Parts of county receive 5"

Santa Claus came to town, looked at his list... checked it twice and left snow as a late Christmas present December 25, 1997.

Approximately three to six inches of the white powder blew in between 10 and 11 pm and blanketed Mitchell County.

According to city police, there were no accidents reported in the city due to the weather conditions. Mitchell County Sheriff's Department officials said that no accidents had been reported on county roads, but three minor wrecks were reported late Thursday and Friday morning on Interstate 20 due to wet and slippery conditions.

Colorado City residents reported about three inches of snow. Loraine had between four and six and Westbrook reported three to five inches.

All incumbents have filed for re-election

All eight incumbents filed for re-election in the upcoming Democratic and Republican primaries to be held March 10, 1998.

One race spiced up the ticket last week when Scott Morton filed to run for commissioner in Pct. 2, the seat currently held by Carl Guelker.

Morton challenged Guelker for the same position four years ago, and lost by two votes 196-194 after a recount

of the ballots. Election returns had Guelker winning 196-192. Guelker is finishing his second term on the court.

The Democrats will be electing a new party chairman to replace Woody Anderson who has accepted an appointment by the United States Secretary of Agriculture to the State Farm Service Agency Committee. The SFSA is a policy making and review committee that administers

Local club to assist in REHAB telethon

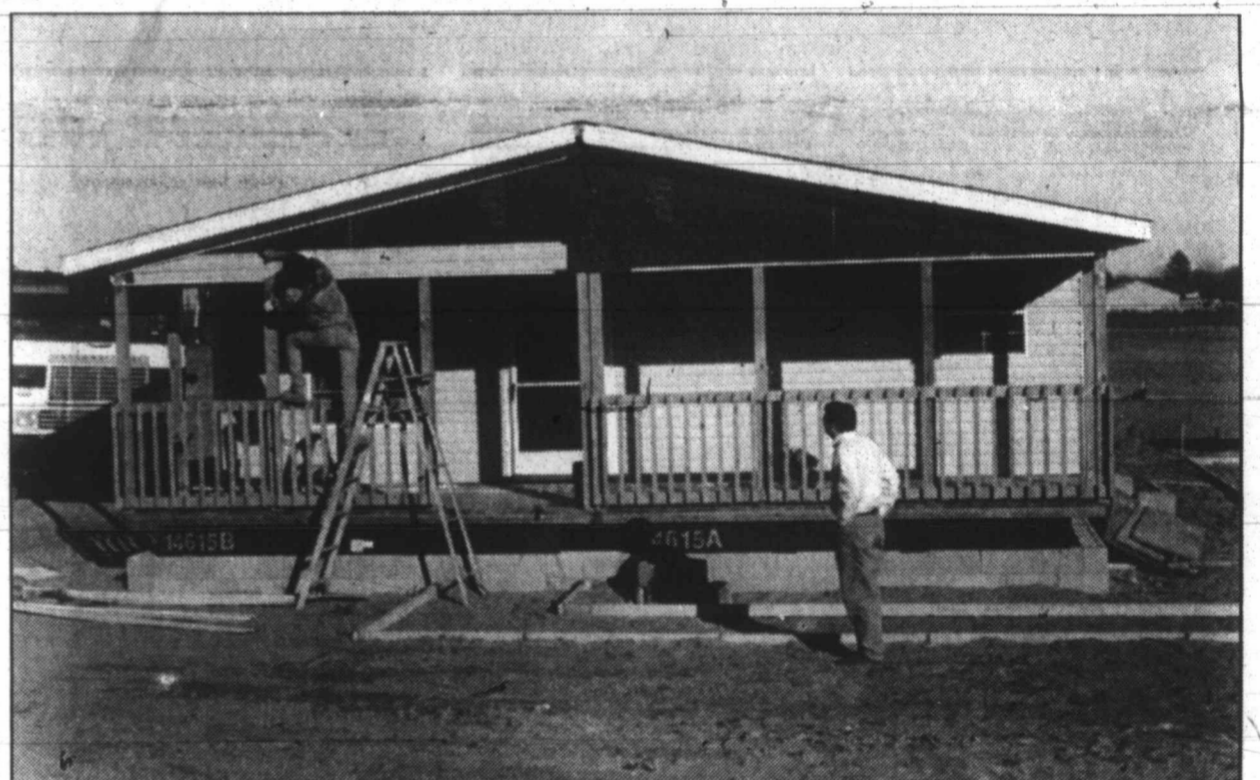

Warning label on cigarettes not only warning for teens

Teenagers don't read my lips, but feast your eyes on this article! The grace period is over for teen smokers in Texas, as the nation's toughest tobacco law goes into effect January 1.

