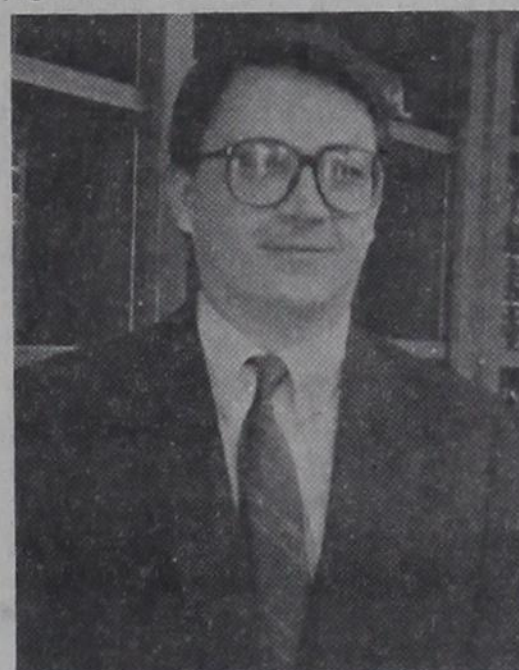

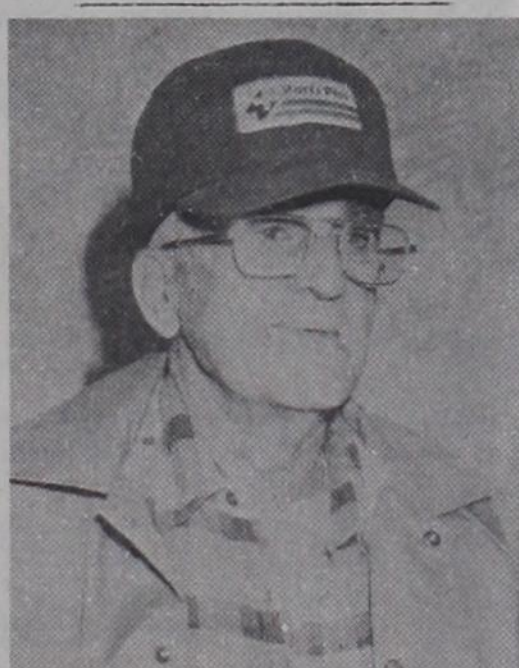

A house fire just three days before Christmas killed a young brother and sister in northeast Amarillo.

The Amarillo Fire Department responded with four units to the 11:42 p.m. Friday blaze at 3829 Pinon Ave., and found the house fully charged with smoke. They stayed on the scene in subfreezing weather until the pre-dawn hours, Amarillo Fire Marshal J. Greg Taylor, said.

Tracy Case, 5, and her brother, Stacy Lynn Case, 7, died in the fire from smoke inhalation, Taylor said. Their mother, Gloria Case, 26, was taken to Amarillo Emergency Receiving Center where she was in critical condition late Saturday, a nursing supervisor said.

Taylor said the blaze started in a sofa located in a garage that had been converted to a den. The den was located at the opposite end of the house from the bedrooms.

When firefighters arrived, they noticed no flames showing from the residence. After they started making their rescue attempt, though, oxygen fanned flames that started to show from the outside, he said.

Firefighters first found Mrs. Case on the hallway floor, and then the children on the floor of separate bedrooms, the fire marshal said.

Officials discovered Tracy dead at the scene; Stacey died a short while later at AERC, Taylor said.

The children's father, Stacy Case, was away at work when the fire erupted, officials said.

"It was a long smoldering fire, and damage was confined to the den area and one can assume that a discarded cigarette in a cushion could have

Emergency Farm Loan Applications Accepted

Emergency Farm Applications being accepted in Wheeler County.

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by drought conditions which occurred January 1, 1989, through June 1, 1989, and freeze conditions which occurred February and March of 1989, and hail which occurred between June 1, and July 15, 1989, are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Wheeler, Texas, FmHA County Supervisor John D. Wolf III said today.

Hemphill County is one of several in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Clayton Yeutter as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the drought, freeze and hail.

Wolf said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loans needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate if 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan", the supervisor said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance programs will have to figure in

From The Minister's Desk:

The first day of January marks the beginning of a new year. It is appropriate that a new year begins in January because the month is named after the Roman God, Janus, who was depicted as a man with two face. One face looked to the past, expressing sorrow and regret. But the other face looked to the future, expressing hope and confidence.

At the beginning of 1990, there are too many people like Janus. These people look forward to the new year, but their anticipation is dimmed by a backward glance. Moping over the past, the enthusiasm of these people for the new year is greatly diminished.

