Cherry Gives Resignation To Bovina School Board

Supt. W. O. Cherry, who for the past thirteen years has served as the popular head of the Bovina public schools, tendered his resignation to the board of education recently, effective on June 30th. Cherry had recently been re-elected by the official body to serve another term. In making the announcement, Supt. Cherry said, "I have a genuine and deep interest in the welfare of the Bovina schools and the Bovina community, which I shall continue to maintain for much time to come."

The resigning school head will leave shortly after the conclusion of the current term for Lorenzo, Texas, to assume the superintendency of that school on July 1st. Incidentally, the Bovina superintendent began his teaching activities in Lorenzo, in 1925. After serving as principal of the elementary school there, he acted as principal and superintendent of the McAdoo school for eight years before moving to Bovina in 1936.

No More Releases On Stored Milo

No more releases on warehouse stored milo are being accepted, it was announced here today through the Farmer County ACA office.

During the month of April a determined effort has been made to obtain releases from the producers on stored milo in order to make room for the anticipated heavy wheat harvest. Attaches at the ACA office said here today that the response had been very satisfactory. No further releases are being accepted for the reason that all details of effecting the release could not be worked out before April 30, the date on which the loans on stored grain expire.

"We are still taking releases on farm stored yellow milo," it was stated at the local office, and officials further said that "purchase agreement grain can be hauled in at any time."

Two Farwell Entrants Qualify For State

Two Farwell track men, John Christian and Toby Booth qualified for entry in state events at the regional Class B meet, held on Saturday in Lubbock, Coach Louis Purvis said today.

Booth stepped off the 100-yard dash in 10.8 seconds, to take first place in the event, while Christian leaped for second in the high jump. Jerry Pool also placed at Lubbock, taking third in the high jump, but only first and second place winners are eligible for state participation.

The heart-breaker of the day, however, fell to the lot of the local relay team, which broke the regional record, running the 440 in only 46.7 seconds - to discover that the final baton hand-off had been past the marker, with the team being disqualified. The squad was composed of Booth, Pool, Ford and Thomas.

District Highway Engineer S. C. McCarty of Lubbock, has given his approval to another 8-mile extension of the Friona to Muleshoe farm to market road in Farmer County and will ask that the State Highway Department include the extension in its program at an early date.

McCarty gave his approval to the route to members of the Farmer County Commissioners Court when they met with him at Lubbock the past Thursday afternoon.

The eight miles of additional construction would extend the pavement to approximately two miles south of the twin houses, Judge A. D. Smith said, which would be some three miles short of connecting with the Bailey County pavement at the Bailey-Parmer county line. The reason for not closing the gap between these two strips of pavement at this time was that sufficient funds are not available to Farmer County just now.

McCarty expressed the hope that he would be able to persuade the Highway Department to close the entire gap when the contract is let, and said that he would work to that end, Judge Smith stated.

This piece of road will be built with State and Federal money, the county being required to provide only the right of way. Funds for the construction are already available.

Aged Lady Dies After Four Years In Bed

Mrs. Sara Kate Jefferson, 87, for many years a resident of Bovina, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. A. F. Randall in Albuquerque, last Tuesday morning, after being bedfast for four years, following a fall in which she sustained a broken hip.

New Mexico Governor Opens Mabry Drive

Gov. Thomas J. Mabry of New Mexico snipped the ribbon that formally opened the four-lane highway between Texico and Clovis Tuesday afternoon in a road-opening ceremony that was attended by a vast crowd, including many New Mexico notables.

Mayor Bob Vinyard of Clovis, and Mayor Orville Francis of Texico took part in the ceremony, held at the city limits in west Texico.

Officials designated the 10-mile four-lane highway that separates Clovis and Texico as "Mabry Drive", the Governor opened the first four-lane strip of highway construction in New Mexico.