The anti-tobacco law approved by Texas lawmakers earlier this year gives law enforcement officers who catch anyone under the age of 18 smoking, or in possession of tobacco products the right to send those youngsters to court.

Retailers who sell tobacco products to Texas young people will also face fines, for a suspended permit and they are required by law to place warning signs about the penalties for violation of the law. Retailers are responsible for training their employees about the new law.

Colorado City Police Chief Pat Taylor said his personnel have been briefed on the new law and that they will begin enforcing the law at the first of the year.

"This law will certainly be enforced on school property, and in other areas where problems and complaints develop," stated Taylor.

"With any new law we are going to have a trial period. We will enforce the law to help solve the problem. Our staff will be working together with the Mitchell County Sheriff's Department on the inspection of retailers. The law itself gives us clear and concise guidelines on retailer inspections," he concluded.

The particulars of the law reads as follows:

• Minors caught the first time can take an awareness

class. If the class is completed by the minor, the ticket can be wiped from their record.

• Minors caught a second time, or who don't complete the class, would have to pay a \$125-\$250 fine or lose their drivers' license.

• The third time a minor is caught with tobacco, a Class C misdemeanor would be filed. Class C misdemeanors are punishable by a fine up to \$500.

Officials from the Texas Department of Health said that the number of younger smokers has grown in recent years. The Center for Disease Control estimates one of every three children now using tobacco products will die early from a tobacco-related disease.

This new law is an attempt to counter the increase in younger smokers.

LaJuana Solomon

Solomons celebrated their 46th wedding anniversary December 23rd of this year.

The couple has two daughters, Peggy Smith, who lives in Buford community and Phyllis Easter, who lives in Lubbock. They also have four granddaughters and three grandsons.

LaJuana shared some of her recipes with us so we could pass them along to you. Enjoy!

Corn Casserole

2 cans whole kernel corn, drained
8 ounces cream cheese
1 can green chiles, chopped
10 ounces cheddar cheese, grated
Add salt and pepper to taste. Mix all ingredients well. Pour into casserole dish. Bake at 350° for 20 to 25 minutes.

LaJuana's Pecan Pie

3 eggs
2/3 cup sugar
1 cup light Karo
1/4 cup butter, melted
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup pecans, chopped
1 9 inch pie crust, unbaked

In mixing bowl, beat eggs slightly, add all remaining ingredients except pecans. Blend well with wire whip. Pour pecans into pie shell and pour filling over pecans. Bake at 400° for 10 minutes, then decrease temperature to 350° and bake for 30-35 minutes.

Summer Sausage

2 pounds lean ground beef
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1/4 teaspoon onion powder
1 tablespoon liquid smoke
2 tablespoons Morton's® Tender Quick salt

Mix all ingredients together with hands. Store for 24 hours in airtight glass container in refrigerator. Take out and knead again. Roll into 1/2" long logs and roll in cracked pepper. Bake at 350° for one hour on broiler pan.

LaJuana Solomon learned the basics of cooking from helping her mother in the kitchen. She grew up on a farm with two brothers and one sister and everyone had chores to do. She remembers gathering eggs each morning. She also remembers lots of trial and error while learning to cook.

This year during the holiday season, LaJuana made 10 to 15 cookbooks for family and friends. It all started when she was trying to think of a special gift for her granddaughter who was getting married. LaJuana said, "I do my best thinking at 3 o'clock in the morning." Apparently, she woke up in the middle of the night and thought, "I'll make my granddaughter a cookbook."

So, LaJuana began compiling some of her own favorite recipes, as well as some family favorites. She wanted the recipes to be useful and simple for her grand-

daughter. LaJuana admitted that the hardest part was getting all the information on her laptop computer. After completing the first cookbook, the project snowballed. Soon LaJuana found herself making cookbooks for lots of people.

Old fashioned home cooking is enjoyed most around the Solomon household. LaJuana said that she loves a good, thick steak and chocolate pie, of course. Her husband is quite fond of beans and cornbread. She said that he has been very good to cook for all these years. If she cooks something that he doesn't like, he simply says, "If you're cooking this for me, you don't need to cook it anymore."

LaJuana and her husband, Linden both were born and grew up in Mitchell County. LaJuana's great grandfather was one of the founders of the McMillan Farm in the county back in 1892. The

Pineda involved in training

Keeping the air station secure is a mission paramount in its importance.

