ASK STATE TO ASSUME BONDS

ASSOCIATION ENDORSES PLAN TO RETIRE HIGHWAY BONDS OUT OF GASOLINE TAX FUND

At the recent convention of the County Judges and Commissioners Association of West Texas, held at Amarillo on September 1, that body voted unanimously for the adoption of some plan to remove from counties the burden of redeeming outstanding bonds, issued for improvement of state highways.

The resolution addressed to the members of the Texas legislature meeting in called session at Austin, is given in part as follows:

Be it resolved by the County Judges and Commissioners Association of West Texas that we transmit to the Legislature of Texas our wholehearted endorsement of the proposed law whereby the State will assume outstanding County highway bonds which represent expenditures invested in State Designated Highways.

Be it resolved that this association not in any sense try to dictate to the Legislature the terms of any certain bill, or the exact basis upon which any bill should be enacted.

But be it resolved that this association commit itself to the following conclusions:

We have cut our local expenditures in every conceivable manner locally, and our citizens are still demanding lower tax rates and more tax relief. We are unable to meet their demands unless the State assumes our county highway bonds. We believe the proposition sound which would take approximately one cent of the four cent tax per gallon on gasoline, with which to absorb all maturities on County State highway bonds hereafter maturing.

To the end that Federal aid may be taken advantage of in Texas, and new construction work continued in those counties needing same to complete our Texas Highway system, we believe that the four cent tax should be left as it is under the present law, and also the present motor vehicle registration tax left intact without change.

We believe that we are truly interpreting the ideas of the citizens of our counties when we say that this is the outstanding opportunity for the Legislature of Texas to give substantial, immediate relief to the taxpayers of Texas.

Our respective counties have their individual problems. However, we are dismissing our personal differences and are joining united in supporting this general proposition, believing that our legislature, with true statesmanship ability, will and should adopt the same attitude, and throw aside any and all petty differences, to the end that this emergency session of the legislature may accomplish the true purpose for which it was called in session.

We would respectfully call attention to the fact that our tax rates must, under the law, be finally enacted or amended at our regular meeting during the week of September 12th in order that our tax assessors for 1932 collections.

Therefore, we would respectfully plead that this problem be given precedence over any and all other measures before the present session of the legislature, and further respectfully plead for an emergency session as will grant immediate relief.

DEMOCRATS AT STATE MEETING

FOUR FROM HERE ATTEND STATE CONVENTION AT LUBBOCK ON SEPTEMBER 13

Four delegates from Ochiltree county attended the state democratic convention held at Lubbock on Tuesday of this week. The delegates were Dave Shanks, Walter Allen and B. L. Rogers representing Ochiltree county and Jack Allen, serving as proxy for Lipscomb county.

According to the delegates, very little of the Sterling-Ferguson battle was evidenced on the floor of the convention which certified the nomination of Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson following the official tabulation of votes which gave her a majority of 3,333 over the present governor.

According to reports however, a contest of the election has been entered in Travis county by Governor Sterling who alleges that he received a majority of the legal votes, supported by others who claim thousands of illegal votes were cast in the August primary.

The Palace Drug will be reopened soon, according to Herring Lance, the new proprietor of the store. The fountain and fixtures are being moved this week to the room on the south side of the Ellis Theatre lobby and is being completely remodeled and restocked.

The store sold at auction last Saturday, Carl Ellis being the successful bidder. Mr. Ellis announced this week that he had leased the store to Herring Lance who expects to have it reopened by next week.

Mr. Lance announces that he will handle a complete line of drug sundries, cosmetics, confections, tobaccos and fountain lunches.

Baptists Meet Nov. 16

State Convention Date Changed By Executive Board; Plan Drive For Funds

The executive board of the Baptist general convention of Texas meeting in Dallas, September 13, voted to change the date for the meeting of the Baptist convention from November 9 to November 16. The convention voted last year to meet in Abilene in 1932.

Plans were completed for the raising of \$600,000 for missions and benevolences by means of the Every-member Canvass campaign now in progress among the 490,000 Baptists of Texas. Dr. J. Howard Williams, executive secretary of the board, was placed in charge of the campaign, and he has appointed seventeen organizers in as many districts representing every portion of Texas.

