

Howard, Stelzer Win Judge Races... Democrats Slate Run-Off Election

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E.A. Howard Jr. took the Democratic Party Garza County Judge vote at 791 to face Republican David Stelzer in the November general election, following primary voting here yesterday.

Stelzer got 123 votes to win over James A. (Buddy) Skinner who garnered 87 votes.

A run-off election for County Sheriff between the two top Democratic candidates Billy Timms and Freddy Cockrell will be held Tuesday, April 12.

Also in the Democratic Party run-off election will be Precinct

One commissioner candidates Sammy Ellis and Lee Norman as well as Precinct One and Three Constable candidates Lonnie Gene Peel and Leroy Demming.

Republicans elected Max Chaffin as their candidate for County Sheriff, edging out Mike Harper 91 to 60.

John Valdez won the Democratic Party Precinct Three Commissioner race over incumbent Tommy Young by a 24 vote majority.

Unopposed Democratic candidates County Attorney Preston Poole and Laura "Chita" Hataway, County Tax Assessor Collector, won their

positions.

For President, the Democrats chose Albert Gore with 455 votes, followed by Michael Dukakis with 383.

Richard Gephardt drew 201 votes, Jesse Jackson got 159 and Gary Hart collected 108.

Senator Lloyd Bentsen got an overwhelming 1,110 votes to Joe Sullivan's 260.

Howard got 51.9 percent of the Democratic vote for judge, compared to Wanda Mitchell's 416 votes (27.3 percent) and Lewis Earl's 316 votes (20.7 percent).

In the Democratic sheriff's

contest, Timms drew 40.4 percent, Cockrell got 29.1 percent, Claborn registered 20 percent and Salinas got 10.5 percent.

In the Commissioner Precinct One race, Ellis got 157 votes (31 percent), Norman received 134 votes (26.5 percent), Jones got 130 votes (25.7 percent) and Jerry Osborn collected 85 votes (16.7 percent).

Demming got 321 votes (40.5 percent) compared to Peel's 292 (36.8 percent) in the Constable Precinct One and Three race, with

Historic Business District Council Says 'Neigh' to Livestock

The Post City Council, at its regular meeting Monday evening, approved the drafting of an amendment to the animal ordinance restricting the keeping of livestock within a two block area of the historic business district.

The council action was in response to a request from the Main Street Advisory Board, which recommended the change to improve the overall appearance of the business district.

The affected area will include 7th to 11th Streets between Avenue M and the Santa Fe railroad tracks.

Opposing viewpoints of the Main Street landscaping plan were aired, with the opponents agreeing to meet with members of the Main Street Advisory Board to work out differences.

The principle opposition centered around concern for traffic flow on Main Street and the affect that the trees might have.

Supporters of the landscaping plan pointed out that the additional parking made possible by the improvements and beautification of the downtown area outweighed the slight inconvenience of the traffic flow.

Mayor Giles McCrary also pointed out that several public hearings had been held with "ample opportunity for input and suggestions for changing."

No action was taken by the council, pending recommendations from the Main Street Advisory Board.

"If people who work downtown would park on side streets or in the city-maintained off-street parking areas," McCrary emphasized, "there would be no parking problem downtown."

He urged the merchants to join forces to insist that employees and business owners and managers park their vehicles on the side streets and in city parking lots.

Main Street manager Melissa Cunningham explained to the council that the landscaping plan has been submitted to the Texas Highway Department, and that the Texas Highway Commission is expected to review the application in July, "and hopefully we'll be ready to start to work in August," she said.

The state is expected to fund half of the costs, with the city being allowed to include a large portion of

the costs as "in-kind," keeping the actual cash involvement at a minimum.

The final budget for the project has not been completed, but preliminary estimates are for a total of \$114,000.

The re-routing of Farm to Market Road 669 to West Main Street, if approved by the state, would qualify the city for an additional \$60,000 for the project in state funds.

In other action the council approved an emergency ordinance to comply with a new state law requiring certain safety precautions for trenching.

Joe Harris, representing Southwestern Public Service, requested the council approve a rate decrease of 3.1 percent.

