

Germans On Rhine West Bank Crushed Air Might Blasts Nine Nazi Army Camps

Over 7,000 Planes Strike At Reich

LONDON, March 22 (AP)—The full fury of Allied air might was turned directly on German troops jammed into the Ruhr today as 1,300 American heavy bombers blasted nine of the largest army camps in western Germany and five more airfields near the front.

Incomplete reports indicated that more than 7,000 warplanes were taking a crack at German targets.

Fourteen waves of Fortresses and Liberators were protected by 700 Mustangs in the attacks on camps and air bases in the Ruhr. The Mustangs also patrolled the sky on other widespread air operations ranging from the North Sea to Australia.

The tactical air commands thus were able to throw their full weight into the merciless bomb and rocket offensive which Gen. Eisenhower had warned was coming.

The weather again favored the airmen, and so many hundreds of aircraft were flashing in all directions over the Reich that the Nazi radio finally gave up trying to follow them in its warning service.

A powerful force of four-motored British Lancasters spearheaded the daytime assaults, and later the German radio reported raiders thundering in over the Reich simultaneously from the south.

Indications were that another two-way blitz was developing against the Reich—a blow which perhaps would equal yesterday's record attacks by 7,000 planes which dumped most of their bombs into an area smaller than the state of Missouri.

This great coordinated operation involving every western air command at Gen. Eisenhower's disposal spread chaos and destruction across scores of railway centers, fortified towns and airfields scattered over the north German plain.

Ten airfields serving as the "eyes of the German high command were beaten into rubble and then set afire.

An RAF reconnaissance pilot who flew over the region said he did not pass a single sizeable town which was not in flames.

"It was really staggering," he said. "How anyone could exist in that inferno is beyond me."

Nineteen German planes, including several Jets, were shot down yesterday, while 45 other planes and three gliders were destroyed.

RAF Mosquitos rounded off the month of raids on Berlin by attacking the capital twice during the night. The first visit was by the largest force of Mosquitos ever sent to Berlin, possibly close to 100.

Also during the night British four-engine Lancasters attacked an oil refinery at Hamburg and a gasoline plant between Bochum and Dortmund in the Ruhr. Allied losses for all operations yesterday and last night from bases in the west totaled 20 heavy bombers, nine American and 11 British, and six medium and light bombers and 21 fighters.

Allied aircraft from Italy yesterday got in some more good luck at the enemy's main rail escape line in Yugoslavia between Graz and Brod, knocking out a large number of rail cars and locomotives and cutting the tracks in many places.

Superforts Blast Rangoon; Japs Flee Devastated Tokyo

A hundred or more Superforts blasted Rangoon today as millions of Japanese fled from the terror of B-29 incendiary raids.

"Extraordinary heavy" Japanese losses were reported as American infantrymen shattered the Shimbun line east of Manila in central Luzon.

General Douglas MacArthur previously estimated Japanese losses in the Philippines at 282,000. All but minor pockets of enemy soldiers were crushed by guerrillas and the U. S. 40th division on Panay in the central Philippines where Yanks captured

the city of Iloilo, 70 per cent of which was destroyed by enemy-set fires and mines.

Hundreds of Japanese were lost at sea when low-flying Mitchell bombers virtually wiped out a six ship convoy off Amoy, China.

Mitcher's task force 58, whose carrier planes knocked out approximately 30 war and merchant ships Sunday and Monday in their third strike at Japan and dealt perhaps more serious damage to the emperor's naval and air machine by destroying repair shops,

ammunition dumps, oil storage facilities and air assembly shops. Deprived of repair facilities, damaged ships remain crippled and faulty airplane engines keep planes grounded.

Tokyo radio indicated Mitscher's carriers and Adm. Raymond A. Spruance's supporting Third fleet may be headed for a strike at the Ryukyu Islands or Formosa, south-west of Japan.

This would put them in the vicinity of Amoy, where Philippines-based Mitchells sank a sizable freighter-transport and two destroyer escorts; probably sank two larger freighter-transport, and damaged a destroyer.

Further south, Tokyo said, 120 American fighters and bombers raided Hainan, fortress island guarding the South China coast. Tokyo said B-29s participated, but this is doubtful.

Three Allied armies are poised along 63 miles of the lower Rhine from Duesseldorf to Arnhem and are ready to join any moment now in the general offensive," Berlin said.

These were the Canadian First, the British Second, the American Ninth and—by enemy account—"considerable parts of the American First army," also fighting south of the Ruhr and east of the Rhine in the bridgehead.

The blistering aerial attacks were in the pattern which precluded other great offensives. The whole circle of roads and railway bottlenecks centered by Muenster was under blazing and continuous attack. The greatest weight of bombs, rockets and incendiaries fell in the Muenster circle east of Wesel, the northwest Rhine corner of the Ruhr.

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Red Onslaught Against Stettin Is Redoubled

Hungarian Drive Reinforced With Move On Austria

LONDON, March 22 (AP)—The Russians redoubled the fury of their onslaught against Stettin, "key to northern Germany," and in Hungary reinforced attempts of a 50-mile front to batter through the Danube gate into Austria, the Germans said today.

In East Prussia storm units fought into Heiligenbeil, last of the Baltic coastal fortress towns southwest of Koenigsberg, Moscow dispatches reported.

They drove to within six miles of Danzig, around which they had drawn a 25-mile siege arc, and were within 2 1/2 miles of wedding Danzig and Gdynia apart.

On the Berlin front, Soviet correspondents said Marshal Gregory Zhukov was moving "in unbroken streams" in warm weather.

On the Hungarian front the Germans said the Russians were attacking all the way between Lake Balaton and the Danube.

German broadcasts said Esztergom, fortified city on the south bank of the Danube and 20 miles northwest of Budapest, Felsosagalla and nearby Tabanya had been evacuated.

Southwest of Budapest, the German communiqué announced, Marshal Feodor Tolbukhin's forces had advanced 12 miles west of Szekesfeharvar and were fighting on both sides of Varpalota, 46 miles from Budapest.

