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Story on Kelley incident unfolding

Last week, the mother of a five-year-old Kelley Elementary kindergartener contacted CBS 7, a news station out of Odessa and claimed her daughter was sexually assaulted at school. In Texas, five-year-olds cannot be charged with sexual assault.

Since then, very few details have surfaced, as law enforcement officials are not issuing any statements about the ongoing investigation and school officials' hands

are tied by federal law. However, another mother of one of the other children involved in the incident has come forward. She wishes to remain anonymous to protect the identity of her own daughter.

The story of the incident, as it was told to CBS 7, was released last Wednesday evening. A Facebook account of the story was posted on the news outlet's page saying, "A Colorado City mother has withdrawn her children from the school district after she says her five-year-old daughter was

sexually assaulted by other five-year-old students. Police remain tight-lipped, only telling CBS 7 that a sexual assault report has been filed and that they are investigating."

Glass claims that her daughter was left in the bathroom at the school with two other five-year-old girls while the other students went on to class. She said that one of the other girls was blocking the door and her daughter was made to pull down her pants and was touched.

According to Glass, her daughter's teacher called her from her personal cell phone after 5 p.m. that Thursday. "My story is the direct story and direct statement from the teacher herself. It's not my story, this is from the teacher," Glass said Tuesday afternoon.

"They were leaving P.E., they went to the restroom, and some little girls got left behind, including my little girl. I don't know who the other little girls are," Glass

Sheriff warns of scam involving phone calls

According to Mitchell County Sheriff Patrick Toombs, phone calls are being made to local citizens in an attempt to obtain money. During the last couple of days, at least two people have been contacted by someone claiming to be from the IRS.

Toombs said that the callers are telling citizens that they have checked records from earlier years and that money is owed on back taxes. They go on to warn people that an IRS agent may be

sent to their home in as little as 72 hours to collect the owed tax money.

The callers are harassing people, scaring them in an attempt to get them to send money orders in amounts ranging from \$1,400 to \$4,900. The area code the scam calls are coming from comes up on Caller ID as 713.

Toombs said that this is not how the IRS handles business. Anyone owing tax money would

City council tables rezoning decision

Several citizens attended Tuesday's city council meeting to express opinions on the issue of rezoning several properties from R1 - Single Family Residence to R2 - Multi-Family Residence District. After hearing concerns from citizens, the council decided to table all zoning considerations until the entire zoning plan for the City of Colorado City can be rewritten, despite recommendations from the zoning commission to approve the change.

Citizens were concerned about the changes that would come to their neighborhoods if duplexes or apartment complexes were built. City Manager David Hoover said, "We need to rewrite the whole thing to make it

a cohesive unit," referring to the piecemeal zoning plan.

The council had been considering changes requested by FGE regarding the sale of effluent water to the company. Energy company officials had requested several changes to the agreement, first signed by both parties on December 23rd of last year.

The council agreed to some of the changes but not all. For instance, the company wanted to lease three acres of land from the city for their own effluent water holding facility for \$10 per acre. Hoover said that the price for the lease would be fair market value of \$100 per acre per year.

Also, the company had asked for city officials to supply over

Hospital board hears Luminant presentation

A small quorum of Mitchell County Hospital District's board met Tuesday evening and heard a presentation by Evan Warren with Ryan, the law firm representing Luminant Energy. It's no secret that the energy company is exploring multiple sites to determine the best place to locate a 150-megawatt solar farm.

The project is a \$300 million investment and would generate electricity for tens of thousands of homes, according to Warren. He said that as electricity retailers, like Oncor, look to diversify what type of electricity they are buying, Luminant is also looking to diversify ways of producing it.

While Warren would not name the other locations of pos-

sible sites, he did say that the site north and west of Champion Creek Reservoir has a particular benefit. Luminant already owns all the land it would need to build the farm.

Other things factor into the equation, such as tax rates. Warren said that Colorado ISD's high debt service tax rate is somewhat of a negative, but if other entities offer beneficial abatements, it would sweeten the deal.

The company is now approaching all taxing entities to secure incentives, and they are requesting a 10-year 100% tax abatement from the hospital district. Warren said the incentives are essential to financing the

Commission sends recommendation to council

The meeting of the City Zoning Commission drew many citizens to the civic center last Thursday, as the group met to consider rezoning several blocks and lots of property, most of which are located near Ruddick Park. The commission approved the properties be rezoned from R1 - Single Family Residence District to R2 - Multi-Family Residence district.

