COOLIDGE LEADS IN CEREMONIAL
GUNS DISPLAYED AS CHICAGO GOES TO POLLSBITTER BATTLE
OF BALLOTS IS
VOTE FORECASTMACHINE GUNS AND MANY
EXTRA POLICEMEN ARE
GUARDING VOTERS(By Associated Press)
CHICAGO, Feb. 22.—The climax in Chicago's most bitter majority primary campaign in years was reached today when the guarded polls were thrown open to voters.

No intense was the feeling over the battle of republican factions for control of the city administration that a special police detail of more than 3,000 men was assigned to polling places with machine gun patrol of more turbulent wards.

Mayor William E. Dwyer's renomination by the democrats also was in the hands of the voters but he was considered an easy party victory and the issue of the day was Edward J. Litsinger's attempt to prevent a comeback by William Hale (Big Bill) Thompson, the city's world war mayor in the republican race.

Litsinger had the support of the republican forces behind Charles S. DeLoach, United States senator, but with Thompson stood his old ally, State's Attorney Robert E. Crowe, and the former mayor forecast at least 100,000 votes to secure his favor.

With factional leaders thus arrayed against each other, the fire was heated on the fire by the vituperation and exchange of filthy personalities on the part of both Litsinger and Thompson, who swept from national issues to table manners in their appeals to voters for the opportunity to run against the democratic aspirant in the April election.

Independent is Strong
A third figure in the day's events although his name was not on the ballot was Dr. John D. Robertson, who withdrew as a republican primary candidate and placed himself in the April race by filing a petition of 42,724 names as candidate for the "people's ownership—smash crime rings" party.

One republican judge and two Litsinger-Dwyer workers were kidnapped by seven armed men who drove up to the sixth precinct polling place in the twenty-sixth ward, just before time to open.

On gaining advantage by asking to see one of the judges, the men produced revolvers and herded the three into their automobile. Police were unable to trace the automobile, which bore no license plates.

Argentina Not To
Aid Coolidge Plan(By The Associated Press)
BUENOS AIRES, Feb. 22.—Argentina, replying to President Coolidge's proposal for a conference to consider limitation of naval armaments, says the Argentine government prefers to await the decision of the preparatory disarmament commission which, meeting under League of Nations auspices at Geneva, has been studying a program for an international disarmament conference.

If that initiative should fail, the government explains, then the moment will have arrived to consider a solution. "Less general and perhaps easier of realization."

The reply has been delivered to the American embassy for transmission to Washington.

Italy Ruins Plans
WASHINGTON, Feb. 22 (AP).—Italy, like France, has turned thumbs down on the American five-power naval limitation proposal and thus has apparently scrapped the hope of a Washington administration officials for a conference and ultimate agreement among the five leading powers for lighter battle craft restriction.Argentina Reply A Surprise
WASHINGTON, Feb. 22 (AP).—The Argentine government's decision to "reply" to American five power naval limitation conference proposal caused surprise at the state department. No response was expected, from that quarter, since the American proposal was addressed only to Great Britain, Japan, France and Italy. Copies were sent to Argentina, Brazil and Chile as a matter of courtesy and for their information.Baroness Derlanger
Dies At Age Of 84

PARIS, Feb. 22 (AP).—The death of Baroness Frederick Derlanger is announced by the Paris edition of the New York Herald-Tribune. She was a daughter of John S. Sillid, who was confederate commissioner to France. She was 84 years of age. John Sillid was sent to Paris by Jefferson Davis, president of the confederate states in 1861. He never returned to America, living in England until his death at London in 1871.

Immunity Not Given
To Trial Witnesses

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22 (AP).—By a vote of 9 to 9, the house judiciary committee today failed to approve a bill which would have granted immunity to certain witnesses whose testimony is needed by government special counsel in the Sinclair oil trial which resumes here April 25. The bill, introduced by Chairman Graham, was drafted by Alton Pomeroy and Owen J. Roberts, counsel for the government in the oil cases. In a letter to Mr. Graham K. Roberts, said that unless the bill was passed, the government probably would be "unable to prove certain facts which ought to be proved."

