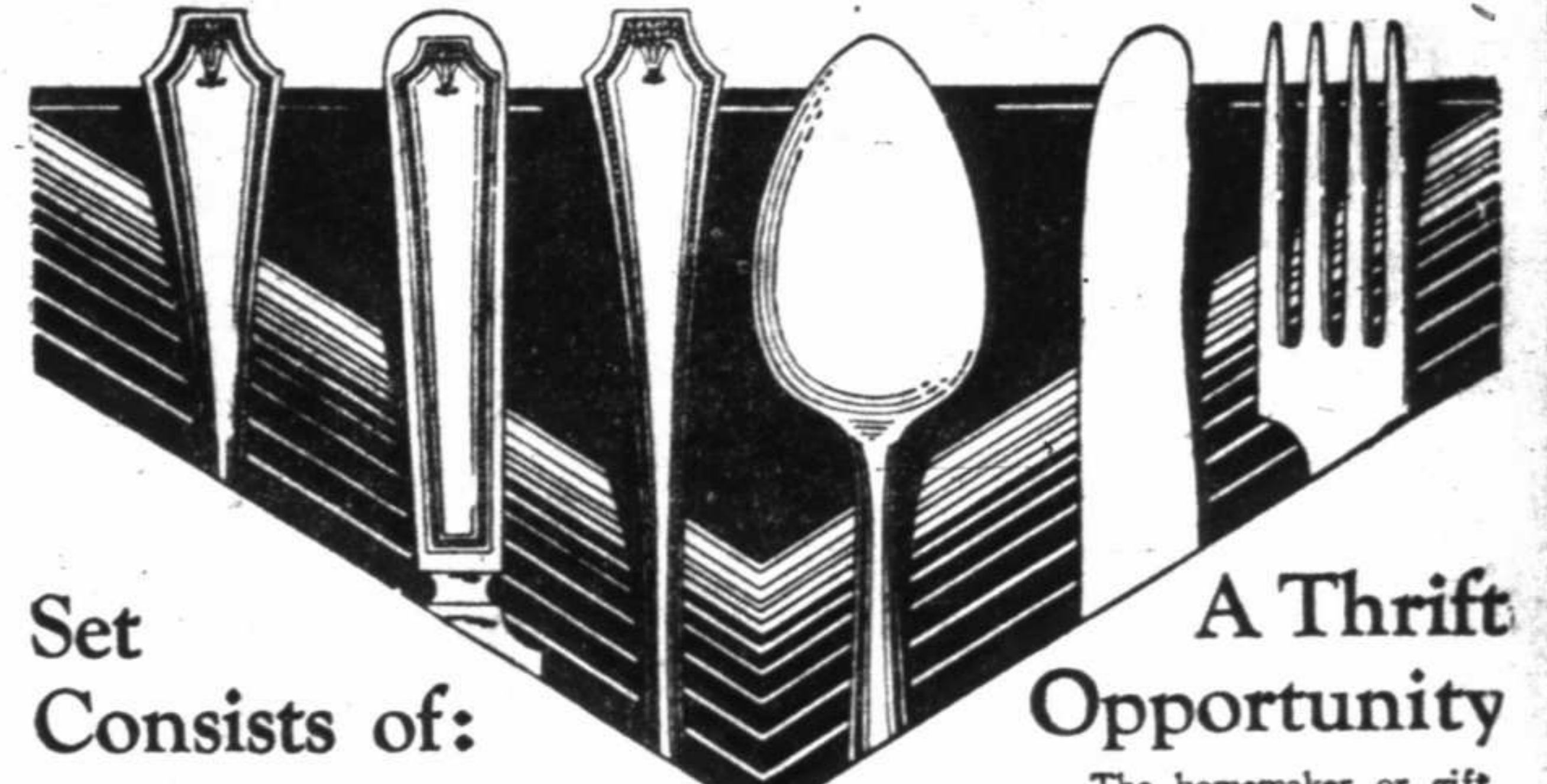

For the second time during the strike of more than two weeks duration the executive committee of the unions met and called an open mass meeting for Thursday night to consider the calling of a general sympathetic strike.