If the commission's approval is upheld by the city council in December, the change will allow for the construction of duplexes and apartment complexes in the affected areas.

Besides the areas around Ruddick Park, a couple of blocks north of Snyder Road (East 10th Street) were also approved for rezoning.

City Manager David Hoover said he thinks the zoning change is important because new families often cannot afford to buy a house outright. He added that is cheaper for developers to build a duplex to house two families, rather than constructing two separate homes.

Pam Guess, a citizen living on 7th Street, voiced a concern about the maintenance of any new duplexes or apartments that may be built if the area is rezoned. "I don't want another junk place," she said. "We've been here 11 years. I want to take pride in our town and community."

Hoover said that, ultimately, the responsibility of upkeep falls on the owner of whatever may be built.

Another citizen who lives on 7th Street, Dolly Ramirez, voiced her concern over multi-family residences being built in her neighborhood. She said she likes her quiet neighborhood and is concerned about more traffic an apartment complex would create.

Commission President Georgianna Porter said that there are many ways to control traffic. Hoover added that the city will be looking into regulations to help with many concerns, including traffic.

Commission member Bob Brookshear said there are few blocks that have enough open space to afford apart-

ment complexes. He speculated that the open lots just west of Ruddick Park might have enough room for a complex, but most new construction would be in the form of duplexes.

"There will probably be very few multi-family houses put in," he said.

Porter urged the citizens to consider that any new construction would cost owners significantly, spurring them to take care of the property. Hoover added that any new construction would not include manufactured or modular homes and must be "stick built" according to the zoning regulations.

While most citizens attending were concerned over new construction and what that might mean for specific neighborhoods, Commission member Shorty Brown said that the rezoning doesn't mean that there are plans for any new construction at this time.

Brown went on to urge citizens to contact their city

Lewis speaks at Lions Club Friday

Bob Lewis, more commonly known as Tumbleweed Smith, presented the program at the weekly meeting of the Colorado City Lions Club last Friday. He was introduced by November's program director Luis Aguilar who met Tumbleweed while working at Western Texas Col-

lege in 2008. Lewis and his wife, Susan, produce a radio program called *The Sound of Texas*. The couple live in Big Spring. Lewis got his start with the radio program in 1969. He was working for NBC in Des Moines, Iowa, when he inter-

viewed an 11-year-old blind girl who had a great enthusiasm about life. Some of his co-workers encouraged him to send it to NBC Monitor, a radio program at the time.

He submitted the piece to the Monitor, and sometime later, received a letter from Gordon Frazier notifying him that it would air on the program on a specific date. "It meant a lot," Lewis said. "I was going to have an interview on network radio. I went out and bought a new stereo just to listen to it."

Apparently, NBC executives weren't the only ones who enjoyed the interview, Lewis said that it had gotten a great response around the world.

Lewis shared what he called a crowning moment of his career. His roommate at Baylor University in Waco was a big jazz fan. The two of them dressed up one night to see Stan Kenton, a jazz performer. Because of the way the college boys were dressed, security for the event thought they were part of the band.

They got in the show, went back stage and got to rub elbows with one of the hottest jazz groups of the time. The boys traveled to see the band in San Antonio, Houston and other parts of the state.

At one point, Lewis got to interview Kenton. He called this one of the crowning moments of his career.

Lewis' wife, Susan, is from Big Spring, and he recalled attending one of Colorado City's famous events, the Tumbleweed Festival. "That may even be where I got my name," he said. He wrote a story for Life magazine about the festival, but it never ran.

Lewis said he had an epiphany about what he wanted to do to earn a living while he was on an Army ship. He was 25 years old when he heard a commercial, the first thing he'd heard on the radio in many months. "That's when I knew what I was gonna do for the rest of my life," he said. "It's been scary and fun."

The Sound of Texas began with Lewis preparing five programs and sending them out to 30 radio stations in west Texas. The first radio stations to play the program were in Big Spring and Littlefield. He said the local station, KVMC, was one of the first five to play the program, as well.

The first year, his program made \$1,800. Lewis could see that he could be successful, but it would take more. That's when he jumped in his car and started searching for the characters he interviews all around the state.

"I've been all over Texas, and I have to tell you, west Texas is by far the best," he said Friday.

Lewis put over 200,000 miles on his car taking *The Sound of Texas* to many radio stations around the state. On April 1, 1970, he officially became Tumbleweed Smith.

A few members of the Lions Club stuck around to purchase one of his new CDs, entitled Top Picks, which can be purchased at KVMC for \$10.

