Vernon Orchestra Will Play For Annual Meet On Dec. 2

Nichols To Speak

The five in one musical maidens one of the outstanding musical organizations of North Texas, will present a series of entertainment features as one of the events of the annual chamber of commerce banquet in Burk Burnett Thursday December 2. The orchestra is directed by Ira V. Younger of Vernon and has won wide recognition as one of the best entertaining groups in the Wilbarger county area.

The orchestra is composed of 14 members who will play during the banquet and give specialty numbers during the formal program.

The annual banquet plans are progressing rapidly. The program committee, Ray Hill, A. B. Sandler, and Jack Brumley announced Wednesday that the program had been completed. The feature speaker will be Ray Nichols, Vernon publisher, and Miss Barbara Crissey of Burk Burnett will sing.

The banquet will be a tribute to the farmers of this territory with each of the business men inviting a farmer and the organization extending the invitation to others. The guests who wish to attend have been requested to register with the secretary of the organization at the city hall before next Wednesday night Dec. 1. Reservations must be made on or before Wednesday.

The entire theme of the banquet will be a tribute to the agriculture industry and to the farmers of this district specifically. Farmers in both Texas and Oklahoma have been sent the invitations.

The ticket sales for the banquet started Wednesday afternoon. The committee, Wiley Browning, Jack Brumley, Oscar Kemp, and A. H. Lohofener started a canvass of the city to bring an attendance of 100 per cent to the annual meeting.

The election of the most worthy citizen in the city will be one of the features of the annual meeting. Ballots were recently published for the selection of the candidates, and the members of organization will vote on the person whom they wish to honor this year.

Duck Season To Open Saturday

Local Nimrods Prepare For Good Season of Shooting

J. H. Dozier, district game warden, announced Wednesday that the duck season for this district would open Saturday Nov. 27 and would continue through December 26. Starting at dawn Saturday the hunters in Burk Burnett and area will start the annual pilgrimage to nearby fields for their supply of the wild game. However, strict limits will be imposed on hunters this year with the bags limited to 10 ducks and 5 geese for the day. At the same time this limit will apply to possession at one time.

Daylight will start Saturday morning officially at 7 o'clock and sun down will be officially at 4 p. m. Hunters shooting any other time will be severely prosecuted by the state game and fish department. There is no open season on wood ducks, canvas backs, ruddy ducks, red heads, Coot, Buffelheads, and Ross geese. The strict restrictions include three shells per gun with choke to prevent further loading, a federal stamp and license for hunting outside of the county in which the hunter lives.

Mr. Dozier urged the hunters to use care in shooting. Shooting down, across, or on state highways is a violation of the law, and the enforcement department will watch such hunters.

BULLDOGS REPEAT LEAGUE TITLE DRIVE BY SERIES OF VICTORIES OVER SIX CONFERENCE RIVALS

The spirits of the Burk Burnett football team and the Burk Burnett fans ran high here Wednesday after the announcement of the eligibility of John Blair, the star end of the Bulldog team by the district executive committee. The decision gave back to the local football team the district championship, a title won for the second successive time, which the team had gained by the most spectacular series of victories that any champion of the district ever made.

The team settled down to the routine workout in preparation for the bi-district game which if Stamford wins the title of 9-B will be played in Burk Burnett next Friday week Dec. 3 at 2:30 p. m. In the high school Wednesday morning the most spectacular pep rally ever held almost blasted away the roof of the auditorium as the peppers and the team rejoiced in the victory.

Mother's Testimony And Bible Proves Blair's Eligibility

John Blair, star Burk Burnett end was declared eligible by the members of the district 10-B executive committee meeting at the Wichita Falls county court house in the justice of peace rooms Tuesday afternoon and Burk Burnett was awarded all the games forfeited by the committee when they declared the end ineligible last week.

The district executive committee, after four hours of debate and examination of evidence, decided that new facts brought to light since Blair was declared ineligible on Nov. 15 warranted it in restoring the star end to eligibility and giving Burk Burnett back its conference record of six victories and no defeats. The Bulldogs defeated the only other contender for the title at Crowell last Friday.

Crowell's contention that Blair was 18 years of age before Sept. 1 was not allowed.

Comes From New Jersey

Mrs. Seletia Blair, the players mother, came from Camden, N. J., to testify in her son's behalf. The family Bible, a book published in 1902 and bought by the Blairs in 1907, was the principal piece of evidence offered. In it was found an entry for John Pershing Foch Blair's birth on Sept. 15, 1918.

