UNCLE SAM LOOKS TO BRITISH FOR WAR DEBT

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, August 24.—The funding of four billion and one hundred and thirty-five million dollars war debt owed by Great Britain to the United States was declared today by Secretary Mellon to have no relation to the war loans made by the United States and Great Britain to the other governments, or to the questions arising in connection with the reparations payments by the former central

powers.
Mr. Mellon issued a formal statement he said on account of the numerous inquiries as to the exact status of the obligations of the various European countries held by the United States. With respect to the British debt, reports have been published, he said, that the British liability was incurred for the other allies and that the United States had insisted that it was only on British security that the United States was prepared to lend money. Mr. Mellon said that the advances were for the purpose of covering payments for purchases made by the allies in the United States.

ATTORNEY GENERAL OF TEXAS IS MILLIONAIRE

AUSTIN, Aug. 24.—Attorney General W. A. Keeling, of Texas, awoke Saturday morning to find himself a millionaire, having become rich overnight while he was asleep.

Mr. Keeling owned 150 acres within two hundred feet of the 10,000 barrel oil gusher which came in near Kosse. The 150 acres comprise the old homestead of the Keeling family. Mr. Keeling had leased 50 acres of the land some time ago, but he owns the royalties on the 50 acres and owns the other 150 acres in fee simple and oil men declare that he could turn his holdings today for a million dollars. The attorney general left Austin and went to Kosse to see how the old homestead was getting along when he received news that his land was becoming somewhat besmirched with oil.

John Keese, of Denton, has been arrested on a charge of assault to murder. Keese is said to have been the woman's companion. The woman's husband, following the couple in another machine, appeared on the scene shortly after his wife had been thrown from the car, and picked her up and took her to a Denton hospital for treatment.

MAKES SPEECH FOR FERGUSON

After being introduced by Judge T. T. Crosson to a crowd of about 250 or 300 people Wednesday night Bascom Thomas delivered an address in behalf of James E. Ferguson for United States senator. The crowd stood and occupied seats on the court house lawn and listened to the Ferguson speaker for about two hours frequent applause punctuating the oration. As Mr. Thomas "skinned" Mayfield and ridiculed the Ku Klux Klan.

Judge Crosson introduced Mr. Thomas as a Protestant and life long prohibitionist and the speaker further supplemented the reference to his prohibition record by saying that he was fifty-one years old and never touched a drink of liquor or beer in his life but said that he had rather vote for a "dry anti" than a "wet pro," and he pictured Mr. Ferguson as being a clean, upright gentleman with a private moral life which no one should be ashamed of.

The speaker reviewed the numerous charges made against Mr. Mayfield, and made some new charges. He repeated the charge that Mayfield was a drinker, carousing, immoral hypocrite, and made charges which he said he would give \$1,000 to any charitable organization if Mayfield would deny or prove that they were not true.

The most enthusiastic applause came from the crowd when Mr. Thomas referred to the Ku Klux Klan, and charged that Mayfield was the high crown prince of the Klan.

Mr. Thomas was formerly a member of the Texas senate, and was expelled from that body for charging that the legislature was corrupt and that certain members were accepting bribes. He reviewed his record in the senate, and stated that Mayfield at the same time, and he charged that Mayfield played poker, was caught in the game and plead guilty and paid his fine. The speaker challenged Mayfield to deny this, as well as the numerous other charges he made against him.

The crowd to hear Mr. Thomas was perhaps the largest crowd to gather here for a political speaking during the present campaign, and judging from the response a large majority of those present were in sympathy with the speaker and will vote for Ferguson. A number of prominent citizens occupied seats on the speaker's stand, among these were: Lon Mapes, A. J. Voelkel, Dr. E. R. Walker, Prof. E. L. Hagan, County Judge Paul Trimnier, J. A. Ostertag, Theo. Krc, and Judge T. T. Crosson. In addition to the crowd seated on the court house lawn many occupied seats and autos parked along the curbing.

Discover Plot to Overthrow Government

ST. JOSEPH, Mich., Aug. 24.—The Michigan statute against criminal syndicalism was to be invoked for the first time today with the seventeen alleged communists arrested near Bridgeport Tuesday, docketed for arraignment here.

The prosecuting attorney announced that extradition would be sought for William Z. Foster, former steel strike leader, arrested in Chicago late yesterday, who is also charged with criminal syndicalism.