He indulged there in a vocal outburst on Anglo-American relations which brought him the characterization "oratorical volcano" in some papers and caused others to revert to sobriquet, "Hell and Maria."

Audience "Embarrassed" Hell and Maria Dawes roared as he was on parade ground," the Daily Mail said, "while his audience silent, mesmerized, almost embarrassed, as the crescendo came. He shattered the ancient peace atmosphere of Vintner's hall and Lord Derby and Lord Riddell on either side of him dodged his crashing fists."

BISHOP TO VATICAN

Mexican Prelate Will Talk With Pope In Rome

MEXICO CITY, July 17. (AP)—Archbishop Francisco Orozco Y. Jimenes of Guadalajara will leave within three days for Rome, it was stated here today, to confer with Vatican officials. There were reports in private circles his stay abroad would be a long one.

The Archbishop remained in hiding in the mountains throughout the so-called "Cristero" rebellion, showing himself upon the recent settlement with a denial he had participated in the armed movement.

Following a field trip which carried them over some 4,500 miles of territory, Dr. Leroy T. Patton, head of the department of geology at Tech, and nine students have returned to Lubbock. During their trip, said to have been one of the most valuable ever taken by the department, collections of data were made for records and statistics of the geology section.

Six States Visited

New Mexico, Arizona, California, Utah, Nevada and Colorado were visited on the trip. The Sacramento mountains, Santa Fe and Albuquerque were points of interest in New Mexico.

In California the geology departments of University of Southern California and the University of California were studied.

Old Paper Read San Antonio Sees Ancient Report

SAN ANTONIO, July 17. (AP)—A newspaper more than 125 years old that has been an heirloom in the Middlemiss family more than one century proved interesting reading for many San Antonians while M. S. Middlemiss, of Brady, was a visitor in the city.

The historic significance of the paper which is the London Times of Wednesday, Nov. 9, 1796, is that it reproduced the speech of George Washington, when he said words to the effect that "I do NOT choose to run." This was upon the occasion of his refusal to serve a third term as president.

CLEANUP IS ON

O'Donnell C. of C. Helping To Improve Its City

(Special To The Avalanche) O'DONNELL, July 17.—A cleanup campaign just staged in this city is said to be the greatest ever seen here. A truck driver, spinning a yo-yo with his left hand, maneuvered his way through city traffic in calm and playful fashion.