Mrs. Blair testified that the entry was in her own handwriting, H. H. Carson of the City National Bank, a handwriting expert verified her signature, and Crowell did not dispute it. The Bible had been in the possession of Mrs. Blair's sister in New York City, who sent it to Burk Burnett before the hearing.

Doctor Unable to Appear

Dr. J. A. Collins of Gordonville had been asked to come to the hearing and testify as to the verity of his affidavit that Blair was born after Sept. 1 and explain the entry in his book which was a principal cause for the adverse decision against Burk Burnett in the last hearing.

This entry read:
"J. H. Blair.....\$15.
Obstetrics, baby B.
"8 '25, '18."

Burk Burnett officials brought the evidence of the book into question, claiming that there was an erasure on the page. Significance was also attached by them to the fact that the entry did not positively show the date of Blair's birth, but only the date of payment for an obstetrical case which the doctor had been called on.

Patients Hold Doctor

Dr. Collins sent word that he was unable to appear because of several patients in urgent condition whom he could not leave. The doctor suffers from rheumatism, which would make it difficult for him to make the trip.

The resolution of the committee was read by the chairman, J. F. Kemp of Seymour, was signed by him and by J. W. Hancock of Chillicothe and W. R. Bradford of Iowa Park.

The committee kept Mrs. Blair in the witness chair more than an hour. It then examined the Bible at length, and brought in the school census records of Wichita county and Cotton county, Oklahoma.

Testimony by Mrs. Blair and by the handwriting expert, Mr. Carson, was to the effect that Mrs. Blair had not signed either of the census blanks but had written the

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ACHIEVEMENT DAY

Those outside of the Hardin Home demonstration club were really surprised when they read the report of the work that has been done by that organization as reported on achievement day Wednesday afternoon. The club report was divided into three divisions. There were reports of the improvement of the kitchens, the wardrobes, and the canning done by members. These reports exceeded even the most optimistic estimates of the members.

Particularly striking in the report was that the membership had canned almost 2,000 jars of food during the year. There isn't a single activity of the club which is more indicative of the efficiency of its members.

Not all of the members are residents of farms, but one of the most persistent criticisms of the farmers and other average householders during the last few years has been that the individuals did not take advantage of the opportunities to serve themselves in activities of this nature. Most farmers could raise the larger share of their food at home and achieve an independence that they have lost by greater attention to such matters.

The activities of the Hardin Club points to a solution of many problems which have vexed the residents of both the farm and the city. When food bills start mounting, when household expenses exceed the budgeted allowances, when clothing requires more money than the pocketbook can stand, some readjustments are necessary. The clubs work seems to indicate that its members are seeking successfully to make those readjustments. At least achievement day reports indicate that they have made progress along that line.

Chamber Of Commerce And The Farmers

The chamber of Commerce has wisely decided that next Thursday night in the annual meeting of the organization that the theme of the meeting will be a tribute to the farmers. During the past few months when we have had so much difficulty as the result of the extended mid-summer drouth, we have really learned the valuable lesson of how much our farmer residents mean to the success of the community. These sturdy citizens have until recently been neglected both by local communities, state and national government.

The lesson that we have learned should be a guide to us as business men in the city to lead us to a more intelligent appreciation of the farmer and his problems. This interest can possibly lead to a greater prosperity for us.

When we have found that our initial source of wealth is in the soil, that the booms and industries draw their riches from the fact that 30 million American citizens have devoted their lives to wresting the last ounce of productivity from soil rich and poor, then we can establish a more solid relationship between agriculture and industry.

On the other hand if the farmer remains a victim of the industrial scheme which hogs the spotlight of national economics and politics, the victim of a pernicious system which by given bonus and advantage by tariff and bounty to the industrialist, then ultimately a day of severe reckoning awaits for us.

Such then is our attitude when we say bravo to the chamber of commerce which recognizes the fundamental wealth of any community is born on the farm.

NO EXCEPTIONS

The ideal for the enforcement of traffic laws either in Burkburnett or any place in the state is the achievement of a state where there are no exceptions. Most of us agree theoretically that speed ought to be curbed when it becomes excessive and that reckless driving is criminal carelessness, but at the same time not an individual will accept without protest a court summons given by an officer when caught in the act of violating the traffic codes of the state or city.

