Dunbar Panther Saves Life of Woman



A seventy year old woman with burns on her face and forearm and some four thousand dollars worth of damage suffered from a fire which damaged her home here in Lubbock last week.

The woman, Mrs. Cora Wisner, was rescued from the frame and stucco house at 802 David Avenue by a Dunbar Panther, Marvin Lethridge of 1003 David. The gridder went into the house and pulled the woman to safety forcibly when she insisted on trying to retrieve a purse and some money from a burning closet.

The purse, reportedly containing several hundred dollars, was later delivered to the

woman by firemen after they had doused the blaze in the house.

Mrs. Wisner was ta-

ken to Methodist Hospital and treated for second and third degree burns but was soon released. She was reported as not being in serious condition.

Lethridge told authorities that he saw the smoke from the burning house as he worked on a car in his front yard. He went the two blocks to the fire and was told that Mrs. Wisner was inside the house. He then went into the bedroom of the house and pulled Mrs. Wisner to safety.

Lethridge stated, "There was a lot of fire in the bedroom and she pulled away from me two times trying to get to her purse. She was using a pot to try to put out the fire."

Mrs. Wisner was able to get her great-grandchildren, with whom she had been baby sitting, to safety before returning to the burning house.

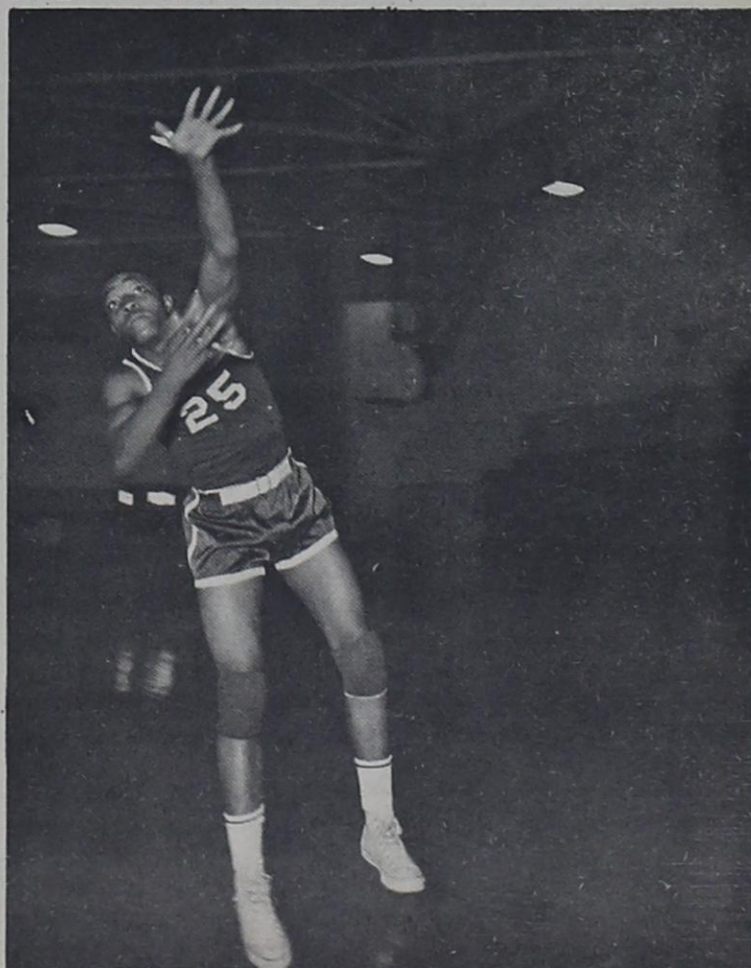

Houston---Barbara Jordan, Administration Assistant to County Judge Bill Elliott, announced her resignation effective January 1, 1966, to become a candidate for the state senate of Texas, District 11.

In making her announcement, she said; "The period of service as an assistant to county judge Bill Elliott, dealing primarily with the anti-poverty and educational programs, has been an experience I deeply appreciate. It has given me new insight into the relationships between the local, state, and national governments. I hope that I will be able to make a contribution in the Legislature toward helping to coordinate these efforts."

Gravely, a modest, unassuming officer who has refused to be photographed for press purposes, is considered in line of promotion for the captaincy. He is a graduate of Virginia Union University in Richmond.