The campaign will continue until October 30. The final week, October 23-30, is designated as pledge week, at which time every Baptist in the state will be solicited for a pledge to the \$600,000 fund.

The money raised by this campaign is to be used by the Baptists for their work of missions and benevolences; every Baptist institution is to share in the funds, whether it is in Texas, in China or elsewhere. The proportion of the funds to go to each institution will be worked out at the meeting of the state convention to be held in Abilene, November 16.

LEAGUE PROPOSES CUTTING OFF PART OF THE CITY STREET LIGHTS

The Herald was in error last week when it stated that the City Council ordered the street lights turned off following a suggestion from the Tax Payers league. This week we have been furnished with a full copy of the recommendations of the league, their suggestion being "that the center light be cut off, which will effect a saving of about \$21.00 per month".

Other economy measures were suggested, the total aggregating \$2,356.00 per year to the city. They were the elimination of the office of dog catcher, the duties to be assumed by the city marshal, the elimination of the street cleaner and using those dependent on the city for assistance to perform these duties, placing the mayor on a per diem basis as formerly and eliminating his salary, and recommending that the city park be planted in vegetables.

COUNTY HAS NO T-B IN STOCK

ONLY THREE REACTIONARIES FOUND DURING RECENT TEST OF CATTLE IN COUNTY

Only three reactionaries were found in Ochiltree county in the recent tuberculosis eradication work completed here last week, all of them being in dairy cows. The infected cows have been slaughtered.

The eradication work was conducted by a party of veterinaries working under the direction of the Bureau of Animal Industry, United States Department of Agriculture and Ochiltree county is now included in the modified accredited area.

One more test will be made in about sixty days by Dr. Daniel M. Purdy, retesting the herd where two of the reactionaries were found, to determine whether or not the disease had been contracted at any of the other cows.

According to the five veterinaries conducting the work, Ochiltree is the cleanest county they have ever worked in, considering the large number of cattle examined and the few number of infected animals found.

Dressmaking Contest

In explaining this the manager of the store pointed out that the modern pattern is of such extreme simplicity that even the most inexperienced seamstress can make a clever and tasteful gown with ease. The great strides taken in the design and coloring of piece goods as well as a consequent drop in prices of really fine fabrics has made a big point with women, concluded the store manager.

The judging of the dresses entered in the contest will be held at the store at the close of the contest on September 29.

The judges in deciding upon the winning dress will not be aware of the makers name. All dresses entered in the contest will be tagged and numbered, so that only the manager of the store will have information relative to the owner of the dress.

Dresses entered in the contest will be judged on a scoring sheet of color, harmony, style, design, and workmanship. Winning dresses with the names of the owners will be on display in the store windows following the judging. Wall plaques suitable for hanging will be given for the first three prizes.

TWO OFFENDERS ARE CONVICTED

HUNG JURY IN ELMER DILLINGHAM CASE; LEROY BARKER JURY IS STILL OUT

Two convictions have been returned in district court this week, both on liquor charges, another case resulting in a hung jury and a fourth case just being turned to the jury late Thursday evening.

Claud Tension, charged with transportation of liquor was found guilty by the jury and sentenced to one and one-half years in the penitentiary. Tension's trial was held Monday. The case of sale of intoxicating liquor against Elmer Dillingham resulted in a hung jury, the vote being ten to two for conviction. The jury was dismissed Wednesday night without reaching a decision.

George Trosper was sentenced to one year in the penitentiary on a liquor sale charge when found guilty by a jury that was out all night Wednesday night, returning the verdict Thursday morning.

The case of State vs. Leroy Barker was turned over to the jury for decision last Thursday evening and as the Herald was printed, no verdict had been returned.

Several other cases on the criminal docket will come up during this term of court, all of them being liquor cases. The grand jury returned seventeen bills of indictment, but arrests have not been made in all of the cases.

Texas Tech And Texas Aggies Will Clash At Tri-State Fair, September 24

AMARILLO, Sept. 14.—Interest in the Tri-State Fair sponsored college football game to be played in Amarillo on September 24, the last day of this year's exposition, is mounting daily and not without sufficient cause.