COUPLE FOUND SLAIN

TOLEDO, Ohio, Feb. 22 (AP).—Mr. and Mrs. Alex Schuster were found shot and hacked to death in their home here today. The supposition is that the husband killed his wife and committed suicide. Three young children were asleep in an adjoining bedroom when police arrived.

HERE INDICATES
CITY'S ADVANCEFIRST "HELLO BOX" HERE
21 YEARS OLD TODAY;
PROGRESS GREAT

Twenty-one years ago today the first "hello" was called over a local telephone exchange in Lubbock and inhabitants of sixty business houses and residences vied with each other in talking over the new fangled device and this afternoon the local branch of Southwestern Bell Telephone company is celebrating the formal opening of its new building on Broadway, with service for thousands of people and connection even with London.

Until February 22, 1906, one telephone line had run into the John R. Robinson land office from Plainview and it was over this that telegrams and telephone calls came to Lubbock. The line came mostly over pasture fences.

Charles W. Alexander and George T. Curtis opened the exchange in a building just east of the old Nicolett hotel and Mr. and Mrs. Alexander operated the board, giving night service on emergency calls. R. C. Burns later bought an interest in the concern, the State Plains Telephone company, and then Mr. Curtis sold his interest to J. E. Alexander. At the end of five years, when there were 400 telephones, the company sold to Southwestern Bell company. In the meantime long distance connections had been secured with ranches in this section and with Gal, through Big Spring and the outside world.

Mexican Jailed On
Gun Toting Charge

Tom Razon, Mexican about 25 years old, was arrested by county officers Tuesday morning and lodged in the Lubbock county jail on a charge of carrying concealed weapons. The Mexican, who at one time is said to have been a police officer here, is charged with having threatened one or two people and with having resisted arrest.

He was brought here from Slaton, where he was taken into custody shortly before noon. A large calibre revolver and several rounds of ammunition were taken from him.

Little Damage Done
By Grice Home Fire

Fire which broke out in the attic of the Wallace Grice home at 1414 Avenue E last night was extinguished by the Lubbock fire department before much damage was done, except to the furniture of the home which was shaken and broken by neighbors and members of the family in removing it from the house.

The damage from fire was confined largely to the roof, a small hole being burned through the ceiling and roof. The house is owned by B. F. Hodges.

Four boys were in considerable trouble at police headquarters here this morning after a bicycle war. The trouble started at the station seeking to identify a bicycle that had been taken in as lost or stolen. The wheel was identified by one boy as his, and another also laid claim to it. Argument waxed warm as to which of the two was really the owner, and Desk Sergeant J. T. Inman was called upon to intervene and settle the differences. After much argument pro and con by supposed owners of the wheel, it developed that the boys were laying claim to the property by virtue of each having certain pieces of the assembled machine. The matter was finally settled by tearing the wheel down, and doling out to each boy parts claimed by him. Each left the building apparently satisfied.

Death Toll Is 21
In Eastern Storm(By The Associated Press)
NEW YORK, Feb. 22.—The mounting death toll of the blizzard that swept the Atlantic seaboard for three days had reached 21 today with the possibility that seven members of a ship's crew who took to lifeboats, had drowned.

The four-masted schooner Camilla May Paige floundered off Brigantine beach, N.J. The body of Captain Warren Grace of Philadelphia was washed ashore and when coast guardsmen finally made their way aboard the ship they found the crew of seven. The schooner, lumber-laden was bound from Jacksonville for New York.

Snow Storm Continues
New England continued the grip of a severe snow storm with several towns isolated. The snow fall averaged a foot.

The sea subsided off the New Jersey coast. Property loss along the New York and New Jersey coasts was estimated at between \$2,000,000 and \$5,000,000.

Hoffman Funeral To
Be Held On Thursday

SLATON, Feb. 22 (Special).—Funeral services for C. C. Hoffman, pioneer business and civic leader of Slaton, who was found dead in his office here yesterday morning, will be held Thursday afternoon, with the Rev. W. M. Lane, pastor of the First Methodist church officiating. First plans were to hold burial rites today but they were later changed to await the arrival of a son from Austin and a brother from Salt Lake City.

