

Wentz State Fire Insurance Commissioner

One of the important appointments in the state of Texas went today to a Big Springer. Mark Wentz, head of the local insurance agency which bears his name, was named by Governor Allan Shivers as state fire insurance commissioner.

The appointment becomes effective immediately, and Wentz will take up duties in Austin. He is to fill the unexpired term of the late Paul Brown. This term runs until February 16, 1955.

Wentz is one of the few insurance men ever appointed to the state position, and the first West Texan

to hold it. He had received strong endorsement throughout West Texas, and had the sanction of the Texas Association of Insurance Agents.

Wentz, 57, has been in the insurance business since 1942. His son, Frank E. Wentz, presently is associated in business with him here.

He has resided in Big Spring since 1925, coming here as a commission agent for Gulf. He later operated an automobile agency, before opening his insurance firm.

He was born in Ogden, Iowa, moved with his family to Burlington, Kan., where he attended public schools. He attended Kansas State Agricultural College in Manhattan, but his college career was interrupted by World War I.

He served in the Army until 1919. An Army assignment brought him to Texas and in 1918 he was married to a Texas girl, Miss Bertha Allen Roberts. They were married in El Paso, where he joined Gulf. He went from there to Abilene before his transfer to Big Spring in 1925.

Wentz is a member of the Masonic Lodge, the American Legion, the Chamber of Commerce and the Lions Club. He is a Presbyterian.

Approval Looms In St. Lawrence Seaway Action

WASHINGTON (U)—Supporters of the 20-year-old St. Lawrence seaway plan boasted of unqualified confidence today as the House called up the controversial bill for a climactic vote.

The Senate has passed the measure, which would authorize the United States to join with Canada in constructing a 27-foot-deep channel up the St. Lawrence River to ocean-going ships, could steam from the Atlantic to Great Lakes ports. The House has never before voted on the issue.

Canada has officially informed this country that if the authorization does not come this year, it will proceed to build an all-Canadian seaway on its side of the St. Lawrence. So today's vote could decide the issue for the United States for all time.

Backers of the project made no attempt to play it close to the vest. One, Rep. Macchiorri (D-Mich.), predicted the margin of victory would be "at least 50 votes."

"Maybe greater," Macchiorri said as an afterthought.

His forecast was in line with that made earlier by House Republican leaders. They said they anticipated passage by a "substantial margin."

The House, meeting two hours earlier than usual, was expected to speed the bill through without delay.

Area Counties Cited In Dust Control Plan

Shivers was notified today by Secretary of Agriculture Benson that an initial allocation of \$2,322,000 had been made for the state.

Mile Run In 2:59 Time

OXFORD, England (U)—Roger Bannister was clocked in 3 minutes 59.4 seconds today to achieve track athletics' greatest goal—the 4-minute-mile.

Running on his familiar Oxford track, he bettered the listed world record of 4:01.4 set by Sweden's Gunder Haegg in 1945.

On the way to his fantastic clocking he equalled unofficially the 1,600-meter record of 3:43.

Conditions for the race today were unfavorable.

A mighty roar went up from the small gathering when it was announced the 25-year-old athlete, who gets his medical degree in a few months, had shattered the barrier that for many years had been deemed unbreakable.

He was given hot competition by another former Oxford youth, Chris Chatterway, and English steeplechaser Chris Brasher in the race which was part of a dual meet between the British Amateur Athletic Assn. and Oxford University.

The "4-minute-mile" has long been the dream of all distance runners. Many have come within a few seconds of it.

FEAR SPLIT WITH U.S.

British Agree To Talks On Action If Meet Fails

LONDON (U)—Britain has moved a step closer to the Indo-China war arena. American and British sources say she has agreed to join Allied talks on united military action in the Far Eastern battlefield.

The report came as London newspapers voiced fears Britain would drift into a serious split with the United States over Allied action in Indo-China. Moscow radio joined in "new aggressive plans" had "isolated" the United States at Geneva.

The American-proposed parley is expected to take place within the next three weeks in either Washington or Singapore. Informants said it would discuss plans for:

1. Underwriting any sort of political settlement in Indo-China that might emerge from the Geneva Parley.

2. Having Indo-China from being overrun by the Communist-led Vietnam if the peace talks fail.

Projected composition of the conference was not disclosed, but the United States, Britain, France, Australia, New Zealand and Canada at least are expected to send staff officers.

Commenting on the danger of an American-British rift, the Liberal News Chronicle declared:

"Unity requires shared readiness to negotiate. But at this moment any American statesman who expresses readiness to negotiate is howled down as an appeaser—before anyone knows what he is proposing to negotiate."

The Conservative Daily Mail

said public opinion in the two countries "can hardly be blamed for its bewilderment now."

"Policy, at least in Washington, seems to have been at the mercy of every prevailing current of sentiment."

The Independent Daily Express called it "simply mischievous" to say a split now exists.

"A plan to intervene in the Indo-China war was never clearly defined," the Express declared. "nor was it probable that the American Congress, let alone Britain, would endorse it."

U. S. administration officials have virtually ruled out any direct American intervention in Indo-China unless Britain agrees to join as part of a coalition to protect Southeast Asia against Red conquest. Britain served notice she opposed such an alliance in advance of the Indo-China negotiations with the Communists at Geneva.

Prime Minister Churchill also told Parliament his government opposes any united military action in Indo-China while the Geneva talks are still on.

The American proposed parley of air, land and sea force chiefs is expected to seek to overcome some of these differences.

The Moscow broadcast heard here said the "complete and final defeat of colonialism" is shaping up in Asia and "the situation has developed far from what the U. S. secretary of state wanted."

"Representatives of many countries taking part in the conference prefer finding ways of agreement which lead to a peaceful settlement of disputed international problems to that of agreement regarding new, aggressive plans," the broadcast said.

"In particular, the British delegation prefers to adopt a more careful attitude than that which the State Department has outlined."

Wounded Man Found On Road

STANTON (SC)—A man who, later in the day, was identified as Clyde J. Hayes of Midland, was brought to the Martin County Memorial Hospital here Wednesday morning after being found beside Highway 80 between here and Midland.

Hayes was suffering from a bad head wound, Sheriff Dan Saunders said, and was unable to furnish officers with any information on what had happened to him. He was still unconscious late Wednesday afternoon.

The sheriff said Hayes' pockets were all empty but that the man was wearing a wrist watch. The presumption is, Saunders said, that Hayes was knocked in the head and thrown from a car or that he fell from one. He was found about 6:30 a.m., by Joe Danley of Stanton, who notified Deputy Sheriff A. C. Abernathy.

Danley first reported to the officers that he thought the man was dead. Abernathy removed Hayes to the hospital. Wednesday afternoon Sheriff Saunders, with the aid of Midland officers, located Mrs. Hayes, who came here. She told officers she did not know what might have happened to her husband.

Saunders said late Wednesday afternoon that it had been determined that the spot at which Hayes had been found was in Midland County. He indicated the matter would be referred to Midland County officers for further investigation.

Continental Says Would Hire More

WASHINGTON (U)—Continental Airlines presented more testimony yesterday to the Civil Aeronautics Board in support of its proposed merger with Pioneer Airlines.

C. C. West of Denver, vice president of Continental, said his company would hire Pioneer personnel and employ 23 additional employees because of the expansion in the routes.

He gave Midland, Tex., as an example of what would happen if the merger is approved. There, he said, eight additional agents would be hired to double the force there. Most or all of these would come from the force of 10 persons now employed at Midland by Pioneer, he said.

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Two Policemen Are Assaulted By Prisoner

A man who assaulted two police officers after he and his wife were arrested Wednesday was fined \$60 in City Court this morning on charges of drunkenness.

His wife was fined \$10 after pleading guilty to the same charge. The man, who gave his address as Ackerly, will be transferred to county authorities on a charge of aggravated assault as soon as he disposes of the drunkenness fine, officers said. At present he is laying out the fine at the rate of \$3 per day.

The couple were arrested about 1:30 p.m. Wednesday in the 1200 block of West 3rd. Their two children were with them.

County Welfare Officer Mary Cantrell and Juvenile Officer A. E. Long were called to the police station because of the children, and Chief M. L. Kirby brought the couple to the city courtroom for a conference concerning the children.

The man suddenly grabbed Kirby by the side near the officer's pistol, the chief said. As Kirby tried to pull away, his shirt and trousers were ripped. Kirby said he knocked the man down and held him down.

While Kirby was holding the man, George Oldham, executive secretary of the Citizens Traffic Commission, who happened to be standing near by, opened the jail door to get the prisoner inside. At the same time Zerah LeFevre, police radio operator, said she held the man's wife, who had tried to help her husband fight Kirby.

After the man was locked up he started banging a tin cup against the jail bars. Patrolman Perry Chandler went into the jail to find out what was causing the disturbance. When Chandler opened the door, he said the man attempted to kick him but missed. The man did succeed in slugging the officer by the left eye.

Acting Judge Mack Rodgers fined the man this morning on the drunkenness charge. The wife paid her fine and was released. The children, who had been cared for by the county welfare department during the night, were returned to the mother this morning.

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Gillette Blasts 'Split' In GOP

WASHINGTON (U)—Sen. Guy Gillette (D-Iowa) told a national Democratic conference today the United States suffered "an astounding and unprecedented reversal" at Geneva on the question of Indo-China.

He blamed it on what he called a "split" Republican administration lacking a foreign policy.

He said the 1952 election put one group of Republicans in charge of the executive branch and another group in Congress. The "fiasco" at Geneva, he said, is only the most glaring example of what price America is paying in the struggle against Communist imperialism.

Secretary of State Dulles said yesterday the Geneva talks are going about as anticipated and that he knows of nothing that has happened to justify an interpretation that the United States had suffered any defeat.

President Eisenhower told his news conference a few hours later he has unqualified faith in Dulles. He said no one loses a battle while the battle is still going on.

Gillette said selection of a Democratic Congress in November would not cure "the split in the Republican party, which may well be incurable, but it will heal the breach in our government and allow the President to lead America in the leadership of the free world."

Gillette, a Foreign Relations Committee member, said the country will live to regret the administration's decision not to use the United Nations machinery to halt the Indo-China war.

"We could have hauled the Red aggressor before the bar of world opinion," he said, "but we preferred to revert to outworn methods of military intervention."

Gillette's remarks were prepared for a panel on "American security" at the second day's session of the Democratic National Committee meetings. The party rally will come to a close tonight with a \$100-a-plate Jefferson-Jackson dinner at which former President Truman will be an informal speaker.

Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson and Rep. Sam Rayburn, Texas leaders of the minority party in Senate and House, are billed for "major speeches" to pep up the drive for election of Democratic majorities in Congress in November.

Adlai E. Stevenson, the party's 1952 presidential candidate, was originally listed for a talk, but he did not come on advice of his

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McCarthy Calls Stevens Perjurer

WASHINGTON (U)—Atty. Gen. Brownell ruled today a confidential 1951 report from the FBI to the Army on possible subversion at Ft. Monmouth, N.J., must not be made public. He said its publication would be "harmful" to the national interest and to matters now under consideration. He also ruled a 2½ page letter which quoted from the report also must not be published.

WASHINGTON (U)—Sen. McCarthy cried "perjury" today at Secretary Stevens and Democratic senators called for prosecutions as a result of what one termed McCarthy's "fraudulent letter" episode in the McCarthy-Army hearings.

In swift and turbulent sequence: 1. The Senate Investigations subcommittee voted to send a daily transcript of its hearings to the Justice Department. This was on motion of Sen. McClellan (D-Ark.).

2. Sen. Symington (D-Mo), endorsing McClellan's move, said someone was "absolutely guilty" of violating the law in connection with McCarthy's getting material from a secret FBI report. He called McCarthy's document, center of a storm yesterday, "this fraudulent letter."

3. McCarthy snapped that Symington was "trying to punish those who dare to give out information on espionage in secret radar laboratories" at Ft. Monmouth, N.J. And he charged that Symington and Sen. Jackson (D-Wash) were "part of a secret effort" to hamper his investigation of Communists in the Army. McCarthy said too he was sorry Symington and Jackson, who walked out on his committee last year along with McClellan, ever came back.

