REDS SURGE AHEAD STEADILY

ELDRIDGE IN PEACE VICTORY STATEMENT TO WILL REQUIRE THE PUBLIC MUCH THOUGHT

To My Friends and the Voters of the County:

In making my announcement for county judge, I wish first to express to you my thanks for the many favors shown me in the past. I covet your love and friendship first and if you think I am the one for the place, I shall ever and always be loyal and true to every trust.

The office of county judge is one of the most important offices in the county and for that reason I seek it.

I have just completed my 33rd year teaching. I began my school teaching career in the fall of 1910, and have had but one interruption. I resigned my school at New Hope December 1, 1917, secured a release from the draft board, entered the naval aviation training school at Pensacola, Fla. I was in that school less than a month. I landed in France January 23, 1918, and was honorably discharged the last of April, 1919. Knowing war as I do it is my earnest prayer that the present conflict be speedily terminated and our loved ones be reunited where we can be again at peace to rebuild and rededicate ourselves to a service that shall never, never end, but promote peace on earth, good will toward men.

No man liveth to himself and it shall be your duty and mine to deal with each other in such way as to make the office a blessing and an honor to all people. I shall never forget that the office is yours and that I am your hired servant.

As to the office, the first thing I shall attempt and use the influence of the office for is to put the administration under the control of the county judges office. This will eliminate several hundreds of thousands of dollars expense for investigators.

I shall use my personal and official influence to secure for the aged a monthly allowance of not less than the maximum paid by other states. If other states can pay \$40 per month, I am sure that Texas, the wealthiest state in the Union, could get in line.

I shall be very mindful of the fact that the judges' office is only a member of the commissioner's court. Knowing this, I shall not forget my duties and limitation. Cooperating at all times in such manner that will bring honor and

The speaker paid tribute to the Lions who gave him such close attention yesterday, saying there are three kinds of applause for a speaker. That which comes when he is introduced, which is faith. Then that which is interspersed during his talk. That is hope. Then that which follows his talk. That is charity. "And the greatest of these is charity."

If we are to win the peace we must do much thinking and less sitting. Few think, the speaker remarked, most of us being merely readers. Few read the editorial features of newspapers, which are the greatest articles of the whole paper.

"This is a changing world," the speaker said, "and we are in for a great many surprises." He then went into a definition of imperialism and said there is more than just political imperialism, for which England has received so much unfavorable publicity. There is economic and race imperialism.

While England is insisting on retaining her colonies in other parts of the world, Russia did not sign away any of her privileges when America agreed to furnish her with lend-lease materials. Now it is too late. We can do nothing toward curbing any of her ambitions, regardless of how much they may be at variance with our democratic ideas of self government.

Russia has sold her ways, and is still selling her power of leadership to the world. Today, Stalin is the strong man of Europe and Asia and is fast becoming the strong man of the world. Russia will revolutionize the world in more ways than one.