A campfire is the perfect thing to warm up the night as the weather turns colder. However, if inclement weather sets in, O'Haver said that the gathering can be moved indoors to the park's Recreation Center.

For now, plans are to hold the gathering outside around the fire pit. Everyone attending is welcome to bring their own smores and hotdogs to cook on the fire during the program to make the evening even more enjoyable. O'Haver reminds those planning to attend to bring a chair and join the circle All Around the Campfire.

There is no cost for the program, however you will need to pay daily entrance fees of \$4 per adult and children 12 and under are free. If you have a valid Texas State Park Pass there is no charge.

Commissioners discuss building lease

Agreement is with Mitchell County Hospital for 505 Chestnut

The county's agreement to lease the office building at 505 Chestnut Street from the hospital district was a topic of discussion in Monday's meeting of the Mitchell County Commissioners Court. County Attorney Ty Wood was present to advise court members on the agreement.

The agreement being considered by the court has the county leasing half of the building, which they would continue to use as a center for MHMR services. Leasing only half of the building brought up some concerns by Wood, as there are several common areas in the building.

As it is written, the agreement

holds the county responsible for paying for any maintenance repairs under \$1,000 and Mitchell County Hospital District responsible for anything over that amount.

County Judge Ray Mayo said that Hospital Administrator Robbie Dewberry had expressed his intentions to have the building painted and have the air conditioning/heating unit repaired. Mitchell County pays for the yard of the building to be maintained.

Wood said that because of the privacy issues presented in providing MHMR services, details of the contract may need to be spelled out. Mayo also suggested that the county share the

utility bills with the hospital district, instead of the county being responsible for all utilities.

Court members took no action on the contract but authorized Wood to contact Dewberry and move forward on nailing down some of the details.

In other action, votes of the November 4th election were canvassed. Out of more than 4,500 registered voters, only 1,233 cast ballots in the election. County Clerk said that there was one write-in candidate, and the electronic tabulator doesn't count write-ins, but the machine does alert election officials so the vote may be counted manually.

Two bids on properties up for tax sale were approved during the meeting. A \$250 bid by Tony Salazar for property at 638 Elm was approved. The property had been appraised at a little over \$17,000 when there was a home still standing on it, but the city has since torn it down and Salazar will be responsible

for paying the demolition lien when he takes possession. Also, a \$1,000 bid by Veronica Huff for a lot on Chestnut Street between 18th and 19th streets was approved.

Before adjourning, the court approved the 2015 payroll schedule for county employees.

TUMBLEWEED SMITH RG3 in bronze

Robert Griffin the Third is Baylor's first Heisman Trophy recipient. To honor him, a bronze life-size statue of the football player was commissioned. It stands just across the southern entrance to Baylor's new football stadium. Baylor chose sculptor Tom White of Prescott Valley, Arizona to create the work of art.

"A person I had done some work for in Waco suggested I try out for the job," says Tom. "I went to Baylor and met with people planning the project and showed them a portfolio of my work. I left that day with an agreement that I was going to do the sculpture."

Tom went to Washington, D. C. where RG3 was in training camp with the Washington Redskins.

"One of the Baylor trainers went with me. We took a Baylor uniform with us for RG3 to wear. We got him out in the field and took pictures of him throwing passes. We took tons of photos, trying to get every move he made. After looking at all those pictures, I chose three different positions that I thought were most interesting. I sent those to Baylor to let them choose which one to use."

As work on the project was nearing completion, RG3 was pleased with the way it looked but there was one detail that needed work.

"Robert had the final say on the piece and he was really concerned about the little goatee he was wearing underneath his chin. I certainly wanted to get it right, so we batted the ball back and forth on that and finally got what he was looking for. I must have made 10 to 15 changes but we finally got it."

The sculpture was unveiled just before Baylor's first game in the new stadium. Gates opened at 4 p.m. and the unveiling was to start at 2:30.

"It was insane. There were tailgaters all around that stadium. Even on the river they had tailgating parties on boats. A lot of people were on hand for the opening game. I had expected a couple of hundred people for the dedication, but there were probably 10 to 20 thousand people there. I remember unveiling the sculpture, cameras going off and I stood out of the way because everybody just surrounded Robert."

RG3's family was pleased with the sculpture. His mom said she really loved it. She was in tears when she told Tom it was the most life-like image of her son she had ever seen. Tom was thrilled to get that approval.

