W. E. Paul and Raymond for A. W. Gregg No. 1 Boyd cleaned out and set pipe. Bottomed well at 2951. This is the well that had the scrap iron in the hole and started giving out oil just as they were fixing to plug. They are now WOC.

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Aug. 23 (UP) — Dragers aided by a diver today sought the body of Oregon Legislator John Snellstrom who was killed with three other state Republican leaders in a plane crash yesterday.

Authorities already had recovered Earle Johnson, Carvallis, Ore., and the bodies of State Legislator Gove, nominee for the House, H. H. Evans, Lincoln county, and William H. Fluhrer, candidate for the State Senate for Medford, Ore. The men died when their Becherat Bonanza, piloted by Fluhrer, faltered on a take-off.

Ruth Leaves Estate To Family

NEW YORK, Aug. 23 (UP) — Babe Ruth left the bulk of his estate to his widow and two adopted daughters, his attorney revealed today.

The attorney, Melvin Lowenstein, refused to estimate the value of the estate when he revealed the terms of the will.

New Plastic Eye Surpasses Glass

MINNEAPOLIS (UP) — A new clinic that will turn out plastic artificial eyes in almost all ways superior to glass eyes has opened here.

Manufactured by a dental technician at the Minneapolis veterans hospital, the eyes are custom-built. Holden Siegart, craftsman, says the plastic will become etched by eye fluids, as the glass ones are, and the new type is almost unbreakable.

Siegart says further that the plastic eye can be moved freely, in co-ordination with the good eye, and that it beats the old glass variety in appearance and in comfort.

In the cold climate of states such as Minnesota, Siegart adds, the old glass variety sometimes popped without warning, like an exploding light bulb, at a sudden change of temperature. None of that with the plastic type, he says.

For fine details, he added, the plastic orb has tiny threads of red nylon running through it.

Welfare Service Feels Pinch Of Inflation

CHICAGO (UP) — Welfare costs will have risen from 213 to 289 per cent in three important branches of service over the past six years and into 1949, Community Fund of Chicago, Inc., reports.

In a booklet being distributed to prospective contributors, the fund said that every one of its 192 agencies has experienced a sharp increase in the cost of operations. It will campaign for \$8,679,000 this fall, 15.5 per cent more than last year.

Costs made their sharpest rise in clinical care over the 1941-1947 period. Individuals who could not afford doctors and hospitals could be examined and treated at a cost of \$1.17 per visit in 1941. By the first three months of this year, it had jumped to \$3.02 per visit.

Care for dependent children in institutions probably will cost 213 per cent more next year than it did in 1941, while care for the aged is likely to cost 245 per cent more.

Lomakin Passage Booked Before Ordered Out

NEW YORK, Aug. 23 (UP) — Soviet Consul General Jacob Lomakin booked passage for Sweden "quite some time before" his recall was demanded by the U. S. government, a spokesman for the Swedish-American line disclosed today.

Lomakin engaged a suite on the SS Stockholm, scheduled to sail at noon Saturday for an eight-day voyage to Gothenburg, Sweden, with no stops enroute, the spokesman said.

The reservation was for Lomakin, his wife and their two children. The spokesman denied reports it was a \$1,400 suite, adding that there were "none that expensive aboard the Stockholm." He would not confirm reports the passage was booked six weeks ago, but said "it was before Lomakin became involved in the incident of the Russian school teachers."

Secret Police Among Arrested In Yugoslavia

BELGRADE, Aug. 23 (UP) — Reliable reports said today that 50 members of the Yugoslav secret police were among the hundreds of persons arrested in a widespread purge of all anti-Tito Communists in the country.

The purge began in Montenegro after four members of the Montenegro government were dismissed Aug. 4 and since then has spread to all parts of the country, the reports said.

It was understood that all 5,000 members of the Ozna, Marshal Tito's secret police, are involved in running down and arresting Communist suspects of being sympathetic to the Communist information bureau in its battle with Tito.

Miss Bentley To Appear Before Committee Again

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23, (UP) — House investigators revealed today that Elizabeth T. Bentley, confessed ex-Communist spy, will be recalled to the witness stand to outline wartime efforts of Soviet agents to "blueprint" American industry.