But during time of war, military policemen assigned to an aircraft wing will be tasked with providing area security to an airfield in a hostile environment. To ensure Wing and Station policemen receive the training necessary to keep them ready for war, a new school has come into existence.

"The school came about to increase the amount of tactical training for military policemen," said Chief Warrant Officer 2 J.D. Perry, officer-in-charge of the school and MWSG-27 training officer. "Wing military policemen

have two missions -- law enforcement, which is primarily garrison, and security, which includes protection of an airfield." Security also includes battlefield circulation, enemy prisoner of war operations, area security and law and order. The law and order and area security mission are critical to support the wing, specifically airbase ground defense.

In order to provide this tactical training while maintaining the necessary number of military police on duty to meet the air station's security needs, the idea for a short duration tactical school surfaced, according to SSgt. David J. Sforza, the school's NCOIC.

The school is primarily for training military policemen, but according to Sforza once all the MPs have gone through the course, it will be opened up to Marines from other occupations.

The first group of students to attend the Air Base Ground Defense Training Course entered Room 209 in the Education Building, Nov. 31, for their first session -- instruction the use of single channel ground-air radio systems. These tactical radios are what military policemen will use in combat.

"The purpose of this class is to give Marines a basic understanding of the SINGARS radio and its uses," said Sgt. Art Pineda, Marine Wing Support Group 27 Airbase ground defense instructor from Colorado City, who was teaching the class. "I'm giving them the low-down on the radio's frequencies, range, maximum capabilities and proper radio procedures. They're learning everything from punching 1 frequencies to changing the battery."

Following the radio class, the students received instruction on the OE-254 antenna and the PPS-15, which is a type of radar motion sensor," explained Pineda.

"Upon completion of the course, each MP will have a tactical vehicle license and be trained on mobile patrolling," said Perry.

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The West Texas Cannon War

Colorado City has its cannon back. Sweetwater has a new cannon. Everybody's happy. The story starts more than fifty years ago. At the end of World War II, Colorado City acquired a cannon to put on display so people could see it and feel patriotic about our country. The cannon became a landmark and a symbol of liberty. It was first in Colorado City's National Guard Armory, then moved to the front of the American Legion Hall.

When the American Legion Post disbanded in the seventies, the building and all surrounding property, including the cannon, were deeded to the Boys Club. The cannon stayed there for years and eventually people in Colorado City didn't really pay much attention to it. The cannon began to show some age.

Last year members of the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post in Sweetwater decided they wanted a cannon to display in front of their building. They looked into what was involved and determined it would be too expensive to get a cannon and have it delivered to Sweetwater.

Then they learned about the cannon in Colorado City, which was virtually abandoned. They got the paperwork started to acquire the cannon, claiming it was neglected and improperly displayed. They got permission from the Army to remove the cannon from Colorado City and place it in front of their building.

When Colorado City residents learned about what was happening, they suddenly felt a strong attachment to their old cannon. They protested. They secured the cannon with a big heavy chain.

But they couldn't stop the Sweetwater folks from coming over and getting the cannon.

The story began to get nationwide coverage. There were jokes about the situation on the internet.

After the cannon was taken from Colorado City, the editor of the local newspaper, Eunice Fisher, let the army know that the incident had caused some hard feelings. That's when Ed Wolverton stepped in. He's a Big Spring native who is now head of the Army Re-Use Department. He managed to find a cannon at Fort Hood and had it deeded to the Sweetwater VFW. It is now on display there.

A group of Colorado City residents went to Sweetwater and got their cannon back. It is displayed in front of the Heart of West Texas Museum.

Colorado City Mayor Jim Baum says to get the cannon back, there were forms to fill out, and the city had to agree to properly display the cannon. A concrete pad had to be built, a flagpole had to be erected and the cannon has to be properly maintained. Mayor Baum agreed to the conditions and signed the papers. The city is now the official owner of the cannon.

Birdie Childs, head of the VFW in Colorado City, said at the dedication ceremony for the cannon: "Our VFW's are still comrades in arms, have always been and will continue that way. We just happen to live in a country where you can disagree on something. But with cooperation, the right thing is done."