Annihilation of the trapped German forces along the Frisches Haff (lagoon) in East Prussia moved toward a swift conclusion. The Jarft river reportedly was failing to hold back Marshal Alexander Vasilevsky's onrush into Heiligenbeil.

The only major activity reported from the long Berlin front held by Marshals Zhukov and Konev from northeast to southeast of the bomb-wrecked capital was within besieged Breslau.

Frisco Delegates Named For British

LONDON, March 22 (AP)—Hot words, cheers and jeers were exchanged in commons today after Prime Minister Churchill announced names of seven men and two women who will represent Britain at the Golden Gate world security conference.

Laborite Emmanuel Shinwell accused the government of stacking the delegation with conservatives.

Barely heard above the cheers and counter-cheers, Churchill roared back that Shinwell "has done everything in his power to break up this government and hopes to gain after its dissolution what he would never gain while national affairs predominated in men's minds."

Obviously irritated by Shinwell's accusation, he added: "Any fair-minded man would say that the labor party had a fair representation."

"Not from you," shouted Shinwell.

Churchill leaned forward, his chin lifted and shot back: "I am the person responsible for nominating this delegation, and they (labor) have a fair representation in this delegation."

Earlier, Moelyn Hughes, a laborite, had asked if there was any reason why Clement Attlee, lord president of the council and labor party leader, should not lead the delegation, instead of Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden.

Churchill said normal practice was for the foreign secretary to lead such missions and explained Attlee's title of deputy prime minister was a courtesy title "which has no constitutional authority at the present time."

Besides Eden and Attlee Churchill named these members of the delegation:

Lord Cranborne, Dominions secretary, and Lord Halifax, British ambassador to Washington.

DRIVE FOR MANDALAY
CALCUTTA, March 22 (AP)—A swift drive to liquidate remaining Japanese troops south of captured Mandalay in Burma was believed under way today.

Edward J. Flynn Greeted By Pope

VATICAN CITY, March 22 (AP)—Edward J. Flynn, president Roosevelt's personal emissary, was received today by Pope Pius XII in an hour-long audience.

The former national chairman of the democratic party was accompanied by Myron C. Taylor, the president's personal representative to the Vatican.

Flynn flew to Italy yesterday from conferences in Moscow.

Official Vatican quarters withheld comment on the audience. Recently the Vatican denied any negotiations were in progress with Soviet Russia and the Rome Catholic press has been strongly anti-Russian in tone.

Flynn visited Moscow after accompanying President Roosevelt to the Yalta Conference. While in the Soviet capital he conferred with Alexei, Patriarch of the Russian Orthodox church.

Following his audience with the Pope, Flynn talked with Msgr. Giovanni Battista Montini, substitute papal secretary of state; Msgr. Domenico Tardini, secretary for Extraordinary Ecclesiastical Affairs; and Msgr. Walter Carroll, American attache to the state secretariat.

Flynn planned to hold a press conference tonight.

Twelfth Yank Dies Of Poison

MANILA, March 22 (AP)—The 12th U. S. soldier in the Manila area died today of poisonous alcohol and military authorities said that stern and vigorous action is being taken to eliminate the menace.

Ernesto Uriburu, secretary of the Argentine embassy in Washington, arrived here last night with official copies of the Mexico City declarations. He conferred immediately with Oscar Ibarra Garcia, under secretary of foreign affairs, and it was expected the cabinet would meet today.

Remnants Remain Of Nazi Armies

PARIS, March 22 (AP)—The Third and Seventh armies crushed all but disorganized German pockets west of the Rhine today while Allied bombers smashed by the hundreds north of the Ruhr, where the enemy said the Allies had massed enormous, smoke-shrouded strength for an imminent new crossing of the river.

Only remnants remained to be cleared up in the German chemical capital of Ludwigshafen, enveloped by the Third army. A stiff fight for Mainz flared into its third day. The Germans in the Palatinate and Saarland had lost probably well over 100,000 men—88,335 in prisoners alone—and two whole armies in one of the greatest debacles in Prussian military lore.

The U. S. Seventh army sped 28 miles north, passing many positions captured by the Third and forming numerous lineups with the Third army.

Just north of the closing battle of the Palatinate, the First army pushed to the Sieg river at points 12 miles from the Ruhr and 13 of its large industrial centers at Mulheim and Gladbach, east of Cologne.

Nervous German broadcasts and the isolating blows of Allied planes focused attention in the tank country of the German plains north of the Ruhr and the great industrial basin itself, marked for conquest by Gen. Eisenhower. The Wesphalian flatlands lead to Berlin's north door.

Japan Continues
Stern Preparations

Japan, stung by the loss of Iwo, the B-29 fire raids on her cities and the crippling blow dealt the home fleet by carrier planes, considered stern measures today to place the homeland in a state of siege.

"We must either win a victory or we shall all die," said Premier Kuniaki Koiso in urging virtual martial law for all the Nipponese homeland.

He and the war minister, Field Marshal Gen. Sugiyama, predicting the United States would attempt to invade Japan, demanded that the diet pass a measure giving the government unprecedented powers. These would include the expropriation of land and the removal of buildings to set up defenses.

The Koiso cabinet left-handedly acknowledged the terrific destruction dealt by the B-29s by asking the diet to appropriate the equivalent of more than \$1,000,000,000 to pay "first aid expenses to the victims of air raids and other war-time disasters."

JAP SHIP DESTROYED

CANBERRA, Australia, March 22 (AP)—Air Minister A. S. Drakeford announced today that Australian airplanes, based in northwest Australia, destroyed 29 Japanese ships and damaged 32 others in February.

One Of America's Best War Efforts

Frank, now in the Marianas as a Seabee officer, doesn't know whether brother Ray was able to join brothers Art and Paul in Italy — but he does know that Ray

was already in England by the time the letter reached Rhode Island. He was a private first class, is now in a military police battalion, "and probably is in Germany now," Frank believes.