Both of the teams, the Aggies of College Station, and the Matadors of Texas Tech, promise to be among the southwest's greatest this season.

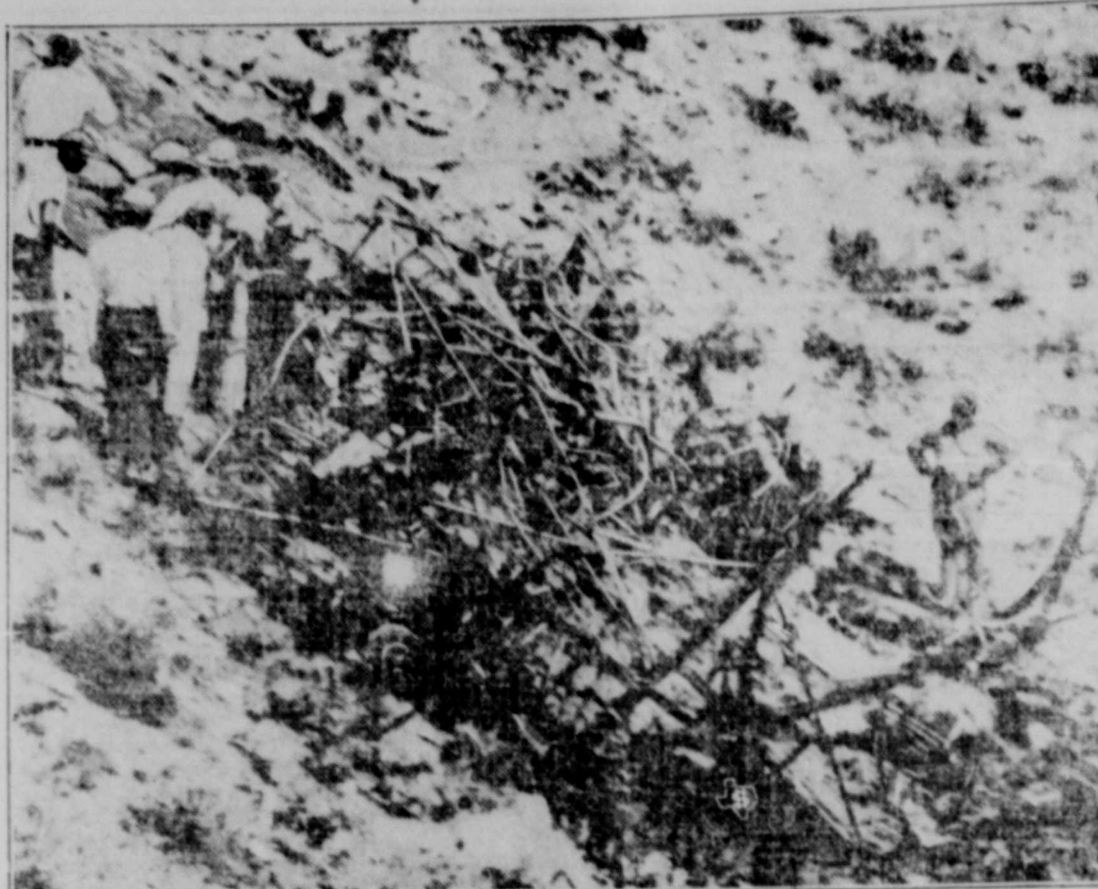

"TOM BROWN OF CULVER"
HAD TO BE ACCURATE

Strict accuracy was an essential feature of the production of "Tom Brown of Culver", the Universal drama which comes to the Ellis Theatre on Monday and Tuesday, with Tom Brown, H. B. Warner and Slim Summerville in the featured roles.