This tendency has been well illustrated in Burkburnett many times. Those persons most active in leading the movement to secure better conditions, such as the placing of stop lights at the schools, have been guilty of disregard themselves when the occasion arose. That school light system has been a particular hobby for this paper.

It seems that some people think that the fact that they are in a hurry justifies the complete disregard of the signals. It would appear that these individuals feel that of they are important or influential, or if they are in a rush that their killing a child would be either justifiable or at least not so criminal.

Considering the heavy traffic that the limited number of officers of this city handle, it is remarkable that we haven't had any more deaths than we have. It is remarkable that injuries and accidents have been so few. But we will not always be so fortunate. Chief of Police Bill Stapp and his crew have made serious attempts to enforce the traffic regulations. Almost without an exception the person challenged by these officers have been angry and attempted to secure special privilege.

HEADLINES

A Strange Combine

The combination between Germany and England would be of the most amazing modern political lineups coming out of the jumbled maze of European intrigue. However, such a combination would be powerful factor in world peace. Any agreement between Germany and England which would be sincerely kept, would be a huge weight on the balance that would make the decision of these two nations or either of them count for international relationships.

Germany already has airtight alliances with Italy and Japan, and England has almost as binding friendship with Russia and France. The agreement to combine their influence would place the two nations in a position to dominate European politics. Since these nations more or less have the leadership in the two powerful European lineups, they are necessary to concerted action by either group, and hold the balance of power. Out of the agreement may come long and lasting peace when no other possible combination could produce such a condition.

Burk Headlines

So far as Burkburnett is concerned there are no headlines so important as the recent struggle for eligibility of John Blair. That flurry of squabbles led to more comment in Burkburnett than any news event has in the last four or five years. Even murder trials, and accidents failed to cause as much interest as the question about John's age. So the community has been in such a puzzle that nearly all normal business stopped for the entire week. Instead of business the first question greeting the merchant or business man was "have you heard anything?" Now that it is settled beyond any shadow of recall. Since the research has definitely established the facts in the case, maybe grocery men can go back to selling beans and potatoes, and dry goods merchants selling pants and overalls. We're glad it is over.

Oklahoma Politics

There may not be very much that is inspiring about Oklahoma politics, but you can never say that it is dull or uninteresting. That state has produced some of the most interesting (to outsiders) political personalities of the nation. The constant fight on the governors of the state and the messy senatorial and congressional battles make reading for the rest of the nation. There are such strange tricks as a man running under his own name "Will Rogers", and winning because voters are strangely indifferent to the facts about which they vote. The announcement of Bill Murray as candidate for governor of Oklahoma will add interest to the political race this year. He has been one of the most interesting men in Oklahoma, and possibly one of the strangest. He has been an out right opponent of the democratic administration under Roosevelt, and will possibly get the votes of the malecontents.

Processing Tax

Just when we started yelling because the cost of food and clothing is so high, the far program for next year includes a processing tax. The recommendations for legislation by the administration includes such a tax. The tax would produce about 100 million dollars on wheat alone, and a relative amount from cotton and corn. It is necessary to finance the cotton and wheat crop control programs, but the processing tax is distributing the burden among the necessities of the average class of people in a way that may become intolerable before many years. What happens is that the mills and buyers of cotton and wheat apply the tax immediately to the products regardless of the fact that they may have millions of bushels or millions of bales supply on hand.

CAPITAL NEWS
LETTER

By W. D. McFARLANE

On October 12, the president officially called the Congress into special session for November 15th giving Congress more than a month's notice and time to get ready. Before adjournment in August the Congress set farm progress set farm first order of

business, with wage and hour, tax loophole, regional planning and Departmental reorganization as important legislation to be considered.

Each of these committees considering this legislation was thus amply notified to begin hearings and have this legislation ready for consideration. Each of these committees knew this legislation would be pending business when we reconvened whether in November or January and each of these committees had been considering this legislation for the past six months or more. Yet, what do we find the facts to be. Disregarding the emergency the notice given and the importance of immediately enacting this legislation to block the program of the reactionaries to further force us into another Wall Street-made depression, for reasons best known to these committees, they have failed and refused to function and have largely let the wall streeters have their way.

All this Congress has heard since our return has been to repeal the undistributed net surplus corporation tax and to nullify the capital gains and loss provisions of the income tax law. These two measures being important provisions of the Revenue laws that require the wealth of the nation to pay their proportionate part of the tax burden.

