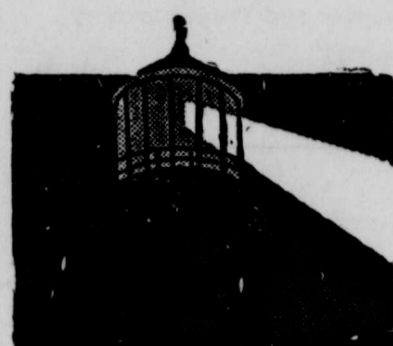

August 1st Last Day

August 1st is the last day that certification of cotton, feed grain and diversified acreage can be made in Mitchell County. Jack Linam, member, Mitchell County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, announced.

Mitchell County farmers desiring payment on cotton and/or feed grain under the 1967 programs, must report their acreage planted and acreage diverted to the ASCS office by August 1, 1967.

Monday, July 24th, 151 Mitchell County farms had not been certified.

Reporters will not visit Mitchell County farms to measure acreages as in the past. After farmers report their acreage to the Mitchell County ASCS office, acreages will be spot-checked on 25 percent of farms certified in the county. There will be no opportunity to adjust if the farm is not within the acreage limitation.

First checks for the cotton program are scheduled to be mailed on August 7th.

Cotton farms which are not timely certified are not only ineligible for program payments but will be reported to cotton buyers as excess farms and all cotton produced will be subject to marketing quotas penalties.

Farmers who had their acreages pre-measured or had an early measurement are still required to certify at the Mitchell County ASCS office not later than Tuesday August 1, in order to be eligible for payments.

FARM SAFETY WEEK, JULY 23-29

July 23-29 is the week designated by the Secretary of Agriculture as Farm Safety Week. The Board of Supervisors of the Mitchell Soil and Water Conservation District urges everyone to observe Farm Safety Week. Rex McKenney has announced.

"Farm Safety Week is a time when each landowner and operator should take time to make a check of the farmstead and his equipment, to make needed repairs, and to remove as many hazards as can be found," McKenney stressed.

McKenney calls attention to the fact that farm tractors equipped with cabs provide safety for the operator. John A. Egging told the American Society of Agricultural Engineers

at a recent meeting that a study of fatalities caused by tractor accidents show that over 75 percent could have been prevented if the tractor operator had been protected with a crash-proof tractor cab.

"Tractors equipped with air conditioned cabs will be standard equipment within a few years," McKenney pointed out. "This will allow the driver to operate the tractor more efficiently because of less fatigue as well as being protected from insect bites and stings. He will also be protected from wind-blown objects such as sand, chaff and pesticides. Many pesticides used today are very dangerous when they come in contact with the skin or are inhaled," McKenney stressed.

