossier of indictments and purported confessions in the hands of the peoples' commissar for justice there emerged today Soviet charges of an international plot to overthrow the government and parcel out some of the country's most valuable natural resources among the nations which fringe her borders.

Eight Russians, said to be anti-Soviet, are in prison under charges of high treason, the punishment for which is death. The alleged confessions of one of them—the counter-revolutionary, Ramin—unravel a group of outstanding figures in half a dozen nations as co-conspirators with leaders of the plot in Moscow. Sir Henry Detering, British oil magnate, is named as one of those who aided in financing the preliminary revolutionary campaign. Former Premier Poincaré and Foreign Minister Briand of France are called "arch conspirators," and the name of Britain's "Lawrence of Arabia" is the final dab of color in the picture.

From Ramin's purported confession the government has reconstructed the elaborate plot. It was reported hatched in Moscow and Leningrad, led with foreign capital in Paris and supported by active agents in Germany, Great Britain, France, Poland, Finland, Rumania and other "capitalist" nations.

There was to have been a diplomatic conference in Moscow.

Baptists Meet In Conference

Thousand Registered Tuesday Night for Annual Sessions Beginning Today at Amarillo; Two Thousand Expected

AMARILLO, Nov. 11. — Approximately 1,000 delegates were registered here tonight and attendance at the Baptist general convention of Texas was expected to exceed 2,000 by the time sessions begin tomorrow.

The president's message, by Dr. Lee R. Scarborough of Fort Worth, will open the first day's sessions. Dr. W. Marshall Craig of Dallas will preach the convention sermon.

After the president's message, reports will be heard from secretaries on enrollment and election of officers, including a president, three vice presidents and two recording secretaries.

W. H. Piquet of Amarillo will deliver the welcoming address. George Burnett of Memphis, Tenn., will report on laymen's work. A report on hospitals will be made at the afternoon session; Robert Jolly will speak on "hospitals in Christ's program." Dr. Wallace Bassett of Dallas on "relief and annuities," and Dr. J. A. Ellis, Denton, on "Christian righteousness."

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11. — Notice was given today by interstate commerce commission that it would require railroads to put in effect January 1 a general revision of rates on grain and grain products which are estimated to entail annual reductions of between \$15,000,000 and \$20,000,000 in freight charges on the total traffic.

The requirement will be made in spite of protests filed by western, eastern and southern carriers against the reductions and by some shipping interests against portions of the revisions contemplated. The original decision required the schedules to be made effective about November 1, but postponement until January 1, was allowed in view of the objections and the difficulties of preparing the new schedules.

War Vets Hurl Bombs Into Store For Failure To Close Armistice Day

(By Associated Press)

ST. CLAIRSVILLE, O., Nov. 11. — Angered over failure of a grocery store to close in observance of Armistice day, a group of Belmont county war veterans today hurled bombs into the place. Patrolmen and employees were forced to flee, gasping for air.

The platoon of former soldiers, wearing steel helmets and carrying rifles, was led to the store by C. W. Fowler, commander of the Belmont County American Legion. He did not enter. Nelson McQuillan, a former officer of the Ohio "40 and 4," fun society of the American Legion was among those who went inside.

McQuillan said the veterans "considered it their right to close the store on Armistice day just the same as they would protest any attempt of anyone to tear down the American flag."

The bursting of the tear gas bombs in the store created more excitement in this city than any event since the news of the signing of the armistice a dozen years ago.

Operators of the store protested against the attack to Mayor C. D. Bradford, but no charges were filed. The mayor said his proclamation calling for closing of all stores was not mandatory but that he intended asking council to pass an ordinance requiring Armistice day closing hereafter.

The bombs were taken by the veterans from the sheriff's office. A deputy sheriff on duty there said he permitted them to enter the ammunition supply room thinking they desired material for a demonstration. They marched straight from the county jail to the store, he said.

After forcing the patrons and employees outside with bomb fumes, a detachment of the men wrecked a fruit display in front of the store. The store was operated by the Great Atlantic and Pacific Tea company and managed by Thorburn Stewart, a local resident.

Girl Kidnaped By an Unknown Masked Bandit

Pretty Red-Haired Victim Is Abducted in Queens Where Mysterious "3-X" Bandit Committed Two Murders

NEW YORK, Nov. 11. — A pretty red-haired girl, otherwise unidentified, was kidnaped early today by a masked bandit in the secluded section of Queens where the mysterious "3-X" killer committed two murders several months ago.

Joseph Luisi, 30, who brought news of the kidnaping to police is a taxi driver. Last night was his night off, so he borrowed his brother's sedan and went for a ride.

Robbed of Girl and Car. About midnight, while driving down Eighth Avenue in New York, Luisi saw the pretty girl and invited her to go riding. Before they got to the point of exchanging names Luisi had been robbed of \$7, his sedan and his girl.

They had stopped riding about 3 a. m. near Bayside, Queens, Luisi said, about halfway between the two places where "3-X" committed his murders. A man suddenly appeared beside the car. He was about six feet tall and wore a mask.

Luisi recalled that Noel Sorvick and Joseph Moynihan had been slain by a mysterious assassin while sitting in parked cars with girls. At the man's command he hurriedly got out of the car and submitted to search of his pockets. The man took all he had, the several dollars, and directed, "now walk away."

Hear Girl Scream. The girl started to get out of the car as the masked man got into the driver's seat, but he ordered her to remain where she was. He started the car, and as he drove away Luisi heard the girl scream.

America Joins Rest of World In Observance

Hundred Million Americans Bare Heads in Memory of Moment When World War Was Brought to an End

Visit Wilson Tomb

Simultaneous Silence Pays Homage to Soldiers; Parade, Patriotic Program, Football Game Feature Lubbock's Day

(By The Associated Press)

THE ANNIVERSARY of the Armistice struck 12 yesterday, and one hundred million Americans observed it with a solemn, simultaneous silence.

They paused, these Americans, wherever they were at 11 in the morning and bared their heads in memory of the moment when cannons sent their last roar of horrors echoing across a shrapnel-ravaged France.

Hoover Leads Observance. President Hoover led the nation in its observance of the day. At 11 o'clock a wreath at the tomb of the Unknown Soldier, Loyal friends of Woodrow Wilson paid homage at the war president's tomb.

The sounding of taps, the halting of business, the bombing of salutes were among the tributes America paid.