4. Secretary Stevens testified he had made an error in earlier testimony to the subcommittee. He said he had been incorrect in stating that after a Feb. 24 meeting with the McCarthy subcommittee he had gone back to the Pentagon and conferred only with his staff.

Actually, Stevens said, he had found on checking that he met with 21 uniformed and civilian officials of the Pentagon, including then Undersecretary of Defense Roger M. Kyes, Army Chief of Staff Matthew S. Ridgway, H. Struve Hensel, then Defense Department counsel but now an assistant secretary of defense, and Fred Seaton, also an assistant secretary of defense.

Of the 21 present, Stevens said, 17 were members of his staff. McCarthy hopped on this change of testimony with a declaration that it appeared to be a "clear-cut case of perjury."

Ray H. Jenkins, special counsel to the subcommittee, told McCarthy to confine himself to asking questions of Stevens.

It was on Feb. 24 that Stevens met with Republican members of McCarthy's subcommittee and agreed to withdraw orders he had issued that Brig. Gen. Ralph Zwicker and some other officers should disregard subpoenas from McCarthy. In issuing the orders,

Stevens had claimed McCarthy "abused" Zwicker at a closed hearing. McCarthy denied that. Stevens' agreement to withdraw his order was widely interpreted as a "surrender" to McCarthy.

Next day, Stevens issued a statement at the White House, with President Eisenhower's approval, declaring there was no surrender and he would not permit the abuse of officers.

McCarthy contends that at the Feb. 24 Pentagon meeting plans were laid to issue a "smear report" against him—the report which led to the present hearings. McCarthy challenged Stevens to say whether he had decided to change his testimony after he learned that Seaton and a "newsmen" had testified last night and this morning at a closed meeting of the subcommittee.

"No, sir," Stevens replied. McCarthy asked Stevens whether John G. Adams, Army counsel, had told Stevens that one member of the press "helped prepare" the Army report.

"He did not," replied Stevens. See PROBE, Page 8, Col. 3

Vietnamese, Laotian Diplomats Begin Arriving At Geneva Talks

GENEVA (U)—Vietnamese and Laotian delegations were arriving in Geneva today for the coming Indochinese talks, but the Far Eastern conference's chief attention turned to the French National Assembly vote on the fate of Premier Joseph Laniel's government.

Barring a defeat for Laniel—which was not expected—it appeared certain the Indochinese parley would begin either tomorrow or Saturday.

The last of the nine delegations for the talks will be complete tomorrow when the Cambodian ambassador to Washington, Nong Kimmy, arrives.

Laniel demanded a ballot of confidence, requiring him to resign if defeated, on his refusal to open Assembly debate on Indochina while the Geneva parley is under way. Some deputies demanded that the debate start May 14.

Quick opening of the Indochinese phase of the Far Eastern conference was assured late yesterday when French Ambassador Jean Chauvel and Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko agreed to get started as soon as possible. The discussions undoubtedly would have begun today had it not been for the French Cabinet difficulties.

The critical military situation at Dien Bien Phu made the talks a doubly urgent matter to Western diplomats here.

In London, informants said Britain had agreed to talk over possible united Allied action in Indochina to either guarantee any settlement that might be reached in Geneva or to aid the French forces if the negotiations here break down.

Most of the arrangements for the Indochina talks here have been completed. A room in the Palace of Nations, in a wing separate from that being used for the Korean talks, has been prepared for the meeting.

France, Communist China, Viet Nam, Cambodia, Laos and the Vietminh. This would sidestep the question of the opposing sides in Indochina recognizing each other.

Eden and Molotov, together with their chief aides, met at dinner last night. Presumably they discussed both the Indochinese and Korean issues.

The debate on Korea will be resumed tomorrow afternoon at what may be one of the last plenary meetings of that 19-nation conference. Later discussions will be carried on primarily in a seven-nation group limited to the four

Sen. Mansfield Says Native Troops Are Proving Ability

WASHINGTON (U)—Sen. Mansfield (D-Mont.) said today the "great contribution" being made by native troops in defending Dien Bien Phu shows that effective anti-Communist armies could be trained in Indochina.

Mansfield, a member of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, said approximately 4,700 Vietnamese and 1,500 Cambodians are among some 12,000 defenders of Dien Bien Phu, the besieged fortress in northern Indochina.

There is still time, he added in an interview, to build up anti-Red forces if the French make further concessions to independence demands.

Secretary of State Dulles was quoted by informed sources last night as having told a bipartisan group of 24 members of Congress that this country has no present plans to send any forces into the Indochina war. He met for 1 1/2 hours with them late yesterday.

But neither he nor the lawmakers commented publicly afterward. Dulles reportedly told the secret briefing session he plans to go ahead with his plans for "united action" to protect Southeast Asia from Communist conquest, even if Britain balks, as she has done pending Geneva talks on the situation. He was represented as saying, however, he thinks Britain eventually will go along.

told the congressmen that some thought is being given to the drawing of a defense line around the Indochina states of Laos and Cambodia and pledging the United States and Allied nations to defend them against aggression.

They are less heavily involved in the seven-year-old war than is the larger state of Viet Nam, where rebel troops led by Moscow-trained Ho Chi Minh are punishing the French and native forces.

Mansfield, who did not attend the Dulles briefing, said it is not generally known that so many native troops are in the Dien Bien Phu battle.

"About 60 per cent of the men being parachuted into the fort also are Vietnamese," he said. The remainder of defensive forces are French, African troops and Foreign Legionnaires.

The senator, who has visited Indochina, said the current monsoon rains should provide a military breathing spell of about six months to continue training and building up an anti-Communist army.

FEAR AUTHORITY

Scientist Explains 'Knock On Wood'

ST. LOUIS, Mo.—"Knocking on wood" for luck is one of the most common of 80,000 superstitions, a psychiatrist said today, and here's why:

It can be a call on magic, a way of handling anxiety or worry, a defense against envy, a sign that emotionally you're pretty immature.

This analysis was presented to the American Psychiatric Assn. by Dr. Judd Marmor, University of California at Los Angeles.

Some people knock on wood very seriously, others do it with a wry smile, others say it while tapping their heads jokingly.

It apparently stems from a primitive belief of protective gods inside trees, Dr. Marmor said.

Therefore touching wood when making any boasting statement would ward off evil consequences.

Touching or knocking on wood represents a fear of antagonizing some all-seeing higher authority.

Along with this, we have many sayings—such as "Pride goeth before a fall"—indicating that we must be humble and submissive.

Dr. Marmor said we apparently assume that pride, success or self-confidence will create envy or antagonism by some "authority."

This apparently traces back to childish fears of offending such authorities as parents or brothers or sisters, and to the feeling you must be humble and compliant in order to be loved.

In our highly competitive society, "knocking on wood" takes on additional meanings, he said.

We try to make light of our good fortunes to avoid envy by our fellows or rivals.

So we knock on wood to indicate we are just lucky, or say our health "is not bad" when it's really excellent, or say business is "fair" when it's quite good.

Knocking on wood can also be a call upon magical powers, or for protection against evil powers, to help us out in the competition.

"Many people will discuss intimate aspects of their sex lives sooner than the details of their financial structure, particularly if there are any assets which might arouse envy."

Superstitions like this, he said, represent efforts to deal with anxiety or fearfulness, stemming from man's being aware he is helpless against some things which he doesn't know, or only dimly understands.

He said such superstitions can be expected to disappear not merely by advances in knowledge, but as humans resolve their unconscious feelings of helplessness and insecurity and hence no longer feel a need to depend upon magic.

LONDON, U.K.—The British press assured its readers today that Queen Elizabeth II—although somewhat skinny—is in sound health as she nears the end of her long Commonwealth voyage.

Two papers said she lost only five pounds. Another speculated that she had been deliberately slimming.

The Daily Sketch threw some subjects into a tizzy yesterday by remarking that the young monarch had lost weight and "looks fine drawn and tired." It drove home the point with two pictures—one taken before the six-month royal tour began and the other Tuesday at Malta.

In the latter photograph the Queen looked almost angular.

The Daily Mirror reported from from Valletta, however, that at the royal ball last night Elizabeth "looked positively radiant."

"Since the start of her gigantic tour, it's true she lost five pounds in weight," the Mirror said. "And she had a little chill at Aden a few days ago which she has shaken off. But the Queen is not tired in any sense that can cause alarm."

The Daily Herald also estimated that Elizabeth had lost about five pounds; but said this "isn't surprising in view of the heat during her strenuous tour."

The Herald quoted a member of the royal entourage as declaring, "The Queen is feeling perfectly fit."

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Israel Stresses Knowledge Of Hebrew In Current Year

JERUSALEM, Israel Sector (U)—The seventh year of Israel's independence will be proclaimed as "Hebrew Language Year." It starts today.

Though the revived tongue of the biblical Hebrews is the official language of modern Israel, the state leaders consider there are still too many persons who don't know it as well as they should.

So an appeal is to be directed to all having some knowledge of it to teach others. And a bill is to be presented in Parliament obliging local councils to set up additional Hebrew courses, imposing a special language tax if necessary to pay the teachers.

The aim in general is that every Jew in Israel, 20 or over, should have a vocabulary of at least 1,000 words of basic Hebrew. The younger ones have it anyhow.

It's a difficult language by West-

ern standards. But the effort to learn it is expected from every citizen as a kind of civic duty.

Generally, old-timers speak Hebrew well enough. But even among them a group still has difficulty in reading and writing because of the Oriental characters and the general practice of printing without vowels. This double obstacle explains why there is room for daily newspapers here in English, French, German, Romanian and Yiddish—besides 11 in Hebrew. However, even the foreign language papers print a regular "Hebrew column for beginners."

For the children there is no Hebrew problem. Hebrew is the language of the toddlers in the kindergarten, the bigger ones at school, the soldiers in the army. (In addition school-children learn a second language, English, and in the higher grades, French or Arabic.)

On a still larger scale, the diffusion of Hebrew has been organized by the Ministry of Education together with the Jewish agency. Throughout Israel seminars have been set up.

Those who cannot pay the tuition, board and lodging fee for the regular course of five or six months may get a loan from the Jewish Agency. Others may attend one attached to a kibbutz, a collective farm settlement. There they work half a day in the fields, stables or shops for their keep and Hebrew lessons which they take the other half of the day.

New Mexico Box Bored By Voting

KATON, N. M. (U)—Officially, the New Mexico primary vote in Vermojo Park precinct of Colfax County will be zero for all candidates.

The 16 registered Democrats and seven registered Republicans either forgot or didn't care that Tuesday was election day.

Mrs. Tom Farmer, county clerk, says a resident of the tiny community in the wide ranchland of northern New Mexico reported no votes had been cast.

Community Takes Revenge On Birds

BOSTON (U)—Flocks of starlings have been ruining the sleep of Quincy residents near the Fore River Bridge. With a novel plan to scare the birds away, the Public Works Department has obtained approval for purchase of a tape-recording outfit.

Frightened cries of captured starlings will be recorded and played back to the flocks at the bridge.

Sen. Russell, Dixie Spokesman, May Vote To Kill T-H Changes

WASHINGTON (U)—Georgia's Sen. Russell said today he would vote to send the Taft-Hartley revision bill back to the Labor Committee "if it can be shown that Democrats on that committee did not have the fullest and freest right" to have their proposals considered there.

Russell, sometimes considered

an unofficial spokesman for Southern Democrats, said in an interview:

"Denying a minority their rights in committee is no way to run a committee."

The Senate may vote tomorrow on a Democratic move to send the bill back to committee. If the move succeeds it may kill the measure for this session.

Chairman H. Alexander Smith (R-N.J.) of the Labor Committee told the Senate when Taft-Hartley revision debate opened Monday that committee Republicans "reluctantly agreed" to limit the bill to changes in the law specifically recommended by President Eisenhower. Democrats have charged steamroller tactics were used to block their proposed amendments.

The committee measure was reported out for debate along strict party lines 7-6. In the Senate as a whole, the Democrats outnumber Republicans by one. But there has been a question as to whether the Southern Democrats would go along with their Northern colleagues in a vote to send the bill back to committee.

Russell, who is not a Labor Committee member, said no committee of Congress should limit its discussion of legislation "to whatever the President happens to recommend." He continued:

"We are not a co-equal branch of government if we can't consider matters beyond the President's recommendations."

