Defense Closes Testimony Thursday; Wife Of Slain Preacher Expected To Go On Stand Today

(By Associated Press)
TYLER, Mar. 28.—The prosecution in the murder trial of Lays Wilson, charged with slaying the Rev. Fount Wallace, Baptist minister, at Troup last April, tried today to blast the defense story of a clandestine meeting between the slain pastor and Mrs. Wilson after a reconciliation between the defendant and his wife.

Mrs. Wilson testified yesterday that she had improper relations with the Rev. Wallace at a friend's home in Tyler, January 26, 1928, about three months before the killing.

Star Witness Presented
Mrs. Laura Dobbs, the friend at whose home the meeting was alleged to have taken place, was a star witness for the state in this phase of the rebuttal.

"They did not meet at my home," Mrs. Dobbs declared.

The witness said Mrs. Wilson came to her home a few days before the habeas corpus hearing for Wilson and asked her to swear that she had left the door unlocked on the day of the killing.

"Oh, honey, you won't have to know anything," the defendant's wife was quoted as saying. "I'll go to the office of Mr. Maynor (Dallas Mayor, defense attorney) and he will tell you what to say."

Judge Issues Warning
Maynor and the witness had a heated clash which brought a warning from District Judge J. R. Warren.

"She's got no right to abuse me that way," the leading defense attorney said. A few moments later when Mrs. Dobbs testified "that's a lie,"

Farm Relief To Get First Action

Agricultural Committee Is Intent Upon Bringing Up Question In Special Session In April

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Mar. 28.—Mindful that in little more than two weeks the new congress goes into special session for consideration of farm relief legislation, house and senate agricultural committees today focused on any derivation from the subject.

Working separately, the committees urged those testifying to confine their remarks to proposals likely to be covered by the proposed farm measures. The grain committee generally was broadened as a federal farm board, commodity marketing council, stabilization agency to control surplus crops, and means of regulating production. The session lasted the heated discussion.

Coast Guard Was Right In Attack

WASHINGTON, March 28.—(AP)—The coast guard announced today that it had received information from "reliable officials" at New Orleans, not belonging to the coast service, corroborating the original position that the Canadian rum runner "I'm Alone" had been legally pursued and sunk.

The names of the officials were not disclosed. The coast guard statement said there was "no doubt that the 'I'm Alone' was 12 miles off the coast, and under American statutes the coast guard has jurisdiction over these waters. Further, it was added, there was no doubt that a hot and continuous pursuit followed from the time the vessel first was sighted until she was sunk by gunfire.

Memory Of Dog Chum's Friendship Halts Circus Elephant's Rampage

HOUSTON, March 28.—(AP)—Friendship for a dog chum yesterday stopped an elephant on a rampage on the Galveston road after the animal had torn out the side of an arena at the Christy Bros. Circus winter quarters broke through a door, crashed through eight wire fences and threatened to enter a farm house.

The elephant was being rehearsed. A leopard rebelled when ordered to mount the elephant. Trainer Stokes lashed the cat. The elephant became excited. At another crash of the whip the pachyderm wheeled, butted through the huge double doors, broke its chains and, waving his trunk wildly, crashed two fences as he crossed the Galveston, Houston and Henderson railroad, despite the efforts of Slim Walker, "bull man," who was hanging on to a bull hook in the elephant's ear.

Walker hung on grimly, shouting from time to time, "be the elephant apparently didn't hear. Down the Galveston road for nearly a mile, motorists were scampering from the highway, stopping automobiles abruptly. Then the elephant went through the railroad fences again, circled and crossed the tracks a third time, crashing two more fences with Walker still hanging to the bull hook.

At a farm house a dog barked furiously. The elephant hesitated. Then Walker showed his wit. "Here, Rover! Here, Rover!" he called, tugging at the elephant's ear. The huge animal quieted down, listened to the keeper for a few minutes and then tamely submitted to being led back to the circus headquarters.

"He thought the dog was his chum which rode in the car with the elephant for several seasons," Walker grinned.

Oklahoma Solons Include More In Impeachment Row

Legislature Continues Investigations Charging 2 More Men; Fred Capshaw Is Indicted

May Charge Others

Charles C. Childers, Chairman Of Corporation Commission Cited; Hay Is Considered In Probe

(By Associated Press)
OKLAHOMA CITY, March 28.—A whirlwind finish of impeachments today was entered by the Oklahoma legislature, nearing the end of a session prolific in accusations against state officials, which resulted in the removal of Governor Henry S. Johnston.