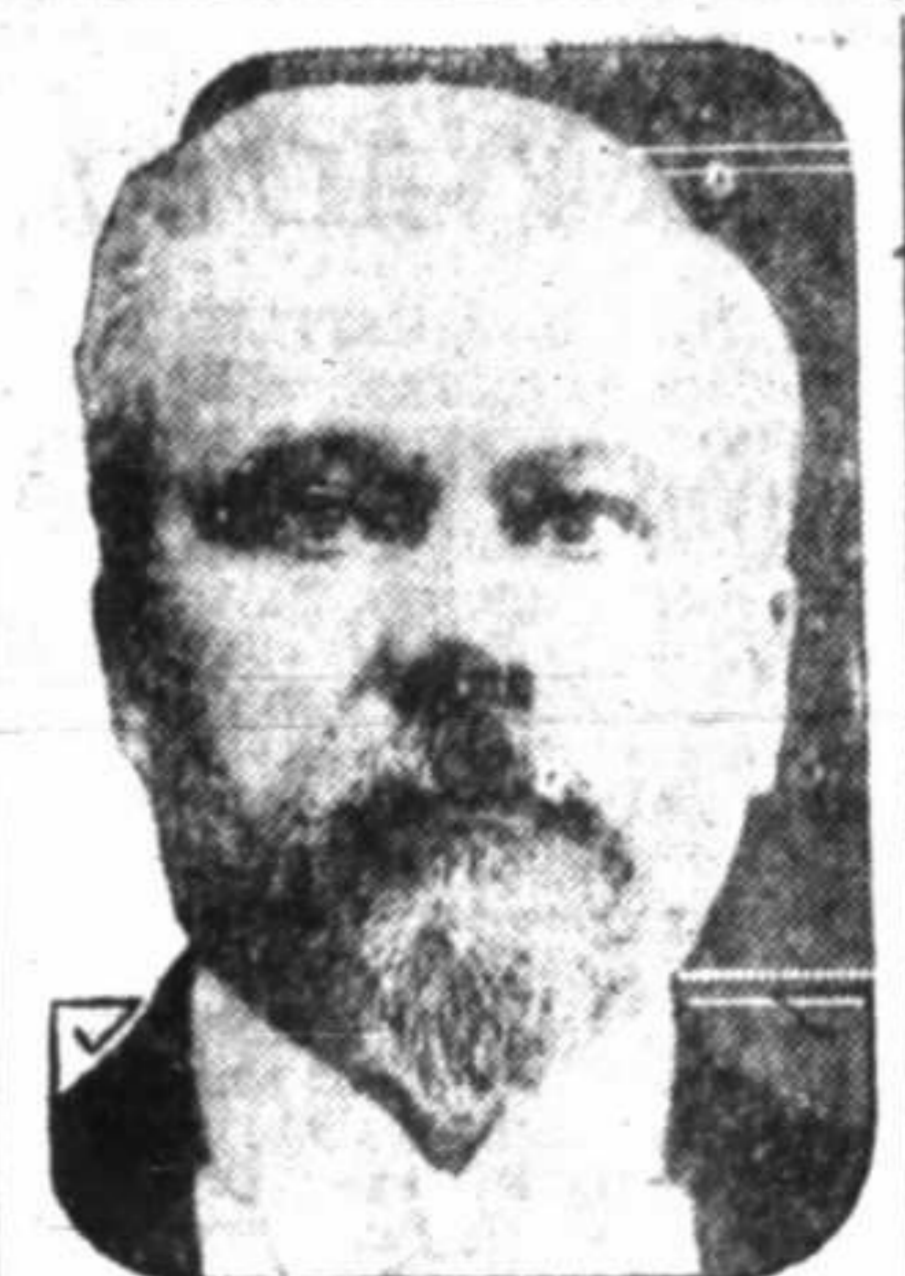
A laborer on a downtown construction job paused long enough to manipulate the yo-yo.