In London, in Paris, in Geneva—seat of the League of Nations which was born of the war—and in other capitals of Europe similar ceremonies took place. King George of England, the Prince of Wales, the prince of India and some 100 ministers of the British dominions joined in tribute at the Cenotaph in London. King Albert led the observance in Belgium.

Club Formed. At Miami, Fla., last night a "Last Man's Club" was formed with 11 members—all veterans of some American war and nine of them veterans of the World War. A bottle of liquor was sealed, the bottle to be opened when the last man of the war was dead.

Women's Clubs Plan Hospital

Texas Children's Institution Unanimously Endorsed by Federation at Annual Meet at Houston Tuesday

(By The Associated Press)

HOUSTON, Nov. 11. — A proposal to build a Texas children's hospital was endorsed unanimously by the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs in annual convention here today.

A resolution adopted pledged the organization to "recognize the responsibility as their own" and pledge the "moral support and advice of individual members and of the association to the directors of the proposed Texas children's hospital and to the performance of every act within the membership which may be influential in bringing about the early consummation of plans to complete, organize and administer the hospital." Mrs. J. E. King of San Antonio, health chairman, introduced the resolution after George Waverly Briggs, Dallas banker, in an address had asked the federation for its support.

Mr. Briggs reported that a site in Dallas had been donated and that work on raising an endowment of about \$1,000,000 was well underway.

29th Marriage Proves Unlucky

OAKLAND, Cal., Nov. 11. — Norman Arthur Lee Flood, convicted bigamist, told police today he had married and divorced 28 women during the last 23 years.

"And sweethearts? I figure I have had about 400 sweethearts," he said. "All my life I have always had a sweetheart."

"Ever since I was 17 years old I've had a way with the women," Flood said. "I soon learned if you treated a woman as you would a square shooting man, the woman will fall for you every time."

"Anyway, I've always found the plan to work out nicely." "Yes," he admitted, "I married them all and divorced them all. I wouldn't be in this mess today if I hadn't shipped up on that last marriage. I thought I was legally divorced from wife number 28, but I guess I wasn't."

Flood was sentenced to serve from one to 10 years in San Quentin prison last week.

Hockley Child Is Drowned in Watering Tank

Sixteen-Month-Old Daughter of Cotton Pickers Falls Into Polecat Well Monday Southwest of Levelland

LEVELLAND, Nov. 11. (Special) — Funeral services were held here this afternoon for Imogene Hallford, 16-month-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. N. E. Hallford, who was drowned Monday in a watering tank at polecat well, 10 miles southwest of here.

Mr. and Mrs. Hallford were cotton pickers from Hall county and had camped at polecat well, an old watering hole of the Mallet ranch. About 30 minutes after she was missed by her parents, the child was found in a metal tank filled with water for stock. Artificial respiration was attempted. Burial was in a Levelland cemetery.

STATE LOSES ROUND Motion to Dissolve Proration Injection Overruled

AUSTIN, Nov. 11. — The state lost the first round of its legal battle to establish validity of the statewide oil proration order today when a motion to dissolve an injunction granted the Danciger Oil and Refining company of the Panhandle was overruled by District Judge George Calhoun.

Dewey Lawrence, assistant attorney general gave notice of appeal. He had not decided, however, whether he would appeal this verdict or wait until the case was heard on its merits.

EFFICIENCY URGED Marketing System Held Not to Blame for Farmer's Plight

JACKSONVILLE, Nov. 11. — Dr. T. O. Walton, president of Texas Agricultural and Mechanical college, addressing representatives of eight East Texas counties attending a district meeting of the East Texas Chamber of Commerce here today, said that, contrary to common thought, the cause of the farmer's plight was not an inefficient marketing system.

He said East Texas must specialize in less to produce products at a low cost by use of more efficient methods if the section is to compete with other areas where "every ounce of horse and man power are being used."

He advocated farming "on a large scale" and urged abandonment of "one-horse methods," which he said seemed to be clinging to East Texas farms.

ROBBERY FAILS. CANTON, Nov. 11. — An unsuccessful attempt was made last night to rob the Ben Warner State bank at Ben Warner, near here. The knob was knocked from the bank vault and also a time lock from the safe. About \$100 in pennies and an undetermined amount of small silver was taken.

Rag Saturated With Gasoline Causes Flames

Mrs. Minnie B. Vaughn Dies at Home of Daughter After Body Burned Almost to a Crisp; Another Injured

Remains Conscious

Confusion in an Attempt to Throw Can of Gasoline from House Saturates Victim's Clothing and Causes Death

(Special To The Avalanche)

LEVELLAND, Nov. 11. — Burned virtually to a crisp, Mrs. Minnie B. Vaughn, 49, of Paducah, died at noon today at the home of a daughter, Mrs. Allen Strickland, on Boyd ranch, 25 miles southwest of Levelland.

The accident which resulted in Mrs. Strickland's death and injury of another daughter, Mrs. Fore of Paducah, occurred at about 6:30 o'clock last night. With her husband and Mrs. Fore, Mrs. Vaughn was visiting in the Strickland home.

Gasoline Ignited. A gasoline-saturated rag with which Mrs. Vaughn was cleaning articles became ignited and the fear confused woman threw the burning rag back of a door in her attempt to throw it out of the door. The flaming cloth fell on a can of gasoline and a gas daughter of Mrs. Vaughn snatched the can and in throwing it outdoors saturated Mrs. Vaughn's clothing.

Mrs. Fore suffered severe burns on the hands in attempting to extinguish the flames which enveloped her mother.

A doctor was summoned from Levelland and after treating her told the suffering woman, as a result of her injuries, that she would not live. She then talked to relatives, retaining consciousness until the end.

Funeral services had not been arranged tonight.

Hankins to Face Trial Next Week

C. Bailey Hankins, 30, preacher-carpenter of Levelland who was arrested in a Lubbock hotel, September 24, will be placed on trial at Amarillo November 17, on a forgery charge filed in connection with the issuance of a \$200 check on Dr. J. E. Nunn, of Amarillo, according to an Associated Press dispatch. Hankins is in the Potter county jail at Amarillo.

An anonymous telephone call which Hankins made to his wife at Levelland from a railroad station here resulted in the arrest of the Levelland college graduate, who had been the object of a search by Texas and Oklahoma peace officers since August 22.

On that day, Hankins' automobile was found abandoned in Erick, Okla., bearing a note which said Hankins was dead and the body hidden where it would not be found. Hankins later confessed writing the note in an attempt to cover illegal activities.