If you are slightly mixed up at this point, think nothing of it. It's even difficult for the four Koerners to keep track of each other. Sister Lucille added to the problem, too, by marrying Noble Robinson who also is upholding the Koerner honors by participating in various Pacific battles.

All five are doing very well. Art proceeded to win a bronze star as an infantryman with an antitank platoon; he's the letter-writing private who was in Italy, remember? Paul the censor in Italy, wore a purple heart, had been given a battlefield promotion from Second to First Lieutenant and been awarded the combat infantry badge and silver star. Since he's acquired another silver star, a DSC, and has become commander of an infantry company.

"Me, I don't have anything except that I've been to some places," remarked Frank. (We peeked behind the curtain where his uniforms hung, and spotted a whole array of ribbons — every thing from Nicaraguan campaigns to good conduct. "I've been in the navy over twelve years — just let it go at that" He advised.)

Today On The Home Front—

President Studies Unploughed Field

By JAMES MARLOW

WASHINGTON, March 21 (AP)—The president has chosen practical an unploughed field for full study; the question of guaranteed wage plans.

WLB recommended to the president that a study be made. The president has given the job to War Mobilizer Byrnes' 12-man advisory board, the same board which only a couple of days ago complained of lack of work.

None of the existing guarantees assures employment for a pro-

longed period. They're limited to the duration of union contracts, are for only one year.

Generally there are two kinds of plans: Those guaranteeing employment and those guaranteeing wages.

Those guaranteeing employment specify the number of weeks or hours of work to be provided employees each year without specifying the amount of earnings to be received.

Those guaranteeing an annual wage assure an employee a weekly income throughout the year re-

gardless of daily or seasonal changes in employment.

This will give an idea of how the plans vary:

Some assure a regular weekly wage for a given number of weeks and a proportion of wages (half-pay) for all, or a specified number of, the remaining weeks.

Some guarantee a certain number of hours or weeks' work a year.

Some assure full pay during weeks of less than full employment but this must be compensated for by extra work during peak seasons with no increase in the weekly pay during these overtime weeks.

Some guarantee a minimum wage to which overtime is added when worked.

Complicated Identity

PITTSBURG, Kas., March 22 (AP)—A man here found an opened pack of cigarettes and was willing—in fact, eager—to return the smokes to the owner—but he wanted to be sure they fell into the right hands.

Refresher Information On Fat Salvage Drive Is Given By Agent

A good many localities in Texas have worked out satisfactory ways to collect waste fat for the war program... while still others need the combined efforts of local groups and the rendering industry to make sure this valuable war product gets into the proper channels.

If you live in a place where butchers are accepting and shipping waste fat, you may need a little refresher information on the subject.

First of all... don't turn in all fat drippings and leftovers indiscriminately. If there are some you can use in home cooking you'll be serving the purpose of the program better by keeping them. For example a homemaker who turns in four pounds of good bacon drippings and then buys a four-pound jar of "shortening" doesn't increase the over-all fat supply. And she's lost money and points as well. Practically all your left-over fat can be saved and used again, unless it's too strong in flavor or scorched.

Now about the salvage program. Dark or "smelly" fats are needed as well as clean fats. And melted down meat trimmings and table scraps should be included. Put these into tin containers for delivery to your butcher. Glass jars may break, and paper containers will leak, so neither of these is acceptable. It's also good to have a lid for your container. Straining the fat to remove bone and pieces of meat is desirable, too.

Your grocer or butcher may pay you four cents per pound, plus two red ration tokens for every pound of waste fat you deliver to him. It's going to take a lot of this kind of deliveries if the nation meets its quota of 250 million pounds of waste fat this year.

Don't Jump Gun By Planting Too Early; Frost May Nip Buds

Gardeners in most of south, east and central Texas may now plant war weather vegetables with little fear of frost catching them. In west Texas it will be best perhaps to wait another thirty days.

Since green beans, tomatoes and other warm weather vegetables cannot stand frost their planting must be carefully timed. If you are not sure when the last killing frost usually visits your part of the state, consult your county agricultural agent.

If the garden plot hasn't been

fertilized, putting down three to five pounds per hundred feet of row space of 4-12-4 or 5-10-5 commercial fertilizer will give quick growth. In planting beans, for example, mark off the row and sprinkle the fertilizer into the furrow. Then chop it into the soil until it cannot be seen easily. If it isn't well fixed with the soil there is some danger of it damaging young plants.

Before planting beans they should be inoculated with nitrogen bacteria. Place the seed in a pint jar, sprinkle a little of the sooty-looking bacteria dust over the surface and shake well. Then plant immediately. The bacteria rust usually may be obtained from seed dealers.

Tomato plants set in April will produce fruit in mid-June, but they require special care. If possible, supply a shovelful of rotted manure where each plant is to grow in order to loosen the soil. In sandy soil areas a teaspoonful of 4-12-4 or 5-10-5 commercial fertilizer may be chopped into the soil where each plant is to be set out. In setting the plants be sure to pack the soil firmly around the roots and then water each. When the water has soaked in pull some more earth around the plants into a cone shape.

To protect against cut worms, wrap the body of the plant with paper so it will extend an inch above the surface and one or two inches below. For a good start, water the young plants each evening for the first week.