Find Fragments Of
Borger Blast Victim

BORGER, Texas, Feb. 22 (AP).—Only fragments of Homer Russell's body have been recovered following the explosion of 1,800 quarts of nitroglycerine at the magazine plant of the Independent-Tribune company here yesterday afternoon. No trace has yet been found of Davis, who is said to have been with Russell at the time of the explosion.

The prairie fire which was started by the explosion which for a time threatened two other large magazines in the vicinity, was still burning Tuesday morning having been whipped in opposite direction by a brisk west wind.

Russell is survived by his widow living in Amarillo. His former home was in Winfield, Kansas.

TEXAS LEASES PURCHASED

INDEPENDENCE, Kan., Feb. 22 (AP).—The Prairie Oil and Gas company today announced the purchase of 4,700 acres of leases in Brown county, Texas, from J. S. Couden, Inc., of Tulsa. The deal was consummated here yesterday at the Prairie offices. Mr. Couden and A. G. Reed, vice president of the company from Fort Worth, were here for the transaction. There are fifty undeveloped shallow sand wells and much undeveloped acreage included in the deal.

APPOINTMENT RUMORED

AUSTIN, Feb. 22 (AP).—Reports that Will Tucker of Longview has been appointed state game, fish and oyster commissioner by Governor Moody were current here today. The governor is expected to send up Tucker's name to the senate for confirmation tomorrow. For several weeks, the game department has been without an official head due to the resignation of T. E. Hubby of Waco.

LUBBOCK JOINS NATION IN PAYING
TRIBUTE TO WORKS OF WASHINGTON

Lubbock today is paying its tribute of respect to the memory of George Washington "Father of His Country," with many business houses of the city closed. Flags were flying from standards equipped by the Boy Scouts, in front of practically every business house in the city.

TWO COUNTRIES
PAY HOMAGE TO
GREAT PATRIOTMOODY AND SOLONS WILL
AID IN CEREMONY ON

LAREDO, Texas, Feb. 22.—The people of two countries today shook hands across the Rio Grande on the proposition that George Washington was a great man and the father of one of them.

Laredo, Texas and Nuevo Mexico, were joint hosts to Governor Dan Moody of Texas, other state officials from both sides of the river, Mot Fritth, Texas legislators and some 30,000 visitors.

Miller Is Governor
LAREDO, Texas, Feb. 22.—Lieutenant Governor Barry Miller of Dallas was Governor of Texas for about fifteen seconds today.

During the meeting of the international bridge in connection with the joint celebration of Washington's birthday, the lieutenant governor showed the scroll-thatched young governor across the main line. Miller thus by law attained a few seconds the dignity of governorship in the governor's "absence from the state."

Moody was standing near the corral post on the bridge marking the international boundary line to shake hands with A. P. Carrillo, main consul general when Lieutenant Governor Miller, here with members of the 40th legislature, suddenly pushed Moody over into Mexico while the crowd laughed. George Washington maintained in peace what he secured in war—liberty. Governor Moody told the throngs of thousands gathered on Laredo's public square in the semi-tropical sun for the chief ceremony of the two Laredos' annual celebration of Washington day.

Government American Success

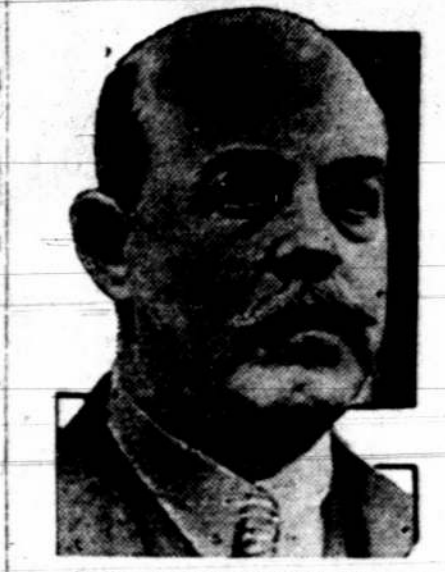

It was decided yesterday. As the GOP has an acknowledged majority in the house his nomination is regarded as equivalent to election.