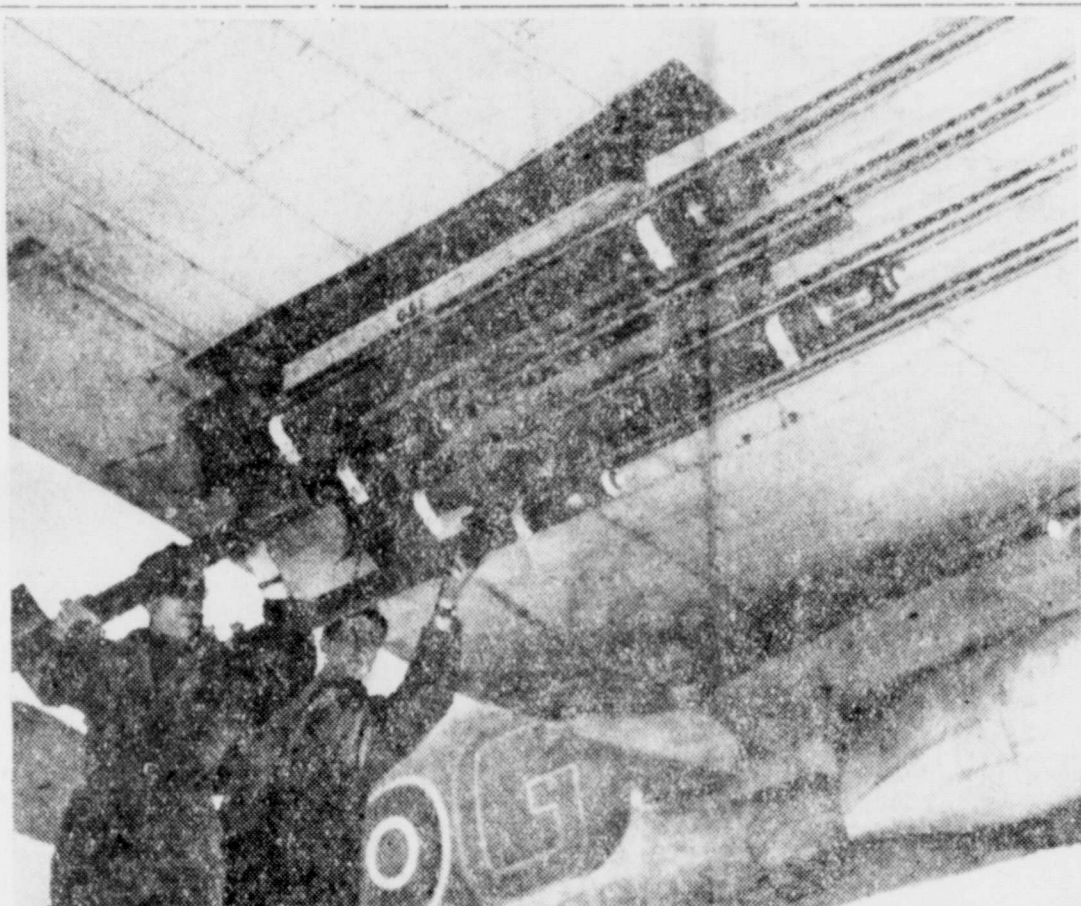
Then there is the race question, which is being forced to the front again, and which can no longer be ignored. The speaker thought race should not be a bar to world greatness or to recognition for ability. We must learn to live together. We must learn to think, he concluded.

RED CROSS WORK.

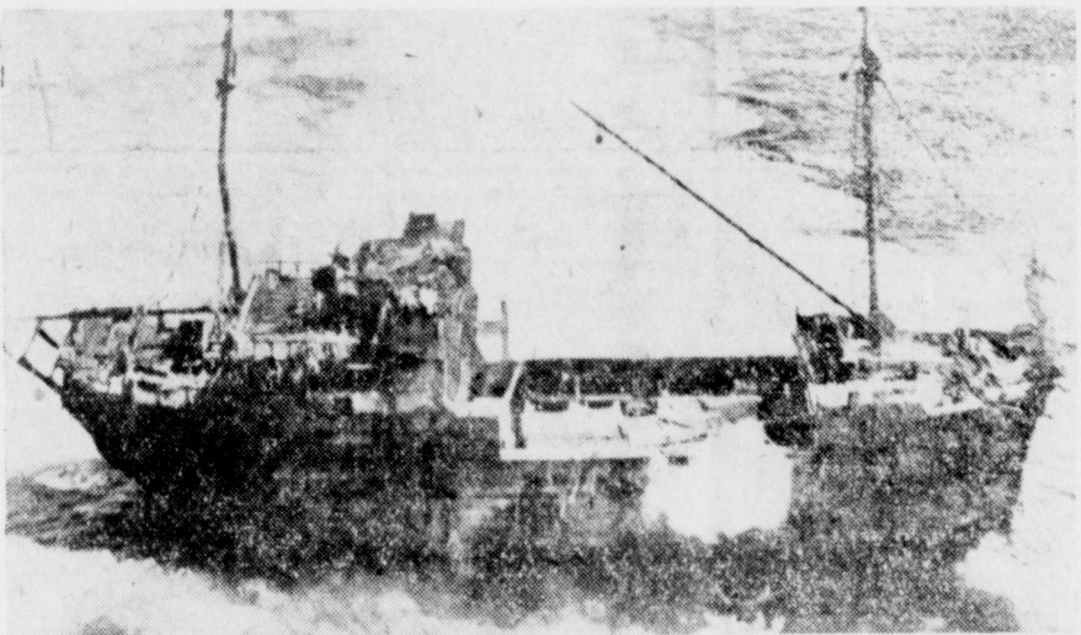

JULY 22 CONVENTIONS MAY BE HOT ONES

SAN ANTONIO, July 6.—Leaders of the Texas Democratic "rump" convention, ardent supporters of a fourth term, have been assured by national party officials in Washington that their delegates will be seated at the national convention in Chicago, July 19, Woodville Rogers, San Antonio attorney and secretary of the fourth-term organization, says.

