KLUX KLAN PLATFORM DEFENDED BY SPEAKER

Dr. Hamlett, pastor of the First Baptist church of Austin, spoke to the crowd that filled the Wilhelmsa theatre Wednesday afternoon, in behalf of the Ku Klux Klan.

Good government and how the Ku Klux Klan stands for that and how the organization opposes monopolistic practices, wife beating, bootlegging and lawlessness in general were outlined and claimed for the Klan by the speaker.

Continuing, Dr. Hamlett said: "You have no right to condemn the Klan unless you know something about it. All of us have the right of free defense. Statements that the Klan are roughnecks are untrue. No gentleman can join the Klan. The Klan one must be a gentleman, so he who howls so loudly against the Klan might sometimes be suspected with suspicion, maybe he tries to join but couldn't get in."

The Klan defender declared his organization was not a political body, it was forced into the Texas election when it was jumped on. The big crowd cheered when he declared that he was only about a year old, and had done well to elect its candidates in every city in the State, except Galveston and San Antonio. He said a "demonstration" in Dallas of the anti-Klan organization in which he said only 800 persons took part and 600 of them klansmen.

Dr. Hamlett frequently emphasized that he spoke officially, that he was a Klansman.

Dr. Hamlett further said: "The Klan never takes the law into its own hands, but creates sentiment in it opposes mob violence. The Klan is not a real Klan, or function as a Klan, but some individuals in it, or it has its charter revoked. It does not seek to override the law but to maintain the law. The Klan would be the first to stamp out lawlessness."

Dr. Hamlett defended the secrecy of the organization. He told how its secrecy intimidated wife beaters and burglars. He declared the Jewish Knights of Columbus and the Knights of Columbus are both secret and no objection is raised by Protestants. He further justified the secrecy of the organization by citing the disguise used by the Boston Tea Party and the Klan used in an instance by Christ immediately preceding his capture in Gethsemane.

Dr. Hamlett said: "The Klan does two things which the parties concerned in the Klan, and if the notice if from the Klan it is signed by that Klan and the Klan seal. All action taken by the authorized Klan is signed by the Klan seal of that Klan. I charge anyone to cite a single instance where the Klan has used force and feathers."

The Knights of Columbus won't be a Protestant in the Jews won't be a Gentile in their organization, they howl when the Protestants have their own country founded by Protestants organize a secret society to keep them out. When they let us in the Knights of Columbus and the Klan society, we'll let them in the Klan Klan," said Dr. Hamlett.

He declared the Klan would be the organization to protect the Klan in their right to worship. They see fit, and added that the Klan insisted on worshipping as it pleased.

During his address the speaker was frequently applauded by the body of men and women, and on different occasions was interrupted by W. P. Florence, well known opponent of the Klan, who persisted in asking questions, which were answered by Dr. Hamlett.

MIDWEST HIGHWAY THROUGH PERRYTON

Representatives of the Midwest National Highway Association are planning to mark the route of the Midwest Highway from Hutchinson to the southwest, in a short time.

The markers are to be of metal, set on permanent posts in cement, with the right and left turns and straight away roads properly labeled. The name of the town ahead will show at the top of the marker, which is to be large enough to be seen for some distance. The direction will easily show and the name of the highway will be at the bottom of the board.

The route of this trail, for the present, is from Hutchinson to Amarillo, Texas. Later it is to be extended on to the northeast, through the route is not yet chosen.

Representatives of this association, who are working in conjunction with the Hutchinson Chamber of Commerce and other like organizations are determined to have a highway marked that will be the shortest between these two points, go over the best roads to be found and cover the distance by the shortest good mileage.

The route to be marked is to leave Hutchinson via First avenue west and go over the Sylvia hard road west to the Stafford county line, then on to the city of Stafford, then south to Pratt, passing just west of Iuka, then to Coats, Crofts, Belvidere, Coldwater, Protection and Beaver, Oklahoma, thence to Perryton, Spearman and Dumas in Texas to Amarillo, Texas.