The Senate agreed yesterday to limit debate to 90 minutes, starting tomorrow, on each amendment or motion to the committee bill. Debate on the bill itself will be limited to two hours, divided equally between those for and those against.

The motion to recommit is likely

to provide the first test of Republican efforts to pass Eisenhower's Taft-Hartley revision program designed to reinforce the "basic objectives" of the present law.

Sen. Knowland of California, the Republican leader, expressed confidence Republicans can defeat the move and predicted final passage of the bill next week. But Sen. Goldwater (R-Ariz.) said the vote would be "very close."

Mink-Clad Zsa Zsa Unhappy Over Plane

SHANNON, Ireland (U)—Zsa Zsa Gabor started out for New York today with Fortiflor Rubirosa but landed here complaining "I'm frozen."

The dapper Dominican's private plane developed heater trouble en route from Paris.

Zsa Zsa, complaining of the chill, hopped off the plane bundled up in a full-length mink, blue jeans, two cardigan sweaters and white wool ankle socks.

When it appeared it would take some time to fix the plane, a converted B25, Zsa Zsa hurried off to the airport hotel to get some rest.

Rubirosa, who stood by silently while his blonde companion did the talking, wore gray slacks and a blue blazer.

German Girl Heads For Home, Death

WATERVLIET, Mich. (U)—A 17-year-old German girl will head home soon to her native Düsseldorf to the waiting arms of her parents and almost certain death.

Elli Judtke, an exchange student at Watervliet High School, has contracted the blood disease leukemia.

Doctors at Ann Arbor's University Hospital diagnosed the illness yesterday. They said the young student is being given daily blood transfusions. She may live possibly two more months, they said.

The State Department has arranged air transportation and a nurse to accompany her home.

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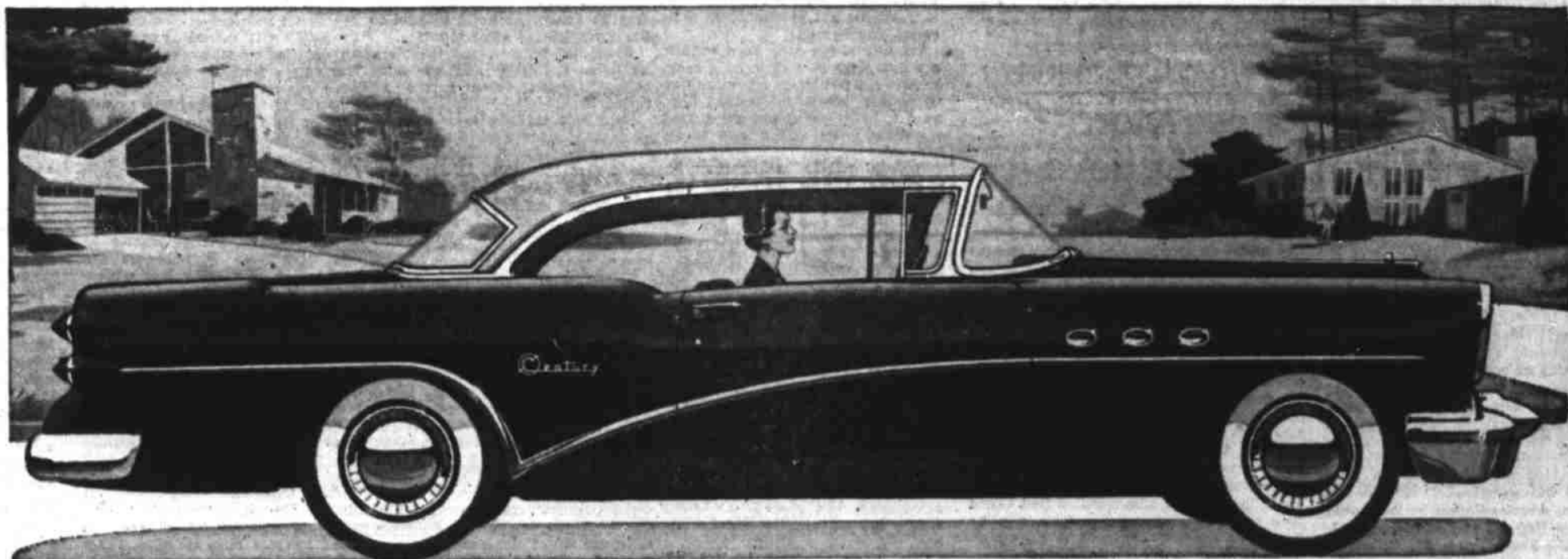

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"The Lord God placed a garden eastward in Eden," — Gen. 2:8. Long before Babylon was built the Sumerians had a province called Eden. A garden there would need irrigation to make it lovely. Christ loved to pray in a garden; God walks in gardens still.

Drought-stricken farmers of the five states of Texas, Kansas, Colorado, New Mexico and Oklahoma are to receive the benefits of a \$10 million emergency fund allocated for the purpose to the Department of Agriculture by President Eisenhower.

The allocation was made as a result of recent conferences between the governors of the five states with the President and USDA authorities in Washington, and it represents two-thirds of what the governors had asked for.

Full details as to how this fund would be administered, and for what specific purposes it will be used, were not available as this was written.

A pending bill before Congress asking for \$15 million has one clause which would pay up to \$1 per acre for "chiselling"—deep-plowing—the soil to prevent wind erosion. This is effective in certain types of soil, but only temporarily.

The big problem has been and still remains: plenty of rain. Some portions of the drought area received good rains in April, some did not. But even with gener-

ous rains the hard-hit farmers need help in the form of quick and easy loans at low rates, credit extensions and other practical assistance.

In the end, the \$10 million set aside by the President and the provisions in the pending bill are at best stop-gap measures, without much effect on the continuing problem of soil conservation and stabilization of agriculture.

Sooner or later Congress will have to face up to the fact that, quite aside from any consideration of parity prices and piecemeal drought relief measures, the nation needs an over-all, continuing program of farm development and soil conservation. The whole question has become so mixed up with politics that the central fact has often been obscured or lost sight of completely: we are fast dissipating our greatest natural resource, just plain dirt capable of producing crops and grazing areas, on which the nation's very existence depends. We haven't made much headway, if any, in preserving our great single asset.

On the basis of the breakdown of attempts to compromise the Army-McCarthy hearings into an early shutdown, these proceedings in the Senate Caucus Room may be under way for weeks to come.

One thing, however, is almost certain: the television-radio broadcast of the hearings probably won't continue much longer. According to reports last week, the networks that had been handling television and radio-casts had already sacrificed, "several million dollars' worth" of advertising time in order to handle the hearings. Up to that time the number of television viewers had not been comparable to the shoals of people who viewed or listened in on the Kafesauer crime investigation hearings, and for most televisioners, and much more so to the case of radio listeners, the whole thing had become monotonous.

A bored televisioner or radio listener is a lost customer; he turns to something else.

Certainly there were hours on end of the opening days of hearings when the proceedings dragged. Constant interrup-

tions, repetitious questions, and all the slow-moving effects of ordinary court trials served to take the edge of public interest.

As temporary chairman Mundt declared Tuesday, all efforts to speed up or terminate the hearings had failed, and the business will now proceed "to the bitter end."

The major compromise effort was based on having nobody else testify from then on out except Secretary of the Army Stevens and Senator McCarthy himself, a proposal put forward by Senator Dirksen (R-Ill.). Joseph N. Welch, the Army's chief counsel, indicated he was willing to go ahead with Stevens and McCarthy and "at most" two more witnesses. Later he said his comment had been misconstrued: "I would in any event insist on calling Roy M. Cohn and Francis P. Carr, two of McCarthy's aides. McCarthy balked at dismissing the charges he brought against H. Struve Hensel, an assistant secretary of defense.

So the compromise effort failed, and the hearings are on indefinitely.

The time has not yet come, not nearly, to regard the big black cloud over Geneva as meaning that all is lost, that there is nothing further to do except to have a bitter quarrel about fixing the blame.

This is not to deny that things are going badly for the Western allies. But only if we become panic stricken, and fall to quarreling with all our allies and with ourselves, is there any objective reason for thinking that we are headed unavoidably towards catastrophe.

Western diplomacy had a bad set-back last week which was caused by a mis- handling of the question of intervention by American naval aviation in the battle of Dien Bien Phu. The crux of the matter is that the French government should never have been allowed to make the request unless it was certain that the request would be granted. Somebody blundered, as Tennyson said, "not making it, but making it at Paris to Mr. Laniel and to Mr. Bidault that they must not put the Western Alliance on the spot. For unless we knew and had made up our minds to intervene before we were asked, it was a grievous mistake to be asked, or for us to let ourselves be asked. Quite obviously someone blundered and it was a costly blunder.

made at Berlin. This was the agreement to leave the making even of a cease fire to the Geneva conference two months later. When this extraordinary agreement was published, it seemed to be necessary to suppose that there had been a private agreement to make at the very minimim tacit cease fire in the long interval between Berlin and Geneva. It is hard on the morale of any army—which is not fanatical in temper—to tell the men to fight when an armistice is in sight. Men do not like to be killed or maimed in the last meaningless battles of a war. Furthermore, it was only common sense to assume that for the admission of Red China to a conference of the Big Four, a price had been exacted—at the last an agreement looking to the acceptance of an armistice. To let them get what they wanted—namely to come to Geneva—without getting what France has to want—a cease fire—was a poor bargain indeed. Chou En-lai is now able to tell at Geneva at a price as yet unknown to us what he should have had to pay for a ticket of admission to Geneva.

After all, in Korea we had refused to engage in a political conference until after there was a cease fire on the battlefield.

WASHINGTON (U)—If you tilted him on the jaw, Secretary of the Army Robert T. Stevens might hit you back. Maybe not until you'd belted him a couple of times. But it would be out of character if he called you names.

He acts like a man born without a snarl. Mild as a duck on a rock, he has sat patiently day after day while Sen. McCarthy quizzed him, tried to belittle him and questioned his honesty by urging him to be honest.

Stevens' public career may be at stake in the Senate inquiry into McCarthy's fight with Army officials. And he has blinked steadily through the pounding. But he has a habit of blinking. It adds to his look of mildness.

Only a few times has he shown any heat in answering McCarthy's questions.

There may be another Stevens. One who can gasp with fury. And maybe he has made it a rule, since he's head of the Army, that in the face of a question he must be a model of self-discipline.

More likely this is the real Stevens at the Senate hearing: a man with white hair and eyeglasses, both of them always in place. One newspaper has noted he even wears the same gray suit every day.

The inquiry is now in its 11th day and he's been the same every

He seems incapable of it. He has answered questions "yes" or "no" sometimes, sometimes been roundabout and sometimes been so vague that he had to be urged to get to the point by McCarthy and Ray H. Jenkins, special counsel to the investigating subcommittee.

From the records, and the story he tells, McCarthy and his aides belted Stevens twice before he belted back.

He didn't publicly take a stand against McCarthy until, he said, the senator insulted a general. And the reporter who he said McCarthy and his aides applied pressure to get special treatment for a draftee wasn't released until months after he said the pressure had been first applied.

McCarthy gives another picture of Stevens, of a man working behind the scenes to force McCarthy to give up his search for Communists in the Army.

Why did Stevens delay so long in taking a stand? He says it was because of his desire to get along with McCarthy and Congress. It may be that he thought President Eisenhower wanted him to lean over backwards to get along.

The administration itself through most of its first year in office, when Stevens' troubles with McCarthy began, had set an example of trying to get along with the senator through one encounter after another.

Stevens 'didn't take his stand' until after the White House relationship with McCarthy began to harden.

Nevertheless, and not by design but by an accident of personalities, the Army may be setting McCarthy up for the old-fashioned nice-guy-tough-guy routine which police have often used.

So far McCarthy has had to deal mainly with nice-talking Stevens. But if these hearings continue, he's going to have to tackle a couple of tough talkers who seem perfectly happy to snarl at him.

Army Counselor John G. Adams and Asst. Secretary of Defense H. Bruce Case are principals in this case with Stevens on the Army side. McCarthy has questioned the honesty of both of them too.

He has had only a brief encounter with Adams and Hensel at this hearing so far. Hensel and McCarthy have looked at each other contemptuously throughout the hearing.