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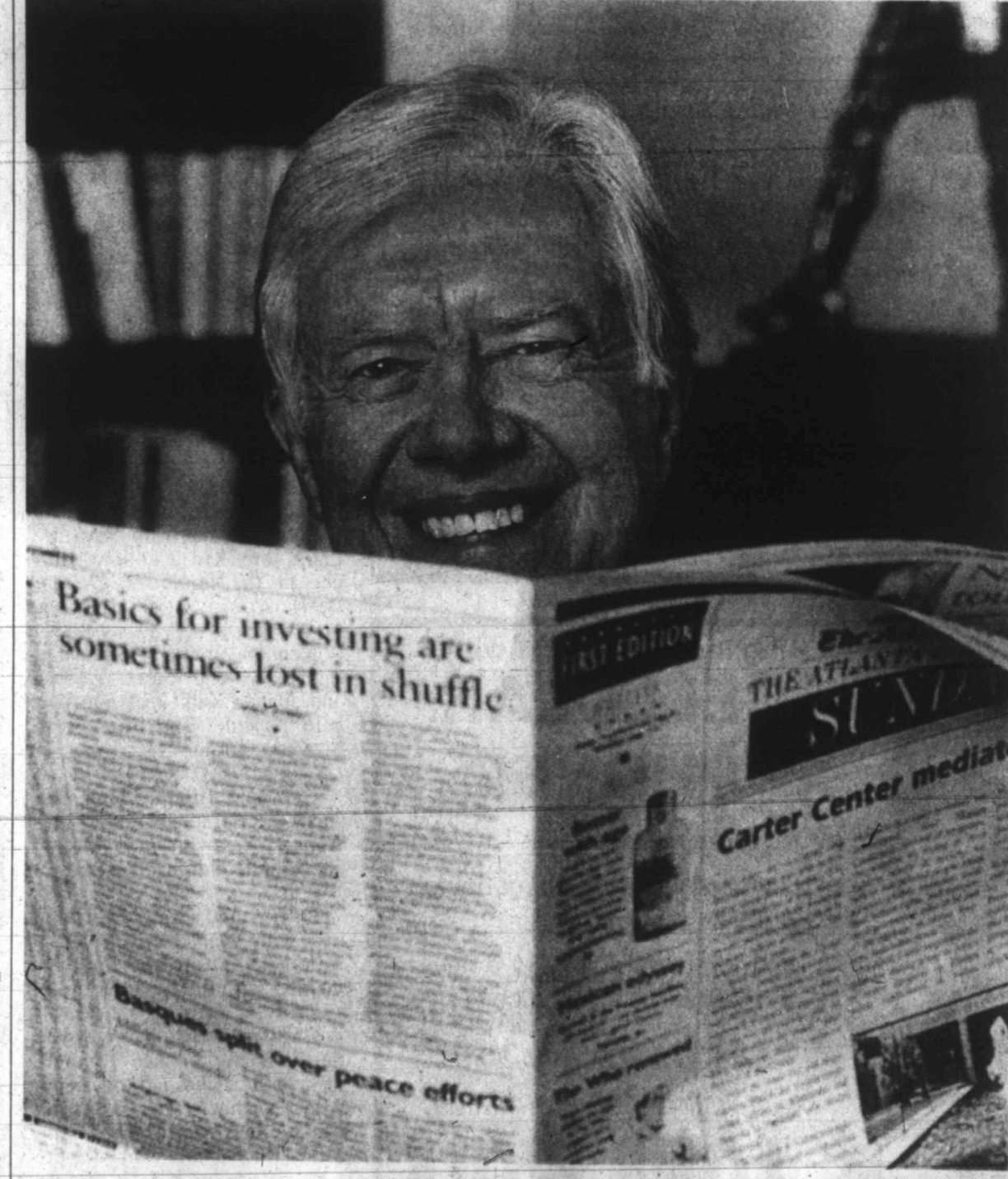

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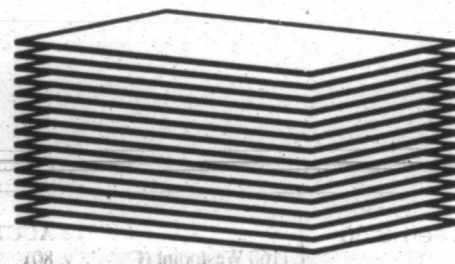
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SS Reform: What's Congress Up To?

#6 in a series of 8 columns about Social Security by Charlie Stenholm.

Two events took place in August 1995 which captured my attention. The first made national headlines: Social Security turned 60 years old. This caused me to consider the many millions of lives have been positively impacted by a program created out of the bipartisan wisdom of Members of Congress who are now long gone. Amazingly, over 160 million people have received Social Security benefits since the program first began.