The distance is about 450 miles. Every turn will be marked and in place where pavements are being constructed detours will also be marked.

The road crosses Oklahoma by passing through two counties, Harper and Beaver. The board of county commissioners of Harper county passed a resolution favoring marking this highway and will make all efforts to improve the roads and make them as good as can be for the travel that will pass this way.

A large delegation of citizens of Oklahoma and Texas communities interested in this highway met representatives of the Midwest at the Oklahoma-Kansas state line some time ago with R. H. Ross, of Rosston, as spokesman. They were given an official welcome to the state for the citizens of the county, the men were entertained royally and given all of the help possible.

There is a great deal of travel from Hutchinson to Amarillo, many people driving that way to get to Western Texas points and others going that way on a trip to California. The marking and improving of a road in that direction, therefore, is greatly needed.—Hutchinson News.

WASTE IN INDUSTRY

W. A. Durgin, assistant to Secretary of Commerce Hoover, says that a chief source of industrial waste is "the universal prevalence of enormously excessive varieties of goods." He cited a number of striking illustrations. There are 1,000,000 varieties of sizes, styles and kinds of shoes made in the United States; 6,964 of axes; 7,362 of fire-arms cartridges; 289 of American flags. The waste in six leading industries was placed at 40 per cent.

The program for the day started at 9 o'clock in the morning with the trap shoot staged by the members of the Perryton Gun Club. This shoot was open to all visitors. In this event the first money was won by Mr. Coate of Spearman, Second money by J. B. Nash of Perryton and third money by M. R. Coffee of Perryton.

The next number was the races for the children which were enjoyed very much by both the spectators and the contestants. We were unable to obtain a list of the winners of these contests.

Immediately after noon came the horse events. In the Tournament Riding, K. Duke and Paul Bowen of Lipscomb tied for first money and A. S. Brillhart of Perryton won the second prize. The Roping and Milking contest was one of the most laughable and novel events of the day. The contestants had to rope and milk a wild cow. The pair getting the most milk were the winners. K. Duke and Clint Hill of Lipscomb were declared the winners with Paul Bowen and D. D. Talliferro running them a close second. The Relay Horse Race was won by H. C. Brillhart with Dave Kettell in second place. In the Free-For-All Horse Race first place was taken by Knothead ridden by Roy Robbin and belonging to Hugh McFarland of Beaver. The rider of the winning horse, Roy Robbin, is an excellent rider for such a young boy. Second money in this race went to a party from Oklahoma City.

The ball game was witnessed by an enormous crowd and Canadian were the victors over Perryton by a score of 7 to 2. It was a good game and the fans should have been satisfied.

In the evening came the Boxing Show and the dance. The main go of the boxing show resulted in a victory for our home boy, Leonard Robinson, who knocked out Jack Davis of Wichita in two rounds. This fight was fast and furious while it lasted. The other bout between the light heavy weights also resulted in a knockout in the second round, "Kid" Penny of Chickasha, Oklahoma dropping Frankie Murray for the count. The preliminaries were very good.

TEXAS AMERICAN LEGION

Waco, Texas, August 22, 1922. The basis of representation of all local American Legion Posts in Texas to the State Convention at Waco on September 11th, 12th and 13th, has been announced by State Headquarters here as two delegates at large for each of the 370 posts, with an additional delegate for each twenty-five memberships above fifteen. On this basis there will be about two thousand delegates in attendance on the convention proper, but it is estimated that those who attend the Ladies Auxiliary Convention and the Divisional Reunion announced for the same dates, at least 5,000 visitors will be in the city.

The Hotels have pledged themselves to maintain normal rates and accommodations will be available at rates running from 50c for a cot to \$3.00 for room with bath. Plans are also afoot for the establishment of a camp with equipment borrowed from the National Guard where the ex-soldiers can rough it using army tents, cots and blankets, and perhaps an open mess which can furnish meals at "two-bits" each.

The entertainment for "Men only" will feature some good fights, a battle royal and wrestling contests. A big community dance, with plenty of pretty girls, a barbecue and watermelon feed will develop something of interest for every day that the veterans are in the city.