McCarthy repeatedly treated Stevens on a first-name basis, calling him "Bob" at the beginning of a brief exchange with Adams. McCarthy tried the same thing on him, calling him "John."

Adams showed he was in no mood for nice talk. He said: "The name to you, senator, is Mr. Adams."

"I guess I must have hit a nerve and stunned her. She made a funny noise, and fell on her stomach with a surprised look. I was a little surprised, too."

"I didn't have to hit her again. Some handlers came up with nets and chains. She was so dazed she couldn't hardly wobble back to her cage."

"The incident left no lasting ill will on either side."

"She never seemed to bear an grudge afterward," said Paul. "It happened so fast I don't think I even remembered who hit her."

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What everybody needs is a good tornado warning system. If you know about a twister in advance, there's nearly always something you can do to protect yourself, says the Weather Bureau which recommends community warning systems.

Warning devices—sirens or other signals—kept the tornado dead toll down to about 500 last year, the Bureau says. There is no estimate as to how many lives would have been taken without the warnings, but there were more than 500 twisters reported during the year.

There may not be a storm cellar handy, but there are other relatively safe places in which to seek shelter. Any kind of underground excavation affords considerable protection.

Get in a ditch or low place in the ground, if you can find no better place to hide. Inside frame buildings, such as a barn, the safest place usually is the southwest corner of the lowest floor. If you live in a brick or stone structure, go visit a neighbor who has a frame house until the storm blows over.

Downtown, the best place to weather a tornado is in a strong, steel-reinforced building, and keep away from the windows. People in school buildings should find a place near an interior wall on the lower floor. Avoid auditorium or gymnasium as these buildings usually have large, poorly-supported roofs which are liable to collapse.

Whatever the type of building you're caught in, if a tornado threatens try to see that electricity and gas are shut off before the twister hits.

Never stay in an automobile, in case a cyclone overtakes you in the open country. Get out of the car and assume a horizontal position in ditch or depression. In town, though, where there is danger from falling bricks or blowing planks, an automobile probably would be preferable to the sidewalk.

If you try to outrun the twister, take off at right angles to the path the storm seems to be following—usually from the southwest to northeast. They say that if you can see a cyclone moving in any lateral direction, it's not coming toward you. But if it appears to be standing still, better dig or move.

Another theory is that the great vacuum created by a tornado is what tears up houses and buildings. Due to the difference in inside and outside pressures, the structure simply explodes. To lessen that likelihood, open a few windows so that atmospheric pressures can equalize as the storm twists and sucks.

It also is a good idea, the Weather Bureau says, to keep your radio tuned to a local station when tornadoes threaten or tornadoic conditions exist. You can keep abreast of events without having to call the weatherman, who is bound to be busy.

Call the Weather Bureau for only one purpose—to report a tornado which maybe you'll be fortunate enough never to see.

What could have been accomplished at Geneva beneficial to the United States it was impossible to see at the time of the Berlin Conference, Jan. 25 to Feb. 15. It was then clear that John Foster Dulles, who up to the last moment was successful at Berlin, had fumbled the ball as he reached the goal posts.

On June 15, 1945, the Secretary of State but he carries on his back too heavy a load of error made by his predecessors since 1938. He cannot divest himself of this load, as his country has committed itself by treaties and agreements to a policy that has brought little but losses since the war was supposed to have ended in 1945. Such conferences as Teheran, Yalta, San Francisco and Potsdam have all been beneficial to Russia; none for the United States.

At Geneva, the Soviet Universal State labors to isolate the United States from our European allies. The stakes are high, for if Molotov and Chou En-Lai succeed fully, American influence will be limited in Europe and eliminated from Asia. For Great Britain, this could mean a restoration of economic dominance over Europe by means of enormous contracts which the Russians would pay for not only in heavy cereals and other commodities, but also in gold. Should Great Britain accept Russian blandishments, it could mean a restoration of British trade in Red China.

What can the United States offer Great Britain as an offset to these enticements? Continued financial assistance is repugnant to the British because it means continued dependence and it is politically offensive in the United States. Nothing but sentimentality and a long history of friendship and our support for Great Britain in two wars — can save the relationships between these two countries.

The pay-off for the Soviet Universal State would be an anti-American settlement of the Korean and Indochina problems. The war which the Red Chinese started in Korea in October, 1950, was designed to destroy the independence of Korea and to incorporate that country into the Chinese sector of the Soviet Universal State. The United States fought a war to prevent such an absorption of Korea by Red China. At Geneva, Chou En-Lai is proposing a unif-

cation of the two parts of Korea which could achieve his utmost aspiration.

It is likely that before the Geneva Conference is over, fighting may again break out in Korea. It is no secret that Syngman Rhee has long planned using the forces at his disposal to keep Korea in turmoil in a suicide struggle to prevent a peaceful conquest of his country. He has, from the first, distrusted the Geneva Conference. He had anticipated that the British would oppose any American program of continued intervention in Asia.

Any compromise over Indochina can only be beneficial to Red China, which is believed already to have three divisions inside that country and a larger army based on Kweilin in Kwangsi. The partition of Indochina into two areas, one held by France, the other by the Communists, cannot but work out favorably for the Communists. A prolonged truce can only work out beneficially for the Communists as it did in Manchuria in 1946 and in Paris during Korea in 1951-1953.

Only some form of international intervention can save Indochina from the Communists. Such intervention by the United States is willing to undertake provided other nations, particularly Great Britain, join even by token forces. Thus far, Great Britain, has declined to join with the United States in any such effort.

Indochina differs from Korea by the technicality that in Indochina it is assumed that a native population has risen in revolt against an alien exploiter. While there is a degree of truth in such an assumption, the reality of the situation is that the conquest of that country would open Thailand and Burma to war and conquest by the Soviet Universal State. The British apparently are willing to chance their eventual elimination as a trading nation and the United States is unwilling to go it alone.

At worst, what Geneva can achieve is the diplomatic isolation of the United States and a complete re-orientation of American policy, which since 1945 has been based on the ideas of General George Marshall. It could even be an enforced reversal of the "no entangling alliances" policy of George Washington, which prevailed among us for 128 years, from 1789 to 1917.

GENEVA — If the West has agreed upon a common position from which to face the Communist challenge at this conference, it is not discoverable. The divisions and distractions are all too painfully evident.

Secretary Dulles worked manfully during the past two weeks to put together an emergency Asian pact that he hoped would provide temporary cement for the disintegrating situation in Indochina, holding the West to a common objective.

But with this an impossibility it appears, as Dulles goes to Washington, that the only alternative is to accept the best bargain the French can make with the Communists to end the Indochinese warfare. Eisenhower's press conference statement on an arrangement with the Communists in Southeast Asia ended the last chance for the kind of intervention Dulles proposed a week ago.

The surprise of the Eisenhower remarks served to accentuate Dulles' lonely position at Geneva. American delegates have been conscious that what was transpiring here has been overshadowed by the concentration back home on the McCarthy hearings. Without a continuity of interest and at least some support, even a man dedicated to his task as Dulles is must feel a sense of futility.

It was the State Department that first felt the full force of McCarthyism, and one consequence has been the serious weakening of the foreign service and, therefore, the major source of information on which foreign policy is based. It can hardly have failed to occur to American policymakers here that the loss of Indochina could touch off a political barrage and a series of public castigations such as followed the loss of China to the Communists.

Within the American delegation it is a source of deep resentment that not a single European delegate has come forward to speak. The reason, of course, is that the delegates do not support America's all-out position behind South Korea and they do not, at least in the beginning phases, want to accentuate their differences. Nevertheless, feeling among Americans is strong.

While British Foreign Secretary Eden operates under a long-standing Churchillian injunction to go just as far as possible to get along with America, he must constantly bear in mind two things. One is the division of public opinion in Britain, where not only in the Labor party but also among Conservatives there is a deep dread of involvement in an Asian war which would become a third world conflict.

Second, Eden must never forget the obligation to try to hold the Commonwealth together. That means the British must consider the sensibilities of Nehru in India and his insistence on both a line and a role in Asia that America cannot accept.

As for France, the distractions and divisions are so numerous they can scarcely be catalogued. The wonder is that Foreign Minister Bidault, a tense high-strung individual, stands up as well as he does. His troubles with the French Assembly are like those of the British.

H. W. Broughton, who spearheaded an unsuccessful drive to bring baseball back here earlier this year, is head of the Sweetwater committee that will meet with League Proxy Harry James and other officials of the circuit to discuss the problem.

Sweetwater will host the San Angelo series starting tonight and extending through Friday. Originally, the two games were to have been played in Wichita Falls.

James has gone on record as saying that Sweetwater will be regarded as the home club unless a final decision is made by the directors.

James also stated that Sweetwater would not have to be voted into the League since its franchise was still active and no cash outlay would be involved. Sweetwater was last in the League in 1952, at which time it finished in seventh place in the standings and drew

a total of 37,000 paying customers.

Sweetwater was a charter member of the circuit. It fielded what is generally regarded as its best team in 1947, at which time it finished fourth under the management of Joe Dotlich. Its draw that year was \$1,631. In 1948 the club played to \$5,425; in 1949, \$3,770; in 1950, to an all-time high of \$9,773; and in 1951 to \$2,430.

It withdrew after 1952 because it could not compete against the larger cities for high priced help. All cities were over the salary limit at the time and Sweetwater backers gave it up as a hopeless fight. Since then, the league has retrenched and pared expenses to the bone.

Wichita Falls has failed to meet expenses since the first game of the season. It drew a crowd of 492 on opening day and, on one occasion since then, only 92 persons paid their way into the park.

Al Atton will continue to serve the club as its general manager from all indications.

The Spudders have won only two games since the season got under way, one from Artesia and the other from Big Spring.

The Sweetwater park is owned by the city.

MORE SCHOOLS IN TIL MEET

A total of 438 Texas high schools will compete Thursday, Friday and Saturday in the University Interscholastic League's 44th Annual State Meet on the University of Texas campus.

Only 480 schools among the 1,500 members of the League had contestants last year.

The approximately 1,500 official contestants represent the best talent from eight regions in Conferences B, A, and AA. Winners of regional events April 23 and 24 make up the entry lists at the State Meet.

Events include tennis, golf, track and field.

Registration of all contestants begins at 2 p.m. Thursday in Gregory Gym on the University campus.

The huge 44th State Track and Field Meet begins preliminaries in Memorial Stadium at 8:30 a.m. Friday. The only finals Friday will be in pole vault, Conference A, at 8:30 a.m.; Pole vault, Conference B, and discus throw, Conferences A and AA, both at 1 p.m.; broad jump, all three conferences, 2 p.m.; and discus, Conference B, 2:30 p.m.

All track and field events Saturday will be finals, beginning at 1 p.m. The track meet has entries from 285 schools, 15 more than last year.

Golf competition, individual and team, begins at 8 a.m. Friday at Austin Municipal Golf Course, with entries from 32 schools.

Tennis matches, involving players from 65 schools, opens at 9 a.m. Friday at Caswell, Freshman and Penick Courts.

The State Meet has equal representation from each of eight sections in three conferences. Every section brings its champions, decided in a series of district and regional meets.

Norman Dudley and James (Tiny) Ellison of the 1953 Big Spring High School football team have changed their minds and are planning on attending Texas Christian University this fall.

Dudley is a 200-pound center, Ellison a 285-pound guard. Both were named to the all-district team and both to at least one second all-state team. Dudley has been named to play in the All-Star game at Dallas in August.

The two originally had announced plans to enroll at Texas Tech in Lubbock, along with end Wayne Medlin, another member of the Big Spring state finalist club.

Dudley lettered three years in football, Ellison four.

Managers of Little League teams will gather at the Justice of Peace Office in the courthouse to take part in the auction of players for the 1954 campaign.

Eight teams are now entered in the two circuits, the same number that campaigned in 1953. Approximately 120 positions are open to youngsters, all told.

Approximately 250 boys underwent tryouts earlier this week at the Little League Park.

Phase In Maneuvers Convinces Generals Armor Is Effective

By JOE BENHAM
FORT HOOD (AP) — Exercise Spearhead moved into the second major phase of its tactical operation today with its leaders already convinced of at least one big factor.