The other event marked a personal milestone for me. My first grandchild was born.

While the successes of the Social Security program are impressive, the birth of Cole Stenholm (and Chase Stenholm since then) cause me to think far out into the future

and consider what his world will be like when I am long gone. Thinking of this prompted me to become involved in a number of Social Security activities as a way of protecting their future.

One activity was to convene a Social Security Summit in Abilene on May 30, 1997. Over 200 people from across the 17th District came to learn about the problems currently facing the program. Young and old alike gained a new sense of urgency about improving the system.

On the 60th anniversary of the Social Security Act in 1995, representative Jim Kolbe (R-Arizona) and I founded the bipartisan House Public Pension Reform Caucus (PPRC). We have used the PPRC to educate our colleagues and their staff members about the Social Security system, inviting

leading experts to share their wisdom. The meetings have been extremely productive and have enabled many members of Congress to expand their knowledge about the program and various dilemmas which lay ahead. To date, 72 of our colleagues from both parties have joined the PPRC.

In late 1996, representatives from the Center for Strategic and International Studies, a Washington-based nonpartisan policy organization, invited me to serve as a congressional co-chair of the National Commission on Retirement Policy along with Representative Kolbe, Senator Judd Gregg (R-New Hampshire) and Senator John Breaux (D-Louisiana). The Commission will make policy recommendations to Congress and the White House regarding retirement issues, including but not limited to Social Security. The Commission plans to release a preliminary report in early 1998. I am also pleased that Dr. Lanny

Hall, President of Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene and the former Deputy Director of the Texas Teacher Retirement System, serves as a member of the Commission.

To date, my work has been to discuss with colleagues and constituents the intricacies of Social Security. Over the last few years, however, many suggestions for reforming the program (ranging from raising payroll taxes to completely replacing the existing system with a different program) have been made. Members of a Social Security Advisory Council submitted their proposals in January 1997. Additionally, many Members of Congress and Senators have introduced legislation to reform Social Security. I will examine a few of these plans in my next columns.

Farmers and ranchers make solid gains in 1997

In an end-of-the-year report, State Comptroller John Sharp today said that 1997 was a turnaround year for agriculture, as Texas farmers and ranchers look forward to another year of solid gains in 1998.

"This year, Texas producers knocked off the dust from the '96 drought," Sharp said. "Most were blessed with much-needed rain, and prices began to return to profitable levels."

"For cattle producers, prices

are on an upswing, and herd sizes are stabilizing," Sharp said.

"Cattlemen can look for continued growth next year thanks to higher prices, lower feed costs and the probable availability of thick forage."

"Overall, 1997 has been good for growers, too," Sharp said. "For example, planted soybean acreage is up 45 percent over the past two years and harvested cotton acreage has increased by 29 percent."

Commenting in the latest issue of *Fiscal Notes*, Sharp noted that not all crops have rebounded evenly across the state.

"The widespread drought of 1995 and 1996 caused Texas farmers and ranchers to miss out on the high prices offered for many crops last year," Sharp said. "And though the rains were welcome, producers had to contend with more insects, as well as lower market prices that accompanied the higher levels of production."

Sharp said that prices for corn and sorghum are about 40 percent lower this year than last year. Rice farmers in the coastal area planted fewer acres in 1997 than in any of the five previous years, in part because last spring's rains prevented them from planting much rice in time. The loss of federal income supports also prompted rice farmers to experiment with other crops in hopes of higher profit margins, according to the Comptroller's analysis.

Sharp said that with rain levels back to normal, many Texas growers are returning to more diversified planting.

The Comptroller's analysis indicates that the coming year is likely to be characterized by the need for Texas agricultural producers to adjust to the federal government's stepping out of the risk management business, a provision included in last year's landmark farm bill.

That legislation called for an end to federal income supports by 2002, with transition payments to be made in the interim.

With the federal government no longer subsidizing crops, Sharp said, Texas farmers and ranchers are free to plant what they choose.

"This new freedom also carries with it new risks," said Sharp. "I encourage producers to familiarize themselves with the latest crop insurance program and other risk management tools so that they can stay on top of changing market conditions."

Sharp said that another question facing Texas farmers has to do with changes in the Conservation Reserve Program, a federal program in which landowners are paid to retire their land for specified periods of time for conservation purposes. The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), which operates the program, accepted only 1.8 million acres of the 3.2 million acres offered earlier this year by Texas landowners. An additional sign-up period was completed at the end of last month, although the number of new acres USDA will accept into the program is unclear at this time.