It is well known that the Corporations should never have been allowed to store up these large surpluses through which they have avoided income tax payment for many years. No individual or partnership has been allowed such a tax loophole, and the gains and loss provisions of the income tax law is the very heart of this law and to weaken it as planned, practically destroys the justice of the principle of income tax law. Yet, big business through their control of the press, the radio and all other means of communications has set this as their program and apparently Congress is "goose-stepping" into line.

All the hullabaloo now being raised by the 3 per cent of the nation who own over 90 per cent of wealth as shown by their attitude thus say that they are willing to stop short of nothing even to throwing us back into depression by tightening credit, by laying off men, by meddling with the stock market and by pulling all the ropes possible, have decreed that Congress must again jump through their hoop. They are apparently unwilling to wait until the next session to have their tax program jammed through and apparently "jammed" it now will be.

The rights of the farmers and laborers to have legislation badly needed to right some of their wrongs seem to be of no consequence and the legislating mill has bogged down, all except the puppets of big business, who are howling loudly to jam through tax repeal to let big business escape again their proportionate part of the tax burden. Big Business' tax program means that this revamped tax program will thus be more unfairly thrown back on the masses and on a broad issue basis we will continue to borrow at high rates of interest to finance the government.

Agriculture

The Agricultural Committee of the Senate is due to bring forth

some kind of compulsory crop control legislation on Monday or Tuesday of next week. It is not clear just what either the House or Senate proposes to do in the way of raising revenue to finance the agricultural program.

The Administration favors compulsory crop control as clearly set forth by Secretary Wallace in his agricultural speeches. The different farm organizations seem to be badly divided—big business is good at such tactics. The House Agricultural committee seems to be still wandering in the wilderness.

Wage and Hour Legislation

Contrary to the announcements of Chairman O'Connor, made last month, at a time when Tammany was fighting hard to control the New York City election, that wage and hour legislation would be forthcoming immediately at the beginning of the special session, we find that this legislation is still blocked in the House in Mr. O'Connor's rules committee. It will be remembered that the House Rules Committee is supposed to be the policy committee of the Administration in power and to represent their views. It is also well known that the alibi of the five southern members of this committee, who are holding up this legislation and refusing to report it out, are not following the wishes of the President, nor the kind of reasonable alibi but the people of this country will not be fooled by their tactics.

The fight between the AF of L and the CIO engendered by the capitalistic crowd is unfortunate. It seems that Grant's famous statement regarding the Democratic party is applicable to the existing labor situation. A petition was placed in the Well of the House Tuesday to discharge the Rules Committee, and it already contains more than one-half of the required number of signatures to force this legislation to the floor.

The Calendar

The Senate took up all last week a filibuster against the passage of the so-called anti-lynching bill, which promises to occupy all the spare time in between the consideration of the important legislation, we were called into session to consider. The Representatives of the Harlan and similar districts over the Nation are sufficiently interested (?) to keep this pot boiling.

The House consumed last week listening to the critics on both sides of the aisle. The Ways and Means Committee is new context legislation and according to the press they have already agreed to amendments which weaken the tax laws on undistributed net profits and capital gains provisions.

Scientists Seek
Craters Caused
By Meteorites

It's a queer search from the hunter's standpoint—this statewide search which two S. M. U. scientists have begun: because they are chasing the "footprints" of something they don't even expect to find. Whenever they find a "footprint", however, they will know that their quarry was once there.

For professors John D. Boon and Claude C. Albritton of S. M. U. are looking for craters caused by meteorites. They are certain that in most cases, they don't find meteorites, which were probably destroyed in forming the craters. What they are trying to determine, however, is not dependent on the meteorite's being intact.

From readers of this paper, Boon and Albritton hope to get reports from residents of this section of the state about depressions which might be craters or remnants of craters.

Since hundreds of centuries ago, and on up to modern ages, meteorites, great iron or stone balls weighing thousands of tons, have collided with the earth to leave their marks wherever they struck. One such mark is located in a relatively small crater near Odessa. A larger one is the famous Flagstaff Crater in Arizona.

Hurling through space at a speed of 180,000 miles per hour (50 miles per second), the giant meteorites have plunged into the earth's atmosphere and became heated to white-hot temperatures before they strike the earth. Many Meteorites are literally "burned up" by friction in the atmosphere before they reach the earth.

