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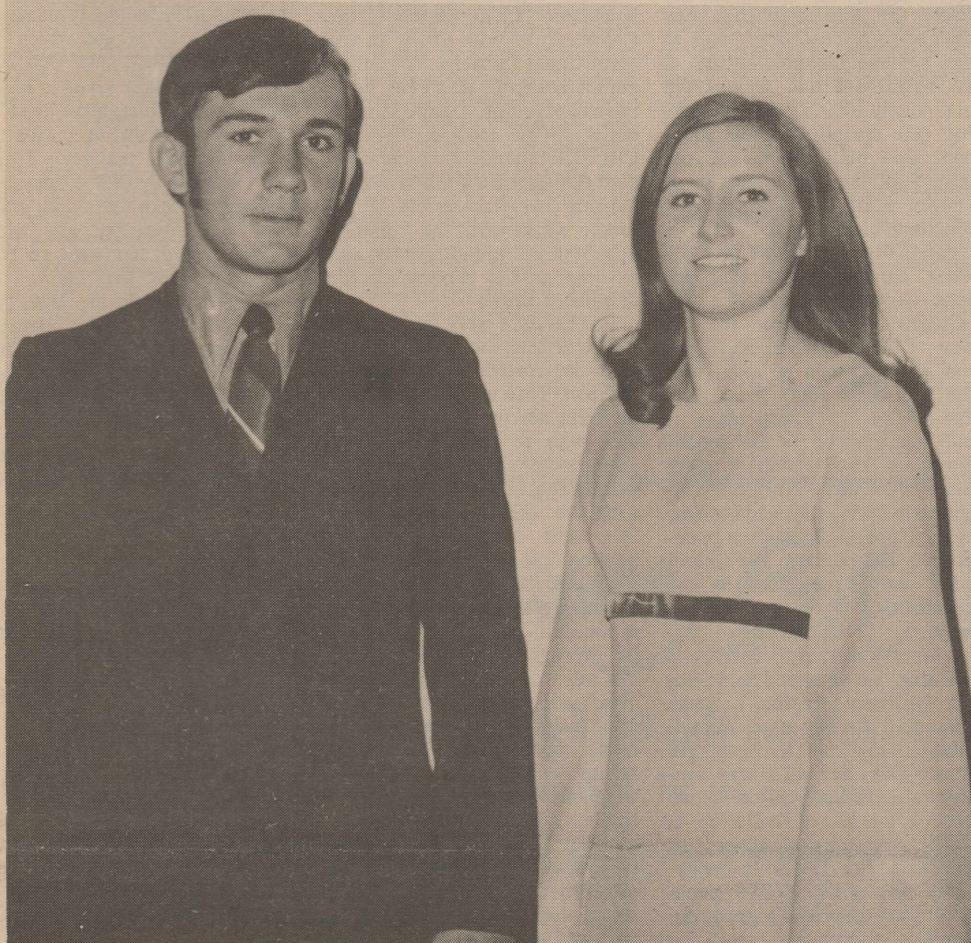

Gonzales' Brothers Serving Country, Alfonso Earns Commendation Medal

Mr. and Mrs. Alfredo Gonzales have two sons serving with the military branches. One, a 14-year veteran of the Marine Corps, is Gy Sgt. Alfredo Gonzales Jr. Their second serviceman son is Alfonso who was recently awarded the Navy Commendation Medal.

Alfredo Jr. is a 1957 graduate of Hart High School who is presently stationed in Vietnam. He is an instructor in combat support and special subjects in the Marine Corps Service Support School and has been with the Supply School Company four years.

Boatswain's Mate First Class Alfonso, stationed at San Diego, received the Commendation Medal and citation which reads:

"For meritorious service while serving with friendly foreign forces engaged in armed conflict against the North Vietnamese and Viet Cong Communist aggressors in the Republic of Vietnam from January 1970 to January 1971. While serving as advisor to Vietnamese Navy River Patrol Division 52 Petty Officer Gonzales participated in two hundred and twenty-six combat patrols and engaged the enemy on eight occasions. During those patrols, he boarded and searched numerous

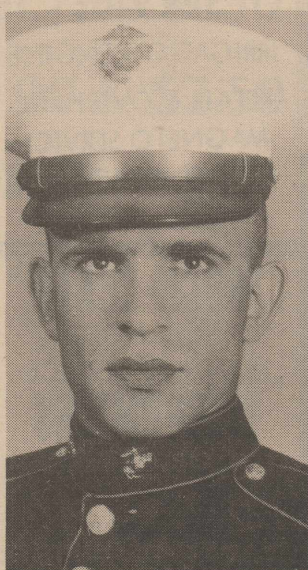
junks and sampans, interdicted cross river traffic, enforced curfew, inserted and extracted friendly forces in hostile territory and provided fire support for besieged units and outposts. His technical knowledge and long, arduous hours were directly responsible for the constant state of readiness of his boat. On 27 August 1970, Petty Officer Gonzales' patrol came under heavy enemy rocket and automatic weapons attack on the Saigon River. Reacting immediately, he manned the radio and called in an artillery strike.