The armored division is here to stay. It won't be rendered obsolete by the atomic age, but may get a boost from it.

The conclusion, apparently nothing new in the minds of Fourth Army Commander Lt. Gen. I. D.

White and Spearhead director Maj. Gen. Hobart Gay, got added backing from the reports of yesterday's simulated atomic action by U.S. troops.

Umpires, following tables estimating casualties from atomic missiles, reported that the strike areas cleared of effective resistance from Aggressor forces. And indicated the immediate area was highly radioactive.

But at almost the same moment the arbiters ruled that the First Armored Division could move its armored vehicles through the area of the sunrise A-blast, and that its troops would be comparatively safe from the imaginary radioactivity.

"I could say that the atom has greatly enhanced the value of armor in the present age," Gen. Gay remarked. The tall, deliberate officer continued, "The foot soldiers run a much bigger chance of getting hurt in an area which an armored vehicle could move through without being contaminated."

Gen. White was enthusiastic about the 22,000-man exercise, too, but seemed more excited over the work of the M-39 than anything else. "It makes the armored infantry the only type of unit which

Soviet General Visits American

HERSFELD, Germany (AP) — Escorted by U. S. Air Force helicopters and jet fighters and a covey of military police jeeps, a high Soviet army officer crossed into West Germany today and headed for U. S. Army headquarters at Heidelberg.

The officer was believed to be Col. Gen. A. A. Grechko, commander in chief of Soviet armed forces in East Germany, en route to pay a courtesy call on Gen. William M. Hoge, commander of the U. S. Army in Europe.

Hoge paid a "formal courtesy visit" — lasting 15 minutes — to Grechko at his headquarters in East Berlin last November.

Two U. S. helicopters escorted the three big black Soviet limousines across the East-West border here. Shortly after, two American jet fighters joined the convoy. Six MP jeeps fell in line, fore and aft, as the party sped down the express highway toward Heidelberg.

U. S. Army and Air Force officials refused to say who was in the Russian party.

No Soviet officer of Grechko's status has ever visited U. S. forces in West Germany during the nine years of the occupation.

Since the Russians rarely do anything impulsive in their relations with the West, observers considered it particularly significant that the visit today coincided with the East-West meeting now on in Geneva.

Red China Claims Capture Of Spies On Korean Island

TOKYO (AP) — Red China said today "five armed agents of the American side" were captured April 10 near Tashwa, a Red-garrisoned island off Korea's west coast.

The Peiping radio heard here said the men "admitted they were from the 18th District of Syngman Rhee's army intelligence department." That would indicate the men were Koreans.

The Red radio quoted the men as saying they had been "ordered to infiltrate and conduct hostile activities" on Py Choo Peninsula.

Peiping said the men, armed with a machine gun, three rifles, grenades and 500 rounds of ammunition, were captured in a boat. Available maps do not show either a Tashwa Island or Py Choo Peninsula. A Taewha Island is located about 30 miles south of Antung on the Korean-Manchurian border but it is doubtful that a small boat would be that far north. It was believed more likely here that the island and peninsula referred to by Peiping is in the major Haeju Peninsula area, where the Reds previously claimed infiltrations by Allied agents.

Eisenhower Signs Highway Aid Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower today signed a record size highway aid bill and expressed the hope that road construction can be stepped up to an even more rapid pace.

With a congressional delegation looking on at a White House ceremony, the President put his name to a measure authorizing \$66 million dollars in federal aid for highway building in each of two years. The money will be used to assist the states in the construction.

The program will start July 1, 1955.

Eisenhower used seven pens to sign the bill. He finished signing his name with the sixth and said with a grin:

"By golly, that's about all the pens I can use unless I use one for a period." And he did.

TOKYO (AP) — Lt. Gen. William K. Harrison Jr. today was awarded the Navy's Distinguished Service Medal for "exceptional diplomacy and tact" during the 14 months he served as chief Allied negotiator of the Korean armistice.

The gray-haired, Bible-quoting Harrison, chief of staff for both the Far East and United Nations commands since the armistice, was decorated in farwell ceremonies at the headquarters here.

He and Mrs. Harrison will leave tomorrow for the United States on the first leg of their journey to Panama, where the general will become Caribbean commander in chief of U. S. forces.

Three Testify In Swindling Hearing On Oil-Gas Deal

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP) — A bank cashier, a gasoline plant foreman and an investor in a Texas oil-gas deal testified yesterday in the trial of two Mid-West promoters accused of a \$400,000 swindle.

William F. Snakard of Wellston, Okla., and Dr. V. J. Devine of Kansas City are specifically charged with conspiracy, five counts of mail fraud and two involving violations of the Federal Securities Commission Act.

It was in connection with one of the mail fraud counts that W. L. Hart, assistant cashier at the First Citizens National Bank at Dyersburg, Tenn., testified.

Hart said he received from a Brownwood Tex., bank a cash letter asking that \$36,000 be taken from the account of Harold D. Keller, wealthy implement dealer, and wired there. The government is seeking to show the promoters were implicated in the transaction.

Keller testified about his investments in the gasoline extraction deal near Brownwood. He denied a defense charge that he threatened to kill or beat Snakard during a quarrel.

The plant foreman was Charles Rhodes of May, Tex., who told of piece-meal purchase and erection of the gasoline plant, finally completed after 11 months.

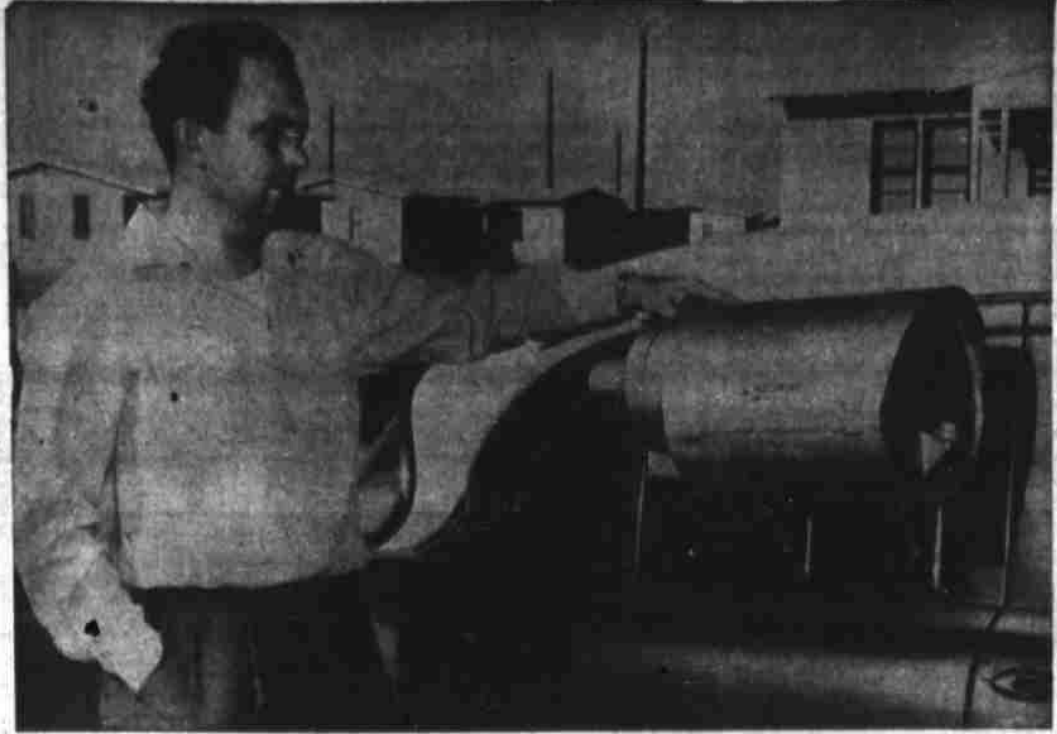
the chamber and recordings of actual storm noises will synchronize with the water-wind funnel as it moves across the "country-side."

'Boom' Year Expected For Air Conditioning

The number of air conditioning units which have been installed in the city indicates that the people of Big Spring intend to beat the heat this summer.

Not only have cooling units been appearing on houses, but some have already been placed on automobiles.

Dealers here in both house and auto air conditioners predict that year than ever before. Sales are already heavier than they were this time last year, the merchants point out.

A "real boomer" year is expected by store managers handling car coolers.

George McAlister, a local resident who invented an evaporative type automobile air conditioner, expects his particular cooler to break all previous records in sales. He is retailing it through three local firms.

McAlister's cooler, which fits on the right front or rear window of

the automobile, is completely electric. It contains a pump and blower which works off the battery. Small unit retails for \$69.50.

Demand has been quite heavy for the cheaper car air conditioners dealers report. These kind sell from \$10 to \$20, and work by wind whipping across water soaked pads. An electric portable cooler which sits in the floor of an automobile and works off the cigarette lighter is also being offered this year.

Most houses here are being equipped with the evaporative type cooler, dealers report, although some of the refrigerated units are being installed.

Service work on old conditioners is taking up a good percentage of the dealers' time right now. And parts for the coolers are in heavy demand, especially the filter mats.

Merchants handling air conditioners have noted that most homeowners are getting away from the temporary window type air conditioner and are now installing more permanent type coolers, complete with duct work. These units are being installed on the roof and on gable ends.

It has also been reported by the retailers that better material is now being put in the air conditioning units by the manufacturers. There has been no noticeable price rise, they said.

Some offices here are installing refrigerated units, but sales are few, it was pointed out. Some refrigerated window units have also been installed in Big Spring.

More Women Should Take Memberships

Although Eva Pyatt, owner and operator of the Kids Shop, 201 East 3rd, admits that the Big Spring Chamber of Commerce has been doing a not much job, she believes more women members would add to the effectiveness of the work.

"There are plenty of firms here operated by women, and if the women are capable of owning a business they should be members of the Chamber," she said. "Besides the Chamber of Commerce needs women's point of view."

Another project which she would like to see undertaken would center in North Big Spring. "I think we should do something for our neighbors on the other side of the tracks," she said. "They need streets, better housing, playgrounds and equipment."

She would also like to see the Chamber sponsor an Easter Parade as an annual affair and suggests that it be for children under 12 years of age.

Mrs. Pyatt figures that other women agree with her on the Easter Parade idea. And it is her opinion that other such "feminine" plans for improving the community would be advanced by more women Chamber members.

She points out that women spend 80 per cent of the money in the United States, and consequently should take a more active interest in directing commercial activities of their cities.

Residing at 509 Dallas, Mrs. Pyatt says she does a lot of garden work and is necessarily interested in beautification. She is a member of the city's zoning board and the First Baptist Church. Before entering the children's clothing business, she manufactured clothing here and was a manufacturer's representative.

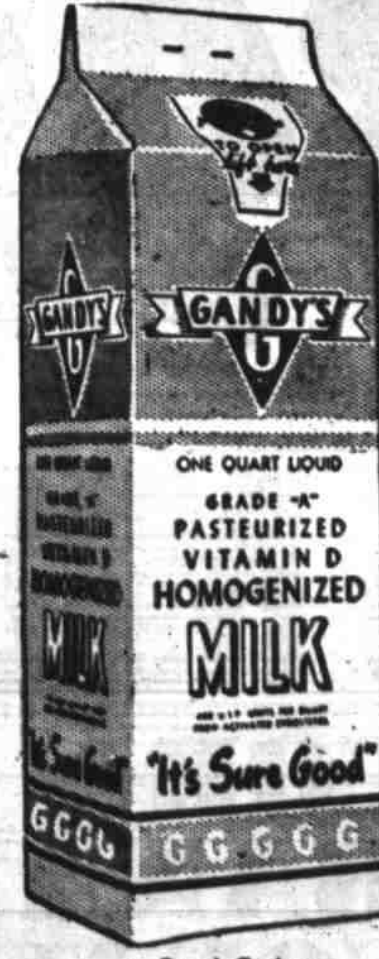
Tabloid Urges Rest For Queen Elizabeth

Edgar Stander and Frank Rockmore of Lenora have gone to Hot Springs, Arkansas, where, as Edgar explained before they departed, "Frank is the one who will take the baths."

Bob Latimer of Stanton has sent Edgar word that it won't hurt him to take at least one of the hot baths while he's up there.