MARIION, ILLINOIS, Feb. 22 (AP).—Answering a woman's telephone call for help, police early today found the bodies of Mrs. Mae Collins and her husband, Ray Collins, at their home here. Collins apparently had killed his wife and then shot himself, as a 28 calibre revolver was within four inches of his hand.

Mrs. Collins filed suit for divorce in January and by filed a cross bill, which charged infidelity. The case was on the circuit court docket for this week.

OIL CUT ANNOUNCED

DALLAS, Feb. 22 (AP).—Oil above 51.9 gravity was cut 30 cents in a schedule of prices paid for crude in Oklahoma and Kansas announced today by the Magnolia Petroleum company here and effective from 7 a. m. Below 28 gravity oil was unchanged and intermediate gravity oils were cut in proportion. The new prices range from \$1.20 for below 28 gravity to \$2.24 for 32 gravity and above.

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WHOLE CAPITAL
TAKES PART IN
VAST CEREMONYPRESIDENT DELIVERS AN
ADDRESS TO WORLD
OVER RADIO(By The Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Feb. 22.—Official and unofficial Washington, led by President Coolidge, set the example for the nation today in celebrating the 150th anniversary of the birth of George Washington.

While scores of meetings of patriotic organizations and other ceremonies were getting under way early in the day, arrangements were being perfected to carry the voice of the president, during his Washington birthday address before a joint session of the house and senate, by radio to the four corners of the country and Europe.

Untold millions were given an opportunity to hear the president speak, shortly after noon, through an unprecedented chain of 42 broadcasting stations. Thousands of others across the seas were prospective listeners under arrangements made by two stations, KDKA, at Pittsburgh, and WGY at Schenectady, to transmit the address over the Atlantic and Pacific.

Ceremonies Start At Noon

The capitol ceremony, setting in motion plans for the 200th anniversary celebration of Washington's birthday in 1932, was to start about 12:15 p. m. eastern standard time, and the president's address soon thereafter was to mark his first personal appearance before the sixty-ninth congress, during its nearly two years of existence.

The house chamber, as is the custom for joint sessions, was the scene of the principal ceremony for the day, observed here as a legal holiday, and although government departments and business houses generally closed down, congress planned to force ahead with its legislative program as soon as the president's address was over.

Important Men To Act

Sir Esme Howard, the British ambassador, Major General Charles P. Summerall, chief of staff, and many others assumed leading roles at other celebrations.

In an address prepared for delivery during his presentation to Adelaide Emley, a school girl, of a gold medal for her essay on William Pitt, the "Great Commoner" of England, Sir Esme Howard paid tribute to both Pitt and Washington.

"It always seems to me," he said, "that there was something akin in

Hollywood Has Surely Changed Our Manon

NEW YORK, Feb. 22.—That's what Manon gets for going to Hollywood, commented a wag in the lobby at the world premiere of "When a Man Loves" yesterday.

And that is a pretty good comment, for the Warner Brothers' film version of the tragic story of "Manon Lescaut" with Dolores Costello as Manon and John Barrymore as the lad who finds the priesthood to escape himself in the hectic life of the spoiled young beauty.

But alas, poor Manon, we know her

not! In the hands of the extremely pretty Miss Costello she becomes an ingenue which she is anything else but in the tale. The mercenary note is hardly suggested and a deliberate sympathy is built by means of three tears, puffed kisses and such like.

I predict for "When a Man Loves" a long run and a merry one, but just the same, it brought many a gasp from the hard-boiled news paper folk who had known Manon before she went to Hollywood.

The audience became most eloquent on those last feverish moments when Manon was shown aboard a French prison ship, en route to the Louisiana penal colony with the other undertrials of the Paris prisons. In the hold was our good friend, Barrymore, seeing the chained hilly apes to revolt.

And revolt they do. When "Manon" wrote we see unhappy Manon in death throes and no despairing lover, but rather two lovers cheek to cheek, sailing toward that dear America, where lies freedom, love and all the rest.