Texico Students Will Attend State Camps

Candidates from the Texico school to attend Boys State and Girls State camps in New Mexico this summer were named the first of the week, Supt. B. A. Rogers announces.

These camps, which are promoted by the American Legion, are held in June, and are actually civic training fields, with the young people taking over the election of various officials and then working out governing problems. The boys camp is held at El Rito, while the girls are to assemble at Santa Fe.

Coeta Roth has been named for the Texico girls, with Frankie Harris as alternate, and Benny Jim Bilington was selected from the boys. Students must come from the junior class, and must have high scholastic standings, Rogers added. All schools of Curry county will be allowed one or more representatives to the assemblies.

Two Friona Men Are Injured On Friday

Two Friona men, Glen C. Stevick and A. L. Stokes, received medical treatment at the Farmer County Community Hospital in Friona, the past Friday, following accidents.

Stevick received severe burns on his right hand while making a tie-in on a high line pole. He was knocked to the ground and was unconscious for a few seconds from the shock.

Stokes employed by the Roberts Construction Company in Friona, lost the tip of a finger on his right hand when the finger became entangled in the belt of a motor.

Both men are recuperating, hospital officials advised.

The Farmer County Commissioners Court, in a special session held in Farwell, Tuesday morning at ten o'clock, passed an order, calling a special election to be held on Saturday, May 28, at which time the qualified voters of the county will determine if the county will issue bonds in the amount of \$1,150,000.00 to be used in the construction of hard-surfaced farm to market roads in the county.

A petition, asking that the election be called, was presented to the Commissioners Court several days ago. A county-wide mass meeting, held at Bovina Monday night, went on record as favoring that the election be called at once.

The bond issue vote is the result of a movement launched some months ago, in which the Friona Chamber of Commerce took the lead, to get a program of hard-surfaced farm roads built in the county. Following the lead of the Friona Chamber, Bovina and Farwell Chamber have approved the calling of the election.

The bonds, if voted, would bear interest at the rate of not to exceed 3½% interest, and would be issued for a period of not to exceed thirty years.

Tentative agreements have been reached as to the location of the proposed roads under the program, and County Judge A. D. Smith said here today that he was having maps drawn by a Lubbock engineer, giving the exact locations of the roads to be paved under the program, should the bond issue carry.

Under the proposed program, a total of 140 miles of surfaced roads would be built in the county and the mileage would be divided equally between the four commissioners precinct.

Balloting places and election officials are set forth in the order calling the election. Otherwise, the manner of conducting the election shall follow the regular Texas election laws. Eight balloting places are set forth in the order.

New Storage Finished At Bovina Elevator

The new concrete and steel storage bins at the Bovina Wheat Growers elevator in Bovina, which have been under construction since last February, were completed last Friday, and is now ready for operation.

H. C. Potts, who has been manager of the firm since last December 15 said that the new storage would increase capacity to approximately 107,000 bushels, and the cost of the new storage would run "around \$24,000". D. L. Walters, of Amarillo, was the contractor.

Potts also stated that Lee Thompson, who resigned the management of the firm a few months ago to accept a position with an oil firm as a traveling salesman, was coming back to Bovina and would take over the elevator management job again. Thompson was scheduled to re-assume his duties on Monday. Potts added that he would become associated with the Macon Elevator at Bovina.

The Texico Cemetery Association will have the regular annual burial ground working on Thursday, April 28, and all members of the group are urged to be on hand early in the forenoon for an all-day work program.

Health Notes

By Texas Department of Health

AUSTIN—Emphasizing the importance of proper sanitation standards in public eating establishments, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, urges the patrons of such establishments to insist upon cleanliness in the preparation and dispensing of foods.

The health authorities cannot maintain daily inspection of cafes and other food handling places, and if the public is careless in accepting unsanitary conditions, dozens of infectious diseases can be transmitted to the public from food and utensils.