But when a large meteorite does penetrate the atmosphere and strike the earth, the resulting upheaval is more powerful and destructive than anything ever produced by man's most potent explosives.

In times past, scientists have been unable to account for the absence of meteorites in craters thought to have been caused by them.

Boon and Albritton have been instrumental in clinching a belief held in recent years that the meteorites—made of iron or stones—explode when they hit the earth, leaving only a few fragments to testify of the collision.

Basing their calculations on research and experiments conducted by P. W. Bridgman of Harvard University, who found that almost any substance would explode if put under sufficient pressure, the S. M. U. scientists have been able to show that meteorites would probably be under sufficient pressure, as they penetrated the earth's surface, to cause them to explode.

With the explosion of the meteorite, they reasoned, layers of rock underlying the meteorite would rebound. A large hole would be blown out by the meteorite's explosion and "waves" of outcropping rock and earth would be formed about the hole by rebounding of the earth.

The theory thus advanced accounts for many craters, formerly thought to be volcanic in origin, about which no traces of volcanic

Those boys on that team started for the goal of regional championship three years ago. I saw them that hot August afternoon in 1935. They were ambitious. Many times since that first afternoon, I have wished that I had been a movie fan and had shot a few feet of film each month during the period. It would be interesting to watch the progress of the club.

Coach Hill and Polk Robison were having a hard time that first year. They had a green and small team. There wasn't a chance for them to win a game, but in every game they were using the men who would be back next year. Tolly McKown is a great football player now, but I am sure that he will give a lot of credit to those two men who time after time corrected his errors and developed him patiently. At the same time the other boys who have been less spectacular in their play but just as valuable to the team were progressing. Patience of the coaches and their willingness to give the boys another chance when they failed has had remarkable results. So in all out tributes lets take our hats off to the two men who three years ago were getting all the brick-bats that a losing bunch of fans can throw.

But Don't Think All The Fans were of the gripping kind. activity could be found. Since the meteorite itself is destroyed by its impact with the earth, only a few fragments would be left to tell of the crash. After years of erosion by wind and water, the crater might be reduced to almost level land.

Such craters, ranging in diameter from less than a hundred feet to a mile or so, are what Boon and Albritton are seeking. From the number found by reports from newspaper readers, the two men will be able to throw some light on periods when the state may literally have been bombarded with meteorites from outer sections of solar space.

Persons reporting formations later found to be meteorite craters will be credited with the discovery in reports of Boon and Albritton as will the newspaper in which they read of the search.

Letters addressed directly to J. D. Boon and Claude C. Albritton at S. M. U. in Dallas will be read and answered regardless of whether the structure reported offers possibilities of being a meteorite crater. Reports should tell the location of the formation, its depth and diameter, whether it is located near a stream, whether the crater has a rim that stands higher than the surrounding land, the finder's name and address, the newspaper in which he read of the search, as well as any other information the reader wishes to include, and a simple drawing of the crater.

Boon and Albritton emphasized that the crater formations might have been worn down greatly by erosion and might appear to be a merely depressed section surrounded by broken rings or "waves" in fairly regular sequence.