"It's unusual for a public utility to request a decrease," Harris said, "but that's what we're doing."

No Plague Reported Here

Bubonic plague incidences continue to spread in parts of West Texas, but according to local DVM Larry Mills, there have been no reports of the disease in Garza County, although evidence of animal deaths from the disease have been reported in nearby Borden County.

The majority of positive plague reports have come from areas where there is screening procedure, with government trappers watching for, and reporting on, unusually large numbers of animal deaths.

If bird hunters, trappers, or ranchers find large numbers of dead rabbits or rodents in the area, then there is need for concern, and the unexplained animal deaths should be reported immediately to local health officials, Mills said.

Mills' opinion is that bubonic plague will eventually work its way into the county, "maybe this year, or maybe in ten years, but with the present spread of the disease, it's bound to reach here."

An outbreak of the plague was confirmed recently for the north-eastern part of Midland County.

Other counties which have reported rodent die-offs include Dawson, Borden, Martin, Howard, Ector, Glasscock, Crane, Upton and Pecos counties, though those cases have not yet been confirmed.

TDH offices said attention is now being turned to other counties where rodents are being checked for evidence of the plague.

According to other information received from the Texas Department of Health, plague, or Black Death as it was called in the middle ages, is an extremely infectious disease caused by the bacillus, Yersenia pestis.

It is primarily a rodent disease, transmitted from animal to animal and the danger plague poses at the moment is primarily to animals such as rabbits, mice and household pets. Plague spreads to such animals through fleas carried by wild animals which have become infested.

In the West Texas area, isolations of the plague organism are usually made following reports or prairie dog colonies undergoing large scale mortality within a short period of time.

These prairie dog "die-offs" remain a grim reminder of the seriousness of the disease once it is

introduced into a population. Household pets are susceptible to bubonic plague, with cats more susceptible than dogs to the fatal disease.

A high fever and swollen lymph nodes under the ears, in front of the shoulders and other locations are primary symptoms of the disease in animals.

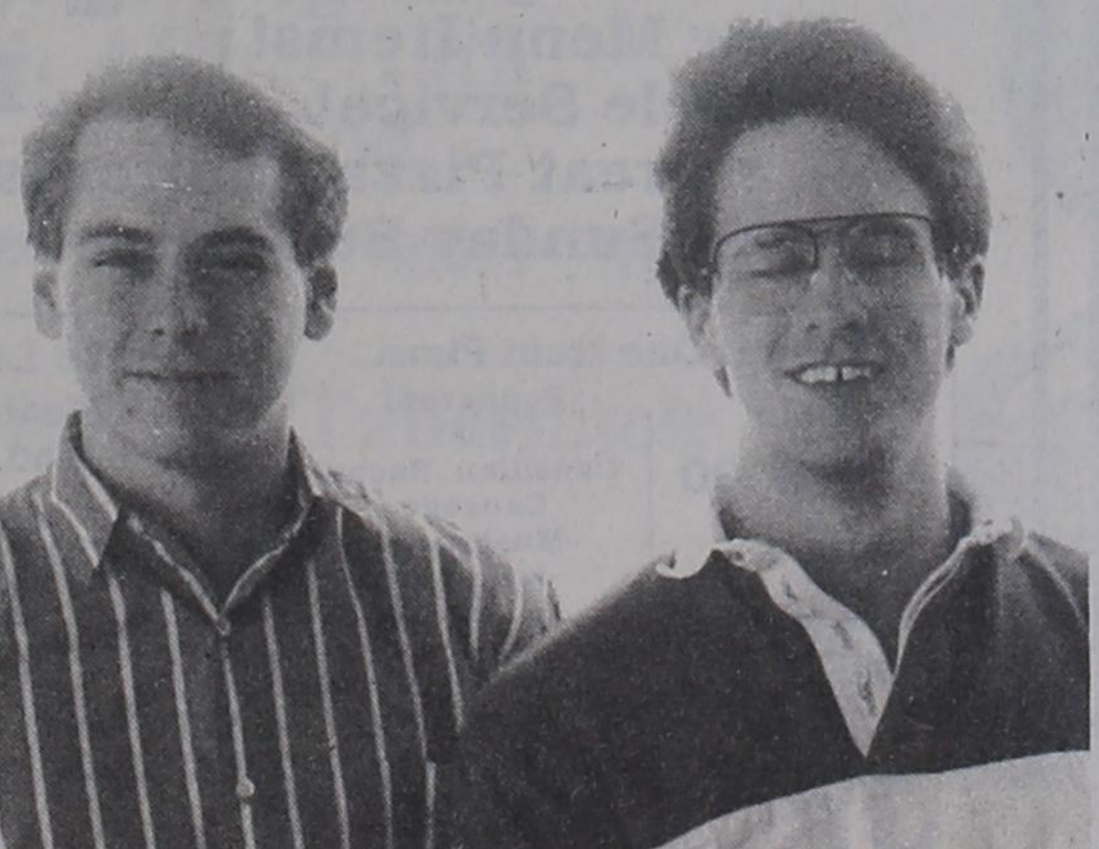
The TDH notes that the disease usually occurs in man as a result of a bite by an infected fleas or from the handling of an infected animal.

