FLIGHT TRAINING

Deadline Nears On School Bid

Bids close March 15 on the Webb Air Force flying school. In a talk with Frank Derigibus requirements for securing the contract were discussed. Derigibus is bidding on the contract with the Air Force.

In regard to airport facilities Derigibus said that a hard surface runway would be required, made either of asphalt, cement or soil, cement.

The paved landing strip must be long enough to safely operate the Cessna 172 aircraft without unusual pilot school. Derigibus noted that the local strip would be long enough if it were paved. He added that the grade of the strip and the approaches were adequate.

Buildings would be required to house the facilities of the school including dressing rooms, briefing rooms and office space.

Approximating the number of permanent employees at the school Derigibus said the figure could go over 30 people. Sixteen flight instructors would be required in addition to seven permanent air force personnel.

Also, two flight control employees, a radio operator, four to five mechanics, two gas

men and possibly three to four security guards.

In addition as many as three persons to handle secretarial duties would be needed.

The civilian contractor will bid on the instruction of pilots and the maintenance and operation of the aircraft.

The Air Force will furnish the budget.

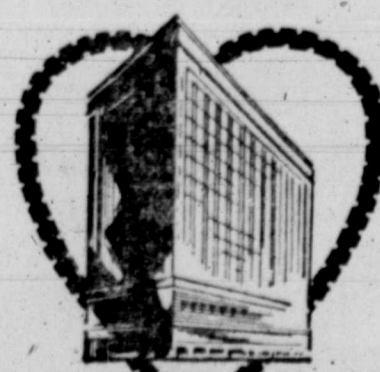
EVEN THAT was better than what was to come, however. As we kept drying our hair and reading about our color character, we came to the mating bit.

Experimental Test Made Of Roughage

A few roughage, ammoniated rice hulls, has put extremely low cost gains on steers at the nearby Coastal Bend Experiment Station.

According to Billy Conrad, animal scientist at the station, a ration of 10 per cent ammoniated rice hulls gave the lowest cost per pound gain of the 13 rations in a test.

Conrad said the results are based on one study there and further research will be necessary before more accurate information is available on the new roughage.

The rations tested included one all-concentrate ration and 12 rations made of three different levels of cottonseed hulls, rice hulls, flax shives and the ammoniated rice hulls. Each roughage was studied at 10, 20 and 30 per cent levels in the ration.

The all-concentrate ration gave the second lowest cost per pound gain.

Most economical gains with rice hulls, cottonseed hulls and flax shives were attained when they made up 20 per cent of the ration.

The roughage study is part of a long range project in which researchers hope to chart the most economical combination of various roughages and concentrates when the commodities are selling at different price levels.

Conrad's study is an outgrowth of research conducted at the Gulf Coast Pasture-Beef Station, Angleton.
