

Campaign Started To Put Monument At Fort Elliott

Fort Elliott And Oil Fields
Highway Association
Plans Work For One Of
Section's Historic Spots

(Special To The Avalanche)

PAMPA, March 8.—The Stars and Stripes will again wave over old Fort Elliott, one of the Panhandle's most historic spots, from a flag pole freighted to Wheeler county in 1875, when the stronghold was established on the Texas frontier.

F. P. Reid of Pampa, president of the Fort Elliott and Oil Fields Highway association, is sponsoring a movement to erect a monument on the Fort Elliott reservation. Mrs. J. J. Long, widow of one of this section's most prominent pioneers, has donated the mast to the association for the erection on the Wheeler county site.

The monument to be placed on the grounds will cost approximately \$3,000, according to Mr. Reid. The movement to commemorate the Fort with a granite monument was launched by Mr. Reid following a Fort Elliott essay contest conducted in the Mobeetie high school by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, in an effort to get additional history of the Plains.

Ordered to Get Pole.

While working for the United States government, following the Battle of Adobe Walls in Hutchinson county, J. J. Long was ordered to Fort Dodge, Kan., to get a flag pole for the new fort then being established in this section to prevent further Indian uprisings. The mast, measuring 18 inches at the base and more than 70 feet in height, was brought to Fort Elliott by Long after days of travel over treacherous trails across Kansas, Oklahoma and northeastern Texas.

When the fort was abandoned in 1894, the flag pole remained on the reservation after seeing daily service in military ceremonies during the nine years that soldiers were stationed at the post. In 1902 when the fort was partially dismantled and the four sections of land, comprising the reservation, were sold, Long bought the pole he had brought from Kansas for the sum of \$7.50. The plainman did not have any particular use for the cedar mast, according to Mrs. Long, but made the purchase for sentimental reason. The pole was then placed on the main street of Mobeetie in front of Long's store where it now stands. Every holiday during the remaining days of his life, the pioneer took particular pains to see that the United States flag was raised to the top of the mast. After his death the American Legion post at Mobeetie obligated itself to carry out Long's flag raising duties.

Mrs. Dixon Heads Work.

Mrs. Billy Dixon of Miami, has been appointed by Mr. Reid to head the campaign for raising funds for the Fort Elliott memorial. Mrs. Long is the widow of Billy Long, one of the defenders in the Battle of Adobe Walls, and prominently identified in Plains history. Citizens of Mobeetie have agreed to purchase a part of the original Fort Elliott reservation for the monument. When the marking is completed it will be donated to the Panhandle Historical society, of which T. D. Robert of Pampa is president.

Letters Written 90 Years Ago Bring \$280,000 to 37 Texans; Slaton Woman Will Get \$14,000 As Result Of Action

EASTLAND, March 8.—Letters written 90 years ago brought \$280,000 to 37 Texans.

On April 2, 1820 William R. Meredith, Indiana millionaire, died at the age of 82. In his will he bequeathed \$1,250,000 to cousins, since he had no closer relatives. Each first cousin was to get \$14,000 and each second cousin \$7,000. Carl Springer, Eastland attorney, read in newspapers of Meredith's death. From stories told him by his father, A. W. Springer of Aspermont, Texas, he was convinced that he and his relatives should share in the fortune.

Will Is Contested.
Meanwhile, paternal cousins of Meredith contested the will on the ground that Meredith had not intended to include maternal descendants. Their contentions were overruled and the Texas cousins made eligible for bequests.

In establishing the relationship of the Texas clan to Meredith, Cary Springer introduced letters that Edward Fayette Springer had received from his sister, Emily Caroline Springer Meredith, mother of William R. Meredith. In one of them, she said she had named a son Edward Fayette, in honor of her brother. Some of the letters were written in 1840.

Under the court ruling allowing maternal cousins to inherit, A. W. Springer of Aspermont, and his sisters, Mrs. Oriana Moore of Guadalupe and Mrs. Barbara Ann Castleberry of Slaton, are to receive \$14,000 each. The 34 second cousins are to receive \$7,000 each.

Mrs. Goffinette Dies Yesterday

Mrs. Victoria Goffinette, 72, died at the home of her son, Ellis Goffinette, eight miles from Lubbock, at 11 a. m. Friday, following an illness of several months. She was born in Liegh, Belgium, in 1856, coming to this country in 1876 and to Lubbock in 1909.

Survivors are six children, Ellis and Arthur Goffinette, of Lubbock; Elbert Goffinette, of Florence, Kan.; Joe Goffinette, of Marion, Ind.; Mrs. J. J. Herzog, of Lubbock; Mrs. John Byrnes, Florence, Kan.; eleven grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held at 3 o'clock this afternoon from Bynum Brothers chapel, Rev. W. P. Jennings, officiating. Burial will be in the Lubbock cemetery, under direction of Bynum Brothers.

Four Fires Keep Department Busy Friday Afternoon

Runs Are Made To Various
Parts Of City; Total Loss
Of All Kept Within Less
Than \$2,000

Four fires, all occurring within a few hours of each other, were fought by Lubbock firemen yesterday afternoon, results of which totaled several hundred dollars in loss, with partial destruction of several small outhouses and a barn, and damage to two dwellings.

About \$600 damage was done to the house of Easton Wolfarth, at 2411 Fifteenth street, when fire of unknown origin burned clothing in the closet of a back room and otherwise damaged that part of the residence. The walls being lined with sheetrock helped to confine the blaze to this closet, firemen using a garden hose to extinguish the blaze.

Pitts Home Damage

At 2316 Sixteenth street, considerable damage was done to a house occupied by E. P. Pitts, from fire originating in the attic from a gas vent. Most of the damage was done to wallpaper. Practically all of the household goods being carried out of the house.

A barn, located northwest of town on the Littlefield highway, near the Tech Tourist camp, was destroyed by fire, the origin of which was unknown. The structure was burned before the fire department arrived, with no water supply adjacent to fight it with.

Fire, originating from a burning trash pile, partially destroyed an old buggy shed, which was being used for a garage, and three other small frame structures in the rear of the 1100 block on Fifteenth street between Avenues J and K, at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

The fire started when the wind blew sparks from the trash pile, which was being burned in the alley, into the old buggy shed, said to have been erected about 20 years ago. Firemen kept the blaze confined to the outhouses and telephone cables and electric light poles, extinguishing it before any of the adjacent residences had caught.

Total damage to the frame structures was estimated at about \$500 and damages to the poles, including one of the city's transformers, amounted to \$500 or more. The transformer shed was about \$150. The buggy shed is said to be the property of Jed Rix, the other structures being owned by Clyde Gibson.