Tom is a native of Midland who worked as a carpenter before realizing he had talent as an artist. He has done life-size bronze statues all over the U.S. and Canada. One is in London. In the last four years he has created 70 sculptures, including those he did for the Boy Scouts and the Billy Graham library. The eight feet tall statue of RG3 has given him the most publicity.

250 million gallons of water per year. The original agreement was for 182 million gallons per year. The council did not want to be held to the larger amount.

Changes reflecting council members wishes were added to the contract, and Hoover will be presenting the counter-offer to FGE leaders.

Because the power plant planned for construction by FGE will require certain limitations on the amount of Biochemical Oxygen Demand (BOD), or "solids", in the water supplied by the city, some wastewater requirements will have to be fulfilled by the city.

While raw sewage typically contains a BOD count of 200, the water being used at the power plant can contain no more than 30 BOD. When water is used for irrigation purposes, a BOD count of 100 is usually acceptable.

Charles Keith from Jacobs & Martin Engineers presented several options for the council to consider as they go forward with wastewater plant additions. TCEQ has already notified Hoover that the current facility is at 70% capacity, signaling the time for the city to begin planning the next steps for a growing community.

be contacted by the agency by mail, and a contact phone number would be provided.

"This kind of thing seems to get worse during the holidays," Toombs said. The sheriff's office has not heard of anyone actually sending in money, but sometimes these threats seem very real.

Anyone contacted by such a scam should hang up the phone and report it to the appropriate law enforcement agency, either the Colorado City Police Department or the Mitchell County Sheriff's Office, depending on their place of residence.

said. "The teacher went back to the classroom, didn't realize they were missing between 10 to 15 minutes. In that time another teacher went in the restroom and found them. One little girl was screaming. They're in there having sex!"

Glass said the teacher provided other details about the incident as well. "I was told by the teacher that the other little girl had locked my daughter in the restroom, blocked the door, made her pull her pants down and touched her and told her she was having sex. My little girl was screaming," she said. "The teacher. I did not say that, my little girl did not tell me that, this is what the teacher had said."

Glass also said she called law enforcement and CPS.

The mother of one of the other girls implicated in the incident came to the *Colorado City Record* late last week to "set the record straight," she said. To protect her identity, we will call her Diana.

Diana said that she received a call at about 11:30 a.m. Friday morning from Kelley Principal Melinda Alexander saying that an incident had happened Thursday afternoon at school. After receiving the phone call from the principal, she went up to the elementary school and met with school officials.

Diana said that Mrs. Alexander assured her that proper school protocol had been followed, after she was made aware of the incident. Both the Colorado City Police Department and Child Protective Services had been contacted.

Diana went on to say that the two girls being accused of the sexual assault went in to talk with special counselors. She said the counselors said they believe

her daughter was telling the truth when she said nothing happened in the bathroom that afternoon.

"These two little girls are innocent of any wrongdoing," Diana said Tuesday. The CPS investigator that interviewed Diana and her family told her that no evidence was found to suggest that "anything like that ever happened."

"It was just a false allegation," Diana added.

Diana told me that while the teacher made a mistake by not counting all the kids as they came back to class, she doesn't believe that the school did anything wrong after that. She said that she was told a teacher heard voices in the bathroom and stuck her head in to see what was going on. The teacher saw three little girls, all completely clothed, no one blocking a stall and no one crying. She sent them back to class immediately.

Diana said she believes that Glass jumped the gun and didn't give officials enough time to even perform an investigation. She says she's unsure why Glass would want to publicize the event, saying that she thinks it could cause harm to Glass' daughter in the future.

"I don't know her, so I don't know what she's thinking," Diana said of Glass. "But she's making my little girl out to be a predator, and she's just a little girl."

Because federal law protects the identity of students, school district officials cannot specifically comment on the incident. Law enforcement officials have not released any further statement on the matter.

CISD Superintendent Reggy Spencer had this to say Tuesday afternoon, "We will accept the negative publicity in order to protect our students. Even if we weren't prohibited by law from

talking about it, we would still protect our students."

According to Spencer, the school district's own investigation has not yielded the same details that have been released to the media thus far. School administrators were made aware of the situation Friday morning and met with all parents of involved parties Friday afternoon.

When the story broke on the Odessa news program, CISD released the following statement.

"Federal Law prohibits us from discussing student identifiable information without parent permission and it has not been given in this case by the involved parties.

First and foremost, the safety of our students is our number one concern and we take all allegations of any kind very seriously. The CISD Administration was notified of a situation involving students at Kelley Elementary last Friday November 7, 2014; the incident allegedly happened on Thursday November 6, 2014.