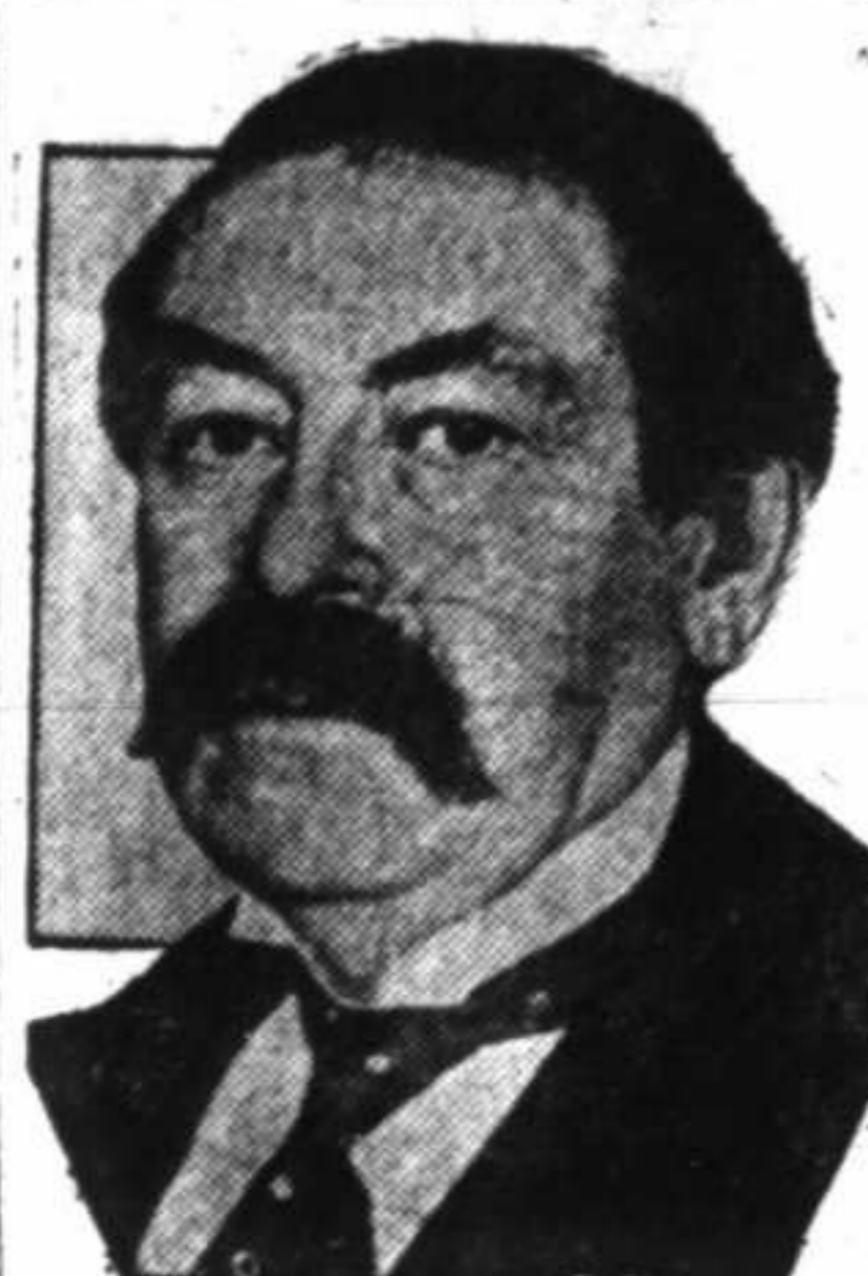

Aristide Briand's Defense Of U. S. Is Feature

PARIS, July 17.—While Premier Poincaré was confined to his bed today with exhaustion and extreme fatigue from his strenuous efforts on behalf of the debt accords with America and Great Britain, the French Chamber of Deputies gave him a second vote of confidence, 359 to 238, emphasizing the government's victories of yesterday.

The premier apparently has won a decisive victory over his opposition in the Chamber of Deputies and the feeling today was he would have no difficulty in securing ratification of the accords before the end of the week.

Briand Helps Out

One victory yesterday came without a roll call when the eloquence of Aristide Briand led M. Franklin Bouillon to withdraw a motion for postponement of ratification until the Young plan becomes operative.

M. Briand denied America was a "shylock." "I had," he shouted dramatically, "the formidable honor of being head of the government when the Americans entered the war. I know whereof I speak."

"The enemy was in the suburbs of Verdun. Those were hours of anguish. No one then believed that victory would perch upon our flag."

"In that desperate moment we called upon the men of the United

States for our just cause. However, bitter may be our internal debates in this painful discussion I can hear the heart of France beating in gratitude to America."

The entire Chamber arose to its feet and cheered as M. Franklin Bouillon withdrew his motion.