Special railroad rates of one and one-half fare for the round trip have been granted an certificates will be issued to all members of the Legion and the Auxiliary thru the local post over the state.

KEEP THE SPRING

PIGS GROWING

The spring pigs that are to make the farm meat next winter or are to be marketed by December or before, will pay for enough attention and feed to keep them growing. Of course, they need some hard or dry grain feed, but the three things we would stress are:

(1) Green feed or grazing, (2) some animal protein, tankage, fish meal, or milk, (3) mineral matter—charcoal, wood ashes and air-slaked lime 10 parts each, 4 parts salt and 1 part copperas. It is best to keep these three essentials before the pigs so they can take what they want.—The Progressive Farmer.

LEGS CRUSHED BY ENGINE

Roy Julian selected an uncommon and what proved to be a very unfortunate spot to take his noonday siesta on Wednesday of this week. He lay down under the big drive wheel of the engine which pulls the Wilbanks Brothers threshing machine Lawrence Wilbanks, engine man, not knowing of the presence of Mr. Julian, had stopped the engine while preparations were being made for a new set, and when everything was in readiness, climbed in the cab and threw in the clutch. As the monster engine moved forward the engineer heard a scream and immediately brought the engine to a standstill, but not until after it had passed over Mr. Julian's legs, horribly crushing the bones and mangle the flesh. A purse of \$209.20 was made up among the boys and on Thursday morning the young man was sent to Shattuck to a hospital, where he can be given the best of attention. Floyd Wilbanks owners of this threshing rig, says this is the only accident that ever occurred at his machine and he has ran machines for the past twenty years. It was a very regrettable affair and everyone sincerely hopes that Mr. Julian will speedily recover and that he will suffer no permanent disabilities.—Spearman Reporter.

BUSINESS BOOM

FEELS STRIKE'S

Industrial disturbances have begun to make themselves felt upon business, but the outstanding feature of the greater part of July has been the continuance of activity at the relatively high rate recently attained, according to the monthly summary issued by the Federal Reserve Board. Production has shown further increases in some lines, the Board declared, while in those normally affected noticeably by season influences the decreases have been relatively light.

"As the current month progresses," the Board said, "the effects of coal and railroad strikes began to be felt, but the effects have been relatively light. Bituminous coal mining has fallen off greatly since July 1, the consequence being that stocks have been further drawn upon. Anthracite production has been negligible, and stocks, with the exception of pea sizes, practically exhausted. The petroleum output continued large, with stocks accumulating."

Agricultural prospects are still very satisfactory for the country as a whole, although there has been considerable deterioration in the condition of wheat and oats. Fruit

crops are reported to be above the average and the tobacco outlook in general was excellent.

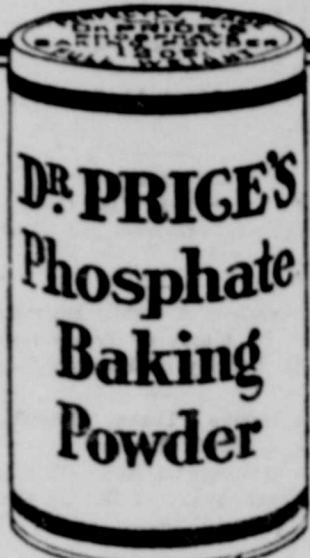

THE BUSINESS PULSE

The economic situation is con-
stantly being reviewed by such
Government authorities as the Fed-
eral Reserve Board and the Depart-
ment of Commerce. There is some-
thing of finality in the conclusions
of these branches of the Govern-
ment, and their bulletins to the pub-
lic are of the most optimistic sort.
One almost believes that were it not
for strikes and lockouts that the
Nation would now be in the heyday
of a boom. The banks, have "plen-
ty of money," and the rates of in-
terest in the big financial centers
have been greatly decreased. Six
per cent, which at one time was a
banker's "favor" has become almost
the standard rate. The stock, grain
and livestock exchanges report
healthy conditions in their affairs.
There has been increased produc-
tion in highly finished lines of
manufacture as well as in basic in-
dustries. Iron and steel have shown
increased production, and there is
significance in the automobile situa-
tion. Expensive distribution meth-
ods are everywhere being cut and
the manufacturers have come to re-
gard the "used car" as a serious
competitor in sales. As a result
there is all kinds of price-cutting
and a clearly defined inclination on
the part of manufacturers to make
up in increased production what
they will lose in the profits on small-
er numbers of sales.

