BENEDICT IS NAMED HEAD OF UNIVERSITY

AUSTIN, July 19.—Dr. H. Y. Benedict, senior dean of the college of arts and sciences, was elected president of the University of Texas by the board of regents today, to succeed Dr. W. M. Splawn, resigned. The election of Dean Benedict was unanimous.
Dr. Benedict has been with the university since 1922.

SAYS MEXICO HAS UPRISING

NEW ORLEANS, July 19.—The New Orleans States says today that local leaders of the Mexican revolutionary junta have received information from the state of Vera Cruz that the uprising there was primarily by federal troops on garrison duty who had been ordered to different sections of the republic to get them away from revolutionary connections with which they are sympathetic.

LeRoy Nicholson was brought to Ballinger Tuesday from Houston, where he suffered a stroke of apoplexy last Saturday. Mr. Nicholson is able to walk but is not yet himself.

DOCTOR VICTIM OF THIEF AGAIN

Dr. C. A. Watson, 709 Tenth Street, was the victim Monday night of another theft, his second in one month, when a burglar, believed to be a drug addict, entered the garage of his home and stole the medicine case out of his car.

About a month ago a burglar entered Dr. Watson's garage and stole his instrument case. No trace of the case or the burglar has been discovered.

Dr. Watson said a "dope fiend" was in his office Monday afternoon and asked for a "shot" of morphine, but that he refused to give it to him, stating that he would however, give him something to relieve him. The man would not take it, declaring that he wanted morphine or nothing at all and asserted he could live all right until morning without the "snow." The same man was also seen in a local drug store Monday afternoon and was after the drug.

The matter has been reported to the officers and they are following a clue.

The value of the case was not great, Dr. Watson said, and was not as valuable as the instrument case stolen from him.

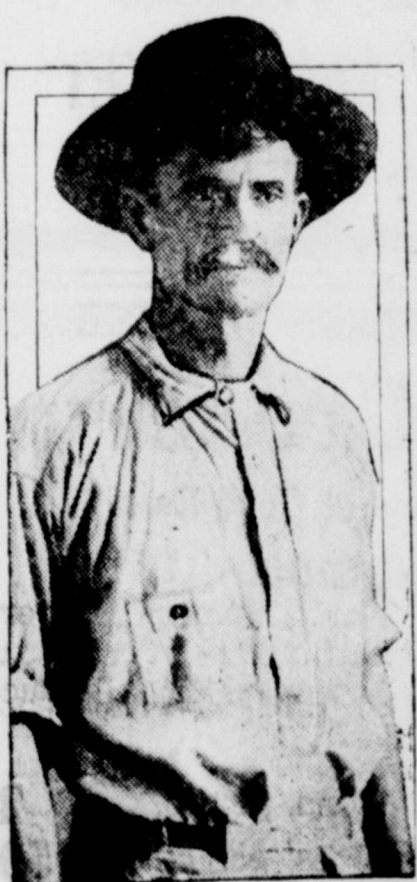

Believe Sacco-Vanzetti Case Cause U. S. Embassy Blast

NICE, France, July 19.—A bomb exploded today in front of the building in which the American consulate is located. No one was hurt and only slight damage was incurred.

Consular officials today expressed the belief that the bombing was the work of someone who wished to make a demonstration in behalf of Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti, without actually causing bloodshed.

BOSTON, July 19.—The end of seven years of waiting in the shadow of the electric chair is in sight for Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti.

The result of the latest, and possibly the last fight to save the lives of the internationally known pair, who claim they were convicted of murder because they were radicals, is expected soon. The long struggle is expected soon.

The long struggle in the Massachusetts courts ended last April when Judge Webster Thayer sentenced the men to die during the week of July 10. They had been convicted of murdering a paymaster and his guard during a robbery in 1920.

Then the eyes of the world turned to Governor Alvan T. Fuller of Massachusetts when Vanzetti, in a long written plea, asked him, not for a "pardon," but for "justice." Accompanying the plea were five affidavits by persons who affirmed that Judge Thayer, during the trial, had spoken outside the court room, in language that showed he was prejudiced against the defendants.

The governor assumed the task of reviewing the evidence, and also questioned the jurors who brought in the verdict of guilty. He worked with an advisory board consisting of President A. Lawrence Lowell of Harvard University, President Samuel W. Stratton of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and Judge Robert Grant.

When it became evident that the work of reviewing the evidence would not be accomplished before the week in which Sacco and Vanzetti were sentenced to die, Gov. Fuller granted a respite until the week of August 10. In the meantime, the committee visited and made measurements at the scene where Frederick A. Parmenter, the paymaster, and his guard, Alessandro Berardelli, were shot to death. They also examined witnesses



who testified at the trial and questioned members of the jury, 11 of whom are still alive.