"Food handlers schools are being taught constantly throughout the State," Dr. Cox said, "and every cafe owner should take advantage of these schools to see that his personnel is trained in the sanitary methods of preparing, storing and dispensing food to the public. If that is their profession, they should qualify themselves to do the work safely. This is the restaurant owner's responsibility to his patrons."

The public should insist upon a cafe free of roaches, flies, and other insects; cracked dishes should never be used; tables and linens, as well as dishes and silverware should be scrupulously clean, and milk should be served in the original container, with the cap intact. They should note whether or not a cafe displays a placard stating that its standards of sanitation have been approved by local, or State health officials.

"Obviously the best in sanitation can be had only through close co-operation between the public and health officials. As long as the public approves and accepts insanitary conditions in eating establishments, they will continue to exist," Dr. Cox warned.

Texas Called Most Air-Conditioned Spot In World

Texas is the most completely air-conditioned region in the world, John E. Haines, vice president of Minneapolis-Honeywell Regulator Company, has concluded after a study of construction activity in the state.

Tech To Offer New Course Next Year

LUBBOCK—An interdepartmental major in American civilization planned by English, history and economics departments at Texas Technological college will be offered next year 1949-50.

Dr. W. B. Gates, professor of English, is to supervise the new major. He said the addition of this course at Texas Tech, which crosses all departmental lines to give a view of America from history, economics and culture standpoints, brings to three the number of schools offering such a major.

Requirements for the first two years of college for those students following the new major will be practically the same as those for any other major leading to a degree of bachelor of arts, Dr. Gates said. The junior and senior years will emphasize American literature, American history and anthropology.

Two courses in the English department, American life and literature to 1860 and American life and literature since 1860, have been added as requirements for the first time next year.

Safe Driving Contest Is Opportunity For Fine Public Service

A safe driving contest, under sponsorship of the Interscholastic League assisted by the Department of Public Safety, the Department of Education and Texas Safety Association, as has been proposed, commends itself as not only being thoroughly practical, but necessary.

Of some 1,200 high schools, about half have safety courses. All should have them. And of this number only a relatively few have behind the wheel safety courses.

As the twig is bent, the tree is inclined. The time to get a thorough grounding in the principles of driving safety is in the student's most formative years, when they will stick to him, instead of the hit and miss variety of "pick-up" instruction so general, in which youngsters approaching the driver license age requirement too often have to try to learn by the system of trial and error. Error means accident, and an accident can mean a death or serious injury.

Under the proposed rules a written examination and driving test would be provided. The entering students must have completed or be taking an approved course in driver education and driver training during the current year, and must never have been involved, as a driver, in a reportable traffic accident, or have been arrested for a traffic violation.

A certain result of such a contest, organized on carefully laid and practical lines, would be the saving of life and prevention of injury and serious loss of property.

Texas' high automobile accident fatality record is a tragic testimonial to failure to abide by safety principles and to the carelessness that is responsible for that failure.

The schools of the state owe an obligation to their students, parents and the public in promotion of safety, and this proposal, under such fine sponsorship and co-sponsorship, is an opportunity for invaluable public service.

Fresh Rhubarb Pie



Folks won't need to guess what this pie's all about, for tart, rosy rhubarb gets a chance to show its virtues with individual pastry wedges baked atop the pie.

"Pieplant" is an old name for rhubarb, but a very appropriate one. Crisp rhubarb stalks, rosy or cherry-colored, make a spring pie that is pleasantly tart and sparkling.

'Tis a pity to hide such an inviting filling, so cut five or six triangles of pastry to arrange on top the pie, one for each serving. Cut the wedges with a pastry wheel to get the pretty scalloped effect, and place pastry over filling before baking.

Since this is a juicy pie, the favorite crimped edge is the one to use to hold in the juices. Make this by pressing dough together between thumb and finger of left hand and forefinger of right hand.

Pie is a favorite dessert, and a satisfying one. That's reason enough to make fresh rhubarb pie a luncheon or dinner pastry treat often this spring.