During the engagement, Petty Officer Gonzales continually exposed himself to enemy fire in order to point out emplacement sites, manned weapons and directed his craft in returning fire with maximum effectiveness until the enemy fire was suppressed. Petty Officer Gonzales' exemplary professionalism, devotion to duty and courage under fire were in keeping with the highest tradition of the United States Naval Service. Combat distinguishing device is authorized. Signed for Secretary of the Navy, J. H. King Jr., Vice Admiral, United States Navy, Commander United States Naval Forces, Vietnam".

10 Accidents Investigated In October

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and one person injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first ten months of 1971 shows a total of 68 accidents resulting in three persons killed and 29 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for October, 1971, shows a total of 595 accidents resulting in 19 persons killed and 294 persons injured. This was 96 more accidents, 14 less fatalities, and 26 more injured than during September.

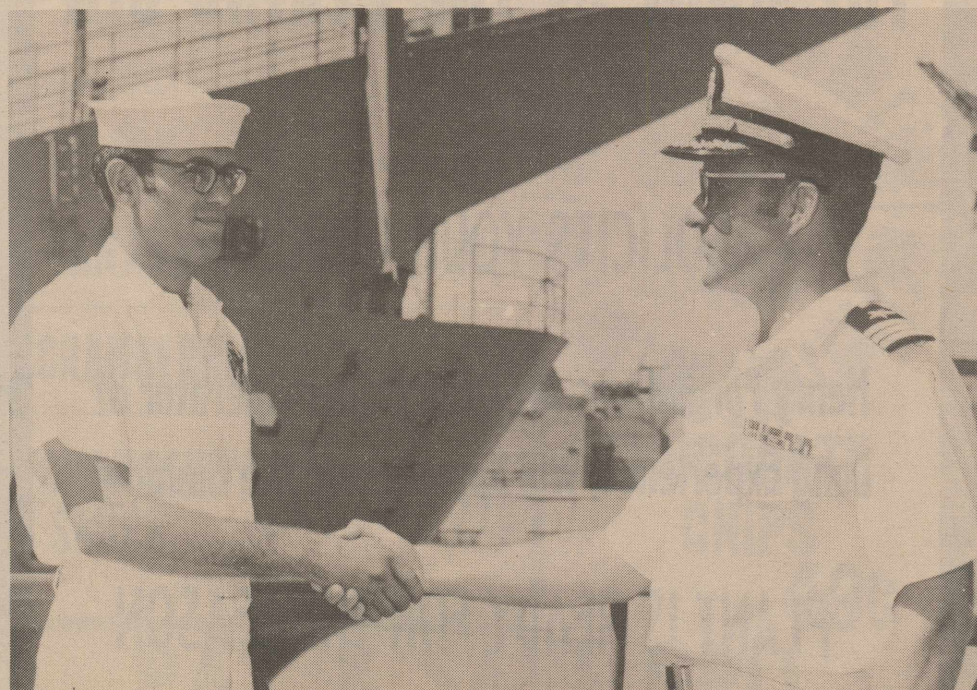

USS Orleck 'Family Gram'

16 October, 1971
"Family Gram"

Dear Families and Friends of Orleck,

Since last writing to you Orleck has spent over thirty continuous and productive days at sea. Prior to our departure from Subic Bay for our first commitment on the gunline, Orleck participated in four rigorous days of Naval Gunfire Training during which Marine spotters were trained. This allowed the ship to reach a very high state of readiness prior to the arrival of the gunline. It is significant that Orleck put out nearly 1000 5" rounds during this training without mishap. The high degree of Accuracy of the ship's guns were proven again and again as the spotters on the beach complimented the gun teams on their work. During this period, Orleck served as host ship for officers and men from the USS New Orleans (LPH-11). Each morning a group of men from the USS ship would be brought out to Orleck by helicopter to be indoctrinated in the procedures of naval gunfire. Since these men were from the Amphibious Navy, they had not ever been exposed to gunfire operations. All of them left Orleck very much impressed by the capabilities of sleek little destroyer.

Immediately following this training, we departed Subic Bay for Military Region 1, South Vietnam. This located immediately below the Demilitarized Zone. Our arrival was fortuitous because it coincided with a suspected build up of North Vietnamese troops just North of the DMZ. In subsequent days, ORLECK's presence was to prove a great deterrent continuously both day and night. The ship's fire was directed by Army and Marine spotters on the ground and in spotter aircraft. ORLECK was fortunate enough to have some of the spotters visit the ship. They flew out by helicopter and had lunch during which time the various aspects of life aboard ship and that in the foxholes

exchanged hands. They also complimented ORLECK on the excellence of her guns and said she was the equivalent of at least one Army battalion of artillery. I really think they came aboard to eat some of that Navy chow that they had heard so much about. At least they ate that way.