The story deals with boys' life at

the famous Culver Military Academy in Indiana, and the preparation of the scenario involved the most painstaking attention to detail. 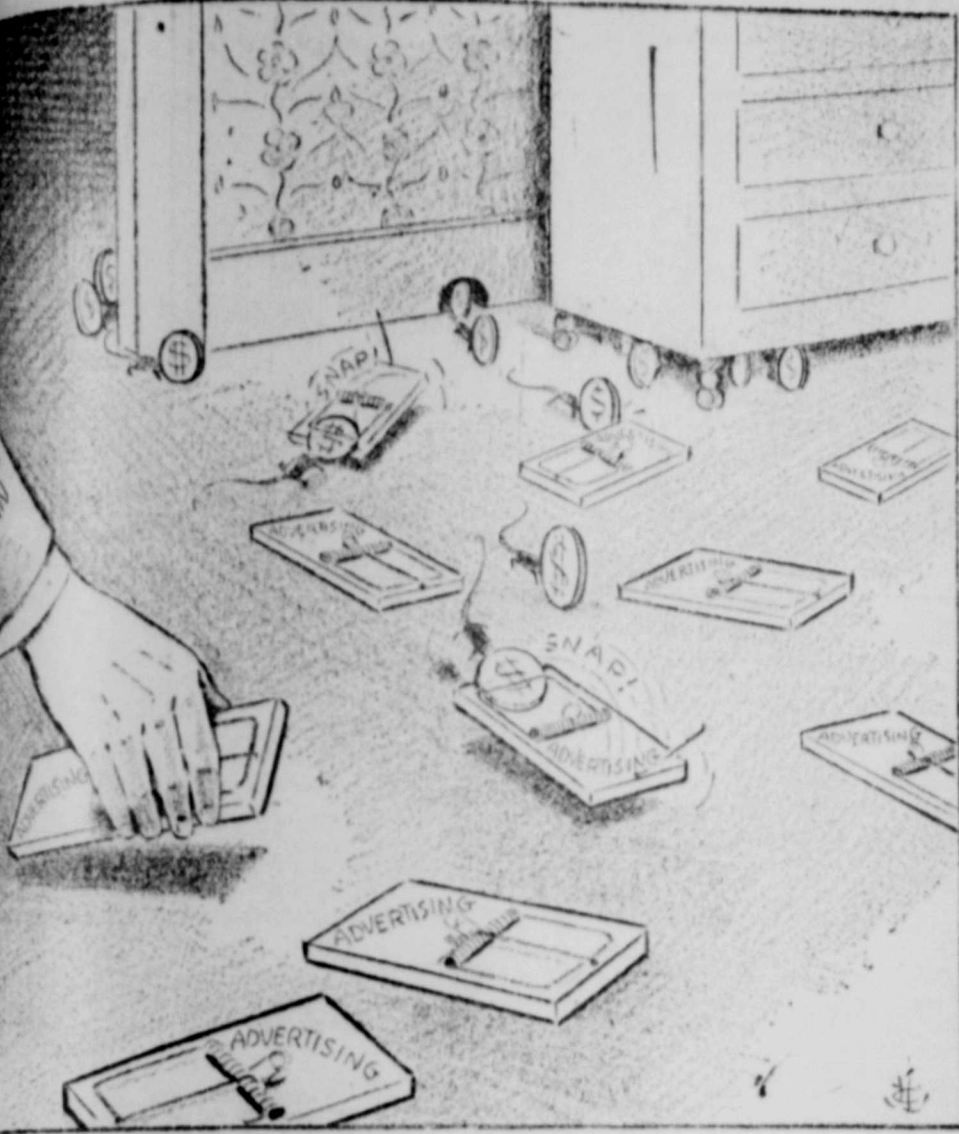

Crop Production Loans

Many Loans Already Repaid Although Not Due Until November 30 This Year

Notwithstanding that crop production loans made by the Department of Agriculture this year are not due until November 30, during the third week of August farmers had already repaid \$643,000 of these loans. The repayments made so far are from the proceeds of such products as truck, berries and garden crops.

With the heavy marketing season for wheat and cotton now beginning, the Department looks for a considerable upturn of repayments in the near future.

The loan office at Washington has about 600 men in the field checking up on farmers to see that they do not market their crops without paying off the Government loans.

In the opinion of officials of the Department this year will probably add considerably to collections on loans made in 1931. In many cases, particularly in the Northwest, where severe drought continued last year after a distressing dry season in 1930 farmers who had been unable to repay their 1931 loans were granted extensions in time. The crop production loans made by the Department this year amounted to approximately \$65,000,000.