In the building line the activity
has continued practically unabated.
Contracts during May amounted to
\$323,000,000 throughout the country.
This was about 50 per cent larger
than during the same month last
year. There has also been a steady
improvement in shoe manufacturing.
The official says that "most staple
crops have shown improvement dur-
ing the past month, and the ap-
proach of midsummer finds the

farming community as a whole an-
ticipating fully average yields." So,
on the whole, it may be observed
that the business pulse of the Na-
tion beats "steady and strong."

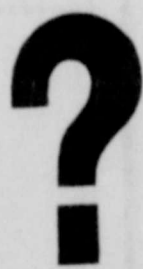

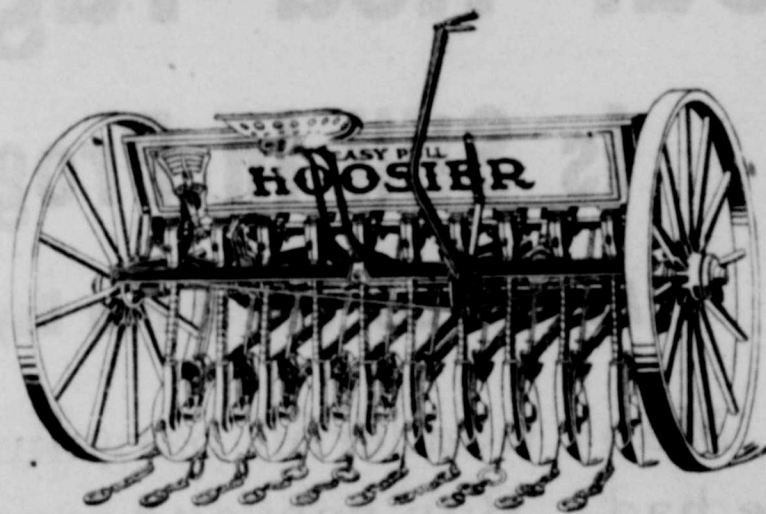

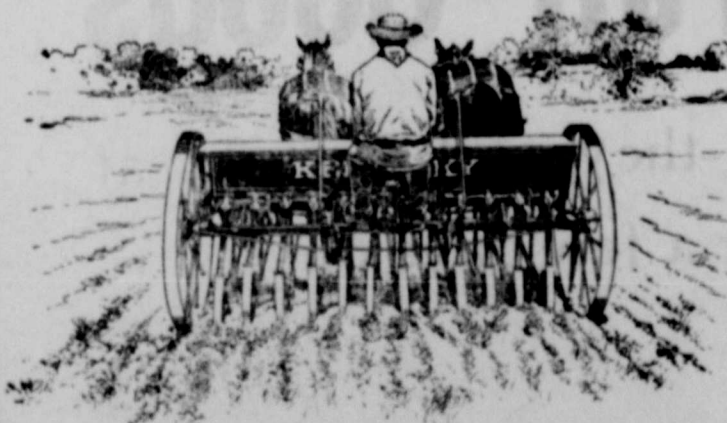

KEEPING ROADS IN REPAIR

"Experience in road construction has cost the taxpayers hundreds of millions of dollars and as many more will be spent before some who have to do with road building will learn just what type of highway to construct and how to take care of it after it is finished.

Most types of road will remain serviceable a long time if properly maintained, but the general impression of the County Commissioners and voters seems to be that a road once constructed at a cost of many thousands of dollars per mile, should last forever without further attention.