But how we rise to ask the scenarist, are they going to explain them-

self when they reach the American shore? After all, the French penal colony will still be there and who will say they were and how will they explain their coming? The wise film writer stopped just in time. Had he allowed them to land on American soil the ending might not have been so happy.

Be that as it may, there is in this film a continuation of the splendid photography that has marked the films ever since "Variety" and odd pictures from Germany gave a few tips on angles, shadows and trick effects.

There is from John Barrymore quite the dullest piece of acting he has done. Never was he more self-conscious than as the youthful lover and never was he more professed. We cannot accept him as a screen fixture, somehow, Miss Costello is made exquisitely lovely in some of the soft focused closeups and there are bits of direction in splendid taste.

He pointed also to the plans of the Ladies Auxiliary in assisting the Legion program, and offered a plea for more active membership in this unit of the work.

Woods Outlines Plan
H. B. Woods, former Commander of the Post here, and now executive committee member from the 18th district, Texas Department, outlined briefly the meaning of the convention that is to meet in Lubbock next May, and in a few well chosen words, told of efforts of the Legion to see that disabled war veterans are more properly cared for. He explained that \$125 of the \$3 annual membership dues of the post here goes to state headquarters to finance the program of the Texas Department, and that through this means, the hospitalization and rehabilitation program of the Legion is being slowly but steadily advanced.

The American Legion, Mr. Woods said, means much more than just a mere meeting of ex-service men who pay their dues and meet every so often for a good time and discussion of the war around which so many memories center. It means concerted effort, not on behalf of the men who came out of the war uninjured and able to take up the regular pursuits of life, but a strong effort on behalf of those men, who, by virtue of their injuries, the most of which are permanent, are not now able to reenter life and make their way as they were before they offered their all on the altar of their country.

Plans For Sunshine
"These are the men who need and deserve attention, and it is the duty of every able bodied man, especially ex-service men, to align themselves with the Legion to the end that these human wrecks, who gave their all, might have a little sunshine and merriment during the remaining days of their tortuous life. The small sum that each man pays for the benefits of the organization is more than recompensed by the actual merriment and satisfaction he derives from mixing and mingling with his fellows, but this is a mere circumstance to the good that can be done on behalf of the boys who are not able to mingle with their comrades."

Members included Chas. Whitcomb, who told of the loan feature of the department insurance policies, and a representative of the Legion post at Loveland. A delegation of six or seven Loveland legionnaires attended the meeting.

C. I. A. ORGANIZING CLUB FOR INTERNATIONAL PEACE

DENTON, Feb. 21.—A club based on international relations is being organized at the College of Industrial Arts under the auspices of the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace. Membership is limited to thirty students.

The Carnegie endowment will furnish each club under its supervision with literature on international problems. A niche in the C. I. A. library will be reserved for this information.

DIAZ SUGGESTS A PEACE PACT

President Of Nicaragua Asks Washington For New Treaty Soon

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22.—Interest in the military aspects of the Nicaraguan situation has been dwarfed somewhat in official circles as a result of receipt by the Washington government of a preliminary draft of a proposed peace pact for a new treaty with the United States.

Although details of the proposition, which American Minister Eberhardt has forwarded by mail to Washington, have not yet been received, and officials refuse to divulge their general nature, it is understood to seek treaty guarantees for the protection of Nicaragua from external attack or internal disorders brought about by outside interference in her affairs.

Attitude Kept Secret

State department officials have also declined to intimate what this government's attitude toward the proposition might be, or to say whether they were formulated by Diaz after conferences with Minister Eberhardt. It is recalled in some quarters, however, that the treaty by which the United States acquired the right to a canal route across Nicaragua also permits the use of Nicaraguan territory to a certain extent by this country for Panama canal defense, and that in view of this treaty, the Diaz suggestions might be for negotiating a treaty similar to the new American Panama pact. The latter calls for cooperative defense of the Panama canal and, it is presumed, permits American assistance in preventing internal disorders indicated or inspired by any third country in Panama.