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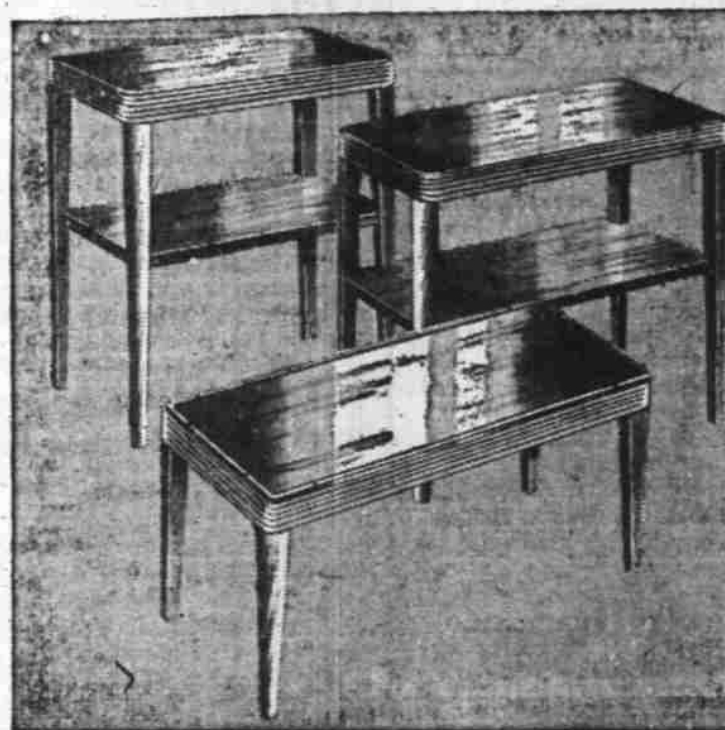
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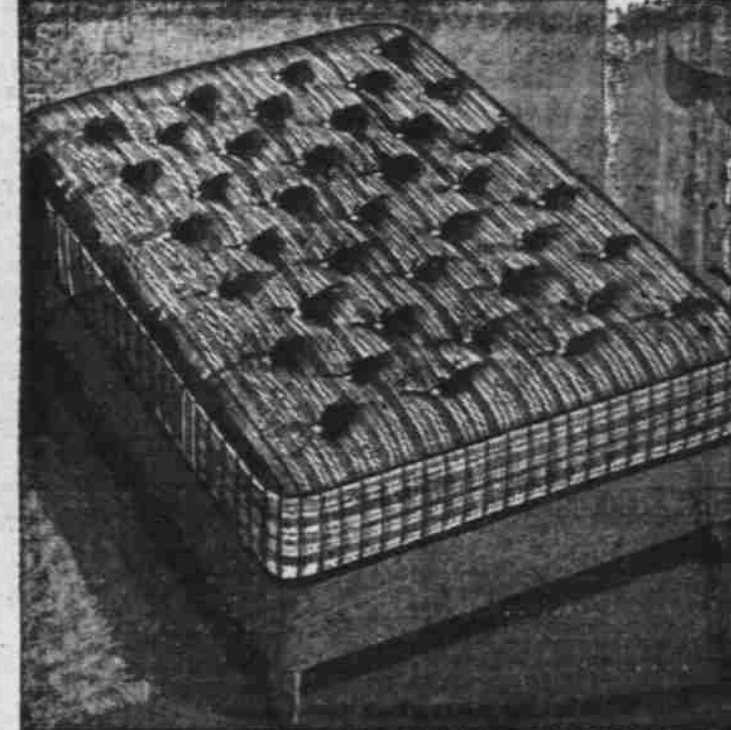

Food Scarcity Reflects Uneven Sales

(Editor's note: This is the third of four stories on food shortages.)

WASHINGTON, March 22 (AP)—Food shortages often reflect an uneven distribution.

Food supplies tend to remain close to the source of production. Normally, it is only when nearby consumers get all they want that supplies move out to areas of lesser production.

This has been true especially in the case of meats and butter, the great bulk of which are produced and processed in the Midwest.

Because of this—and some black marketing—there has been a tendency for a larger and larger portion of the hogs and beef cattle to be bought and slaughtered by small, local plants serving very limited areas.

Large packing plants which normally supply the more distant areas have been getting smaller portions of the meat animals.

The government has had to depend very largely upon the bigger plants to supply the Army and lend-lease and to provide foreign relief. These plants have been forced to cut down on supplies moving to their civilian customers. Officials say that the only way to obtain an even distribution would be to place a policeman on every livestock farm, in every slaughter plant and in every retail store.

Another cause of maldistribution is an understandable attempt

on the part of some processors to favor their better customers. Frequently transportation difficulties cause temporary local shortages.

Government distribution policies for sugar, as well as a wartime decline in the domestic production, have affected supplies of this commodity. Last year the government allowed civilians larger rations, principally for canning. It also increased allowances to industrial users, such as soft-drink makers, bakers and candy makers. These increased allowances, sharply opposed by some government authorities, had the effect of

largely depleting sugar reserves. Now food officials regret their 1944 liberality. They since have reduced allowances for both civilians and industrial users.

Looking backward, it is easy to see now that rationing could have been used more effectively in 1944 to make supplies of present shortage items last longer.

Meats, lard, shortening, other fats (except butter) and some canned foods were taken off the ration list in the spring. They were not returned until late in December, after it became apparent that the war would continue well into 1945.

"But," protested Rockefeller triumphantly, "I'm wearing a suit of my father's right now."

Mr. Rockefeller spent his last years in Florida. Down there they tell a story that one day he went to the dentist to have a tooth pulled. "How much?" he asked in advance. "Three dollars," said the dentist. "Hmph! Three dollars to pull a tooth!" grumbled John D. "Here's a dollar. Loosen it a little bit!"

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Oil Workers Wire Connally Message

FORT WORTH, March 22 (AP)—"At this moment, when we have placed the Good Neighbor policy on a solid foundation as result of the Inter-American conference at Mexico City, it is necessary for our country to demonstrate our willingness to meet our neighbors halfway," O. A. Knight, president of the Oil Workers International Union (CIO) wired Senator Tom Connally (D-Tex.) in urging senate ratification of the U. S.-Mexican water treaty.

The telegram, sent yesterday to Connally, who is chairman of the senate's foreign relations committee, continued:

"High-sounding sentiments on international cooperation will mean nothing if we maintain a dog-in-the-manger attitude on matters of mutual concern to ourselves and our neighbors. The success of the San Francisco conference on the United Nations depends on a genuinely friendly attitude of our country. Ratification of the U. S.-Mexican water treaty will speak volumes on that score."