People who skin dead animals or who handle sick animals which have harbored the fleas can catch bubonic plague. Humans can get bubonic plague if an infected animal's blood gets into a cut or abrasion.

Early symptoms of bubonic plague in man include fever, painful swollen lymph nodes in the groin, armpits and neck, and chills and headache. Symptoms usually occur two to six day and sometimes up to ten days after the bite of an infected flea.

Some effective preventive measures against plague are rat control - elimination of rodent harborages and food sources - and use of effective insecticides as antiflea measures

Personal protection by the use of insect repellents in plague endemic areas is also recommended.

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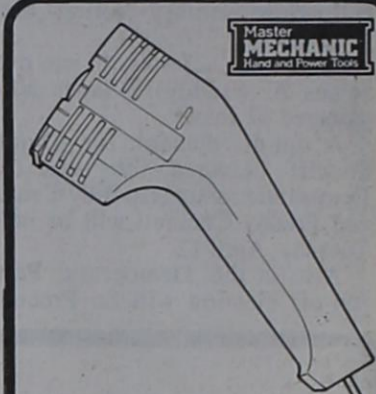

Trophies and ribbons have been furnished by United Supermarket

and Cal-Maine Foods, Inc. The Showmanship Belt Buckle has been furnished by the Lynn-Garza County Farm Bureau Directors. Premium money will be furnished by the association.

There will be trophies for the Grand Champion and Reserve Champion Gelding and Mare. First through eighth places in each class will receive ribbons. Premium prize money will go to the first through fourth places in each class.

The following G.C.J.L.A. Horse Show Rules will apply:

1. Animals must be owned and cared for by exhibitors for at least 90 days prior to show.

2. There will be four Halter Classes: two mare classes and two gelding classes. These classes will be broken by age of horses.

3. All horses will be on show grounds and report to Superintendent by 1 p.m. Saturday.

The following G.C.J.L.A. Livestock Show Rules will apply:

1. Exhibitors must be regularly enrolled in school and must be in the F.F.A. or 4-H, and must be certified by the County Agent or Vo-Ag Teachers in Garza County.

2. Each exhibitor shall be limited to only two animals in each class and not more than four in each division.

3. All animals must be trained and shall be controlled by exhibitors to satisfaction of Superintendent at entry of show.

4. Entry fee shall be \$4 per head. Entry form and entry fee must be in to the County Extension Office April 15.

5. If exhibitor is unable to show his or her animal, they may get a substitute to show entry. Exhibitor must get permission from Executive Committee and Division Superintendent and substitute must qualify under Rule No. 1.

6. Showmanship award will be presented in each division.

7. All animals must be clean and free of all foreign matter.

8. All exhibitors will be under control and direction of the Superintendent. The Garza County Jr Livestock Association will not be responsible for any loss, injury, or damages.

9. The decision of the Executive Committee shall settle any disputes.

10. Any violation of the rules and regulations or misconduct toward the judge or officials could result in the forfeiture of all premiums, trophies, ribbons and buckles.