Although both houses agreed to adjourn Saturday, the house continued its investigation for impeachment charges. The house investigating committee voted an impeachment charge against Fred Capshaw, member of the corporation commission, and considered an identical charge against Charles C. Childers, chairman of the commission. It also was expected to consider a charge against Harry B. Cordell, president of the state board of agriculture.

Diverted State Funds
The charge against Capshaw was that he diverted state funds by the employment of three workers in the corporation commission for purposes other than provided in the appropriation from which they were paid. John Head, chairman of the investigating committee said Childers' name was on the same payroll.

Both Capshaw and Childers are members of the legislature. The investigating committee was being prepared against Cordell.

The senate court of impeachment today received 31 articles voted against Chief Justice C. W. Mason, Justice J. W. Clark and Justice Fletcher Wiley of the state supreme court by the house. It was planned to hold the trials of the justices after a recess of perhaps two weeks.

Investigation of the office of Miller D. Hay, state mine inspector, was started today by a legislative committee.

Effort To Be Made For Leahy's Life

HUNTSVILLE, March 28.—(AP)—It was believed here today that a strenuous effort would be made to save Harry J. Leahy, convicted slayer of Dr. J. A. Ramsey, aged Methodist physician, from the electric chair. Leahy is scheduled to be executed April 12.

John Mathis Sr., Houston attorney, was in conference with Leahy more than two hours last night.

LAW IS MODIFIED

Michigan's Life Term For Pro Law Violation Cut

LANSING, Mich., March 28.—(AP)—Michigan's legislature today closed the books on the state's criminal code law, with its accompanying threat of life imprisonment to the prohibition law violator.

The senate passed the Watson house bill, embodying amendments, to the criminal code which eliminates life offenses, with approximately 130 other "minor" felonies, from the class of crimes punishable on fourth offense with life imprisonment. The measure now goes to Gov. Fred W. Green, who announced he would sign it early next week.

Bribery Charged In Impeachment Counts On Long

Louisiana Governor Declares Standard Oil Paying For Action Against His Proposed Oil Tax Ruling

Names Requested

Senate Demands List Of Men Involved; Hearings On Impeachment To Begin Next Week

(By Associated Press)
BATON ROUGE, La., March 28.—Gov. Huey P. Long struck back today at those who are seeking his impeachment, and added bribery to the charges which have come up through activities of the Louisiana legislature.

While the house was arranging details for the start of hearings on the impeachment Monday night, the 36-year-old governor made the charge that legislators had been bribed by the Standard Oil company to oppose his proposed oil tax.

Staggers Capital
These fresh charges staggered this ancient capital, already a scene over the charges against the governor, accused of plotting murder and of eighteen official irregularities.

By unanimous vote the senate adopted a resolution demanding that the governor name the legislators whom he said accepted bribes and name the oil company financial agents charged with paying the bribes. A circular issued by the state highway department, entitled "Crown of Gold: Standard Oil Company vs. Huey P. Long," has been presented to the senate. Late today the governor had not furnished the names.

The house session of the day was swift. It brushed aside a Long supporter who attempted to invoke a rule holding the impeachment proceedings out of order, appointed a committee of 12 to draft rules of procedure, agreed to have 12 official questioners of witnesses, set Monday night at 8 o'clock as the time to start the impeachment hearing with 10,000 people in the hall, and adjourned until next week.

Ice Gorge Breaks In North Dakota

BISMARCK, N. D., Mar. 28.—(AP)—After having defied all efforts of army engineers for nearly a week, one of the mightiest ice gorges on record in this section of the Missouri river weakened tonight. Water was pouring through the middle of the ice pack and around its sides, gradually taking out huge floes and relieving flood conditions in the lands between here and Huff.

Twelve Blocks Of Denver Industrial Tracks Approved

City Commissioners Okeh Plans To Build Tracks From Station To Business District; Order Lights

Indications of Lubbock's industrial expansion is given in the action of the city commission, at its session yesterday afternoon, when permission was granted to the Fort Worth and Denver City railroad for the building of approximately 12 blocks of industrial tracks.

Revolutionary Troops Move South From Juarez As Gap Between Opposing Armies Is Narrowed

Federal cavalry occupied Escalon after a fight with rebel rearward forces in which four rebels were killed and two fedegals wounded.

Meanwhile, at Jimenez, north of Escalon, a clash between rear guard rebels and the vanguard of the pursuing fedegals was reported to have resulted in several casualties on both sides.