El Paso Newspaper Reporters Watch Juarez Fighting On Floor Of Home

First-Hand Stories Of Combat Given To Papers

Correspondent for the El Paso Herald and the Associated Press, JUANES, Chihuahua, Mex., Mar. 6.—El Paso newspaper reporters smuggled to the floor at the home of Harry Mitchell, Juarez cafe proprietor, today while bullets whizzed into the walls and on all sides of the house as rebels and federal soldiers met in combat during the battle at Juarez.

At times the opposing soldiers fought hand to hand directly in front of the house.

Crash Through Windows
During the fighting bullets crashed through the windows and others buried themselves in the pavement of the street, sending up little puffs of dust.

Crawling on their hands and knees, sometimes rolling from place to place, the reporters and members of the Mitchell family spent their time between peeping hurriedly out of windows and running into the basement when the fire grew more intense. Reporters who telephoned their papers called from a position flat on the floor.

Close fighting occurred when a group of about 15 cavalrymen charged toward Lerdo street on the west from Ochoa street. The Mitchell home stands on Lerdo, directly in the face of Ochoa street. Infantrymen hiding behind posts waited until the horsemen approached within 75 yards of the house before they opened fire. Several direct shots must have been fired in this encounter, but so far as watchers could see, a horse was the only casualty.

Prize Telephone Girls
All the newspapermen who were able to get early reports to their papers highly praised the telephone girls who remained on duty at their posts in the telephone exchange until communication was cut off.

There was considerable fighting just outside the telephone exchange before the wires were cut.

To watchers in the Mitchell home it appeared the heaviest fighting of the day occurred about 9:30 this morning.

The engagement seemed to center at Sixteenth of September street and Lerdo. Machine gun fire added its steady rumble to what seemed to be the popping of hundreds of pistols and rifles as the rebels charged west on the main street toward Rio Bravo hotel, federal headquarters.

Horsemanship and infantry charged across the street in full view of spectators in the Mitchell home.

Suddenly several foot soldiers came north on Lerdo street and stopped directly in front of the Mitchell home. They moved on down the street into the midst of intermittent fighting. A group of federal cavalry charged up to the soldiers in the street with pistols and rifles leveled at them.

"Who are you for?" yelled an officer.

"For the government," came the answer.

"Well, that's all right," the cavalry leader replied.

For a moment it seemed the two groups were on the same side. Then without warning, both sides opened fire simultaneously.

Inside the Mitchell home reporters took chances with stray bullets and others crawled to safer positions behind the walls. Members of the Mitchell family joked with them.

"Sounds just like Chicago." Someone observed casually, and laughter drowned out momentarily, the sound of firing.

About this time foot soldiers were

blazing away within 25 feet of the house. One soldier, who appeared to be a federal, spotted himself on the curbing in front of the house and lit a cigarette while bullets whizzed past him.

The antics of that lone warrior amused the watchers from the Mitchell home. He'd duck, take a puff at his cigarette, and then with a loud yell would throw his gun to his shoulder, take aim and blaze away. He repeated the performance several times and then sauntered away, still puffing the cigarette.

Several men, apparently officers, drove slowly past the house in an automobile, firing casually as they proceeded. From a rear window the spectators saw two soldiers sniping from the Rio Bravo Hotel. Both remained there until the battle was nearly over.

Meet In Hand-to-Hand
About a block down the street from the Mitchell residence infantry rebels and federals met in hand-to-hand combat. One rebel on horseback, carrying a machine gun, swooped down in the midst of the federals and opened a rattle-tat with his gun. The federals scattered.

One man fell in the fight but was picked up by his comrades and carried away.

The observers watched a group of rebels capture some federal snipers in a house a block from their position. The capture came about after the insurgents had searched several other dwellings. The spectators watched carefully, expecting to witness an execution, but instead the prisoners walked calmly away with the rebels marching behind them.

A little later firing broke out afresh at the Rio Bravo hotel. On all sides came the tinkle of glass shattered by bullets.

"Come out of there, you dirty, double-crossing diabolos," a soldier yelled from a sidewalk in front of the Mitchell home as the fighting was at its height in the center of the town. No one answered.

A moment later five shots rang out and reporters peeped out in time to see the lone challenger fleeing up the street with bullets

kicking up dust at his heels.

All Were Alike
The most exasperating part of the whole battle was the fact that the reporters could not distinguish rebels from federals. One couldn't tell who was winning the fracas.

On more than one occasion the non-combatants huddled in the Mitchell home thought the battle was over when hails in the firing came. More than once they sallied out into the street only to plunge pell mell for safety as firing broke out anew.

At 10 a. m. telephone communication went out. Then about a half hour later when firing had ceased curious residents of the neighborhood began poking their heads out of doors and windows. Cautiously residents began to appear on the streets. The reporters followed.

Newspapermen felt more secure when no more shots were heard and they walked toward the main part of the town. There the city still was in panic. Rebel generals stood about in front of the Rio Bravo hotel, the building that a few hours earlier had housed the government commanders.

Frias Has Prisoners
Along came Albino Frias, former chief of police of Juarez, turned rebel. He came in company with a detachment of federals, evidently prisoners.

Frias was in high good humor as he bantered with the rebel generals and took a drink out of a bottle offered him by the rebel general de la Vega, who sat on a horse. A reporter bustled up to Frias and asked for a statement. "Aw, get away from here; we're too busy," said the former chief of police, taking another drink.

In spite of orders to refrain from looting which the rebel generals said their men had been given liquor was flowing freely among the victorious revolutionary troops gathered at the Rio Bravo headquarters. Bottles of tequila were being passed from man to man. Some of the leaders were staggering, but their gaiety seemed to have been caused by fatigue from the four-day march from Chihuahua City to Juarez.

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All this concerning the causes of rebellion.

Regarding now the real situation of the country, I wish to state that happily the sense of military duty; the knowledge of the real mission of the army; the populace grip that undoubtedly President Portes Gil has and the strength of legality that already is a factor of first order in this country growing into institutional life, have contributed to locate and isolate the rebels.

I only wish to add to finish with this exposition you asked that I am complying with my purpose of a definite withdrawal from the political life of the country and my unavoidable duty as a soldier, made me place myself under the orders of the President. But I continue more than ever firm in my purpose of not being any more in Mexico in any occasion, a political factor."

The movement is one started by bad military chiefs, greedy and corrupted, who without the remotest revolutionary principles in the social and economic order and without the remotest purpose for the betterment of the masses, rebelled against a civil leader who has shown with only three months of administration that he has and has had a perfect respect to the law and public and private morality.

Claim Suffrage Violation
Under the false pretenses of the intention to impose candidates in the coming presidential campaign, whose results can only be known in November, and claiming as the only apparent reason the violation of the public suffrage that has not been exercised yet and shall only be exercised nine months from now, the military men I have mentioned are taking advantage of the forces placed in their hands by the governments of the public to guar-

tee its institutions and take care of the honor of the country. They have rebelled apparently to substitute a supposed political electoral imposition for a real and present political imposition.