The Woman's Angle

TODAY club women of Texas gathered in annual session at Houston, are advocating that the body officially abhor lynching that the women exert their influence to curb mob violence and that a protest be made against lurid theater advertising and the printing of salacious titles. Simultaneously, the Federation is making recommendations concerning better educational facilities in the state, better libraries and other constructive measures.

At the same time the Oriental Women's congress, which met recently in old Damascus, in Syria, is decreeing that neither the purchase price ordinarily paid by the Moslem bridegroom for the bride nor the dowry customary among some Christians in the future to be regarded as an obligatory adjunct to marriage.

Employment of children under 14 years of age is to be abolished if these women have their way. Divorce is to be made more difficult. School attendance for girls and boys will become obligatory and trade schools will be provided for both sexes.

East and West, women are working continuously toward one goal and that is the welfare of the family; the protection and education of the coming generation.

There is a cry for women's rights that echoes around the world today but women know what they want to do with their rights. Back of the battle for suffrage there was the desire to pass laws which would protect the home and the family.

The campaign for women's rights is essentially more than a mere battle with men, fought for the sheer pleasure of war, it is a recognition by the women of their power and of their place in helping to manage the affairs of the world. There is a parallel of this in practically every home: the man goes out to make the actual money for support and he usually provides the essentials of food, shelter and clothing for his family, but it is the woman in the home who looks after the details of education, who adds all of those items which contribute so much to the comfort and actual welfare of the family within the shelter. Each has his place but neither can rule the other without impairing the results of the other's work.

When I get into an argument like that I never can think of anything convincing to say and it always appears that I really haven't any beliefs at all but by the next day I've thought of a lot of arguments that would have settled the discussion in the beginning. The only trouble is that by that time the other party has already lost interest.

NUT CAKE RECIPE
To make it the recipe for today. One cup butter, one and one-half cups sugar, three-fourth cup milk, two teaspoons baking powder, one cup chopped nuts, four eggs with the whites beaten dry. Sift flour and baking powder together three times. Cream butter; add sugar and alternately the milk and flour mixtures. Add whites of eggs and nut meats that have been sprinkled with flour. Bake for 30 or 40 minutes. When it is cold, cover with chocolate icing and decorate with whole nut meats.

Resolutions Submitted To Texas Federated Club Women In Session

Legislation In State Is To Be Asked

Child Welfare Is Among the Topics Contained in Club Women's Proposals Before Convention

HOUSTON, Nov. 11. (AP)—Twelve resolutions, including one designed to discourage minors from attending sordid court trials, were submitted to the 33rd annual convention of the Texas Federation of women's clubs in session here.

The resolution will be voted on later.

"The declaration concerning minors deplored 'the fact that children of all ages are now permitted to be presented at murder, assault, divorce and other trials where intimate or vulgar details are introduced into the evidence, and we believe that a degrading influence thereby defiles the purity of the American home.'"

Other Proposals
Other resolutions proposed: A state hospital for the criminally insane.

Reaffirmation of the Federation's position for a "modern prison system."

A state law requiring licensing of motor drivers.

Requesting that no national park be considered by congress until it has been approved by the department of the interior.

Fixing the size of the organization's yearbook.

Proposing better state hospital facilities for negro tuberculosis.

Urging the use of cotton for sack-making purposes in preference to "hemp and jute bags" which were described as "imported products used in competition with the crop we raise ourselves."

It was suggested orally from the platform that the Federation members, in supporting such a campaign could telephone their grocers not to deliver and feedstuffs, bran, salt, sugar, and the like contained in jute or hemp bags, and that if the grocers already had on hand commodities so wrapped, the dealers should not again buy them.

Urging support in behalf of prison reform measures "along the lines of the Beck Bill passed in the state senate during the 41st legislature, our ultimate aim and objective being segregation, proper sanitation, adequate hospital facilities, and educational and vocational programs which will effect a rehabilitation of many inmates whose time as wards of the state should be used in gainful occupation, and a system of business efficiency tending toward self maintenance."

Urging the legislature to set aside the retrieve prison farm as a bird and forest reserve.

Urging further support of the Texas University Endowment for child welfare and parent education.

Deputy United States Marshal J. P. Edgar and Mrs. Edgar have returned from Chillicothe, O., and Anderson, Va., where they delivered prisoners to the federal reformatory. Five men were delivered in Ohio while two women were taken to Virginia. Mrs. Edgar accompanied Mr. Edgar as guard for the women.

The seven were sent up from trials in Amarillo federal court.

Seek Ways of Cutting Down On Bread Line

Secretary Lamont Suggests that Men Be Put to Work Removing Traffic Hazards During Months

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11. (AP)—The hunt for ways and means of cutting down bread lines has brought from Secretary Lamont the suggestion that men be put to work removing traffic hazards during the winter.

It was a double-barrelled relief measure which the commerce executive advanced as the cost of traffic accidents and losses in transportation efficiency are estimated by his department to involve an annual economic loss of three billion dollars.

Cities Safety Aids
Apart from the simple tasks of removing snow from clogged streets and cutting down obstructions to view, Lamont suggested development of highway and railway grade separations, street widening, pedestrian safety islands and other similar aids to safety.

He went further in calling attention to the practice of some cities of building subways for pedestrians near public schools. Such tunnels, he said, have eliminated a considerable source of accidents in Los Angeles at a cost of less than \$10,000 each, with the added feature that lowered police costs paid for the outlay in a few years.

President Hoover, besides announcing on Saturday that emergency appropriations for both unemployment and drought relief would be asked when congress convenes, added a word of urging to the relief movement in his call for support of the annual Red Cross drive beginning tomorrow.

He expressed hope that the public this year would be "more responsive than ever before."

England Baffled By Torch Murderer

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Grand, Grandmothers

WE all, or rather most of us, revere and honor our mothers. It is right that we should. Many of us—and usually it is for harmless fun—like to make a joke of mother-in-laws, which really isn't as terrible as it sometimes is made to sound.

But what about the grandmothers?

Most of us are prone to forget them when we shouldn't. There is a weakness in mankind.

There are homes in Lubbock this morning, there are homes all over the South Plains and all over this country of ours, which would not be the homes they are without grandmother. Many of them house her.

Others have stood intact against the ravages of human frailty all because a little gray-haired old lady has, in the wisdom of her years, dropped a word, a smile or a motherly pat upon a head reared in revolt.

These grandmothers—these grand, grand grandmothers! What would civilization do without them and without the peaceful, comforting, age-tempered humor which is theirs!