REBELS MAKE AIR RAID
JUAREZ, March 28.—(AP)—Mexican rebels staged their first bombing raid today, attacking Bermejillo, Chihuahua, where Ex-president Calles is thought to have established headquarters for an advancing federal army.

Having concealed their strength for some time, rebel leaders dispatched two rebel bombers, escorted by several pursuit planes.

Escobar Ready to Fight
Rebel officials at Juarez declared General Escobar, their chief, was "ready to fight near Jimenez."

They prophesied that the major battle of the revolution would be fought within the next 24 hours.

Federal air scouts reported to General Calles that rebel troops were retreating from Jimenez northwest to Santa Rosalia on the route to Chihuahua City.

The maintenance of these book collections is the real community plan, under the plan, is designed to afford rural people the same library opportunities as those enjoyed in cities.

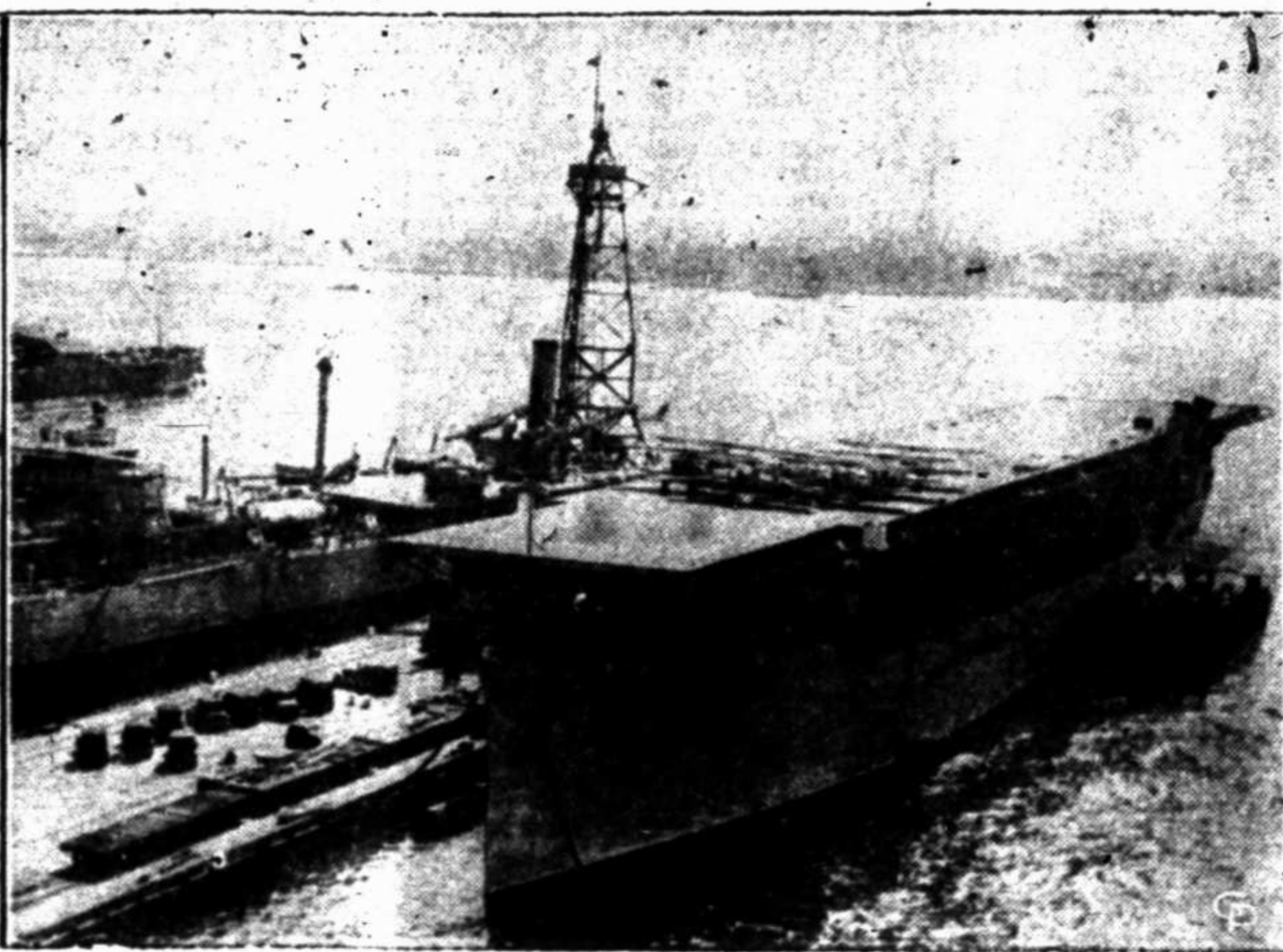
ROYALTY MEET SET

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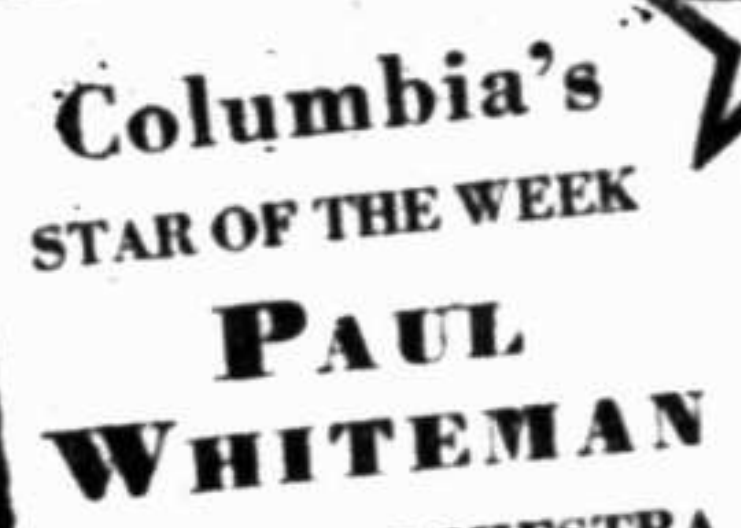

Hatching 250,000 Chicks Climaxes Career of Former Michigan Teacher

MR. CLEMENTINE, Mich. Mar. 28.—Twenty-two years ago a modest school teacher of Romeo, Mich., the son of a chick raiser brought out his first hatch of chicks, with 52 of them just scratching. A year later he sold a cock and with the money entered the first poultry show, where offered at State college, then Michigan Agricultural college, at East Lansing.

Today W. A. Downs has his 1929 hatch under way, which will include more than 250,000 chicks. He intends raising a part of them to three or four weeks old in a new scientific brooder which he has installed—the only one of its type in Michigan.

Downs has spent his life and his research in the raising of chicks, and says "it just comes natural." My father was a poultry man starting 40 years ago and I have learned on his work.

In 1888 G. W. Downs, W. A.'s father, had the first incubator in Michigan. The way was a prominent chick raiser, and he was prominent in the papers and no doubt is a sharp in the flesh at home and abroad.