11. Any replacement of lost animals after ownership deadline must be approved by the board of directors prior to purchase.

Cecil Foster Sr collecting 180 votes.

Democrats here sent a clear message to Austin that elected judges should be continued, swamping the referendum with 1,269 for and only 50 against.

The unofficial total votes cast in the Democratic were 1,565.

The Republican voting total was 234. They also voted overwhelmingly to establish English as the official language of the State of Texas and the United States. The referendum drew 187 for and 12 against.

Republicans in Garza County favored George Bush with 131 votes as their presidential candidate, followed by Pat Robertson with 46 votes.

Bob Dole got 28 votes.

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

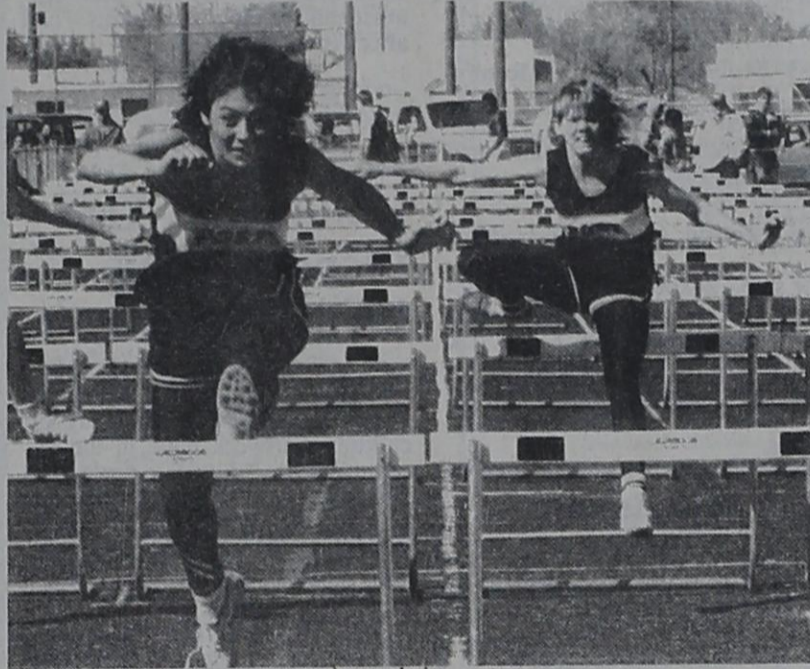

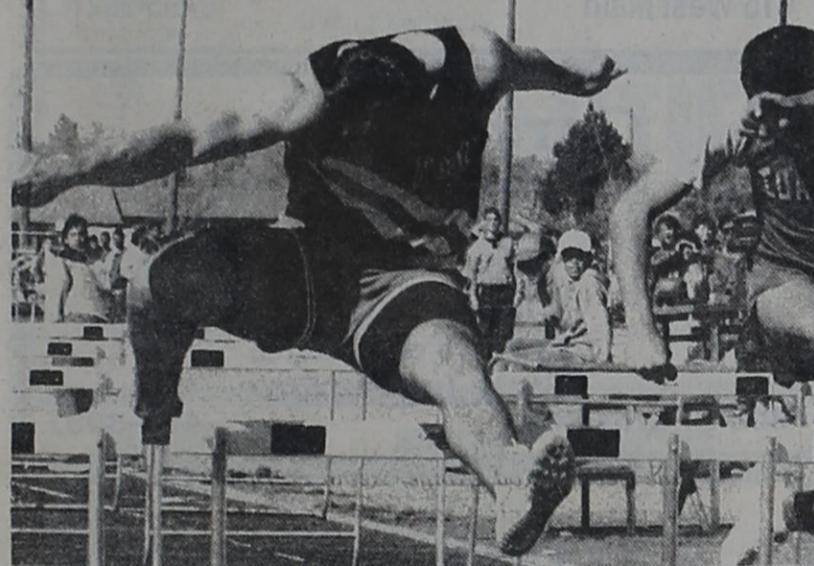