In fact, at the bottom of the movement there is no apparent intention of the rebel chiefs other than stopping Mexico from entering into the regime of an institutional life for which we have been struggling and which we were succeeding in establishing here. They desire a dictatorship of military character with the chiefs of great discredit and corruption at the head of it to strangle all the conquests of social and economic orders obtained by the revolution of Mexico. They desire to place, instead of the present constitutional regime marked by respect to the laws, the hideous regime of a military dictatorship that can not have even the excuse of a real strength in the public opinion.

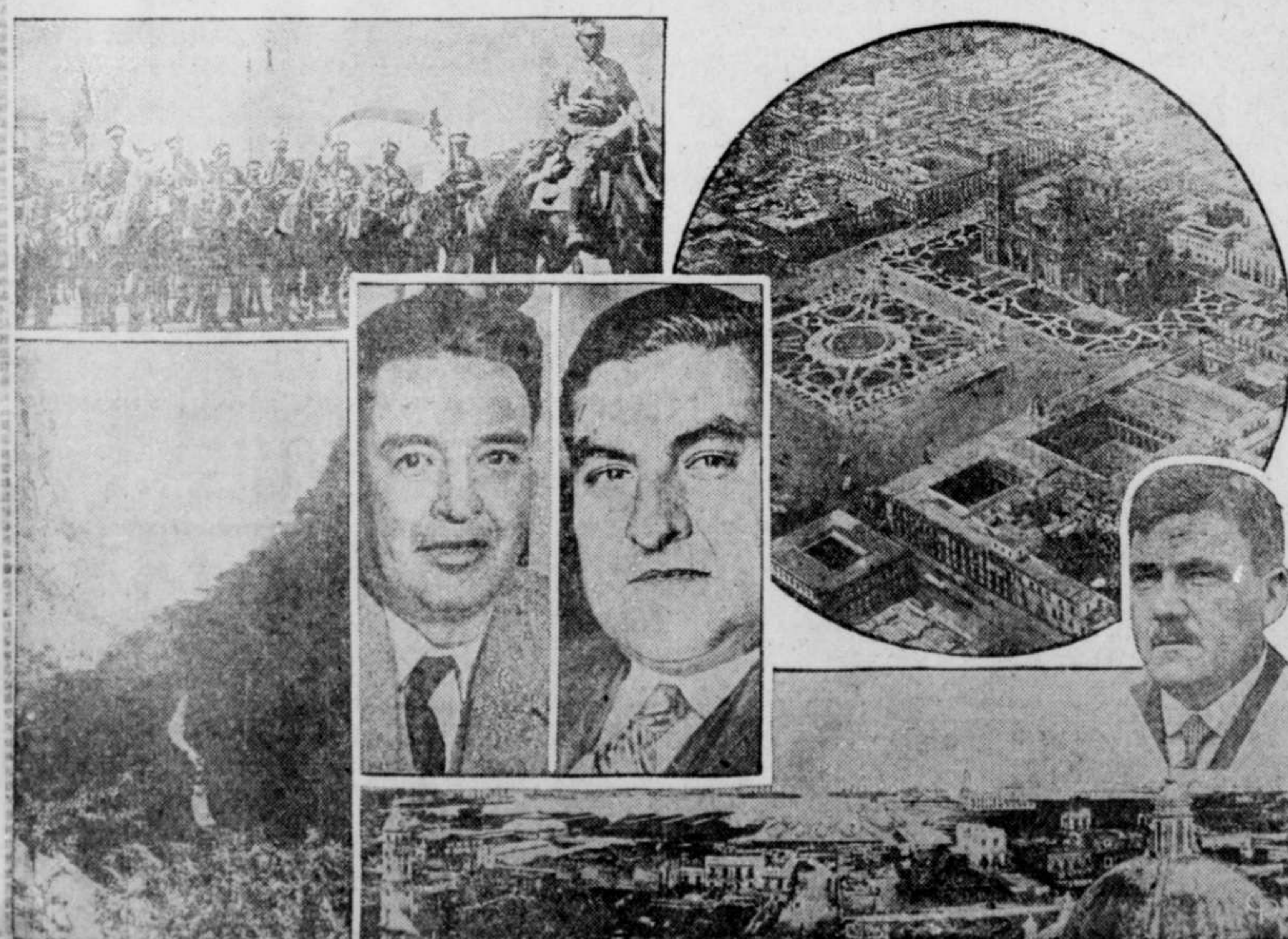

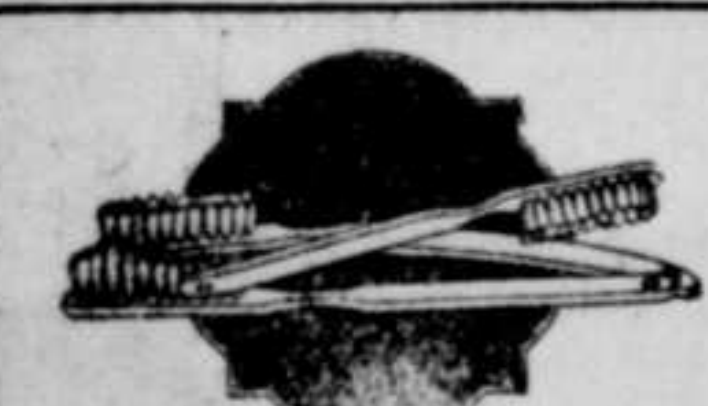
Fruit Custard Pudding
One and one-half cups canned peaches, 1-3 cup sugar, 3 table-spoons cornstarch, 2 cups milk, 1-4 teaspoon salt, 2 eggs, 1 cup cake crumbs, 1 orange.
Drain fruit from juice and cut in thin slices. Place in serving dish. Pour over orange juice. Grate rind of orange and add to 1-2 cups milk. Scald over hot water. Mix sugar, salt and cornstarch and stir in remaining 1-2 cup of milk. When smooth, beat into well-beaten eggs. Strain scalded milk into egg mixture, beating until sugar is dissolved. Cook 20 minutes over hot water, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and stir in cake crumbs. Stir until cool enough to pour over fruit without breaking glass dish. If a glass dish is not used, the custard can be poured over fruit without cooling. Chill and serve from serving dish with or without whipped cream.

Parents often fail to see defects in their children when they are quite apparent to other people.

It is natural, of course. Old sights and sounds fail to register on our senses. We fail to hear the street cars pass the house after a month or two when at first they bothered us to death.

A spot on a damask chair distresses us at first—then in a week it passes into the discard of impressions and we notice it no longer. We are not half so likely to make an effort to remove it after it has been there for a month or two, as we were upon first discovering it.