Yanks Entrenched

Meanwhile, American marines and bluecoats are firmly implanted along the Corinto-Managua railroad in Nicaragua and in the hill fortifications at Managua known as the Loma, the latter force having been moved from barracks inside the town to strengthen the protective circle around the country capital against possible attacks from liberal forces of Juan B. Sacasa. Although the Loma has been reduced to 12 officers and 141 men, 17 of whom are 350 men are now stationed at Chinandega and will do patrol duty on the Managua-to-sea railroad between Corinto and Leon. Another detachment of 20 officers and 450 men is based at Leon and patrolling that section from there to the capital.

"ISLAND UNIVERSES"

MT. WILSON, Calif., Feb. 22.—With cameras and the giant reflecting telescopes of the observatory here, Dr. Edwin Hubble has been studying the nebular universe outside our own solar system. These "extra-galactic" objects, he says, are not actually gaseous nebulae, but are actually groupings of stars. Dr. Hubble finds that within a distance of 500,000,000,000,000 miles, these groups are evenly distributed, with one spiral for a cubic space represented by the figure 7 and 56 ciphers.

GANGS IN CHICAGO

CHICAGO, Ill., Feb. 22.—There are 1312 gangs in Chicago, according to a report just completed by Dr. Frederick M. Thrasher, who offers it as a text-book in sociology. "The Gangs" represents a seven-year serious study of gangdom and is hailed as the first authentic survey of Chicago's underworld.

Chinese Naval Guns Bomb Part Of French Land

SHANGHAI, Feb. 22 (AP)—A Chinese nationalist gunboat stationed in the Whangpoo river today attempted to shell Kiangnan arsenal, once one of the greatest in China. The attempt fell short of success but at least five shells dropped in the French concession nearby and the residences of two Americans were damaged. Two Chinese were killed, but there no foreign casualties.

French concession volunteers, special police and French marines were mobilized for patrolling the streets of the French concession, which is separate from the international settlement. The American residences damaged were those of William Rae and F. W. Schlobohm. Mrs. Rae and her children fled from their home. A shell exploded in a bedroom of the Schlobohm home.

The guns of the gunboat were defective, causing the shells to drop short of the Kiangnan arsenal.

10 Shells Are Fired
Five shells fell in the French district, and five in the native city. The Chinese cruisers were prevented from taking part in the bombardment by two French gunboats, who trained their guns upon the Chinese cruisers, but did not fire.

The Chinese cruisers, it was learned, had agreed to betray Marshal Sun Chuan-fang, ruler of Kiangsu province, and turn over to the nationalists (Cantonese) who are directing a campaign against Shanghai. Their plan was to steam up the Whangpoo river to join the nationalist army above Sunkiang.

Paint Jazz Tobacco Help Buy 7 States

STANTON, Va., Feb. 22 (AP)—Much has been said and written about jazz paint and tobacco, but little said of the fact that success of the first "League of Nations" depended largely upon them.

They were part of the price paid for that vast territory which now includes the states of West Virginia, Kentucky, Indiana, Ohio, Michigan, Wisconsin and Illinois, as revealed in a deed now on record here.

A full council of Indians met at Logansport, on the Ohio river August 2, 1743, to sell the land so much desired by the early settlers of the Valley of Virginia to George Croghan, of the province of Pennsylvania.

The purchase price included 50 pounds of vermilion, ten dozen jews harps, 120 pounds of tobacco, and calico, serge, ribbon, live arms, ammunition, knives and hatchets.

FUNDS NEEDED HOUSE IS TOLD

Second Deficiency Bill Seen By Solons Laboring On Annual Holiday

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Feb. 22.—Carrying a total of \$63,400,557, the second deficiency appropriation bill was reported today to the house.

The measure has a two-fold purpose, the meeting of deficits that have occurred in current appropriations, and the supplying of funds for work that must be done before next year's appropriations become available July 1.

The major item of \$37,200,000 would be for payment of pensions, principally those to Spanish war veterans.

For purchase of 650 armored trucks and cars to safeguard mail deliveries against bandits, \$500,000, and to pay for marine guards of the mails \$342,500.

