The Winningham Blacksmith & Machine Shop was destroyed by fire last Saturday night. The building and contents were a total loss for the firm. Mr. Winningham was in the shop at the time of the fire. He was in home Sunday afternoon and did not learn of his loss until his arrival here. From all indications it was very much as if this fire was incendiary origin. If this be the case no expense should be spared in bringing the guilty culprits to trial. There is no crime so dastardly and cowardly as that of arson. A man who will stand out in the open and put you down is a credit to this community.

Mr. Winningham's loss was partially covered by insurance, he carries \$3,800.00 on the building and contents. His loss not covered by the insurance will be about \$2,500.00. As an act of settlement is made with the insurance companies Mr. Winningham will erect a fire-proof building to take care of his big business.

FERTILIZER

Henry Ford promises to make nitrate fertilizer so cheap that farmers throughout the country will be encouraged to use it to keep their soil fertility up to maximum if the Muscle Shoals deal goes through. If Ford does thus cheapen fertilizer, one result should be the doubling of the productive capacity of American farms. Millions of acres, even in the comparatively new West, are producing far short of capacity, because of diminution of fertility consequent upon constant cultivation and little or no renewal of strength.

The National Fertilizer Association, composed of concerns now manufacturing fertilizer and selling it to farmers can afford to pay the prices demanded, is sending out propaganda against the Muscle Shoals deal. Editor, congressmen and other persons who may influence legislation and public opinion are receiving a series of illuminated sheets, called "Truth About Muscle Shoals."

A national guessing contest might be established, and a bag of fertilizer awarded to the person making the most nearly correct answer to the question: "Why Doesn't the National Fertilizer Association Wish Henry Ford to Have Muscle Shoals?" —Wichita Eagle.

FARMERS SAY PUREBREDS BEAT ORDINARY STOCK

It is the consensus of opinion of 500 growers of purebred and grade live stock who were questioned by the United States Department of Agriculture that the purebred sire is from 10 to 400 per cent better than the ordinary sire. This applies to all classes of live stock. Many of the men who replied to the department's questionnaire gave figures and specific instances to back up what they had to say regarding the remarkable improvement effected in a relatively short time.

In reply to the question as to the value of their example in inducing others in the community to take up improved live stock of these farmers and breeders said that they had been the means of starting at least two or three, and one man who had been raising purebreds for 40 years said he had influenced every man in the neighborhood.—B. A. I. Editorial.

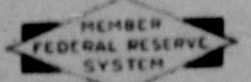

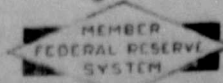

DECIDING WHERE TO BUY

The success of a business depends on its ability to analyze the mental operations of the public, and to determine how people decide as to where they shall buy goods. The merchants who read the public mind most accurately get the business.

Consequently the inner consciousness, when asked what or where a person should buy, is apt to respond by suggesting certain advertised goods.

It is of course true that while a store by advertising can always draw a lot of new trade, it can't keep it unless it really does give good values. But advertising helps a store to that, notably in these two ways:

1. Advertising encourages merchants to handle big lots when such are offered them at low figures. They know that by appealing to the public by advertising, they can swing these big lots and turn them into money in a short time. Thus buying in a large way and taking advantages of special opportunities, they are able to offer special values.

2. Advertising increases volume of trade, thus reducing the operating and overhead expense per article, making it possible to cut prices to the public. The advertised store buys and operates at low figures, and can thus make low prices.

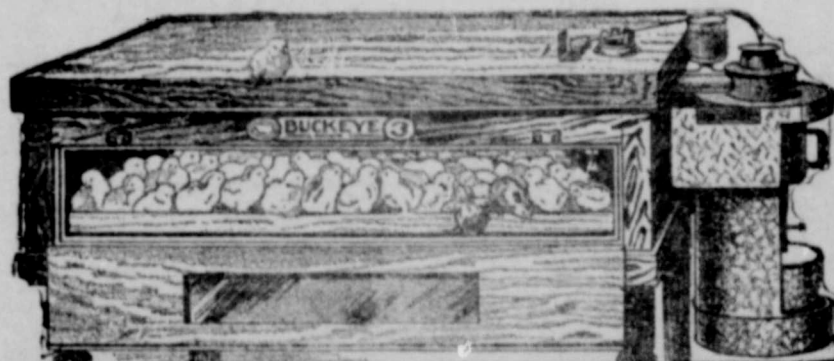

LOST THE COUNTY SEAT FIGHT

On the face of the returns from Tuesday's election it would seem that Spearman has lost the county seat fight. Over-confidence and a lack of through organization of the Spearman forces may be given as the prime cause of the defeat. Also, the cattle-men of the west end of the county have been hit hard by low prices and they were afraid the removal of the county seat would incur an additional expense which would have to be met by an increased tax on their lands and herds. Precincts on and five, which vote at Spearman, stood by the colors loyally, counting out 246 for removal to 16 against. But Malock takes the cake as the champion exponent of removal, giving the proposition a solid vote of 13. Kimball gave 10 for and 14 against; Grand Plains, 3 for and 41 against; Pleasant Hill, 5 for and 43 against, and Oslo 43 against. Total: For removal, 277; against removal, 157. It will be seen that a great majority of the people of the county favor the removal of the county seat to Spearman, but the returns show a lack of 38 votes of giving the two-thirds majority necessary for removal. Or, had the opposition received only 19 fewer votes, Spearman would have won the fight. —Spearman Reporter