They said her story will be told next month after the House Un-American Activities Committee ends its investigation of alleged Red infiltration in the government and turns its attention to industrial espionage.

Two Wells In This Area Being Closely Watched

Two wells which will be watched with great interest in this district have been announced.

One is a wildcat in Comanche county, the other is a test in the western part of Eastland County.

W. C. Estes of Brownwood and associates are drilling a wildcat, 12 miles northwest of Comanche, the No. 1 Ewell Ward, projected depth 3,500 feet, by rotary. The location is 380 feet from the west and 990 from the north line of the James Madison Survey.

The 4 M Company has made location for the No. 1 S. H. Hill, a deep test, three and a half miles west of Cisco, 2,000 feet from the south and 330 from west line, Sec. 61, Block 4, xH & T. C. Survey. Drilling is scheduled to start Sept. 1.

Texas Traffic Deaths Rise

CLEVELAND, O., Aug. 23 — Reversing the record for the country as a whole, Texas had more traffic deaths in 1947 than in 1946, according to final figures just released.

Nationally, 1947 deaths were down 3 per cent—from 33,411 to 32,300.

Texas' increase was approximately 2 per cent—from 1,959 to 1,997.

Reduction in night deaths where street lighting has been modernized, average 76 per cent. The Street and Traffic Safety Lighting Bureau reports.

TO ASK RECOGNITION

STOCKHOLM, Aug. (UP) — Reliable sources said today that Count Folke Bernadotte, United Nations mediator for Palestine, will propose to the United Nations General Assembly in Paris next month that the existence of the Jewish state of Israel be recognized officially.

AIR FORCE GIVEN MORE AUTHORITY

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23, (UP)

The Air Force was given greater control over strategic air warfare at a week end conference of the joint chiefs of staff, Defense Secretary James Forrestal announced today.

The joint chiefs of staff gave the air force the authority to decide what weapons it needs to carry out strategic air warfare.

This decision apparently gave the air force the right to decide whether the navy's new 65,000-ton carrier shall be built in quantity and used for strategic bombing.

The joint chiefs of staff met in that the air force must take into account "the contributions which may be made by forces from other services."

The joint chiefs of staff met in secrecy at the War College at Newport, R. I., over the week end.

The 65,000-ton carrier is considered by many experts to be a major contribution to strategic air warfare. Until bombers capable of flying from here to another continent and returning can be produced, navy experts believe the 65,000-ton carrier may prove the best method of carrying atom bomb attacks to the heart of an enemy's homeland.

Longview Men Building Drive-In Theatre Here

Show men from Longview and Temple are building an Amphitheatre on the Eastland-Cisco highway about three miles from Cisco. The work has been in progress several months, however was delayed.

The building is on the land owned by J. G. Harlow of Dallas who is a son of L. C. Harlow South Walnut Street, and have ten acres leased for ten years.

Voluntary Enlistment In Army To Go On

In answer to many queries recently as to whether the U. S. Army and U. S. Air Force will continue their extensive Volunteer Enlistment Program, the following statement was made by S-Sgt. James Hendrick of the Eastland Recruiting Station.

"The Volunteer Enlistment Program will continue, even though Selective Service soon will be in effect. The Army and A.F. will rely heavily on 3-year volunteers to build and maintain their strengths at the new levels authorized by the Congress."

Selective Service provides a means for the Armed Forces to fill the gap between their volunteer recruiting intake and their manpower requirements. The Air Force intends to continue to rely wholly on volunteers, whereas the Army's manpower needs are more pressing.

The Army has a great deal to offer career volunteers—far more than before the war. It is a NEW ARMY in a great many ways. Exceptional benefits and opportunities have been created to attract alert, intelligent, and ambitious young men. The Army's personnel policy now is based on the premise that the individual is its greatest single asset.

A volunteer between the ages of 18-34 (17 with parents consent) may enlist for 2, 3, 4, 5 or 6 years. If he is between 19-25 years of age he may enlist for 21 months.