Meanwhile, the pro-Roosevelt group has effected a powerful statewide organization to carry the precinct conventions for the president and name sympathetic election officials.

A statement by Mayor Gus B. Mauermann that the delegates named at the regular state convention would vote for a fourth term if an acceptable candidate is nominated for the vice presidency, drew the fire of Rogers.

"For Governor Moody (former Gov. Dan Moody) and Mayor Mauermann to string along at Chicago for a fourth term does not undo the wrong they did at Austin in selecting electors for the November ballot pledged to nullify the people's vote," Rogers said. "We are trying to remedy this in the coming precinct conventions July 22."

WELLS UNDER NINE BARREL GET SUBSIDY

WASHINGTON, July 6.—The long awaited subsidy program for the nation's stripper crude oil wells was announced late yesterday by Secretary of Commerce Jesse H. Jones.

In a brief announcement, the secretary disclosed that payments to all wells in fields producing less than nine barrels of crude per day per well will start Aug. 1. Payments will range from 20 to 75 cents a barrel.

Jones did not attempt to list the fields in which the payments will be made, but it is expected that a complete tabulation of them will be released shortly by Economic Stabilization Director Vinson.

The program will be handled by the Defense Supplies Corporation, a subsidiary of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation. Jones said that it had been formulated at the request of Vinson and with the approval of the president.

DALLAS—Alta Mesa oil pool in Brooks county was granted an increase of 12.5 cents per barrel and Vacherie pool in St. James Parish, La., was given an advance of 9 cents by the Office of Price Administration, effective next Monday, Ralph Crocker, acting district price executive, has announced.

Alta Mesa was advanced to \$1.45 per barrel and Vacherie was raised to \$1.30, both for 40-gravity oil and over with the 2 cents off for each degree below 40.

The adjustments, Crocker said, were made to bring the ceilings up to the prices for oil produced in the surrounding territory.

LARGEST BANK.

NEW YORK, July 6.—The Chase National Bank, world's largest, reports its resources on June 30, were \$4,990,182,843 compared with \$4,765,999,375 on March 31. Holdings of government securities were up to \$2,778,218,273 from \$2,691,990,168. Cash and amounts due from banks declined to \$886,347,989 from \$936,854,463. Deposits at June 30 were \$4,677,872,688 against \$4,457,581,731 on March 31.

FIGHTING RAGES ON 125-MILE FRONT IN SOUTHERN POLAND; NAZI RESERVES OF LITTLE AID

LONDON, July 6.—The German High Command reported today that fighting had flared on a 125-mile front in southern Poland, indicating that the Red Army had opened a new drive which formed the lower wing of its great offensive aimed across the Polish plains at Germany.

A Berlin communique said the battle line across southern Poland between Kowel and the upper Dnester had blazed into action, but the cautious first reports, lacking Moscow confirmation, did not make clear the weight and scope of the operation.

Only yesterday the Nazi command reported that the Germans had withdrawn from Kowel, keystone base covering the approaches to the Bug river defense line 40 miles to the west.

If the Nazi report of the Kowel-Dnester push by the Soviets is borne out, it will mean a resurgence of hostilities in an area dormant since Marshal Gregory K. Zhukov's First Army of the Ukraine drove through to the Kowel area and the Czechoslovak border on either side of Lwow early in April.

MOSCOW.—The Germans rushed fresh reserves, including air-borne divisions, into battle on the approaches to Lithuania today, but the onrushing Soviets hurled them aside and drove to within a little more than 25 miles of the border and 42 miles of the stronghold of Wilno.

The fall of the encircled stronghold of Molodechno, 42 miles northwest of Minsk and 63 miles southeast of Wilno, yesterday opened the floodgates to cavalry, tanks and mobile infantry of Marshal Ivan D. Cherniakhovsky's 3rd White Russian Army and they surged westward with increasing momentum.