During the first week of the gunline, ORLECK served as flagship for Captain CORLEY who is Commodore of ORLECK's Squadron, Destroyer Squadron 17. At the time, the Commodore was acting in the operational capacity of gunline commander. In this role, he is responsible for all the gunfire ships off the coast of Vietnam. ORLECK turned to accommodate the Captain's stateroom to painting his flag on the ship's motor whaleboat. The Commodore enjoyed his stay which was an impressive experience for the entire crew.

ORLECK's stay on the gunline was cut short by one day with the forecast arrival of a typhoon. This was to be neither the first nor the last time weather was to plague our operations. To evade the typhoon, we headed South to rendezvous with the USS FOX (DLG-33). Our next assignment was to be her escort in the Central Tonkin Gulf area. The mission of the FOX and ORLECK was to monitor air and surface traffic throughout the Tonkin Gulf - a very demanding and extensive task. We had more than a few exciting moments during these operations. The first night, we had to investigate two unknown ships and take all appropriate information regarding their movements. On two other occasions, we kept tabs on Seventh Fleet operations. Less than a week after our arrival on the Tonkin Gulf, we were again forced almost as far south as Saigon to avoid yet another typhoon. It was during this commitment, ORLECK filled in for other ships who were unable to meet their commitments because of mechanical casualties. It is a real tribute to every man on the ship that ORLECK operated continuously for this past month without debilitating casualties. In fact the ship received two "Well Dones" from other Squadron Commanders for

whom ORLECK filled in. Everyone is justifiably proud of the accomplishments of the ship. Its performance exemplifies our "Can Do" attitude. We were finally relieved in the Gulf by the USS Ramsey (DEG-2) and began our trip back to Subic for our long awaited upkeep period. Once again typhoons persistently plaguing the South China Sea forced us South. However, after two days, the weather finally cooperated and we made it into Subic Bay. We are presently furiously engaged in our upkeep period which is scheduled to last until Oct. 20.

The past 30 or so days have confirmed absolutely the crew's ability to perform its duties in an outstanding manner. Time and time again they answered the call to man their duty stations unhesitatingly and with energy. They continued to put out after many long hours and arduous hours on the line. At no time did they fail to operate with perfect teamwork and dedication. No Commanding Officer could be prouder of his men than I am of these.

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Mustangs Trample Longhorns In Season's Last Skirmish

And suddenly it was over. The 1971 football season ended on a sour note for the Hart Longhorns Friday night as the Bovina Mustangs went wild for a 42-12 victory.

The Mustangs led the Horns in every way in the statistics. They had over 20 first downs and over 400 yards total offense.

The Horns received to start the ball game. But they made no more yards than those made on the kick-off since Bovina was really ready for the Horns!

Bovina got the ball and really began to move. However, when they got down to the Hart 30 yard line, the Horns stiffened up on defense and a lot of hard hitting caused a Mustang fumble that was hopped on by Wayne Ethridge at the Hart 28. Again the Horns could not move the ball and had to punt.

This time the Mustangs got on the scoring track. They moved the ball to the Hart 6 yard line where Bill Shelby scored for the Mustangs, Kim

Rundell converted and Bovina led 7-0.

Again the Horns got the ball, were unable to grind out a first down and had to give the ball back to the Mustangs. Again the Mustangs scored. This time it was on a 34 yard pass from Shelby to Shannon Davis. Rundell booted the extra point and Bovina had a 14 point lead at the end of the first quarter of play.

Bovina got another score at the start of the second quarter. It was Davis going 3 yards for a score and again Rundell toed the extra point and Bovina led 21-0. Then the Horns got back on the track and moved the ball to the Bovina 3 yard line where Stanley Dyer powered over for 6 points. The try for the two extra points went awry and the score stood at 21-6.

Just before the half, Bovina managed to score again. This time it was on a 26 yard pass from Shelby to Bobby McMeans. Rundell kicked the extra point and Bovina led 28-6 at the half.

The Horns controlled the third quarter as they got one

score to none for the Mustangs. Hart's score came on a 56 yard end around run. The conversion attempt again failed. That left the score at 28-12 at the end of three periods.

Bovina controlled the fourth quarter, scoring twice to no scores for the Horns. The first score came on a 1 yard run by Davis and the second score came on an 8 yard run by Davis. Rundell converted after both scores making the final score stand at Bovina Mustangs 42 and Hart Longhorns 12.