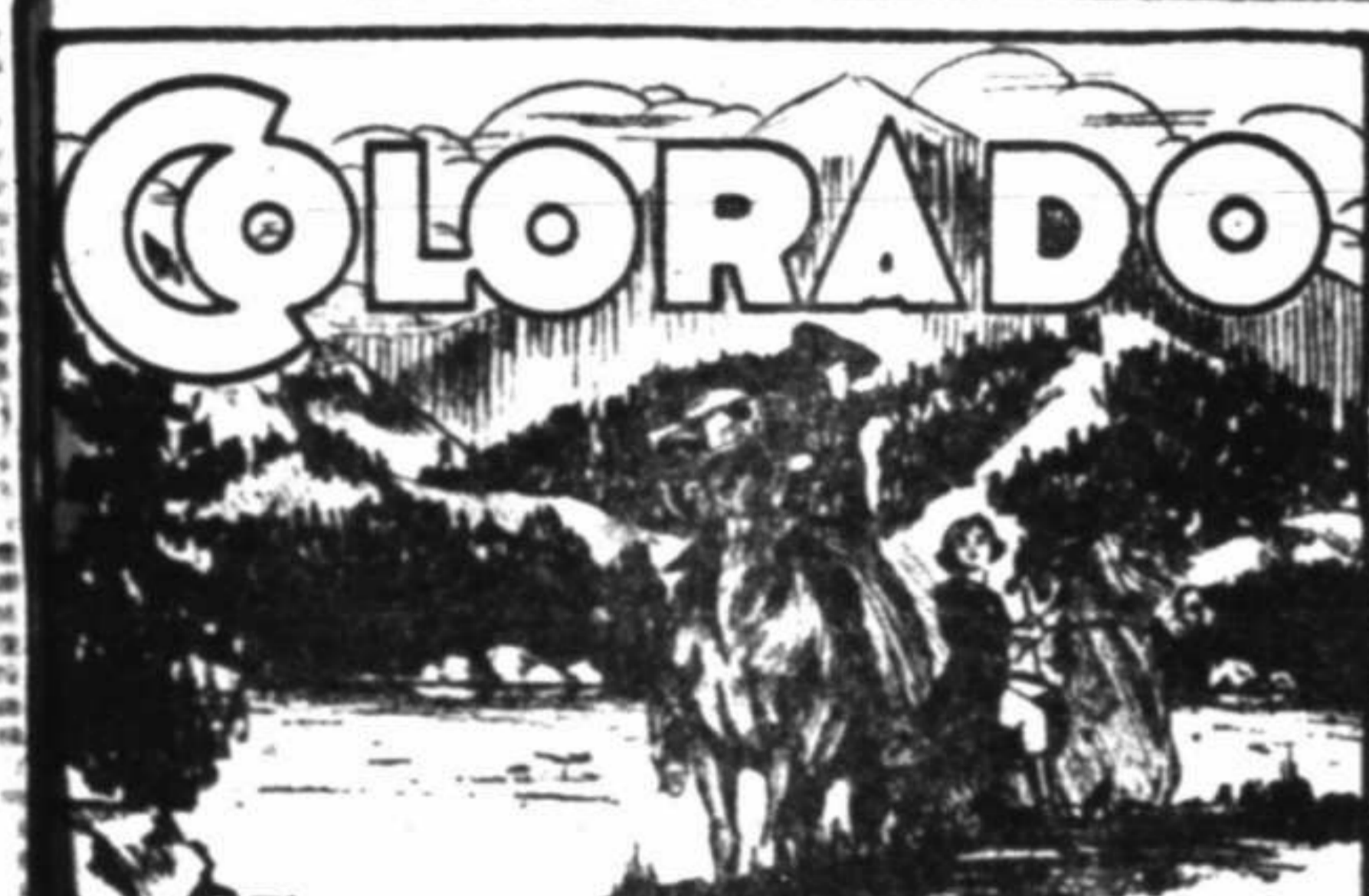