RHUBARB PIE

1½ cups sifted enriched flour
½ teaspoon salt

Sift together flour and salt. Cut or rub in shortening. Add water gradually. Mix to a dry, crumbly dough. Toss out on lightly floured pastry cloth. Press dough together. Roll two-thirds of the dough to a circle one-eighth inch thick. Line nine-inch pie pan with pastry. Fill with rhubarb filling.

½ cup shortening
2 to 3 tablespoons cold water

Roll out remaining pastry to circle one-eighth inch thick. Cut into five or six triangular wedges. Arrange evenly over rhubarb filling. Bake in hot oven (450 degrees F.) 10 minutes. Reduce heat to moderate (350 degrees F.) and continue baking 45 minutes.

Rhubarb Filling

1½ pounds fresh rhubarb
¼ cup sugar

Cut cleaned rhubarb into half-inch lengths. Add sugar, flour

¼ cup enriched flour
¼ teaspoon salt

and salt to rhubarb and mix well.

Wheat Storage Survey Being Made in Texas

FORT WORTH—With Texas wheat farmers preparing for an early harvest of what could be a record crop, a statewide survey is being made of the now undetermined amount of storage space that will be available to handle the golden grain.

The Production and Marketing Administration and Commodity Credit Corporation are co-operating in the survey which will be completed in 10 days.

Several large elevators are under construction and a number of individual farmers are heeding the warning to prepare storage space on their own land until railroads and elevators can handle the harvest.

G. E. Blewett, secretary-treasurer of the Texas Grain and Feed Dealers Association, made a survey last February of Texas storage facilities. That showed a total capacity of 133,000,000 bushels and did not include government hangars or other buildings not generally classified as suitable for storing grains.

The later capacity is being increased to an unknown extent by new construction, which Blewett estimated might equal or exceed 5,000,000 bushels. All this building is being done with private capital.

Conservative sources are estimating this year's yield at 99,000,000 bushels. Equally authentic sources are of the opinion the crop could go to 120,000,000 bushels or perhaps exceed the all-time high of 1947 when the wheat crop was estimated at between 124,000,000 and 130,000,000 bushels.

In 1947 Texas had 7,587,000 acres in wheat. On Dec. 1 government reports showed a planted acreage for this year of 7,630,000 acres of about 113 per cent of the seeded acreage in 1948, which was 6,752,000 acres and on which 56,290,000 bushels were produced.

Restaurant Operator Turns Forecaster

AUSTIN—Do you think it will rain? Ask the nearest restaurant operator. He knows.

With professional assurance, Patrick D. Moreland, executive vice president of the Texas Restaurant Association, has determined the mathematical probabilities of Galveston weather for three June days during which his association will have its annual convention and trade show.

Not only has he determined the statistical odds against rain June 7, 8, and 9, but he was amazed that anyone should think it unusual.

He said that he was doing no more than any successful restaurant operator does year in and year out. Restaurant owners base their food purchases on the probable weather temperature and rainfall are acute financial problems in the business and the average restaurant man is a student of the almanac, Moreland said.

He said that the best example of the effect of weather on Texas restaurant trade is the rush for Mexican food every time the temperature drops.

Here are the TRA manager's odds on rain during his convention:

It will not rain in Galveston June 9. Odds are 16 to 1 against rain next June 7. In favor of a dry June 8 the odds are 14 to 3. Odds against a three-day rain are about 1000 to 1.

He is predicting no rain in Galveston June 9 because in the last 17 years it never has rained on that day. His weather research revealed that, except for a mild drizzle in 1935, only once has there been rain on June 7. The only day which gives him any concern is June 8: it rained in 1940, 1942 and 1946 on that day and there was a light drizzle in 1935.