When a railroad company constructs a line, not costing many more dollars per mile than some of our

roads, and in some instances, not so much, they divide it up into sections and put a crew of men on each section to keep it in repair. If they did not do this, their original investment would soon be lost. If counties and road districts would patrol their new highways and keep them in thorough repair it is possible that they would still be serviceable even after the bonds had matured and had been canceled. Too often are our expensive roads worn out long before they have been paid for. Such has been the experience of every county and good roads district in the Southwest.

Serviceable roads in all seasons of the year are one of the necessities of the twentieth century, but it is a waste of money and uncalled for extravagance to spend from \$10,000 to

\$40,000 per mile in their construction only to let them go to pieces for want of attention. No county or road district should vote unless a sinking fund is provided for the cancellation of the bonds at maturity. It is of even more importance that a fund for maintenance be provided in order that taxpayers may get value received for the large expense necessary for the original construction." —Farm and Ranch.

EARLY PLOWING FOR WHEAT

One of two plots of the same ground used for comparison at Manhattan, Kan., returned one hundred dollars an acre more in eleven years, that the other without the expenditure of a dollar more. The difference was the difference between early plowing and late plowing. One was plowed in July of each year and one at the usual time in September.

Both plots were in wheat continuously and the value of the wheat from the July plowed land for the eleven years was two hundred and seventy-seven dollars and ninety-one cents while the value of the September plowed wheat was one hundred and seventy-three dollars and sixty-nine cents.

Perhaps you think that you haven't the time to do it but right now is the time to plow for winter wheat. If it means an increase of several dollars an acre, it ought to be worth taking the time. At least plow some of your acreage so that you may be able to compare the results with your usual methods, if you are not convinced. Eighty acres of wheat land plowed in July for eleven straight years would produce thousand, three hundred and twenty-seven dollars more than the average farmer who plows in September, gets in that time. Eight thousand dollars would pay off the mortgage—if you have one; it would build a pretty good new home with running water, bath rooms, toilets, electric lights, furnace heat, and modern conveniences which make life so much more worth living. If you were sure of having such a home in eleven years, don't you think that you would take time to plow in July? But if you consistently and persistently refuse to do your plowing in July, how are you going to find out whether it pays or not?

Plowing early and deep puts the soil into condition to absorb all the moisture that falls as well as retain what may be in it at the time. It also gives the ground time to settle, thus insuring quick germination and absorb moisture by pressure and they cannot get it from loose soil.

How to secure the largest possible returns for the time and labor expended is the farmer's greatest problem and any plan which gives promise of helping to solve that problem, put forth by a reputable authority, should receive consideration. The experts have always declared wheat is, and always will be "a gamble" on the Plains but if we are bound to gamble, why not do it as safely as possible? —Southwest Plainsman.

COAL PRODUCTION AND UNDERGROUND SUPPLY

Recent development in the coal industry of the United States lend to some figures of world production and consumption previously by the Trade Record of The City Bank of New York. The fact that the United States has more than one-half of the underground coal of the world supply of 42 1-2 per cent of the world's output from the beginning of the war to the end of 1920 as an annual average of about 100,000,000 tons, with a fall off in our own output, supplied but about 40 per cent of the world's coal production, in the immediately preceding year, 1920, our share of world production was 45 per cent.

vakia, Japan, Belgium, India, China, Australia and South Africa, are, in the order named, the world's chief coal producers and the countries here named normally supply approximately nine-tenths of the world's coal output. Our supremacy in this line is illustrated by the fact that our own output in 1920 was more than that of the three next largest producers of coal of the world. Great Britain, Germany and France, their 1920 output having aggregated but 510,000,000 tons, while our own output in that year was 583,000,000. Even in 1921, in which year our output fell to the lowest point since 1909, our total output was about equal to that of the three chief rivals above named, though this was due in part to the unusually low output of Great Britain in 1921.