Bob had a parakeet. He reckoned it was about the smartest parakeet in the whole, wide world, and he was mighty proud of it. (All this according to Edgar Stander.)

Bob kept telling the boys down around his Stanton filling station about this parakeet and finally one day he decided to take the bird down to the station and show him off. It happened that this was the day of one of the very worst of this spring's sand storms. The parakeet got out of the station, somehow or other, and out into the high winds and blowing sand.

Bob hasn't seen that parakeet since, but the tragedy inspired one of the most dramatic and moving poems ever written in Lenora. Some folks say Edgar Stander authored it. Here it is:

"Bob Latimer had a parakeet. It talked both night and day. Along came a West Texas Wind And blew that parrot plumb away."

P. S. Bob is training another bird to become the smartest parakeet in the world. Stander says he's building a wind shield for this one.

Lenora proper has received about two inches of rain this year, although it has been heavier over parts of the surrounding area.

Among the farmers in that community reporting cotton up are Ed Pollock, Lois Madison and Smoky Greenhaw.

For the first time, residents of the Lenora area expect to have telephone service in about two weeks through the West-Tex Telephone Co-Op of Stanton. The automatic dial exchange at Lenora has been completed and the equipment has been installed. Workers are busy in that section installing telephones and lines and getting the system ready to operate. Hereafter we'll be able to give more prompt reports on rainfall and other Lenora happenings.

Where hail was received over this area some farmers report a hard crust on the ground and think they will have to do a little more surface tillage and replanting.

Reports from most parts of this section indicate that feed and Sudan are coming up well. Cold mornings appear to have discouraged a little bit here and there but the warm sun later along in the day has more than offset the morning chill and prospects are mighty good.

A number of Dawson County farmers are going in for Blue Panic Grass this year. Several of them have already bought their seed and a number of these have already planted and gotten the grass up.

J. V. White of Klondike, planted 10 acres on April 20 and his grass was up to a good stand one week later.

Monroe Davis of Spangberg planted a small patch on April 21 and his grass was breaking through the surface on April 23.

Others who have recently planted include Bill Anderson, who lives five miles south of Lamesa on the Stanton highway, and W. Brown, whose farm adjoins the Lamesa Airport section on the west.

Jess Jenkins of the Lamesa unit

of the SCS, says Blue Panic can be planted from now until the first of August, but that now is the best time to plant this grass.

Blue Panic is probably the most important crop ever introduced into West Texas. It provides good profits in beef and milk production and at the same time stabilizes and improves the land.

Skeet Noret is going to use Blue Panic to protect some steep slopes on his farm northwest of Punkin Center in Dawson County.

Last week approximately two miles of terraces were completed on this farm which is bisected by Sulphur Draw.

The slopes along the shoulders of the draw were gullying badly. He says these terraces have been so designed and constructed that they will help wean water away from these slopes; that they will put the water which has been running down these slopes and into Sulphur Draw to good use instead of wasting it, and that these terraces will probably save one or two irrigations a year.

This spring he will plant the steep slopes adjacent to Sulphur Draw to Blue Panic to protect them.

What will a good stand of alfalfa or winter grasses and alfalfa do to tumble weeds, goat heads, careless weeds and other weeds?

Last fall, H. L. Anderson, who farms a quarter-section six miles south of Lamesa on the Stanton Highway, planted a patch of alfalfa and a patch of winter grasses.

Last week clippings were taken from both patches. The alfalfa yielded 12,000 pounds of growth to the acre, and the grass-alfalfa mixture yield was 14,000 pounds to the

Sen. Johnson Asks Brady Creek Funds

WASHINGTON (U.S.—Sen. Lyndon Johnson (D-Tex.) yesterday asked a Senate appropriations subcommittee to approve a million-dollar appropriation for the Brady Creek Watershed Flood Control Project in Central Texas.

Johnson, asked the money for the fiscal year starting July 1, said it would take 20 years to complete the project at the rate money has been forthcoming so far. He said \$284,000 was provided for the year ending June 30 and the original budget for next year asked \$288,723.

The senator said the total estimated cost to the government would be \$4,737,238 and farmers in the area plan to spend another \$1½ million.

J. M. Caldwell reports that while his Dawson County ranch, north of Sand, has been very dry for the past several years, a careful examination of the soil reveals a few of the better grasses are present and have survived the drought to reseed the grazing land if just enough moisture will fall from now on.

Explaining that the better grasses will multiply and force out the less desirable grasses, Caldwell says he plans to rest one complete pasture this year.

Retirement Credit Allowed Those Who Attend AMA Meet

AUSTIN — Retirement credits may be earned by Reserve Medical Corps officers on inactive duty who attend the scientific presentations on Military Medicine during the annual meeting of the American Medical Association, June 25 in San Francisco, the Department of Defense has announced.

Physicians eligible to receive the credits are Medical Corps officers of the U. S. Army, Navy and Air Force Reserves. Point credits will be awarded on the basis of one for each day of attendance, provided sessions attended total more than two hours.

Scientific subjects of specific interest to civilian practitioners will be discussed by military medical authorities during the three-day assembly. They include the initial care of the severely wounded, arterial grafts in military surgery, retinal burns produced by atomic flash, a new rapid test for determining antibiotic treatment, and the medical experiences of physicians who were Communist prisoners in North Korea.

Among the civilian medical leaders participating in the program will be Dr. Stanley Olson, Dean of Baylor University College of Medicine.

Newlywed Comes Up With Shrimp Creole

As our gift to mothers on their day is a succulent but elementary and speedy recipe for Shrimp Creole given us by a bride of four months, Mrs. Charles S. Hoyle, 1302-A Wood.

It only takes about 20 minutes to make but the end result tastes like something one spent hours in preparing. Pat Hoyle likes it especially because her husband is a flight instructor at Webb Air Force Base and it's often hard to predict when he'll be home for dinner. So she does this Shrimp Creole dish in a flash and Lt. Hoyle remains the well-fed husband.

Pat is a native of Los Angeles, Calif., and her husband is from San Diego. Before her marriage she screened patients at the University of California Hospital in San Francisco.

She is definitely not the typical unadorned newlywed. For instance, she has used her skill on a sewing machine to decorate, and very attractively, their apartment.

Here's her recipe:

SHRIMP CREOLE
Ingredients:
1 cup sliced, peeled onions
1/2 cup diced celery

1 minced, peeled clove of garlic
3 tablespoons butter or margarine
1 tablespoon flour
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon granulated sugar
2 to 3 teaspoons chili powder
1 cup water
4 cups boiled white rice (1 cup raw)

2 cups canned tomatoes
2 cups cooked or canned peas
1 tablespoon vinegar
2 cups cleaned, cooked, canned shrimp
Method:
Cook first three ingredients in butter in skillet over medium heat until tender—about 10 minutes. Add combined flour, salt, sugar and chili powder mixed with 1/4 cup water. Add 1/2 cup water. Simmer, uncovered, 15 minutes. Meanwhile, cook rice and keep hot. When onion mixture has cooked 15 minutes, add tomatoes and rest of ingredients except rice. Heat.

To serve: Place rice in buttered, 1-quart ring mold; unmold on plate. Place creole in center and around rice. Makes six servings. For two: Halve each ingredient. Pass rice.

Here Is Tasty Recipe For 'Eating Italian'

If you sometimes like to "eat Italian" when you're restaurant-bound, try preparing this simple but delicious Italian-style shrimp dish and enjoy it at home.

Its sauce is unthickened—just the true flavor of lightly-seasoned tomatoes comes through. The herbs in the sauce are those used most often in Italian cooking—oregano, basil and parsley, and of course there's a suspicion of garlic. Our recipe calls for garlic salt, but you may add a minced or crushed clove of garlic if you prefer.

This Shrimp Marinara is a fine last-minute recipe. You can shell, clean and refrigerate the shrimp in the morning. At suppertime you can quickly put the sauce together, then add the raw shelled sea food just before it has finished cooking. Although raw shrimp comes in an interesting assortment of colors—from greenish-gray to coral—it all turns pink the moment it starts to cook.

Two "musts" with this shrimp dish are Italian bread or crisp rolls and a green salad. But do you want to start off with an appetizer? Then how about tempting antipasto? During Lent, make this a platter of stuffed hard-cooked eggs, cooked white beans marinated in olive oil and wine vinegar and seasoned with salt and freshly-ground pepper, crisp ribs of celery, green olives and strips of canned pimiento. By the way, white beans come canned these days so all you have to do is to put them in the marinade.

Caramel custard rounds out this Italian-style menu deliciously. A demitasse of black coffee served in a small, heavy, footed glass, accompanied by a twist of lemon peel and sugar, is a perfect last touch.

SHRIMP MARINARA

Ingredients:
1 pound shrimp (fresh or frozen)
2 tablespoons olive oil
1/4 cup finely diced celery
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper
1/4 teaspoon sugar
1/4 teaspoon garlic salt
1/4 teaspoon basil
1 teaspoon oregano
2 tablespoons minced parsley
1 No. 2 1/2 can (1 pound and 12 ounces) peeled tomatoes
Method:
Shell and clean shrimp, do not cook. Heat oil in a 10-inch skillet. Add celery and cook over low heat until tender. Add salt, cayenne, sugar, garlic salt, basil, oregano, parsley and tomatoes. Allow to

bubble gently over low heat, stirring often, until slightly thick—30 to 45 minutes. Add shrimp. Cover skillet and cook 3 to 5 minutes—depending on size of shrimp. Serve over cooked rice if desired. Makes 4 servings.

New Recipe With Apples Is Apple Meringue Pudding

APPLE MERINGUE PUDDING
1-3 cup cornstarch
1 cup sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
3 cups milk, scalded
3 eggs separated
1 tablespoon orange rind or 1 teaspoon lemon rind
24 small vanilla wafers
2 cups canned pie apples
Mix cornstarch, 2-3 cup sugar, and 1/4 teaspoon salt in top of double boiler, and slowly pour over scalded milk. Cook over boiling water, stirring almost constantly until mixture thickens. Cover. Cook 15 minutes, stirring occasionally. Pour hot mixture very slowly over beaten egg yolks, stirring constantly. Return to double boiler, and cook 2 to 3 minutes. Cool, and add flavoring. Arrange alternate layers of vanilla wafers, apple slices, and cooled mixture in 1 1/2-quart baking dish, ending with pudding. Beat egg whites with 1/4 teaspoon salt until foamy, add 1-3 cup sugar gradually, beating until it stands up in soft peaks. Pile lightly on pudding. Bake in a moderate oven 350 degrees F. until delicately browned, 15 minutes. Chill before serving.

A Different Snack

Here's a different kind of snack: Cover slices of bread with processed cheese, thinly sliced. Top with canned apple slices and a sprinkling of brown sugar and cinnamon. Broil until the cheese begins to melt. Serve at once with coffee or tea for grownups, milk or cocoa for small fry.

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Add Meat Balls To Hamburger Repertoire

If your budget benefits from frequent chopped-beef dinners, you'll want to add this tomato and meat ball dish to your hamburger repertoire. It is one of those budget and flavor wise dishes that is fine for a family meal. Easily and quickly made, too!

The meat balls are tangy with tabasco sauce; they have a pleasant soft texture because the liquid from a can of tomatoes, and soft bread crumbs, go into them. Rolled in a mixture of flour, salt and paprika before they are browned, they have appetizing color. You use the rest of the can of tomatoes to make into a good rich gravy-like sauce to serve with the meat balls and cooked noodles.

When I prepare meat balls, I like to get them the same size. So what I do in this recipe is to take up a level quarter-cup measure of the meat mixture, then shape two balls out of this amount. If you do this, you'll have about 18 meat balls out of this recipe.

I find families differ in the amount of noodles they consume at a meal. If your family are really big pasta eaters, you may want to double the amount of noodles called for in this recipe. Use any width noodle you like, from the fine to the wide. To cook the 4 ounces of noodles called for, heat 6 cups water with 1 1/2 teaspoons salt until boiling in a large sauce-

pan; drop the noodles into the boiling water and boil nine to 14 minutes, depending on how tender you like them. Stir the noodles occasionally so they won't stick, and drain them thoroughly in a colander as soon as they are ready. Double the amounts of water and salt if you are cooking 8 ounces of noodles, but keep the boiling time the same.