Once we were made aware of the allegations, we took the necessary actions internally and externally to protect all the students involved, notified the proper authorities, and met with all parents of the students on Friday afternoon.

CISD has not been able to verify any of the allegations through its own investigation. To our knowledge this incident is still under investigation by the police and other law enforcement channels, and we have worked and cooperated to the fullest extent with all other parties involved."

A note from Spencer was handed out to all Kelley students on Thursday, November 13th. It reads:

Dear Parents,
We are aware that many of you have seen the recent coverage in the press of an incident that

happened at Kelley Elementary School. I want to reassure you that at no time were your children in danger. The safety of our students is the number one priority in Colorado ISD. Please understand that school officials are prohibited by federal law from speaking about specific students without the permission of their parents. This is done to protect the students. Because we do not have permission of the parents of the children involved, we are unable to provide any details of the incident. Please keep in mind that through the press you are only hearing one side of this story. However, rest assured that school personnel have thoroughly investigated the incident and have found no substantiation of any of the allegations made in the press. The school immediately called in law enforcement so they could also investigate whether any crime may have been committed. We thank you for your trust in Colorado ISD, and we are confident that we can go forward together to provide the best possible learning environment for our children.

Christian Temple serves 950 plates to county citizens

The congregation of Christian Temple began offering to feed the community a Thanksgiving meal for free about three years ago. It's been an annual event that anyone would deem successful. However, organizers were not prepared for the overwhelming success they experienced last Sunday, November 16th.

When the Community Thanksgiving Meal was first served three years ago, volunteers served about 300 plates, a large majority of which were to other congregation members. The next year, the event had to be postponed due to inclement weather, but over 450 plates were served to community members eventually.

This year, congregation members prepared to feed 500 people but ended up serving much more than that. When the dust had settled and the dishes had been done, organizer Bobby Matlock estimated that the church had fed about 950 people.

Fuller Foods donated all the turkeys, an oil company in Snyder donated 17 hams and a busi-

nessman from Colorado City donated eight more hams. All the sides, trimmings, desserts and drinks were provided by the church. After running out of to-go boxes, Gas 'n' Grub donated more to keep the deliveries going.

Matlock estimates that there were about 100 or more volunteers whose service made it all possible. At least 10 groups were making deliveries at the same time. While weather may have put a damper on last year's turnout, Matlock said he thinks this year it may have actually helped.

"I think people stayed in and called for a delivery," he said.

Everyone was surprised by the huge turnout, but God provides, and the congregation served the 950 plates.

"It was overwhelming and wonderful," Matlock said. "The guys making the deliveries said that everyone was just so appreciative."

When asked if the church is planning to do it again next year, he answered, "Oh yeah. People are already excited to do it again."

'Friend to Friend' program informative

"Friend to Friend: Staying Well Together" was held November 13 by Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service Mitchell County and Mitchell County Hospital District at Mitchell County Hospital. Friend to Friend is a program to educate women about mammogram and pap test screenings. The purpose of the event is to encourage women to have regular screenings, because research shows earlier detection of breast and cervical cancers usually leads to better outcomes.

Dr. Dee Roach, Mitchell County Hospital Chief of Staff, was the medical speaker for the night. He talked about breast and cervical cancer and how regular screenings, depending on your family history and age, is vital.

Breast cancer is the most common cancer and is the second leading cause of death in women. One in eight females, or 12 percent, and one percent of males are diagnosed with breast cancer. It is estimated 232,670 new cases will be diagnosed in 2014.

It is important for women 40 and over to be screened yearly, and it is recommended to be screened earlier if there is a family history of breast cancer.

Cervical cancer was also discussed at the event. Cervical cancer is caused by the HPV virus, and Texas has the highest mortality rate. It is estimated 12,360 new cases will be diagnosed in 2014. It is important for women to begin getting pap tests at the age of 21 or when they become sexually active. Beginning at age 30, it is recommended to get a

pap test every three years.

Beverly Cogburn was the cancer fighter speaker for the night. She spoke of how she knew something was wrong, and after going to the doctor, she waited on treatment due to personal events. She said had she received treatment sooner the chemo and treatment would not have been as painful. She encourages all women to get regular screenings and to seek treatment as soon as a screening reveals an issue. The earlier cancer is detected the better the survival rate.