The treaty would allocate the distribution of water in streams both to the United States and Mexico.

Engineers Set Record In Bridging Rhine

Across The Rhine, March 22 (AP)—First Army Engineers threw one of "several" bridges across the Rhine in the Remagen-Bonn bridgehead in the record time of ten hours, it may be disclosed today.

A Corps Commander bet one engineering unit it could not span the 1,200-foot river within 15 hours. The engineers promptly cut five hours off that estimate and won themselves time for a beer party while infantry and armored units crossed the span.

Texas HD Association Endorses Rural Aid

Dallas, March 22 (AP)—The Board of Directors of The Texas Home Demonstration Association has endorsed a bill under consideration by the House of Representatives which would enable rural communities to establish co-operative hospitals and provide prepaid medical service.

The board in a meeting here yesterday cancelled the 20th annual meeting of the Association, an organization of 40,000 rural women, in a move in line with the government's ban on wartime conventions.

Speculation Arises Of Kesselring's Job

With U. S. Ninth Army, March 22 (AP)—Speculation rose in Allied lines on the Western front today that Field Marshal Albert Kesselring might have been transferred from northern Italy to take command of German armies in the West, succeeding Field Marshal Von Rundstedt.

Kesselring is reported now to be in Hitler's graces as a result of his long delaying campaign in Italy and his prompt declaration of allegiance to Hitler after last July's bomb plot.

NIMITZ'S NEPHEW IN SERVICE

SAN ANTONIO, March 22 (AP)—Adm. Chester W. Nimitz' nephew, Robert Lewis Reagan, 17, has enlisted in the Marine Corps. Reagan was sworn in yesterday at the marine recruiting and induction station here.

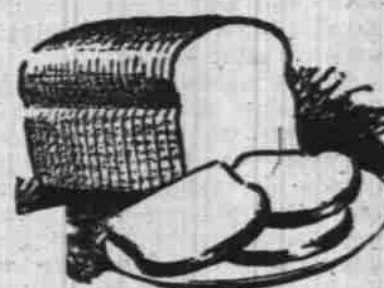

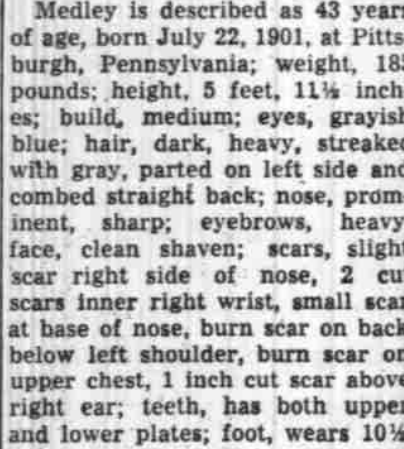

FBI Searches For Joseph Medley On Charge Of Murder

Dean R. Morley, special agent in charge, Dallas Federal Bureau of Investigation, today announced a nation-wide manhunt looking for the arrest of Joseph D. Medley. C. charging him with fleeing from the District of Columbia to avoid prosecution for the crime of murder. He is sought for the brutal murder on March 6, 1945, of Mrs. Nancy Boyer, who was killed



by being shot twice through the head. He is also wanted for leaving the custody of a guard of the state prison at Jackson, Michigan, on November 27, 1944, where he was serving a sentence for armed robbery. Medley is reported to have two revolvers in his possession.

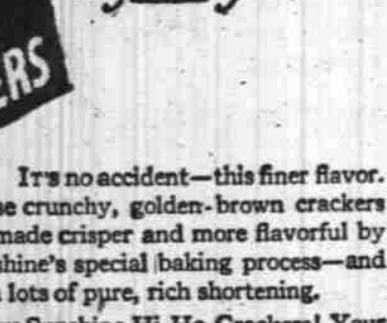

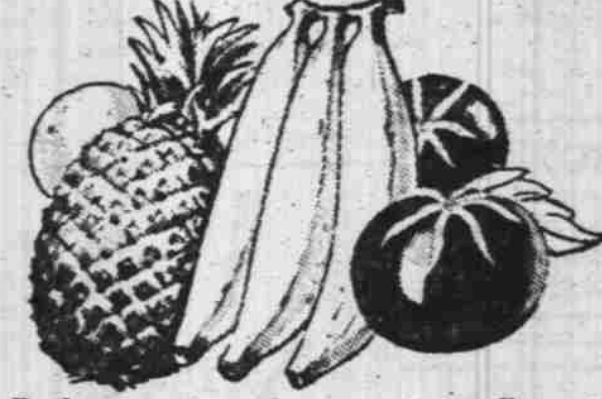

A chart showing all food ration stamps now good for consumer use lists the sugar stamp and all canned foods and meat-fat stamps now in use. Five new red stamps, worth 10 points each for a total of 50 red points, were validated for the March rationing period. The new red stamps are E2, F2, G2, H2, and J2. They are good from March 4 through June 30. The five new blue stamps, also worth 10 points each, are N2, P2, Q2, R2, and S2. They remain good from March 1 through June 30. Additional red and blue stamps will become good on April 1. The chart shows how the red and blue stamps overlap, with four sets of each valid during each rationing period. Each set is good for about four months, the first set going out of use when the fifth becomes good. Only one sugar stamp, No. 35, is now good. It came into use February 1 and will be good through June 2. It overlapped the previous sugar stamp, No. 34, for one month. (Sugar stamp 34 was good for consumer use from November 16 through February 28). Another sugar stamp will become good on May 1.

Commander Of Group Praises Sgt. J. E. Parker

Sgt. J. E. Parker, assigned to the 309th engineers of the famous 84th (Railsplitter) division, has sent home a letter of commendation to members of the division from Maj. Gen. A. R. Bolling, commanding.