UNIDENTIFIED GERMAN TAKEN BY 10 SOVIET SOLDIERS

BERLIN, Aug. 23, (UP) — Russian authorities today released three Americans they had arrested in the cold war, but almost simultaneously 10 Soviet soldiers kidnapped a German photographer in a sudden raid into the American sector of the capital.

The Americans released were

1. Thomas Headen, 43, U. S. military government official, a former Kansas City and New York newspaperman, who was arrested yesterday when he stepped into the Potsdam Platz, the area in which a number of Russian abductions of German policemen occurred last week.

2. Lt. Sherman Turner, Jr., of Council Bluffs, Ia., who was seized by the Russians Aug. 5 when he wandered over the zonal border in northern Bavaria during a farm inspection tour.

3. Roland M. Myers, Brooklyn, N. Y., who was seized with Turner. Myers is a civilian worker for the military government.

The Russians also released two of seven German policemen they had been holding after kidnapping them last week from the American and British sectors of Berlin. One was August Hoppe, German district police chief of Kreuzberg, in the American sector.

Soviet authorities thus still held five German policemen from the western sectors, as well as the unidentified German photographer who was seized today when Russian soldiers knocked down two German policemen in the American sector and hustled the cameraman over the sector boundary.

Western Powers Confer Before Kremlin Meeting

MOSCOW, Aug. 23, (UP) — U. S. Ambassador Walter Bedell Smith conferred with his Anglo-French colleagues at 11.30 A. M. today probably for their last preparatory session before meeting Soviet leaders at the Kremlin later this afternoon or tonight.

The impression strengthened among Anglo-American observers that the Kremlin appointment was fixed yesterday for today following a full week's deliberation by the three western powers.

Smith hand his Anglo-French colleagues appeared cheerful over the week end and optimism waxed as the decisive meeting in the Kremlin approached.

CHICAGO, (UP)—There's nothing to worry about, men. Perfume can't trap a man against his will.

Maurice Talmadge, who has been concocting devastating whiffs for 25 years, made the admission.

"We've been trying for years and years to develop a perfume that will make men fall in love at first sniff," he said, "but all our best efforts have been in vain."

Talmadge suggested delicately that one of the major stumbling blocks has been the fact that modern males just don't have a good sense of smell.

Even the most tantalizing aroma is powerless, he said, unless a man is more than casually interested in a girl, in the first place. At best perfumes just rate an assist in romance, he said.

Women have been dabbling themselves with perfume ever since Cleopatra wore 16 scented oils in her hair. They spend millions for perfumes in the United States every year, Talmadge said.

"Women buy perfumes to make themselves attractive to men," Talmadge said. But the funny thing is they're so interested in pretty

bottles and exotic names they're rarely aware of how attractive or unattractive a perfume actually may be."

Putting it bluntly, Talmadge declared women knew little about perfumes, and men a great deal less. There isn't one woman in a thousand who can tell the difference between her favorite perfume and another similar brand, he said.

There are more than 5,000 American and 1,000 French brands to choose from, Talmadge said. The prices range from 50 cents to \$400 an ounce. The bottles come in all sizes shapes and colors and, Talmadge admitted, the names are "simply fantastic."

"But none of those things really counts," he said. "Women should choose perfumes by how they smell and nothing else. And then they should apply them very sparingly."

A woman who uses good perfume carefully, Talmadge said, can give herself a big romantic lift. But if she expects the perfume to do it all, she's in for a setback.

Easy-Going Culture Of Mexico Praised

MANHATTEN, Kan. (UP)—A cultural agent for the Mexican government does not agree with U.S. "movies and artists" who persist in casting his countrymen as villains or fellows who lie in the shade with a jug of liquor nearby.

Robert de la Rosa, in a commencement address at Kansas State College, admitted Mexicans do not always go at "breakneck speed," but he pointed out that they also do not have ulcers, high blood pressure or cerebral hemorrhage.

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—Commercial uses are being sought for the wasted two-thirds of California's present lumber crop. Myron E. Kreuger, professor of forestry at the University of California, is heading the campaign.