A son speaks harshly to a life-pulsating youngster. It is grandmother who comforts, who dries away the tears which follow tumultuously upon the childish hurt. Grandmother knows. She'll ease the sting.

A daughter, momentarily plunging against the shackles of burdening motherhood, threatens to give up her fight to guide the erring steps of her young.

Grandmother, who passed through the same things years ago—perhaps when that same daughter's actions drove her to near desperation—fills the breach and soon everything is right again.

A sickly child calls out in the night. Grandmother, shivering in her old fashioned nightgown and cap, shuffles in her worn slippers to the bedside of the little one. And it's grandmother who knows best how to soothe a child for growing boys and girls, whose luscious culinary offerings make holidays more attractive.

We're busy, in this world of ours. We have little time for grandmother, sentenced by age to a life of slow movements and regular habits. We work hard when we work and play equally as hard in the off hours. We don't remember, sometimes, until grandmother, her gnarled hands folded on stilled breast, has gone to the rest she has earned.

But these grandmothers—these grand, grandmothers! Aren't they really wonderful?

BROAD-MINDED

Statistics can always be argued from different points of view. Yet the temptation to collect and daily with them persists. For example, the public's reception of a recent book is cited by the publishers as proof that America is a tolerant land.

It has been the fashion to represent the people of the United States as narrow-minded and intolerant of views which differ with their own. Yet here was a book dealing with a socialistic theme and distributed to 35,000 persons without socialistic tendencies which did not provoke from those readers one letter of indignation or criticism.

But these grandmothers—these grand, grandmothers! Aren't they really wonderful?

It may be true; it probably is true. But Menckens, Lewis and the others toward whom the triumphant shout of the publishers is addressed, could doubtless argue from these same figures exactly to the contrary.

Among others, any of drawing conclusions from statistical facts is Robert W. Benchley, dramatic critic and humorist. Learning that 9,000 umbrellas are left under theatre seats in the course of a year, he sagely remarked: "That proves something or other, but we don't know what."

Most persons are about as broad-minded as their narrow view of their own selfish interests permits. A tolerant, liberal mind is acquired only through arduous effort, exceptional self-restraint and training of a highly specialized sort.

Practical Health Problems

TEETH WILL INDICATE WHETHER BABY IS DEVELOPING PROPERLY

EDITORS NOTE:—This is the third of a series of four articles by Dr. Morris Fishbein on nutrition of the child.

The circumference of the chest of the child at birth is little less than that of the head, but the difference is not usually more than half as much. At the age of one year, the head and the chest are usually just about the same length around.

However, after the age of one year the chest increases somewhat more rapidly in size than the head so that at the end of five years the chest is at least one-half inch farther around than is the head.

In the case of the undernourished infant, the circumference of the chest does not increase at the same rate as that of the head, because the bony frame does not develop properly and also because the amount of fat under the skin is not what it ought to be in a normal infant.

One of the most interesting methods of determining whether or not the child is developing properly is to watch the appearance of the teeth. The teeth begin to develop long before the birth of the child. By the time of birth, the temporary teeth are usually formed beneath the gums.

However, there is a considerable variation as to when the teeth appear upon the surface. The lower central teeth in front usually come out between the fourth and eighth month and the upper central teeth follow within a few weeks.

The front molars and the rest of the incisors follow between the 10th and 16th month. If the child receives an insufficient amount of calcium and of vitamin D, the development of the temporary teeth is late. Associated with this failure to develop are the other signs of rickets. It is, of course, recognized that the proper development of the jaws is associated with the proper growth of the teeth. The jaws of an undernourished infant and the jaws of those who have rickets are poorly formed, the face is narrow and the chin is pointed.

Will Broadcast Speeches

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11.—Sooner or later congress is sure to "go on the air."

It hardly seems necessary to argue that congress proceedings, considering that they are the whole nation's business, ought to be as public as the twittering of the birds in the foliage in mid-summer.

All enlightened senators and representatives endorse this sentiment.

Even the unenlightened ones acquiesce in it; they are afraid not to.

Until quite recently, to be sure, the senate did hold an occasional secret session. The system was a survival from the era when the ruling class did not try to hide its opinion that it was none of the common people's affair how their betters ran the country.

Senatorial secrecy is obsolete now—in practice, if not quite in theory.

That is, today, if the senators wish to close their doors, they must vote on the question, name by name, in open meetings—and few of them dare vote to do so.

Just once since the rules were changed, when the senate was discussing the naval treaty, framed at last winter's London conference, a secret debate was very gingerly hinted at—but the speed with which an overwhelming majority of the senators thied away from the idea was astonishing.

Hence suggestions that publicity sometimes must be avoided, in order not to risk offending foreign governments, can safely be dismissed as "the bunk." The senators are far more fearful of offending their home folk.

To publish all the speeches made in the senate and house of representatives in the course of a legislative day is vastly too much of a contract for any newspaper; quite a short speech runs to a column or so and there are dozens of them.

The function of the press is limited to giving the general purport of congressional doings—plus essential high lights.

A stenographic report is available in the "Congressional Record," but practically no one expects professional politicians can be persuaded to wade through the "Congressional Record."

For some reason a speech is more interesting to listen to than it appears to be in print. Illustratively, thousands were on hand or tuned in on their radios to hear President Hoover at King's Mountain—but how many read his speech in full in the following day's papers?

Mayhap it seems as if it would be impossible to separate the wheat of interest from the chaff of mere routine, were congressional proceedings to be broadcast by radio.

However, that is a problem concerning the answer to which I know a good deal from personal experience.

Believe me, the reporters galloping overlooking the senate and house of representatives are not over-crowded when the lawmakers are transacting hum-drum. The scribes are scattered—everywhere. Yet let a hot controversy start and there they are, almost instantly. It becomes kind of an instinct. My impression is that radio fans would be quick to acquire it.

According to Clark Kinnaird of Hearst radio news service, not everything should be broadcast—simply that it all should be made available for stations to pick up and disseminate, if worth it.

My own thought is that it would be preferable in its entirety—like the "Congressional Record"—leaving it to listeners to tune in and out for themselves.

It would be practicable, broadcast experts tell me. "A mike on each lawmaker's desk; its place on the 'air' each, for the senate and house of representatives; a high-power station, some 50 relay stations, that would be the equipment. The cost? Ten or fifteen millions—but what's that to Uncle Sam?"

It certainly would not be a bit like an ordinary program.