Like other Railsplitters, he is proud of the letter in which Gen. Bolling recounted how the men broke through at Gellenkirchen, Beeck, Worms and Lindern to breach the Siegfried line; when they turned the advance of the German counteroffensive at Ardennes, how they crossed the Roer river and broke through German lines to advance 42 miles in five days through heaviest fighting.

Approaching the river, the division turned north and pushed another nine miles and amazed even the general by asking to push on and for authority to cross the river even "after long, hard, grueling days and cold, sleepless nights." He observed, "You men can accomplish anything you set out to do."

Sgt. Parker enlisted in Dec. 1943, trained at Camp Howze, Camp Claiborne and went overseas in Oct. 1944. Before his entry into service he was a carpenter. Mrs. Parker is staying here with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. C. Tucker, 210 North W. 4th.

Legislation To Aid Big Horn Sheep Before Texas Lawmaker Body

AUSTIN, March 22 (AP)—Legislation to aid the dwindling herd of Texas big horn sheep in their fight for survival is making progress.

The house last night passed a measure providing for a game preserve in Hudspeth and Culberson counties, and the Senate finance committee has recommended a similar bill for passage.

The Game, Fish and Oyster Commission, with some state and some federal funds, is seeking to establish a preserve in a habitat best suited to the big horns and staff it with a conservationist qualified to aid the project.

The plan is to fence the area and prevent the big horns from coming in contact with domestic sheep, whose diseases they are subjected to. Inroads of domestic sheep on pastures would also be prevented.

The stock of big horns has steadily diminished from untold thousands, to a few hundred.

There will be other matched ropings and jackpot ropings.

Prince Juan Visits Generalissimo Franco

LAUSANNE, Switzerland, March 22 (AP)—Prince Juan, son of former King Alfonso and heir to the now non-existent throne of Spain, called upon Francisco Franco today to resign and leave the way open for "establishment of peace and concord among all Spaniards."

In a statement given to the Associated Press recalling the sixth anniversary of the end of the Spanish civil war, the prince, Count of Barcelona, declared that restoration of the monarchy "alone can provide an effective guarantee for religion, order and liberty."

Government subsidies on meat, butter and flour, intended to keep down the cost of living, have already amounted to \$863,000,000.

More Peace Rumors

"No representations of any kind have been made to me, either directly or indirectly," Gray was quoted.

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Editorial

Principle Is At Stake

Without going into the merits or demerits of the midnight curfew, the action of Mayor LaGuardia of New York in arbitrarily establishing an hour of "tolerance" in his city is an unhappy action.

It makes no difference if the ban applied to sale of peanuts or to the operation of night clubs, it is a federal stipulation. Although there has been a decided controversy about it, the fact remains that it still is a federal regulation.

How then can one city openly set it aside and substitute a closing time of its own through the dubious device of an hour of tolerance. It even lacks the dignity of open defiance by going the subversive way of fudging.

The principle of a thing rather than the regulation itself is at stake here. If Mayor LaGuardia gets away with it for the benefit of his constituents, to whom he must look for re-election of course, then what is there to prevent any city in the nation from doing the same thing, or from adding two or three hours of tolerance instead of one? And if this regulation is so circumvented, what is there to stem the tide as pertains to most any regulation?

A Practical View

With a single speech, Commander Harold E. Stassen has shown himself the most promising heir to the mantle of Wendell Willkie. In his radio address at Minneapolis, the former Governor of Minnesota displayed the same vision of "one world" and the same courage to put forward a specific program for realizing the vision.

It would be misleading to see him as a Willkie imitator. Commander Stassen has long had a clear-cut forward-looking international program. But his two years in the navy appears to have strengthened his perception of the necessity for a strong and vital world peace organization.

Some reaction in Washington indicates that other leaders are uneasy about such a bold stand . . . but if we rightly interpret his purpose now, he will support the best charter on which agreement can be obtained at San Francisco, and then go on striving to make something better feasible.

But he really believes that a strong peace organization is more practical than a weak one, and that it is necessary to "raise a definite standard that will appeal to the best that is in man."

The Stassen view that there must be a "new and higher level of government" to care for the things that nationalism leaves to anarchy is just as practical as the fact that nature abhors a vacuum. It is as realistic as the radios, airplanes and rockets that have shrunk the world. His statements that tariffs

The whirlwind conquest of the Saarland and Palatinate by the U.S. Third and Seventh armies under that grand team—Generals Patton and Patch—represents one of the major victories of the war and one which is likely to precipitate the trans-Rhenish invasion of the great Ruhr industrial center by Allied forces north of Cologne.

Supreme Allied headquarters tell us that the German hold on the Saar-Palatinate area west of the Rhine has been reduced to "little more than a bridgehead." This means that the Patton-Patch combination has nullified any German menace to the Allied right flank west of the Rhine and thus has removed what may be the last obstacle to the eagerly awaited invasion of the Ruhr by the Allied left, or northern, flank.

One finds no argument against the belief expressed by the German radio that Field Marshal Montgomery's command is about to cross the Rhine. The radio also thinks air-borne troops will be employed—sounds wholly reasonable. Meanwhile hundreds of thousands of terrified German civilians are fleeing in panic from the doomed Ruhr, tying Nazi military operations in knots.

But the Saar-Palatinate victory reaches much further than that. It has disrupted two German armies—the First and Seventh—and inflicted casualties which are expected to run beyond the 100,000 mark. That is a more terrible loss to the crippled Nazi fighting machine at this critical juncture than several hundred thousand casualties would have been early in the war.

The Hitlerites just haven't the troops to defend the long battle front of the Rhine. There will be fierce fighting, but they can't stop us now from swarming across the last great barrier to the heart of the reich.

"I saw this fellow with his head stuck up over a hedgerow," recalled Martino, who obtained wide acclaim when one of Boyle's columns last fall described how he single-handedly killed or captured some 20-odd Germans in France.