The plan sounds most sensible. There are few cases so critical that a nurse's constant attendance is required and after the patient is bathed and fed and medicated the distraught \$30-a-week papa finds himself paying nurse \$15 a day while she sits or reads.

WERE "VULGAR"

The average American high school graduate is "more vulgar and infinitely less cultured" than any European peasant, according to Everett Dean Martin, "America who has staked her all on education" is utterly confused as to its meaning, he explains.

But the fact remains that America reaches down into her pockets and gives every kid a chance at education, whatever that education means, unlike any other country in the world, and we are moved to note that the peasant freed from our "vulgarity" must awfully glad to give their kids a chance at what is offered them here.

The attempt on the part of Dallas school officials to organize a "Double A" interscholastic league in Texas is not likely to receive such a rousing ovation on the part of the majority of high schools in the state. The fact that Dallas Fort Worth, Houston and San Antonio rarely furnish finalists in the state football race, makes us wonder if the size of the school enrollment in the state should have anything to do with the classification of the teams.

The Oak Cliff Leopards and Main Avenue of San Antonio have sent teams into the state semifinals but outside of these two, four major cities of Texas have fallen below the average in the matter of turning out strong football teams. Past records lead one to believe that the smaller schools of the state would be against the odds since it will remove from their schedules some of the cinch victories.

ANGELO MAY WANT IN
Prexy Anderson in the Abilene Morning News advances the belief that the San Angelo Bob Cats will likely want in the Double A class with the large city high schools in order that they win a game occasionally. This presumption on the part of the conductor of the Morning News seems quite natural to one who is acquainted with the friendly sort of rivalry between the two cities.

It is equally as probable that the Abilene Eagles would be willing for the "game little Bobcats" to be included in another loop, since the Angelo aggregation has the righting team in the Oil Belt.