It would come in fits and starts, usually beginning at noon, when the houses generally convene, and last until 4:30 or thereabouts, the average adjournment hour. There would be a lot of piffle—and yet I believe that would gradually wear itself out, as the legislators came to realize the formidable proportions of the audience they were addressing, and to hear from their constituents.

Yes, it surely would raise the level of congressional oratory.

It probably also would transform congress—as the voters were brought to an appreciation of the sort of statesmen a goodly share of them have been represented by hitherto.

Quite likely the statesmen sense this probability, and it may explain why some of them regarded the radio suggestion with small favor.

But they can't escape it—finally.

A PROBLEM FOR LEADERS

Every practical politician knows that in the final analysis campaigns are won by the local organization. The county boss may not count for much as an individual, but in the state or national aggregate he counts for everything. When he does not function efficiently, the party's chances promptly evaporate.

The strength of the county boss is born of his personal contact with the voters, and he has suddenly awakened to the fact that he has personal contact with only half of them. The men he meets easily for he moves among them constantly. But the women he does not meet and he has relatively few opportunities to do them the favors that win votes.

This was unimportant as long as no one else was working on the women in competition with the county boss. In the absence of an opposing force, they could be relied on to go with the men. But the presidential election demonstrated the havoc that could be raised when leaders come into the campaign who can and do meet the women voters. These new leaders of the women in the recent campaign were the preachers, who come into contact with the woman voter in circumstances that make their influence extremely powerful.

It is a difficult problem for the county boss, and until he solves it politics will remain chaotic from his viewpoint.

Contract for Steel Is Let

Wichita, Kan., Firm to Furnish 431 Tons of Steel in Construction of New Temple Ellis Structure Here

Described as the largest steel contract let here in recent years, a contract for 431 tons of structural steel was awarded to Ben Sibbitt, of Wichita, Kansas, president of the Ben F. Sibbitt Steel and Iron works, for construction of the Temple Ellis building. It has been announced by S. B. Haynes, architect.

Steel is to be purchased in the Pittsburgh, Pa. area and will be shipped to Wichita, Kas., where it is to be fabricated and then shipped here. There will be about 15 car loads in the shipment.

To Start Soon

Shipments will start soon. It is expected and the steel will begin arriving about December 10. Work of setting the steel columns in the footings now being dug is to start about December 15, Mr. Haynes said.

The 431 tons purchased is structural steel and lintels. Mr. Haynes said, "There will be more steel purchased later on."

Six bidders were here for the lettings. They included: North Texas Steel company, Central Texas Steel company, Lubbock Steel company, Mosher Steel company, Capital Steel company and Trucon Steel company, besides Mr. Sibbitt.

To Bid on Other Later

Later on bids for the brick and steel joist will be opened. It is thought that this will be done until after January 1.

Other bids will include the plumbing, heating and electrical contracts. These will be taken some time next year.

Each brick of the dry pressed brick type, to match the present brick, will be used. The first floor will have granite columns six feet high, with the remainder of the face of stone.

The amount of steel purchased will be sufficient to care for a 12 story building, Mr. Haynes pointed out.

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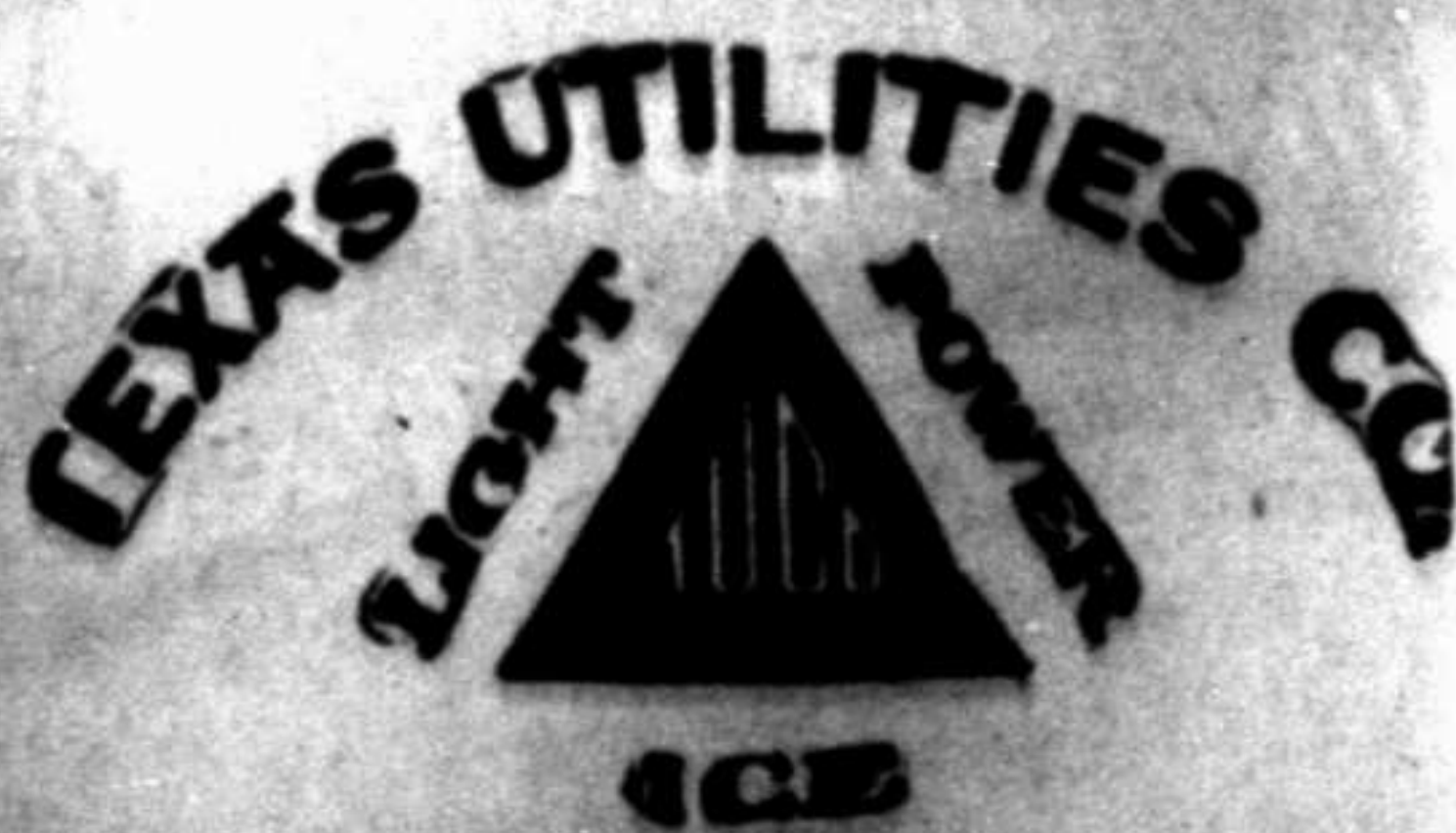

Man Gives Up And Is Found Dead in Cell

William Jones Tells Police He Is Slayer of Gerald E. "Jerry" Buckley; Death to Be Investigated

DETROIT, Nov. 11. (AP)—Two hours after William Jones, 49, had walked into police headquarters and asked to be locked up as the slayer of Gerald E. "Jerry" Buckley, radio announcer, he was found dead in his cell, with severe head injuries.