The literature confiscated when the raid was made on the headquarters of the communists indicated a plan to attack the American government. Pamphlets containing a list of the leaders in the United States advised the overthrow of the American government and the establishment of a soviet form of government. The officers seized the literature when the fifteen men were arrested.

INCREASED INTEREST IN THE RUN-OFF RACE

Political activity on the part of the followers of the candidates for United States senator during the last two weeks has greatly revived interest in the second primary to be held Saturday, and the vote will be larger than at first expected.

The last week of the campaign developed into a whirlwind drive by supporters of both candidates, and speakers are on the stump in practically every county in the state, and the woods are being shelled in an effort to rally the voters to the polls Saturday.

Election boxes in Kunnels county have all been supplied with ballots and other election supplies, and the polls will open at eight o'clock Saturday morning and close at seven. County Chairman Estes Lynn sent out the supplies early in the week.

The Ledger will begin receiving the returns Saturday evening as soon as the polls are closed.

42 ACCREDITED TEXAS SCHOOLS

AUSTIN, Aug. 24.—Forty-two Texas high schools were made accredited schools during the past year, according to the annual report of the department of high school supervision of the state department of education, made public here today by State Superintendent Annie Webb Blanton. Ninety-seven high schools in the state applied for classification during the year, according to the report, fifty-five schools failing to meet the requirements of the state board.

Of the schools granted classification by the state department during the year, thirteen were placed in first class, seventeen in second class and twelve in third class. Lack of funds to provide nine months term, an inadequate number of teachers and lack of the required minimum of equipment prevented more schools from obtaining recognition, the report said.

NARROW ESCAPE FOR SAP TRAIN

LOCKHART, Aug. 24.—Authorities are investigating what they believe to have been an attempt yesterday to wreck the passenger train on the San Antonio & Aransas Pass Railroad, near Gonzales. Three iron spikes had been driven between the joints of the steel rails.

J. U. Guffy, road master, struck the obstruction with his motor rail car while traveling at a pretty good rate of speed. The car was thrown from the track and Guffy slightly injured. Guffy was running just ahead of the passenger train, and the train would have probably been wrecked had the motor car not struck the spikes first.

BONUS BILL MAY PASS THIS WEEK

WASHINGTON, August 24.—Committee changes recommended in the House soldiers bonus bill having been approved in the senate Tuesday and Wednesday, the consideration of individual amendments have been taken up. The passage of the measure this week was regarded by some of the party leaders as a possibility before the end of the week.

RAMSEY HEADS SALVATION ARMY

DALLAS, Aug. 24.—Judge W. E. Ramsey, chairman of the board of directors of the Federal Reserve Bank for the eleventh district, has accepted the finance chairmanship of the Salvation Army Divisional Advisory Board for Texas and Louisiana.

Judge Ramsey now is engaged in planning the Salvation Army's annual appeal in the Southwest Division, which will be conducted Oct. 16th to 23rd. He is determined that the appeal shall be the most successful that this division has had since the Advisory Board plan was adopted three years ago.

Judge Ramsey said he accepted the position of Divisional Finance Chairman "because the Salvation Army reaches a large class of persons not reached by other organizations, because of its ever widening sphere of influence and because it reaches out to the man 'who is down but never out.'"

The record of the Salvation Army was investigated thoroughly by Judge Ramsey before he accepted the position. His investigation not only convinced him that the cause is worthy of his support, but he expressed surprise at the activities in which the Army is engaged and of which so many persons are not aware.

Judge Ramsey is one of the leading citizens of Texas, having been a member of the state supreme court and having attained distinction in politics. He was prominently identified with the Red Cross during the war.

County Advisory Boards of the Salvation Army will begin to plan for the appeal in the near future. Some of these boards may be visited by Judge Ramsey, and all of them will be called upon by representatives.

HERRINGTON, Kans., Aug. 24.—Strike conditions are in a state of foment here today following the shooting of M. L. Locke, a Rock Island railroad fireman. Locke is in a hospital with a bullet wound through his lung, and his condition is serious.

Locke declares that he was shot by a Rock Island guard as he was leaving the round house. The guard, according to Locke, stopped him and asked him where he was going. A few words followed and the guard fired at Locke, according to the statement.