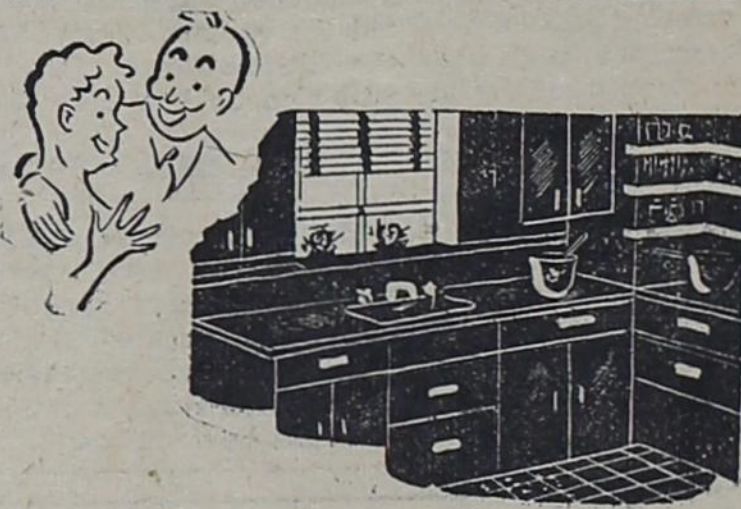

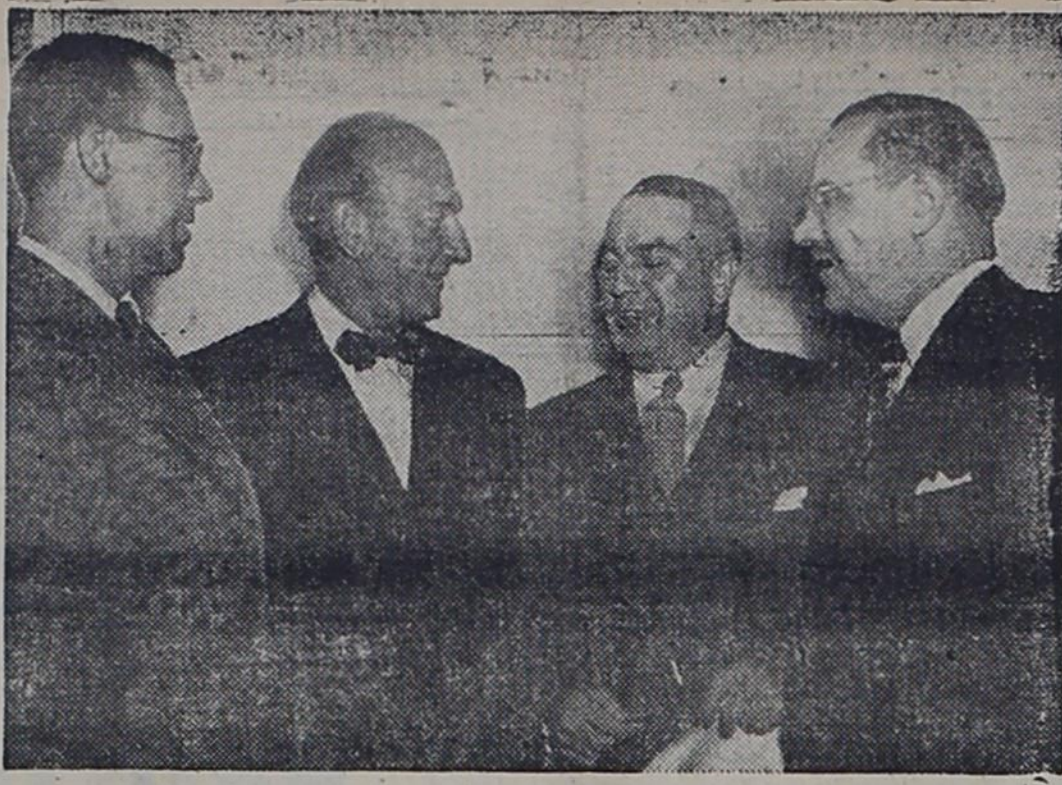