For rearrangement of world war veteran's graves in France \$94,953 is recommended with an additional \$158,000 to purchase marble headstones and otherwise mark graves overseas.

The bill also carries \$50,000 to complete the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Arlington cemetery.

the characters of the Great American whose birthday we are gathered to celebrate today and this Englishman who so passionately strove to preserve America for men of British race and of English speech."

Washington Sees Success "Washington," he continued, "saw his efforts to found a great independent country crowned with success. But saw his apparently ending in failure when the rulers of Great Britain followed a policy which he believed must lead a rupture between the mother country and the American colonies."

In his address, prepared for delivery at a joint meeting of the sons, daughters and children of the American revolution, General Summerall discussed Washington's "almost prophetic vision as to our national defense."

Voice Reaches Out WASHINGTON, Feb. 22.—From the historic chamber of the House of representatives, the voice of Calvin Coolidge today reached out over the nation and into foreign lands to sound the commanding note in tribute to America's first president.

Speaking at a joint session of congress, Mr. Coolidge declared before the hushed audience official life that Washington had come to personify the republic, and that he was "a builder, a creator, a man with a national mind."

The president began speaking at 12:30 p. m. The largest radio hook up ever attempted, 42 stations, broadcast his words and endeavored to carry the speech across both the seas and the continent.

When the president entered, the assemblage rose and applauded. Senator Pease of Ohio, chairman of the George Washington Bicentennial commission, then introduced the president.

Another rising ovation greeted the president as he began reading his speech from manuscript and the clicking of a battery of cameras in the gallery.

The president described Washington as a man who had a "national mind." "He was consistently warning his countrymen of the danger of settling

Teaches On Religion "It was with clear vision that the first president looked upon religion," Mr. Coolidge continued, "because for him there was little in it of emotionalism."

"He placed it on a firmer, more secure foundation, and stated the benefits which would accrue to his country as the result of faith in spiritual things, the president said. He recognized that religion was the main support of free institutions, x x x without bigotry, without intolerance he appeals to the highest spiritual nature of mankind. His genius has filled the earth."

Strong At Berlin NEW YORK, Feb. 22.—President Coolidge's speech in Washington today was heard "clear and strong" in Berlin, said a cable from the national broadcasting company this afternoon.

PARIS, Feb. 22.—President Coolidge's speech before congress today was heard distinctly and completely by radio amateurs in Paris and environs.

Clear In London LONDON, Feb. 22.—(Six p. m.) President Coolidge's Washington day address before the joint session of congress was coming through remarkably well, judging from reports received from radio listeners up to the time this dispatch was filed. Even owners of crystal sets could listen in on the president's speech, as it was picked up from the Atlantic and re-broadcast from the high power stations of the British broadcasting company.

Soft Foods Often Lead to Decay of Teeth

BY DR. MORRIS FISHBEIN

Editor Journal of the American Medical Association and of Hygiene, the Health Magazine

MANY factors are involved in decay of the teeth. When the child is young, the food that it takes is absorbed by the intestinal tract and sent through the blood to take care of the deficiencies in various tissues.

The enamel of the human tooth is a finished product and it is not possible to affect it greatly by the diet after it is once completed. Foods do, however, exert a considerable influence on tooth decay. If some of the lower animals are fed on foods that require little or no chewing, the teeth decay rapidly.

Sugar Causes Decay

When emigrants come to this country their teeth seem to decay more rapidly than they do abroad, and dietitians are inclined to trace decay to a change of diet, particularly to the fact that the American diet contains a far greater amount of sugar than do the diets of foreigners.

Many of our foods are overprepared and prepared and predigested. When eaten, much of the starchy material remains about the teeth, and is changed by the action of the ferment in the saliva to sugar. Fermentation takes place rapidly, and decay follows.

Citrus Fruits Help

Those who have studied the diet in the relation to the teeth are inclined to recommend that persons eat coarse foods which require chewing. The use of the citrus fruits, such as oranges, lemons and grapefruit, seems to help in bringing about a proper condition in the mouth, through the action of the citric acid.