William G. Thompson, defense counsel, was invited to present any new witnesses and any new evidence he had. This move was interpreted in some quarters as indicating a desire on the part of the committee to investigate a line of defense that was excluded by the various courts under rules of evidence binding them.

No other criminal case in the history of Massachusetts ever attracted such world-wide attention as that of Sacco and Vanzetti. For seven years the men, themselves, steadfastly protested their innocence, basing their battle for liberty on the contention that they did not have a fair trial. They declared that they were tried while "Red" hysteria was at its height, and were condemned because of their admitted radicalism, and because they had been draft evaders during the war.

In dramatic court room statements, just before Judge Thayer sentenced them, Sacco and Vanzetti accused him of prejudice and of influencing the jury against them. The judge had thrice denied motions for a new trial, and the Massachusetts supreme court had overruled ex-

Discussions are continuing in a most cheerful and friendly atmosphere, Gibson added. "We are beginning to see some light ahead," he said.

GENEVA, July 19.—A sensation was caused here today by an official announcement that Earl Cecil, a member of the British delegation to the three-power naval conference, will return to London tonight.
W. C. Bridgeman, head of the British delegation, will go to London tomorrow for the purpose of consulting with the British cabinet and elucidating the British position at the conference.

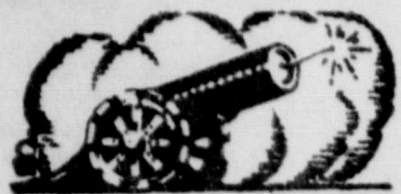

HOOPER NAMED MUSTANG COACH

Winston Hooper, 22, son of Rev. and Mrs. R. B. Hooper of this city, for three years a track star at Southern Methodist University at Dallas, has been elected as track coach of the university for next year, it has been learned here. Hooper succeeds Lee Brooks, who intends to enter Harvard in the fall.

Recently Hooper was notified that he was placed in the mile and half-mile events of the 1927 all-American track squad, which is the second time he has been placed on the honor team of North America. In 1925 he was placed in the mile event of the team.

The new Mustang cinder coach won the mile and half mile events in the conference meet last spring, setting a new record for the conference mile, it being 4:21.8, and at the national meet held in Chicago he finished fifth in the mile race—however, he lowered his own record to 4:18.8.

Hooper is now planning a won-

derful track season for the Methodist school next spring.

Some few weeks ago young Hooper came to Ballinger to visit his parents here, but returned to Dallas to look after his duties at the university. Rev. Hooper is pastor of the First Methodist Church of this city, and while he has been here only a short time the Hooper family has made many friends in this city.

DECREASED BUILDING IN THE ELEVENTH DISTRICT

DALLAS, July 19.—Building activities in May in principal cities of the eleventh federal reserve district decreased 20.7 per cent under the same month of 1926. R. C. Andrews, of Dallas, district manager of the American Railway Association, reports.

Increases, however, were shown in San Antonio, Corpus Christi, Port Arthur, Austin, Beaumont, Galveston, and Shreveport, La., he said.

The total in the tenth reserve district was about the same as in May 1926, but a 13.3 per cent reduction was seen in the eighth district.

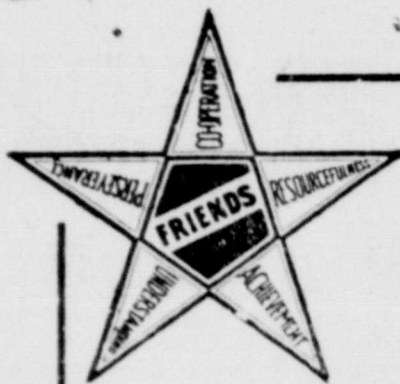

U. S. AVIATORS' FLIGHTS HELPED BOOST TRADE

(By Associated Press)

HOUSTON, July 18.—That the recent epochal flights of Lindbergh and Chamberlin were of direct trade promotional value says Ernest Tutt of the Houston branch of the Department of Commerce, is indicated by the fact that in the space of three days the automotive division of his department has received two cabled inquiries from Germany and Argentina relative to the purchase of the duplicates of the planes used in the respective flights.

The inquiry from Argentina stated that money had been raised to finance a flight across the South Atlantic via Brazil and Dahar, Senegal, Africa. For this trip it is proposed to use an American plane and quotations were asked c. o. d. Buenos Aires,

on the same type as were used by the two American trans-oceanic flyers. These quotations were furnished within twenty-four hours after receipt of the inquiry.

In connection with Argentine aviation, Tutt says that the president of the republic has requested congressional authorization to spend \$1,605,000 for a national aviation school at Buenos Aires, an airport and various operations of the new civil aviation bureau.