The big increase in our coal production during the war, an advance from 458,000,000 tons in 1914 to

606,000,000 in 1918, was accompanied by great increases in our coal exports. They totaled, including bunker coal supplied to vessels in the foreign trade, in the fiscal year 1914, all of which preceded the war, 27 1-2 million tons, valued at \$86,000,000, and in the fiscal year 1921 49,000,000 tons, valued at \$435,000,000. While there was of course a big fall off in our coal exports in the fiscal year 1922, as was the case in the exports of all classes of merchandise, the value of the exports of coal in the year ending June 30, 1922 is about 50 per cent greater than that of the year preceding the war. Our total exports of coal (including bunker) since the beginning of the war have exceeded a billion dollars in value.

GENERAL SAWYER'S MISHAPS

Custom prescribes that the President of the United States shall have a "personal physician," but laws—of which we have so many, provide "an appropriation therefor." In consequence the President always brings along his family doctor and has him made a "Major," or something else in the Army, and assigned to the particular job of looking after the health of the inmates of the White House. It seems a ridiculous performance—nevertheless that is the way it is always done. President

Harding went his predecessors one-better and when the medico from his old-home town got into his army clothes his shoulder-straps showed him to be a "General." In explanation of his advancement over his predecessors it was announced that General Sawyer had been delegated special powers with regard to the public health. He was made chief-coordinator of the Federal Board of Hospitalization. But General's day-dream has been ruthlessly disturbed by the demands of many representative members of the American Legion that he "stand aside." It is claimed that General Sawyer has prevented the program of the Veteran's Bureau from going into effect, and letters assailing him indicate that he has not a proper appreciation of the physical and mental remedies that should be applied in caring for the men whose lives were wrecked by the war.

"The President's friend" might have been immune from these attacks had he been sworn in as a "Major," and contented himself with looking after the President's health. Ordinarily the only additional duties would have pertained to afternoon teas, receptions, golf, motoring, and similar enervating activities.

But poor old Dr. Sawyer was made a General and clothed with public duties. Evidently he has not been

giving satisfaction to the American Legion, and that organization is spoiling the old physician's fun. General Sawyer will probably be like the man in one of Shakespeare's plays who thought his "greatness" a-ripening only to discover that on the third day there "comes a frost." The pseudo-tragedy might have been avoided had the old Doctor been satisfied with the title of Captain, or even that of Major.

THE TREATMENT OF MALARIA

A number of subscribers have asked that details for treating malaria be given in The Progressive Farmer.

After a person has had malaria, the only remedy that will destroy the malaria parasites (germ) is quinine. If quinine is taken in large enough doses and for sufficient length of time, it will always destroy all the parasites. If the drug is not taken regularly for a long enough time, or if the doses taken are not large enough, it may fail to destroy all the malaria parasites, and after a few days or a few weeks, the person will have another attack of the disease.

The proper dose of quinine (quinine sulphate) for persons of different ages is as follows: Under 1 year of age 1/4 grain; 1 year, 1 grain; 2 years, 2 grains; 3 or 4 years, 3 grains; 5, 6, or 7 years, 4 grains; 8, 9, or 10 years,

6 grains; 11, 12, 13, or 14 years, 8 grains; 15 years or older, 10 grains.

To be most effective, one dose of quinine should be taken every night before going to bed for a period of eight weeks without intermission. If a person has acute malaria (fever or chills and fever) he should take the dose of quinine given above three times each day for three days, and then one dose every night for eight weeks.

A person who has had malaria should not stop taking quinine as soon as he feels well, as is often done, but should continue for the full eight weeks. This course will destroy the malaria parasites in the body of practically any person who carries it out. There are a very few exceptional cases that have to continue the drug longer than eight weeks.

Every person who has malaria in a community is a source of danger to other people living near him and especially to his own family. A person who has had chills and fever or other form of malaria within 12 months and hasn't taken quinine as directed above is probably still a malaria carrier and should take quinine.—Dr. Washburn, in The Progressive Farmer.

If one really wants fruit, it may be gotten by the payment of the price in diligence and care. We must cultivate the trees, feed them with proper fertilizer, and keep them clean by proper spraying.—C. L. Newman, in The Progressive Farmer.