TOMATO MEAT BALL DISH

Ingredients:
1 No. 2 can tomatoes
1/4 teaspoon tabasco sauce
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon dried parsley or dried shredded green onions
1 cup soft bread crumbs
1 pound ground chuck beef
3 tablespoons flour
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon paprika
2 tablespoons butter or margarine
2 tablespoons diced green pepper
1/4 teaspoon dried thyme or oregano
4 ounces noodles any width (cooked)
Method:
Drain liquid from canned tomatoes; there should be 1/2 cup. Stir in tabasco, 1 teaspoon salt and parsley. Pour over crumbs in mixing bowl; mash crumbs in liquid until they become a soft mass. Add beef; mix well with a fork. Form into about 18 balls, using about 2 tablespoons of the meat mixture for each. Mix flour, 1/4 teaspoon salt and the paprika; roll

meat balls in mixture. Melt butter in 10-inch skillet; brown meat balls. Add celery, green pepper, reserved tomatoes and thyme. (If tomatoes are solid-pack, break up.) Cover; simmer 30 minutes. Turn hot cooked noodles into serving dish; spoon meat balls and tomato sauce over top. Makes 4 servings.

Peach Salad Is For Calorie Counters

For party guests who are counting calories, try this party peach salad. Made of peaches, cottage cheese and lettuce and served with crisp rye wafers, the salad provides individual servings totaling a mere 164 calories.

PARTY PEACH SALAD

1 package lemon gelatin
1 cup hot water
1/4 cup cold water
1/4 cup lemon juice
1 number 2 1/2 can peach slices, well drained
1 cup cottage cheese, well drained
Rub a four-cup mold with salad oil. Place lemon gelatin in a four-cup bowl. Add hot water and stir until dissolved. Stir in cold water and lemon juice. Pour one cup of gelatin mixture into oiled mold and let chill until slightly thickened. Let rest of gelatin stand at room temperature.

Arrange peach slices in the thickened gelatin layer. Add rest of gelatin. Chill until firm. Keep chilled until ready to serve. At serving time, turn out on lettuce and spoon cottage cheese around the mold. Garnish with maraschino.

Here's How To Serve Tasty Chinese Supper

Cook Chinese-style for one of your Lenten meals. We tried the idea ourselves and can recommend it. Our main course was the new frozen meatless chow mein accompanied by Almond Soy Rice, and our family greatly enjoyed both dishes. As a matter of fact, I thought we were preparing enough of the rice for six people; I noticed that four eaters did away with every last grain!

Frozen chow mein is a new product that comes in three varieties: chicken, beef and meatless. It's an especially good product, in our opinion, because the vegetables stay crisp and the gravy is well flavored. Crisp Chinese noodles are packed along with the chow mein; although the package suggests serving the noodles "as is," we prefer to heat them in the oven. We tried serving three packages of the chow mein to four people, to see if we could keep our menu cost down, but our tasters all complained! They liked the chow mein so well that they insisted one package is not too much for each person served.

For the start of your Lenten Chinese-style meal, take a tip from the usual bit of fare in a Chinese-American restaurant. Tomato juice with saltines, or chicken soup with soft noodles or rice, will make an acceptable first course. Or if

you expect company at this meal, you might serve a more elaborate appetizer and have shrimp dipped in a batter and fried.

Dessert might be pineapple slices and almond cookies. Or you could have pineapple, lemon or orange sherbet. Or maybe you fancy broiled or baked peaches. If you can get hold of some ginger marmalade, put a spoonful of it in each peach cavity before heating, then serve with whipped cream. It's a combination we favor.

ALMOND SOY RICE

Ingredients:
1/4 cup butter or margarine
2 cups converted-type rice
2 1/2 cups boiling water
1/2 cup soy sauce
2 tablespoons butter or margarine
1 cup blanched slivered almonds
Method:
Heat 1/4 cup butter in large heavy skillet over low heat. Add rice and stir constantly until rice is golden-brown. Add water and soy sauce; cover skillet tightly. Simmer 40 minutes or until liquid is absorbed and rice cooked through. Melt 2 tablespoons butter in a small skillet; add almonds; cook and stir over low heat until almonds are lightly browned. Stir almonds into rice. Makes 6 servings. Serve with frozen meatless chow mein heated according to package directions.

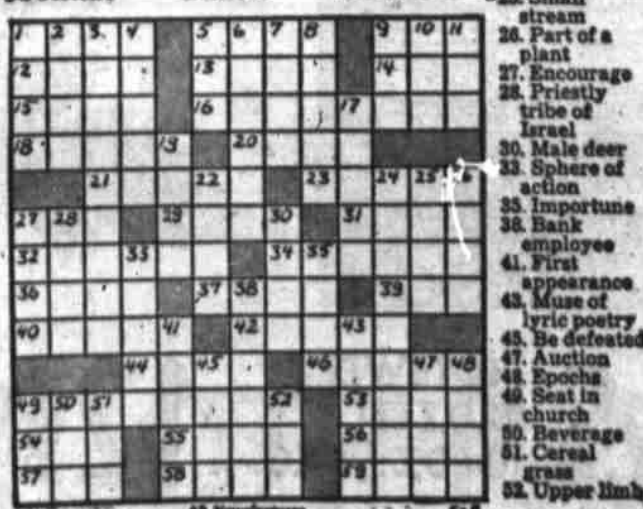

Will people in general wear such suits in time to come?

Eight years ago I gave a short talk before a group of scientists. At the close of my talk, I said: "You scientists have brought atomic bombs into the world. Now it is your duty to find ways to defend the human race against them."

Sad to say, little has been done to bring about a real defense. Millions of dollars have been spent on civil defense projects, but thousands of millions have been used to build "bigger and better" bombs.

During visits to New York City, I have been amazed by the many signs pointing the way to bomb shelters. Such shelters have given the residents a feeling of hope, but the H-bomb has changed the picture. A shelter might save people from bombs of the Hiroshima type,

but it could hardly be of much use against hydrogen bombs. People have been advised to leave cities in case of an atomic attack. This is a simple thing to suggest, but it would be hard to do quickly enough.

Work has been done to protect Canada and the United States with radar screens. Such screens are expected to give a city six hours' warning of attack. That time would be far too short. A full week would hardly be enough to empty a large city.

A scientist who heard my talk said to me later: "In my opinion there is only one way to bring about real defense against atomic bombs. That would mean world control of the bombs. If all nations agree to this, we can hope for the future."

Several weeks ago Premier Malenkov of Russia declared that an atomic war would destroy civilization on both sides. Many persons on our side of the Iron Curtain have said the same thing, but Malenkov seems to have been the first Russian leader to admit that his country would suffer untold damage.

Suits have been devised to guard people against the deadly rays which come from the remains of atom bombs. After seeing pictures of these suits, I have decided that I don't like the fashion. Tomorrow: Peaceful Projects.