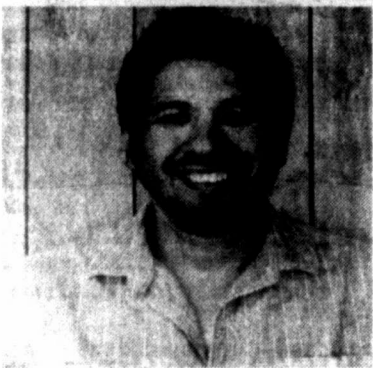

Alpine outscores Wolves

When two evenly matched teams enter the play-offs, success usually follows the team with less turnovers.

That scenario played out again last Saturday in Midland as Alpine held on for a 41-35 win over the Wolves.

The ball just bounced in Alpine's favor on more than one occasion.

A deflected pass into the arms of an Alpine receiver and a fumble that bounced into the arms of an Alpine lineman leading to two touchdowns enabled the Bucks to outscore the Wolves in an exciting opening round of the play-offs.

Throw in a muffed punt that a Wolves receiver was calling for a fair catch when run into by an Alpine defender and it was too much to overcome.

The scoring was often as both teams stayed within a touchdown of each other through-out the game.

A 1st quarter 12-yard run by senior running back David Sanchez put the Wolves up 7-0 midway through the 1st quarter. Alpine scored two late touchdowns in the 1st quarter to take a 14-7 lead.

The Wolves scored two 2nd quarter touchdowns, a 1-yard run by quarterback Dillon Gainey and a beautiful 59-yard pass from Gainey to Trinnon Jackson and the game was tied at the half 21-21.

Following Gainey's 1 yard run, the Bucks went up 21-14 with 6:36 remaining in the second quarter on a deflected 44 yard touchdown pass. It was one of many lucky breaks that went Alpine's way.

Sanchez scored first at the 7:46 mark in the 3rd quarter with a 20-yard run and added another on a 9-yard run with 4:55 to go in the 3rd. With the score tied at 35 a piece starting the fourth quarter, the Bucks were able to push the go-ahead touchdown in with 11:48 to go in the game.

An end-zone pass attempt to Trinnon Jackson was wrestled away by an Alpine player to spoil the Wolves last effort to score the tying touchdown.

Both teams rolled-up plenty of total offensive yards, the Wolves with 428 to Alpine's 387. The Wolves suffered two pass interceptions and a muffed punt, while Alpine lost only one fumble.

Sanchez went over the 1,000 yard mark this season, rushing for a tough 143 yards on 23 carries in this game. Sanchez completed the season with 1087 total yards rushing on 171 carries which is an average of 5.1 yards per carry. Gainey was 15 of 27 with two interceptions for a 267-yards passing.

Pip Jackson was the Wolves leading receiver with 9 catches for 111 yards and Trinnon Jackson nabbed two passes for 90 yards.

Defensively, the Wolves were led by Mark Munoz, Alex Trujillo, Emanuel Ventura and Pip Jackson.

It was a good year for quarterback Dillon Gainey, who threw for 1918 yards with 131 completions.

Closing out the year with a 6-5 record, the seniors should be recognized as their career at CHS comes to an end.

David Sanchez and Pip Jackson joined the varsity during their freshman year and contributed for 4 years. 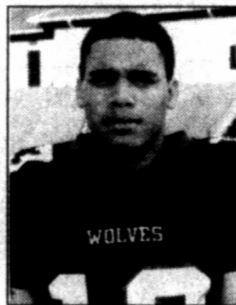

With winter comes fire hazards, so citizens beware

Colorado City Volunteer Fire Department Chief Rick Goodney wants citizens to stay warm this winter but also be safe while doing so. Goodney said that winter can be a time of fire hazards, just as much as summer.

Anyone using an electric space heater should pay particular attention. Though they may be a necessity, the heaters can also pose a dangerous fire hazard.

Goodney said that older space heaters without automatic shut-off switches should not be used. He said that newer models come with a switch

that turns the machines off if they are accidentally tipped over. Pets can tip the heaters over sometimes without owners noticing.

Of course, citizens should also inspect extension cords used with space heaters, as they need to be in tip top condition without cuts or breaks of any kind. Cords should also be big enough to carry the electrical load to operate the heater properly.

Another caution while using space heaters is to keep anything that might be flammable out from in front of them. Any items that burn, such as clothes, blankets, drapes, etc. can catch fire if they

are too close to the heaters.

Many people may use natural gas to heat their homes, and Goodney said that those with floor vents should be particularly careful. He said that floor vents can become dangerous when they are blocked with rugs, clothing or other flammable materials.

Anyone using gas to heat their home should also use a carbon monoxide detector. The detectors, along with smoke detectors, can be purchased from any hardware store.