My advice to these people is relatively simple. Become a New Testament Christian! The New Testament plainly teaches that through an obedient faith in Jesus Christ the sins of the past can be forgiven. Ephesians 1:7-8 says: "In Him we have redemption through His blood, the forgiveness of our trespasses, according to the riches of His grace, which he lavished upon us." The forgiveness of sins has been generously provided through the death of Jesus.

And the New Testament also teaches that the forgiveness of sins is final. The eighth chapter of Hebrews contains a quotation from

Jeremiah who recorded that God has promised: "...I will be merciful to their iniquities, and I will remember their sins no more." (Jeremiah 31:34, Hebrews 8:12) God does not hold grudges! Rather He completely forgives the sins of those people who have an obedient faith in Jesus Christ.

Because of this promise, Christians should have the same attitude about the past that the Apostle Paul had. He clearly stated this attitude when he said: "...I do not regard myself as having laid hold of it yet; but one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and reaching forward to what lies ahead, I press on toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus!" (Philippians 3:13-14)

Notice that he said: "...forgetting what lies behind and reaching forward to what lies ahead..." This is the attitude that Christians can have about the new year of 1990 because God has forgiven and forgotten their past sins.

For this reason, Christians are not like the Roman God, Janus. They only look "...forward to what lies ahead..." looking at the future with hope and confidence.

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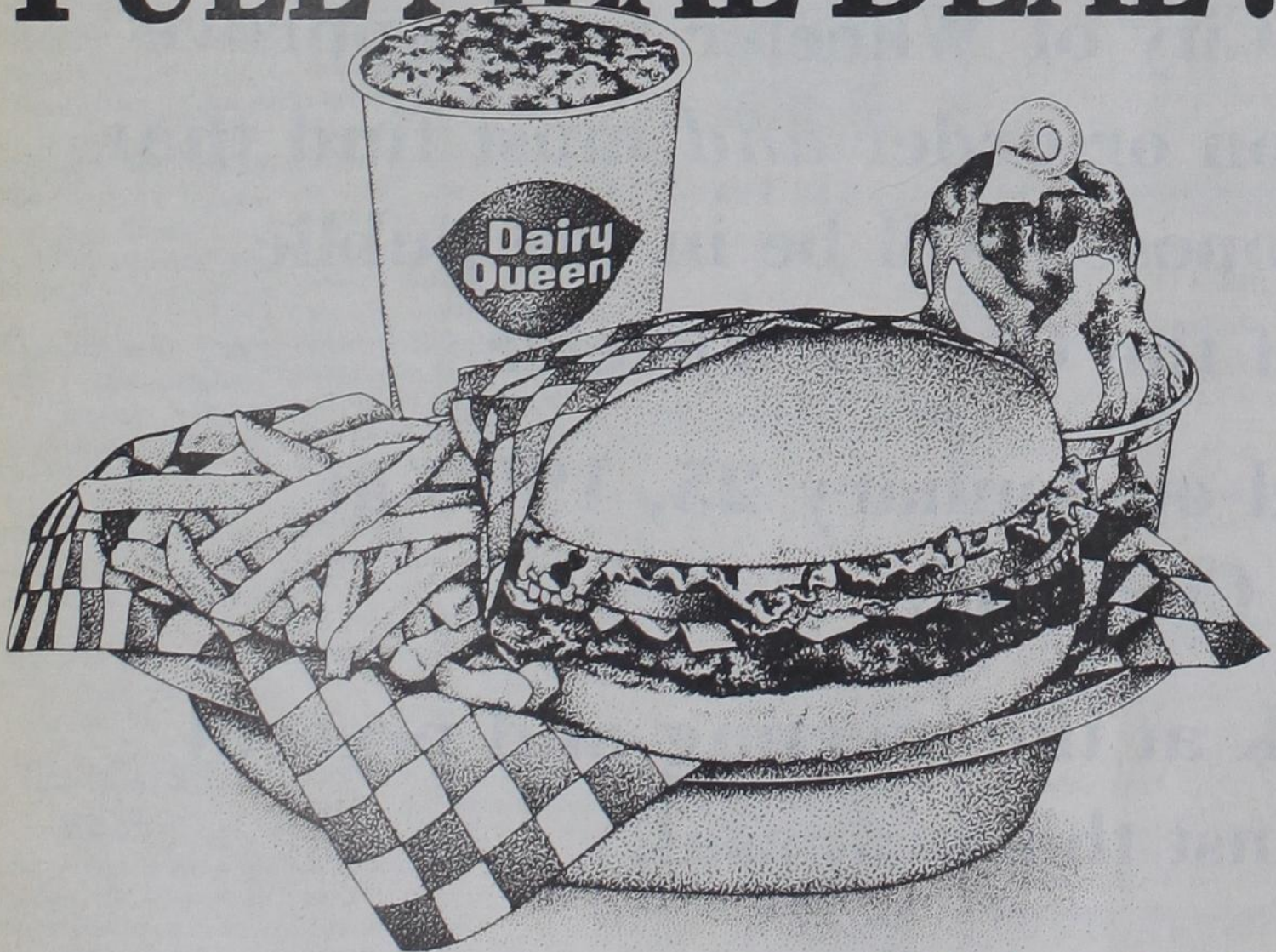