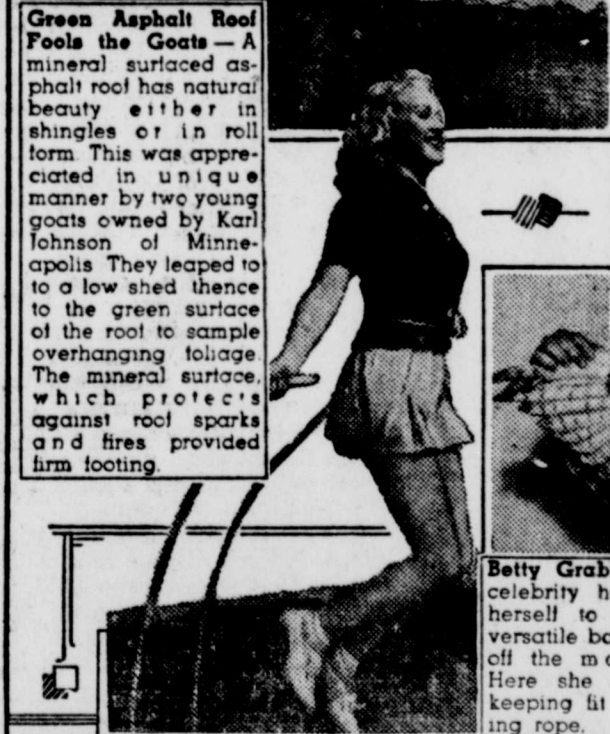

Burkdogs Smash Crowell To Win Important Game

Bitterness Fails to Develop Into Open Fight: Teams Play Clean Headup Games

McKown Injured

Burkburnett High school became the uncrowned champion of district 10-B Friday night as they belted the Crowell Wildcats for a 21-7 victory and vindicated their right to the crown awarded Crowell after a Burk player was declared ineligible and the season's string victories were forfeited.

Interest in the game that reached fever heat after the Bulldogs were directed to forfeit their season's schedule, attracted 500 Burkburnett fans and more than 2,000 Crowell supporters who mingled in the stands while the teams fought cleanly on the field. No rowdy outbreaks occurred on the field.

Tolly McKown, Burk scoring ace, was the battering ram of the offense that smashed the Wildcats for three periods until he was replaced by Brown. Evans took up the reins where McKown left

off, showing the same driving force that had shattered the defense.

The Wildcats' scoring triumvirate, composed of Joy, Orr and Meason, worked efficiently behind a line that was outclassed by the charging Bulldog forward wall. The Wildcats' own McKown played a bang up game at his tackle position, but was unable to carry the battle alone.

Break Turns Tide

Although Burkburnett was leading, 13-7, in the third quarter it was anybody's game until a break occurred which noticeably broke the Wildcat spirit. After the Bulldogs had been held for downs, Evans kicked over the Crowell goal line on fourth down. A 15-yard penalty was assessed against the Wildcats from their own 10-yard line, however, on that play, giving the Bulldogs first down on the Wildcat 5-yard stripe. Evans capitalized the opportunity smashing through for the victors' third touchdown.

Burkburnett scored late in the first period. Taking the ball on their own 20 after a Wildcat kick had gone into the end zone, the Bulldogs marched 80 yards without being stopped to put McKown over from 2 yards out. Evans missed the try for point.

In the second stanza, Burkburnett started a drive on her own 38-yard line and again pushed all the way to a touchdown, McKown again cashing in from the 5-yard line. Tolly himself essayed the try for extra point and converted with a beautiful kick.

The Wildcats came back with fire of the same order. Fitzgerald returned the Bulldog kickoff 20 yards to the Crowell 45. Brilliant running by Joy, Meason and Orr covered the remaining interval, and Joy went through from the 1-yard line. Fitzgerald kicked the extra point.

Score From Penalty

The third Bulldog touchdown resulted from the penalty imposed on the Wildcat 20-yard line midway of the third period. A few moments later, the Burkburnett safety was scored when Fitzgerald's punt was blocked and rolled over the end zone out of the field of play.

The Burkburnett powerhouse had a lead of 20-9 on first downs, and rushed the ball 322 yards to Crowell's 150. The Bulldogs lost 81 yards from scrimmage, however, while the Crowell attack lost but 7 yards by such methods.

RETIRED WORLD WAR COMMANDER APPOINTED CHAIRMAN OF MILITARY ACADEMY

General Robert Lee Bullard, 1915 he went back to teaching in the First Division A.E.F., has accepted the Chairmanship of the Board of Advisers of the Castle Heights Military Academy, owned and operated by the Bernarr Macfadden Foundation.

Robert Lee Bullard was born in Youngsboro, Alabama, in the deep South, on January 15, 1861. His first job was that of a country school teacher. Then came his appointment to West Point and the start of his soldiering career. After graduation, he saw action in the Apache campaign where he won his commission as Captain. Soon followed the Spanish American War where he led his 3rd Alabama Infantry to victory. After the war he became Governor of the district of

Lanao, in the Philippines. In 1908, when America entered the World War in 1917, General Bullard was commissioned a Major General in command of the First A.E.F. Division. Here his company won the first battle at Montdidier and became the spear-head of the American offensives, which crumpled the Marne silent.