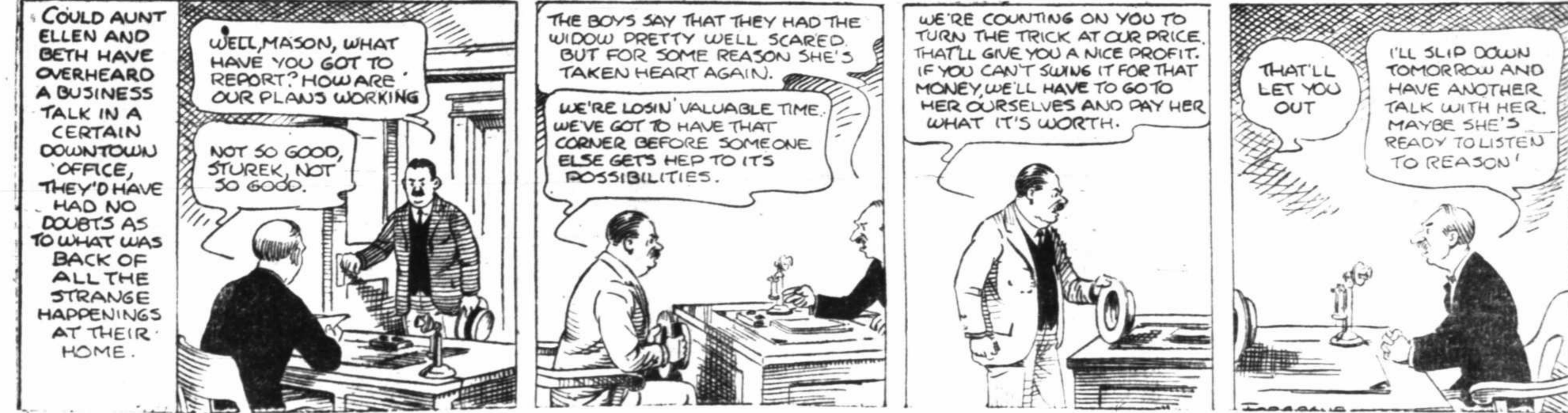

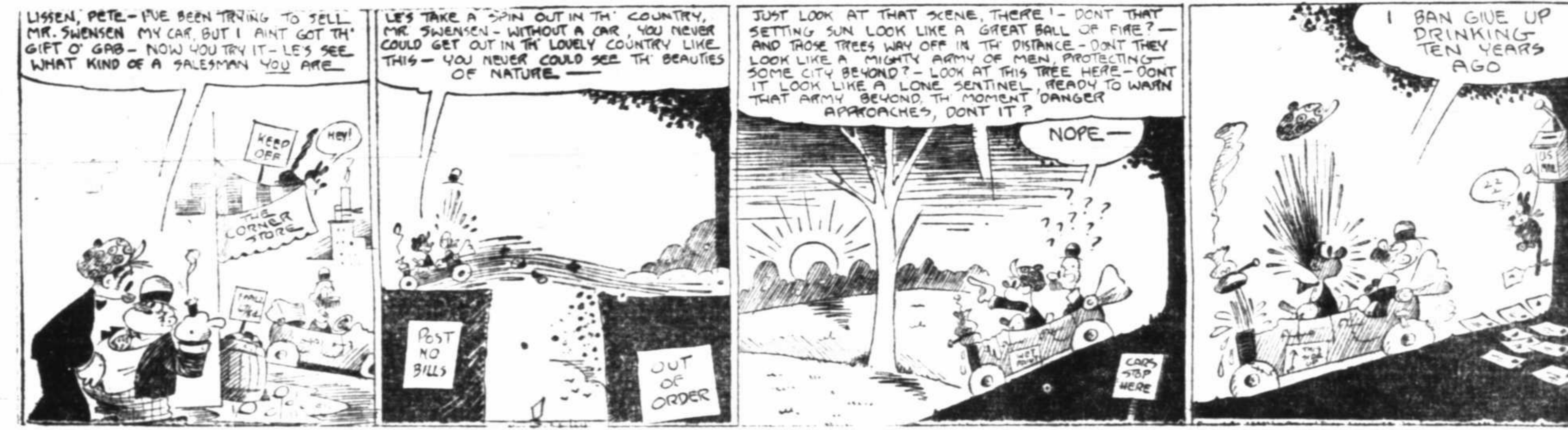