ONE FAVORABLE ANGLE
From one standpoint advanced by those who are supporting the change, the idea may prove profitable. To have each of the four cities hold a city championship series each fall and then pair up with the others in the semi-finals would bring out keen rivalry between the cities. A football game for the championship of Ft. Worth and Dallas, for instance, should get an enormous gate. The same might prove the case between Houston and San Antonio. With all the high schools in these four cities eliminated, to regular Class A interscholastic league could be played off in a much shorter time.

Light Heavyweight Titleholder Successfully Defends Crown By Beating Off Middleweight Champ

Loughran Takes 5 Rounds While Mickey Has The Better Of Only One; Referee Favors Walker

CHICAGO STADIUM, Chicago, Mar. 23 (AP)—Tommy Loughran successfully defended his world's light heavyweight championship tonight by beating off Mickey Walker, the middleweight titleholder seeking his third world's championship. Loughran, the master boxer, outpointed the Jersey Bull Dog, getting the decision in a battle that went the ten round limit. Loughran had the better of five rounds, with Walker winning one, the sixth. In this session he cracked the tall Philadelphiaian with a pair of heavy rights to the chin, forcing him to break ground and retreat. The battle opened Paddy Harmon's new \$7,000,000 stadium but failed to attract a capacity crowd. The attendance was under 20,000.

The decision was not unanimous. Referee Dave Miller voted for Walker, with the two judges declaring for Loughran.

FIGHT BY ROUNDS
Round One
They shook hands and came out fighting. Walker speared two lefts to the head. Loughran hooked two lefts to the body. Walker right to the jaw and Loughran landed a right to the head. Loughran backed away from a left and caught a right to the body. Loughran landed three left jabs to the face. Mickey hooked a left to the body. Loughran jabbed two lefts to the face and blocked a left to the body. Loughran smashed two lefts to the face and a right to the body. Mickey missed a left hook to the head. Loughran speared three lefts to the face and threw a right to the body. Mickey charged in and they traded punches to the body.

Round Two
Walker sent a left to the body. Loughran a left to the head. Loughran jabbed twice to the jaw. Loughran landed a right to the head and Mickey put a right to the body. Loughran put three lefts to the face. Loughran forced Walker into a corner but no damage was done. Out in the open, Loughran landed two lefts to the face and a right to the body. Mickey scored with a left to the body, they clinched. Walker crossed a right to the chin with Tommy throwing both fists to the body in close quarters. Walker reached Tommy with a left hook and caught four punches to the body in return. Walker blocked lefts to the head as the round ended.

Round Three
They clinched. Mickey hooked two lefts to the head. Walker hooked a left to the body and then ducked away from the body. Tom speared away with long lefts and driving rights to the body as Walker came charging in. Walker scored with a left to the jaw and then missed another right to the same spot. Walker missed a right uppercut. Loughran landed three lefts to the face without a return. Loughran landed two right uppercuts and blocked Walker's right. They missed rights, but both inflicted body punishment as they came together. Loughran stabbed two lefts to the face and Mickey hooked his left to the chin.

Round Four
Walker missed a left hook to the head. Loughran blocked a left lead and jabbed twice to the head. They clinched with Walker scoring two uppercuts. Mickey banded a right to the body. Loughran cracked Mickey's ribs with a right and stepped away from a left hook Mickey was short with a left to the body but connected with a right to the body. Mickey hooked a left to the head and repeated, but missed a right driving Tommy into the ropes. They exchanged body blows at close range. Loughran stabbed four lefts to the face and stepped inside of Mickey's right to the head. Loughran threw two lefts to the face. Loughran drove two rights to the head and Mickey hooked a left to the mouth.

Round Five
They went Walker out with instruction to throw everything. He hooked a left to the head and then scored with a right to the body. He missed a left to the body with Loughran reaching out with long left jabs. Mickey missed a left to the head and Tommy stepped inside of his right. Loughran blocked a right to the face and sent a right to the right to the jaw, backing into the ropes with Walker after him. They exchanged body punches and ducked out into mid-ring. Mickey staggered Loughran with a heavy right to the jaw, forcing him to grab and hold on. Mickey put a right to the head and a left to the body. Walker connected with a right to the head backing Tommy into the ropes. He cracked Loughran with a left hook to the chin and was trying for a right to the body as the bell rang.

Round Six
Loughran stabbed a left to the face and clinched. Loughran missed a right to the jaw. Mickey missed a left to the body. Mickey claimed a right to the body as they clinched. Mickey hooked a left to the stomach. Mickey missed a left to the chin. Walker planted a left to the body as they clinched. Mickey missed another left to the head with Tommy counting with two rights to the face. Loughran landed a right uppercut and backed away from a left to the head. Mickey drove a