More Loans For Farms

Making Available Relief Funds Provided By Congress For Needy Farmers

Preparations are being rushed by the Reconstruction Finance Corporation for the establishment of regional agricultural credit corporations, as authorized by the Emergency Relief and Construction Act, signed by the President on July 21. It has been definitely decided to locate eight of these agricultural credit corporations as follows:

Land Bank District No. 4—Comprising states of Ohio, Indiana, Kentucky and Tennessee. Main Office, Columbus, O.; branch office, Louisville, Ky.

District No. 6—Comprising states of Illinois, Missouri and Arkansas. Main office, St. Louis, Mo.; branch offices, Chicago, Ill., Kansas City, Mo., Little Rock, Ark.

District No. 7—Comprising states of Michigan, Wisconsin, Minnesota and North Dakota. Main office, Minneapolis, Minn.

District No. 8—Comprising states of Iowa, Nebraska, South Dakota and Wyoming. Main office, Sioux City, Iowa; branch office, Omaha, Neb.

District No. 9—Comprising states of Kansas, Oklahoma, Colorado and New Mexico. Main office, Wichita, Kans.; branch offices, Oklahoma City, Okla., Denver, Colo.

District No. 10—Comprising State of Texas. Main office, Fort Worth, Texas; branch offices, Houston, Texas, San Angelo, Texas.

District No. 11—Comprising states of Arizona, Utah, Nevada and California. Main office, Salt Lake City, Utah; branch offices, San Francisco, Calif., Phoenix, Ariz.

District No. 12—Comprising states of Montana, Idaho, Oregon and Washington. Main office, Spokane, Wash.; branch offices, Helena, Mont., Portland, Ore.

Two additional regional agricultural credit corporations will be established later, one in Land Bank District No. 3, comprising the states of North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia and Florida; and one in District No. 5, comprising the states of Alabama, Mississippi and Louisiana.

Under the terms of the act, the

Reconstruction Finance Corporation is authorized to set up regional corporations, with a minimum capital of \$3,000,000. These corporations may make loans or advances to farmers and live stock men and make loans direct to the borrowers, rather than through local associations, as is the case in borrowing from the Federal Land Banks.

The rate of interest to be charged is left to the discretion of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation. Truck License Law Amendment Passed House Of Representatives

The following clipping from the House Journal was received this week from Representative A. C. Johnson, dealing with the amendment to House Bill 336, modifying that part of the provision relating to licensing drivers of motor trucks. Regarding the amendment, Mr. Johnson states: "The bill to accomplish this was introduced by Mr. Burns of McCulloch county, and I enclose herewith a page from the House Journal, showing that I joined with him and others in working out an amendment, which was done after consultation with the Attorney General's department and the highway department."

The reference to the bill, as taken from the House Journal, reads in part as follows: "H. B. No. 32, A bill to be entitled 'An Act amending paragraph 8 of Section 9 of Chapter 282 of the General Laws passed by the Regular Session of the Forty-second Legislature relative to the licensing of chauffeurs of trucks, and declaring an emergency.'"

The bill was read second time. Mr. Burns of McCulloch offered the following amendment to the bill. Amend House Bill No. 32, by striking out all below the enacting clause and insert in lieu thereof the following:

"Section 1. That Section 10 of House bill No. 336, passed at the Regular Session of the Forty-second Legislature, shall be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 10-A and to read as follows:

"Section 10-A. Provided that a person owning any motor vehicle or his employee transporting his own farm produce or live stock to and from market, or any dealer or his employee demonstrating such a motor vehicle for the purpose of sale, and not operating for compensation or hire, shall not be liable for the chauffeur's license provided for in Section 10 of House bill No. 336, passed by the Regular Session of the Forty-second Legislature and or in Article 6587 of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925.

"Sec. 2. If any section, subsection, clause, sentence, or phrase of this act is for any reason held to be unconstitutional and invalid, such decision shall not effect the validity of the remaining portions of this act. The Legislature hereby declares that it would have passed this act, and each section, subsection, sentence, clause, or phrase be declared unconstitutional.

"Sec. 3. The fact that many ranchmen and farmers of Texas are being unduly burdened by the existing law which requires them and their employees to obtain a chauffeur's license before transporting their own commodities to and from market with their own truck, creates an