"I went over to him and I said 'keep your head down if you want to live,'" related Martino in telling of his first encounter with Boyle, "and he turns around to me and says 'whose life is it—yours or mine?'"

"So I told him 'if you want to commit suicide, go ahead.' That's how I knew he was a reporter."

Martino, telling about Boyle while spending a furlough at his home here, called the Missouri newspaperman "a rough customer."

"Just like he was always dirty," said Boyle, a GI, Martino said. "He

The Colonial Question

By WALTER LIPPMAN

Colonial questions were discussed at Yalta, exchanges of views are now under way, and the San Francisco conference will have to take decisions about them. They are complex and explosive questions, and in our own approach to them we must make very sure that we really know what we mean, and that we mean what we say. For this we can do no better than ask ourselves what are our own American ideals and policies in regard to territories and peoples which are not self-governing.

We are ourselves a colonial power, and it is as a colonial power that we have to approach this problem with our allies in the United Nations. Moreover, we cannot afford to take the view that our treatment of the Philippine Islands is a model, which exhibits all our ideals and principles about colonial territories. We have no intention, for example, of dealing with Alaska as we have dealt with the Philippines, nor with the Hawaiian Islands as we shall wish to deal with either Alaska or the Philippines, or with the Panama Canal Zone or with Puerto Rico or with the Virgin Islands. Merely to name the territories which are under the American flag and are not now self-governing is to realize at once that there is no general formula which we, or any one else, can agree to.

In examining colonial questions with other nations we shall understand them better, and they will understand us better, if we do not make the assumption, now current, that the only right solution is to do what we are doing in the Philippines: that is, to prepare the colonial people for self-government, grant them independence, set them up as a new sovereign state, and then clear out. Alaska reminds us that there is another solution which, when it is feasible, is morally as desirable, perhaps more so. It is the solution which the Continental Congress formulated for the territory north of the Ohio and which—adapted into the Constitution—determined the future of the whole continental territory west of the boundaries of the original thirteen states. This

is to admit new states into the Union on a basis of full equality. Independence, as in the case of the Philippines, is one solution. Eventual admission into the Union, as in the case of Alaska, is another. Who is prepared to say whether either of these solutions is the ideally right one for Puerto Rico? And no one will be prepared to say that either solution is the right one for the Canal Zone.

Our own colonial empire, though a small one, is, therefore, exceedingly complex. Yet it is fairly simple as compared with a great structure like the British Commonwealth and Empire, or with that of the French Empire. We have to bear this in mind when we go to San Francisco intending, if that is our intention, to propose a declaration of ideals on the government of dependent peoples. For any declaration we sponsor must fit our own ideals and practice in the Philippines, in Alaska, in Puerto Rico, in the Canal Zone, in Guam, and in the Virgin Islands. I doubt whether the mind of man is capable of composing a declaration which covers all these specific colonial territories.

Does this mean that the world organization should not be concerned with colonial problems? Not at all. But it does mean, I believe, that we should be very chary indeed of proposing great generalizations which cannot be applied to all the particular cases, that we should not introduce into the Dumbarton Oaks charter legislation on colonial affairs, but should regard it strictly as a constitution which grants to the United Nations limited power to create organs of consultation.

The colonial policy of the United States, which governed the settlement of the whole continent, is stated in Article IV, Section 3 of the Constitution. It is ten lines long, and its language is austere and dry. Let us use its style, rather than the grandiose ambiguities of the Atlantic Charter, for our model.

There are two compelling reasons, it seems to me, for thinking that the San Francisco conference should not try to settle and solve.

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or give the world the impression it would like to settle and solve, the colonial questions of this earth. The first is that while all enlightened men must insist on the moral principle that a power which governs dependent people is accountable to the conscience of mankind, that is quite a different thing from saying that it would be feasible or wise to make it legally accountable to the membership of the United Nations. It just is not in the cards to make the Governor of Alaska, the Governor General of Bermuda or the Governor of Tunis legally answerable to an assembly in which Saudi Arabia, Iraq, Iran, Liberia, Ethiopia, Dominica, Haiti, sit as sovereign judges. It would be a mistake to try.

A second reason why San Francisco should not legislate is that before there can be a proper settlement even of colonial territory lost by Germany in the last war, it will be necessary to negotiate security pacts in the Atlantic, the Mediterranean, and the Pacific. What should be done with Pantelleria, for example, cannot be determined intelligently until Britain, France and the United States know where they stand with respect to one another on all sea and air bases in the Atlantic Ocean. What should be done with the islands in the Pacific cannot be determined until there is among all the powers concerned a specific security agreement for the Pacific. These security agreements will have to be co-ordinated with the United Nations organization as a whole. But they cannot be made by it.

Crew Duties On An Aircraft Carrier

IN THE WESTERN PACIFIC, (Delayed)—The men aboard an aircraft carrier could be divided, for purposes of clarity, into three groups.

There are the fliers, both officer-pilots and enlisted radiomen and gunners, who actually fly in combat. They do nothing but fly, and study, and prepare to fly.

Then there are the men who maintain the fliers. The air officers, and the mechanics and the myriads of plane handlers who shift and push and manhandle the planes a dozen times a day around the deck.

These men are ordinarily known as "Airdales," but the term isn't much used on our ship. Usually they just call themselves "plane-pushers."

And third is the ship's crew—the deck hands, engineers, signalmen, cooks, plumbers and barbers. They run the ship, just as though it were any ship in the Navy.

The fliers aren't looked upon as Gods by the rest of the crew, but they are respected. Hardly a man on the crew would trade places with them. They've seen enough crash-landings on deck to know what the fliers go through.

But there is a feeling—a slight one—between the ship's regular crew and the air maintenance crew. The feeling is on the part of the ship's crew. They feel that the plane-handlers think they're prima donnas.

They say to you "Them Airdales is the ones that gets all the glory. Nobody ever hears about us. All we do is keep the damn ship going."