Unseen Faults
And so it is with habits in our children. We get so accustomed to them that we do not see them at all. Or if we do see them they don't disturb us as they should.

How resentful we are if an outsider dares to mention that Billy blinks his eyes or Dorothy is getting round-shouldered! For habit comes under various heads; it can be bad behavior, habit of carelessness, or more serious still, habit of physical nature.

Parents would be wise if they kept themselves alert to the impression their children were making on other people. It is a splendid way to get real perspective on one's own family.

If an aunt or cousin comes to visit at your house it might be a very excellent opportunity to frankly ask for honest advice.

"Of course we think that Billy and Dorothy are perfect, but tell me honestly, what do you think?"
"Well—to begin with—" may be the answer, "we think Billy needs glasses. He blinks constantly. I don't believe you notice it, but to strangers it is very apparent. And if Dorothy doesn't straighten up she will be ill. She needs to be watched carefully. I'd take her to a doctor right away."

More Happy Advice
Or: "Now that you ask, I'd make Billy lift his feet. He drags over your floors until he has them ruined. And make Dorothy stop biting her nails. Her hands are in dreadful condition. You could get something at the drug store to put on them, or make her wear mittens at home."

The old-fashioned hall, large as a room, we still have with us in many of the old-fashioned homes, as well as in many of the more modern summer cottages. In days gone by this hall was the receptacle for the family coats, hats, rubbers and other overshoes. Sometimes it had a closet in which to hide these things, but more often there was a spacious track with mirror, hooks and marble top, with its card receiver above, and a cupboard beneath for the overshoes. Except for the hatrack and possibly a bench, the hall was bare. We did not need to make a reception room of it, as we then had our big double parlors. In other words, rooms and room were not then at a premium. Households were plentiful, and we could afford to live in big houses with some leisure.

Now today, when rooms, room and servants are all at a premium, the utilization of the hall, if we happen to possess one of any size, becomes a problem. We want a little more room, so we turn the hall into a reception room. The sketch shows one of these halls furnished properly but practically utilizing some of the old-fashioned furniture we have no room for elsewhere. The hall and stairway are paneled in pine, stained dark to represent oak. The furniture consists of two old-fashioned chairs of oak with rush seats, a small table between with old-fashioned lamps modernized with electricity, and a dresser table in the center, which goes very well with the stained panels and the oaken chairs.

The dresser affords the room for overshoes once the function of the hatrack, as well as for other things the hatrack could not accommodate. A small hook and a larger rug rug cover the oak stained floor. A view of the dining room is afforded through the open door at the foot of the stairs. This dining room is as simply furnished as the hall, and a rag carpet rug covers the floor. There is no attempt to combine the simple elegance of the modern, nor the elaborateness of the antique, with the simple old-fashioned furniture of the hall. All is in perfect harmony, restful and comfortable, with a pleasant air of invitation about it.

Best Trades Come From Centers Of Middle Western States; Business Better Than Year Ago

(By Associated Press)

NEW YORK, Mar. 8.—Bradstreet's tomorrow will say:

Unsettled weather, with heavy rains an especially notable drawback in a large part of the south but with warmer weather noted as benefiting trade in a large part of the west, has made for a very irregular set of trade reports this week. In the southeast renewed high water in streams has been a bar to trade and crop activity, and in the west shows and cold following high temperatures have retarded spring buying and made for bad roads.

Relatively best trade reports still come from large industrial centers of the Middle West, where the activity in "heavy" lines such as steel, iron, automobile, machine, tool and agricultural implement manufacturing have acted as a spur to distribution. New England and the North Atlantic states have displayed fair activity, considering weather drawbacks, and metal mining sections in the further west have also shown gains. With all the drawbacks as to weather, this applying to the two past months of "old fashioned" winter, however, the general conclusion hitherto voiced that business and industry were better situated than a year ago in the same period still remains good.

Junior Colleges To Be Studied By Texas Professors

(Special To The Avalanche)

AUSTIN, Mar. 8.—Investigation of the present system of financing public junior colleges in Texas is being started by Dr. Frederick Eby and Dr. B. F. Pittenger, of the school of education at the University of Texas. A survey of the junior colleges of Houston and of South Park Junior college, Beaumont, will be made the latter part of this week by Dr. Pittenger, while Dr. Eby will visit the Tyler Junior College next week.

Results of this investigation, which is to include every public junior college in Texas, are expected to yield two important discoveries, according to Dr. Eby. In the first place, the investigators hope to discover this cost of education in public junior colleges so as to be able to guide other cities in establishing that system of education. Secondly, they expect to see whether or not the junior college can take over education at that level for the country at large and give equally as well-educated products at an equally low or cheaper cost.

Mountaineers Are Called In Answer To Relic Probing

Plain Kentucky "Shiners" To Testify On Alleged Duping Of Famous Museums In United States

(By Associated Press) LOUISVILLE, Ky., March 8. — Kentucky mountaineers always have interested scientists. An idea which resulted in many celebrated northern and eastern museums displaying Indian relics purchased at good prices has engaged the scientist who will be called upon to testify in a federal court as to whether famous museums have been duped by a plain Kentucky mountaineer. Federal investigators say they have and here's the story.

Cumberland City is tucked away in the Cumberland mountains of Kentucky. Near it live Mark Hanna Guffey, W. M. (Wade) Bell and R. V. (Velt) Jones.

Cumberland City came to the attention of Indian relic collectors, antique hunters and scientists upon discovery that the surrounding country abounded in a vast wealth of prehistoric objects of great value. Many of the relics were of a strange variety and unknown to science.

Loss Faith In Purchases. But after a time certain relic collectors and experts began to lose faith in their purchases and complained to the government. An investigation started. Agents of the government uncovered large quantities of Indian relics in Clinton county until they came upon a strange work shop. Then was directed at Guffey, Bell and Jones.

"The work shop was crude with an old Ford car as chief implement and power plant. However, it turned out wares so genuine in appearance they found places among the most authentic collections of the world," Guffey, Bell and Jones have been cited to come from their mountain workshop on charges of using the mails to defraud and to tell what they can do with a Ford car and limestone rocks.

LINES AID VALUATION

Blanco County to Get Three New Pipe Lines

JOHNSON CITY, Mar. 8. (P)—Three pipe lines with a total taxable value of about a half a million dollars soon may traverse Blanco county.

A force of 210 men are working on the Shell pipe line, connecting the McCamey oil fields with Houston. The Texas company is at work near Blanco, laying pipe and erecting telephone lines. A third line is planned by the Atlantic.

OLD BUILDING BURNS

Galveston House Was Built Of Storm Driftwood

GALVESTON, Mar. 8. (P)—A building which served for more than ten years as a schoolhouse, and during the past fifteen years as a residence of Mrs. Rockwell, was burned at Dickinson recently.