Police said he was intoxicated and that he probably had received his injuries in falling from a bench in the "golden rule" bullpen where he was placed. The prosecutor's office is investigating his death.

Had No Injuries.
According to police Jones was unharmed when he appeared at headquarters last night. They said he had no connection with the Buckley case and that he had no apparent injuries when he arrived at headquarters.

The official report of his death said there were lacerations and contusions of the face and scalp and a dislocation of the jaw. Medical examiners said there was a probable concussion of the brain. A post mortem examination was ordered.

Police Commissioner Thomas C. Wilcox said nothing in the reports received by him indicated that any policeman had laid hands on Jones. Two other prisoners in the cell with Jones were to be questioned by representatives of the prosecutor's office.

Leaves Seven Children.
Jones leaves a widow and seven children. Members of the family said he had been out of work several months.

Ernest G. McMath, reputed millionaire down river liquor baron, who was arrested yesterday for questioning in the Buckley case, was expected to be summoned before the 22-man Wayne county grand jury today.

Representatives of the prosecutor's office were prepared to oppose his release on a writ of habeas corpus, petition for which was filed.

Search of McMath's home in Dearborn revealed papers indicating that McMath had had business dealings with Buckley.

U. S. Opposed To Limitation Of Armaments

Budgetary Restriction Method Not to Be Accepted to America, Ambassador Hugh Gibson Tells Commission

GENEVA, Nov. 11. (AP)—Unalterable American opposition to any limitation of armaments through a method of budgetary restriction was announced by Hugh S. Gibson, the Washington representative, at the session of the preparatory commission on disarmament here today.

Ambassador Gibson's announcement was made in the discussion of the budgetary methods of limitation.

U. S. Not To Sign.
The American envoy declared the American government after examining the question minutely recently had found it could not change its attitude of opposition to the plan and he asserted that the United States was not likely to sign any convention imposing this method, although not objecting to other nations limiting their expenditures.

"We already practice a system of limitation by direct means, plus full publicity for expenditures," Mr. Gibson said. "We believe this the most effective method of limiting armaments. In short, we believe it easier to conceal the application of a dollar than to conceal the existence of a rifle."

Ambassador Gibson told the

commission the United States, however, would not object to a treaty which bound the other powers to limitation by budgetary restrictions while leaving the United States free to employ her own system of limitation.

Lord Cecil presented the British viewpoint on the subject, emphasizing the tremendous importance in British opinion, of a limit for war materials. Any further war, he forecast, will be fought by small armies with high technical equipment.

It is not sufficient, he pointed out, to limit the personnel of armies as the numbers of men now are less important than the material equipment of armies. Publicity of armaments, he said, is a useful method, but one that exists already, a good basis but utterly insufficient.

Direct limitation is in principle most effective, he declared, but in practice this also is insufficient. Only limit of expenditures, he said, will meet the needs of the situation. He acknowledged that Am-

erica might find it difficult to accept the budgetary method but said he hoped she would find a way, remarking that it would be very hard to arrive at a useful treaty if the United States stood out.

Germany took a position with America, Count Von Bernstorff protesting that direct limitation was a method indispensable to any disarmament convention if Germany was to sign it.

Italian views were presented by General De Marinis, who reaffirmed his government's support of limitation by budgetary restrictions for war materials both in use and in stocks.

He declared world armaments had increased greatly during the last 18 months and that much of the increase had been in war materials. Italy, he said, favors limitation of materials both by direct and indirect methods, which he regards as not mutually exclusive.