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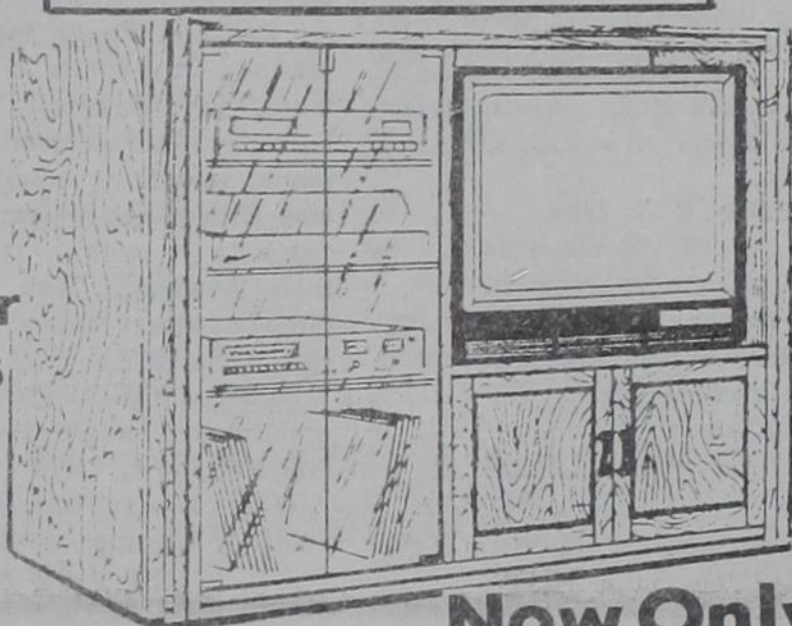
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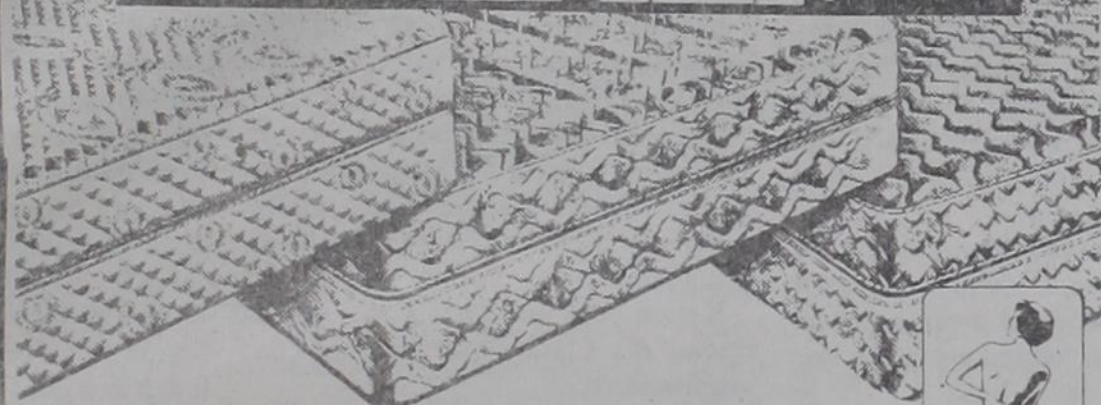

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had no smoke detectors," Taylor said.

Taylor said it takes a long time for smoke to fill a house from the ceiling to the floor, where the children were found.

"We don't know if a \$10 smoke detector could have saved their lives, but it certainly could have improved their chances of living," Taylor said.

"Officials really harp on holiday fire safety with Christmas trees around homes. But this was a common fire cause, and could have been prevented," he said.

Taylor said minimum standards ask for at least one smoke detector positioned outside the sleeping area. "That may have helped avert the loss of lives," he said.

The fire marshall explained that, nationwide, about 85 percent of homes have smoke detectors, but only 80 percent of those detectors really work.

"A lot of that is because of lack of maintenance, where the units are not clean, or because the batteries don't work," Taylor said.

"A \$10 investment is cheap," he said.