It originally was built from driftwood and debris of the county fair amphitheater destroyed in the 1900 storm.

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Sunday-School Lesson

BY DR. J. E. NUNN

INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON FOR

MARCH 10, 1929

General Topic: Baptism and the Lord's Supper.
Scripture Lesson: Matt. 28:19, 20; 1 Cor. 11:23-29.

Matt. 18:19. Go ye therefore, and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them into the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.

20. Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I commanded you: and lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world.

1 Cor. 11:23. For I received of the Lord that which also I delivered unto you, that the Lord Jesus in the night in which he was betrayed took bread;

24. And when he had given thanks, he brake it, and said, This is my body, which is for you; this do in remembrance of me.

25. In like manner also the cup, after supper, saying, This cup is the new covenant in my blood; this do, as often as ye drink it, in remembrance of me.

26. For as often as ye eat this bread, and drink the cup, ye proclaim the Lord's death till he come.

27. Wherefore whosoever shall eat the bread or drink the cup of the Lord in an unworthy manner, shall be guilty of the body and the blood of the Lord. 28. But let a man prove himself, and so let him eat of the bread, and drink of the cup.

29. For he that eateth and drinketh, eateth and drinketh judgment unto himself, if he discern not the body.

Golden Text: This do in remembrance of me.—1 Cor. 11:24.

"An ordinance is an outward institution, appointed by Christ, by positive precept, to be observed by all his people to the end of the age, commemorating an essential fact and declaring an essential truth. Of these there are two, baptism and the communion—the initiation and the consummation of the Christian life. These ordinances are the gospel in symbol; they commemorate, declare, and typically embody the whole Christian system (1 Cor. 15:1-5). They are the true symbols of Christianity, divinely appointed and all sufficient." Henry G. Weston.

The Communion. "It is not because we look upon it as a sacrament imparting a mysterious spiritual grace; it is because we look upon it as a sacrament im-

parting a mysterious spiritual grace; it is because the vision of Christ which we get when we partake of these emblems of his suffering, and the prayers to Christ that rise from our hearts when we recall what he has done for us, inspire us with a new devotion to him and put within us a courage to face our duties and bear our trials, that we emphasize the importance being faithful in celebrating this ordinance."—Frank M. Goodchild, in "Around the Lord's Table."

When the knights of King Arthur had been long absent, on their quests, from the Round Table, their courage and moral stamina would gradually weaken; so the legend tells us. The renewal came when they were able once more to share the meal of their fellowship. Such a reinvigoration of the spiritual life comes to the Christian at the table of the Lord, when he rightly partakes of the Supper.

The Two Christian Sacraments. "Protestants regard baptism and the Lord's Supper as the only sacraments. The Roman and Greek churches add five others: confirmation, penance, extreme unction, holy orders (the clerical office) and matrimony. A sacrament, according to the meaning of the original Latin word, is an oath. One might say that in this sense by the two Christian sacraments, baptism and the communion, we swear or pledge our allegiance to the Lord Christ. More specifically, however, the sacrament is an act by which, or in which, God speaks to us. The Bible is his spoken word, the sacrament his acted, dramatic word."

A Command and an Example. Matt. 3:13-17; 28:19, 20.

What makes baptism and the communion especially imperative and precious to the Christian is the fact that in observing them he is following both the command and the example of his Lord.

It was appropriate that the head of the church should lead the long procession of his disciples down into the baptismal waters; himself submit to the initiation that he was transforming, and sanctifying with the Holy Spirit (ver. 11). In Acts 10:38 Peter refers to this event as Jesus' formal anointing for his life-work. The representation of the Holy Spirit by a dove-like semblance is fitting. We think of the dove of the Deluge. Among the Samaritans the dove stands for the glory of God. Attention has often been called to the fact that all three personalities of the Trinity were present on the occasion.

"In the closing verses of Matthew our Lord gives baptism an added importance by making it a part of his Last Commission, and of his program for the spiritual conquest of the whole world. This inclusion of baptism in the commission is important, because here is one of the church's strongest warrants for making it an indispensable act of the Christian profession."

The Baptism at Pentecost, Acts 2:38. We learn from this, as well as many other references in the later New Testament books, that baptism forthwith became a universal ordinance in the early church. It always followed immediately upon identification of oneself with Jesus and his kingdom. "Unto the remission of your sins," need not trouble Protestants, when we remember that the ordinance was but a symbol. The remission of their sins would be effected not by the baptism, but by that which was symbolizing: repentance and faith in Jesus as Saviour.

"Buried With Him By Baptism." Rom. 6:4.

"Baptism was an incomplete sacrament while Jesus was with his disciples. Its meaning could be fully defined only after his death and resurrection. The apostle Paul, who lived in the perfect light of finished redemption, adds another word to baptism's symbolism; it symbolizes his burial and resurrection, our resurrection hope; and in it we declare that we have left our old sinful personality, to be new men and women in Christ Jesus. This importance representation is obviously sacrificed when the ordinance is administered otherwise than by immersion."

Summary. Christian Baptism, from the Protestant viewpoint, is thus:

1. A rite of initiation into the organized church.

2. A symbol of the spiritual purification that the candidate has undergone (cp. Acts 22:16).

3. A burial and resurrection, picturing Jesus' burial and resurrection, and the spiritual death and resurrection of the believer in union with him. (cp. Rom. 6:3; Gal. 3:27).

4. A pledge of devotion to Christ as Lord and Saviour; and, when administered in public, an open declaration of one's allegiance to him.

The Lord's Supper A Memorial. "This do in remembrance of me." 1 Cor. 11:24, 25. The Lord's Supper is a remarkably meaningful, sacrament simple, dramatic, of large teaching value.

"The ordinary meal is well-nigh a sacrament in Scripture. Many Biblical scenes and lessons are associated with eating and the dinner table. Bread was then the com-

monest food and wine a common drink. And they both were the result of crushing. It was natural then that there at the Last Supper, on the eve of the Cross, as Jesus broke bread and filled the cup with his disciples, he should point out to them how truly that breaking and pouring pictured the violation of his body, the shedding of his blood—soon to be—and all that they would stand for. Already he had called himself the Bread of Life, and as early as the Cana Miracle he had intimated that his Spirit was the fruit of the vine that was to satisfy and revivify the world athirst. "If (the Lord's Supper) is a singular medicine for all sick creatures, a comfortable help to weak souls." (John Knox).

It is supposed that at first the sacrament was observed as a part of, or the conclusion of, the regular communal meal that a group of disciples ate together. (cp. Acts 2:44-45). When there had been too much sociability or gluttony at the meal the observance would degenerate into a profane farce. 1 Cor. 11:27.