Brushing of the teeth thoroughly morning and evening and after each meal is desirable if the teeth are not properly spaced so that food tends to remain in the crevices. Cavities should, of course, be filled and the deposits of tartar should be removed at least twice each year by a competent dentist.

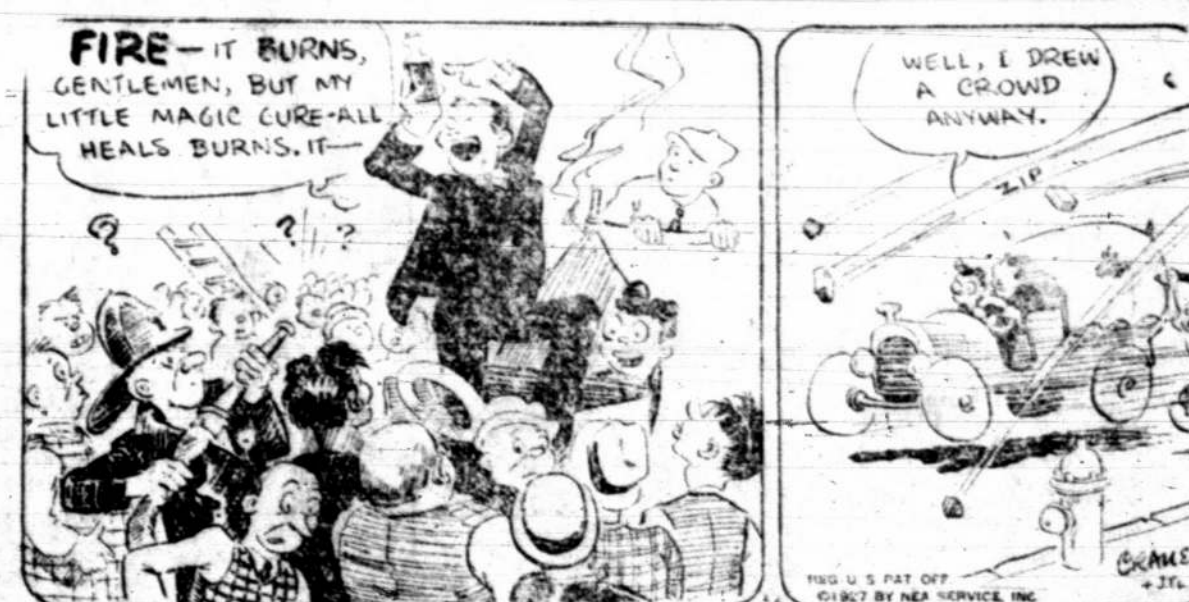

Bovina Shows How Cooperation Aids

BOVINA, Feb. 22.—Bovina, on the Santa Fe, twelve miles east of El Paso, is an example of what two-way business men can do through concentrated effort for the development of their town. Since the organization of the Bovina Chamber of Commerce, a 17 room modern stucco hotel has been sponsored, and installation of a telephone system to be connected with the Bell Company's long distance line has been pushed.

Bovina has two creameries, one of which ships more than 1000 pounds per week. Diversification as taught by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce is practiced by the town and the community, and the local chamber of commerce is advocating a program of more poultry, dairying, and more livestock.

Bovina is a town of 500 population, with a trade territory of about 1,000. Its schools enroll 350 pupils. Both a bank and a doctor are needed in the town. The Bovina Chamber is attempting to secure these through co-operation of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. The nearest doctor to Bovina is a dozen miles away. Local interest is excited. A doctor office was to a doctor who will serve the territory.

Chicago Newspaper Veteran Is Called

CHICAGO, Feb. 22 (AP)—Michael Ahern, veteran newspaperman who helped invent the story that the great Chicago fire of 1871 was caused by Mrs. O'Leary's cow, is dead here at the age of 71.

In a newspaper story several years ago Ahern said that he and two other reporters concocted the tale of the cow overturning a lighted lantern in hay to start the conflagration and afterward caused a spontaneous combustion in the O'Leary barn probably caused the fire.