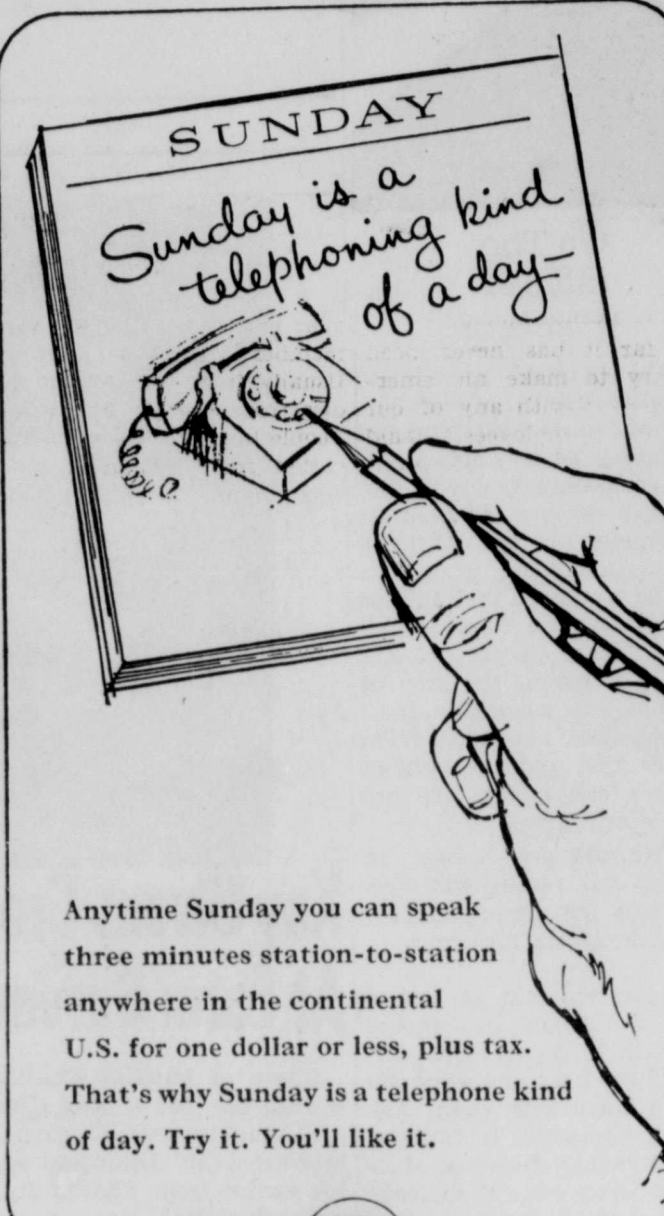
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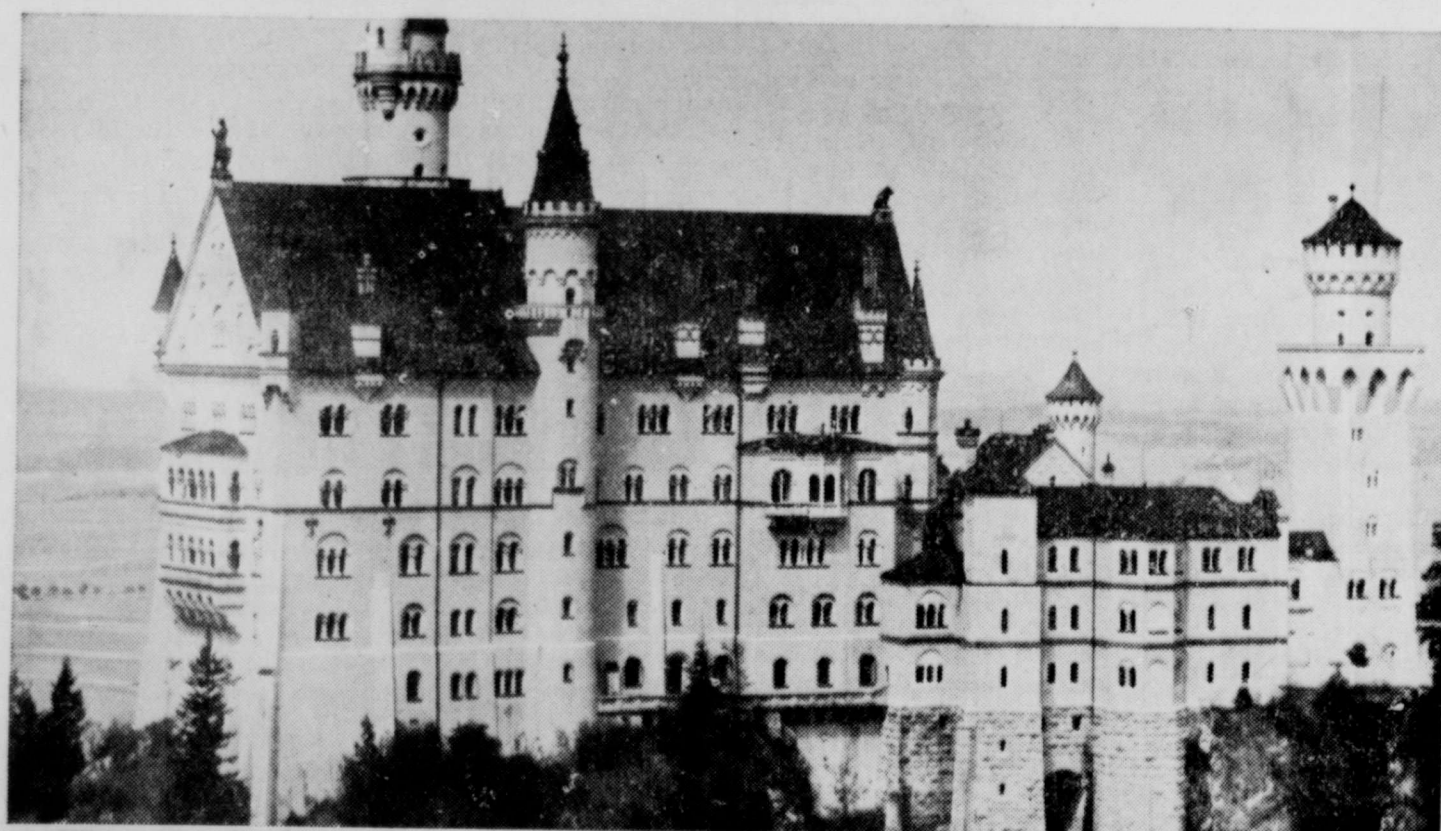
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OUTDOORS IN TEXAS