"The New Covenant," v. 25. "New covenant in my blood," is to be understood: This new covenant of grace, that supersedes the old one of law, is mediated by my blood, as the old one was by the blood of the sacrificial victims. The shedding of blood was essential to a covenant, and it was the condition of the forgiveness of sin. (cp. Jer. 31:38, and Heb. 10 and 11).

"The Christian would be carrying Jesus' thought and intention to their natural conclusion if he remembered his Lord not only specially in this ordinance, but also incidentally in every meal; thinking of that Lord's giving of himself every time that he partakes of a morsel of bread, or

puts a cup to his lips."

Summary:
1. The Lord's Supper commemorates and reminds us of—vividly re-enacts for us the sacrifice of the Cross.

2. It is a confession and reminder of our need of constantly partaking spiritually of the "Bread and Drink of Life, even Christ Jesus. And so, observed not once, like baptism, but repeatedly.

3. It expresses our community and union with Christ, and with one another, the church. Hence it should bring us nearer to him, our Lord, and unite us more truly into a brotherhood where he is the Brother Preeminent.

4. Because the sacrifice that it commemorates was one that Jesus gladly made—they sang a hymn before they went out—and because of all that it means to us, the Lord's Supper is also regarded as a thanksgiving. That is the meaning of the word "Eucharist," by which it is sometimes called.

5. As the most general and universally practiced rite of our faith, it is, as it were, a rally-post of Christianity. Around the table of our Lord we are in the company of all the saints who from their labors rest and of all the millions who today call Christ Lord.

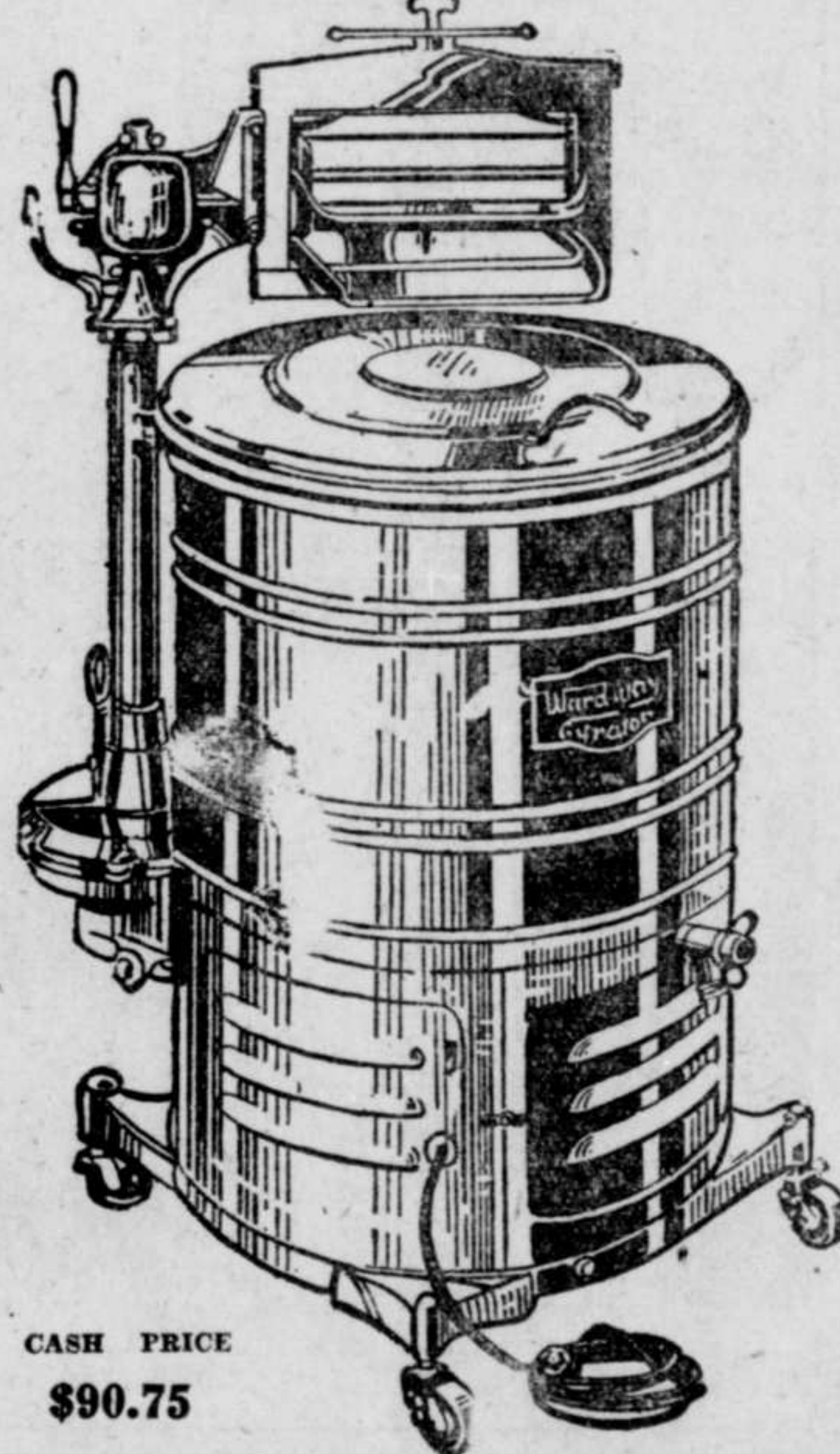

Dallas Protests Crime Pictures

DALLAS, March 8. (AP)—Movies of crime have been attacked as unwelcome by the Dallas city censor and various women's organizations, but William McGraw, district attorney, takes an entirely different attitude.

"One of the greatest services rendered to the general public by the motion picture makers in the last year is the awakening of interest in the administration of criminal law," McGraw said.