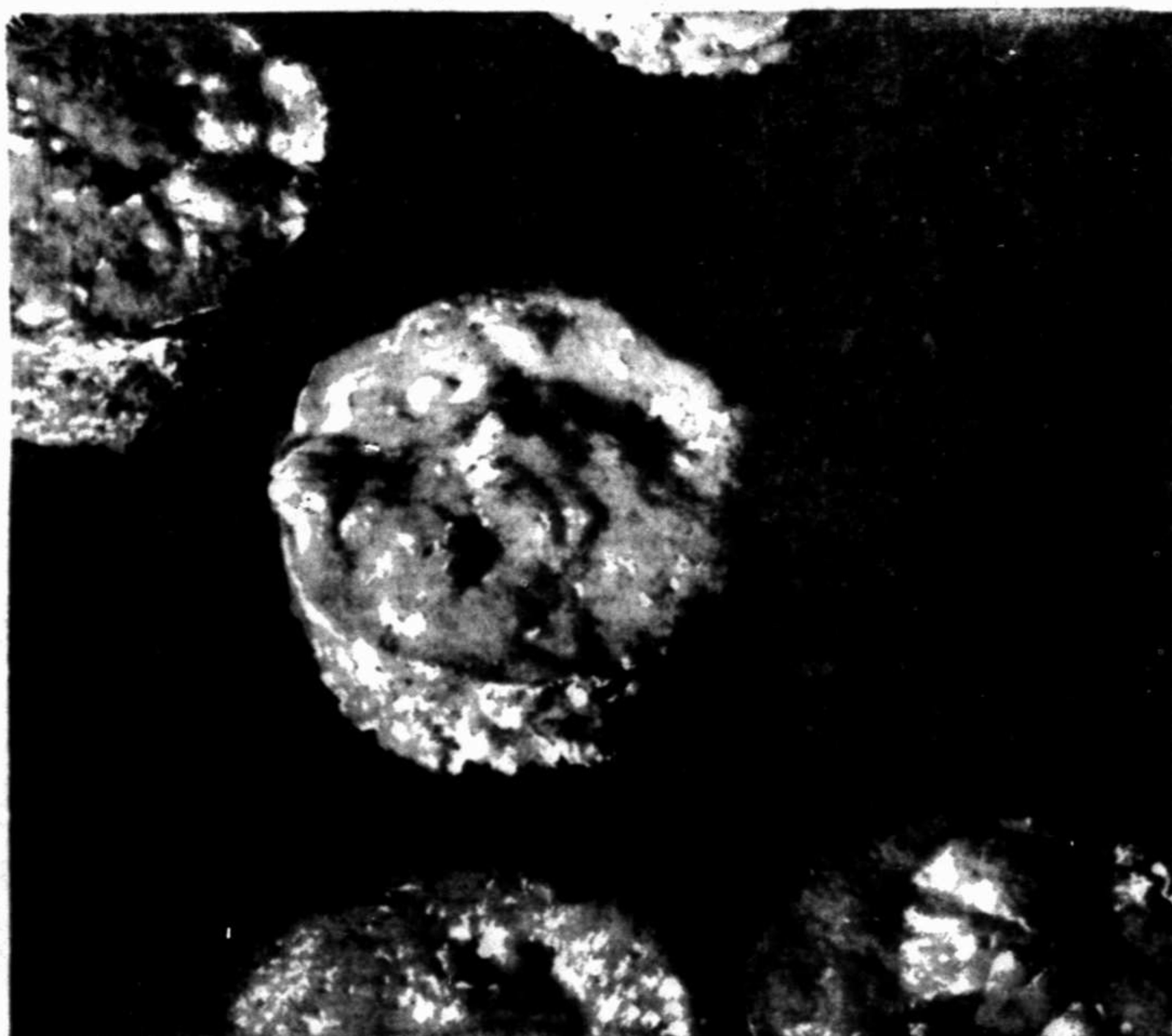

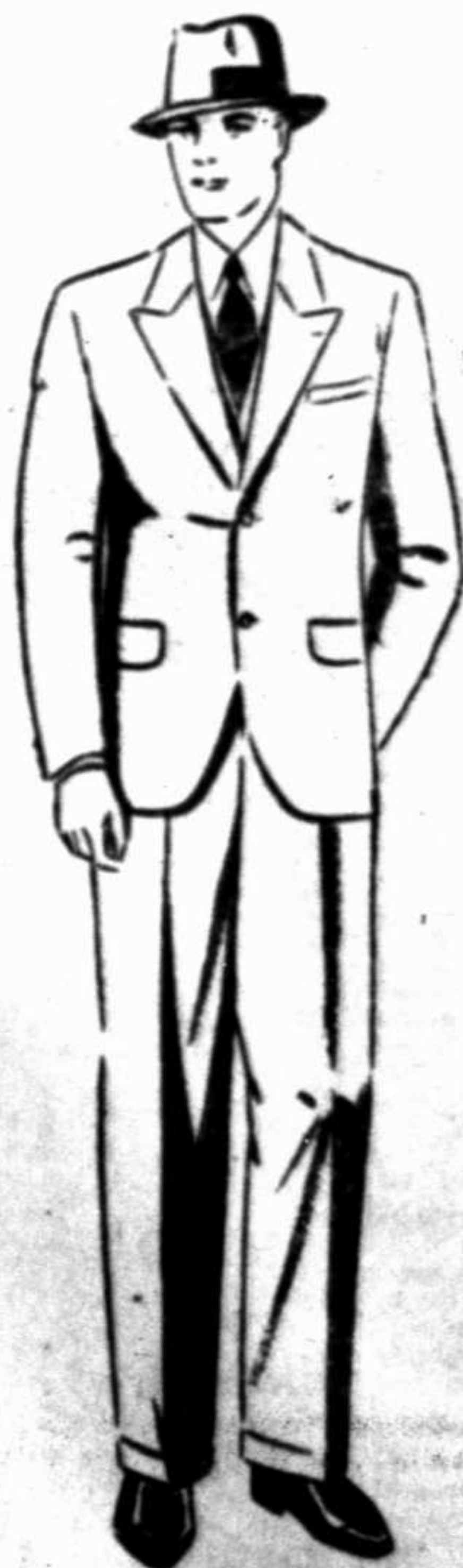

Inhalators Used In General Fight Upon Pneumonia

NEW YORK, Nov. 11. (AP) — A general attack upon pneumonia through use of inhalators of a public service company began here today.

Inhalators give a mixture of two gases, oxygen and carbon dioxide, and have been used with marked success upon some types of pneumonia, particularly among newborn babies.

Experiments also have been underway in various cities trying inhalators on the common type of pneumonia which sweeps the country each winter among adults, and which in most communities carries the highest death rate of all diseases for a short time during late winter.

The New York Edison company announced last night that its inhalators henceforth are at the call of the medical profession for fighting pneumonia. The company has the inhalators for sufferers from electric shock.

Matthew S. Sloan, president, said 127 such pneumonia cases had been treated, and that of 85 who received treatment in the preliminary stage 70 recoveries had been reported.

Carbon dioxide is the substance which makes the "fizz" in soda water, and is also the gas exhaled normally from the lungs. It has a stimulating effect upon lungs which have collapsed.

SCHOOL TO CONTINUE

West Texas Drouth Are Not to Shorten School Terms

AUSTIN, Nov. 11. (AP) — The drouth in West Texas counties will have no appreciable effect on the length of school terms, reports submitted to the state board of education today by high school inspectors indicated. Terms in some of the counties will be reduced 10 to 15 days, the reports said.

Inspectors reported school finances were in as good shape now as in former drouth years and that tax collections would be not more than 10 per cent under normal. Many property owners, the inspectors reported, will be unable to pay their taxes owing to the drouth.

SLATON, Nov. 11. (Special) — Slaton business firms cooperating through the Retail Merchants' association, will give away \$150 in gold during the first annual Texas Panhandle-Plains poultry show, which will be held here on December 10, 11 and 12. On each of the three days \$50 will be given away in cash. These cash gifts will have no connection with the regular poultry show premiums, which will be furnished by the Texas Panhandle-Plains Poultry association. It was announced.

Methodists to Meet in 21st Annual Confab

About 70,000 Members and 409 Organizations to Be Represented at Five-Day Session at Sweetwater

SPARENBURG, Nov. 11. — The twenty-first annual Northwest Texas Methodist conference, representing 409 organized congregations and approximately 70,000 members, will convene in a five-day session at Sweetwater November 12 with Bishop Hiram A. Boaz presiding. Many denominational matters affecting the ecclesiastical affairs of North Texas will be discussed and acted upon. A high light, usual feature of these conferences, will be assignment of approximately 300 preachers for another twelve months. Reports from the various charges rendered at the session will probably indicate an excellent spiritual growth, including a large increase in membership, but the financial report will reflect the general monetary depression prevailing over the entire world.