But as far as I can see, the Airdales haven't had an awful lot of glory. And their job is often a miserable one. Their hours are ungodly, and in the pinches they work like fiends. I think the Airdale deserves what little credit he gets.

It is these "plane-pushers" who make the flight deck of an aircraft carrier look as gay and wildly colorful as a Walt Disney cartoon. For they dress in bright colors.

They wear cloth helmets and sweaters that are blue, green, red, yellow, white or brown. They make the flight deck look like a flower garden in June.

This colorful gear isn't just a whim. Each color identifies a special type of workman, so they can be picked out quickly and sent on hurried tasks.

Red is the gasoline and fire-fighting detail. Blue is for the guys who just push the planes around. Brown is for plane captains and mechanics. White stands for radiomen and the engineering bosses. Yellow is for the plane directors.

Yellow is what a pilot looks for the moment he gets on deck. For the plane directors guide him as though they were leading a blind man. They use a sign language with signs explicitly, the pilot can taxi his plane within two inches of another one without ever looking at it.

The pilot circled around it and radioed in, asking permission to land. When the permission came back, he sent another message, facetiously inquiring: "Which runway?"

Our pilots and crew are quite proud that we have the narrowest flight deck in existence. They're proud they can even hit the damn thing. They enjoy telling this story, as an illustration—

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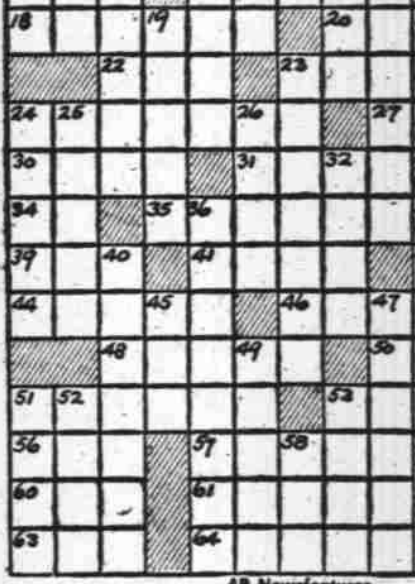

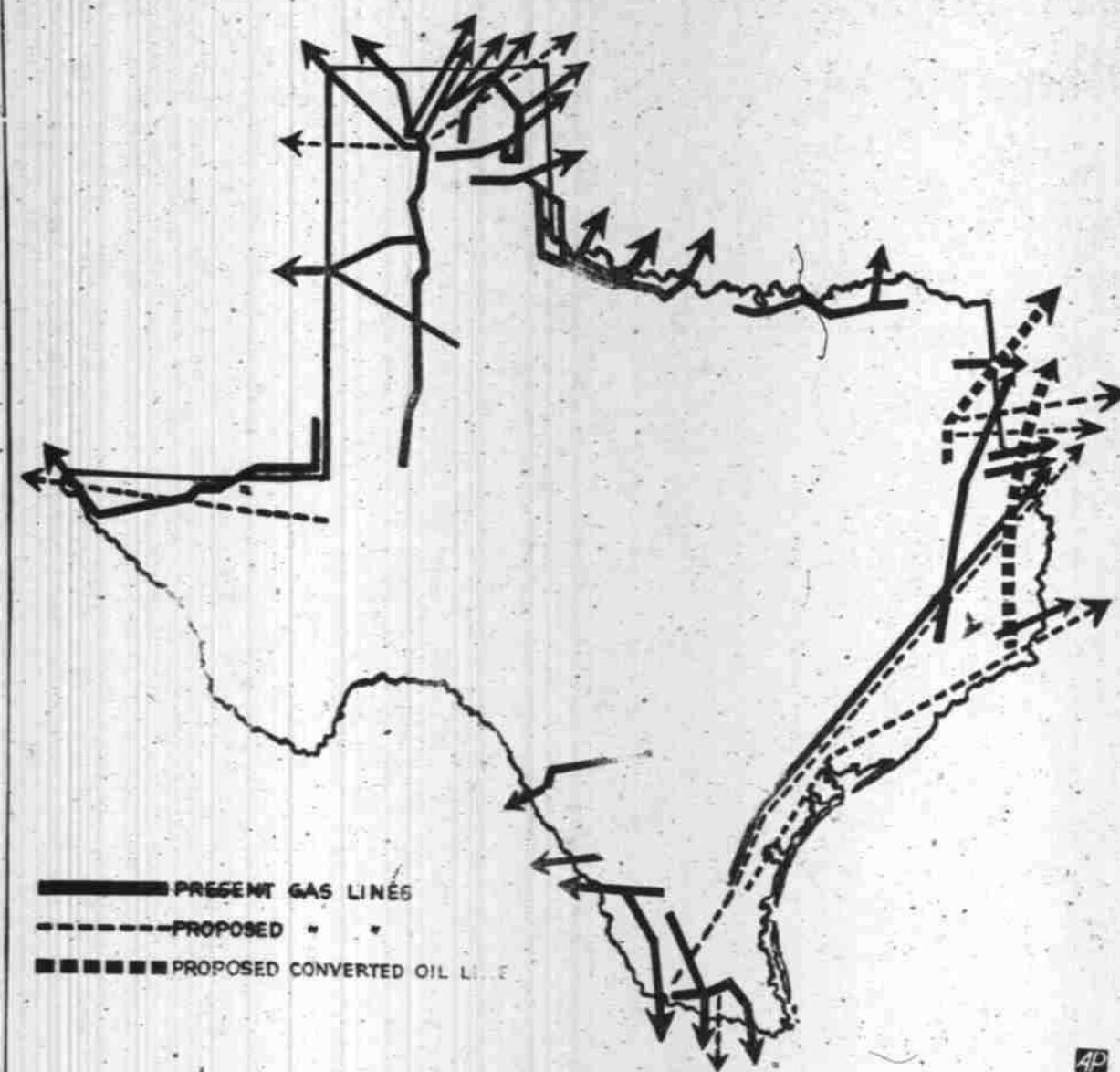