"Crime pictures, as they have been termed, have had the effect of leading many citizens to inquire in their own communities how their laws have been administered. 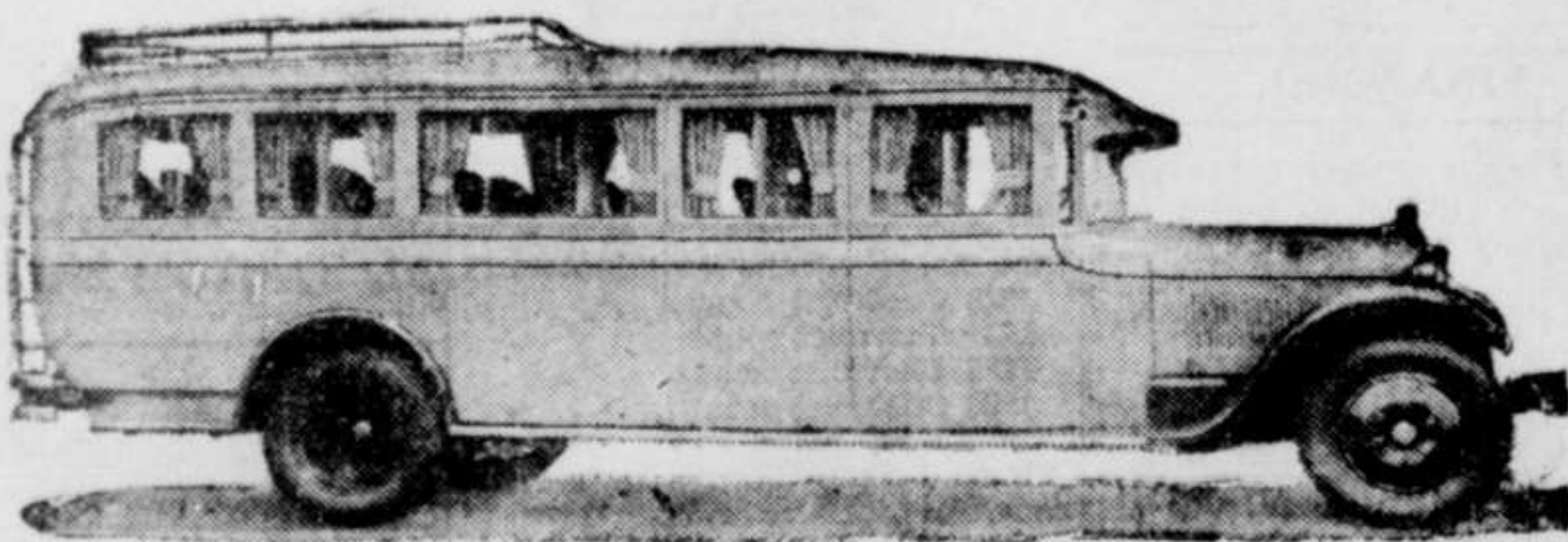

Speculators For Advance Control Of Stock Market

Powerful Speculative Forces Bid Vigorously for Shares Friday; Call Is Dropped To 9 Per Cent

BY CLAUDE A. JACGER, Associated Press Financial Writer
NEW YORK, March 8. (AP)—Speculators for the advance took complete control of the stock market today after an opening break had carried many popular issues down 2 to 3-1/2 points. Disregarding the surprisingly large increase of \$140,000,000 in brokers' loans and the warning statement of Paul Warburg, international banker, powerful speculative forces bid vigorously for stocks, pushing more than a score to new high records.

Radio issues were the outstanding feature. The old stock soared 38 points to a new high record for all time at 445, after having dipped to 398 1-2 on the first outbreak of selling, and the new stock closed 7 1-4 points higher at 89, also a new peak. More than 600,000 shares of the new stock changed hands during the day.

Except for a slightly easier undertone in call money, which dropped from 10 to 9 per cent, there was little in the day's news to explain the sudden change in speculative sentiment. Earnings and trade reports continued favorable and a flurry of buying developed in the oil shares on reports that marked production was being made in negotiations for a curtailment of crude production.

The seeming defiance of the federal reserve authorities by stock market operators continued to be a source of uneasiness in conservative banking and brokerage quarters. With loans only \$22,000,000 below the record high total for all time, an unusually heavy mid-month turnover of funds due next week and expanding agricultural and commercial demands for funds, many of the large financial houses continued to urge a cautionary policy on the part of their customers.

Some of the other outstanding strong spots in today's market were advance Rumely, Allis Chalmers, Davison Chemical, Grand Stores, Midland Steel products preferred, National Cash Register, Ross Insurance, Stromberg Carlson and Victor Talking Machine, all of which closed 4 to 10 points higher. U. S. Steel common, which sold down to 183 1-2 in the early trading, closed at 186 1-4 for a net gain of 2 points and General Electric rallied from a low of 231 1-8 to 238 1-2, closing within a point of the top.

Cotton rallied about \$1.25 a bale. Wheat declined a fraction of a cent; a bushel and coffee futures rallied 25 to 28 points.

Buying Wave Is Continued Friday On Gotham Cotton

NEW YORK, Mar. 8. (AP)—Further advances occurred in cotton today on continuation of the recent buying wave. The advances was promoted by relatively steady cables and reports of small fertilizer sales in February.

Reports of Mississippi river overflows on unprotected lands at Cairo, Ill., and of a levee break north of Blytheville, Ark., also were mentioned as a factor in the afternoon upturn. Prices for all months have made new high ground for the movement. May contracts sold up to 21.40, or 24 points net higher, and closed at 21.39, the general market closed very steady at net advances of 23 to 27 points.

The opening was firm at an advance of 7 to 12 points. Active months showed net gains of 10 to 12 points right after the call in response to the relatively steady showing of Liverpool and reports that February fertilizer tag sales showed a falling off of 24.4 per cent compared with last year.

NEW ORLEANS, Mar. 8. (AP)—Prospects for a return of unfavorable weather, good weekly statistics and a bullish consumption estimate by a private authority caused cotton prices to advance, practically \$1.50 a bale here today. Realizing and some hedge selling appeared but was absorbed quickly and in the late trading May sold up to 20.71, compared with 20.42, the day's low. The option closed at 20.66 for a net gain of 24 points. The general market closed steady at net advances of 24 to 29 points. First trades showed gains of 8 to 11 points, with May at 20.53, July 20.56 and October at 20.24. A report by a prominent private authority making the domestic consumption during February 594,569 bales was construed as bullish and helped the initial advance.

All of this gain was lost, however, in a wave of profit-taking which was absorbed around yesterday's closing levels. Towards noon the market rallied again under buying promotion by an unfavorable weather outlook, bullish weekly statistics and a reported break in the Arkansas levee.

Demand continued aggressive for practically the remainder of the session, prices reaching new highs in late trading with May at 20.71, July 20.75 and October 20.42, or 27 to 29 points net up. Near positions closed 4 to 5 points under the top while December showed the maximum gain closing at 20.47, compared with 20.18 at yesterday's close.

Texas for the Federation, and was called by Mrs. M. S. Hudson, of Hale Center, a state director of the organization. West Texas will be the first section of the state to start a drive for new members.

Field Directors Present

Three field directors of the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton association were present, namely, E. M. Mitchell, Dawson county; Frank Triplett, Hale county; W. W. Porter, Mitchell county. Three directors of the cotton association, R. E. Overstreet, Lubbock county; W. H. Hames, and M. S. Hudson, Three presidents of County Farm Bureaus, W. L. Brashers, Lubbock county; Moore of Hockley county; Mayhew, of Hale county. Two county agents, Eaton of Lubbock and Evans of Hale were in attendance, as were two county home demonstration agents, Mrs. Kelly of Hale and Miss Louise Baird of Lubbock counties.