Another part of winter safety is making sure

chimneys are clean and in good repair before lighting a fire in the fireplace or wood-burning stove. Goodney said to make sure everything is in good working order before the first fire is lit. Flues must also be opened to allow for proper smoke escape.

And finally, as the holidays approach, Christmas trees will be going up as a way to celebrate the season. Goodney said that anyone putting up a real Christmas tree should make sure to water it so that it doesn't get dry and become a fire hazard.

Following these tips can make winter a little warmer and a little safer for all.

Disposal well rules changed recently

The three Texas Railroad Commissioners recently unanimously adopted disposal well rule amendments that are designed to address disposal well operations in areas of historical or future seismic activity. Disposal wells are permitted by the Railroad Commission to safely dispose of non-hazardous produced water (saltwater) and hydraulic fracture flowback fluid from oil and gas wells.

Chairman Christi Craddick said, "Once again the Texas Railroad Commission is taking the lead in ensuring our rules follow science in protecting our natural

resources while at the same time providing a stable regulatory environment for our oil and gas operators."

Commissioner Porter said, "I would like to commend our staff for drafting and amending these rules so quickly. These comprehensive rule amendments will allow us to further examine seismic activity in Texas and gain an understanding of how human activity may impact seismic activity, while continuing to allow for the important development of our energy resources in Texas."

Commissioner Barry Smitherman said, "These disposal

rule amendments represent the fourth significant rule amendments over the last three years. Our first in the nation hydraulic fracturing chemical disclosure rule, our water recycling rules, our rule amendments relating to well integrity and construction requirements, and now this seismic-related rule, maintain the Commission's commitment to best practices for the industries we oversee. Once again, the Railroad Commission of Texas takes common sense, proactive steps without unnecessary intrusion from Washington, D.C."

The main components of the

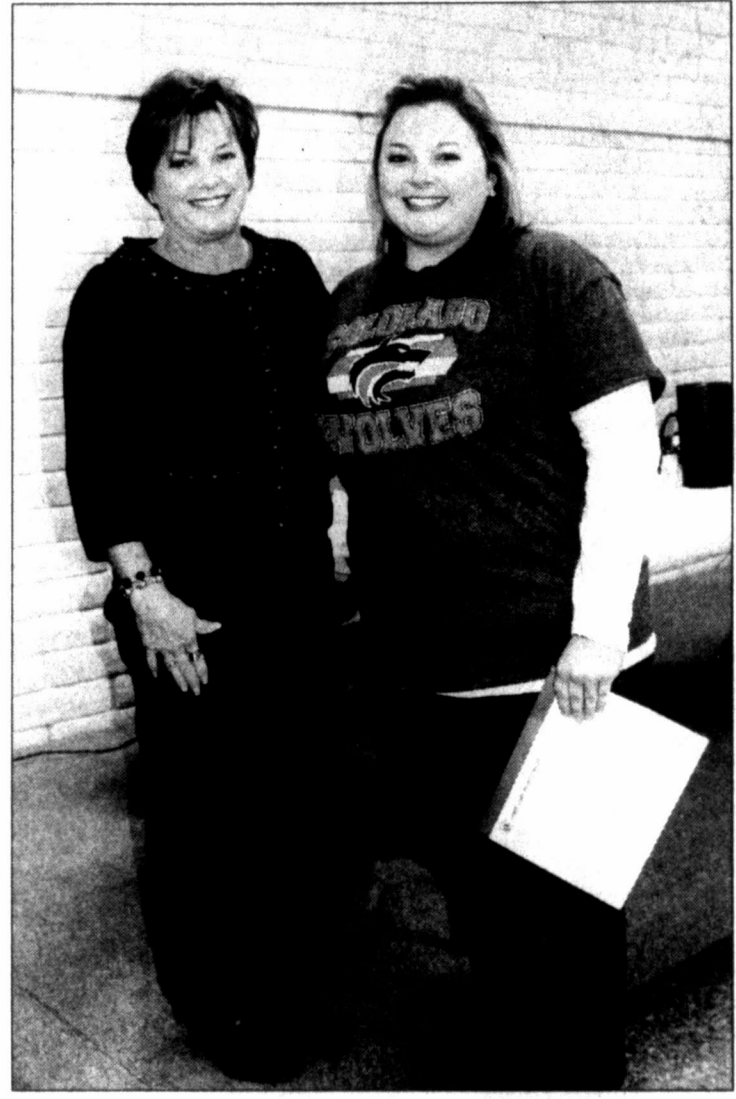
adopted rule amendments, which become effective Nov. 17, are:

- requiring applicants for new disposal wells to conduct a search of the U.S. Geological Survey seismic database for historical earthquakes within a circular area of 100 square miles around a proposed, new disposal well;

- clarifying the Commission's staff authority to modify or suspend or terminate a disposal well permit, including modifying disposal volumes and pressures or shutting in a well if scientific data indicates a disposal well is likely to be or determined to be contributing to seismic activity;

- allowing Commission staff to require operators to disclose the current annually reported volumes and pressures on a more frequent basis if staff determines a need for this information; and

- allowing Commission staff to require an applicant for a disposal well permit to provide additional information, including pressure front boundary calculations, to demonstrate that disposal fluids will remain confined if the well is to be located in an area where conditions exist that may increase the risk that the fluids may not be confined.

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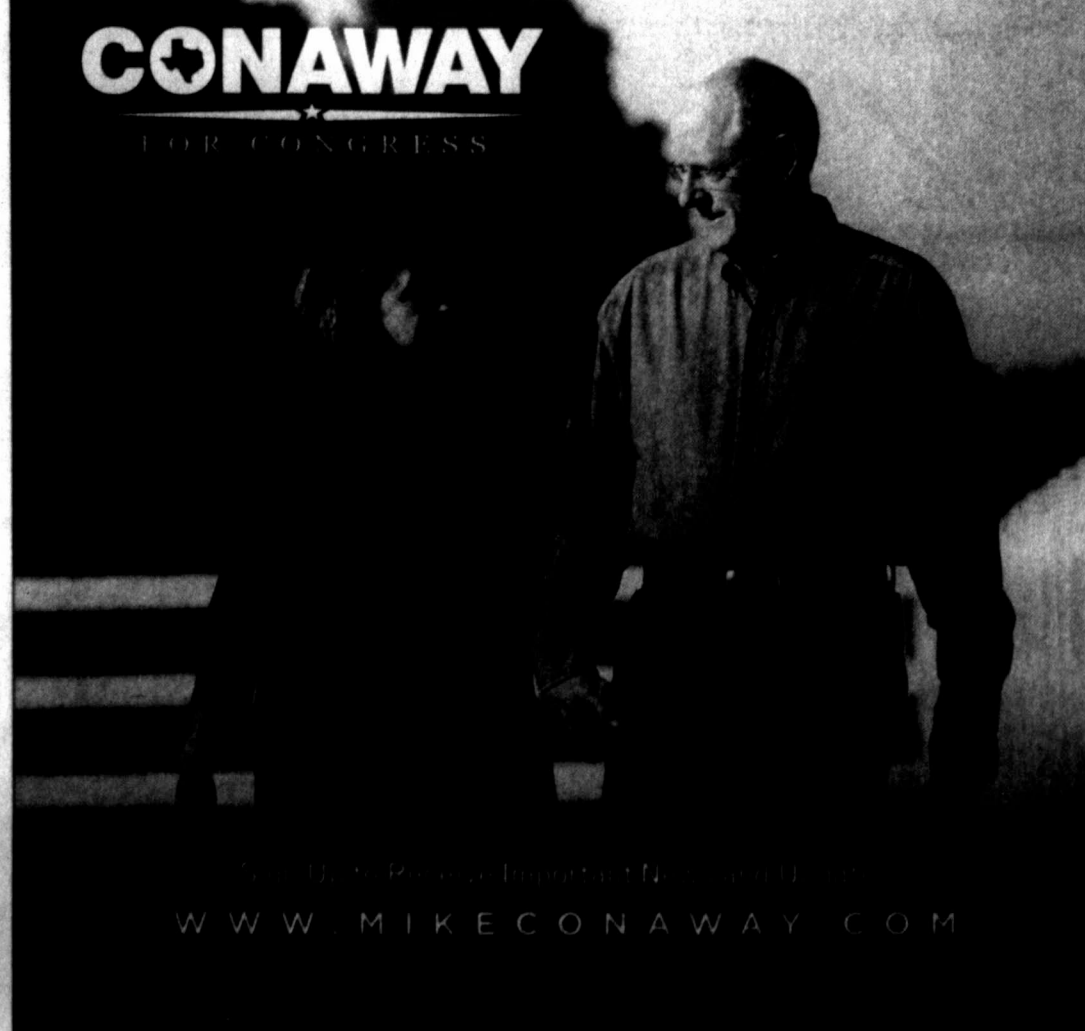