BEAUMONT — (AP) — The Mississippi River can be crossed at Vicksburg, Miss., according to information received here. Vacationists have been informed by the chamber of commerce here that the Mississippi can be crossed at only one other point at present, that being at Helena, Ark. Reports stated that the road to New Orleans and Baton Rouge

is closed and the Old Spanish Trail is passable only to Franklin, Louisiana.

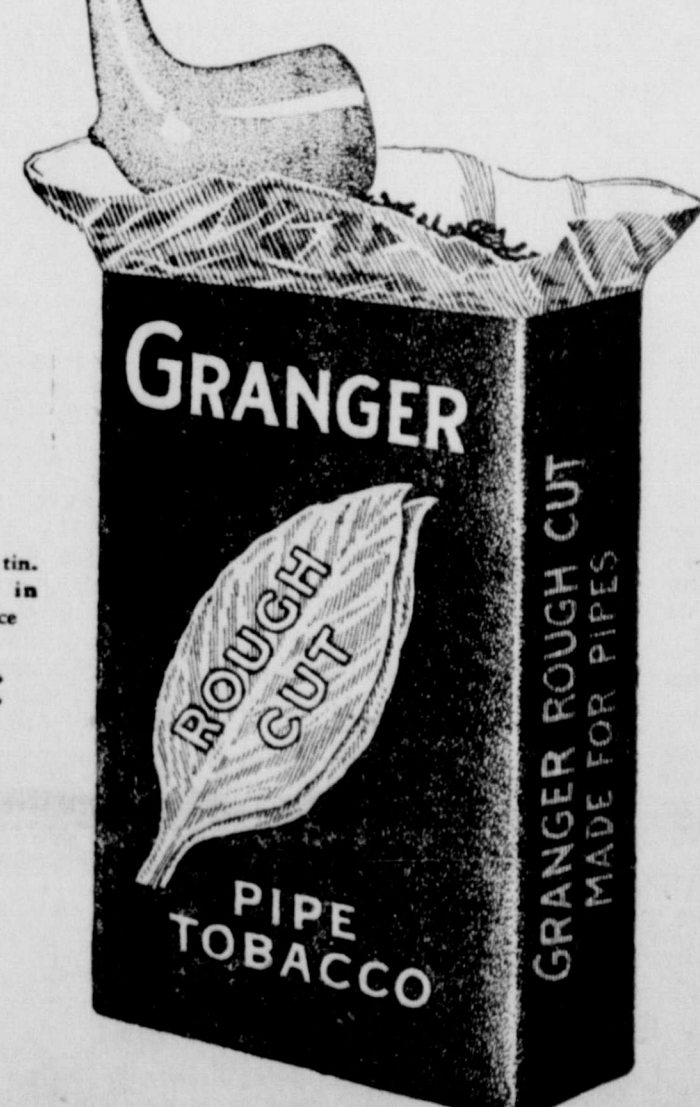

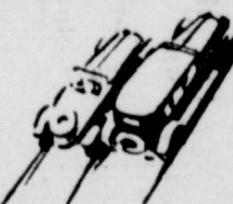

Believe Sacco-Vanzetti Case Cause U. S. Embassy Blast

receptions.

During the trial, sympathizers throughout the world raised more than \$250,000 for the defense. Frequently, when decisions were returned against the defendants, demonstrations occurred in foreign countries. United States embassies in Europe and South America were bombed and strikes were called. The vacant home of one of the principal witnesses for the prosecution was wrecked by a bomb. Judge Thayer and other judges of the Massachusetts superior and supreme courts were placed under guard.

Thousands of communications from all over the world reached the governor, some asking intervention and some opposing it. Cables from officials of foreign governments urged him to exercise executive clemency. Among the communications were several letters threatening the governor with death if Sacco and Vanzetti were executed.

The life of a third man, doomed to death, has been prolonged by the lengthy court proceedings and the appeal to the governor during the past 18 months. He is Celestino Madeiros, convicted of murdering a bank cashier at Wrentham, Mass., during an attempted hold-up.

Madeiros, while in jail, made a statement tending to exonerate Sacco and Vanzetti of the crime, and accusing the "Morelli gang of Providence, R. I." of the murder.

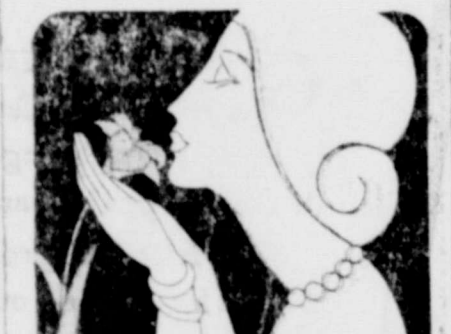