The conference will be formally opened at 9 a. m. Wednesday, Nov. 12, in the First Methodist church, Rev. O. P. Clark, pastor, being the host, assisted by Rev. H. W. Hanks, pastor of the Highland Heights church of Sweetwater, and Rev. L. N. Lipscomb, presiding elder of the Sweetwater district. After organizing the conference will proceed to hear reports from the various charges, to admit on trial probationers preachers, to advance undergraduates and to ordain deacons and elders, and to transact the routine business of the conference. Many connectional officers from Nashville, Tenn., are expected to attend and address the sessions daily. The appointment of preachers to stations and circuits for the ensuing year will be publicly read by Bishop Boaz at the close of the evening service, Sunday, Nov. 17. Nine presiding elders and the bishop constitute the "cabinet" which make the appointments. It is understood that many changes will be made this year, but there are few "transfers" from other annual conferences expected due to the crowded condition of this conference. In fact the financial depression is expected to result in several stations being reduced to half-time points and several circuits being consolidated. Mission funds will be smaller than for several years.

The Northwest Texas Conference a year ago—when the last official statistics were compiled—enrolled 62,706 members, had baptized during the past 12 months 2,506 adults and 532 infants, numbered 409 congregations, owned 366 edifices valued at \$4,145,650; owned 186 parsonages, valued at \$552,350. During the year the conference paid eight presiding elders or district superintendents \$46,693 and its preachers \$332,337. A total of \$1,329,977 had been raised during the 12 months for all purposes.

For superannuated preachers

("worn-out and shelled") a total of \$94,440 had been raised, the Sweetwater district leading with \$16,716 followed closely by the Vernon district with \$13,812. Other districts raised for this purpose: Abilene, \$14,774; Amarillo \$10,697; Clarendon, \$14,174; Lubbock, \$12,072; Plainview, \$8,160; Stamford, \$9,130.

The newly acquired Panhandle District of old West Oklahoma Conference will be formally absorbed by the Northwest Texas Conference at this session in pursuance to an allocation made by the recent general conference, making the Northwest Texas Conference nine presiding elders' district and adding another district superintendent to the roll. Through the formation of the new district, allocation of some of the Amarillo district will be made to it, resulting in a general redistricting throughout the conference. Territorial allocations not having been specifically designated as yet, it is understood that Hamilton, now in the Sweetwater district, will be given to the Stamford district, and Post, now in the Lubbock district, to the Sweetwater district. Spareburg and Ackerly, now in the Sweetwater district, will be returned to the Lubbock district. The three farthest north counties in the Texas Panhandle, now in Amarillo district, it is understood, will be allocated to the former Panhandle district of the West Oklahoma Conference. The Abilene district will be considerably strengthened under the allocation plan. It is understood.

Pearce to Move
One presiding elder who has served his quadrennium, Dr. W. M. Pearce, on the Amarillo district, will by the rules of the denomination have to move. His successor can only be elected. Pearce will likely return to a station preachership. Interest centers in the successor of Dr. J. W. Hunt, founder of McMurtry College, Abilene, who recently resigned. It is understood that Rev. E. E. White, presiding elder of the Abilene district, has been urged to accept this post, but he has not yet publicly announced his plans. The officers of president and dean will probably be consolidated for purposes of economy following the resignation recently of Dean Boyd McKenon.

An advance report indicates that preachers salaries will be about 70 per cent paid, while conferences benevolences will probably stagger between 35 and 50 per cent of the total assessments. Conditions over the conference are uniformly pronounced the worst in the history of the conference, the depression having been conference-wide. Yet the same report indicates that great revivals with many conversions and additions have rewarded sacrificial labors of preachers.

To Furnish Charges
A number of "supply" preachers will likely not be provided with charges for another year due to the lack of "openings," the number of available "conference" preachers being commensurate with the charges available. Some of these supplies have been holding regular work for several years, and some of them, at least, will be thrown out into a cold world to work at secular employment.

The conference will be entertained on the Harvard Plan. On Sunday, November 17, practically every Protestant pulpit in Sweetwater will be supplied with Methodist visiting preachers. An old fashioned Methodist "love-feast," or agape, will precede the morning service.

Sunday at the First Methodist church. Preachers are eager to attend the conference since they have a new bishop, Bishop Boaz, who follows a quadrennium of supervision by Dr. John M. Moore, new bishop of a Florida Conference.

GIVEN EIGHTEEN YEARS

CAMERON, Nov. 11. (AP) — Fred Matthews, charged with slaying Joe Hosh, was found guilty by a jury and given 18 years in the penitentiary yesterday. It was his third trial on the charge. He was convicted and given 50 years the first time, but the court of criminal appeals gave him a new trial and the second time the jury was unable to agree.

ESTIMATE CORN CROP

Prospective Production for Year Shows Increase

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11. (AP) — Prospective production of corn was reported today by the Department of Agriculture to have been increased 47,000,000 bushels over the estimate of a month ago by a favorable late growing season.

The preliminary estimate of this year's corn crop was placed at 2,094,000,000 bushels, as against 2,046,716,000 a month ago and production last year of 2,614,307,000.

"Late crops in 1930," the department said, "were favored by a late growing season in many important states and yields are quite generally

above the expectation of a month ago. The estimate of corn production has been increased since last month two per cent."

FIRE BREAKS OUT

VENICE BEACH, Cal., Nov. 11. (AP) — Fire broke out in the new Venice Beach oil field today igniting well number 2 of the International Petroleum Corporation, Ltd., when a drill hit a gas pocket. The flames were being controlled and no other wells were endangered, firemen reported.

Thirteen ringers are now required when the full chime of bells in St. Paul's Cathedral, London, peal out, as the bells weigh from 300 pounds for the treble, to 6,200 for the tenor.

SHIPMENTS ANNOUNCED

Cotton from Abernathy Near Total of Last Year

ABERNATHY, Nov. 11. (Special) — Three less bales of cotton have been shipped out of the Abernathy station by the Santa Fe this year than last, up to the same period, according to reports here.

Total shipments up to this week amounted to 1,379, compared with 1,382 bales for the same time last year.

It is estimated that there will be as many bales of cotton shipped this year as last.