ALLIED SUPREME HEADQUARTERS.—American assault forces by-passed embattled La Haye-Du Puits from the east and west and stormed southward through 16 French villages and hamlets today in the bloodiest fighting of the month-old invasion.

An almost equally bitter battle was raging at the opposite end of the front around Carpiquet, three miles west of Caen on the invasion road to Paris, 120 miles farther east.

Canadian troops were believed still in possession of Carpiquet itself, but German attacks were continuing and a spokesman acknowledged that some enemy forward elements may have penetrated Allied positions.

Gen. Eisenhower's 61st communication of the invasion said the Germans were "contesting every foot of ground" around La Haye, German road and railway center barring the west coast approaches to central Normandy and the Brittany peninsula.

SAN FRANCISCO.—American Army troops captured a second airdrome on Noemfoor Island off Dutch North Guinea to open twin bases today for U. S. bombers within 770 miles of the Philippines while Marines and soldiers mopped up the last Japanese defenders on northern Saipan Island in the Marianas.

Disclosing that the bloody Saipan campaign was nearing a successful conclusion, Admiral Chester W. Nimitz expressed "high hopes" of increasing pressure on Japan with his Pacific fleet now approaching peak efficiency.

Nimitz at a press conference said the fleet had developed a secret weapon for operations in the western Pacific—solution of the problem of supply.

"We will apply continuing and unremitting pressure at every possible point," the Texan said.

LONDON.—Prime Minister Churchill disclosed today that the Germans were bombing London with robot bombs at the rate of 100 to 150 a day and in the first three weeks of their assault had killed 2752 persons, a high proportion of them in the British capital.

Some 8000 other persons have been hospitalized for injuries, but a large proportion of them were discharged after only a few days. Large numbers of children have been removed from the city.

Churchill said long-range rocket installations in the vicinity of Pas de Calais had been under continuous attack since last September. Reconnaissance also revealed 100 smaller sites between Le Havre and Calais, he said, and "all these have been destroyed."

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DESTRUCTION.

This must be the most destructive era in human history. Surely now the words of Shakespeare are fulfilled:

"When wasteful war shall statues overturn,
And brails root out the work of masonry."

It is sad to see the news pictures, in an endless stream from so many cities and countries, showing the immense devastation accomplished and still in progress. How many thousand fine buildings have been laid low and how many million homes wrecked! It seems all the worse because the Old World cities are built mainly of imperishable stone or brick, rather than our American wooden construction whose wreckage is more readily cleared away.

The sadness naturally grows as observers with imagination picture to themselves the families that dwelt in those homes, the life they lived, and what may have become of them. Such meditation leads to "long, long thoughts." The thoughts may be fruitful; but they are often full of bitter despair.

GERMAN REVOLT.

What the Germans need, perhaps, more than anything else, is a revolution. They pretended to start one after the last war, but it didn't last long. A nation of people long trained to obey its masters was unprepared for individual thinking of freedom. The great nobles and land-owners were still powerful. The middle classes lacked energy and the lower classes were cowed. There was no such spirit in the air as that possessed by the French people in their revolution 150 years ago. The liberty gained by the French at that time was illusory, but eventually they really won their freedom. The Germans now could do likewise, doubtless with the approval of the Allied powers—if they had the spirit and leadership.

But they need first to modify their overwhelming pride of race and their cult of material power. They need to learn that much of what they have regarded as honorable is barbarous, because it is based on mere force and pride and greed. They need a baptism of freedom and also a baptism of humanity. They must come to realize that mankind must be allowed to live in peace, or it will destroy itself.

AN AMERICAN GIANT.

There is a tradition that little men are inclined to be bright, and big men to be dull. This belief seems invalid in the case of Clifford M. Thompson of Milwaukee, just admitted to the bar. At least the superficial facts suggest a successful career for him.

This man is a veritable giant, right out of the fairy tale books, and the tallest man in the United States. He stands eight feet and seven inches high and weighs 460 pounds. He seems to deviate from the traditional trend of giants, by being nimble in both body and mind. He is good in professional basketball, even though opponents have accused him of merely standing still in the middle of the floor while reaching over and dropping the ball into the pocket. He has also been an advertising man, which profession is no haven for dummies.