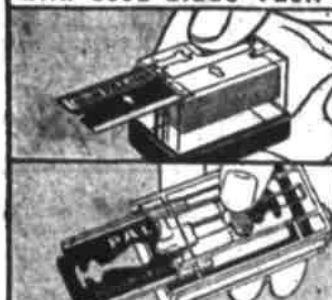

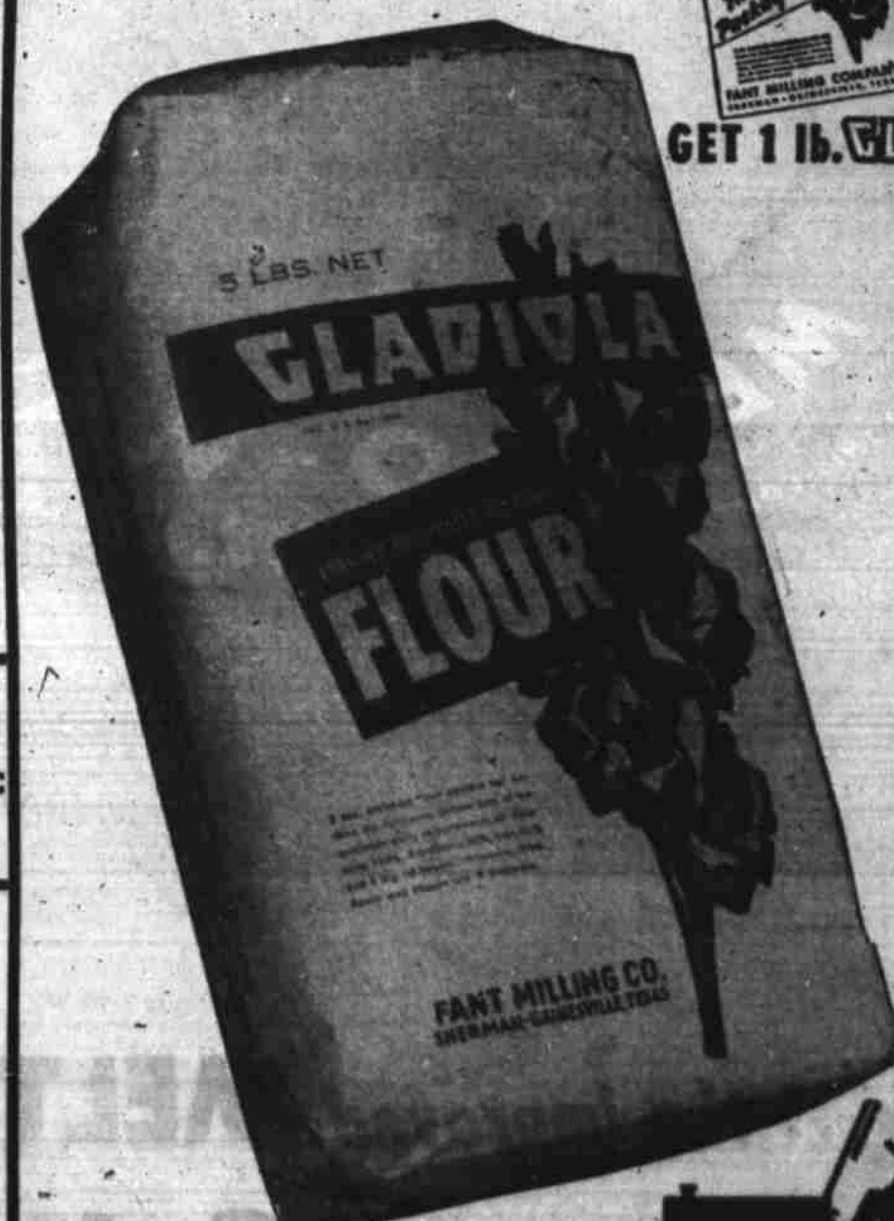

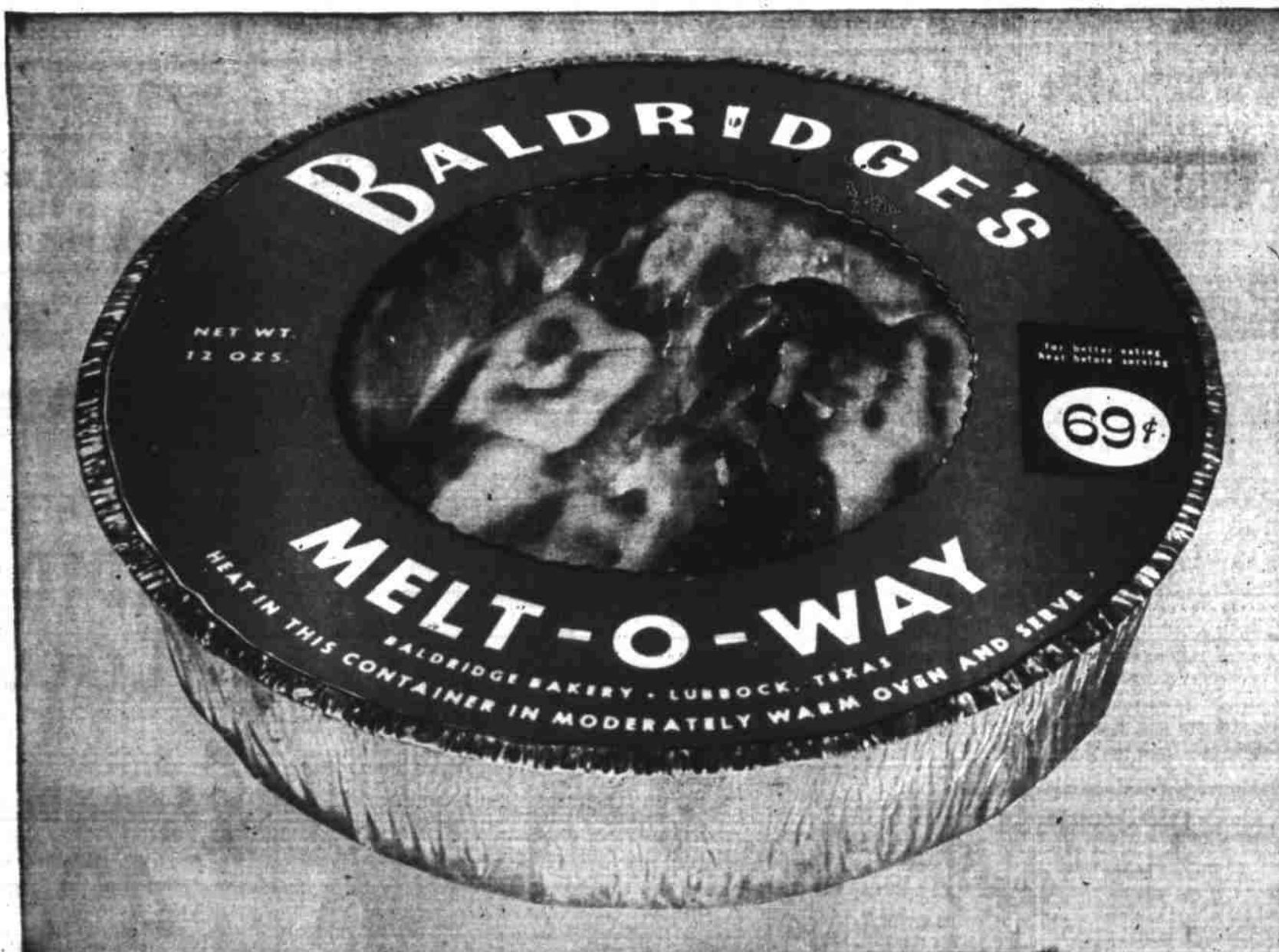

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Give Mother Cake And Candy Too On Her Day

By CECILY BROWNSTONE

Mother can have her cake—and her candy, too. For here's a Box-of-Candy Cake you can make her for Mother's Day on May 9.

Isn't this an ingenious present? We like the cake because while it is definitely a showpiece, it's really simple to achieve. You use one 9-inch cake layer and frost it with a rich chocolate icing, then arrange a lace-paper-dolly frill around it and candles on top. The final touch is to section off the candles with a little decorating icing, so as to give a real "candy box" effect.

We've chosen one of those quick-mix recipes for the cake. Its flavoring of orange and almond tastes intriguing with the creamy chocolate frosting. Buy any assortment of candy you wish for the top of the cake—Jordan almonds, pastel mints, chocolate and cream caramels (wrapped or unwrapped), bonbons topped with nuts, small chocolate drops studded with silver dragees, gumdrops and jellies. It's best to use candies that are not chocolate-covered so they will show up against the chocolate frosting.

If you haven't a decorating tube, you can force the decorating icing through a cornucopia made of waxed paper.

BOX-CANDY CAKE

Ingredients:

2½ cups sifted cake flour

Blueberries Good In Cake And Muffins

These recipes use the canned blueberries, because they will be available the year round; however, during the fresh berry season the same recipes may be used with fresh blueberries. A slight variation of each recipe is explained, when using fresh instead of canned berries.

BLUEBERRY MORNING MUFFINS

1½ cups flour
½ cup sugar
4 teaspoons baking powder
¼ teaspoon salt
¼ cup milk
2 beaten eggs
4 tablespoons melted shortening
¾ cup well drained canned blueberries or 1 cup fresh raw blueberries.

Sift dry ingredients together into mixing bowl. Stir slightly, if necessary so that ingredients are evenly distributed. Melt shortening and cool slightly. Mix melted shortening, beaten egg, and milk together with the well drained or fresh blueberries. Make a well in the dry ingredients in the mixing bowl and add all at once the remaining ingredients including blueberries which have been mixed separately. Stir all together just until blended and dry ingredients are moistened. Batter may appear slightly lumpy. Overmixing of muffin batter will cause the muffins to be tough.

Spoon the batter into well greased muffin pan so that each cup will be about two-thirds full. This amount of batter makes 12 muffins. Bake in a preheated 425 degree oven for 25 minutes. Serve warm with butter, honey, marmalade or jam. They are delicious for breakfast.

BLUEBERRY COUNTRY CAKE

1 cup sugar
4 tablespoons (½ stick) butter or margarine
1 egg
¼ cup milk
2 cups sifted flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
¼ teaspoon salt
1½ (about) cups well drained canned blueberries or up to 2 cups fresh raw blueberries.

Cream sugar and butter or margarine. Beat in egg until smooth. Sift dry ingredients together and add alternately with milk until well blended. Last fold in well drained canned or fresh raw blueberries. If canned blueberries are used, a 15-ounce can, well drained will make 1½ to 2 cups of berries, all of which may be used. Save the juice to make a confectioner's icing. If fresh blueberries are used, up to two cups may be used.

Turn blended batter into a greased then floured deep pan or baking dish, approximate size nine inches in diameter. Bake in preheated 375 degree oven for 45 to 50 minutes or until a pick comes out clean when thrust in the center. While cake is still warm, top with confectioner's icing made with a mixture of powdered sugar and blueberry juice or milk blended into a smooth spreading consistency. If preferred, this cake may be served warm and fresh out of the oven with butter. It is good served warm with the confectioner's icing, too.

Treat With Waffles

Cream a half cup of butter or margarine with a teaspoon of sugar and a tablespoon of molasses, making sure that you add the sugar and molasses gradually. Serve over waffles, pancakes or French toast for something good!

Sweet Potato Peeling

If you must peel sweet potatoes ahead of the time you are going to cook them, put the pared potatoes in salted water to keep them from darkening.

1½ cups sugar
2½ teaspoons double-acting baking powder
¼ teaspoon baking soda
1 teaspoon salt
2-3 cup vegetable shortening
1½ teaspoons grated orange rind
¼ cup milk
¼ cup orange juice
¼ teaspoon almond extract
3 eggs
Rich Chocolate Frosting
Assorted Candies
Decorating Icing

Method:
Put flour, sugar, baking powder, baking soda and salt in sifter. Put shortening and orange rind in mixing bowl; stir just to soften shortening. Sift in flour mixture. Add ¼ cup of the milk and the orange juice; mix until the flour is dampened. Then beat 2 minutes at low speed of electric mixer, or 300 vigorous strokes by hand. Add remaining ¼ cup milk, almond extract and eggs. Beat 1 minute longer in mixer, or 150 strokes by hand. Four better into two round 9-inch layer pans that have been greased and lined on the bottom with buttered waxed paper. Bake in moderate (375F) oven 25 to 30 minutes or until cake tester inserted in center comes out clean. Turn out on cake rack; remove paper and cool.

To frost and decorate, prepare Rich Chocolate Frosting and spread over top and sides of one of the layers. Cut the center out of a 12-inch lace-paper dolly, leaving about a 1½-inch border. Carefully place the border around frosting on top of the layer to make a frill. Place an assortment of candies on frosting cake. Then prepare Decorating Icing and force through decorating tube or waxed paper cornucopia and draw lines separating the candy. (Frost the second layer and reserve for dessert another day.)

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RICH CHOCOLATE FROSTING

Melt 3 squares (3 ounces) unsweetened chocolate over hot, not boiling, water; remove from heat; add 1½ cups sifted confectioners' sugar and 2½ tablespoons hot water; blend. Add 3 egg yolks, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Add 4 tablespoons soft butter or margarine, a tablespoon at a time, beating well after each addition.

DECORATING ICING

Put ½ cup sifted confectioners' sugar into a small bowl. Add about 2 teaspoons milk gradually, stirring until smooth and icing is right consistency to use in decorating tube or waxed paper cornucopia.

DENVER (U)—The Oil Workers International Union (CIO) expects to seek "substantial" general wage increases from the oil industry this year.

OUIU President O. A. Knight of Denver said yesterday he will recommend that goal at a meeting of the union's policy committee on June 4. He said the committee must approve any national wage increase campaign.

"We have been studying the matter of a general wage increase since the first of the year," Knight said. "On the basis of exploratory conferences with some companies, and on the basis of financial data on 1953 operations of the industry, I am now prepared to firmly recommend that we seek an increase."

She was nominated without opposition last night to succeed Hazel Markel, women's commentator for the Mutual Broadcasting Co.

McCarthy's Name Anathema In Ames

AMES, Iowa (U)—The City Council has received a petition signed by 30 Ames citizens asking that the name of McCarthy Road here be changed "to some other, wholesome name."

The road, a residential street, was named after an old Ames family and not for Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.).

IN SPRING ONE PIGEON'S FANCY TO STAY SINGLE

OAKLAND, Calif. (U)—Mrs. Harry Esquibel says a pigeon she owns has been perched determinedly atop a telephone pole in Oakland's Sunnyside district since early Monday.

"He escaped when we were trying to get him into the mating cage," she says. "We've sent all the best females up to get him, but he just sits and lets them fly by. He hasn't even come down to eat."

"I don't know what to do," she asked. "The registration number of the reluctant pigeon not mentioned because 'I don't want to hurt his reputation.'"

'Invisible' Light May Help In Making Drug Selections

PITTSBURGH, Pa.—A new "invisible light" technique for quickly identifying germs known to be resistant to certain drugs was described recently to the Society of American Bacteriologists.

A team of researchers of the CIBA Pharmaceutical Co. of Summit, N.J., told about it at the SAB's 54th general meeting.

And some doctors who studied the report declared that the advantage of the technique, if developed for general use, would lie in this:

It might allow a doctor to eliminate certain drugs from the very start in treating a patient—and to concentrate on other methods of

treatment that might have a chance of effectiveness.

The CIBA investigators—researchers F. C. Kull and M. R. Grimm—reported they had noted detectable differences in the way different strains within given families of germs react to infrared "invisible" light.

Strains known to be resistant to certain of the antibiotic "wonder drugs" or to the new antituberculosis drugs absorbed the light to a different degree than did strains known to be sensitive to such drugs.

The researchers said that while the technique offered a means of quickly determining that a given germ had at least some resistance or susceptibility to a given drug,

it has not yet been developed to the point of showing the exact degree of resistance or susceptibility. In another report to the meeting, a research group of the Army's Camp Detrick, Md. Laboratories—scene of studies on biological warfare—reported possible advances towards production of a new and superior "toxoid" for combating dreaded botulinum poisoning.

The botulinum germ is one of those listed unofficially as possible germ warfare weapons which this country should guard against.

The Camp Detrick researchers report was read by Dr. J. T. Duff.

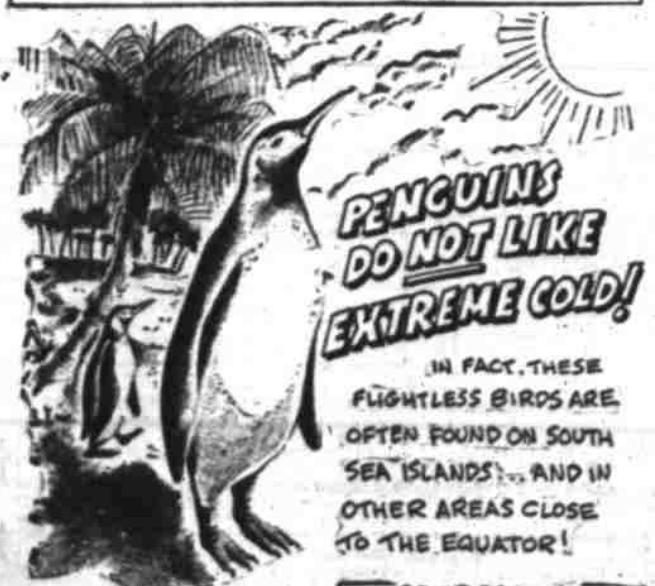