In recognition for his able command and work he was promoted to rank next that of General Pershing and assigned the task of directing our new Second Army in a drive against the great stronghold of Metz. For his bravery as a field officer and in continual contact with the enemy, he won the nickname of "Counter-attack" Bullard. He was

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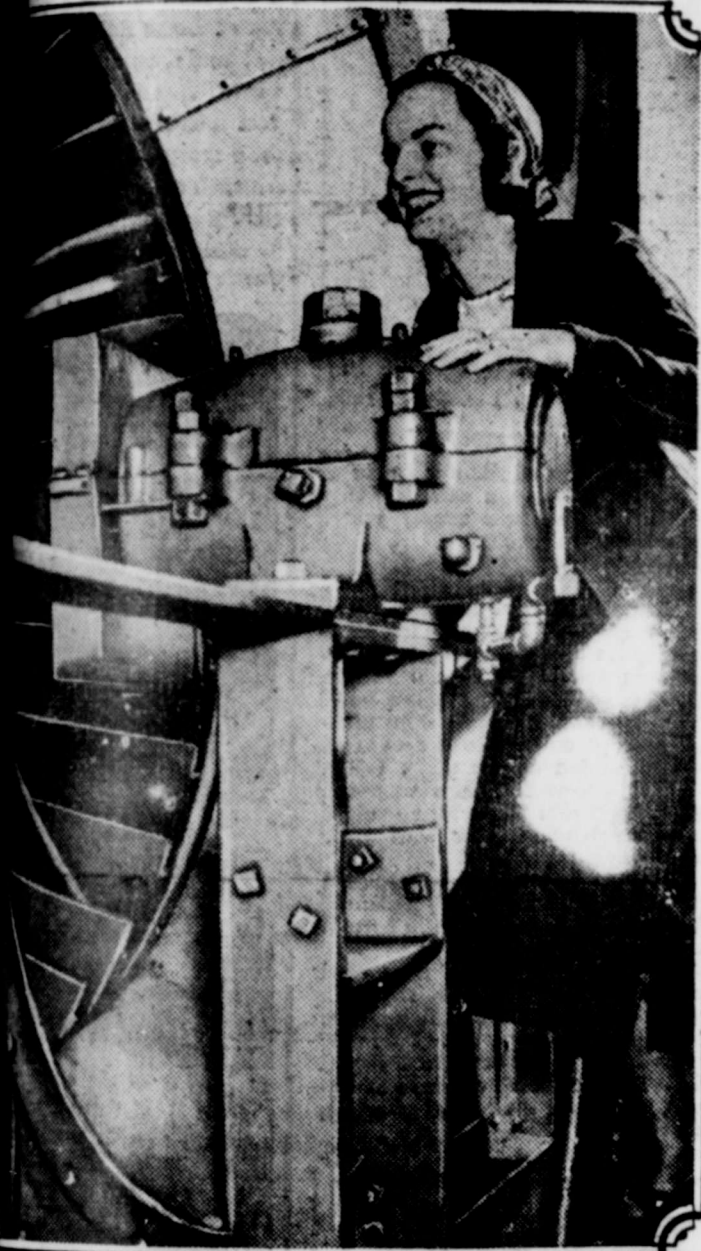

The Cooking Clinic



QUESTION: How is it possible to prevent fruit pies from boiling over in the oven?

ANSWER: Have you ever tried putting a loose top crust on fruit pies? You simply fit bottom crust into pan, flute edge and add filling. Cut top crust just large enough to fit over filling, and meet the fluted edge of lower crust, prick pastry, place on pie, and bake. When filling expands, the top crust rises making it impossible for the juice to run out.

QUESTION: Which type of electric oven cookery is preferred—starting with a cold or preheated oven?

ANSWER: That is a question which only you can decide, particularly if you have a Hotpoint range. Many foods—cakes, pies, meats, hot breads, etc., are equally successful when the baking begins in either a cold or a preheated oven. The "one-step" cold-oven-start method is, of course, ideal for cooking meals when you are away as well as convenient for the homemaker who forgets to preheat the oven. Both methods are successful, however, so it is recommended that you use the particular one which best fits your needs.

QUESTION: How can one cream butter quickly without waiting for it to soften?

ANSWER: First, rinse out mixing bowl with hot water and dry. Then add butter and cream it with a wooden spoon. To speed up the process even more, place bowl in pan of hot water. In a short time the butter will be fluffy and soft.

QUESTION: What remedy can you suggest for coarse granular refrigerator ice cream?