Anyway it should be interesting to watch this giant's legal career. If he lacks timidity and takes moral advantage of his towering height, he should go far in his profession. When a man of his endowment leans over and tells the judge and jury, they should stay told.

COFFEE COMPLICATIONS.

July was ushered in with a boon for coffee-lovers—a group including nearly all Americans. As decreed by the office of price administration, starting on Monday, July 3, coffee which had been generally priced in restaurants at 7 to 10 cents per cup or pot was reduced to five cents, including cream and sugar.

It has sounded too good to be true. Perhaps it is, in many cases. For there is an "escape clause" in the rule, by which an "eating or drinking establishment" may continue charging more than a nickel if it was doing so in "the seven-day period of Oct. 4 to Oct. 10, 1942."

That provision may send millions of restaurant people and their customers searching for information as to just what the status of coffee prices was on that magic date. And there may be a lot of argument.

Prices must be posted, too, by Aug. 16, for 40 basic menu items served as of April 4-10, 1943. Life in the U. S. A. grows very complicated. It's some compensation to have more and cheaper coffee.

OTHER EDITORS

Morgenthau Warnings.

W. F. Worth Star-Telegram: Secretary Morgenthau, in his Independence Day speech at the Philadelphia Navy Yard, reiterated the warning against the probability of false peace offers emanating from both Germany and Japan. The wily foe may be expected, when his back is against the wall, to pretend surrender in order to escape from his predicament and gain time for preparing a mortal blow against us. We must not be

deluded by the voices which will be raised for a truce which can only end in renewed struggle when the enemy has gotten back his wind.

The history of the Germans is one of continued war accompanied by continued treachery. This people is both arrogant and glib, a combination that makes it easy for militarists to originate war at any time. If at the end of this war Germany is left with any resources or liberties out of which war can be made we may be sure that leaders will arise to capitalize upon them. Treaties are scraps of paper when they are

made with the Germans, as with the Japs, who are even less to be trusted. Both possess inbred tendencies to violence which the peaceful nations must keep constantly under restraint if there is to be peace in this generation or those which follow. The Germans have been perennial disturbers of the peace since history began; the Jap no less since they first broke out of their feudal island home. The barred cell, if not the padded cell, gives the pattern for future control of both.

Cynical mendacity in both Berlin and Tokio already is busy with plans for evading the full weight of Allied vengeance by a pretended peace. If we accept such "offers," and allow ourselves to be thrown off our guard thereby we shall deserve the horrid awakening which will be ours when the forces of ruin now being driven back to their lairs shall again strike out at all that is good in the world.

We can not make peace with beasts who walk in the shape of men. Destruction of unbreakable chains for the enemy of mankind alone can make the world safe.

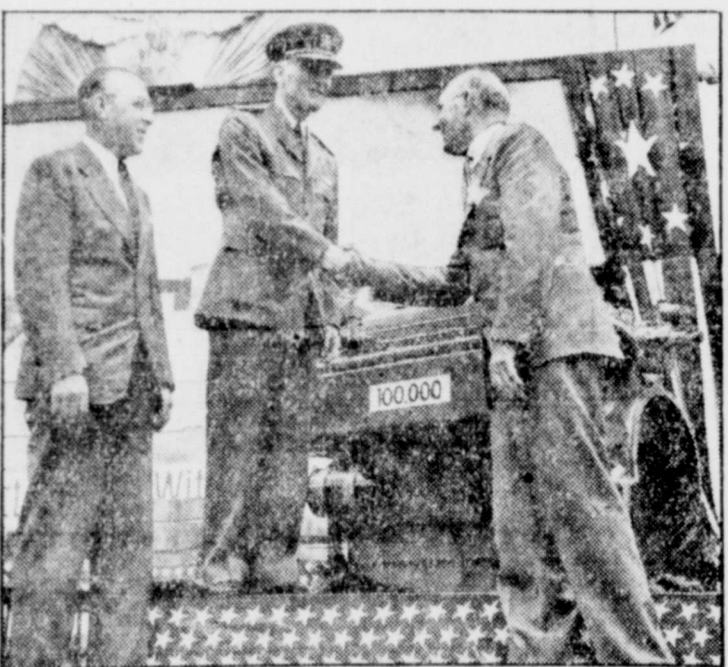