NEW YORK, Aug. 24.—"It is now up to the shopmen," said a spokesman for the Big Five brotherhood chiefs this afternoon, after a conference on a separate settlement of the seniority proposition. No other comment was made. The Association of Railroad Executives yesterday rejected the proposal submitted by the brotherhood representatives asking that the railroad heads yield on the question of seniority rights.

DENISON, Aug. 24.—The Katy railroad will not yield on the seniority question, regardless of what other roads do, W. M. Whitenton, assistant chief operating officer, announced here today.

NEW YORK, Aug. 24.—Members of the Big Five brotherhood group of rail strike mediators met today at an uptown hotel, and after a short session left hurriedly for a secret conference at an undisclosed place with representatives of a small group of railroad executives, who yesterday were ready to take up as individual roads further negotiations.

A Letter to the People

Comanche, Texas, August 20, 1922.

Editor of The Star-Telegram:

I see in the Star-Telegram for Sunday, August 20th, in "Letters From the People," a letter signed by a bunch of Cordell brothers, who give no address or other sign of where they live or who they are, but go on at great length by flattery and slander, with a subtle and garbled mixture of a very little truth, with much falsehood and innuendo to attack Hon. Oscar Callaway in a cowardly way meant to appeal to ignorance and prejudice.

I have lived on an adjoining farm to Oscar Callaway all of his life, and know him thoroughly and every incident of his life and of the lives of all his family. I know thoroughly and familiarly the whole story of his devotion to his father and his brothers and sisters as well as the story of his political courage and honesty and devotion to the welfare of the people. I never knew a man who was more devoted to his family, nor a family more devoted to a brother.

This letter has been mailed all over the 17th District during the past week, and is published in all the newspapers as political advertising. It is prepared and circulated by Mr. Blanton himself as a campaign document, at an expense of thousands of dollars, and that notwithstanding his statement that he could not meet Mr. Callaway because he had already spent all the money authorized by law.

The fact is that Mr. Callaway never sought to obstruct the draft or any war measure. His speech in Comanche in August 1917 did more to promote the draft and adherence to the law than any one thing done in the county. During the war Mr. Callaway personally directed and took part in the work on his farms, which produced wheat and other food products enough to feed thousands of people. He had three brothers in the army, all of whom are now members of the American Legion and one of whom is Commander of his Post.

The statement that Mr. Callaway tried to make a speech in Gorman in 1918 and was informed that he could not make a speech of that kind there, is absolutely false. The only speech Mr. Callaway made or attempted to make in Gorman in 1918 was a speech in the governor's race. He made this speech without any molestation in the afternoon and left there to fill another speaking date. I have understood that after Mr. Callaway left Gorman one Judge Jean P. Day, now notorious in Oklahoma for killing an army officer, made a speech there.

Mr. Blanton prefers this form of campaign to coming out in the open and meeting Mr. Callaway like a man, as he has challenged him to do, through the columns of your paper, and through circulars distributed over the district. I see that 77 citizens of Comanche, Texas, sent Blanton a telegram asking him to meet Callaway there, and I understand that fifty citizens of Santo and over two hundred citizens of Carbon and Gorman on last Saturday sent him similar requests, offering to pay all expenses if he would meet Mr. Callaway and answer the charges against him. He has refused all petitions, though he is still in the district and has no other speaking dates which would interfere with his meeting Mr. Callaway.

Mr. Callaway's friends may expect and look out for any kind of cowardly attack to be made by Mr. Blanton during the last days of the campaign, in newspapers and circulars. Knowing the character of campaign Blanton has waged in the past and is waging now, we must be ready to protect ourselves and the district from his viciousness.

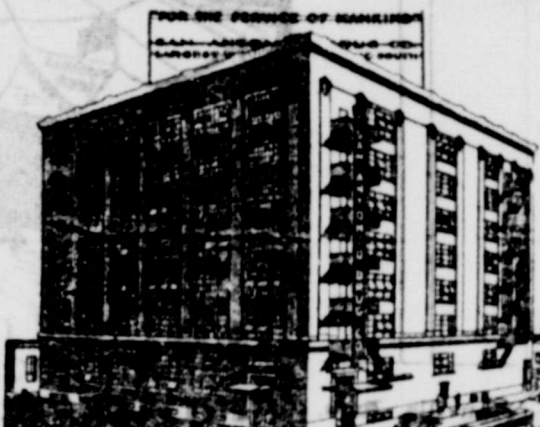