On the bulletin board in the office of a large Texas firm is a huge chart. It shows the vacation schedule of each employee. Also the route each will follow on his or her vacation.

In nearly every instance each employee had specified where he would be spending the night. In addition, each gave a description of his or her automobile, its color, make, model, year and license number.

"So far it has never been necessary to make an emergency contact with any of our vacationing employees," said the office manager. "However, if an emergency ever arises, we can easily get in touch with any person."

Isn't this a good practice for anyone to follow who travels? This, whether he be a salesman, hunter, a fisherman or just vacationing?

Much contacting trouble can be eliminated by the simple process of keeping your automobile description and license number on file in your office or with someone who may need to contact you.

A friend of mine, who travels a great deal, files what he

calls his "flight plan". He makes three copies of his itinerary. One he leaves with his secretary, the other with his wife and the third with the girl at the office switchboard. Thus he has a three-way assurance of being reached in case of emergency.

There are all kinds of safety precautions which may prevent a serious accident, either in your car or on the water. Remember — this is vacation time. Usually it is one of the most disastrous periods of the year. People hurry to the summer vacation spot. Then dash hurriedly home to get the kiddies back to school.

As a result of all this hurry, each year several hundred motorists fail to make it home in one piece. Tragedy is even greater when we start out for pleasure and end up with a serious accident. It mars forever the joy we might have had. All the precautions we take may never be enough. But if one life is saved . . . some misery is prevented . . . it's well worth the effort to exercise care.

These same practices should be employed by the boater.

Every person who goes out in a boat should have an efficient life preserver. It shouldn't be just makeshift something merely to comply with the law. It should be a life preserver that will work under the most difficult conditions.

Just a seat cushion all right for the person who is a good swimmer . . . if he can take it with him when he goes overboard (which is seldom possible) . . . or there's someone to toss it to him when he hits the water. But a cushion is inadequate for most women and children and quite a few men. Few know how to use them.

Even a ski-belt would be better.

The standard, round like a doughnut, life preserver, with rope attached, is much better.

A body fitting life preserver is much, much safer, especially when going out over open waters. In fact, such a preserver just could be the most important item aboard the boat.

Outdoors people also should take along a first-aid kit. There are many times when a small amount of antiseptic, a simple bandage or a piece of gauze comes in mighty handy.

One of my friends always carries with him a pair of tweezers. In hunting and fishing he soon learned that it is easy to back into cacti and get a seat filled with thorns. His tweezers have paid off more than once, especially to some of his guests.

All of these things are important safety factors when going outdoors. It might be well for you to do a little checking and make some provisions for your own safety and convenience.

If this column upset you, it was entirely intentional. Just hope it makes you a bit more careful whether motoring on the highway or boating on the water.

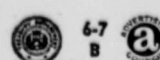

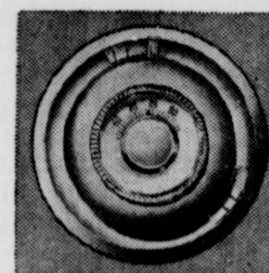

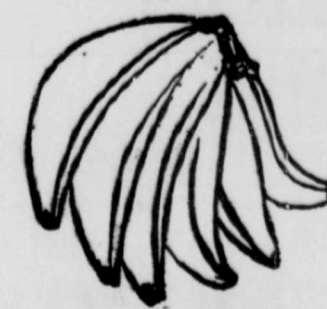