ANSWER: Equally as important as using a good tested recipe for making ice cream is freezing it properly; that is, freezing it so quickly that large ice crystals haven't an opportunity to form. To accomplish this, set the cold control at the lowest degree possible. This varies with most refrigerators but there is a new one on the market with an exceptionally efficient speed-freezing unit. In it ice creams freeze very rapidly and as a result are smooth and velvety.

Mrs. Nichols Rites Held Here Saturday

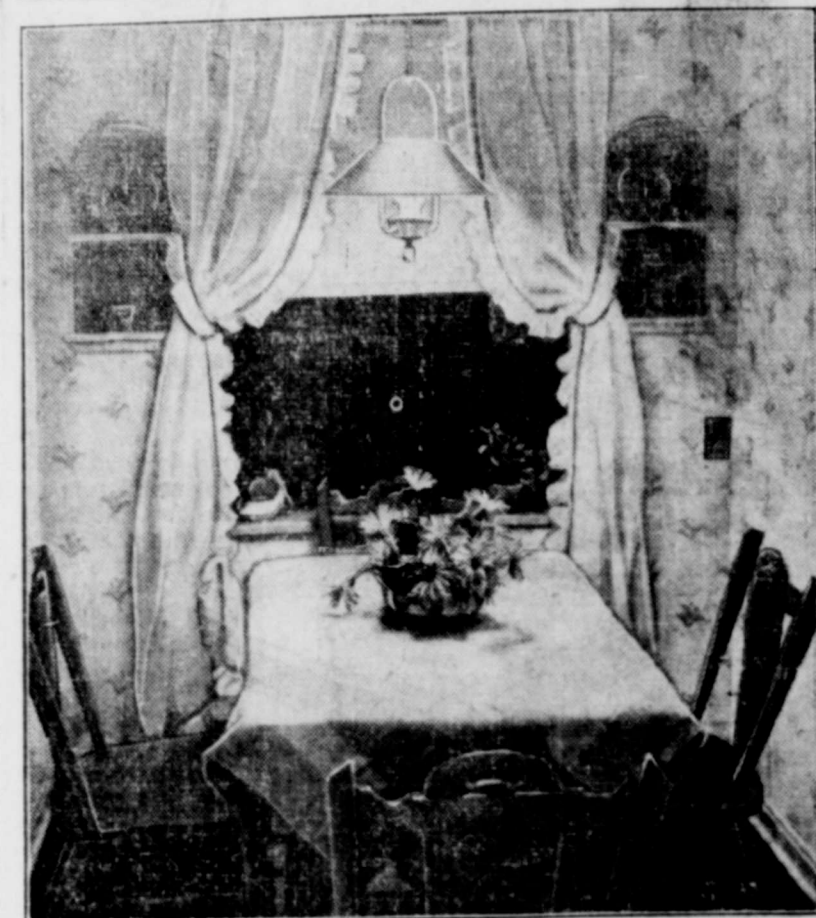

Cozy Dinette Features "Intimate" Lighting

THERE'S a way to make your breakfast nook or dinette more individual and cozy. It has to do with lighting.

In many apartments and homes the dinette is a part of the kitchen, and it is difficult to make it seem a separate, distinctive section. Usually the lighting fixture above the table hangs the ceiling and gives a far-away feeling.

Try substituting a drop cord with a new fixture placed about 36 inches above the table. I think it will add an intimacy and charm that you want. It is also better lighting from the scientific angle, since it gives a greater distribution and amount of light on the table.

Even a small breakfast table, like a family-sized one, needs a fixture hanging reasonably close to it to provide tranquil, cheerful lighting. I suggest that if you have a breakfast nook with a lighting fixture close to the ceiling you make this change and see what a difference it makes.

Several types of fixtures go very nicely here, and you needn't delve very deeply into the family purse for one of them either.

Smart Colonial Design

In quaint design, looking much like a hanging kerosene lamp, is one fixture which in reality is the latest in scientific lighting. It has an inner translucent diffusing bowl which prevents the light from glaring harshly down into the eyes of persons seated at the table. When a 75 or 100-watt bulb is used the light is still soft, yet abundant enough for reading or sewing or game-playing.

Another idea for the breakfast nook is an inexpensive parchment cylinder shade, closed at the bottom to soften shadows.

If you already have a drop cord and ordinary downward shade in your dinette, you can still improve the lighting by using one of the new bulbs with a silver bowl, in 100-watt size. This will throw the light upward, and give a smooth, glareless, smart effect.
