McGuire Is 2nd Deputy In Race

A competitive race for Mitchell County Sheriff became definite Friday with the announcement by W. R. (Bill) McGuire that he will seek the office.

McGuire, son of a former chief deputy sheriff and, himself, a deputy sheriff, is the second announced candidate for the law enforcement office.

He joins Forrest Smith, chief deputy sheriff, in the race for the post now held by Sheriff Lewis Claxton. Claxton has stated he will not be a candidate for re-election in 1972 and will step down from office when his term expires Dec. 13, 1972.

McGuire, 25, who enters the race with a blend of law enforcement tradition, experience and education, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. R. (Bob) McGuire. His father was chief deputy 10 years under both Sheriff R. E. (Dick) Gregory Jr. and Sheriff Claxton.

His education includes graduation from Colorado High, college at University of Texas and East Texas State University.

He is a combat veteran of U. S. Marine Corps, having been wounded 3 times in Vietnam.

His preparation and training for law enforcement includes completion of 240-hour Texas A&M University Extension Basic Law Enforcement School at Howard County Junior College, completion of 40 hours of Texas Department of Public Safety's Breathalyzer School in Austin, completion of Jail Procedure School in Abilene.

McGuire pledged 100 per cent time and effort to the office.

"If I am elected sheriff of Mitchell County," McGuire told the Record, "I will strive to uphold the duties and responsibilities of the office to the best of my ability... and I will give 100 per cent of my time and effort to the people of Mitchell County."

McGuire, who has been a deputy sheriff for 13 months, emphasized that he would utilize manpower of the sheriff's department "to its best potential and effectiveness."

"If elected," he stated, "I will have a deputy in Loraine and, possibly, a deputy who lives in the western part of our county near the lake or Westbrook."

"I will continue to improve the working relationship between the city, county and state officers and with officers in surrounding counties."

"This cooperation has been a policy of Sheriff Claxton and I believe it should be continued and an improvement for maximum law enforcement."

McGuire said he has enjoyed as well as benefited working with Sheriff Claxton and "if elected I will strive for the best law enforcement that can be provided by the sheriff's department for the citizens of Mitchell County."

The candidate is the husband of the former Lana Shurtleff, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Curtis Shurtleff. They are expecting their first child.

Wolves Win New Trophy

The Colorado High School Wolves varsity basketball squad brought home another trophy last week, this one for the consolation title in the Lamesa Tournament.

Lamesa won the tournament as they defeated Fort Stockton in the final game Tuesday night.

Colorado City faced Fort Stockton in the Wolves first game of the tournament Monday night and Fort Stockton won, by the score of 70-49.

Then the Wolves went on to defeat Fort Stockton 78-62 Tuesday morning and then Tuesday evening in the consolation game, the Colorado City team downed Graham 67-62.

The win against Graham was the 16th win of the year opposed to three losses for the 1971 Wolves.

The Colorado City team's next outing will be against Dunbar in a district game to be played here Tuesday night at Wolf gym.

Judge Kirk To Seek Full Term

District Judge Weldon Kirk announced his candidacy Friday for the 32nd District Judgeship, a position he has held since moving up from district attorney.

Kirk will be seeking his first term for the district office, subject to action of the Democratic Party Primary.

He has served on the 32nd District bench for a year, having been appointed to fill the vacancy created by election of Austin McCloud of Chief Justice, Court of Civil Appeals.

Prior to his appointment, Judge Kirk was district attorney of the 32nd Judicial District, comprised of Fisher, Mitchell and Nolan Counties, for the 10-year period of 1961-70; and was county attorney of Nolan County for the 6 year period of 1955-60. He practiced law in Sweetwater from 1950 until he became district judge.

"I am extremely grateful to the voters of Mitchell, Fisher and Nolan counties for the confidence and support they have given me in the past," said Judge Kirk, "and I ask for and will certainly appreciate your vote and continued support."

A native of Gorman, Eastland County, Judge Kirk was a pilot in the Army Air Corps during World War II, and is a major in the United States Air Force Reserve, serving in an assignment with the Aerospace Defense Command as a judge advocate.

Judge Kirk graduated from the University of Texas School of Law in 1950. He is a member of the State Bar of Texas, and is currently serving a second term as president of the Nolan County Bar Association. He served 3 terms as director and one term as vice-president of the Texas District & County Attorneys Association.

Judge Kirk and his wife, Mary, have two children - Lisa, 13 and Paul, 11. They are members of Sweetwater's First United Methodist Church.

Janet Brownfield, Colorado High senior and 4-H member, scored a double win Friday afternoon with the grand champion and reserve champion lambs of Mitchell County 4-H & FFA Livestock Show. Her grand champion was a crossbred lamb and her reserve champion was a Southdown.

Brownfield showed her Hampshire barrow to the grand champion of Mitchell County 4-H & FFA Livestock Show's swine division Friday.

The 4-H Club had come by his stock show credentials naturally. His father is Vocational Agriculture Instructor Frank Brownfield and his sisters have shown champion lambs in previous years at the show.

Brownfield, an 8th grade Colorado City student already a veteran of 5 years in show arenas, won the grand championship in close competition with 116 swine.

Reserve championship went to Robert Cox, 17-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. James Cox, with his heavyweight Duroc.

Cox, Colorado High FFA exhibitor, earlier had won the championship of the 2-class Duroc competition.

Show judge Jim Allison, swine herdsman at Texas Tech, commended the entire division of swine.

"You have here some of the best I have seen at any show," Allison told the arena crowd as he named the champions.

"The Hampshire (Brownfield's grand champion) is a little more clean," spoke the judge after citing an impressive list of points for the finalist hogs.

His Duroc was bred by Duncan Hog Farm at Robert Lee.

Best hog bred in Mitchell County was shown by Glenn Sullivan, 16-year-old Westbrook Future Farmer.

Sullivan, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Sullivan, won the honor with his Chester White, bred by Lee Roy Cornutt of Loraine.

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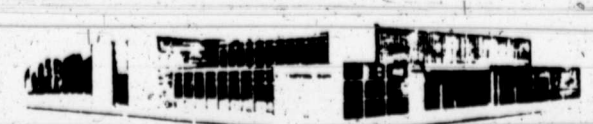