B. Sherrod offered felicitations from the city of Lubbock to the gathering, and predicted the Farm Bureau in a year's time, would be stronger than it has ever been.

Provide Comforts Object

"The first object of the Farm Bureau," President Lucas said, "is to improve conditions in country home life. To provide for the coming generations more culture and opportunities is the thing that is lying next to the women's hearts. This is the reason they are so actively interested in Farm Bureau work."

He said the reason for state organization, is to centralize and combine local organizations, to act as one body in order to make itself heard. The bureau fosters community progress, education, good roads, elimination of rodents and other pests. It ties the business men closer to farm problems, giving them an agricultural outlook.

Mrs. M. S. Hudson stated the bureau to be the greatest movement that has ever been attempted to be put over in Texas. "In West Texas, with our wonderful soil, water, climate, intelligent people, under our present system, debts, mortgages, etc., are being multiplied instead of being decreased," she said. "We have the greatest of advantages, yet we have not yet been able to pay off our indebtedness." Lack of organization among the farmers was given as the reason for this.

Professors H. J. Bowers, E. O. Elsworth and Dean A. H. Leidigh, of Tech college, were among those on the program.

The visitors were guests of the Lubbock County Farm Bureau association at luncheon, which was served at the college.

by a stray bullet.

Another American, Tedy Barnes, was found dead in Juarez after the battle. His body lay beneath several slain soldiers near federal headquarters at the Rio Bravo hotel. Barnes was a bartender in the Mint Cafe.

The battle began just after dawn and by noon the federal were ready to quit.

Hostilities Are Over

Driven to the banks of the river after a sharp street battle in which guns and rifles popped briskly for two hours, federal soldiers under General Mathias Ramos sent word to the American side through Brig. Gen. Moseley commander at Fort Bliss, that hostilities were over.

Within a short time a truce was arranged between rebel and federal chieftains. Casualties for the government were estimated at 14 dead and for the rebels nine dead. Many on each side were wounded.

Rebels with bands on their arms to distinguish them from their former fellows in arms of the Mexican army, slipped close to Juarez under cover of darkness today and when the mists of the early morning were rising the battle of gun fire was on.

Fire On Both Sides

Moving on Juarez from the east and west, the rebels opened fire simultaneously from both sides and at the same time a train of box cars backed down the tracks of the Mexican National railways into the heart of the city. There was a lull after the first onslaught as federal withdrew from house tops where they had posted machine guns and the fight concentrated in the main streets of the city, Calle Comercio and Sixteenth of September.

These thoroughfares, lined by open bars and gambling houses, won't be patronized by folks from the American side, were the scene of spectacular fighting. Some dead were left in the street and windows of buildings were shattered by bullets.

Federal Gradually Withdraw

Federal soldiers gradually withdrew and by 8 a. m. their forces were driven to the river bank and into an irrigation ditch west of the city. There they maintained desultory fighting throughout the morning. Stray bullets from the battle fell in El Paso where two children were reported wounded shortly after the conflict was under way.

A bullet went through the car of American army officers parked on the El Paso end of the International Bridge and some bullets flew ten or more blocks into the city.

The shooting became more desultory as the rebels slowly spanned the city. Shortly before noon Brig. Gen. Moseley crossed the International Bridge and conferred with the federal commander, General Ramos, asking permission to cross the federal lines to warn General Miguel Valles in charge of the rebel forces against firing across the river.

Position Hopeless

General Ramos suggested to Moseley that the federal position was such that it seemed hopeless to continue the battle and that he would be willing to quit if the rebels would cease firing and consent either to a guarantee of safety or permission for the federal to be interned on the American side.

Brig. Gen. Moseley then walked to the rebel headquarters in the Mesa Hotel, where he met General Valles, who accompanied him to the rebels house, which the rebels took after a brief skirmish late in the morning. Here the details of capitulation were discussed, and a truce called.

General M. J. Limon, one of the Juarez military commanders, narrowly escaped being shot when rebels fired with a machine gun from the top of a hotel building while the general was riding on a caboose. One of the trainmen was killed but General Limon was uninjured.

All morning the federal line, including about 50 soldiers and citizens volunteers and Fifth Cavalry men held the line along the river. There were frequent outbursts of rifle and machine gun fire interspersed with bugle calls.

Crowds Witness Show.

On the International bridge and at the ends of El Paso streets meeting the Rio Grande, there were large crowds braving chance bullets to witness the show. The occasional whine of a bullet sent scores scurrying behind buildings for shelter.

After the tide of battle ebbed, Mexicans thronged the streets of Juarez. Rebel officers took charge of affairs with the retreat of the federal to a dike at the river, and issued strict orders against looting. Conditions were orderly. Saloons were closed and business was suspended.

When General Moseley, accompanied by two aides and a number of newspapermen, drove with General Ramos to the headquarters of General Valles, a great throng of curious Mexicans swarmed about his automobile. The conference between the two was dramatic. General Moseley, opening the meeting, said:

"The first consideration that brought me over was that several bullets fired perpendicularly with the river's course crossed the line and wounded some persons. I wish to get assurance that this shall not be repeated."

Valles said he was sorry for this, but that it could not be helped. He declared he had issued strict orders that no American lives be endangered.

General Moseley then added: "General Ramos authorized me to say that he realized lack of hope in continuing defense in his position and that he would be glad to enter the United States territory and be interned if General Valles would issue an order to cease firing."

After further discussion General Valles accompanied General Moseley to the Mexican consulate. There an extended discussion was held over the question of whether the federal should cross into American territory or lay down their arms in Juarez under guarantees from rebels. It was reported that an agreement was made to intern the federal soldiers at Fort Bliss.

EL PASO, Mar. 8. (AP)—Three hundred Mexican federal were interned at Fort Bliss tonight, in execution of truce terms under which the federal surrendered the city of Juarez.

The men were stationed in barracks and in a riding hall at the fort, under guard, until their disposition can be decided by the United States government. The internment was under the direction of Brig. Gen. Van Horn Moseley, commandant at Fort Bliss.

The federal army in Juarez this morning was variously estimated at from 450 to 600 men. Most reports placed the force at the larger number. Where the balance above the 300 who were interned are, is not known but it is believed they have gone over to the rebellion.

LAREDO, Mar. 8. (AP)—The decisive battle of the Mexican revolution will be fought at Saltillo, just south of Monterrey, within the next four days, General Andreu Almazan, commander of the federal forces at Monterrey, told a representative of the Laredo Times, in an exclusive interview there today.

General Almazan said he and 3,000 troops were prepared to leave any hour to meet the forces of General Jose Gonzales Escobar, rebel chieftain thought to be mobilizing his forces at Torreon, 50 miles from Monterrey.
